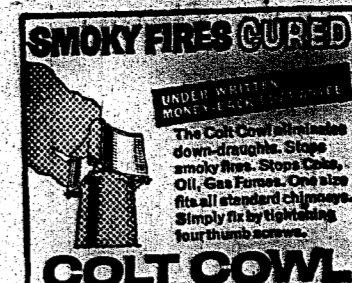

WATERFORD HEALTH AUTHORITY AMENDMENT OF ACTS RELATING TO CHILDREN IN FOSTER HOMES, ETC. Attention is directed to the important changes effected by the Children (Amendment) Act, 1957, in the law relating to children placed in foster homes, or placed in employment in certain circumstances, by a person or by a body other than a local authority. By reason of these changes, all the existing requirements regarding children up to age 9 accepted in foster homes for reward now apply to such children up to age 18 and apply in addition to illegitimate children accepted in foster homes, other than the homes of relatives, irrespective whether the child is received for reward or not. Other new provisions relate to: (a) the placing of new obligations on persons or bodies arranging fosterage; (b) the extension of the period of notice to be given in connection with the placing of a child; (c) notification to the appropriate local authority of any arrangement (made by a body or a person other than a relative of the child) for the employment of a child under 18 years of age in circumstances which require the child to reside in premises other than those in which he or she previously resided; (d) supervision by the local authority of the welfare of children. None of the foregoing provisions applies to a child who has been legally adopted, i.e. in respect of whom an Adoption Order has been made in pursuance of the Adoption Act, 1952. **LETTER TO THE EDITOR**

**WATERFORD HEALTH AUTHORITY PROVISIONAL ESTIMATES, BUDGETING 1969/70 AND THE RATES PROBLEM IN GENERAL**

Dear Sir,  
 In your necessarily abbreviated report of the Provisional Estimates Meeting for the coming Financial Year, you have failed to mention that you have consulted the Health Authority Offices, Dungarvan, by our Co. Manager, Mr. C. O'Connor. I think it only right to point out that this Provisional Estimate was only approved after a very full and frank discussion on every aspect of it, and only after the Estimates Committee had already gone through the Provisional Estimates very thoroughly with the Co. Manager and his Senior Officials, and that it was approved at this meeting on a majority vote and not unanimously as might be inferred, though not stated, from the final sentence of the supplied Report. This, apart from the report as submitted is substantially correct and indeed the Manager and his Senior Officials were highly complimented on the detailed nature of the Report and its excellent presentation at the Meeting.

Some of us however felt and we deem it necessary to point out this, that as we were dealing with a Provisional Estimate demanding a gross total expenditure of over £12 million for the financial year 1969/70 (receipts are however estimated at just over £1 million) and necessitating an increase of 3/6d. in the £ on the County Rate and 6/8d. on the £ on the City Rate, that by spreading the full debit balance of £91,780 over a longer period we could effect a further reduction on the County and City demands. We agree this may not be the best method of financing, but as drastic situations need drastic remedies, and as the county ratepayers will be faced with an increase of about 10% in the £, bringing the County Rate to over £4 in the £ for the coming Financial Year, we felt we were justified in the circumstances in making this suggestion as the lesser of two evils. Nor were we impressed by the ever-increasing salary and wage demands before us for the 11th Round, with the 12th Round, we were informed, just around the corner, and we made our position quite clear in regard to these proposed increases, and our thorough disapproval of the now all too common long retrospective periods involved in such claims, at a time when the Central Bank advised restraint and even credit restrictions. Our views however on the spreading of the Debit Balance and the Salary and Wage increases, and retrospective periods thereon, did not receive the approval of the majority of the members present and voting.

We were and we still are of the opinion that the criterion by which any Rate should be struck, should be the ability of the Ratepayers to pay for it, and that is the real kernel of the matter and will ever remain so. After all, it is as simple as this that if I have not got 6d. in my pocket, I cannot give 6d. to the Street Singer, can I? Nor are some of us on this Authority and the County Council prepared to ask the ratepayers to bear a rate of perhaps over £4 in the £ for the coming year. We honestly and sincerely believe it is altogether too big a burden on their shoulders, especially business people and factory workers in small provincial towns, like Cappoquin, Lismore, Tallow, Ballyduff and other, if larger towns in our county. Remember also the farmers too find the valuations of their lands and buildings, even though I do agree that in the matter of rates they are being generously subsidised, much more so than the urban dweller, but the subsidisation does not in many cases, assist the farmers who really need assistance with their rates, those between the £50 and £75 Rateable Valuation or over.

