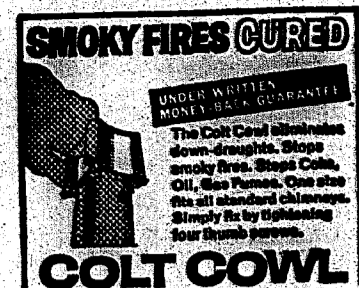

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TO RAISE £5,000 FOR WORK ON DUNGARVAN QUAY

FURTHER concern for Dungarvan's Quay was expressed at last Monday's meeting of the Urban Council, when the Town Engineer, Mr. Patrick Walsh said that wherever the money was going to come from, work would have to be done on the repair of portion of the harbour that recently collapsed into the sea. The meeting decided to seek a loan of £5,000 to commence work on it and representations will also be made to the Department and to Bord Failte in an effort to get grants towards defraying the cost.

The County Manager, Mr. Charles O'Connor said that at the January meeting of the Council, the members adopted a figure of £2,200 as the Roads estimate for maintenance and footpaths for the coming year. There was also an Urban Road Grant of £1,452. Tied up with that estimate was the question of the quay wall and road, and whilst they had given the idea of increasing the insurance on the harbour a lot of thought and consideration that was not feasible. He believed that some money would have to be spent on the harbour, and a sum of £5,000 might be obtained by loan, and they could ask the Dept. to defray 50% of the loan charges. Should the Council consider it, they could defer the £400 included in the estimate for footpaths and put it towards repaying the loan charges.

The Manager went on to state that money might be made available to the Council if they sold their site near the Courthouse to the Dept. of Posts and Telegraphs for a Post Office, whilst they might also consider a deputation to meet the Minister to discuss the whole quay position with him.

The Chairman, Mr. Thomas A. Kyne, T.D., said he felt that a case could be made to Department on the question of saving the roadway at the quay. If there was any further erosion at the quay the public road would go. He would support sending a deputation to the Minister.

Mr. P. Walsh, Engineer said Dungarvan was one of the premier sea angling centres in the South East Coast of Ireland and Bord Failte surely had an interest and commitment here. He felt they could approach them for a grant towards repairing the harbour.

The Manager said Mr. Walsh's suggestion was an excellent one. Unfortunately however, the Engineers just couldn't give a firm estimate of the cost of the entire work.

Mr. Walsh, E.E., said there was a section of about 25 to 30 yards that was in real danger of falling in. That was not a pessimistic but a realistic view of the position and whilst it could last for a year or a few years, the chances were that it would not. The section near the Bridge was also very bad, and a big portion of that would have to be taken down first before the roadway could be repaired. The lower portion of the Quay was also in a very bad state and was the immediate cause of the upper portion collapsing.

Mr. Walsh went on to say that even the top berth where boats were discharging at present, was not all that safe. Wherever the money was going to come from the portion of the harbour that collapsed would have to be repaired, he said.

Mr. Patrick Whelan said that regardless of shipping or tourism, the repairs to the harbour would have to be done for the road's sake.

Mr. Walsh E.E.—If it is not done it will be a frightful advertisement for the town.

Mr. Austin Deasy said the Quay was the showpiece of the town and was the attraction for tourists. On that count

he felt that Bord Failte might help them. The Engineer said he had discussed the position fully with the County Manager and County Engineer and they felt that having spent £5,000 on the quay at least they would have achieved something. It was difficult, he added to assess what the total cost would be and he admitted that they could not even do a great deal with £5,000.

The County Engineer, Mr. J. D. Hally, B.E., who also attended the meeting, said that if the Council went to Bord Failte and told them they had a certain amount of money to contribute towards this work they would be more likely to get something from them than by asking them bluntly what were they prepared to give them.

Mr. Hally went on to say that the County Council was faced with a somewhat similar problem at the Dungarvan side

of Youghal Bridge seven years ago when the quay wall was breached and a hole was carved under the roadway. The County Council did a job on it over a period of years and it was now in reasonably fair condition. If the Urban Council started work on the quay with a backing of £5,000, and then tackled it progressively in the future, it might suffice.

The Town Clerk, Mr. J. P. Robinson said it would cost them £250 in repayment in the first year on a loan of £5,000. That would be slightly over 1% increase in the £ on the rates.

The Co. Manager said the question of the provision of £400 for the repair of footpaths might be deferred and that sum might be put towards repaying the loan charges on the £5,000. They could also agree to send a deputation to the Minister.

The Co. Engineer, Mr. Hally said that by deferring the £400 for footpaths and by using only £1,000 of their Road Grant instead of the £1,452 they could pay off the loan charges completely in the first year without an impact on the rates. The completion of surface dressing of some roads, as envisaged under the Road Grant could be held over he added.

