LATE MRS. K. TOURANEENA NEWS

CASHIN, Ex-N.T.
AN APPRECIATION
 The recent death of Mrs. K. Cashin removes another teacher of the Old School, one of the remarkable band of people whose impact on the community derived no less from a unique personality than from their considerable professional abilities. Katty as she was familiarly known, was a native of Strabally and spent her entire teaching career within the boundaries of the parish, first in Ballinard, but for the greater part in Ballyaneon. Here, three generations of children passed through her hands.
 Perhaps her most fitting epitaph is the simple phrase "she was a mother to all of us" overheard at the funeral from one of those pupils, now himself a grandfather.
 Her home was a haven of friendship for all. In the less affluent days of the early Thirties it had one of the "going to Cashin" to hear the news or enjoy a programme was an institution of the village life. All were made welcome, but particularly the younger generation in whom she had a special interest. Conversation and discussion usually followed.
 Today, dispersed in many lands, the youngsters of those days recall with affectionate remembrance the gracious and cultivated atmosphere of these gatherings.
 Her piety was deep and sincere, but completely unostentatious. Until failing health prevented her never missed daily Mass. She possessed an immense capacity for friendship and service and never spared herself for her pupils, her family or her friends. All good causes had her active support.
 A dedicated member of the I.N.T.O., she was held in high regard by her fellow teachers. Solas na soilice agus radharc na Cirionide da hanem.

ORGANISED PAPAL VISIT TO BOGOTA
 A distinguished Irish priest, whose mother came from Modeligo, was chiefly responsible for the success of Pope Paul's visit to Colombia a few months ago. He is Rev. Mgr. Thomas White of Durrow Co. Laois, who is a welcome visitor each year to this locality, as it was here at Millstreet Modeligo, the home of his uncle Mr. Ed. O'Connor, and where his mother was born and reared; that he spends his annual holidays since his early boyhood days.
 Mgr. White entered St. Kieran's College, Kilkenny in 1948 and distinguished himself as a scholar. He also became a hurler of note, winning a place on his county's minor team. In 1950 he entered the Pontifical Irish College in Rome and was ordained in 1956.
 Mgr. White, who is only 37 years of age, is Secretary at the Apostolic Nunciature in Bogota for the past 14 months and arranged the various meetings which His Holiness had with cross-sections of Columbian Society. He said that he considered his appointment not as a personal triumph but as a great honour that an Irishman should be associated with the organisation of the Pontiff's visit.
 After his ordination he was recruited for the Vatican Diplomatic Service and served in various parts of the world before his appointment to Bogota. He is brother of Mr. Sean White, Bord Fáilte, New York; Mr. Willie White, a fashion photographer in London; Mrs. E. P. McKenna, wife of the well-known actor, and Mrs. Alice O'Byrne, Aughrim, Co. Wicklow.

SIABH GUJA
 The place names of a district of the closest connection between that district and the Gaelic language. The reflect the old Gaelic way of life and very often have some wonderful tale to relate.
 Cathair na Leige - The Fort of the Flagstones. The Cathair was the residence of a chief-tain in ancient Eire and usually had two circular fences around it. The Cathair here was on Mr. O'Hanrahan's land but has long since disappeared.
 There are two other Cathairs in Siabh gCua "An Cathair Breac" on Mr. McConville's farm and "An Cathair" on Mr. Cullinan's land at Bleantis. There are much larger than the usual "Lios." Cathair na Leige had na silte; i.e., the meeting of the roads.
 The following names in this townland appear in the Ordinance Map (a) Maun Rua (Red Bog); (b) Ath Doimhin (Deep Ford); (c) Tobair Phoib, Paul's Well; (d) Siosh Phoil (Paul's Stream); (e) Gléann Darmin (Dermot's Glen).
 A branch of the McGrath family lived here in former times. A "Caibine" or tent for Thomas Mac Craith of Cathair na Leige still exists and also a lovely song "Is go Cathair na Leige mo lean ba mhíne mo thrial". We heard this grand air played on the programme "Bring Down the Lamp" by Sean Deering of Dungarvan. At some future date we may be able to give the words.
 Underground Chambers are a feature of some of these ancient fortifications. There are said to be over 30,000 of them extant and are loosely called "fairy forts", "Lane's forts", "Raths" or "Lioses." Some of them have been excavated and have been given dates stretching from the Bronze Age to Medieval time. Most of those excavated date from the 6th to the 9th Century A.D.

