## DUNGARVAN RATE 85/- BIGGEST EVER INCREASE

FOR the coming year the ratepayers of Dungarvan must face the greatest single increase in the history of the town. For at last Monday night's annual estimates meeting of the Urban Council a new rate of 85/- in the £ was adopted by five votes to two for the coming year. This staggering rate represents an increase of 16/- on last year's figure of 69/-, though it is 11d. less than the rate sought by the County Manager, Mr. Charles O'Connor.

In his estimate of expenses for the coming year, the County Manager, Mr. Charles O'Connor said a rate of 85/11 in the £ would be required to meet the net estimated expenditure of £72,575 for the year 1969-70. This was £14,615 more than was required for the year just ended and the total amount was made up as follows: County Council Demand, 38,990; Town Services, £33,585. The County demand would account for 42/6 of the total rate, and the Urban services would account for the remaining 39/9.

Mr. O'Connor said the total rate increase would be 16/11 and the County demand was up by 8/1 on last year and Urban Services were up by the remaining 8/10. Outlining more fully the 16/11 increase, the Manager broke it down as follows: Roads up by 9d.; Sanitary up by 1/7; Housing 5/6; County Demand, 8/1; General Purposes 1/-.

The Chairman, Mr. Thomas A. Kyne, T.D., said the increase was a very hefty one and he had spoken to the Town Clerk and Manager to see if there were any means of reducing it. But unfortunately they did not give him much encouragement in that respect.

Mr. Declan Goods said the demand before them was fantastic but if they required the services then they would have to pay for them.

Deputy Kyne said half of the increase was due to the increased County demand and they had to meet that increase. They could tackle the remainder of the increase however in the hope of making some reductions.

### DUNGARVAN QUAY

The Town Clerk, Mr. J. P. Robinson, informed the members that the estimates included £575 for Loan Charges in respect of £5,000 loan they were raising for the repair of the Quay. Sanction had been received for this loan, he added.

The Manager said they were also seeking aid from the Department by way of subsidy for this work, and that possibility had not been ruled out. They had also made representations to Bord Fáilte and they had passed it on to the South Eastern Regional Tourist Organisation. The repair work would be done by direct

labour and work should not be too long in starting, he said.

### CLOSE DOWN

Mr. Patrick Whelan said if a rate of 85/11 was struck it would mean a weekly increase of from 1/- to 3/- on Council houses and there was also the danger that small shops in the town might close down. During the year they did nothing but spend money but where was it all now going to come from, he asked.

Mr. Austin Deasy said they were all very keen and equally anxious to keep down the rates.

Mr. Whelan—if all Councils took a firm stand the Minister would have to do something.

Mr. Deasy—One of our primary functions is to strike a rate be it a good or a bad job, and I am afraid it is going to be a bad job to-night. But we must stand up to our responsibilities and strike a rate.

Deputy Kyne said at the present time the Council was building 52 houses and that could not be done without money. This was the worst impact they were ever faced with, but at least next year they would have the rents from these new houses coming in.

The Manager said Dungarvan Urban Council had been progressive and problems had to be encountered. The Council had a formidable housing programme and people with two children now knew that they could be housed by the Council. In towns not too far from here that position did not pertain, he said.

