DRIVING CHARGE WAS SEQUEL TO FATAL ACCIDENT

Dismissed by Justice

GEORGE FORAN, Bridgetown, Clonea, Rathgormack,
was charged with careless driving before Justice L.
B. Skinner, at Dungarvan District Court on Wednesday—
the charge being the sequel to a fatal accident at
Knoekylian, Leamybrien, on September 29th last.

Miss Alice O'Connell, Knock-
acullen, Leamybrien said she
left her home with her two
sisters, driving her father's
car, that night. Later George
Foran joined them and took
over the driving of the car.
After coming from the Car-
rick road onto the Dungarvan-
Waterford road they met a
bus coming against them and
she saw nothing until she
heard a bang. She then saw a
man whom she knew as Wal-
ter Foley come up on the
bonnet of the car. The driver
braked and stopped the car
and Walter Foley fell off.
They were driving on the left
hand side of the road at be-

tween 35 and 40 m.p.h. at the
time. The weather conditions
were misty and they were
driving with their dials on.
Miss Breda O'Connell and
Miss Mary O'Connell, sisters
of the previous witness gave
similar evidence.
James Madden, Waterford, a
bus conductor, said that the
deceased Walter Foley, got on
his bus in Dungarvan. He re-
membered him getting off the
bus near Leamybrien almost
opposite to the mouth of the
lane leading to where he lived.
Foley appeared to be alright
then. The bus pulled away
and witness was not aware
that any accident had occurred

until the following morning.
Sergeant Lenthien said that he
was called to the scene of the
accident and arrived there at
about 8.45 p.m. The road was
straight and 48' 3" wide at the
point. He saw a car stopped
on its left hand side facing
Dungarvan and there were
tyre marks along the left side
of the road for a distance of
48' 2". George Foran told him
he was the driver of the car.

Witness went on to say that
the deceased, Walter Foley,
was lying on the road with his
head towards the wall and his
legs protruding on to the road.
He was being attended by a
priest and doctor and was later
removed to Ardkeen by
ambulance. On the following
day the defendant made a
statement after caution, in
which he said that he had driven
from his home as far as
Mahon Bridge with his brother.
There he joined Alice O'Con-
nell and her sisters and he
drove her car. They were
going to a dance at Clonea. He
was travelling at about 40
m.p.h. on his own side and

saw a bus coming against him
and after passing it he saw a
man crossing the road right in
front of him. He braked hard
but hit the man and carried
him about five yards on the
bonnet before he fell off.

Witness then said that Fo-
ley was a man of 79 years and
on the night of the accident
he was wearing a long black
coat and a black pants. He later
attended the inquest, at
which the cause of death was
stated to be congested cardiac
failure, probably accelerated
by the accident.

This concluded the State
Case and Mr. E. P. King, Solr.,
(defending) asked that the
charge against his client be
dismissed on the grounds of
lack of evidence as there was
nothing to prove that his
client was negligent on the
occasion.

The Justice said that there
was no real evidence to con-
vict the defendant on a charge
of careless driving and he ac-
cordingly acceded to Mr.
King's request and dismissed
the charge.

A 23 year old German
pleaded guilty, through an in-
terpreter, at Dungarvan Dis-
trict Court on Wednesday, to
a charge of indecently assault-
ing an 11 year old boy at The
Mall Dock, Youghal, on Mon-
day night last. The defendant
was Hiko Tobold, a crew
member of the German ship
"Nordsee Karin" and Mr. A.
V. Maher, Solr., Dungarvan,
appeared for him. He could
not speak English. Tobold was
convicted and fined E5, with
a further E5-7-0 expenses.

Supt. P. MacMahon, who
prosecuted, said that at about
9 p.m., the young boy to a
shop in Youghal for a message

fendant came up to him and
said "you will take to my
ship." He took the boy to-
wards the Mall Dock, where
the assault took place. The

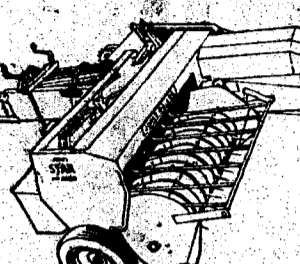

For twenty hours a delegation representing the N.F.A. and associated farming bodies argued the farmers' case for an overall increase of 10% on 1968 incomes with the Minister for Agriculture in the Department offices.

Every single sector of the agricultural industry was covered and at the end of two days of talks the Minister announced that he would give "sympathetic consideration" to the proposals advanced by the delegation.