SALMON SEASON OPENS

The 1960 salmon season for both nets and rods officially opens today, 1st Feb., but being Saturday, it is weekly close season, on which netting is not permitted. However, netmen can operate from midnight on Friday, until 6 a.m. on Saturday. Net licences were issued at the Fishery Office on Tuesday last. The usual 20 harbour or lower licences were taken out, but it appears that the number of drifts in the upper river will be somewhat less than last year.

NEW FISHERY BY-LAW

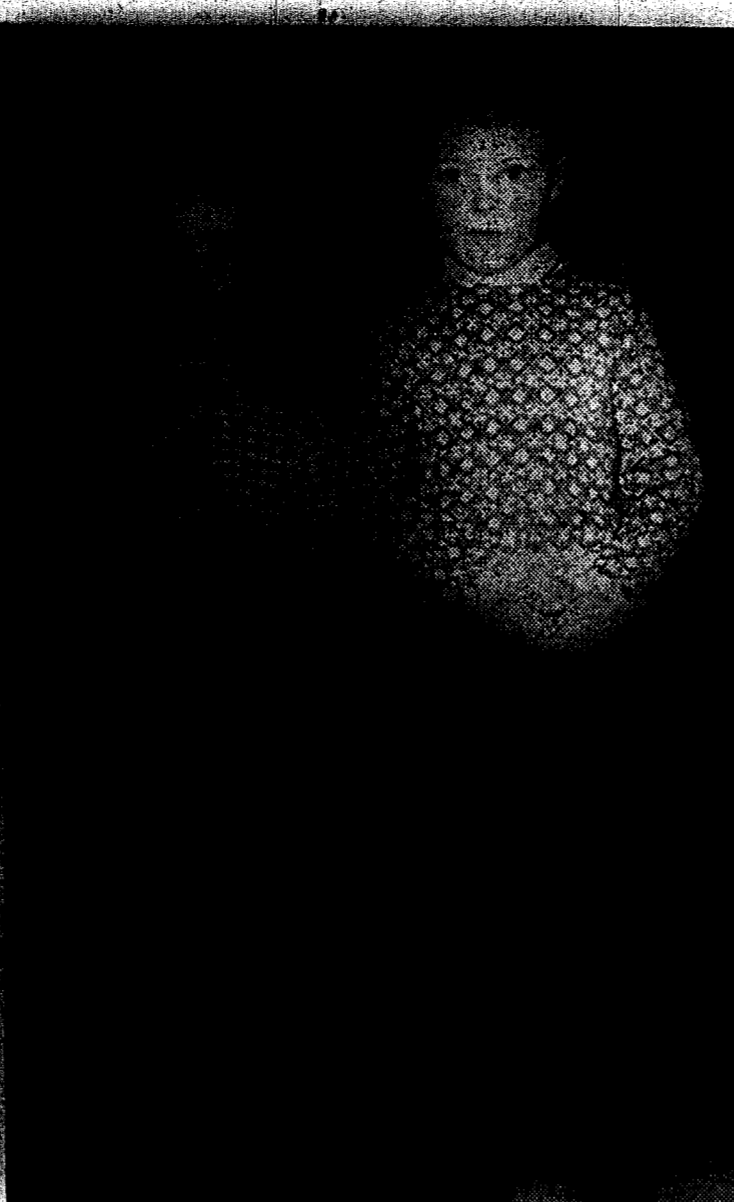
On February 1st this year a new by-law came into operation in this fishery district, limiting the length of a snap net to 20 yards and the mesh not to exceed 2 1/2 inches from knot to knot. The mesh of a draft or drag net is not to exceed 2 1/2 inches from knot to knot, measured when the nets are wet.