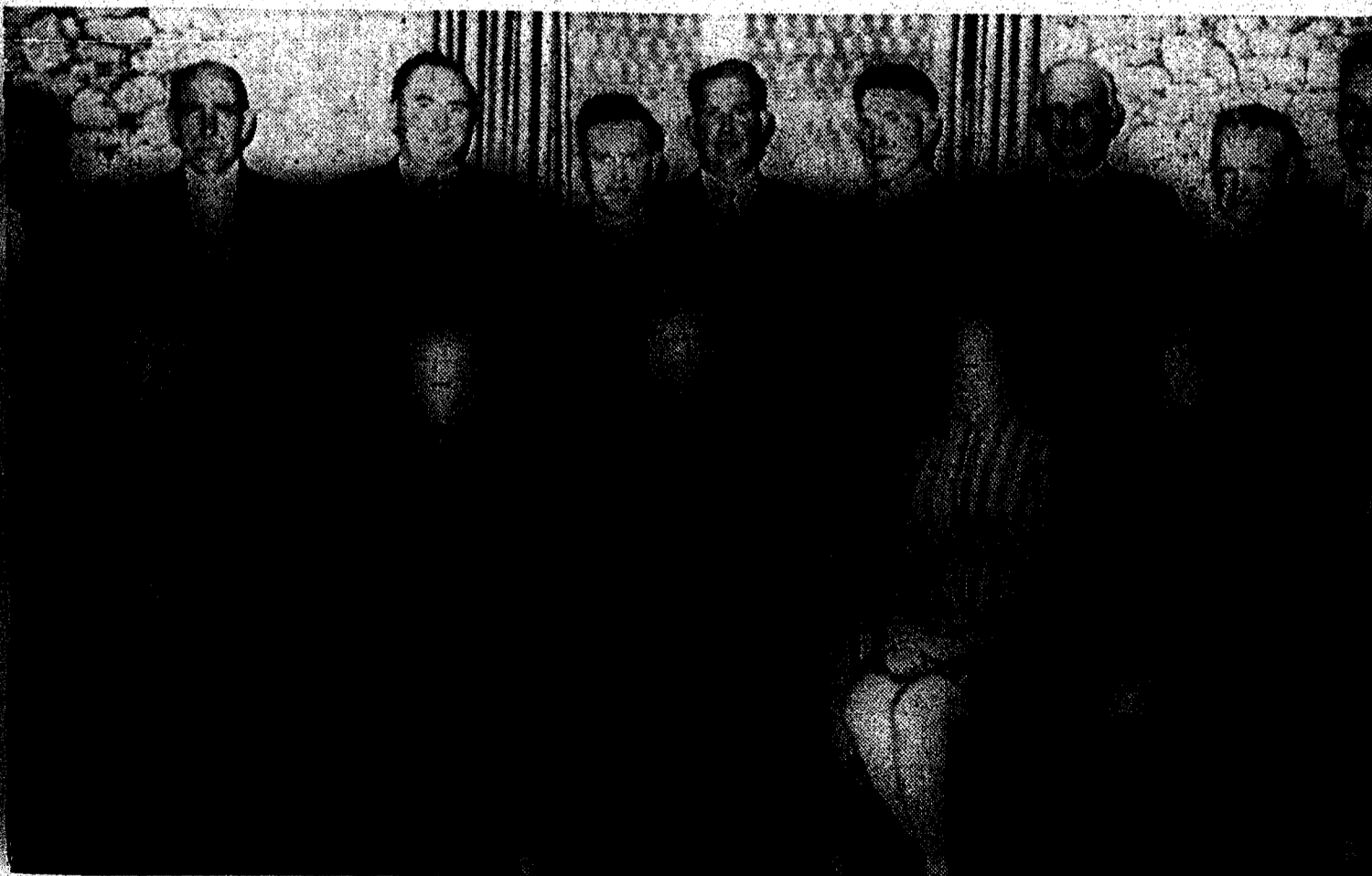
The Manager went on to state that Stage one of the town's new sewerage scheme was nearing completion and in the interests of industry there would be applications to get ahead with stages two, three and four of that scheme in the near future, and that would put a further 3/- or 4/- on the rates. But if they were to put Dungarvan on the map they would have to proceed with these schemes.

Deputy Kyne said the Town Clerk and Co. Manager had assured him that everything in the estimates had been cut to the bone. The estimate did not even include provision for extra lighting in the town. He asked if they agreed to reduce the proposed increase from 16/11 to 16/- what would they have to reduce the estimates by. The Manager said £775 would be the figure, but it would be better to take credit in Council receipts for another £775 during the coming year rather than reduce the estimates which would mean reducing the services.

