Court Sequel to Dungarvan Show Win

AT Cashel Court on Wednesday, the Dungarvan Show
Society was given a decree for £45 against
James Wade, Camas, Cashel, for the wrongful detention
of the Guinness Perpetual Trophy, which was won by the
defendant's son, Tommy Wade, riding Dundrum at
Dungarvan Horse Show in 1967.

Mrs. Eunice Hookin, secretary
of the Society, said that the de-
fendant entered a horse
named Dundrum for a speed
competition at their 1967
Show. Dundrum won and the
following year she applied in
the usual way for the return
of the trophy but received
no answer.

Cross-examined by Mr. D. T.
Ryan, Solicitor, witness said no re-
ceipts were asked for, for
trophy by her Society. Very
few societies look for re-
ceipts but Dublin, she believed
was an exception. It was not
the practice to take back
trophy following their presen-
tation to have names of win-
ners engraved on them.

Nicholas Cummins, Guinness
Co. Waterford representative,
said that he attended the Dun-
garvan Show in 1967. He saw
the Guinness Trophy being
presented by the wife of a
Guinness representative to
the defendant's son.
Witness identified himself in
a photograph of the presenta-
tion handed into Court by Mr.
A. V. Maher, solicitor, for the
plaintiffs.

Cross-examined by Mr. Ryan,
witness said that he understood
that some societies did look
for receipts for trophies won.

Paul J. Power, President of
the Society, said that he was
present at the presentation of
the Guinness Trophy to Mr.
Tommy Wade. He was seated
on another horse, Rolling Hills,
at the time. This horse came
fourth in the competition. His
Society did not look for re-
ceipts. In Dublin they did
but the cup, were so valuable
that few winners would take
them away.

Justice Skinner—How valu-
able was this cup?

Mr. Maher said that the
agreed value was £45.

Cpl. Ronald Chavasse said he
acted as announcer at the
1967 Show. The Guinness
Trophy was won by and pre-
sented to Mr. Tommy Wade.

Cross-examined by Mr. Ryan,
witness said that it was usual
for a winner to ride off with
the Cup following a presenta-
tion. To do that would be no
trouble to a man with Mr.
Wade's experience.

DID NOT TAKE CUP.

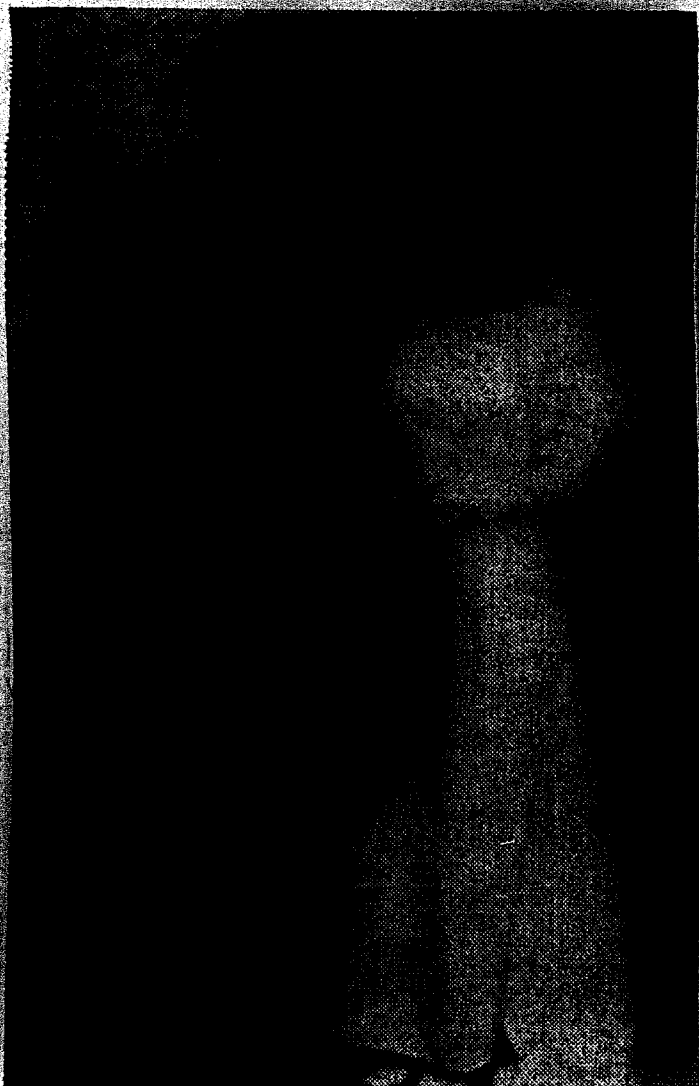
James Wade, defendant, said
that he was the owner of Dun-
dum and Rolling Hills. He
entered both horses for the
1967 Dungarvan Show and Dun-
dum won the Guinness Per-
petual Trophy. He did not
take the Cup. His instructions
in recent years to his sons
were, not to take perpetual
cups back with them. He had
won numerous trophies in Dub-
lin and all over the country
and was always asked to sign
a receipt. On an occasion
when a representative of Guin-
ness called to enquire about
the trophy, he told him that
he had never received it.

