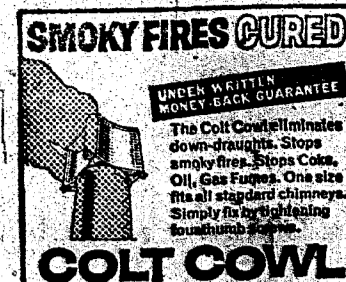

### CALL TO RE-OPEN DUNGARVAN RAILWAY STATION

**WATERFORD COUNTY COUNCIL** is to ask Coras Iompair Eireann to re-open the Dungarvan Railway station and to provide a rail service for the carriage of goods between Waterford and Dungarvan. A notice of motion to this effect was tabled by Colr. Austin Deasy at last Monday's meeting and received the unanimous support of the Council.

Colr. Deasy said the Dungarvan-Waterford road was taking a considerable beating at the present time and the County Council would have to foot the bill for the road improvements. The Rail line to Ballina court was being re-opened because of the new magnesite factory, and it seemed to be good economics to have the Dungarvan Station re-opened altogether and have goods passenger service between Waterford and Dungarvan. By re-opening the Dungarvan Station also they would help to stop the tearing up of the Dungarvan-Waterford road as was happening at present.

Colr. Deasy went on to say that there was also traffic chaos in Dungarvan with big C.I.E. delivery trucks blocking the traffic. The traders of the town were also dissatisfied with the Station's closure, because before they were able to collect their goods at the Station or alternatively leave them stored there until they required them. Now they had to pay for them being delivered.

There was a great case for the re-opening of the line for a goods passenger service, he added.

Colr. Patrick Coffey seconding the motion said that since the line's closure there were

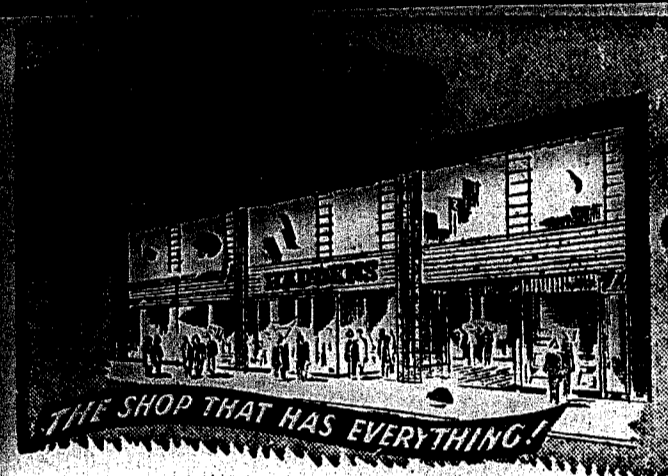
heavy vehicles with trailers travelling at about 25 miles an hour on the Dungarvan-Waterford road. It was almost impossible to pass them and the road constituted a traffic hazard.

The Chairman, Mr. Charles Curran, said the Dungarvan-Waterford line should never have been closed and C.I.E. realised that now. He had discussed the matter recently with officials of C.I.E. and if they got an assurance of business for the line it could be re-opened, he said. The resolution was carried unanimously and a copy of it has been sent to C.I.E.

### COLR. HARTY'S RESOLUTION PASSED

At last Monday's meeting of Waterford County Council a resolution proposed by Mr. Michael Harty, calling on the Minister for Health to give the utmost consideration to allocating an increased Grant towards the Waterford Health Authority, was unanimously passed.

Mr. Harty said they could only view with alarm the abnormal increase in rates due to Health Administration.

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### LETTER TO THE EDITOR

Dear Sir,  
 I would like to protest against the treatment meted out by Dungarvan Urban Council to the town's two soccer clubs. Recently it not only refused to grant the Dungarvan Club the security of a 30 year lease, but endeavoured to introduce a system whereby both clubs could be subjected to one month's notice to quit their grounds when required to do so. Even the eventual agreement to extend the notice period to three months showed the scant appreciation of the Council for the two clubs, and the work which they do for the people of the town.