### TOURIST GRANT

Mr. Patrick Whelan said the estimates included a grant

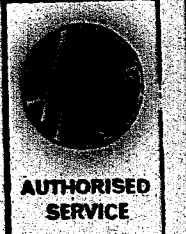

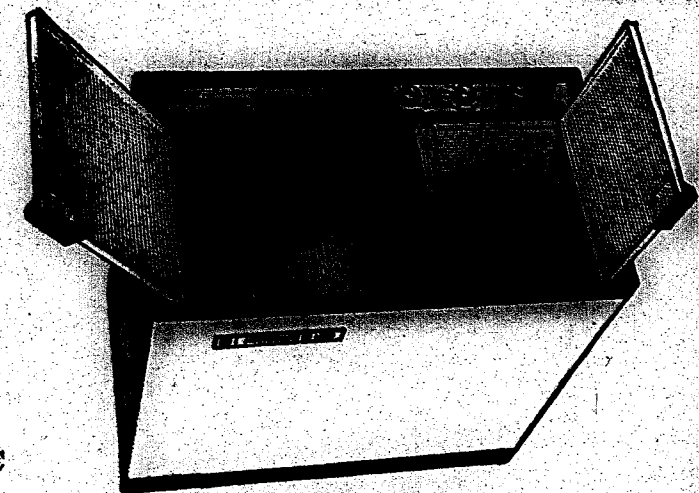

It was his opinion that they were so drunk that they were falling on the ground. Michael Connors told the Justice that it was just a family row.

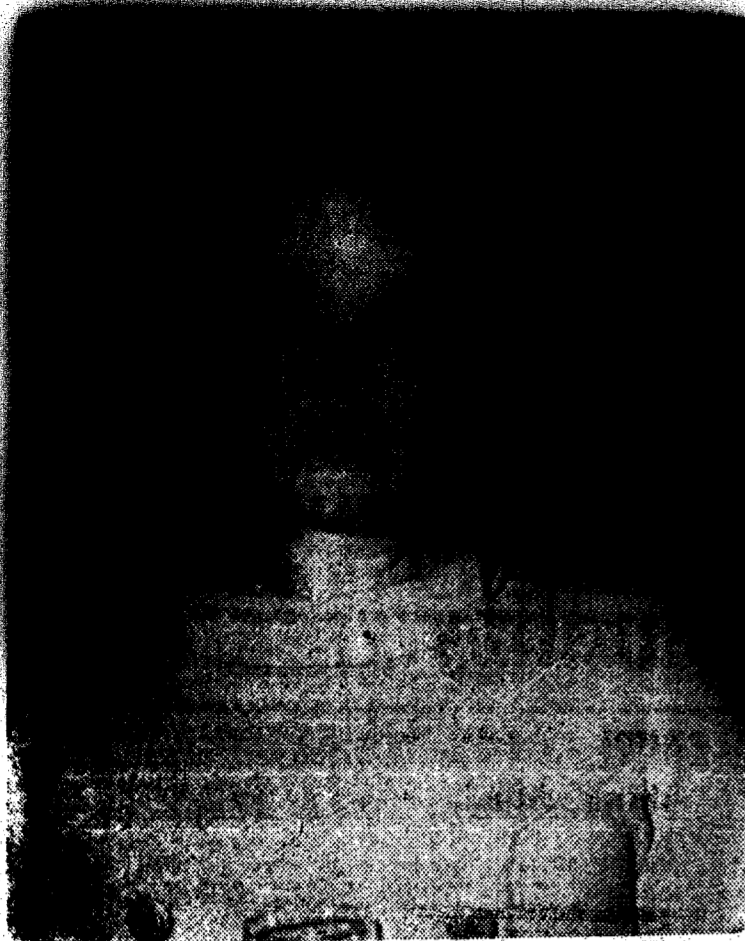

## QUANN'S SITE FOR JUNIOR CHAMBER OF COMMERCE

Dungarvan Urban Council has had to decide between the town's Junior Chamber of Commerce and the Pipe Band in the siting of the upper portion of Quann's field (near the Catholic Graveyard). And at this week's meeting of the Council it was agreed to give the site to the J.C.C., on which they intend to erect a children's Playground in the very near future. As an alternative however, the members agreed to offer the Band a site at Abbeyside Park on which to build their proposed new Band room, or the lower portion of Quann's, whichever was most suitable to them.

The matter was raised by Mr. Patrick Whelan, who said the Pipe Band was now being turned down for a site which had already been agreed to at the Council's last meeting. He would like to know the reasons for this.

Mr. J. P. Robinson (Town Clerk) said it was not agreed to give the upper half of Quann's to the Band. It was agreed to submit the proposal to their Engineer Mr. P. Walsh for his view. The Engineer was opposed to giving this particular part of Quann's to the Band for a Bandhouse, and they had also received objections from nearby residents who did not want the Band that near to them because they felt it would cause a nuisance to them. They also felt that right beside the churchyard was not the place for a band house.