Overcrowding at Kilrossanty N.S.

The provision of additional
accommodation at Kilrossanty
National School was being
held up pending the Manager's
assent to the amalgamation of
the Fews and Kilrossanty
Schools. This was the text of
a reply given by the Minister
for Education, Mr. Lennihan, to
Deputy John Fahey, following
his representations in regard
to overcrowding existing at the
Kilrossanty school at present.

The Minister also stated that
he was hopeful that this mat-
ter could be resolved at an
early date and his Dept. would
then expedite as far as pos-
sible the preliminary arrange-
ments for the provision of the
necessary additional accommo-
dation.

The young priests were or-
dained by the newly consecrat-

who is a director of the Va-
tican Bank, and this was his

first ordination as a bishop.
The ceremony was conducted
in English according to the
new Ordination Rite.

After their ordination the
priests concelebrated Mass

Anthony and Mr. P. Griffin,
Limerick, whose son was also
ordained, presented the offer-

thony's College, Galway, and

A PLEA FROM INDIA

BY REV. FR. NASH S.J.
(By courtesy of "THE SUNDAY PRESS")

The first letter comes from India. The writer is Fr. Alphonse, O.C.O., a Carmelite. His address is: St. Joseph's Monastery, Varapuzha P.O., Ernakulam DT, Kerala State, S. India. There isn't a chance that you remember all that so please write it down as you'll want it again—I feel sure.

"With most grateful hearts," says Fr. Alphonse, "we thank you for the £5 just delivered here by the postman. We pray God to bless and reward you as only He can. We appreciate very much also that you have written about us. It is our most earnest prayer that many, generous souls may be prompted to help our poor destitute people realising that what they do for these, His least ones, is done to Himself.

"This is the largest parish in the archdiocese. We are four priests and two brothers and seven branch churches. In all about ten thousand Catholics rather more spread out over a huge area. The work as you will realise is constant, but we are not too tired to do it. What breaks our hearts is the spectacle of so many many starving poor on all sides Catholics and non-Catholics. I eat only one meal a day deliberately omitting supper so as to have at least a little to give away. But when I feel so criminal when eating even this small meal when I reflect on the many around me who don't have a square meal any more in the month.

"When on my rounds I see the utter misery and hunger and poverty and diseases of all these good people I feel the need for an increase of alms. We do everything we possibly can to help them still. I cannot sleep at night haunted by the thought of their misery.

"Please, PLEASE, father, will you tell your readers about us once more! The Communists are making capital out of the situation, and you know how easily a poor starving person can be led to believe their lies and join their ranks. I would beg you to tell your friends that £3 a month would enable a family to procure their full ration of rice, and if they have that is all they desire and pray for. Just three pounds a month—I cannot doubt that there are people in the Island of Saints—as we call Ireland—who would be willing to send us that sum. It would be a fortune for the poor whom we always

have with us, and an immense relief. We would send a photo of each family so helped, and the entire parish, priests and people, would pray for our benefactors."