The magnitude of our task where the Health Authority Estimates are concerned is borne out when we reflect that the gross total estimated expenditure for each of the Institutions we administer for the coming Financial Year is, i.e., Ardkeen Hospital, Waterford—£467,550 (very close on half a million pounds; St. Patrick's Hospital, John's Hill, Waterford—£160,200; St. Vincent's Hospital, Dungarvan (District)—£27,520; St. Joseph's Hospital, Dungarvan (Co. Home, for clarification purposes, though I object to this name)—£96,100; Lismore District Hospital—£12,050; St. Peter's Hospital, John's Hill Waterford—£245,350.

What then is the solution to the rates problem—quite frankly I do not know off hand, but this I do know, that under the present system we cannot hope to bring down the Rates or even to stabilise them, or near their present figure unless and until some change is made. This may come about by a complete change in the present system of rating, but when this will happen, if ever I cannot say it is legally possible to have the Griffith Land Valuations of the 1840's changed, if it is, then surely this proposed change would be most inequitable, if the Buildings Valuations are to be changed as well. It may also be that a transfer of the Health Service charges from the Rates to the Central Authority may give the desired effect, as then the burden would be spread over very many more shoulders in the person of the Taxpayer. But isn't this in essence a case of robbing Peter to pay Paul, a case of reducing local Taxation by increasing national Taxation. The problem is one of the greatest magnitude, facing each and every one of us, and if this letter serves no other purpose than awaken interest in this problem, in the minds of the ordinary Ratepayer and Taxpayer, it will have served, I hope, some very useful purpose. The time has come when every Ratepayer should take a deep and abiding interest in local administration for they who pay the Piper are surely entitled to call the Tune. I cannot and I will not as a responsible Public Representative recommend strong or any illegal action in the matter of our Rates problem but I do urge that you the Ratepayers take a far more active interest in them, that you become more vocal and more outspoken on this problem, which is of vital concern to each and everyone of you.

The Manager, in his supplied Report very properly points out that of the increase of £194,993 on the gross expenditure for the present year increases under Salaries and Wages and Extern Institutions between them account for 57% of the total increase, not an insignificant observation, but rather a very important one.

I deeply regret the absence of the Press from our Health Authority Meetings since we changed over to evening, instead of afternoon meetings. Were the Press present at our meetings, I would not have occasion to write this letter. I intend therefore putting in a Notice of Motion to have this position changed and I sincerely hope my Motion will get the support I for one, feel it richly deserves. I am to add that of the present County Rate of 71/6d. in the £, Health Services alone account for almost 30% in the £ of this County Rate.

