Library Headquarters Remain in Lismore

The Libraries headquarters in Lismore will not be transferred to Dungarvan. This news was finally revealed at a meeting of Waterford County Council on Monday when a letter from the Director of the Library Council of Ireland was read. The letter stated that they were now in agreement with leaving the library headquarters in Lismore and they hoped the County Council would go ahead and provide new branch libraries in Dungarvan and Tramore.

Mr. H. R. Dowd then pro-

posed and Mr. Norman Walsh seconded that they borrow £10,500 from the local loans fund and that it be spent as follows: £5,000 for Dungarvan; £2,500 for Tramore; £3,000 for development of Lismore, plus Government grants of £5,000 for Dungarvan and £2,500 for Tramore.

Mr. Dowd then thanked all the Council members who had supported the retention of the Library headquarters in the town. They had shown extraordinary patience in this and he assured them that the people of Lismore appreciated.

Selling of Portlaw Site

Departmental sanction has been received by County Waterford Vocation Education Committee to sell a half-acre site in Portlaw. The Committee bought the site in 1939 for £100.

At last week's monthly meeting of the Committee, Mr. F. Roche said that the Muintir na Tire

guild in Portlaw intended building a hall and they were interested in the site. They asked him to put up a case for them to the Committee.

Mr. Wm. Dower said he thought it was the feeling of the Committee that the Muintir na Tire get the site.

Mr. Norman Walsh said they were dealing with public money and they were both honour bound and duty bound to advertise the site for auction. That would be the more business like approach to it and it would also leave them free of embarrassment later on.

Roadworkers not to be let go

In our report of last week on the meeting of Waterford County Council, in which reference was made to the Council's financial position, we quoted the County Engineer, Mr. J. D. Hally, as saying that one of three alternatives would be to let roadworkers go.

This in fact was incorrect. What Mr. Hally said was that one of three alternatives would be to let some of the men on cottage erection — not roadworkers — go.

However, Mr. Hally also wishes to stress that he has no desire to see any workers of the Council become redundant. He assures us in fact that this is the last thing he wishes to see happening.

The Chairman, Ven. Archbishop D. Power, P.P., said they would like to convene the Muintir na Tire but he agree with the views of Mr. Walsh. They should try and get the market value for the site and that would be got by a public sale.

Mr. Walsh said that when he saw this coming out of the blue at a previous meeting he knew there was something behind it. If the Muintir na Tire approached them in the proper manner it would be a different story.

Finally it was decided to adjourn it for one month.

OUR NEW BISHOP



HIS HOLINESS POPE PAUL VI has appointed Rev. Michael Russell, B.D., D.C.L., of the Archdiocese of Cashel, to be Bishop of Waterford and Lismore in succession to the late Most Rev. Daniel Cohalan, who died on January 27 last. The Bishop-elect is aged 44 and a native of Loughmore, in Co. Tipperary. He is the youngest member of the Irish Hierarchy.

He was educated at C.B.S., Thurles, and then at St. Patrick's College, Maynooth, where he was ordained in 1945. During the course of his studies, Dr. Russell obtained the B.A. in Ancient Classics with 1st Class Honours, the B.D. and the Doctorate in Canon Law.

All Dr. Russell's priestly service has been in the Archdiocese of Cashel, where he has gained wide and valuable experience. Since 1949 he has been Professor of Moral Theology and Sacred Eloquence at St. Patrick's College, Thurles. For some years he was also Dean of Discipline of the College and is at present the Vice-President. In addition, he is Chancellor of the Archdiocese Curia and Secretary to His Grace the Archbishop of Cashel.

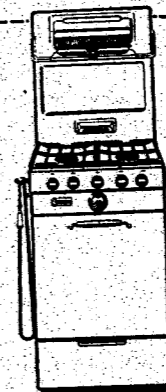

Farmers Incomes Down £8m.

Farmers' incomes will be down by £8,000,000 this year! This is the dismal result of the most recent estimate prepared by the Economics Section of N.F.A. How the position has changed since the spring of this year when the Department of Finance shatered any chance of obtaining benefits in the Budget by bringing out a forecast, which showed a quite blantly that there would be an increase of £12 million in farmers' incomes this year. At the same time N.F.A. was trying to hammer home to the Department of Agriculture that there would be a drop of £2 million in income—a figure that has now been accepted as much too conservative. Conservative now; but at that time it was being cited as "a typical N.F.A. overstatement of the case".