Mr. Patrick Walsh (Council's Engineer) said people had also come to him and objected to the giving of this site to the Pipe Band. While he was Engineer to the Council he would not recommend that site for the Band.

Mr. Whelan said most people had raised no objections because members of the Band had went around with a petition to them. The objections that had been raised were only very slight. He asked Mr. Walsh who had made the objections.

Mr. Walsh: I will not divulge the names. That part of Quann's is used extensively by the elderly people of the town where they can sit down. The site is also beside the churchyard, which is not a suitable place to have a Bandroom and those are my views and the Council can either accept or reject them.

Mr. Walsh went on to state that he would not have any objections to the siting of the Children's Playground there. That would not interfere with the old people's amenities.

Mr. Whelan said the Pipe Band members were willing to build a lean-to off their Band room, where the old people could sit in shelter.

Mr. Thomas A. Kyne, T.D. (Chairman) said it was his view that the Junior Chamber had first claim on the site. He personally would like to accommodate both of them, but he would give his preference to the Junior Chamber in this. Mr. Whelan said the Pipe Band were in town a very long time and had given great service to the town over the years.

Mr. Robinson (Town Clerk) said the Junior Chamber's equipment for the playground would be coming within a week or two. It would not be

erected immediately however, because the J.C.C. would be seeking an amenity grant from the Dept.

Mr. Austin Deasy said he did not think this site would be suitable for a Bandroom, but he felt it was their duty to get the Band a site.

Mr. Declan Goode: Is there any site we could give them? Deputy Kyne: Not one they will accept.

Mr. Jackie Kenneally said they had all promised the Band they would do their best for them in acquiring a site, but now they didn't seem to be doing anything.

Deputy Kyne said there was room for both groups at Quann's. The Band had been offered the lower portion, but both wanted the top half.

Mr. Walsh (Engineer) said originally the Pipe Band made application for the lower portion of Quann's. They were now being offered that by the Council.

Mr. Goode suggested that a site at Abbeyside Park might be suitable for the Band. He proposed they a site at the Park be offered to the Band and if they refuse to avail of it they could then offer them the lower portion of Quann's again.

Mr. Goode's proposal was agreed to by the members.

## "Lighting System Could be Put in Museum"

The Lighting System at Dungarvan Technical School was so antiquated and out of date that it could be put into a museum, said Mr. Thomas F. Maher, Acting C.E.O., at last Monday's meeting of the Co. Waterford Vocational Education Committee.

Mr. Maher said they had received many complaints from students attending night classes about the lighting in the school, and every other day he had to get the flexes repaired. The present lighting system was 22 years in use, he said, and the flexes were corroded and the fuse box was enlarged. The E.S.B. employees were horrified every time they came to check it when they saw the increased loads it was carrying. He asked the E.S.B. for lighting designs for the school.

Mr. Liam Comerford said the lighting system in the school was not sufficient for modern needs, and that was the least their students deserved. All their power points should be done also, he said.

Mr. Maher said the lighting system was antiquated and so out of date that it could be put in a museum. The new installation could be carried out during the summer months, and provision had already been made for it in the estimate. He believed a new lighting system would cost in the region of £500.

On the proposal of Mr. Liam Comerford, the Committee agreed to consult their Consultant and a report will be considered at the Committee's next meeting.

## Serious Shortage of Teachers

Because their staff situation was so bad, the Co. Waterford Vocational Education Committee has decided not to allow their domestic Science or Rural Science teachers to go away as Examiners to outside counties starting on May 28th.

At last Monday's meeting of the Comm.tee in Dungarvan the Acting C.E.O., Mr. T. F. Maher said they had only two Domestic Science teachers for the entire county and only one rural science teacher. He had been trying to get a Temporary Rural Science teacher, but was not successful and the position was now serious. He was reluctantly opposing that they be allowed to go as Examiners this year.

Mr. Maher said if they allowed the teachers to go the children would be left without teachers, and he could visualise the Committee being faced with a deputation from the parents. Their staff situation was very bad and all their teachers were doing extra hours.

Mr. Liam Comerford said the story was no different to the position was now serious. He county in Pos. Primary schools where there was a terrible shortage of teachers.

On the proposal of Mr. Declan Ahearn, it was unanimously decided not to allow their teachers to go as Examiners this year because of the scarcity of staff.