Mr. Joe Bruton, Chairman of the N.F.A. Livestock Committee, a member of the N.F.A. delegation, said that it was a move in the right direction and was welcome at a time when we needed to give every possible encouragement to increasing livestock production.

The N.F.A. delegation said that this was not the case and pointed to the discrepancy in the prices which producers were getting. The Minister indicated that he would investigate the workings of the Anglo-Irish Trade Agreement as it affected sheep prices on the home market.

Central marketing was raised during the discussions on the pig industry and it was emphasized by the N.F.A. that greater emphasis would have to be placed on diversified products to ensure that we were not entirely dependent on selling bacon and pork abroad.

The N.F.A. questioned the new grants for pig units holding a minimum of 3,000 pigs and maintained that it did not conform with the national objective of supporting the family farm. If this policy was pursued all the way then pig fattening would be taken out of the hands of ordinary farmers.

The N.F.A. sought grants and interest-free loans for commercial egg producers in Western-type areas who were willing to form egg production and marketing groups. The Minister agreed to study fully the present arrangements for commercial egg producers in the West and asked for detailed submissions from the N.F.A. Poultry Committee on this question.

"We had pressed" said Mr. Maher, "to have the incentives made more attractive, so that more family farmers would be encouraged to participate and work towards their holding viable units."

WATERFORD MEET CORK IN UNDER-21 HURLING

CORK'S Under 21 hurlers step out in defence of their Munster title at Dungarvan on Sunday next when they meet Waterford in a first round championship game that could well provide the best hour's entertainment at this venue for many a long day. The standard of hurling in this grade has been remarkably high in recent years, and Cork, strong though they undoubtedly are, will be hard pitted to stave off Waterford's challenge on Sunday.

Not for a long time have Waterford's hopes of honours in the Under-21 grade been so optimistically high as this year. At the disposal of the selectors is quite a talented pool of players and though there are some surprising omissions, the side to do duty is nonetheless a formidable one.

Cork, despite conceding ground advantage, will nevertheless start favourites, and their side contains a number of players who have been given a number of outings with the senior team. A Cork side defending any title is never an easy one to beat, and the same will undoubtedly apply on Sunday. Thus a flat out effort for the hour is a must if Waterford hope to register their first championship win of 1969.

Backed by a big home following and benefitting from a number of challenge outings, Waterford therefore approach the tie confidently though cautiously. In senior star, Martin Hickey they seem to have a real trump card, and much will depend on how he fares in this game. It is however, by no means a one man outfit, and if the selected players measure up to club form, then Cork might well find the task beyond them.

Either way, however, it should be a game of hurling at its best, and given the breaks Waterford might well shock the champions.

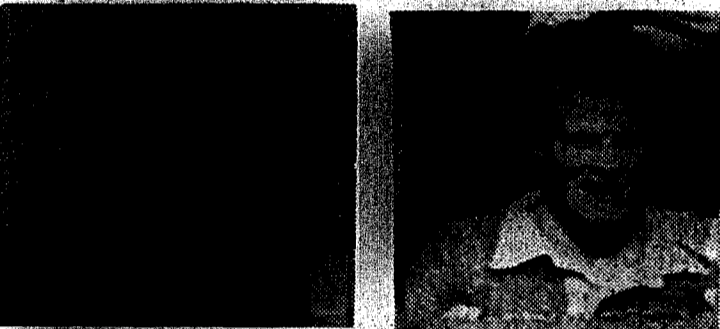

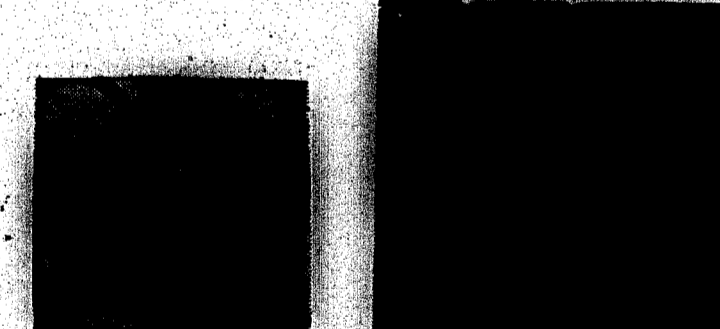

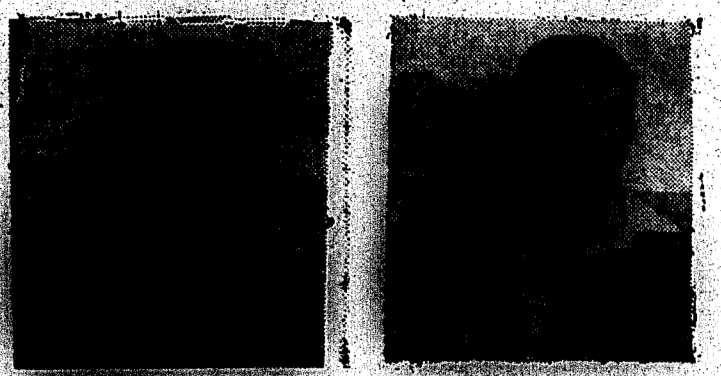
TOM RYORDAN . . . one of Kill's big guns in another danger man in Kill's attack.

