Ballinacourty Scheme Now To Cost £120,000 Lowest Tender Not Accepted

THE members of Waterford County Council were told by the Secretary, Mr. J. G. Dowling at last Friday's meeting in Dungarvan that the water supply scheme to serve the proposed new £2,500,000 Magnesite Industry at Ballinacourty would now cost £120,000 compared to the

The Co. Secretary said the Water Scheme for this industry was originally estimated to cost £75,000 on the basis of a daily supply of 1,200,000 gallons for the Company. The Company subsequently informed the Council that they would require a 50% increase on that daily demand, and it was then estimated that the scheme would cost £98,000.

The Secretary said it was then agreed by the Council to raise a loan for £98,000 with the Company paying 50% of it and the Council the other 50%. The scheme then went

up for tender and it was now going to cost £120,000. The Company was prepared to pay 75% of the excess £22,000 and this would mean that the Company would be paying £65,000 of the entire cost of the scheme, and the Council would have to meet the remaining £55,000. The Company, he said was also prepared to advance £10,000 immediately to enable the scheme to get ahead. The average annual impact on the rates on the amount being put up by the Council would be 3d. Mr. Austin Deasy said they should be given time to consider these figures. He asked

The successful tender was submitted by the Galway firm of Burke and Clancy but the lowest tender was a couple of hundred pounds lower. Mr. Deasy: The local firm of Messrs. E. O'Brien & Sons was the lowest tender. Was there any valid reason for not accepting it? Mr. Hally: They have no experience of this kind of work and it is a job that has to be done quickly. Mr. Deasy: The local firm are a highly efficient one.

Mr. Hally: I do not doubt that at all, and when they get into this type of work I have no doubt they will become equally efficient at it. Mr. Deasy said it did not appear satisfactory that this money should be left out of the area. The fact remained that a local firm had submitted the lowest tender. The Co. Manager, Mr. C. O'Connor said in accepting tenders the Council had also to be guided by its Consultants. The revised figures will be considered by the members and the matter will be finalised at the next meeting.

Grave Six Counties

Situation Referred To

The grave situation pertaining in the Six Counties was discussed at last Friday's meeting of Waterford County Council in Dungarvan.

Mr. Kieran O'Ryan said despite all that had been happening in the North all the time, the Government could devote to it in discussion was two minutes. He proposed therefore that they call on the General Council of County Councils to urge the Government to take up the question of partition with the United Nations.

Mr. J. Fahey, T.D. said the Minister for External Affairs had already been to see U Thant and there had also been a lengthy Government Party Cabinet Meeting on the 1st.

The proposal however, was carried unanimously, but only after some heated crossfire between Mr. O'Ryan and Deputy Fahey.

Recently, Mr. Kieran O'Ryan made representations to the Dept. of Posts and Telegraphs with regard to the quality of television reception in the Nire Valley area, and he has received the following reply from the Department:—

Mr. Childers desires to refer to your enquiries regarding television reception in the Nire Valley area, Ballymacarbery, and to say that he is aware that the quality of reception in this area is below the normal standard, but it is surrounded by high mountain ranges which practically rule out the possibility of giving reception of good quality. The Authority is completing a survey of all areas of poor reception, including the Nire Valley area. It is examining what can be done to improve reception in many of these areas, but it must first look to improving reception in the more populous areas.

The Minister regrets that the reply is not more favourable.

Housing Caravans

The Secretary of Waterford County Council, Mr. J. G. Dowling told last Friday's monthly meeting that the Council had purchased eight caravans for the rehousing of applicants for demountable type dwellings.

The Dept. of Local Government, he said, had also sanctioned a loan for £10,000 for this service, and the caravans, when purchased, would be allocated to the most deserving people by the Council.

Replying to a member, Mr. Dowling said the caravans would cost about £500 each, and that would enable them to purchase about twenty more.

SCHOOL YEAR 1968-70 NOTICE TO PARENTS AND GUARDIANS

The free transport scheme has been introduced to provide the opportunity of post-primary education for children who live an excessive distance from the nearest post-primary school.