The Urban Council is supposed to consist of the elected representatives, patrons and benefactors of all the people of Dungarvan, but in this matter they have shown themselves to be both shortsighted and politically-minded. They know that each extra house built is of more tangible advantage when it comes to polling day than the less apparent but more long term and widespread advantages to be gained from promoting our soccer clubs, and of course, any such promotion will make the Council unpopular with that ever-present and not inconsiderable section of the community who blindly despise any activity which comes under the heading "foreign games" no matter how beneficial such an activity may be to the people of the town.

And it is not beyond the bounds of possibility that there is, though I am not claiming this as a fact, a group in the Council with this frame of mind, who will allow such highly personal attitudes to prejudice their decisions with-out regard to the possible benefits which such activities as they might foster could bring about.

Between them, Dungarvan and Abbeyside Soccer Clubs cater for over a hundred players in regular, well-organised competitions, involving various league and cup championships and tournaments. Outside of these, they probably involve another thirty or forty players, mostly youngsters, in occasional competitions and it is hoped that eventually these too will be able to partake in more regular activity.

Last year, both clubs fielded sides in the Under 15, 16, and 18 Leagues and Cups, indeed at present Dungarvan are winning the latter league, which carries much prestige; Dungarvan also have two Junior league sides, and Abbeyside one. Both clubs have also fielded Under 12 and 13 teams and the Villagers, at least, intend entering in the forthcoming Under 14 league.

This undoubtedly makes these two clubs the leading ones catering for the youth of the town. To use an old cliché: they certainly help to keep the young men and boys of the locality "off the streets" by providing them a healthy, clean hobby.

But the advantages and activities of the soccer clubs do not end there. They also have provided a social life for these youths by regularly holding teenage dances for them, the proceeds of which were expressly ploughed back for the benefit of the clubs' youngsters. They have proved excellent hosts for some of the youths of Birmingham who have visited here on two occasions, as well as youths from Limerick and Dublin, thus helping to foster friendly international and inter-county

relations. The clubs are arranging a reciprocal trip to Birmingham in the near future for both adults and youths.

On most Sundays during the season they provide a spectator sport for the people of Dungarvan, free of charge, and of course they provide buses for that large section of the local populace who like to watch the Waterford side in action.

Any organisations which gladly and voluntarily engage in such a range of beneficial activities should be dearly cherished by the local council, and not snubbed as is the case. These clubs incur a great deal of expense through their activities, and they receive no aid from their head body in Dublin. They have to get by through personal subscriptions and pools and bingo competitions the success of which reflect the high level of goodwill of the local people towards the clubs. If these clubs were to be guaranteed some form of security by the Council, it would be a base which could expand their excellent undertakings.

Here in Dublin, the Corporation has always been glad to provide facilities for sports clubs because of the good which they do, and I think that Dungarvan Urban Council should adopt a similar attitude.

In my opinion, the Council should not only provide long-term leases for both our soccer clubs, but should do so free of charge, so that they can lay plans for the future with a secure mind, and hence provide even better recreational facilities for the people of Dungarvan. How about it, Councilors?

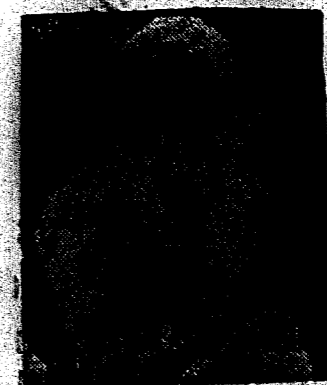

**Health Services Impact on Rates**

AN assurance that the Dungarvan District Hospital would not be closed was given by the County Manager, Mr. Charles O'Connor at last Monday's meeting of Waterford County Council when the Council was considering the Provisional Estimate and Draft Demand of Waterford Health Authority for the coming year. But the hospital's role, the Co. Manager said, would be one of a community service centre for patients that could not be treated at home and where no surgery would be carried out.

When the Authority's Provisional Estimate came before them for the coming year, the Chairman, Mr. Charles Curran said the impact on the rates next year would be terrifying and they should be given higher Government grants. Mr. James Quirk said if they agreed to spread the Authority's Debt Balance over a longer number of years that would mean a lowering of the increased rate in the coming year.

Mr. Austin Deasy said that the Government was surely under a duty to give a higher grant than 56.5%—which they were giving at present. With the imposition of the Wholesale Tax everything was being put up, and the Government should give back some of the extra millions they would receive from this tax.

