FINED FOR CARELESS DRIVING

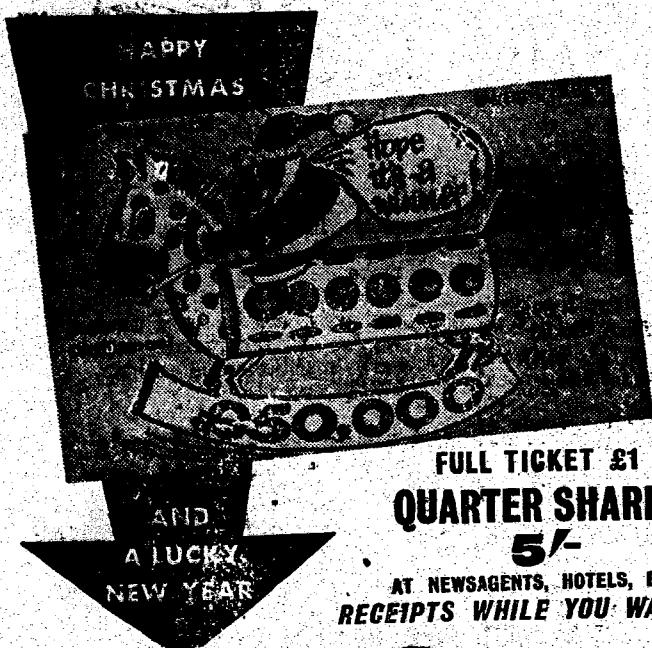

POST EARLY PLEA BY POST OFFICE

CHRISTMAS MAIL HINTS

Here are some hints from the Post Office which will help you with your Christmas Mail. Get your correspondence and parcels ready in good time and post early. You will need a lot of stamps—buy a supply now and so avoid queuing later on. Address everything clearly and be sure to use the full address. Use street numbers instead of, or in addition to, the names of houses. Write the name of the post town in BLOCK CAPITALS. Affix postage stamps at the top right hand corner of address side of envelope.

Peck your parcels in strong wrapping paper and tie them securely. Do not rely on tie-on labels. Use a gummed label or write the address on the wrapping.

Persons posting turkeys or geese are asked to make them up in an outer wrapping of canvas or sack and to use two address labels sewn or otherwise securely affixed to the parcels. If you have a parcel for registration, remember to seal the knots on the twine with sealing wax. Bring your parcels and correspondence to the Post Office as early in the day as you can. Do not crowd the Post Office by writing cards or envelopes or addressing parcels there.

LATEST DATES FOR POSTING

To ensure delivery before Christmas with these dates carefully: Bridgely, 17th Dec.—Parcels for Gt. Britain; Saturday 18th Dec.—Letters for Gt. Britain; Monday, 20th Dec.—Letters and parcels for Ireland; Tuesday, 21st Dec.—Letters and parcels for local delivery.

Enquire at the Post Office for the latest date for posting by Air Mail to places abroad. If necessary have your letters weighed, but in any event ensure that they are fully prepaid.

The minimum postage on a sealed envelope is 5d. The minimum postage on cards sent in open envelopes is 3d. You can write five words (or initials) of conventional complimentary greetings on cards sent in open envelopes.

Finally, parents are asked to advise young people to post their Christmas cards as early as possible.

FALLING INCOMES

At the December meeting of the Waterford County Executive of N.F.A., held in Dungarvan, delegates discussed the N.F.A. campaign to draw the Government's and the general public's attention to falling farm incomes and the widening gap between these and the incomes of other sections of the community, where, it was noted, fresh demands are still being made including a shorter working week.

Contrary to the Government's prediction of a £12 million increase in farm incomes during 1965, the N.F.A.'s estimate of £2 million drop in at least £8m. have grown to at least £8m. during the past unfortunate year for many farmers. This represents a drop of 15 per cent in the average farm income for 1965. How many other sections of the public would be prepared to face this position and still working a six or seven day week? The Executive un-animously agreed to support the national campaign and to do everything in their power to provide evidence of their dissatisfaction, at the forthcoming Munster demonstration to be held in Cork.

RATES - PROTEST TO THE GOVERNMENT

Speakers drew attention to the increasing Rates burden and, while acknowledging the stand made by Waterford Co. Council to combat rising costs and the mandatory increases imposed upon them by the Government, strongly criticised the Department of Local Government for its inability to restrain increased expenditure and the ever-mounting cost of increasing salaries. It was un-animously decided to send a resolution to the Minister for Local Government calling on him to halt the inflationary situation and pointing out the inability of rate-payers to meet the demands imposed on them by Government policy.

