DUNGARVAN AND CLONMEL

ESTIMATES MEETING ADJOURNED Rate of 83/4 Facing Public

THE members of Waterford County Council met in Dungarvan on Friday last to consider the estimates of expenditure as presented by County Manager, Mr. Charles A. O'Connor, for the coming financial year, 1969-70. The estimates called for an increase of 11/104 on the current year's rate, which, if passed, would have brought the rate for 1969-70 to a staggering

83/4 in the £. But the Council on the proposal of Mr. Norman Walsh took the unexpected step of adjourning consideration of the estimates until the Health Authority had re-examined its Estimates for the coming year, in an effort to effect savings. It was further decided to ask the Minister for Health what increased grants, if any, he proposes to give them for next year.

The total revenue expenditure of Health Authorities in the coming year would be in the neighbourhood of £40 million, as compared with a figure of £41 million as originally estimated in respect of the current year. It was particularly disturbing, the circular added, that this situation should be expected to develop in a year in which no substantial extensions to services were being budgeted for.

The Dept's Circular went on to say that the Minister shared with the Council the consciousness of the very heavy burden which the local rates impose and of the requests from many sources that the exchequer come to the assistance of the ratepayer by extending existing subventions towards the health services for the relief of rates. The Minister for Finance has however already made known publicly that the Exchequer is facing a very difficult situation in the coming budget. Substantial increases in the Estimates for the public services as a whole indicate a level of expenditure for 1969-70, which, altogether, outstrips estimated revenue, and unless very large economies are effected, further increases in taxation will be necessary.

The Circular also stated that such increases, unpleasant in themselves, could at this stage put a serious restraint on growth in the National Economy. The most effective way of reducing the burden on the ratepayer, without transferring a corresponding burden on to the taxpayer, was to reduce the level of local expenditure. The Minister, he added, felt that in the Health Services substantial economies can be found without detriment to the efficiency or availability of the present services. He accordingly asks that each Health Authority examine critically their forecasts of expenditure for the coming year and that they should endeavour to achieve substantial reductions in their projected expenditure.

The Manager, in his report went on to state that to meet the costs of the services, for which a gross sum of £1,135,943 was estimated, a rate of 83/4 in the £ would be required for the year 1969-70. This would represent an increase of 11/104 on the current year's rate of 71/6.

The Manager added that the Council was aware of the continued demand from the public for new improved and extended services in all spheres of activity, and it had been the Council's policy, within the limits of the community's resources, to meet these demands as far as possible.

Concluding the Manager said that since his report had been finalised, a circular had been received from the Dept. of Health, asking all Health Authorities to examine critically their forecasts of expenditure for the coming year in an endeavour to achieve substantial reductions in their projected expenditure.

DEPT'S LETTER

The Dept's letter stated that the Minister for Health had under consideration the cost of the Health Services in the coming year, and on the basis of the estimates submitted by Health Authorities the total cost of the services in the year 1969-70 would show an unprecedented increase over the costs in the current

year. The total revenue expenditure of Health Authorities in the coming year would be in the neighbourhood of £40 million, as compared with a figure of £41 million as originally estimated in respect of the current year. It was particularly disturbing, the circular added, that this situation should be expected to develop in a year in which no substantial extensions to services were being budgeted for.

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Concluding the letter stated that each Local Authority was to examine its estimates in respect of its Health Authority as a matter of urgency with a view to securing substantial economies.

At the outset, the Chairman Mr. Charles Curran said they were faced with the onerous task of striking a rate for the coming year, but at this stage practically all of the estimates before them were mandatory and no reductions could be made without a pruning of the services. This Council has for years, he said, been trying to introduce a common sense approach to the spending of Public money, and the letter from the Dept. before them was a vindication of the Council's caution and restraint in the spending of Public money over the years.

Mr. Curran said the increases were due mainly to an extension of the services, the increased cost of the existing services and salary and wage increases.

Mr. Norman Walsh said they should adjourn the meeting. The Minister had asked them in his circular to try and effect substantial reductions in the Health Authority Estimates and he felt they should accede to his request. It would also be unwise to strike a rate

without increasing the cost. Mr. Declan Ahearn said if he went back to the people that elected him and said he was a party to an increase of 12/- on the rates he did not know what would happen. Mr. Curran: I still think the Minister is going to come to the aid of the ratepayers. He will have to. Deputy Kynne: I think that is wishful thinking.