FISHERY ELECTION YEAR

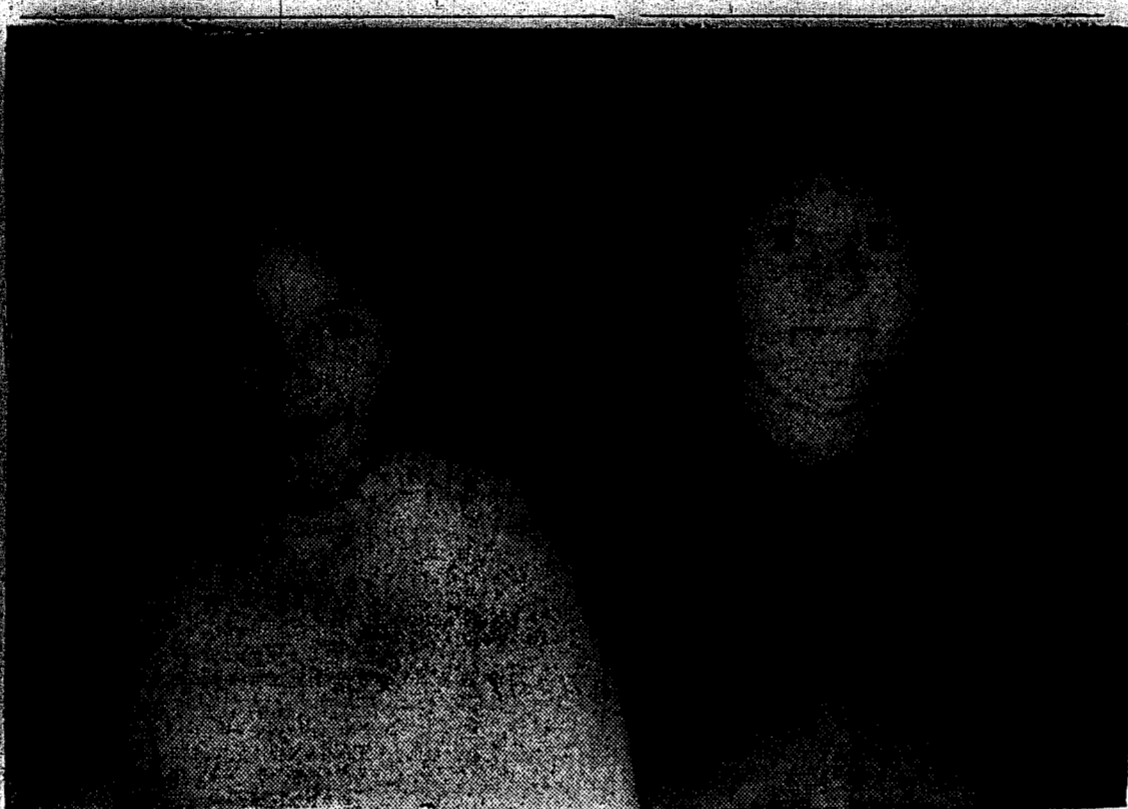

Holders of licences for the '60 season are advised to retain their licences so that they can vote at the coming election or nominate a candidate for the election. The Board consists of 6 freshwater members, six tidal and eleven ex-officio.