Finally the Council unanimously decided to raise the £5,000 loan, and the officials will try to get a grant from the Dept. and from Bord Failte towards the work. It was also agreed to defer the £400 allocation for footpaths and to spend only £1,000 of the £1,452 Road Grant until it was known if grants would be forthcoming for the work.

HOUSING BEFORE PLAYING FIELDS

HE was in favour of all sports, but he could not put playing fields on the same level as housing. So stated Mr. Patrick Whelan, at this week's meeting of Dungarvan Urban Council, when Colr. Thomas Wade tabled a notice of motion requesting that the Council take immediate steps to acquire suitable land to lease to clubs and organisations in the town, which may require it.

In moving the motion, Mr. Wade said they frequently had deputations coming before the Council looking for sites for either playing purposes or on which they could build premises. This was something they had a duty to do, and for that reason he was moving the motion.

Mr. C. O'Connor (Co. Manager) said he was not at all sure that they had the legal powers to do this. When the Council had land that was not needed at the time they often leased it to clubs and others, but he did not think they

could set out to purchase land for that specific purpose. The Manager added that when the Council had land they had been very fair to clubs.

Mr. Austin Deasy said he did not think the Urban Council had been over generous in the giving of land to clubs. The stage could be reached when land for open spaces was just as important as land for housing and this stage had in fact been reached in Dungarvan. He did not see how a Government could stop them from getting land for playing fields, as it was surely in the interests of the children that they provide them with pitches.

Deputy Tom Kyne (Chairman) said the Abbesside G.A.A. Club went and purchased their own playing field and developed it. Every club should be men enough to do the same, he said, whilst at the same time the Council would give them the fairest break they could. He could not vote for increases on the

rates simply to provide fields cheaply to Associations. Mr. Deasy said he had been a member of the Abbesside G.A.A. field Committee for a number of years, and it was a hardship on them to be trying to pay off the debt.

Deputy Kyne: But they had the will to face up to the task as other clubs and organisations should also have.

Mr. Patrick Whelan said he was in favour of all sports, but he could not put playing fields on the same level as housing. Housing must be their first priority, he said.

Mr. Wade said he did not table the motion with the intention that housing should suffer at the expense of playing fields.

The Manager said he would like to look into this matter because he did not think they had any specific powers to purchase land for this purpose.

The Council agreed to defer it, and the matter will be considered again at the March meeting.

Want Conditions of Post Altered

The Co. Waterford Vocational Education Committee is to ask the Dept. to advertise the post of permanent Whole-time Physical Training Instructor, and to alter the present qualifications so as to enable the Committee's present Temporary Instructor, Mr. John Frazer, Tallow, to be eligible to try for the position.

At last Monday's meeting of the Committee in Dungarvan, the Acting C.E.O., Mr. Thomas F. Maher said they had written to the Dept. requesting them to make Mr. Frazer a Permanent Officer, but they had replied stating that he did not possess the necessary qualifications.

INCREASED EXPENSES FOR MEMBERS

He had always voted against increases on all Committees and he was going to do the same now, stated Mr. James Quirke, at last Monday's meeting of the Co. Waterford Vocational Education Committee in Dungarvan, when a letter was received from the Dept., stating that the Minister was prepared to sanction a sum not exceeding 1/6 a mile to Committee members for travelling expenses.

The Acting C.E.O., Mr. T. F. Maher said the present travelling expenses for members were 1/- a mile. It was also proposed to increase the members' subsistence allowance from 15/- to 25/-.

The Committee approved of the increased rates, with Mr. Quirke dissenting.

£20,000 FOR 90 ACRES TO RETAIN SOME OF SCHOOL EQUIPMENT

A 90-acre non-residential holding, the property of Mr. Patrick Walsh, Tourin, was sold during the week for £20,000. The purchaser was Mr. Jameson, Tourin Grass Drying Station, Messrs. Farrell & Morrissey, Solra, Dungarvan, had. Carriage of Sale and the Auctioneer was Mr. Peter Mackey, Clonca.

TO RETAIN SOME OF SCHOOL EQUIPMENT

The C.E.O., Mr. T. F. Maher is to compile a list of the equipment in Cappoquin Tech. that can be retained for the Committee's use, and the remainder will be sold. This was agreed on at last Monday's meeting of the Vocational Education Committee in Dungarvan, when Mr. Maher said that at their last meeting it was decided that the school's (taken over by the Sisters of Mercy in the town) equipment would be assessed by a Dept. Valuer and sold.