Mr. Wm. Dower asked if they were any nearer having the Health Charges on a Regional Basis. The Manager said a Committee or Council had been set up by the Minister for Health to advise him about the future of hospitalisation in this country. Mr. Michael Harty said at a previous meeting of Waterford Health Authority he had passed a resolution calling on the Minister to keep the Dungarvan hospital open and to make it into an 80 bed hospi-

### Helvick Lifeboat Minister's Reply to "Doomed" T.D.

Despite a plea by Waterford County Council to reconsider its decision, the Royal National Life Boat Institution has decided definitely to withdraw from service the Helvick Lifeboat on March 25th next. This news was conveyed to the Council at last Monday's meeting when a letter from the Institution's Secretary, Mr. Stirling Whorlow was read.

In his letter Mr. Whorlow stated that his Institution received the resolution from the County Council asking them to reconsider their decision. Much thought had been given to the entire matter and all relevant considerations were examined very closely before the conclusion was reached that there was no longer any operational necessity for maintaining a Lifeboat at Helvick Head.

The letter continued: "I am afraid therefore that the Institution's decision could not be reversed, although I would like to thank the Council for the interest taken in the Lifeboat service and the points which had been made in their letter."

The Chairman, Mr. Charles Curran, said that was that far as the Helvick Lifeboat was concerned.

On the proposal of Mr. M. Harty however, the Council passed a resolution that in the event of the R.N.L.I. deciding to place a larger boat on the South East coast that the Helvick Station be given priority in the string of it.

### Sheep Dipping Schemes Cost £4,600 a Year

Waterford County Council on Monday last adopted a resolution from Sligo County Council calling on the Government to finance the Sheep Dipping Scheme Annually.

The Co. Accountant, Mr. P. J. O'Leary said the Sheep Dipping Schemes in Co. Waterford were costing £4,600 annually, and the Dip alone cost £1,200. There was an estimated revenue of £600 from the schemes, leaving £4,000 to be borne out of rates.

The Sligo resolution was adopted on the proposal of Mr. William Dower, seconded by Mr. Kieran O'Riyan.

Mr. P. Hogan, T.D., has received the following circular from the Minister for Education:—

The Department of Education provides free transport for children who have excessive distances to travel to the nearest primary or post-primary school. To be eligible for conveyance to a national school a child must be—

(i) Between 5 and 10 years of age and reside not less than 2 miles from the nearest suitable school.

(ii) Between 10 and 14 years of age and reside not less than 3 miles from the nearest suitable school.

A special transport service is not established to a national school unless there are at least ten eligible children in the locality.

Where, however, a small national school is amalgamated with another all the school children in the school district concerned are given free transport to the amalgamated school.

Under the post-primary scheme children living three miles or more from the nearest school at which free education is available are provided with free transport to that school.

The scheme is administered by C.I.E. as agents of the Minister for Education. C.I.E. organises special school bus services for eligible children to each post-primary centre. Use is made also of public scheduled services where these are suitable. The services are organised on the basis of the various school districts or "catchment areas."

A special school service is not established unless there is a minimum of seven eligible children. The scheme does not apply in urban areas where children generally do not live more than three miles from a school.

Where children wish to obtain post-primary education entirely through the medium of Irish they are given transport to the nearest class "A" secondary school or to a vocational or comprehensive school providing such education.

### MINISTER'S APPEAL

With the re-opening of schools during the coming week after the Christmas holidays, children will once again be making their way to school in the dark and half-light of the winter mornings. The Minister for Local Government wishes to appeal for care and prudence by all concerned to ensure that children are not exposed to unnecessary danger, whether through carelessness or plain lack of thought on the part of any road user. In modern traffic conditions the journey to school is always a hazardous one; the danger increases in winter conditions.

The very small children need particular care. Their parents should try to ensure that the children are accompanied to school by an adult or an older child properly trained in good road behaviour. A small group of parents could, for example, take turns so that one parent could bring a group of children to and from school or at least accompany them on the most dangerous part of the route.

Parents should ensure that all their schoolgoing children wear their reflective armbands, which in the case of primary schools are at present being supplied direct to the school through the Safety First Association of Ireland.