In arriving at their figures the experts in the Department of Finance completely ignored the costs factor—as if it had no bearing on incomes. This cost factor will account for over £8,000,000 of the £8,000,000 drop in incomes. The remaining £15 million is in the field of output.

It is interesting to have a look at some of the details in the revised NFA Estimate. In the cost section it can be seen that seed, feed and fertilisers have gone up by a whopping £27.5 million in 1964. (No wonder N.F.A. is seeking public inquiry under the prices Act.) Other expenses (exclud-

Louth's Galway listener can only be described as slightly ridiculous.

In the case of beet, N.F.A. holds exactly the same views. N.F.A. wants to see the present acreage first of all maintained and then improved upon, but this can only happen in the context of the farmer getting a fair reward for his labour. It should be noted that N.F.A. is not the negotiating body for beet growers.

The Irish Beet-growers' Association in accordance with its agreement with N.F.A. fills that function. For this reason it does seem a little high-handed to be branding N.F.A. as the "culprits" in this field.

In fact, the senior officials of the Irish Sugar Company should have little difficulty in recalling the effort put in by N.F.A. some eight years ago when beet acreage was also then carried out a campaign, in which both voluntary, officers and staff men participated to boost the growing of beet in the West. There has been no change of heart or of policy in the organisation since.

Those who doubt NFA thinking in regard to large crops should have a glance through the Association's Green Book. In the section dealing with potatoes, paragraph 205 reads: "The potato crop has a high labour input. A remunerative market outlet would provide the incentive for intensified production in the average family farm. Problems relative to soil, climate and labour are few. Problems relative to marketing are not insurmountable."

Paragraph 212 reads: "The development of the Comhul Siucra Eireann Teo., potato enterprises, coupled with contract growing and guaranteed economic prices to the producer, should provide an expanding outlet."

Again in May of this year the N.F.A. National Council addressed five direct questions to the Government, one of which was: "What incentive is the Government going to provide to develop horticulture, cash crops and expand agricultural employment and when?"

These statements should indicate that far from being indifferent to the drop in tillage in the country, N.F.A. has numbered its development among all its policies and negotiations with the Government.

The Association will continue along this line but as the farmers' organisation it will also continue to demand that the producer gets a fair return for his labour. The Association is always ready and willing to participate in negotiations with any firm or company in achieving the objective of increased production.

There were, of course, the few sceptics but generally the N.F.A. National Scheme for small farm businesses has had a terrific reception throughout the country. Doubts as to the success of the scheme revolve around such matters as full farmer participation and enthusiastic Government support. The former is the old bogey which has always plagued in whenever a progressive scheme is mooted. We hear it too often. The latter point is one where

we can only wait and see. We give it a thumbs up, a cross section of some of the most progressive farmers in the Irish independent states in the policy document issued by the National Farmers' Association. The document is an excellent contribution to the important question of the NFA's role in the future of the farm. It is a document of a size (less than 25 pages) which, with proper attention, be made a very useful guide to the farmer. It is a document which should be read by every farmer who takes the time to study the plan. In drawing up this small farm plan, the N.F.A. have done a very good job.

Norman Hicks, writing in the British Farmers' Weekly, said "Ireland is a fascinating country—to the tourist, the historian, the sociologist, and the economist. What beautiful pictures remain! holiday-makers bring back with them of remote homesteads in Connemara and Donegal. But to the economist with imagination, how vividly another aspect of the same picture—of centuries of neglect, starvation and despair—is painted by some of the statistics which the National Farmers' Association has compiled to support their proposals for a national "Small Farm Business" scheme.

Coming so soon after the publication of the M.B.'s report on the structure of our dairy industry, the analysis of Irish farm structure which the NFA has prepared is startling."

Paddy Donnelly, the County Kildare C.A.O. said on television that it would be foolhardy of the Government not to accept the scheme. The targets for production set in it were very reasonable and if anything erred on the low side. The total amount of money involved was very small particularly when one remembered that in the initial year or two it would be a mere pittance. He felt to see how the scheme could be ignored by anyone interested in increasing production.

Michael Dillon writing in The Irish Times said: "It is encouraging to read a statement submitted by the farmers for their own industry which faces the problems in a realistic manner. This is what the new national scheme for small farm businesses does. The approach is not that the country owes the farmer a living but rather that the farmer is entitled to be put in a position to make a living for himself out of his own land by

his own efforts. That is not unreasonable."