Under the terms of the scheme, children living three miles or more from the nearest centre at which free education is available are eligible for transport to that centre.

Eligible pupils commencing post-primary education in September, 1969, should apply for transport without delay on a special form which they can obtain from the headmaster or headmistress of the post-primary school at which they propose to attend.

Eligible pupils at present attending postprimary schools will be given an application form by their headmaster or headmistress.

Eligible pupils intending to commence a Leaving Certificate course from September 1969 at a centre other than that in which they studied for their Intermediate Certificate should apply for a transport application form to the headmaster or headmistress of their new school.

Since the preparatory arrangements take a considerable time, free transport cannot be arranged for pupils who do not complete and return the application forms to their headmaster or headmistress before 16th May, 1969.

Direct transport cannot be provided from pupils' homes. The scheme is organised on the basis that no pupil will have more than three miles to walk or cycle either to the nearest school or to a pick-up point on a school bus route serving the nearest school.

PLANS FOR £300,000 COLLEGE Minister Addresses Dungarvan Dinner

ANNOUNCED Friary P.P.U. Meeting

REV. DENIS MASON, O.S.A., Ballyboden, Dublin, a native of Cappoquin, is the new President of the St. Augustine's College (Dungarvan) Past Pupils Union. He was elected unanimously at the annual meeting in the College on Sunday last at which 100 past pupils attended. He succeeds Mr. Maurice Browne, Cork, a native of Abbeyside, who held office for the past twelve months.

At the meeting plans were outlined for the building of a new £300,000 Day and Evening College on the Ballyboden Road, Dublin. It was stated that work on the college would be completed by the end of the year and that it would take two years to complete. It will cater for four hundred boys, over two hundred of whom will be day students. The College will have all modern conveniences, including a Language Laboratory, Arts and Crafts, and up to date Library, including a Consulting Library, and a magnificent Swimming Pool.

Referring to this mammoth venture the Father Provincial Rev. Fr. O'Mahony told the gathering that the new school would serve the ordinary boy from the ordinary family, with no element attached.

The meeting discussed various fund raising campaigns that might be launched to meet some of the very hefty expense, and it was agreed that the P.P.U. would take over the responsibility of providing a new Chapel in the proposed College, at an estimated cost of £20,000. A 10 years target in clearing off this debt was set by the members.

Present at the meeting was Mr. Rev. P. J. Dalton, Bishop of Adama, Northern Nigeria, and he was welcomed by Rev. T. C. Butler, Rector, St. Augustine's.

PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS
In his address to the meeting, the outgoing President Mr. Maurice Browne said that Education in Ireland had experienced some fundamental and far-reaching changes within the past year or so. In fact the year just passed had been the year of change, and it was open to question whether all the changes had been for the better. To his mind, some of the changes had been nothing more than changes for the sake of change.

Continuing, Mr. Browne said: "It would appear that Education has become, regrettably, the latest 'beast' for the politicians. A few years ago they were hot on the trail of the National Language, now they have turned their attention to the latest 'hot' topic: 'free education' for all."

"Perhaps some of the Parties will presently come up with the gag of 'free brains' for all and then you young students can all hope to go places. But you know, and I know and the Lord knows that

rather than going to University and finding himself unable to cope. He believed also that there was a tendency to over-emphasise the value of University education as distinct from training in high standard Technical Colleges. (This was a small nation with a below average population and in spite of all the talk about getting ready to meet the challenge of future development industrially, it seemed to him that the present emphasis on University education would leave them with a surplus of graduates which their present or even future development could not absorb. In short, he said, they would be educated for export and all at the taxpayer's expense.)

He referred to the building of a new Augustinian College in the town and said St. Augustine's was entering on a new era of expansion and development and he wished the Order every success in this new venture.

Concluding, he paid tribute to the late Paddy Barron, a valued member of the teaching staff at St. Augustine's for many years, and Eddie Spratt who by his "wise ways and modern instances" added much to the gaiety and character of their annual meetings over

been to the forefront in the Educational sphere in the South and with a new college in the offing in the town, he was confident that the "Alma Mater" would go from strength to strength.

