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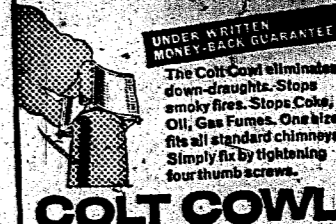

Dungarvan Man Fined for Assault

John Michael Wright, 32 Congress Villas, Dungarvan, was convicted of assaulting William Barry, 34 Congress Villas, at O'Connell St., on November 24, at last Wednesday's District Court. Barry was also charged with being drunk on the same occasion. Garda P. Noctor said he was on duty at 11.25 p.m. in the Patrol Car on Nov. 24. At Western Ice he saw both defendants. Barry had a bottle of stout in his hand, and Wright was arguing with him. They went up O'Connell St. and witness who had stopped the patrol car, followed them. He saw Wright strike Barry on the shoulder and then in the face. Barry was knocked to the ground and the stout bottle was smashed. He arrested Wright and took him to the Station. Both men were drunk, he said, but Barry was trying to avoid fight all the time. Justice Skinner convicted both defendants of the charges and fined Wright £3 and Barry 10/-.

Gaming Licence for Dungarvan Premises

A licence under the gaming and lotteries act in respect of premises at Grattan Square, Dungarvan, was granted to John Doyle, Mitchel St., Clonmel, by Justice L. B. Skinner, at Dungarvan District Court, on Wednesday. But on the recommendation of Supt. M. English, the Justice has limited the hours of openings from 11 a.m. to midnight daily.

When the application came before the Court, Supt. English said he was not objecting to it being granted, but he wanted to point out that this Amusement Centre would have a number of slot machines. Children coming to school in buses might easily go in there instead of going to school if the premises were opened early in the morning, because the buses stopped right outside this premises. He asked therefore that the opening hours be limited from 11 a.m. to 12 midnight. The Justice granted the licence subject to the hours limitation being complied with.