BASS FISHING INQUIRIES

On the evidence given by many persons the Minister will decide whether or not to introduce regulations governing the size of bass to be taken and the possible total prohibition of netting them. 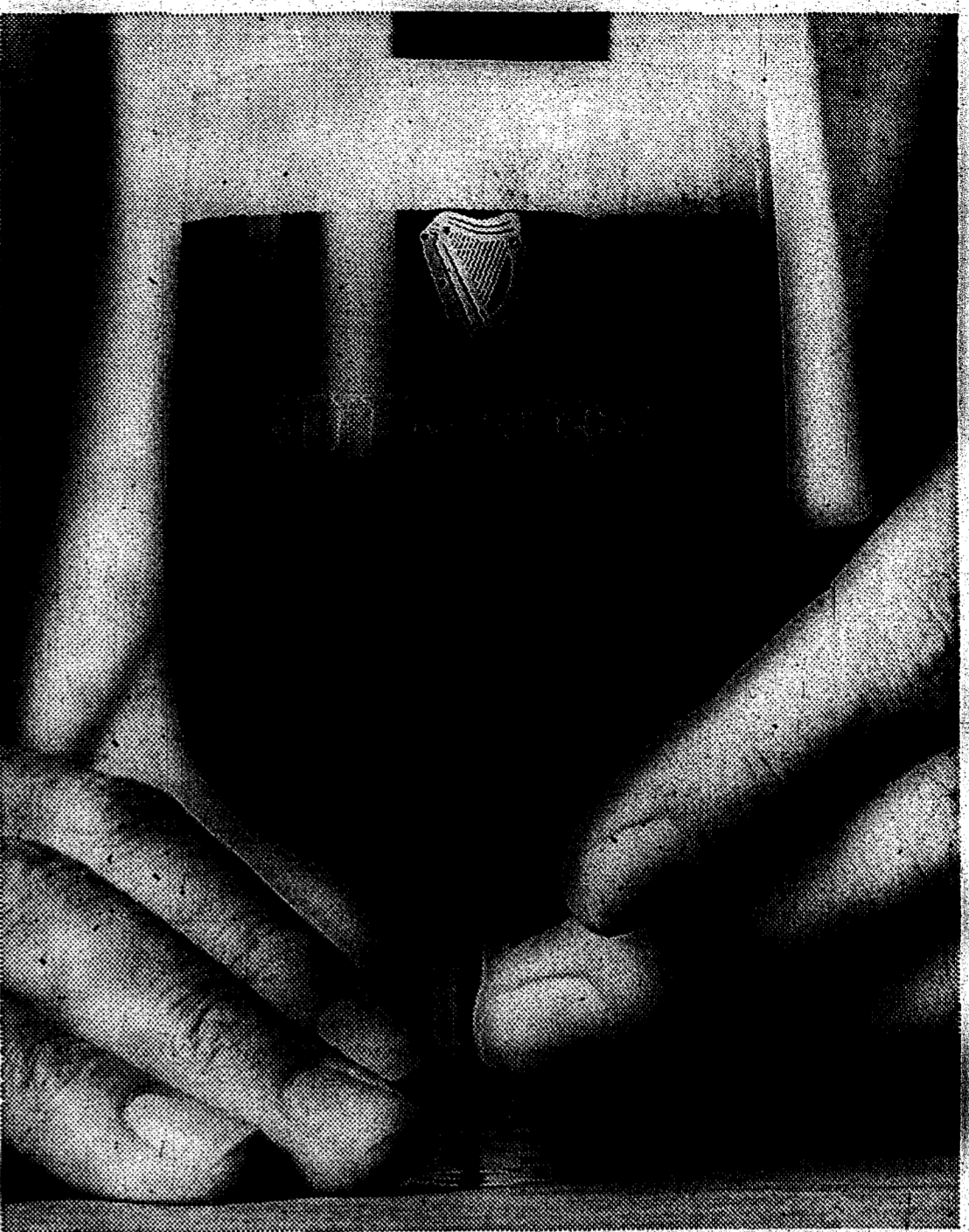

CHECK your cattle regularly for signs of warble infestation from early February onwards and NOTIFY the Department or your District Veterinary Office of any warbled cattle in your herd.

TREATMENT AND CERTIFICATION ARE FREE for affected animals duly notified to the Department. A CHARGE of 5/- per animal will be made for treatment where an owner is found to have in his possession cattle which show warble infestation but which had not been notified.

FAILURE TO NOTIFY WARBLING ANIMALS OR MOVING SUCH ANIMALS WITHOUT A CURRENT TREATMENT CERTIFICATE OR LICENCE RENDERS THE OWNER LIABLE TO PROSECUTION.