By the time our readers have seen this first letter a reply will have reached Fr. Alphonse. It too, is going by registered post, and he stresses that this is the surest way to provide against "accidents" in transit. "Dear Father," we art writing, "we feel we do not deserve any thanks for any help we try to send you. We regard it as high privilege to co-operate in so worthy a cause, more especially because, as you remind us, what is done to your dear suffering people is done to Christ Himself.

"If you experience qualms of conscience for eating a single meal only in the day, what must we feel! Many of us have abundance; we spend many a £3 on amusement, dances, movies, shows, drink, cigarettes. Were we to look back on a Monday morning and reckon how much we had spent on extras over the week-end, and balance that against your modest request, we think we might well feel remorse of conscience.

"Not all of us have abundance, of course, but a large proportion of us if we were awake to your needs, could give substantial assistance. Indeed, it is often those who possess least who give most—at the cost of personal sacrifice. It is also true that the response from Ireland to help feed the hungry has been magnificent. We had a wonderful film of Biafra on television lately which brought us close up to reality and spurred us on to further generosity.

"There are many urgent appeals for many worthy causes. We don't doubt that yours will stir up again the charity of Christ in our hearts and lead us to give Him food and drink in His distressed people. We shall look forward to hearing from you and to seeing the picture of the family we try to help. We value your prayers and all of us, rich and poor, promise to unite with you and your parishioners in commending to Our Lord and Our Lady, the needs of all spiritual and temporal.

"We have carefully noted your address and we thank you for reminding us to send our letters by registered post."

It was indeed regrettable, as on Sunday a Waterford team won a Munster championship for the first time ever, thus making athletic history in Co. Waterford. These winners from De La Salle, St. Donip's, Butlerstown, Deise, Enniscorthy and Lismore packed magnificently, and had too much power for the holders and king-pins of juvenile athletics, Cork.

A special word of praise and congratulations to local boy, Tony Ryan, who ran a really magnificent race and finished in third place. A marvellous achievement for this thirteen year old boy. All credit too, to the unsung manager of the Deise juveniles—the Hon. Secretary, Eddie Moore, whose dedication to the promotion of juvenile athletics has been crowned with success in brilliant fashion.