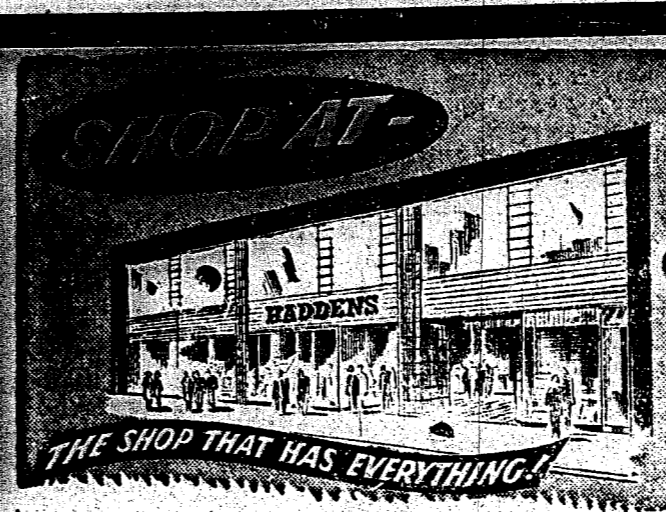

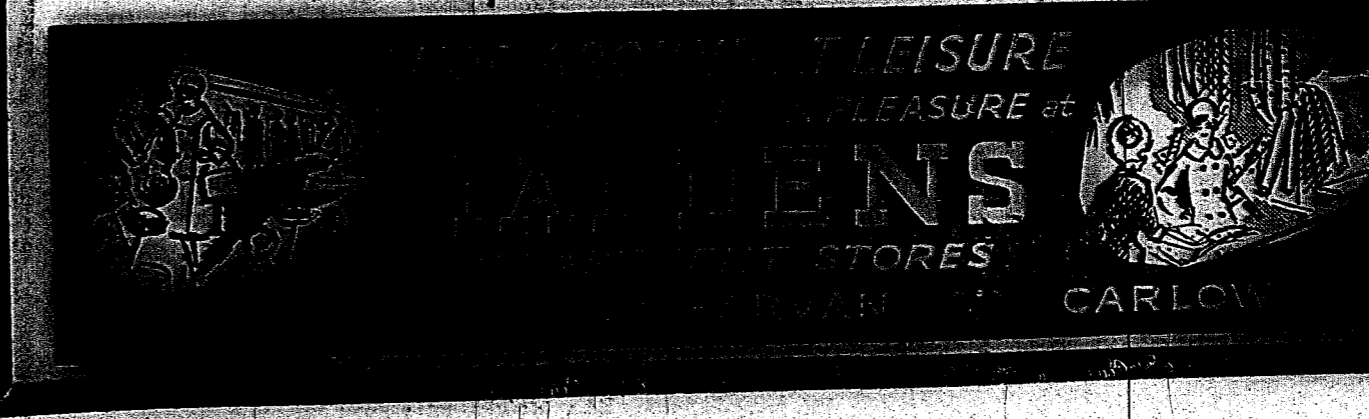

Dungarvan Youths Fined on Fishing Charges

One of them (defendant) had a rod but was not using it. They ran away but the Waterkeeper caught O'Riordan who at first gave a wrong name, but then gave his correct name. The Waterkeeper told O'Riordan it was wrong to engage in illegal fishing, and O'Riordan told him that when he was bigger he would deal with him. Later the Waterkeeper found a dead salmon and spear nearby. Mr. Power added that the boy's father had been convicted of a similar offence four years ago.

Mr. E. P. King, Solr., defending, said the defendant was only a schoolboy and had no previous convictions. It was to be hoped that he would not have any more.

Justice Skinner: Apparently he was holding a school around the water pool that day.

Mr. King: He may have been the tutor, I do not know.

Justice Skinner convicted O'Riordan and fined him £1 with 26-8-0 costs.

FURTHER CONVICTIONS

Laurence Sheridan, 22 Shannon St., and Michael O'Shea, 1 Connolly Row, Dungarvan, were also charged at the court with fishing for salmon on the Colligan on 29th July, without having the necessary licences.

Waterkeeper J. Doyle said he was on duty this day when he saw two youths using a rod and line. He asked them if they had a licence to fish for salmon and they said they hadn't. They said they were fishing for brown trout.

Justice Skinner: Could they have been fishing for brown trout?

Witness: They had salmon fishing gear. They hadn't a licence to fish for brown trout either.

Laurence Sheridan's father told the court that his son did not understand the law.

Justice Skinner: I do not think there was anyone in Dungarvan who was ignorant with regard to salmon fishing. He convicted both defendants and fined them 40/- each with 23-8-0 costs each.

BONUS ON TURKEY POULTS SALES BY HATCHERIES

The Minister for Agriculture and Fisheries announces that the temporary bonus scheme for turkey poult sales by licensed hatcheries will be operated in the year up to 31st December, 1969, on the following basis:—

(i) The bonus payable will be 1/6d. for poult purchased by turkey rearers in the Western Areas (which comprise Counties Cavan, Clare, Donegal, Galway, Kerry, Mayo, Monaghan, Leitrim, Longford, Roscommon, Sligo and West Cork). Of this amount 9d. will be paid to the hatcheries selling the poult and 9d. direct to the purchasers in these areas.

(ii) 9d. per poult in all other areas, payable to the hatcheries selling the poult.

The hatcheries must sell the poult in every area in (i) and (ii) above at a price not exceeding 5/3d. per poult inclusive of cost of packing etc. and delivery to the purchaser's nearest railway station or bus depot.