Replying to this toast, Rev. T. C. Butler, O.S.A., Rector, Dungarvan, welcomed all their guests and mentioned in particular their Chief Guest the Father Provincial, Fr. O'Mahony.

During the past year, he said, they had lost a great friend in Paddy Barron, who gave 35 years service on the teaching staff of St. Augustine's. In the last few years he had not been in good health and for the last six months of his life he had literally drag himself to school. Even on his death bed, said Fr. Butler, Paddy Barron had expressed the wish that he could come back for even one class a day or even one class a week when he recovered. That, he said, was his devotion to St. Augustine's.

Fr. Butler also paid tribute to the late Eddie Spratt who gave such wonderful service to the P.P.U.

He went on to say that they were on the threshold of bigger and better things in education, and their first aim in S.A.C. was to expand and extend the curriculum. They had however, come up against a problem of a shortage of teachers. The physical side had not been neglected either, and besides the games of hurling, football and basketball, they had lately started a rugby team in the Dungarvan College. They had also participated in Lawn Tennis competitions. He reminded the members that the school students would be putting on a Physical Education display in the College on 1st June.

Another ambition was realised this year, he said, with the introduction of the Legion of Mary into the school, and its members were going out visiting old people living alone; people in the County Home and were doing odd jobs for them. Also under consideration was the formation of an Orchestra or Band, and while they had the teachers and the talent, their problem was the finance.

They were all looking forward, he said, to the new college which was just "around the corner."

The Toast to the P.P.U. was proposed by Fr. Whelton, New Ross, who spoke of the "intangible something" that existed between members of the P.P.U.

The final toast was to the guests and this was proposed by Rev. Fr. Butler and the Fr. Provincial Fr. O'Mahony replied.

THE Minister for Agriculture and Fisheries, Mr. Neil Blaney, T.D., was given a tremendous reception on Sunday night when he addressed the annual dinner of the Joint Dungarvan/Abbeyside Cumalainn in the Devonshire Arms Hotel. He spoke at length on the achievements of the Party and on the troubles of the Six Counties and at the conclusion was given a standing ovation by the 160 guests which attended. The function was presided over by Mr. Declan Goode U.D.C., Dungarvan, and Bridlín Ní Criostóir on behalf of both Cumalainn presented Mr. Blaney with a specially prepared address of welcome.

In welcoming the Minister, Mr. Goode said they were privileged to have such a distinguished Guest of Honour as Mr. Blaney, and he extended to him and their other guests a "lead mile falke."

Mr. Bobby Keane proposed a toast to the President of Ireland, Mr. Eamon De Valera, and proposed the Toast to their Guests.

PRESENTATION
Bridlín Ní Criostóir then presented the Minister with a specially prepared address of welcome on behalf of the Joint Cumalainn.

Mr. Blaney in his address first of all thanked the two Cumalainn for the beautifully prepared Address of Welcome, which he said had come as a complete surprise to him.

Referring to elections, he said they would have a General Election this year, but when he did not know. It would however be either at the end of May or beginning of June or around October/November.

Mr. Blaney said one thing the members of Fianna Fail would have to do from now on was to counteract the anti-Government propaganda that was being poured out over television and radio and on the newspapers. This propaganda, he said, was criticising what was not being done, criticising what was being done and moaning about what had not yet been attained. They would have to counter act this propaganda by telling the younger voters of the achievements of Fianna Fail over the years. They were not making enough capital out of their achievements, and were not boastful enough of what had been done by this Government. We do not talk of the milestones that have been reached, continued the Minister, and the many other things that have been done under Fianna Fail.

Mr. Blaney said it was Fianna Fail who had brought in the Acts and Legislation that saw an end to the near slavery of the workers in the past and all the rights they now enjoyed had been brought about by the Government Party. Labour should be reminded, he said, of the conditions of improvement which they had secured unaided for the workers, and both opposition parties should be reminded of the opposition which Fianna Fail met with when in the 1930's their great industrial drive got under way.