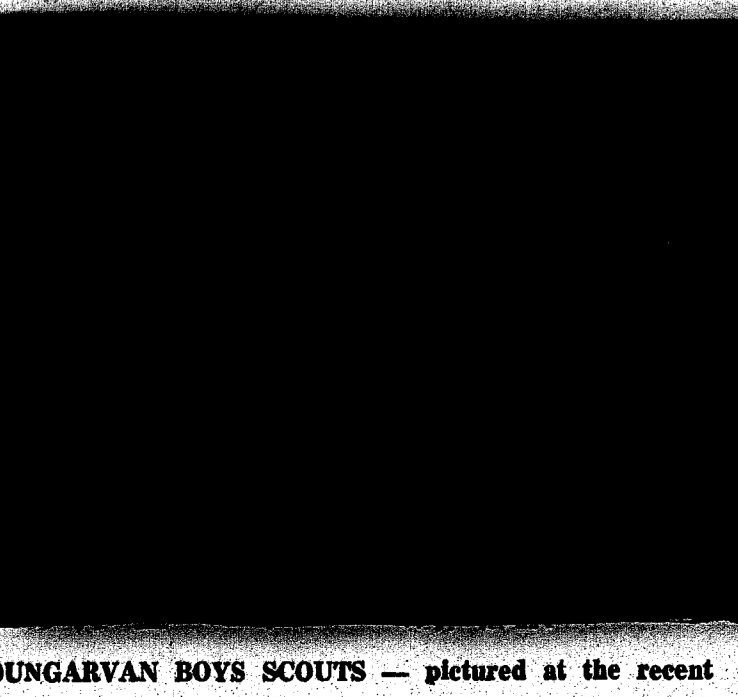
YOUGHAL NOTES

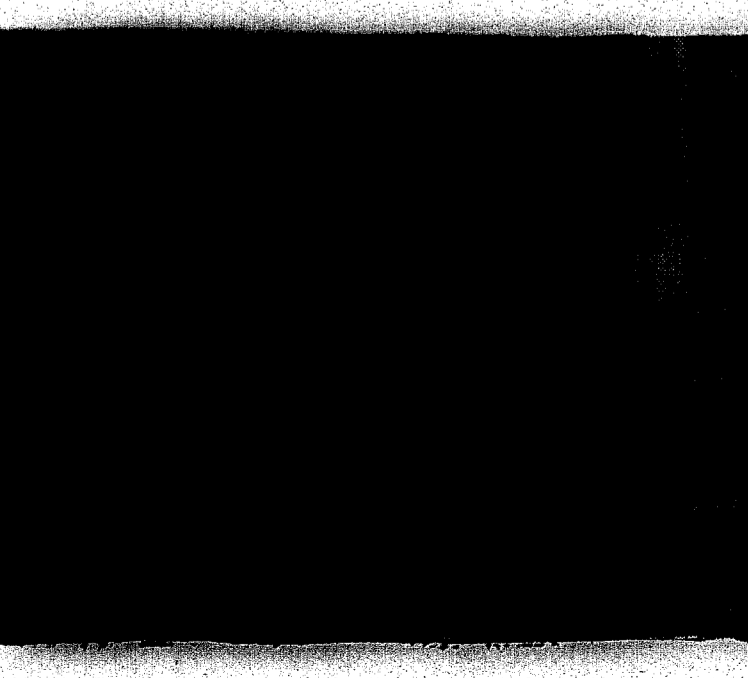

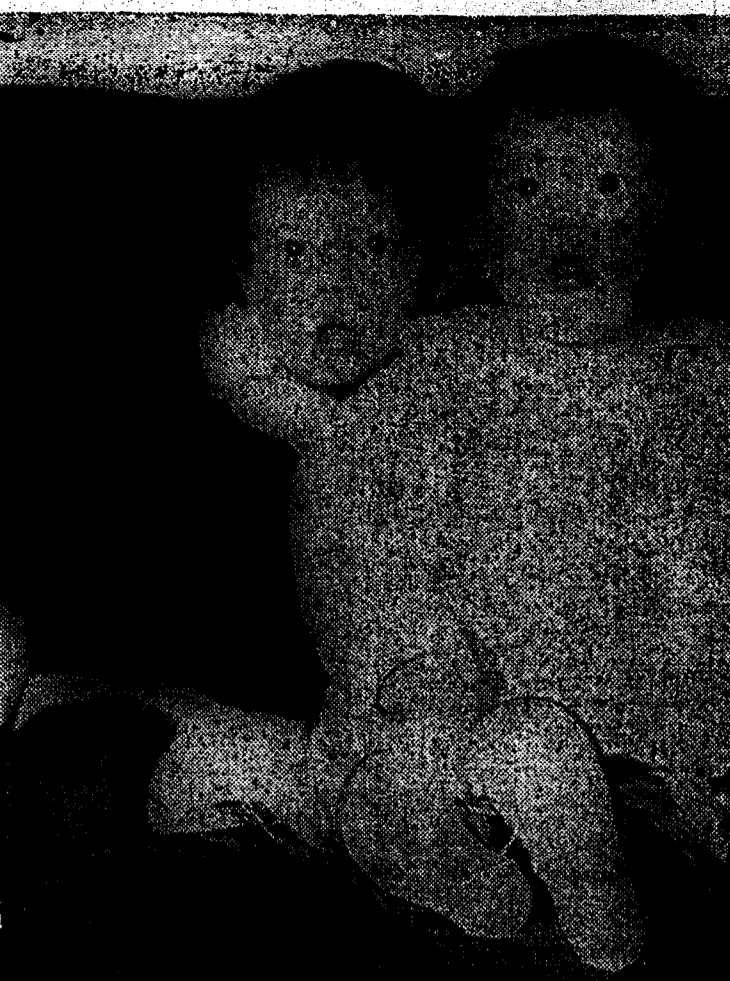
YOUGHAL NOTES

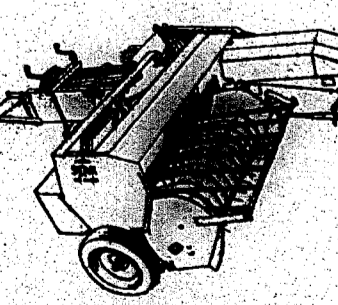

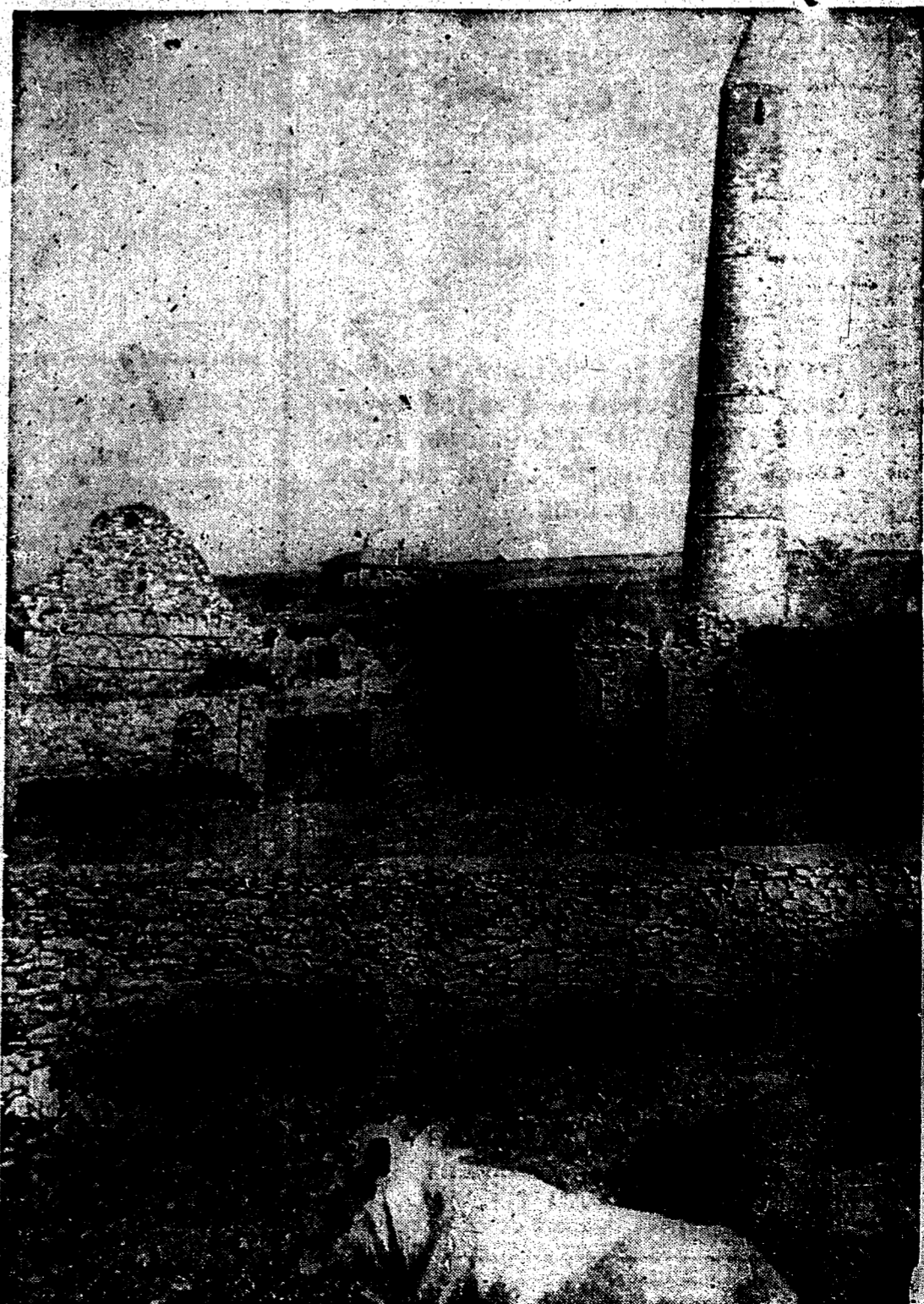

Champions Titles

BALLINACOURTY ... 0-4 TALLOW ... 1-0

REIGNING Western and County Under 21 football champions, Tallow, relinquished both titles at Cappoquin on Sunday last when they had to give best to Ballinacourty in a first round game that was played under atrocious weather conditions. With twelve of last year's winning side again on call, Tallow were warmly fancied to prevail, but they had to give best to a Ballinacourty side that mastered the champions and won on merit alone.

If anything in fact, Tallow were fortunate to have escaped with only a one point defeat. Ballinacourty dominated this game to a considerable degree, and exerted a territorial advantage that was in no way reflected in that final tally. But their attack looks the achilles heel of an otherwise competent side, and had the champions been "let off the hook" on Sunday, then those "County forwards, and they alone, could have been saddled with the blame. Had their accuracy and finish been on a par with their approach work