Mr. Maher said some of the equipment in the Cappoquin school would be suitable for

the new Kilmacthomas school, and that would save them from purchasing it when the time came. He had prepared a list of Domestic Science and Woodwork equipment that could be used in Kilmacthomas, blackboards, etc., could be sold.

Mr. Patrick Kennedy said they should keep any equipment that would be of use to them, because to replace it would cost them money.

It was agreed that Mr. Maher compile a list of the equipment that could be retained for the Committee's use, and the items that could be sold.

Youth Club Deputation Before Council

The demand for a Youth Club centre in Dungarvan was there, said Mr. J. D. Hally, B.E., Chairman of the Dominic Savio Youth Club, when he was spokesman for a deputation to last Monday night's meeting of the Urban Council.

Mr. Hally said the reason for the deputation was to seek confirmation of a site at Strandside North, Abbeyside, behind the "two Shops". The demand was there because they were meeting twice weekly in temporary premises at present which were too small for the numbers attending. The Abbeyside site was very suitable and was not too far away from the town centre.

The Council's Engineer, Mr. Patrick Walsh said he had no objection to the proposed site being given to the Youth Club. There were about 17 acres of land at Strandside North that

could be reclaimed in the near future and the erection of a Youth Club on this site would not interfere with these plans.

The Chairman, Mr. Thomas A. Kyne, T.D., said if Mr. Hally and their own engineer got together and discussed what kind of scheme could be worked out they could then submit it to the Council.

Mr. Hally said that all they wanted at the moment was an assurance that they would be given favourable consideration by the Council.

Deputy Kyne said they could take it that they would look kindly on their request for a site.

Dungarvan School May Have Extensions

A new extension, teachers room and gymnasium are the envisaged extensions for Dungarvan Technical School, and at last Monday's meeting of the Co. Waterford Vocational Education Committee in Dungarvan the members unanimously agreed in principle to these proposals.

Acting C.E.O. Mr. T. F. Maher said the principal need in Dungarvan was a new science room, because their present one was inadequate. They also needed a gymnasium, which the Committee has already agreed in principle to, whilst the teachers in the school approached him for a teachers' expenses and make holes whilst waiting for the various classes.

Mr. Maher said he was asking the Committee to agree in principle to the proposals and they could then send it to the Dept. Sketch plans could then be prepared and also sent to the Dept.

Mr. Maher said there would be no money involved for a number of years. The other schools in Dungarvan would also have the use of these extensions, whilst they in turn could avail of other rooms in the other schools.

By agreeing to this in principle they would not be committing themselves to anything.

On the proposal of Mr. Patrick Kenneally, the Committee unanimously agreed in principle to the proposals.

Urban Council in "Extremely Fortunate Position"

Dungarvan Urban Council was in an extremely fortunate position and the plans before the members now was a tribute to the foresight of the previous Councils, said Mr. C. O'Connor, Co. Manager, when he presented a plan for the provision of developed sites on the Council's estate at Abbeyside to last Monday night's meeting of the Council.

The Manager said the Council had forty four sites available for Private houses and forty eight for Council houses, and in time the Council would offer the sites for the private houses for sale. This was an extremely fortunate position to be in and was a tribute to the foresight of the Councils that had gone before them.

The Manager said they could take an outline plan to the Dept. and it would then come back to the Council members at their next meeting.

Deputy Tom Kyne (Chairman) said he was quite happy about the plan. When they purchased this land for £500 an acre in Abbeyside some people said they were mad but they were not so mad after all.

Mr. Patrick Whelan said their greatest need was still housing, and they should press ahead with another scheme as soon as possible.

It was unanimously agreed to submit an outline plan of the sites to the Dept., and the Council will consider the matter further at the next meeting.