SAISFACTION AT FERTILISER ENQUIRY

Satisfaction was expressed at the Government's decision to set up a Fertiliser Prices Advisory Body to investigate the cost of fertilisers. N.F.A. has been pressing for a long time being pressing for this action. Prominent N.F.A. Council member, Jim Mullins of Kilkenny, has been elected as one of this three-man body.

N.F.A. AND THE RISK OF DISASTER

The Secretary, Brian Pearce, attended a meeting of voluntary organisations in the county, called by the Co. Engineer, to prepare a programme of assistance in case of catastrophes caused by blizzards, floods, etc. A network of "kev" people was formed, who, in the event of serious conditions, could be alerted. The County Engineer would like to hear from farmers with tractors and mounted shovels or grabs; who would be prepared to assist, under contract, with snow clearance, in times of emergency. 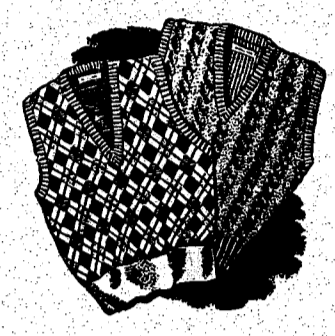

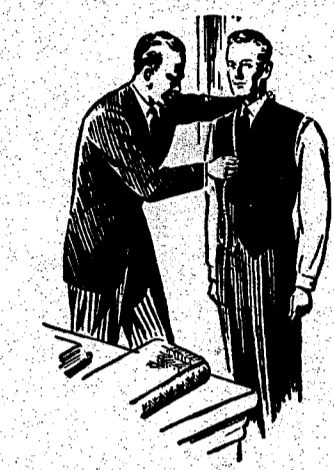

DAMATIC "ENDING" TO MUNSTER CLUB FINAL
In its inaugural year the Munster Club Championship has certainly met with its share of trouble. First because of the constant demand for prominent players, this championship ran behind schedule, and the final was set for Sunday last at Cashel—a ridiculous time of year to play so important a final.

Be that as it may, a fine crowd (estimated at 5,000) turned up at the West Tipperary venue for this decisive between the star studded Mount Sion and Glen Rovers in expectations of a thrilling final.

But what a hurling catastrophe it turned out to be. Nine minutes before the actual ending of time referee Tommy Foran of Carrick called the game to its premature halt, as players and spectators were involved in a free for all in the vicinity of the Glen Rovers goalmouth.

At the time of the abandonment, the Glen were leading by 3-6 to 2-6, but such was the strength of the wind blowing in Mount Sion's favour, that the odds at that stage were on a Waterford victory.

All through this final there was a very evident "needle" in the exchanges. Yet the first half fortunately ran its course without a serious incident and at the interval Glen Rovers led 3-5 to 1-0. But this was far from being an unassailable lead, and the issue at this stage was wide open.

Then, to the second half, which, whilst it lasted, was all Mount Sion. Soon, however, trouble could be seen on the horizon, and the distasteful delaying tactics of Glen goalie Finbarr O'Neill caused the referee to firstly speak to him and then gave a seventy to Mount Sion. Gradually Mount Sion reduced their deficit, and with twenty minutes still left in the game, had cut the Glen lead to three points. Then followed a period of scoring stalemate, and thirteen minutes from time Seamus Power and Francis Regan received marching orders. But four minutes later came the incidents that caused the game's abandonment and which shed no credit on those involved. Hurlers were swung viciously, whilst sideline spectators made an ugly situation infinitely worse by joining combat on the playing pitch. Referee Foran waved his hands apart calling it a day, and when interviewed afterwards, stated that he had done so for the safety of the players and his umpires.

On Monday night I spoke to a Cashel Official and he was pretty adamant that it was the Glen followers who joined in that final fray. Prior to the premature ending he told me they had been goading on their players from behind the road goal, and immediately the fare up took place they were on the scene in a flash.

Now the referee's report must go before the Munster Council, following which the Provincial Authority will make a ruling.