then they would have run up an infinitely bigger tally, and would not have necessitated a nail biting finish for their mentors, which saw Tallow make brave but vain efforts to salvage the game.

The game looked a virtual cakewalk for Ballinacourty at half time when they led by 0-5 to nil, having played against a very strong wind and driving rain. Tallow had forced the pace in that opening half, but their efforts perished on the rock that was a truly magnificent County defence. With lesser opportunities Ballinacourty made far better headway and points by Marty Kiely in the 5th minute and Brendan O'Brien on the quarter hour gave them their interval lead.

The one real glimmer of hope for the champions came in the sixth minute of the second half, when Tallow edged in front for the first and only time. Following a bout of sustained pressure Shamie Hannon slammed the ball to the net from a melee, but few could have realised at that stage that that score would be their lone one of the game. Again Ballinacourty took up the running, and with a brilliant Raymond Cantwell, ably assisted by Paddy Cashin, lorded it at midfield, the flow of the exchanges was very much towards the Tallow goal. The equaliser, when it came, was a high inevitable, such was the pressure they

were exerting, and the score was Greg Fives from a free. The challengers continued to press strongly, and Jesse Lander's shot what proved to be the winning point ten minutes from time. (The champions to their credit, did not relinquish their titles without a grim defence of them. In the closing stages they piled on relentless pressure, and the winners defence repeatedly sought the temporary refuge of the sideline to clear their lines. Tallow forced line half after line half, but all the time Ballinacourty's defence was supreme, and they deservedly held on in an exciting finish. Undoubtedly the honour for this rather surprise win must go to the winners defence, and well though all six backs played, particular mention must be made of full back Greg Fives (his fielding was impeccable) and centre back Larry Cliffe. Midfielders Raymond Cantwell and Paddy Cashin both gave stellar displays, and except for very brief spells were the complete masters of this vital sector. In front however the winners were noticeably weak, and considering the amount of possession they had, their tally of four points was patently to say the least. Of the starters, Mickey Fives, Maty Hannon and Marty Kiely were best.