## West Waterford may have no Voc. Teachers

It seemed most unfair that the children in West Waterford should be deprived the Services of Vocational teachers Mr. Liam Comerford stated at Monday's meeting of the Co. Waterford Vocational Education Committee in Dungarvan.

The matter arose when a letter was read by the Acting C.E.O., Mr. Thomas F. Maher, from the Dept. asking that the Committee submit their teaching requirements for the new Vocational School opening in Kilmacthomas next Sept. Mr. Maher said they sent the following list of required teachers to the Department: Metal Work, Rural Science, Maths and General Subjects; Commerce; Irish and Continuation Subjects, which would include Languages.

Mr. Maher said they had received a similar letter previously from the Dept., but could not reply to it because they were not sure when the school would be opening.

It was at this stage that Mr. Comerford asked if the Vocational teacher in Cappoquin in the Post Primary Education Centre would be retained there or would be transferred to either Dungarvan or Kilmacthomas. It would be unfair, he said, if the children of West Waterford were to be deprived of the services of Vocational teachers.

Mr. Maher said that since they handed over their interest in the Cappoquin Vocational school they had no schools in the West Waterford area and therefore had no further responsibility for West Waterford. That area had been taken over by the Post Primary Education Centre and it was now their responsibility.

Mr. Comerford said he thought they had a responsibility in the matter too. If they took away all their teachers from West Waterford they would be defeating the ends and ideals of the Post Primary Centre. They had made a great fight to have the Vocational teachers retained in Cappoquin and now they were considering taking them out of it.

Mr. Maher said they might require these teachers in their own schools. Also two teachers of theirs had quietly resigned and gone to other counties because they would prefer not to teach in the Post Primary school.

Mr. Comerford said he was worried about the children in the West because they could be left without such classes as Woodwork and Metalwork.

Mr. Ted Buckley said it was the people in the Cappoquin school that should be responsible for providing these teachers.

Mr. Comerford said this had been brought about by the stupid planning of the Development Branch of the Dept. of the Department of Education. They should therefore acquaint the Development Branch of the Anomaly that was arising in West Waterford.

This suggestion was unanimously agreed to.

of £140 for the Tourist Board and this was money that should be deleted and it would cut the rate by another 2d. The rate was high enough as it was and he proposed that the £140 for the Tourist Board be deleted.

Mr. Noel Hackett seconding, said he couldn't see what the working class were getting from the Tourist Board. Deputy Kyne said he felt it would be a backward step to delete that grant because Dungarvan was getting a fair share from Tourism and the shoekeepers were doing fairly well from the tourists. Last year, he said if you walked down Main Street you would think you were in London there were so many tourists to be seen.

Mr. Whelan—I believe they would come anyway, grant or no grant.

Mr. Declan Goode said they were being asked to contribute to an industry that was worth £8,000,000 a year to the country. He did not think that was being unreasonable.

Mr. Deasy said the £140 was a very small amount to contribute for what Dungarvan was getting from Tourism.

Deputy Kyne — Dungarvan is getting more than it would give back in contributions in 20 years. Much more is being spent on Dungarvan than we are contributing. A vote was then taken and it was decided 5-2 to retain the £140 for the Tourist grant in the estimate. Colrs. Kyne, Deasy, Good, Kenneally and Walsh voted for and Colrs. Whelan and Hackett against.

Deputy Kyne said it now looked as though a reduction of 11d. on the proposed increase was the only hope they had without cutting vital services. Everything possible had been cut, including future stages of the sewerage scheme which would just have to be done very soon.

Mr. Goode then proposed and Mr. Kenneally seconded that a rate of 85/- in the £ be adopted for the coming year.

Deputy Kyne said none of them could do any better than that.

The Manager said that was the minimum rate he would be prepared to accept.

Colr. Goode's proposition was then put and carried by five votes to two. The voting was: for—Colrs. Goode, Kenneally, Kyne, Deasy and Walsh, against, Colrs. Whelan and Hackett.