An appeal also to drivers of motor vehicles and motor cycles—take extra care—leave a few minutes earlier and keep a special look out for pedestrians and cyclists—especially children. On these dark mornings drivers should drive on dipped headlights unless the road or street is well lit by good street lighting. Reflective armbands worn by pedestrians are useless unless they can reflect the light of headlights. Even when dawn is well advanced weather conditions such as a heavily overcast sky

may dictate the need to retain at least the side lamps lit while driving. It is not enough for a driver to be able to see; he must also ensure as far as possible that other road users can see him. In the dull grey light of dawn or the difficult conditions of evening twilight an unfit moving vehicle can present as much danger as during the hours of darkness.

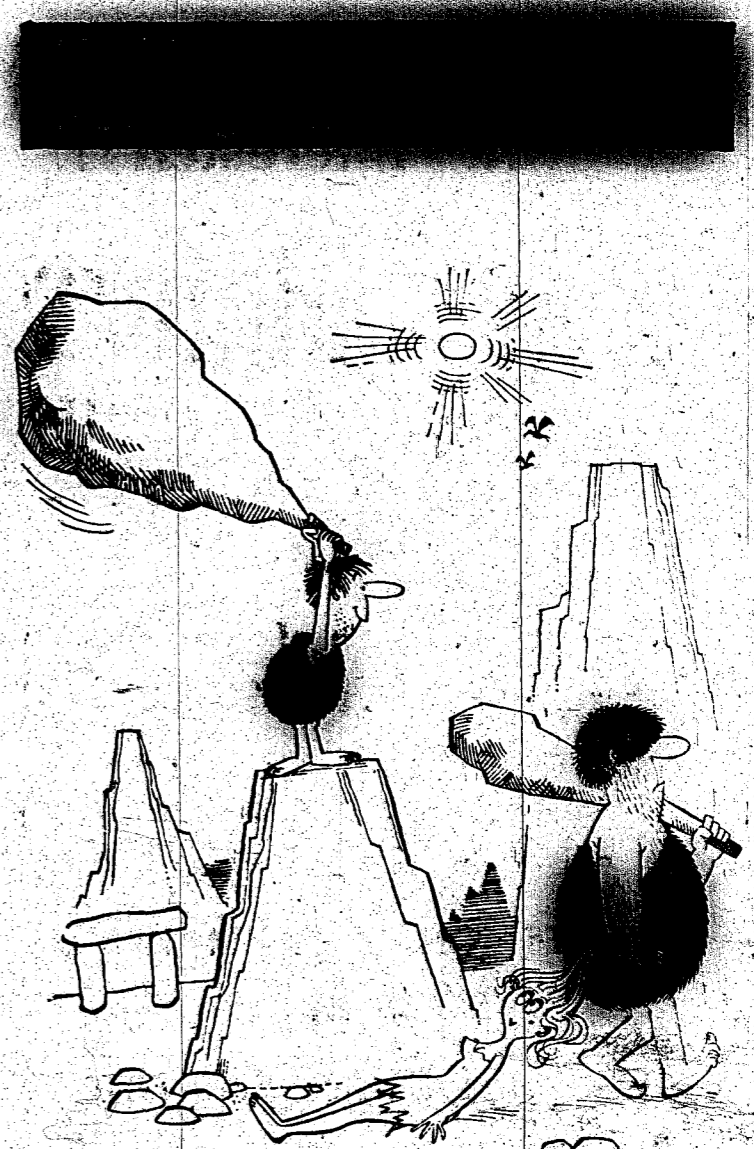

NFA NEWS Why the Summit is Off

The anticipated summit meeting between the Taoiseach and the President of the N.F.A. Mr. T. J. Maher, did not take place. It was hoped that this would create a climate and open the way for the dawning of a new era in Government-N.F.A. relations.

The decision of the N.F.A. President is not just a personal one. He has the full backing of the Association and indeed, the full body of the rank-and-file of the Association. The feeling of members on this matter was quite clear from the resolutions submitted to Headquarters immediately it became known from the Government Information Bureau announcement that the Taoiseach had decided to bring Mr. Blaney along with him, to the talks.

On the surface the controversial sections may seem innocuous. They may be to be aimed at merely preventing inconvenience to the public by making it incumbent on the organisers of a meeting, procession or demonstration to give due notice of the size and the proposed time of the event—and in the case of a march or procession, the route to be taken.