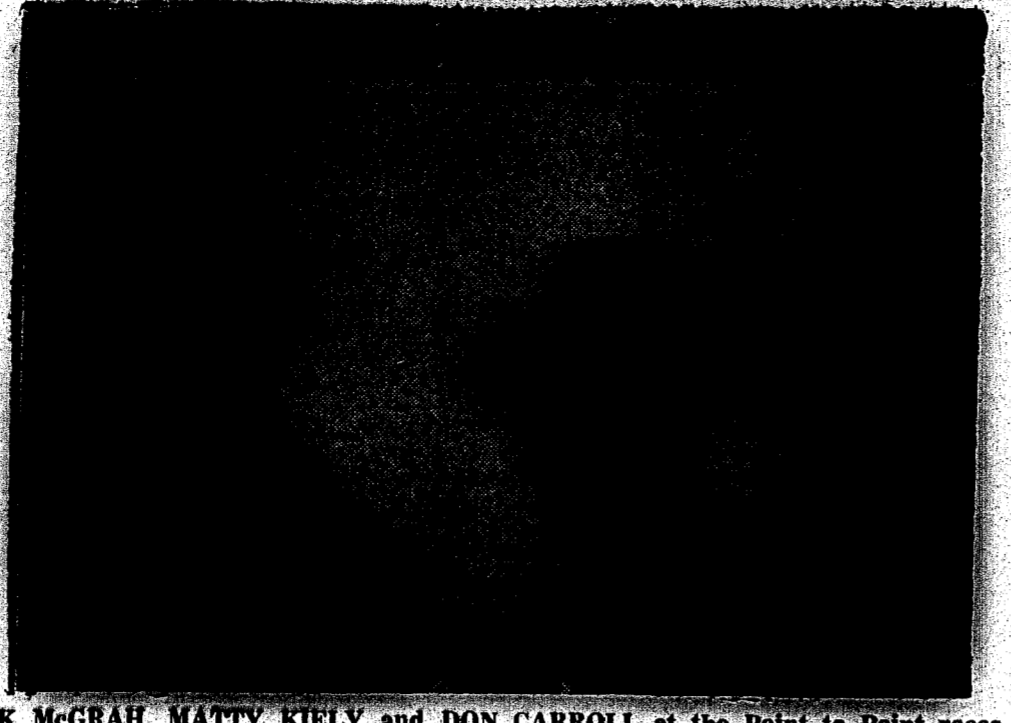

Revised Rent Scheme for Dungarvan

2/6 INCREASE ON FIXED RENTS

A new rents scheme is to be implemented in Dungarvan. This was decided on at last Monday's meeting of the Urban Council when the County Manager, Mr. C. O'Connor, on the instructions of the Council, placed a Revised Scheme of Differential Rents before the members for consideration. The scheme, as presented, was not adopted in toto, but it was agreed that an increase of 2/6 weekly be put on the rents of all Council's "fixed rents" houses.

The Manager's scheme called for an increase in the rents of all houses presently on fixed rents. He proposed to increase the rents of the St. Garvan's Tce., Mitchel Tce., St. Augustine's Tce., Congress Villas Connolly Row and Weyburn Tce. houses from 6/- to 10/- weekly, and the Thomas Tce., St. Brigid's Tce., Cathal Brugha Place and Fitzgerald Tce. houses from 5/- to 10/- weekly. The Caseyville, St. Michael's Tce., St. Patrick's Tce., Wolfe Tone Road, Keating Street, Murphy Place and Shannon Street houses, also on fixed rents, would be increased from a minimum of 2/6 to a maximum of 5/10.

The Manager, in dealing with the scheme, proposed that the principal income be reduced by £1, and since differential rents were based on Gross Income, this allowance he said, would offset deductions from wages for Social Welfare Contributions, etc. He also proposed that the principal income be reduced by a further £1 in the case of houses which had no bathrooms and that the total family income be reduced by 10% in respect of each child under the age of 18 years who was not working. He further proposed that only half the income of other members of the household (excluding the principal income) be taken into account, subject to a maximum of £4 in each case.

Mr. Thomas Wade, the Towns Association representative on the Council, said the Council tenants in Dungarvan would be up in arms against any increase. If there were to be increases however, under no circumstances could the tenants accept those envisaged in the present review. An increase of 2/6 all round would be far more acceptable, and that would bring in an extra £2,500 a year to the Council from the 490 Council houses. The tenants, said Mr. Wade, felt that the money should be spent elsewhere and they were objecting very strongly to this proposed scheme. An increase of 2/6 was as much as any tenant should be asked to pay.

Mr. T. A. Kyme, T.D. (Chairman) said the increases on the fixed rents would only balance the reductions in the differential rents. Also the tenants on

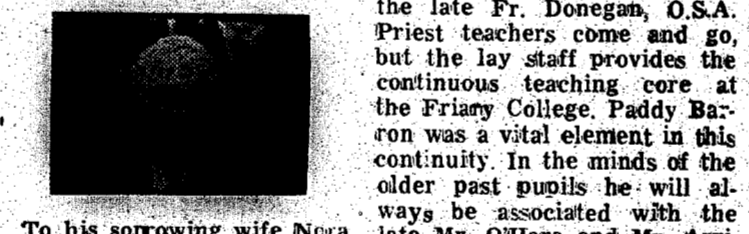
fixed rents had the option of going on differential rents if they so wished. Deputy Kyme said the rents were being reviewed because of complaints by tenants in schemes such as Boreenara, who were paying very heavy rents. He was of the opinion that the rents burden should be shared rather than having it falling on a certain section. Mr. Austin Deasy said he felt that the proposed increase by the Manager on the fixed rents were a bit drastic. In some cases, he said, the fixed rents were being doubled, and that on houses that were not in a very good condition. He had particularly in mind

Mr. Deasy said that would be a very good scheme and he could see no reasons for objecting to it. It was agreed that the Manager would go ahead and advise that scheme.