Continuing, the Minister said: "Those who strongly criticise us with their propaganda have done a hell of a sight less than Fianna Fail has done, and we all remember the two Coalition Governments, which pushed this country to the point of bankruptcy. And yet, John A. Costello, a former Taoiseach in a Coalition Government, when making his bowing out political speech last Friday, openly stated that he would bargain a new Coalition after the next General Election, if F.F. failed to gain an overall majority. The people have the remedy to another Coalition by giving F.F. that overall majority, and they can save John A. Costello the worry of burning the midnight oil in his home in trying to bargain yet another Coalition between parties whose policies are widely different."

Mr. Blaney said it was 12 years since the last Coalition, but recently they had the example of Fine Gael and Labour trying to outbid each other on Dublin City Council, and this was proof positive that Coalitions were not for F.F. However, the play actors over-played their hand on the Dublin City Council and left the Minister with no option but to abolish them.

But the outstanding example of the hypocrisy of Fine Gael and Labour, he continued, was the uncomplimentary way they had described him when he spoke on the troubles of the North after they had been last October. They followed that up with further uncomplimentary statements when I again referred to the Northern troubles at a Convention in Cahir. This was an effort by the Opposition to embarrass him, embarrass the Taoiseach and, above all, to embarrass

the ordinary people by giving them credit when the larger concerns would not even let the people into their premises. He would like to see these people getting the relief in rates that other sectors had got.

Mr. O'Ryan said he had met a farmer who because of the rate they had struck would now have to pay £420 a year in rates, which represented 30% a day.

Mr. J. Fahey, T.D., said they were all paying lip service to the small farmer and small farmers made up 85% of the farming community in County Waterford. There was the concession of farmers up to £20 valuation being completely de-rated and there was a sliding scale of rates for £20 to £33 valuation. Now however it seemed they wanted to extend these concessions to the man with the large broad acres. A man paying £420 in rates as Mr. O'Ryan had stated, had very valuable property today and he would prefer to see more small farmers making out a living from this amount of land rather than one man having it all.

Mr. Walsh said one could not judge a man's prosperity on his acreage valuation.

Mr. Curran said this Council and all other Councils should not be asked to go through what they have to go through at estimates meetings each year, and something would have to be done.

Mr. Austin Deasy said if the present rating system was not next year would the Dublin Council change then a lot of Councils City Council did this year. He had supported the striking of a rate at the estimates meeting, but if the rating system was not changed next year he would not support the striking of a rate.

Mr. Walsh: We hadn't the courage of our convictions this year.