Mr. Maher was in touch with the Taoiseach and it was indicated to him that the arrangements announced through the Government Information Bureau would stand—that Mr. Blaney would have to be present at any proposed talks.

The N.F.A. President then issued the following statement: "When I wrote to the Taoiseach on Nov. 9 requesting a meeting, I specifically asked for a personal meeting with him to discuss how, in the Taoiseach's own words, we might 'wipe the slate clean' and 'establish harmonious and fruitful dialogue' between the Government and the N.F.A. My communications by letter and by phone with the Taoiseach since Nov. 9 has been on the basis of arranging a personal meeting with him."

"At no time—until I heard the public statement from the Government Information Bureau on Friday night, 3rd January—was there any understanding on my part that this proposed meeting was anything other than a personal meeting between the Taoiseach and myself.

"Since the Government/N.F.A. problems have been aggravated in the extreme during the tenure of office of the present Minister for Agriculture, his presence at any meeting between the Taoiseach and myself, would, in my opinion and in the opinion of my Association, be tantamount to the failure of such a meeting before it got off the ground.

"I have consequently informed the Taoiseach that I am still prepared to meet him personally at his convenience, but that no useful purpose would be served by my meeting him in the company of Mr. Blaney.

Mr. Maher, who was addressing the Annual Dinner of the South Tipperary Executive N.F.A. said that the Bill had a lot of good features and there was no outcry against them, but there certainly was a general outcry against the specific sections that would give to the State powers far beyond those ever envisaged in our Constitution.

Mr. Maher said that this Bill was yet another example of the State endeavouring to extend its powers by bringing in unnecessary controls.

As an organisation representing 130,000 members, we have a right to question some of the proposals contained in the Bill and while, of course, it will not be so until in its final form, the very fact that these provisions have been incorporated in the initial draft shows what might happen certain freedoms unless the public are very vigilant at this time.