- (a) Brucellosis in Cattle (Clearance Area) (General Provisions) (Amendment) Order, 1966.
- (b) Brucellosis in Cattle (Disease-Free Area) (Amendment) Order, 1966
- (c) Brucellosis in Cattle (Movement Control) Order, 1966.

The Minister for Agriculture and Fisheries has made three Orders, entitled as above, operate from 17th February 1969.

The Order at —

(a) by amending the Brucellosis in Cattle (Clearance Area) (General Provisions) Order, 1966, provides in relation to the Clearance Area (1) for the surrender in certain circumstances of cattle identity cards issued by the Minister; (2) for the postponement or reduction of payment of compensation for reactor animals in certain circumstances; (3) for controls on the movement of unpasteurised dairy products from infected herds; (4) for the notification to the Minister by a veterinary surgeon of cases of abortion in cattle and (5) for other controls necessary to avoid the spread of brucellosis in cattle.

The Order at —

(b) by amending the Brucellosis in Cattle (Disease-Free Area) Order, 1966 provides in relation to Co. Donegal (1) for the postponement or reduction of compensation for reactor animals in certain circumstances; (2) for the notification to the Minister by a Veterinary Surgeon of cases of abortion in cattle; (3) for controls on the movement of unpasteurised dairy products from infected herds and (4) for other controls necessary to avoid the spread of brucellosis in cattle.

The Order at —

(c) (1) controls the movement of certain classes of animals into and within counties Cavan, Leitrim, Monaghan and Sligo, including the exposure of animals for public sale and (2) provides for the production, surrender, and transfer in certain circumstances of brucellosis certified cards and other documents relating to cattle.

The Order revokes the Brucellosis in Cattle (Movement Control) Order, 1967 (S.I. No. 62 of 1967) and the relevant amending Orders.

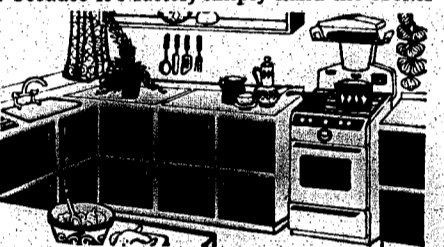

As a team mate of Jackie Bumster, he well merits all the praise given to him by Mr. Murphy. Jackie spearheaded a star-studded Ballinroad team in the late 20's. He was one of the best and most entertaining footballers that ever trod the famed Shandon ground. My greatest memory of Jackie was when he left the Ring defence standing at Dungarvan in 1923 by crashing a great ball to the Ring net from 30 yards out. He continued to perform this feat on many occasions later.

We played the Nire at Dungarvan in 1929. I passed a ball to Jackie and he went like a flash to beat the whole Nire defence, finding the net with a great right footed shot. Yes, in those far-off days, Jimmy Foley was coach and mentor to a great Ballinroad side. He was a tiptop coach and helped Jackie Bumster to reach great heights. If the Waterford Co. Board inaugurate a hall of fame award it should go to one of the greatest footballers of our time, Jackie Bumster.

Labour Party Selects Candidates

The Labour Party Conference to select candidates for the next General Election, took place at the Courthouse, Dungarvan, on Sunday, 16th February. Mr. T. Warrington, Organiser, presided. A large number of delegates from all over the Constituency attended.

Opening the Conference, Mr. Warrington paid tribute to the large numbers attending, notwithstanding the shocking weather conditions of the day. The Labour Party had decided at National Conference, that where a Deputy of the Party existed, that at least another candidate should contest the next election. This was being done so that the electors of the country would have an opportunity of electing from the 100 or so candidates put forward, a Labour Government. During the last few months the Party had published their outline of policy on the many parts of Government administration they would put into operation if they were given the power to do so. The Labour Party reply to any Party who asked what they intended to do following the next election was this: our Policy and any Party that agrees with it are welcome to support a Labour Government to implement it.

The sweeping success of the Party in the Local Elections in Dublin and again the massive swing in the Cork and Limerick byelections showed that the workers in the cities had at last realised where their interests lay and the swing to Labour since the publication of the Party Policy amongst the young voters promised a record vote.

Deputy T. A. Kyne and Aid. T. Brennan were unanimously selected to contest the next General Election.