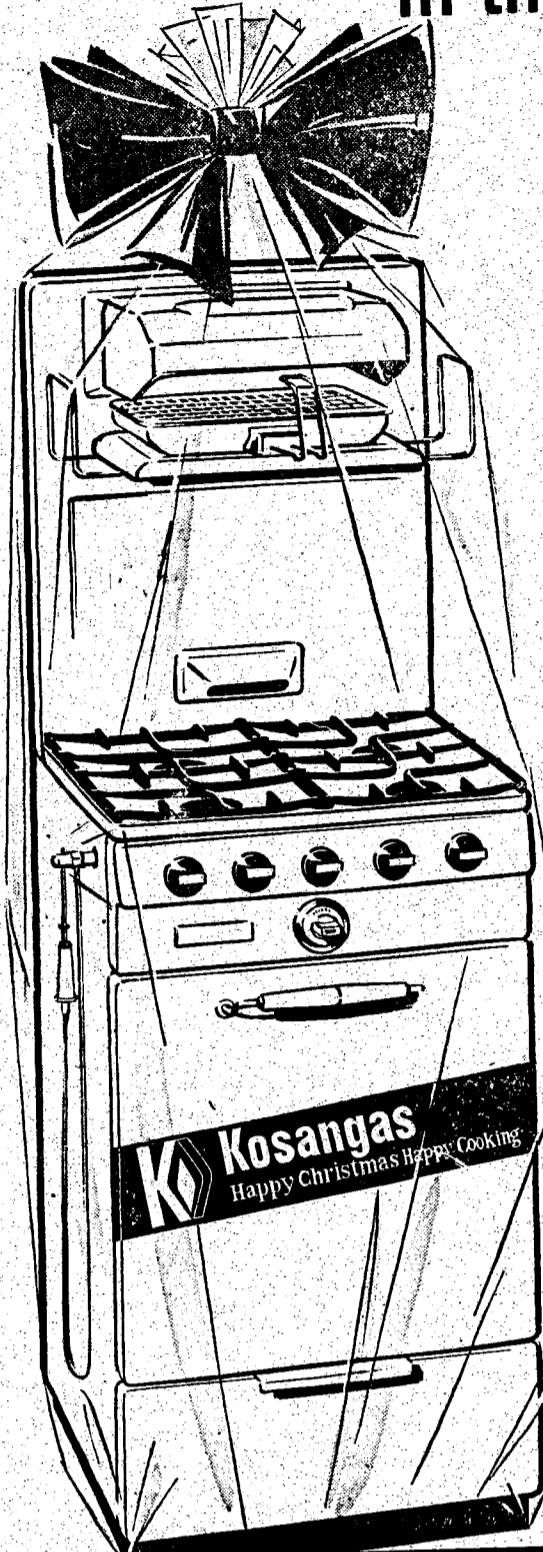
But certainly these incidents must be strongly condemned, for they have done mammoth harm to a competition that was only in its first year of launching after much agitation by all Munster counties in getting it under way.

The Mount Sion stars in this decisive were Larry Guinan in defence and attack—and despite injury, Mick Flannally, Frankie Walsh, Martin O'Gorman, P. J. Doyle and Seamus Power—until his enforced departure.

Contrary to general reports, Christy Ring, the 45 year old maestro, was far from great. He scored a good goal early on, but thereafter was well watched.

The best were undoubtedly their back trio of Gerry O'Sullivan, Denis Riordan and Seanie Kennefick, midfielder

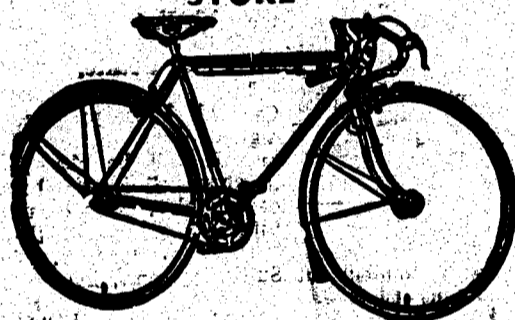

Champions Celebrate Reference Made To Unsporting Incidents

It was a night of celebrations all the way in Clonea Hotel on Thursday night of last week, when Ballinacourty, Intermediate football champions for the first time this year, commemorated that pinnacle of achievement in a great year. Over 160 attended their annual Social and from every viewpoint it was a real night to remember.