At this stage Mr. Deasy proposed an amendment to Mr. Walsh's proposition, that they go ahead and with the other estimates other than Health, and that they adjourn the striking of the rate until the Health Authority had re-examined its Estimate. Mr. Thomas Dunphy seconded.

This amendment was beaten by 17 votes to 3, and Mr. Walsh's proposal was then put that they adjourn the meeting and was carried by a 15-5 vote.

The voting was: For—Cols. Walsh, Deasy, Dover, Hart, P. Kenneally, Whelan, Coffey, Cusack, O'Ryan, Ahearn, Dowd, Quicke, Dunphy, Harney, Keane (15); Against—Cols. Curran, Kynne, Hennessy Cahill, W. Kenneally, T.D. (5).

The Council will now consider the striking of the rate at its monthly meeting on 10th March.

Mr. T. A. Kynne, T.D., said there were statutory demands before them and they couldn't get out of those. Quite obviously next year they would need even more money, but whether the Minister would meet the increase or whether it would have to come out of rates, he did not know. They could not improve the services

Soon, he said, an announcement would be made about an increase of about 20% for Capitalisation Rates, and he could see another £42,000 being expended in the coming year that no provision had been made for in the Health Authority estimate. The Dept. should be written to, telling them that no deductions could be made, and that instead they might have to increase it. He was aware that there would be substantial increases in the cost of the Health services in the coming year that no provision had been made for, and it was his honest and considered view that no reductions could be made on that estimate.

Mr. Walsh said that obviously the Minister had something in his mind and they should not strike a rate until they knew what it was. He accepted as valid however the points made by the Co. Manager.

Mr. Curran: I can see a situation building up in this country where there will be a complete break down in our economy.

Co. Manager: The Rate must be struck by March 18th. There are Statutory Demands before us from the Corporation and Health Authority that must be met.

Mr. Austin Deasy said increases should be tied to the output of the people. People with £20 Valuation were paying a huge part of the rates, despite the fact that a lot of the incomes of these people had not improved, whilst others had got their percentage increases. This country

Members Expenses; 'Would Hardly Pay For Postage'

What the members of Waterford County Council were getting in a year for attending meetings of the Council would hardly pay for their postage stamps, remarked the Chairman, Mr. Charles Curran, at last Friday's estimates meeting of the Council in Dungarvan.

Mr. F. J. O'Leary, (County Accountant) told the members that for the year ended December 31st last, it had cost £4,210 to convene the Council meetings. The total maximum cost of convening a meeting was £20-10-0, but it usually cost something less than that because some members would be absent. The £4,210, he said

included a revised travelling rate of 1/6 a mile, which was implemented last August. Next year it would cost more because the revised rate would be in operation for the entire 12 months.

Mr. O'Leary said the rates to members for the year differed in all cases, but ranged from a minimum £13-10-0 a year to a maximum of £107.

Some of this was covered by grants.

Mr. Austin Deasy said when grants were taken into consideration it was costing less than a half penny in the £ on the rates to convene their meetings.

Mr. Curran said some people

were under the impression that Council members were making money out of this, but what they were getting would hardly pay for their postage.

Mr. Norman Walsh said the amounts each Councillor received for the past twelve months should be published in the Press.

Mr. H. R. Dowd said that now that the public realised what the Council members were getting out of it, no one else would be interested in seeking election, and that the present members would be saddled with the job for all time.

COUNCIL'S STAFF THANKED

The staff of Waterford Co. Council were the recipients of congratulatory remarks from County Councillors, at last Friday's estimates meeting of the Council in Dungarvan. For the great work they had done in clearing the roads during the recent bad spell of weather.

Mr. Patrick Kenneally said the Council staff had shown that they had the interests of the community at heart, and it was only right that they should convey their thanks to them.

Mr. Patrick Cahill seconded, the Chairman and the other members of the Council associated themselves with the remarks.

Justice Skinner said Costigan had been fairly well behaved lately and he had seen him before the Court for a long time. He convicted him of the charge but gave him the P.O.A.

"Their talents and energies should be channelled through the various voluntary organisations which do so much good for all sections of the community. On the other hand, we should express our support for those movements which seek to establish a more just and equitable society in this country. Local and Central Government should be receptive to such deputations so that all the facts may be laid bare and solutions to the problems may be more easily achieved.

In conclusion I wish to express my gratitude to the Secretary, Treasurer and the Branch delegates who worked so ardently to achieve all our successes during the year, and I feel sure that their efforts will be rewarded by the election of a Fine Gael Government during 1969.