Jim Donohoe said this in any in the Irish Independent. "It is one of the most impressive pieces of work which has come from the Association for a long time and it is a very good job. It is a document which should be read by every farmer who takes the time to study the plan. In drawing up this small farm plan, the N.F.A. have done a very good job."

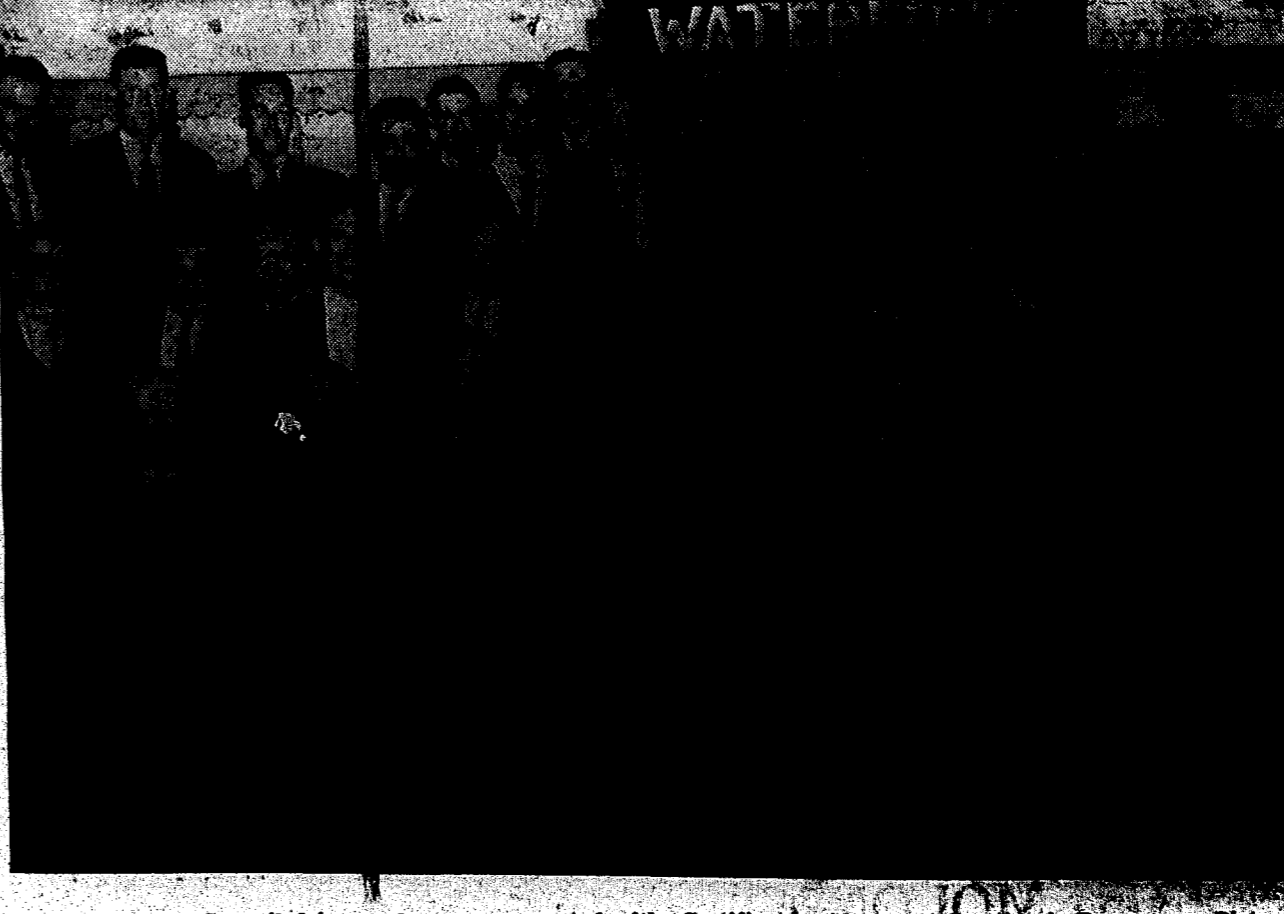

SALMON FISHERMEN PERTURBED

The Youghal Fishermen's Association is very much perturbed at the delay of the Fisheries Department in Dublin in making known the Minister's decision with regard to the use of monofilament drift nets which were prohibited by order of the Minister in May of this year. In this matter public inquiries were held in the various fishery districts last August, when it was stated that the findings would be known at least four months before the opening of the 1966 season. According to local fishermen, it is now too late for ordering nets for next year, and they have asked the Department of Fisheries to speed up the matter.