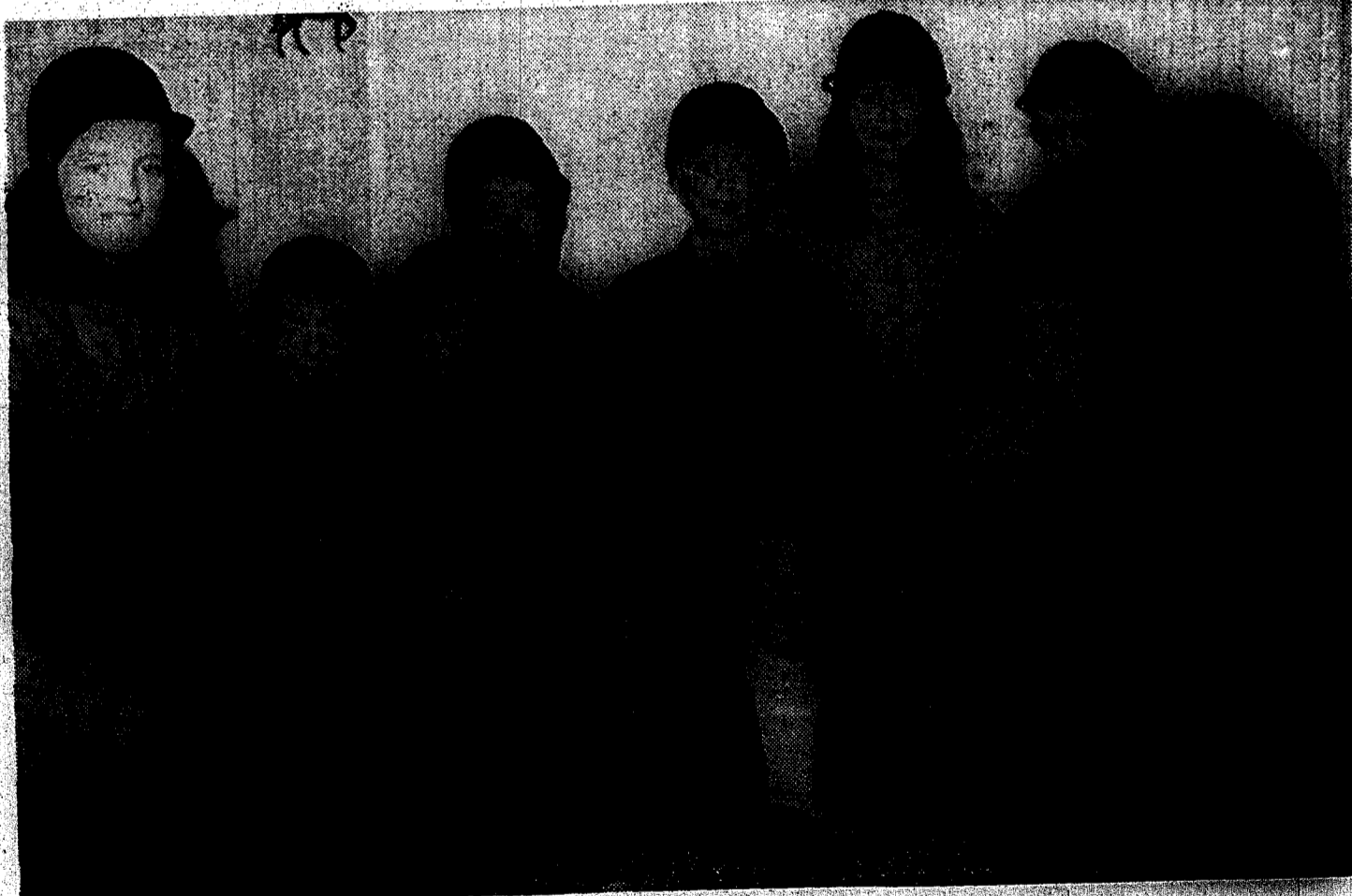
The scheme applies only to poult sold for fattening at the purchaser's premises. It does not apply to poult sold for breeding or for export.

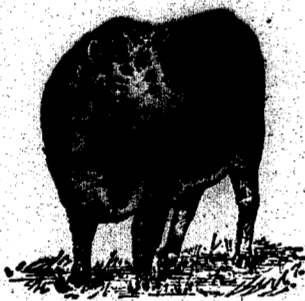

Dungarvan School Will Aid Handicapped Children

St. John's School, which opened in Dungarvan last Tuesday, 7th January, marks a welcome move to provide educational facilities, specially suited to provide the greatest possible benefit for children who are mildly mentally handicapped in the Mid and West Waterford region. A total of 56 children are at present attending the school and they are drawn from a region which extends from Stradbally to Knockmore and from Fourmilewater to Ardmore. A special transport system has been worked out by C.I.E. with the approval of the Department of Education and this brings the children to the school each morning and returns them to their homes each evening.

The St. John's Association of Parents and Friends of Handicapped Children has been mainly responsible for the new school and it is only with the passage of time that the benefits which the children who attend it will derive from the special education they receive there will become event.