Deputy Kyne, returning thanks for his selection, said he agreed that two candidates should go forward from the Party and there was no more fitting candidate he would wish for than Aid. Brennan. With his experience of Local Government in the Corporation and on the Health Authority, he would be well fitted to take his place in Dail Eireann. He appealed for the full co-operation of all Branches in seeing to it that every Labour vote was cast for the Party.

Aid. Brennan, thanking the delegates, said he would be proud to fight with his old friend Deputy Kyne in the endeavour to secure two Labour seats in the Constituency. He believed that Waterford City would follow the lead of Dublin, Cork and Limerick, and vote Labour as they had never so strongly done before. We promised his best efforts to make the joint efforts of Deputy Kyne and himself to return two Deputies in the Constituency.

The following were elected to the Constituency Council: Chairman, Deputy Kyne; Vice-Chairman, Aid. Brennan and John O'gan; Hon. Secretary, Liam Curhan, Waterford, and Hon. Treasurer, P. J. Breen, P.C., Dungarvan. Each Branch will nominate one member to the Constituency Council. Meetings will alternate between Waterford and Dungarvan, with instructions to form Divisional Councils where necessary.

A resolution was sent, on proposal of T. A. Kyne, wishing Mr. Matt Organ, President of Abbesside Branch, good wishes for a speedy recovery from his illness.

No Longer Responsible For Day Classes in Tramore

The Tramore Town Commissioners have expressed shock that the termination of the Co. Waterford Vocational Education Committee's lease of day Vocational classes in Tramore.

Mr. T. F. Maher (Acting C.E.O.) told Monday's meeting that the following letter had been received from Mr. Michael Cullen, Acting Town Clerk in Tramore: "At a recent meeting of the Tramore Town Commissioners reference was made to the fact that the Committee was terminating its lease on Tramore House on March 31st. The Commissioners are not concerned with this from the point of view of the letting of the premises, but are shocked to realise that your action may mean the end of Vocational Education in Tramore."

"There is a great need for adult education in Tramore; the town is expanding rapidly many houses are being built there and it is held that nowhere else does a greater demand for it exist. I am instructed to seek an assurance that the Committee does not plan to withdraw facilities for Vocational Education and that you intend to provide a better service in the future."

Mr. Maher said that the Stella Maris Convent and the C.B.S. in Tramore had merged to take over the Post Primary Education in the town. The Vocational Committee had to give up its interests in day classes then, and both the Convent and C.B.S. gave an undertaking that they would be able to cater for all the subjects taught by the Vocational Authority. There was a signed agreement three years ago to this effect, and the Committee's lease in Tramore would terminate next month and the Committee would no longer have any responsibility for day classes in the town.

Mr. Maher went on to say that there was no question of their stopping Adult Education in Tramore, and any classes that would be required there would be provided.

Mr. Austin Deasy said the Town Commissioners were under the impression that the Vocational Committee was responsible for providing these Vocational subjects when in fact they were not. He wondered if the Commissioners were aware of the signed agreement of three years ago.

Mr. Maher: They are. This agreement was signed whereby the Convent and C.B.S. would provide all the subjects taught by the Vocational Committee under the Post Primary set up.

Mr. Ted Buckley, N.T. said under this new set-up in Tramore the Post Primary school was responsible for the teaching of the Vocational subjects.

Mr. Sean Whelan: We are no longer responsible for the teaching of day classes in Tramore.

Mr. Maher: That is correct. We will however provide Adult Education if there is a demand for it.

It was unanimously agreed to inform the Commissioners that they were no longer responsible for day classes in the town, but that night classes would be provided if there was a demand for them.

As from 17th February 1969

COWS

HEIFERS AGED 12 MONTHS AND OVER or BULLS AGED 9 MONTHS AND OVER

may not be moved into the Clearance Area (Counties Cavan, Leitrim, Monaghan and Sligo) unless they are:

- moved under special permit direct from a certified herd in Co. Donegal, a Brucellosis (Certified) Herd or a similar herd in the Six Counties.
- OR
- accompanied by an official certificate that each animal has passed a Brucellosis test within the previous 14 days
- OR
- being moved direct to a registered slaughtering premises or through the area to a destination outside the area under permit.


The permits and certificates referred to above are issued in appropriate cases by the District Veterinary Offices of the Department of Agriculture and Fisheries or the Ministry of Agriculture in Belfast.

Anyone who infringes the above movement controls renders himself liable to prosecution and a heavy fine.

Certainly there is a good run of fish into the estuary of the Blackwater and there is every indication that catches will improve with a change of weather conditions. Price per lb. to fishermen remained at 14.