Tallow, no doubt, will be bitterly disappointed at losing both their Western and county titles at their very first defence of them. Clearly they were too complacent in their approach to this tie, and paid a very dear penalty for it. John Norris at corner back was their outstanding defender, and little behind him at centre half was Billy Sheehan. SHORTLY after half-time in this 2nd Division League tie at Springmount on Sunday last, Dungarvan's proud record of never having lost a home league game, seemed to have gone well and truly by the boards. WATERFORD'S National football league aspirations were buried in the mud of Tullamore on Sunday last when they went down by a clear cut margin to an unimpressive Offaly side. But had Waterford been aware of the maxim that by taking points the goals will eventually come, they would scarcely have gone under by so wide a tally, for territorially this was a game from which they almost held their own.

The game in fact was really won and lost in the opening minutes of the second half. Offaly turned over with a half time lead of 1-11 to 2-0, and considering the strength of the breeze which had favoured them during that opening half, Offaly could scarcely have felt very smug about their position. But the restart was only seconds old when Gay Graham had his second Offaly goal, and a point almost immediately, stretched their lead to 12 points.

But from that moment onwards, Waterford ruled the roost. They literally encamped in Offaly territory, and on numerous occasions goals were there for the taking, but, alas, they were not taken. Instead the Waterford forwards seemed obsessed with the idea of scoring goals, and as the half progressed they became even more frantic in their fruitless search for major scores. There was a dozen occasions when Daise forwards had the comparatively simple task of tapping the ball over the bar, but on each such occasion the forward in possession opted to try for the goals that never came.

Perhaps it was the way they had twice pierced the home rearguard for goals in the first half that made them go all out in search of more in

that second half. Their first came in the 8th minute entirely against the run of play, and at a time when Offaly were leading by two points to nil. Pa Walsh at full forward was left in lonely isolation on the fringe of the square, and from John O'Brien's perfectly placed pass he hammered the ball past Martin Furlong. (Again Offaly took up the running and by the 21st minute had added five more points without reply—and a succession of reckless wides. And then, Waterford, in another breakaway attack, struck for the second time. Again John O'Brien was the architect of the move, and from his pass Vinny Kirwan belted home a really well taken score. Offaly now led by a mere point, nine minutes of the half remained, and backed as they were by the near gale force wind, the stormers were in dire straits.

But Offaly rose to the challenge, and by the interval had tacked on available scores—principally their 27th minute goal scored by Graham. **NOT INSURMOUNTABLE** An eight points deficit looked anything but insurmountable, but Offaly did the real damage with that early second half goal and a point, and they failed to raise another flag for the remainder of the half. Waterford then took almost complete control, but instead of whittling away the lead by the very simple process of taking

the scores that "were on," they foolishly indulged in an all out bid for goals. And with Offaly's defence considerably tighter now than it had been earlier on, these Waterford tactics were destined to fail.

In that second half Vinny Kirwan pointed, free in the 19th and 28th minutes, and a minute later, Pa Walsh had their only point from play during the hour. Offaly, unimpressive though they were, fully deserved their win. They were content to take to take their points in the first half, even when Waterford's goals brought them into real peril, and Waterford would have done infinitely better had they followed suit.

Their defence in the second half stood up to intense pressure well, and Greg Hughes, John Egan and John Smith, when he moved to centre back all played well. Larry Coughlan was the more prominent of their midfielders, and Gay Graham, scorer of two vital goals, Tony McTosque, and Paddy McCormack did best in a one too snappy attack.

Waterford can have no qualms about the final result, but they must certainly feel a trifle disappointed at the decisiveness of that defeat. The final scoreline does not give anything like a true reflection of the game's overall trend.

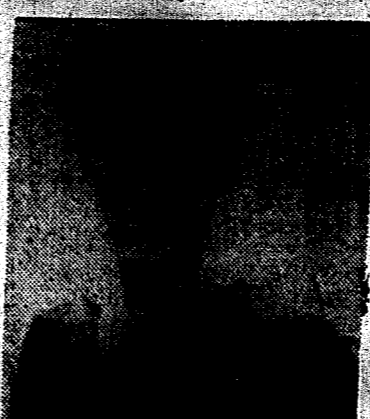