The Club Chairman, Mr. Paddy Joe Dwyer, in welcoming the guests, said this was the first time since 1949 that they had won the county title. He said that the year had been a great year for the club and that it gave him great pleasure to propose the toast to the President of the County, Mr. Michael Walsh, G.C., Abbot, President of the Ballinacourty Club, said it was a great pleasure for him to be present at this 19th annual social of the Club. It was thirteen years ago since he attended the first of the Club's socials. At that time he clearly saw the great spirit, comradeship and co-operation that existed in the Club. Down the years since then the personnel of the Club had changed, but that great spirit still lived on. He hoped that spirit would continue and if it did then the future success of the club would be assured.

This year, said Fr. Walsh, the Club had brought off county honours for the first time. More important still, the players had performed in a very sporting manner. It was very important to "play the game" but nowadays there seemed to be many untidy incidents and the G.A.A. pitches were becoming like battlefields. It was up to the individual and the clubs to stamp out this, which, if allowed to spread, would spoil the good name of the Association. Very often in recent times they were reading in the Press about these incidents, although he could not say whether or not the position was being exaggerated.

Proposing the toast to the Ballinacourty Club, Tony Mansfield said there was special significance attached to this great occasion by virtue of the fact that they were here as county champions. He congratulated the team on winning their first ever intermediate football title, adding that they deserved special praise for the great effort they had put into it. Nor should they forget all who had helped since the club was formed in 1947. He hoped they would be forgiven if he mentioned just two of the late Jack Power, Ballinacourty and the late Tommy Parsons, Dungarvan.

Mr. Seamus O'Brien, Secretary of the Western Board, having first thanked the Ballinacourty Club for inviting him to the function, said he wished to make reference to the real marks of Fr. Walsh about lack of sportsmanship at lack of games. Unfortunately, however, bad sportsmanship was not exaggerated in the Press, and all that appeared in print was substantially true. They had, however, people in this county strong enough to deal with this type of thing and it would disappear eventually.

Right through the year, continued Mr. O'Brien, Ballinacourty displayed a very high standard of sportsmanship. In one particular game this year he knew it was the plan of the opposition to incite Ballinacourty into playing unsportingly, but they did not succeed. They attempted this knowing they were not as good in ability as Ballinacourty. Ballinacourty could be very proud of that, and also of the fact that they went out the Intermediate title, one of the best championships they had this year. Besides, it was the only county title that came to the Western Division in '65. Ballinacourty should be proud also because their standard of football was so superior to that of all the other teams, something that was substantiated by their big winning margins in all their games.

Another factor, said Mr. O'Brien, that contributed to their great win, was the excellent Committee within the club. There was great organisation, spirit and co-operation, without which victory would not have been achieved. They were now in the senior grade and they had the spirit, determination and intelligence to carry them a long way in next year's championship.

Mr. Deane Goode, Secretary of the Co. Board also returned thanks for the invitation extended to him to be present. Proposing the toast to the Gaelic Athletic Association, he said this was one of the greatest occasions in the history of the club. They had won the Intermediate title for the first time this year, and in winning it played manfully and in accordance with the rules. Referring to the late Tommy Parsons, he said he had been made touchy to the late Tommy Parsons and he knew that Tommy was with them now in spirit. He (speaker) said Tommy was resting to night "neath the Rock".

John McGrath, captain of the Club's victorious Intermediate side, said it was a great honour to be called on as captain to speak on behalf of the team. During his five years with the Club he found them the most willing panel of players he had ever been associated with, and it was this dedication and co-operation with their Committees that helped to win the county title. If the same spirit and co-operation was prevailing in the senior grade he was sure they could win the premier title within a year or two.

Mr. Michael Fives (Chairman of the Abbeyside G.A.A. Club) said he had no doubt that Ballinacourty would go well in the senior grade. They may not win that championship in a year or two, but when they got to know more about that grade he had no doubt but that they would win a title.

Finally, the Club Chairman, Paddy Joe Dwyer, having thanked all the speakers, said they were now in the senior grade for the first time, but they were still only half way as far as they should be. They could win that title within a few years. He thanked the Committee he had working with him during the year and the team members who put so much effort into their training. He also thanked their supporters for their vocal and financial support during the year.

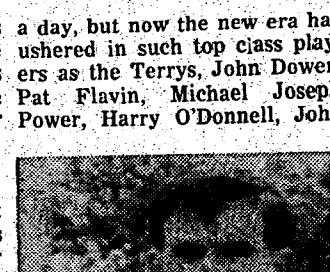


JOHN TERRY . . . may revert from full to corner back.