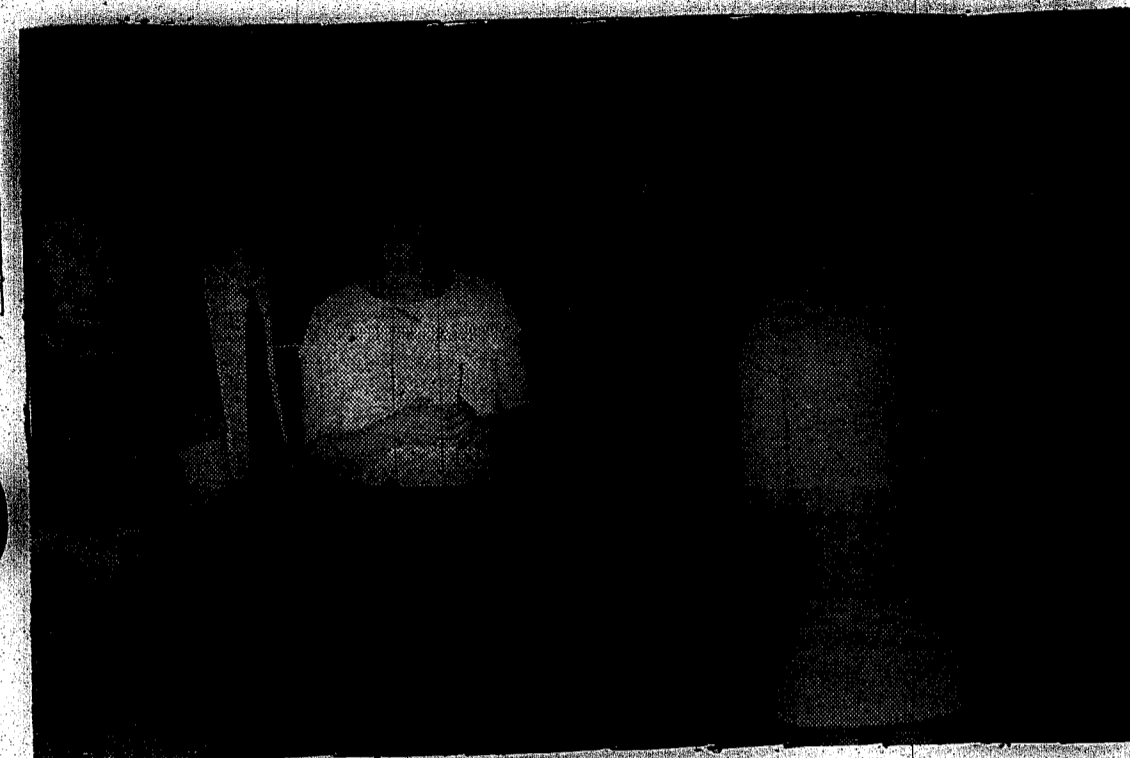

The problems attached to sheep production can best be emphasised by the fact that the National sheep population has fallen by approx. 1 million since 1955, states Mr. Jim Quinn, Secretary of the N.F.A. National Sheep and Wool Committee in his annual report to the National Council. This decline must be seen in the context that markets for lamb are not over-supplied. The finger of blame must be pointed at those responsible for the lack of a dynamic policy for sheep production and marketing. Such a policy could well create hope for the future of individuals engaged in production and at the same time pay dividends to our national economy.

The Committee are satisfied that expansion in the national sheep population is both desirable and feasible. It should be noted that the target set in the second programme for economic expansion was 6.6 million sheep by 1970. Expert opinion could not see any real marketing difficulties for this number of sheep. With but one full year to go to 1970 it is obvious that rather than achieving what was considered a very conservative expansion target, total numbers are likely to be less than the starting figure for the programme.

In pursuance of the objectives of the Committee as outlined in our 1967 report it was considered desirable to continue to press for the implementation of a worthwhile national policy if effective dialogue is not possible at Government level the publicity media to get across the Committee's proposals to the general public will be used to the maximum extent.

A special Sub-Committee was appointed during the year to look at policy and to incorporate both old and new ideas in proposals. The following proposals have been agreed by the committee. (1) that the existing hill-lamb subsidy be maintained; (2) that ewe lambs marked on the hills should be eligible for a further subsidy when produced for inspection as hoggets suitable for breeding; (3) that both these schemes should apply to foothills and traditional store producing areas at a suitable level of subsidy.

(4) Production of Winter Feed—Land approved for cultivation and sown with improved crops should on completion of the work be eligible for a grant of £10 per statute acre in addition to any existing grants; the scheme to apply to designated areas.

(5) Recognising that good hill husbandry requires mixed sheep and cattle grazing, it is proposed that a subsidy should be paid on calves produced and suckled by cows grazing hill land with sheep in an approved ratio.

(6) To maintain confidence in the trade, throughout the country and particularly amongst landholders, footers of stock in the face of the incentives production which these incentives will bring about, a guaranteed floor price structure should be implemented over a twelve month period.

An elaboration of policy proposals is in the course of preparation and will be incorporated in a special document. THE SMALL FARM PLAN Referring to the Small Farm (Incentive) Bonus Scheme introduced by the Government in the past year, Mr. Tom Llewellyn, Secretary of the N.F.A. National Rural Development Committee stated in his annual report to the National Council that it was referred in the official statement that 200,000 farmers could qualify for the scheme. More correctly the figure should be about 130,000 farmers who qualify on an acreage or valuation basis.

Under the Gross Margin conditions, however, the number that would qualify is possibly around 74,000. The Minister has stated that "it is possible to ensure that livestock producers will not be open to further exploitation by irresponsible interests concerned in any future circumstances of a less buoyant market for our beef exports."

Government action, through the Dept. of Agriculture, is required on the adoption of more stringent inspection procedures with regard to our meat exports and on the introduction of a more effective method of applying to the benefit of livestock producers, the funds at present devoted to the Carcase Export Subsidy. A new export subsidy system was announced by the Minister for Agriculture in February 1968 whereby a farmer selling cattle direct to a meat factory can either have an amount representing the subsidy included in the payment which he gets from the factory or, alternatively, he can forego it at the factory and write to the Dept. of Agriculture for it. This is of no advantage whatsoever to farmers. It does nothing to rectify the basic problem that the carcass beef export subsidy can operate to the farmer's disadvantage rather than to his benefit in a situation of market depression.

Considerable hopes for real improvement of our meat export marketing arrangements lie in the not too distant future have been raised by the move which is now in hands to convert International Meat Packers Ltd. to a Co-operative enterprise owned and controlled by farmers. This concern already handles about 40% of Irish exports of carcass beef and on successful completion of the transition to farmer ownership, there is scope for joint action with other Co-ops. in the meat business in the export marketing field. In effect Irish farmers now have the opportunity of working towards the establishment of their own Meat Marketing Board in the foreseeable future.