YOUGHAL DOCTOR BEREAVED
 Deep regret was felt in town on Monday last at the announcement of the death of Dr. Michael J. Riordan, of St. Luke's, Cork, which took place after a period of illness at the Mercy Hospital, Cork. For over 40 years he was consultant surgeon at the Mercy Hospital, and was also on the staff of the Bon Secour Hospital, and a Fellow of the Royal College of Surgeons. He was brother of Dr. Eugene T. Riordan of South Abbey, Youghal, to whom deep sympathy is extended and the other members of the Riordan family.

YOUGHAL MAN ACQUITTED
 At the Central Criminal Court on Monday last, a 34-year-old factory worker Eamonn Collins of Friar Street, Youghal, was acquitted by a jury on a charge of causing malicious damage in excess of £50 to a number of buses in Limerick on May 29th last. He was also found not guilty of obstructing a member of the Garda in the execution of his duty on the same occasion, when six buses were burned in a Limerick car park.

Through her and her work there continues the great tradition of Gaelic culture, music and dance so lovingly fostered by the gentle, kindly poet and in his children and grandchildren he has left worthy successors to a proud and great tradition of Gaelic culture and pride of race.

Inquest on car crash

A verdict in accordance with the medical evidence that death was due to shock and laceration of the brain, result of a motor car accident at Ballymacmague, Dungarvan on 30th January, was returned by a Jury at an inquest before Dr. D. Healy, Coroner in Dungarvan, on Wednesday, on the 16th year old Thomas Patrick McGrath, Caseville, Dungarvan.

William McGrath, father of the deceased, gave evidence of identifying his son's body at 1.15 a.m. in the morgue of Dungarvan hospital, on January 31st. He had last seen his son alive around 6 p.m. on January 30th when he was in his usual good health.

Dr. John Ballot, Dungarvan, said that at approximately 11.30 p.m., on the night of January 30th he was told of a serious car accident at Ballymacmague, Dungarvan. He went to the scene and saw a car overturned at the Railway Crossing with the engine still running. There was a man lying in a pool of blood on the roadway near the car. It was the deceased. Petrol was still spilling at the rear of the car and in case that it caught fire he had the injured man removed to a safe distance. He then extricated a second man from the car and put them both in the ambulance.

Dr. Ballot said he accompanied them in an ambulance to Dungarvan district hospital, but McGrath died on the way. He examined him further the next day and found that he had a broken left wrist, and his left cheek bone had been driven in. There was a penetrating wound over the left cheek about two inches wide and on probing this wound he found that it extended up to and through the base of the skull and into the cranial cavity. In his opinion death was due to shock and laceration of the brain.

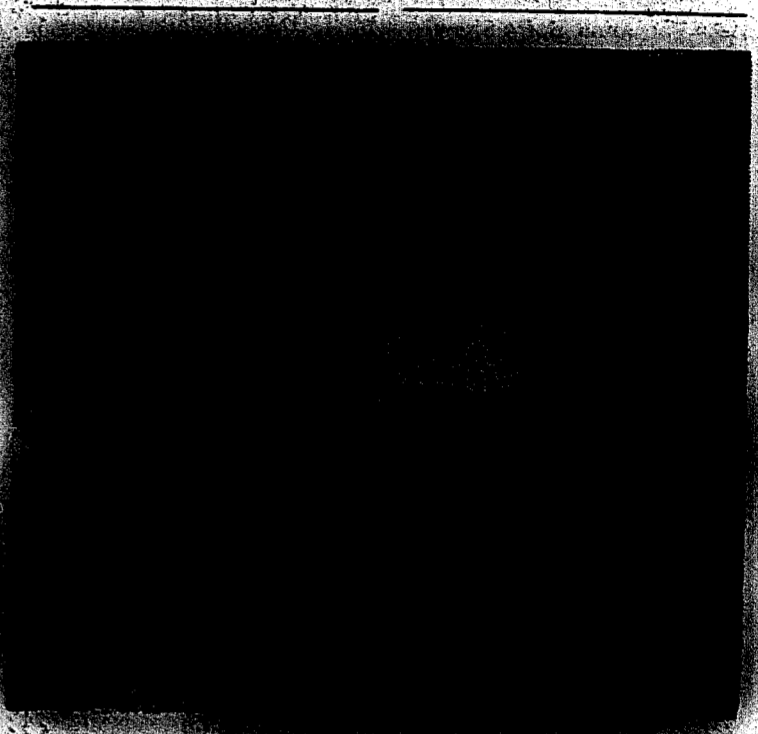
Garda John Griffin, Dungarvan said the accident was reported to him at 11.30 p.m., on 30th January and he went with Garda T. O'Donovan to the scene at Ballymacmague. A motor car was overturned and Dr. Ballot was attending to the injured men. Both were unconscious and were removed to Dungarvan hospital. He subsequently accompanied William McGrath to the hospital morgue, where he identified his son, Thomas Patrick. At this stage the Jury retired to consider the evidence, and they returned within a short time, and the foreman of the Jury, Mr. Peter Quailly said they were returning a

verdict in accordance with the medical evidence that death was due to shock and laceration of the brain as a result of a motor car accident at Ballymacmague. On behalf of the Jury he extended sympathy to the relatives of the deceased youth.