OLD PARISH WORTHY CHAMPIONS Clinched Victory In Second Half

OLD PARISH 2-2; ARDMORE 0-3

THE years of football oblivion are no more for gallant Old Parish. For on Sunday last before a fine attendance at Dungarvan's Fraher Field, they made no mistake at the second attempt when capturing the Western Junior title at the expense of neighbouring Ardmore. The previous Sunday they were denied outright victory when a last minute free came crashing off the Ardmore cross-bar, but this time there were no such fortuitous interventions to save the Seaside's and to-day Old Parish can proudly carry the banner of champions of the Western Division.

As I expected, this replay lived up to highest expectations. It is true that one felt for most of the hour that the Reds would prevail, but the tenaciousness of Ardmore, coupled with some fine bouts of football, made this a highly entertaining replay. In fact from the two hours fare served up by these finalists has emanated more thrills than we have witnessed from any other championship this year.

And without further ado the writer must stress quite emphatically that Old Parish are worthy champions. Here was a side bent on atonement for failure at the same stage of last year's campaign. For all that they were still the outsiders on Sunday, as Ardmore's scintillating displays en route to the decider earned for them general favouritism. But as I suspected, Old Parish confidence and morale had been boosted considerably by their successful exertions of the previous Sunday and this time left no doubt in the minds of anyone as to who was the better side.

MEMORABLE VICTORY This, in every respect, was a memorable victory for a great club. To achieve their primary goal they displayed football maturity that stamped them as a side of exceptional ability, and, believe me, Bonmahon will

have to be a mighty good side to prevent them from annexing county honours as well. In victory they literally overwhelmed the Ardmore challenge, and in the second half stroled to a resounding victory. Ardmore, on the other hand, can offer no alibis. They were the writer's fancy to take the title, but now I realise this assessment was arrived at through undervaluation of the Old Parish ability. Ardmore, to their credit, faced up to the challenge admirably, but even they will have to admit that Old Parish, a side without an apparent weak link, were the undisputed masters.

The writing was clearly on the wall for Ardmore even at the half way stage on Sunday last. For though leading by 0-2 to 0-1 at that stage they had played with the very strong breeze and in all the circumstances this looked an inadequate lead. And as the second half proved, that was a viewpoint of substantial foundation.

SLENDER LEAD

Old Parish it was who drew first blood with a point by Tony Hallahan, but then came strong Ardmore pressure and a brace of points gave them their slender lead. But as the interval drew nearer, Old Parish began to gain a dominance that was only spasmodically broken thereafter. Some great chances from frees were missed before the interval, and so they still trailed by that solitary point at the interval.

Ardmore hopes were not bright now by any means, but when Michael Troy stretched their advantage with a pointed free early in the second half, things looked just that bit more promising. But then we saw Old Parish in most devastating vein. A Tony Hallahan goal in the 7th minute gave them the lead for the second time, and after that it was as good as over. Hallahan quickly added a point; another like score consolidated their position still further, and in the 19th minute Pat Langan hammered home the final nail in the Ardmore coffin with an opportunistic goal.

ALL PLAYED WELL

This was undoubtedly an Old Parish display without blemish, and all fifteen contributed triumphantly to the momentous triumph. Between the posts Paddy Joe

Morrissey defied Ardmore on several occasions with superb saves, and as the Ardmore scoring total verifies, their defence covered itself in glory. The full back line of Michael Mahony and the two John Terry's fielded with confidence, while outside them, John Dower, flanked by D. Murphy and Michael Terry held a vice-like grip on the opposing Ardmore trio.

Once again Pat Flavin played a storming game at midfield, ably assisted by Michael Joseph Power, and this pair held definite sway for most of the hour.

Up front, too, there was a sextet of stars. Harry O'Donnell, John Leahy and Pat Langan, scorer of the clinching goal, formed a most penetrating half line, and Tony Hallahan has seldom if ever been seen to greater advantage. Nor did Tom Curran and Maurice Wade let the side down in any way, both giving first class performances.

Ardmore, no doubt, will have been sorely disappointed at going under, particularly when having such high hopes of victory. But try as they might—and on this count they earn full marks—they could not master opponents who turned in capital displays.

In the Ardmore defence, the half line of Noel Rooney, the brilliant Pato Keever's and R. Hennessey all starred, and at midfield Michael Reilly never ceased trying.

But their attack, which, up to this, had wreaked such havoc on all other defences, found no way round or through an impregnable Old Parish rearguard. Mottly Cronin, Liam Lincoln, Dick Cashman and Michael Troy tried all they knew, but generally their efforts were in vain.