Gurly, C.S., Youghal reported the matter to Collins Barracks, Cork, and an expert identified the object as a marine marker. He rendered the cylinder safe and later stated it could be most dangerous if interfered with by unauthorised persons.

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WHY THE SACRIFICE OF 1916?

The ordinary Irishman who wishes to commemorate the 1916 Rising in a practical and positive way, will find no better way of doing so, than by wearing the Fainne Nua." So said Dr. Seán O Tuama, lecturer in Irish at U.C.C., when he spoke at the presentation of An Fainne Nua in Lawlor's Hotel, Dungarvan.

Present on the occasion was the largest ever gathering in support of the Irish language in west Waterford. Representing sporting, cultural and administrative of the area's religious, fraternal life present included: Rev. M. Wall, C.C.; Pdraig O Conaire, C.A.O.; An tAth. B. O Ciohthaigh, O.S.A.; Dr. Ann Casey; Mr. J. Moloney and Mr. Mr. D. Good, Chairman and Secretary, Waterford Co. Board G.A.A.; Mr. E. Power, D. O Faolain and A. Flynn, Waterford inter-county hurlers; Rev. Mr. O Murchu, Principal, C.B.S. Dungarvan; Mr. P. Walsh, vice-chairman, Dungarvan U.D.C.; Mr. J. Hally, Co. Engineer; Mr. J. Dowling, Secretary, Waterford Co. Council; Mr. S. O Luasra, C.E.O., Waterford Vocational Education Committee; Mr. J. Hynes, Secretary, Waterford Health Authority, and many more, including a large representation from the Gaeltacht area.

SURVEY

Dr. O Tuama recalled that some time ago, a survey carried out by Irish Marketing Surveys revealed that between 75% and 80% of the people of Ireland would like to see Irish spoken generally in the country again. A similar survey made in 1916 would surely, he suggested, have shown a majority of the people against restoring the language.

If during 1966 the great number of people who were now well disposed towards Irish, took to wearing the Fainne Nua a new and rapid improvement in the language position should result. He urged, in particular that employees of shops, stores, companies and factories should organise themselves and arrange for the distribution amongst themselves of an Fainne Nua Daitte (for those who, from time to time, would like to speak the little Irish they had).

PEARSE'S FREEDOM

Continuing, Dr. O Tuama said, that to have gained a measure of political and economic freedom in the aftermath of 1916, was not necessarily a gain of basic importance. The same economic prosperity we have been enjoying might well have been achieved by us, without ever leaving the Commonwealth or the United Kingdom. The ordinary Irish worker, in fact, might possibly have a higher standard of living had we never got our freedom.

Why then the 1916 revolution? What freedom did Pearse and the other leaders aim at? It is clear, that freedom for them meant self-government, not only for the sake of economic prosperity, but—more urgently in the long term view—for the opportunity of safeguarding and developing our Irish identity. The Irish language, as everyone knows, is the kernel of this identity, and the government and people of Ireland must now be willing to take the final and irrevocable steps to restore the language. Otherwise the 1916 Rising will have been a vain meaningless sacrifice.

ADJUDICATOR'S REMARKS

The margins on the approach road from Dungarvan are reasonably well kept. On the left hand side near a couple of houses there is the beginnings of a roadside garden which has been neatly kerbed. The entrance to the caravan park is neat and tidy. Near where this approach joins the town proper there is an untidy patch of ground on which some trailers and lorries bearing carnival equipment are parked. Also off this road there are some neat cottages with bright flower gardens.

There is some tattered fly-posting in the promenade area. The view across the bay from the cliff area is splendid. Looking at the caravan park from here it is suggested that it could do with some screening and planting.

The verges on the approach to the Ardmore Round Tower and the Old Church are badly in need of attention. There are a splendid group of ancient monuments here and they should be better presented. The environs of this area are spoiled by a number of derelict buildings and one particular derelict cottage with a rusted iron roof.

There are some fine new premises on the approach road to Youghal and others in the course of being built. The older row of terraced houses here are well maintained and some have splendid flower gardens. The margins on this approach are badly in need of attention. It was a great pity here to see an abandoned car body slowly disintegrating on the side-walk.