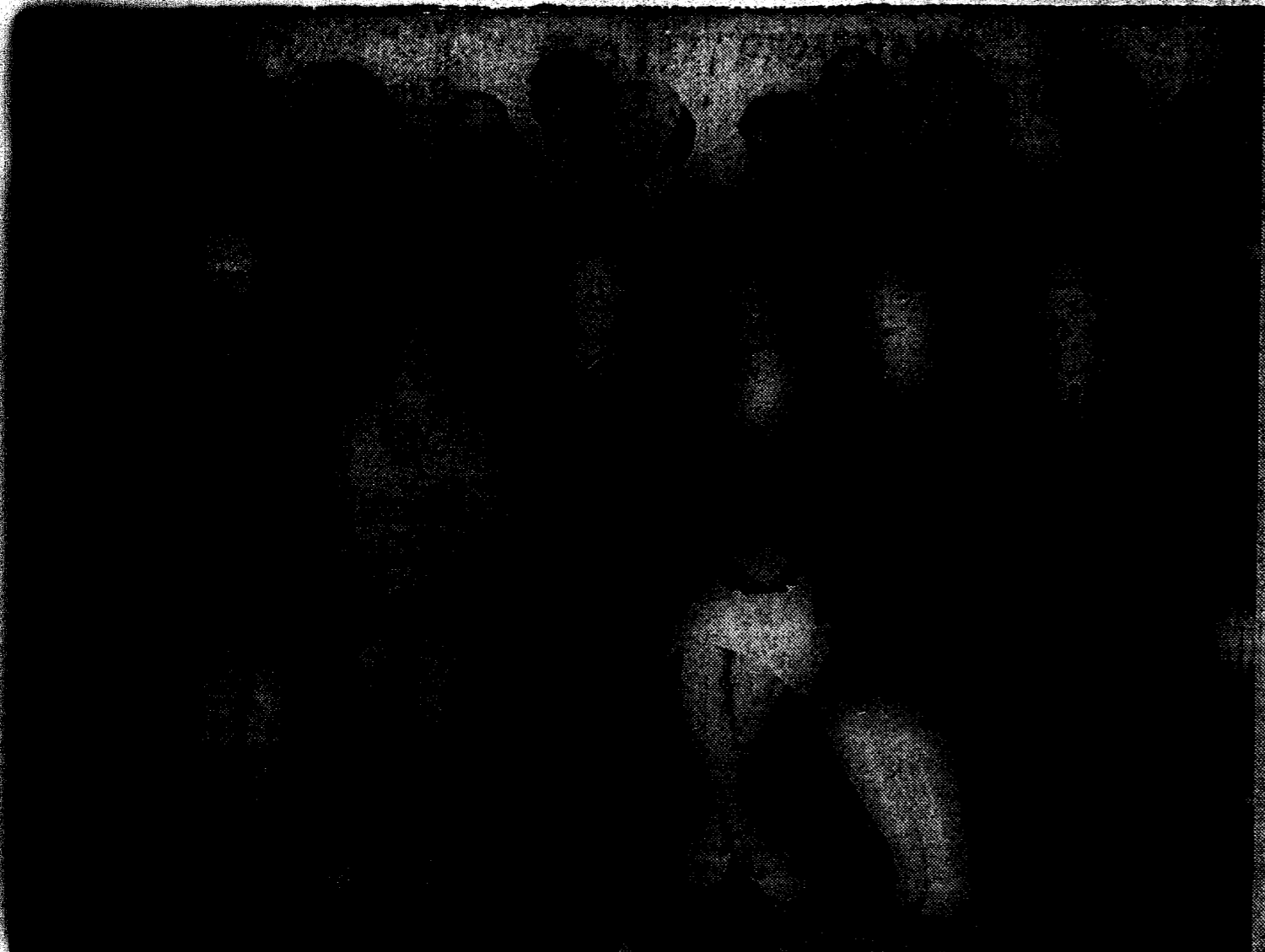

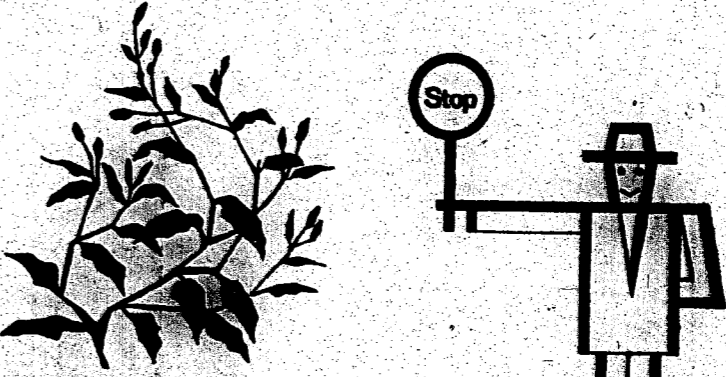

LETTER TO THE EDITOR

VISIT OF MAYOR RICHARD J. DALEY

I would like to deal with the ill-conceived letters which have appeared in the public press, condemning Waterford Corporation for its unanimous decision to confer the freedom of the City on the Mayor of Chicago.

For sheer unadorned bumptiousness, not to mention a complete ignorance of the facts, it would be hard to beat these letters.