Store Cattle Study Group—Representatives of the Livestock Committee had comprehensive discussions with the Store Cattle Group in December 1967 on all aspects of the store cattle trade, including breeding, production, marketing and transport. The Group was established early in 1966 by the then Minister for Agriculture. The Livestock Committee representatives were pleased to find a wide measure of agreement between themselves and the Study Group, and it was confidently anticipated that they would have many useful recommendations to offer in their Report. There has been an inexplicable delay in publishing the Report. The Minister for Agriculture has recently indicated that it could be published at an early date.

Animal Health—Many people who have never given a second thought to the importance of the livestock industry in the national economy were forcibly reminded of it during the critical weeks of Nov. and Dec. 1967 when the foot and mouth epidemic raged in Britain and stringent precautions had to be taken to guard against the spread of the virus to this country. NFA at all levels maintained a constant state of alert and was directly responsible for many of the precautionary measures which were taken.

The progress made on wable fly eradication up to 1968 sufficed something of a set-back following the decision of the Dept. of Agriculture to abandon the general compulsory dressing of cattle

This has been achieved, however, at the expense of a reduction of approximately 100,000 of the number of saleable cattle on farms in June 1967 so it seems inevitable that a period of rebuilding of stocks will be required before this year's export performance can be repeated again.

# Five Year Tickets "Left Over"

CONTRARY to all expectations the demand for five-year All-Ireland hurling and football tickets in County Waterford is anything but great. Whereas in other Counties the demand far exceeds the supply, it was revealed at last week's meeting of the Waterford County Board in Dungarvan, that there was a surplus of both hurling and football tickets in this County.

The Board Chairman, Mr. J. Moloney, N.T., said they were allotted 250 hurling and a similar number of football tickets. It was agreed that application for these tickets would have to be made through the clubs, but at the closing date for applications, there were still 74 hurling and 43 football tickets "left over". The Chairman said they should send a cheque to Croke Park for the full quota of tickets. He was convinced that they would dispose of all the tickets, and it would be a mistake not to avail of their full allocation of tickets. Mr. Sean Power (Mitchels) said clubs were told that they would only get two tickets per club, but there might be others in that club still seeking one of these tickets. Mr. Moloney said some clubs had applied for their full quota of football tickets, but only part of their hurling al-

location. Other clubs however had not applied for any portion of their allocations. It was agreed to refer the matter to the Coiste Gnotha, who will consider the matter further.

# Indoor Training Course for Hurlers and Footballers

IN a bid to make a greater championship impact at senior level in the coming year, Waterford's senior hurling and football panels will undergo an eight weeks' training course (Indoor), commencing on 14th January and concluding on March 6th. This was unanimously decided on at last week's meeting of the County Board in Dungarvan, presided over by the Chairman, Mr. J. Moloney, N.T.

There will be twice weekly sessions, Tuesdays and Thursdays in the Clonea Ballroom, and the course will be under the charge of the Wexford and Kill footballer Sgt. Seamas Keavans.

At the Board Meeting, Mr. Pat Fanning, a member of the sub-committee set up to go into all aspects of this proposed training course, said the sub-committee had met in Kill, and following a lengthy discussion it was agreed to recommend to the Co. Board for its approval, eight weeks of collective training for the senior hurling and football panels. It was proposed, he added, to start the training on January 14 and conclude it on March 6th. It was also recommended, he said, that the courses be held twice weekly, on Tuesday and Thursday nights. Mr. Fanning continued: "It was also agreed by the sub-committee that the course should be under the charge of Sgt. Seamas Keavans of Kill. The training sessions, if held, will take place in the Clonea Ballroom, which will be available to the Board at a nightly charge of £20."

Mr. Fanning went on to state that the club would be responsible for getting their own players to and from the training sessions. That would not entail a great deal of expense, but he was sure if it involved a case of hardship on any particular club, recognition of that fact would be taken by the Board.

The course would be sufficiently varied, he concluded, to ensure that it would not become an ordeal for any player. Unless they went into this course in a totally committed way they would not achieve the best results possible on the playing fields.

Mr. Tom Cunningham (Dungarvan) said the players attending the training sessions possess the proper spirit and the right approach then no form of training could become an ordeal to them. Finally, on the proposal of Dick Cullen (Mt. Sion) seconded by Sean Power (John Mitchels), the Board unanimously approved of the eight weeks course, and of the other recommendations of the sub-committee. Preparations are now being finalised for the course.