In recent times there has been a great upsurge in public feeling for the mentally handicapped and there is now a far greater understanding and goodwill and interest for any move aimed at providing the proper services for these children, as members of the community, are entitled to. The provision of these services costs a great deal of money and the Association sponsoring the new school of St. John in Dungarvan have shouldered a very great responsibility. They took on this heavy burden, however, strengthened by their faith in the generosity of the public to subscribe to any appeal for funds which they would make.

On next Sunday, January 12, a Collection to raise funds for the new school will be made at Masses at all the church gates in every parish in Mid and West Waterford, from Kilmacthomas to the Western boundary of the county and from Fourmilewater to the seacoast. This collection has the full approval of Most Rev. Dr. Russell, Bishop of Waterford and Lismore and of Rt. Rev. Dr. J. Ward Armstrong, Bishop of Cashel, Emly, Waterford and Lismore, both of whom issued appeals for the fullest support for the collection last Sunday.

This is only the beginning of a great social crusade and its success and development in the future will depend almost totally on the generosity and support of the general public. 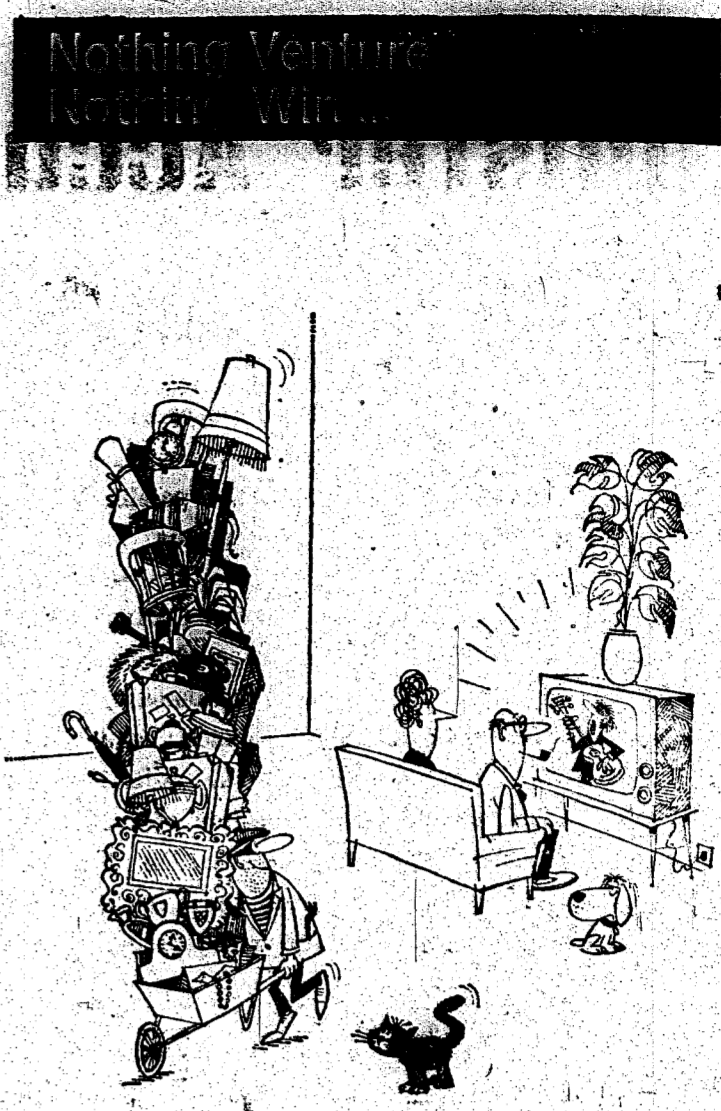

Prospects not good for Grain Growers

ACHIEVEMENTS AND TARGETS OF PIGS COMMITTEE

Quite a lot of work was done by our National Pigs & Bacon Committee during the past year. Quite a lot remains to be done.

Among the achievements one might list are: our success in getting the differential interests within the industry to set up a joint Working Group, which has already submitted reports on a National Pig/Grain Policy; a cash flow of incomes and expenditure for three systems of pig production; housing - detailed plans for a new type of pig house were drawn up by the Agricultural Institute at the Group's request; the introduction of the idea of block financing under which co-operatives, compounders, etc., could obtain large sums of money from the Agricultural Credit Corporation; and distribute these as loans to pig producers.