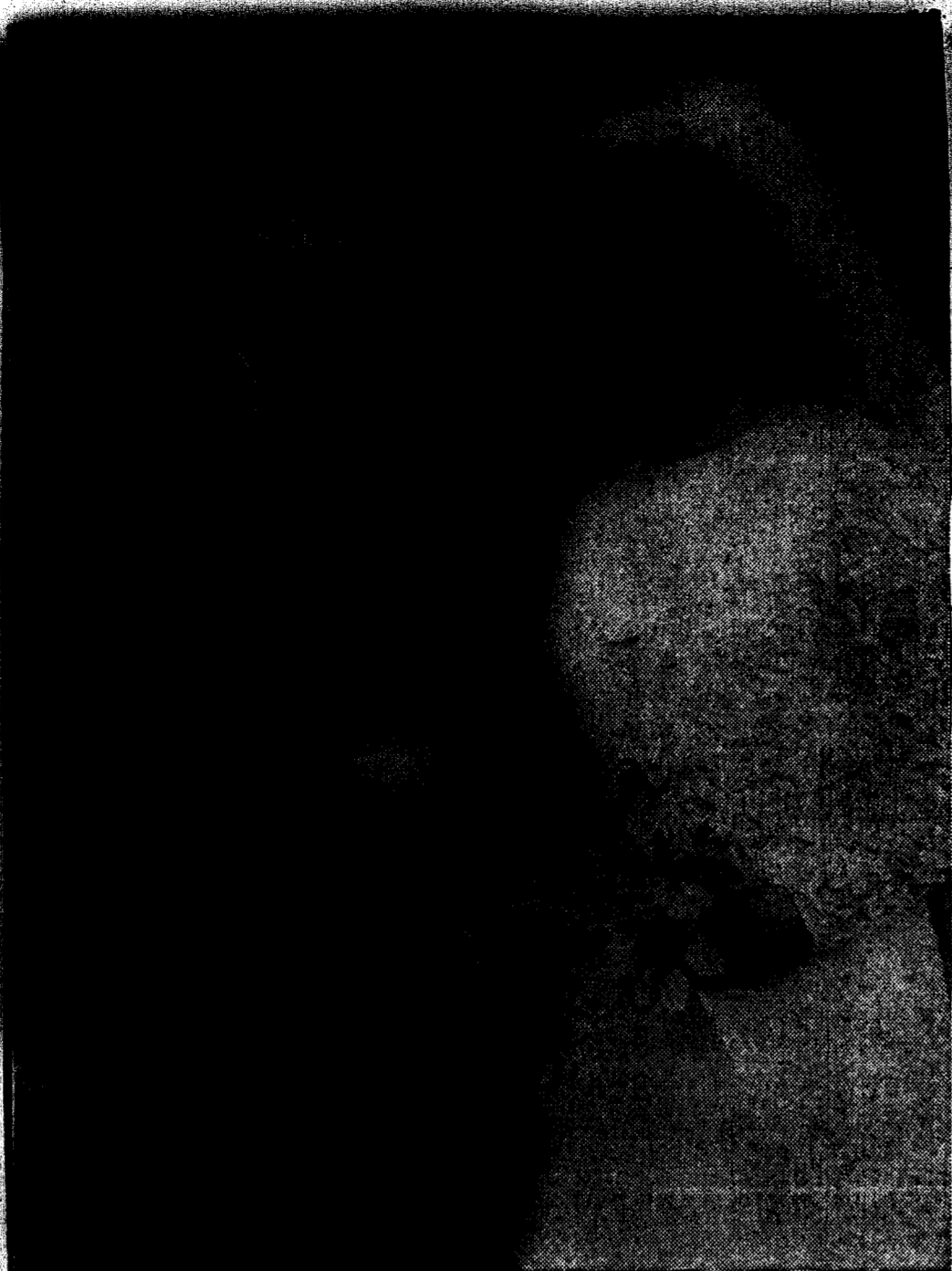

## SUNDAY'S WESTERN G.A.A. CONVENTION

# Secretary Recommends Pruning of Teams in Some Grades

THEY had now reached the stage where it was becoming a desperate struggle to finish their championships in the time allotted and with increased inter-county commitments the position was worsening each year. So states the Western Board Secretary Seamus O'Brien (Abbeyside) in his report to next Sunday's Western G.A.A. Convention in Cappoquin.

The report continues: "I believe that there is an urgent need for a review of our championship arrangements and even a pruning of teams in some grades. This is a matter that might have the attention of the new Board. To complete our ten championships and four winter league competitions, last year took a tremendous effort and were it not for the wonderful co-operation of clubs and officials, and particularly the clubs that were involved up to the end of the season, it would have been impossible to finish all the Board's commitments."

The Secretary states that 1968 was a year that compared very favourably, as far as playing activities were concerned, with the two previous years, and the number of matches played equaled last year's record number of 140. Affiliation, too, were the same as in 1967 and the sixty nine clubs which affiliated entered to total of 114 teams and all but five of these took part in the championships. Their games were again accorded great support during the year and attendances at all the Board's attractive fixtures were well up to previous standards.

Referring to the social activities in the Division, the Secretary states that the holding of annual socials by most clubs was a welcome development and showed a recognition by clubs of the great need for social activity. "It is rather disappointing however," he continues, "to find that far too many of our clubs do not avail of such functions to promote and encourage Irish dancing and singing or at least to devote part of such functions to the development of our culture."

"We can all persuade ourselves we are making progress, but while we allow a situation to exist whereby it now takes as much courage to sing an Irish song or dance an Irish dance as it did when we lived under foreign rule, we should not even think about progress. It is about time that some clubs realised that there is absolutely no difference between their socials and those held by other associations inside and outside the country."

## Injury Forces Abbeyside Soccer Starlet to Retire

Because of an injury received some years ago and which was reactivated in last year's under-16 semi-final against Portlaw, young Michael O'Connor, Murphy Place, Abbeyside, has been forced to give up playing soccer. Michael who is son of Mr. and Mrs. Danny O'Connor (Danny is a founder member of the Village club) was one of the most brilliant young prospects to come on the scene for a long time and it was most unfortunate that his playing career should now be ended almost before it had properly begun. He possessed skill in abundance and if ever a boy seemed destined to go to the very top grade in Irish football, Michael was that boy.

Not has Michael's enforced retirement gone unnoticed by the Schoolboys' League, whose Secretary, Mr. Joe Goulding, has paid warm tributes to him.