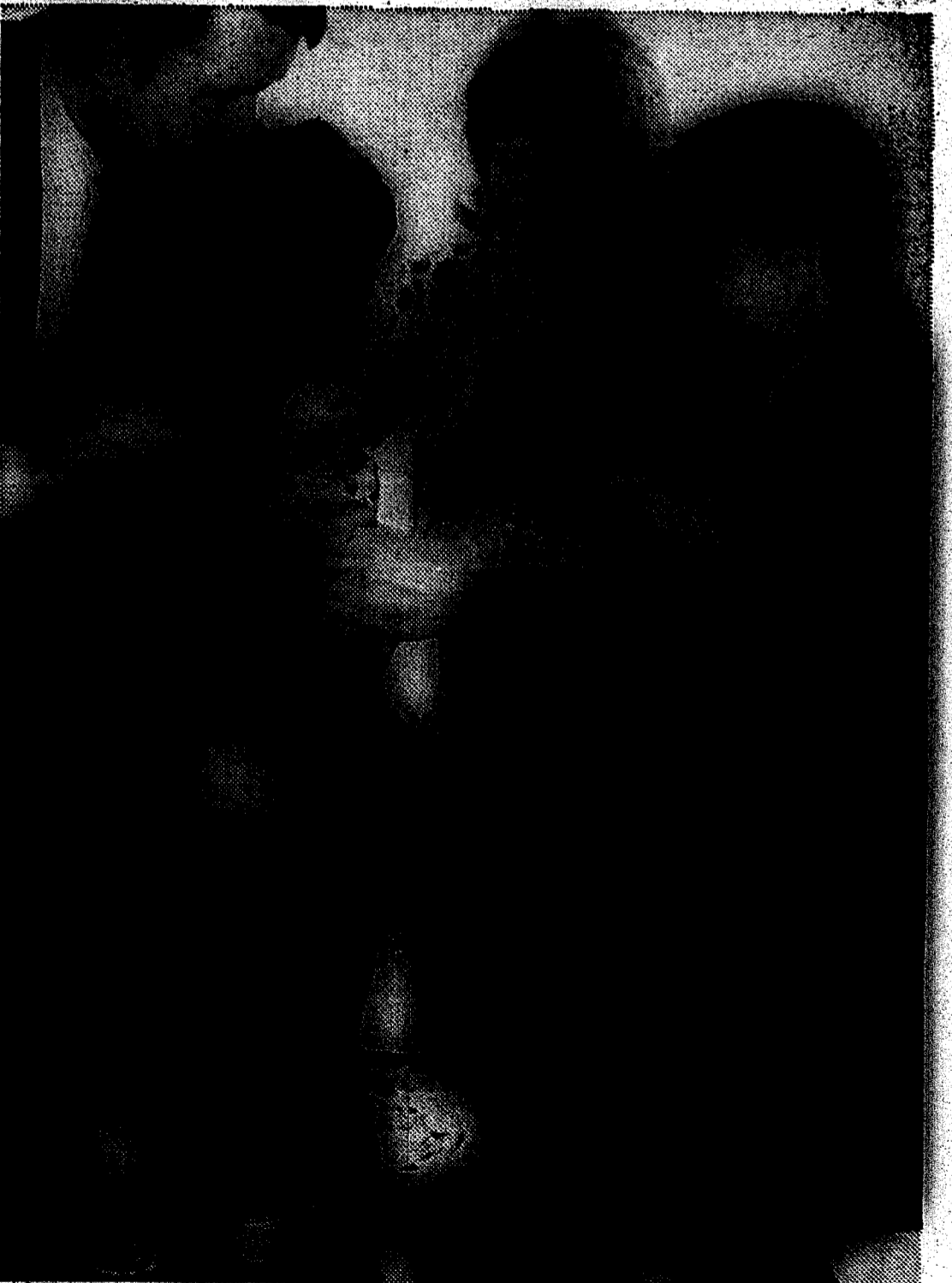