Dr. Daniel Healy, Coroner and Supr. M. Healy, on behalf of the Garda Síochána, also associated themselves with the sympathy of the parents and relatives of the deceased.

Mr. E. P. King, Supr. Dungarvan, who appeared for the parents and family of the youth, thanked them for their sympathy, and said he had been asked by the Garda Síochána to convey their thanks to the Garda for all they had done for them.

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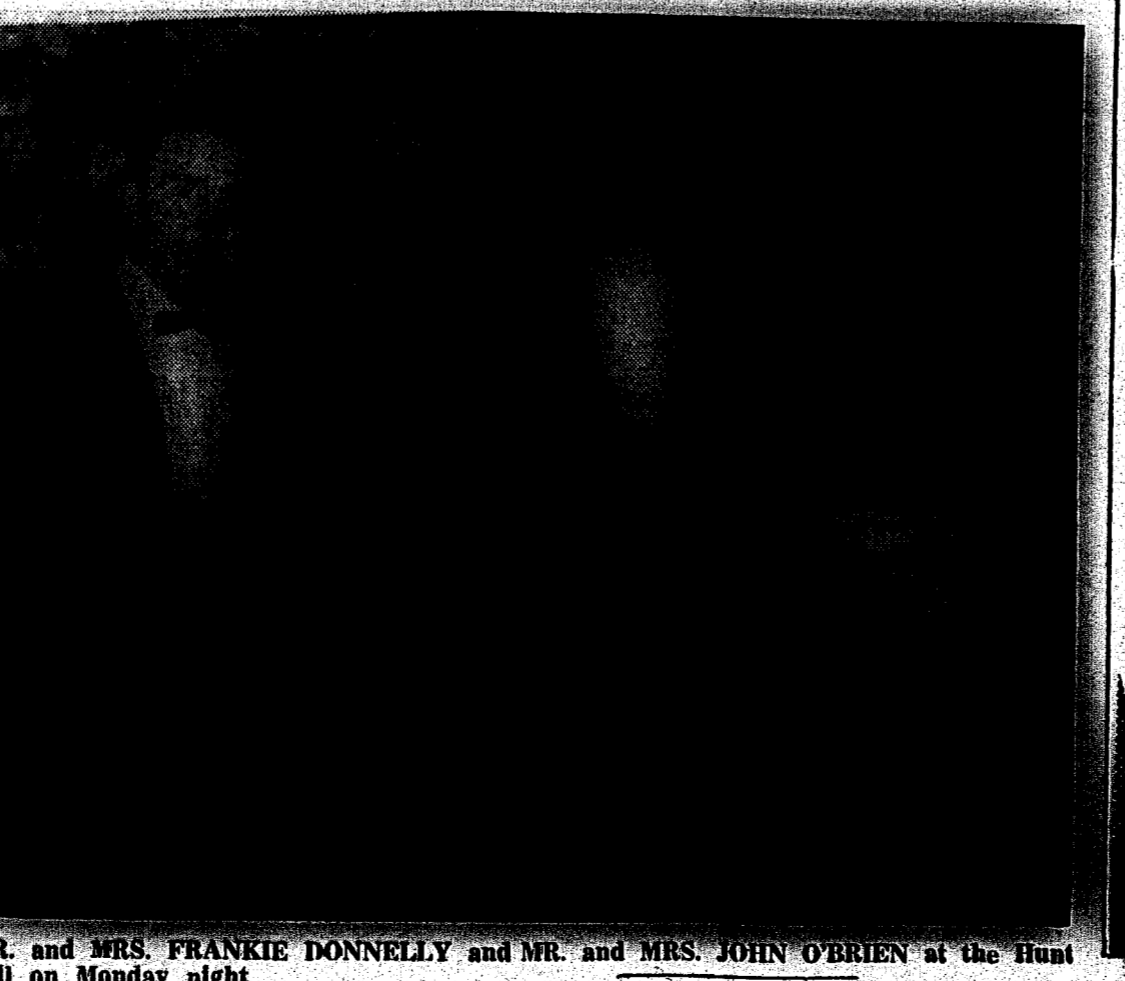