Wheat Sowing—No Time to Lose

The county advisory services wish to draw the attention of farmers to the importance of early sowing of wheat. Suitable sowing conditions may occur early in March. These may be of short duration and should be availed of as fully as possible.

Early sowing is the first step in preventing the difficulties associated with the late harvesting of the wheat crop. The two important wheat varieties are Quern and Aile. Quern is the better winter wheat, but Aile has a slight advantage in milling quality.

Quern has a good resistance to rusting in the ear. Its resistance to shattering is about equal to that of Aile. If in doubt about sowing, recommendations your agricultural instructor will be glad to help.

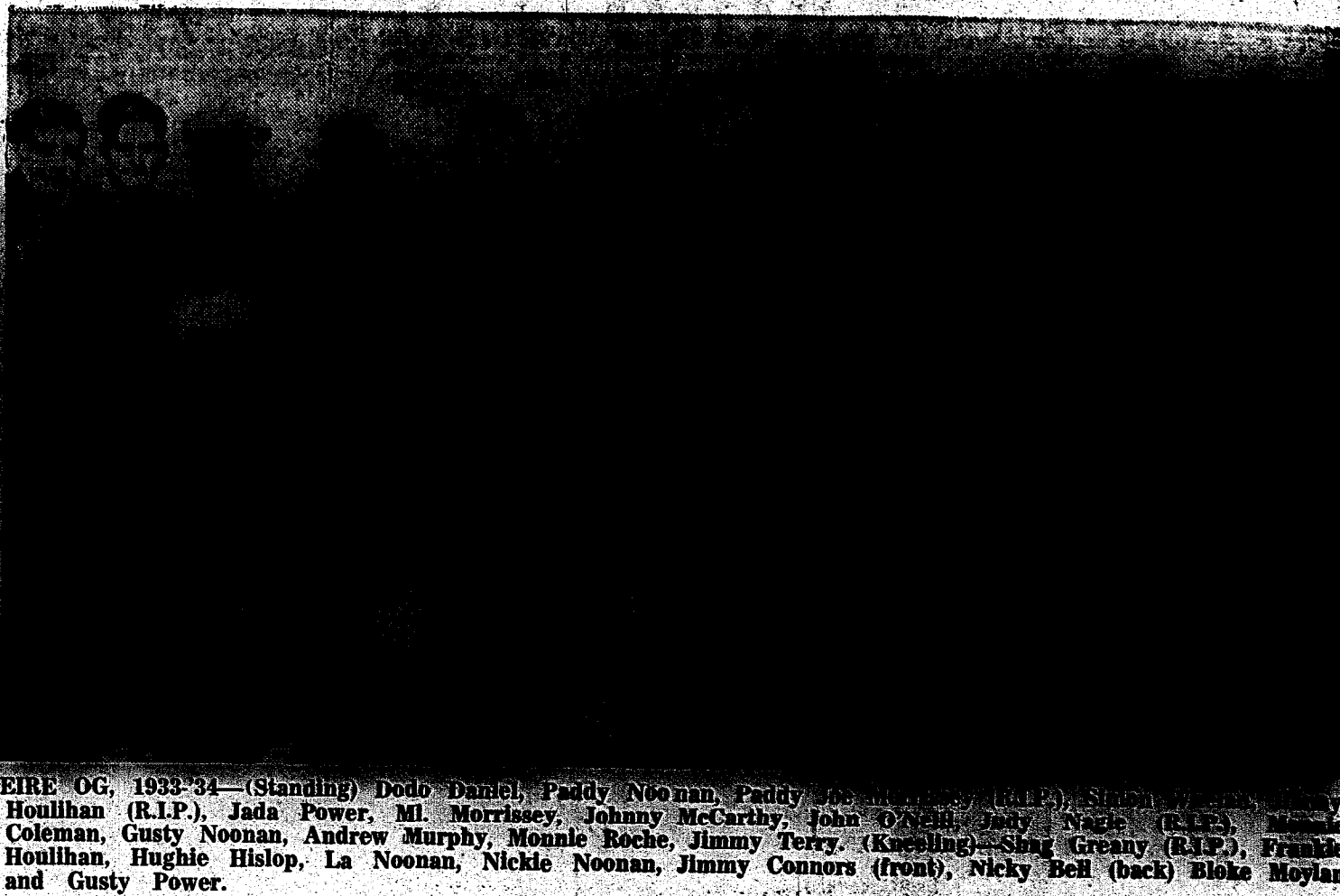