Now for a few facts: Nearly sixteen years ago, when Richard J. Daley was first elected as Chief Executive of Chicago, he took over a city with an unenviable reputation for gangsters and hoodlums. This quiet man of immensely strong moral character set about reforming this great Metropolis, and such has been his success that he has been returned with an increased majority in each of the three subsequent Mayoral Elections.

The whole world knows what happened at the Democratic Party Convention last summer, when the hoodlums and thugs of America converged on Chicago with the avowed intention of preventing the Convention taking place. It will be to the eternal credit of the Chicago police, and the iron discipline of the Force, that although heavily armed, and provoked beyond human endurance not one shot was fired by them.

I had the pleasure of visiting Chicago nearly four years ago and discovered that it was the most beautiful city which I visited in the United States. Being concerned with Local Government, I was especially interested in American methods. What better tribute could be paid to the law-abiding citizens of America than to name this city.

The Old Parish Parochial Committee would like to inform "Destructors" and "Awake" (?) that among other Irish charities, Mayor Daley has contributed thousands of dollars for personal purposes. I would like to inform Mr. Ryan that Richard J. Daley's tributes came from West Waterford, in fact from Old Parish. I might also add that we here in Waterford are immensely proud of the great achievements of this worthy son of the Dunes in the great Republic beyond the sea.

I am sure that all right-minded people will agree that it is very fitting indeed for our city - the Capital of the Deelish - to have among its Freeman the great Catholic Administrator.

If nothing else, this first round Under 21 hurling championship game at the Frabur field on Sunday last, marked Dungarvan's emergence as live contenders for the Divisional title, presently held by Lismore. But it was not to be. Dungarvan proceeded to play their best hurling of the hour, and many fine outfield movements culminated with excellently taken scores. Waterford County Council to renew its request to the Minister for Local Government to receive a Deputation from the Cork and Waterford County Councils to discuss the possibility of receiving increased Road Grants because of the closing of the Mallow/Dungarvan Rail Line.

The Secretary of the Council, Mr. J. G. Dowling told last Friday's meeting in Dungarvan that an acknowledgment had been received from the Dept. of the Council's request for this Deputation. The letter had also stated however whether the Minister would or would not receive the deputation. Mr. Dowling said a letter had also been received from the Dept., stating that he could not receive a deputation from the Council in connection with an increase in the ordinary Road Grants for the coming year. The letter stated that if the Minister received deputations from individual Councils he would have to receive them from every other Authority. He could not therefore accede to their request.

The Chairman, Mr. C. Curran said the Minister would not receive a Deputation. He had already told him so.

Mr. K. O'Ryan said the Minister has been stalled. He had told him at the Ard Fheis in Dublin that he (Minister) would receive this deputation about increased Grants because of the closure of the rail line. Clearly the Minister has been stalled.

The Secretary pointed out that with regard to the receiving of a Deputation for increased grants consequent to the closing of the rail line, the Minister had not stated that he would or would not receive this deputation. It was merely an acknowledgment of receiving the Council's letter.

Mr. O'Ryan said they were entitled to an increased Road Grant because of the closure of the Mallow/Dungarvan line. The Minister told him he would receive a deputation about this. He said he would stand up in any court and swear this.

Mr. Curran said the Minister had told him he would not receive the deputation. That was before he had spoken to Mr. O'Ryan however.

Mr. William Kennedy, T.D. said they had received a grant for the Tramore Road when the Waterford-Tramore line was closed.

Mr. James D. Hally (County Engineer) said the closing of the rail line was having serious effect on their road, and a grant should be given. There had been special grants for all other roads effected by the closure of rail lines.

Mr. Sean Whelan said they should write to the Minister again and ask him if he was going to receive the joint deputation as he promised Mr. O'Ryan.

Mr. James Quirk said the road from Dungarvan to Fermoy was the worst in the county and there were many accidents on it because it was so narrow. They would be going however until someone was killed on that road.

Mr. Declan Ahearne said the situation was also causing grave concern to Cork County Council, who were insisting that the Minister receive this deputation.

It was agreed that the Deputies on the Council meet the Minister in the coming week and ask him to receive the joint Deputation from Cork and Waterford County Councils.