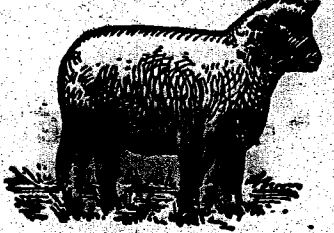

# Brilliant Kill Take Phelan Cup

# Goalie's Jubilee

KILL ..... 1-8 KILROSSANTY ..... 0-7

**KILL'S** position as the premier football side in the County was consolidated still further at Dungarvan's Fraher field on Sunday evening last when they scored a deserved 1-8 to 0-7 victory over Kilrossanty in a tough, tense and at times over robust replayed final of the 1968 Phelan Cup. Like the drawn game it was brimful of exciting passages; it was played with an intensity usually associated only with the championship but alas it provided a sad aftermath as players from both sides engaged in an ugly brawl in the middle of the field.

Right through this hour there was very clearly no love lost between these arch rivals. There were several incidents that went very near meriting marching orders, but players from both sides seemed only too anxious to make use of the leniency of referee Ned Power. Things unfortunately came to boiling point minutes before the end when Achill Lannon was guilty of a heavy frontal charge on Kilrossanty's Tom Walsh, and was certainly more than fortunate to have escaped the displeasure of the referee. But not even that indiscretion could justify the all-out attack on Lannon when the final whistle sounded, which resulted in players from both sides engaging in a "no punches pulled" melee that took more than a little while to quell.

### DESERVED WIN

As for the game itself, not even the most ardent Kilrossanty follower can deny Kill their victory. This was the champions at something approaching their very best, and had not their forwards squandered so many gilt edged chances in the first half they would surely have won by an infinitely greater margin. Kill, as always battled valiantly and for long spells early on, and again at the start of the second half they seemed to have even more than a favourable chance of upsetting the odds. But always when their status as the number one team in the county was in peril Kill turned on the heat and left no doubt in anyone's mind as to where this Phelan Cup was going.

As a spectacle too it was most entertaining for the very big attendance and Kilrossanty's ability to match strides with Kill for so long was a major factor in this. In fact for most of the first half Kill looked in real trouble as they failed to make even the slightest impression on an opposition that played direct football and played it most effectively at that.

During the first half Kill were backed by a wind of near gale force proportions, yet for all the attacking they did, they found few chinks in Kilrossanty's defensive armour for the first twenty minutes. Early on too the champions suffered a real blow when Clare and Member player, Pat McMahon, injured a finger quite accidentally and had to retire. With 20 minutes of the half gone and Kilrossanty on level terms at 0-1 each, the Comeragh men seemed poised to score quite a resounding win. But then as they have so often done before, Kill hit an inspired patch and by the interval they had compiled a tally of 1-5 to Kilrossanty's lone point.

But it was still by no means an unassailable lead, and when Kilrossanty cut the deficit with three points within nine minutes of the restart their odds shortened considerably. The game was now grippingly tense; the battle was really joined in earnest, and Kilrossanty above all seemed capable of a continuance of the pressure they were now exerting.

Not surprisingly, Kill forced the pace from the opening whistle when sided by the breeze, but they soon found there was going to be no easy way past Kilrossanty's defence. Coupled with that was KIL's own inaccuracy and after 20 minutes of almost monotonous attack all they had to show was a Seamus Keavans point. Mitters Casey had balanced out that score with a pointed free in the 17th minute but shortly afterwards the Kill attack finally clicked.

In the 20th minute Paddy Duggan pointed a free and a

brave bid had been successfully stifled. They hit back for points by Casey (from a free), and Riordan from play, but again Kill replied with a Duggan point from a free. Kill were now playing for time and the only other score was another Casey point from a 50 second two minutes before the end.

### DIFFICULT TO BEAT

When it mattered most on Sunday, Kill rose to the occasion and it is going to be difficult indeed to stop the championship winning march of this splendid side. Once again Nick Whelan enhanced his goalkeeping reputation with a series of fine second half saves and he was afforded great cover by his full backs.

Tom Mooney was an outstanding centre back and the transfer of John Regan from attack to wing half back was a successful move for Regan was one of Kill's stars. On the other flank Achill Lannon played a storming game and constantly moved upfield to join in attacks.

The loss of Pat McMahon at midfield after only a few minutes was a blow but Seamus Keavans again displayed his great talents in goal. He simply lorded it in the area and Kilrossanty could never curb his effectiveness. Up front Monty Guiry tumbled, tumbled and finally succeeded in scoring. He picked off three great points and was a menace which the opposition could never subdue. Paddy Duggan and Mike Flynn also had their moments, but for most of the hour it was Guiry who wreaked havoc.

Even in defeat however, Kilrossanty emerged favourably.