(The Preliminary Report of the Pig Industry Working Group has been published and circulated to the interests concerned.)

(b) The setting up of pig selling groups. Experience has already shown that the value of selling groups - particularly for the very small producers - in obtaining better prices is considerable. Equally important is the improvement in quality production and in management knowledge which seems to go hand in hand with group activity.

(c) The steps taken by the Committee to mitigate the effect of the changes introduced in the Pig Compensation Fund. The Committee circulated the proposed changes to a wide circle of producers and on the answers received it was able to advise the Pigs & Bacon Commission on the changes which would be most acceptable to producers.

(d) The vigorous stand taken on behalf of producers during the bacon factory strike and the price and transport concessions wrung from the Dept. of Agriculture during that period.

(e) The significant increases in pig prices in April, 1968. The new guaranteed minimum prices are: Grade A. Special - 278/- per cwt. d.w.; Grade A - 266/- do.; Grade B1 - 255/- do.; Grade L - 250/- do.

(f) The improvements introduced into the Accredited Herd Scheme. These include £5 grant per litter up to a maximum of £200 per annum; £40 for privately owned board; 4/- per lb. liveweight for young pigs accepted for progeny and performance testing and £10 to purchasers of approved in-pig girls.

(g) The increased grants for pig housing generally and for big units which became effective from June 1968. Piggery grants were then increased to 3/- per sq. ft. (9/- in Piped Areas) and for large-scale fattening units one-third of approved capital cost can be obtained as a grant.

All meetings of the Bacon Industry Panel and the Bacon Market Council, at which suppliers to the British Market discuss among themselves and with Ministry Officials, the steps to be taken to maintain supplies and prices were attended by members of the Committee.

Policy Objectives. - 1. To obtain realistic minimum guaranteed prices for pighead on the cost of production. 2. To have a national pig/grain policy introduced. The report prepared by the Pig Industry Working Group is a factual statement on the interaction of pig and grain prices. 3. To rationalise the industry in so far as it lies within the producers' hands. 4. To promote pig selling groups and collective purchasing of feedstuffs, etc. 5. To have specialist pig advisers appointed in each county. 6. To insist on the establishment of a satisfactory veterinary service for pig producers. 7. To take those steps which will improve breeding, housing and husbandry. 8. To continue to study proposals put forward for the centralised marketing of pigs and to ensure that if any such scheme is introduced that it will be along lines and operated on conditions set by pig producers. Centralised marketing could mean better pigs for farmers and a better income for producers and a better run. On the other hand it badly run could lead to the stagnation of the curing industry and a bad service and poor return to the producer.

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The NFA Grain Committee in its annual report for 1968 pointed out that with a 20% increase in wheat acreage in 1968 a significant rise in yields per acre and a considerable overlap between the wheat and barley harvests, serious difficulties in the intake, drying and storage of the 1968 wheat crop were prevented only by exceptionally favourable harvest, weather conditions. Since we cannot count on similar good fortune in future years, the report adds, it is imperative that intake facilities be improved, with particular emphasis on catering efficiently for bulk grain, and that realistic incentives be provided to encourage farm storage and drying of grain.

Research work on cereals must also be intensified, particularly in the production of earlier ripening varieties. The position can only be seen in full perspective, said Mr. Maher, when we examine the import side of the account as well as the export side. Thus, we find that not alone does Irish agriculture pay its way, so to speak, but in fact for every £100 spent on the import requirements

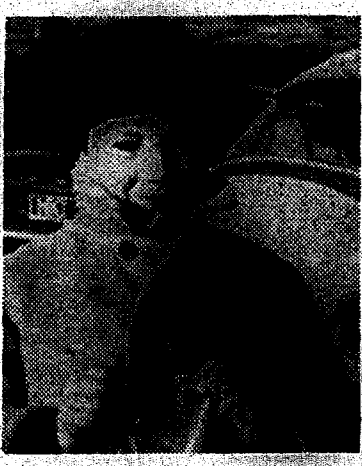
