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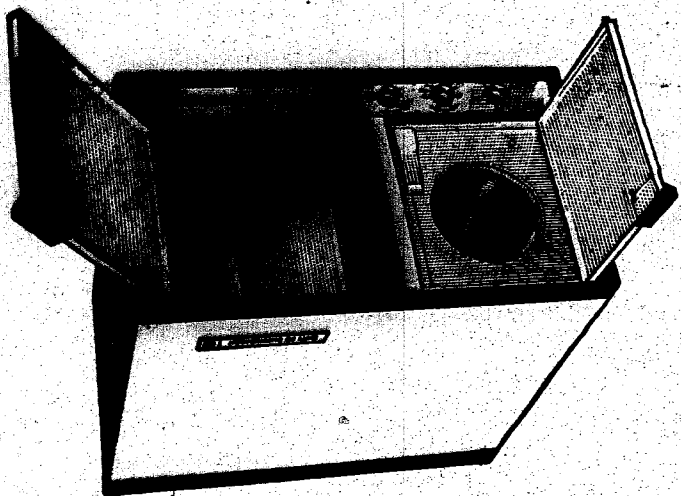

## CAUTIOUS APPROACH TO FINANCING WATER SCHEME

A final decision on the financing of the £120,000 Ballinacourty Water Scheme to serve the new £2,500,000 Magnesite Industry of Quigley Magnesite Ltd. was taken at last Monday's meeting of Waterford County Council in Dungarvan. The Council's decision, agreed to by 17 votes to 4, will now be sent to the Company for approval.

Mr. J. G. Dowling (County Secretary) outlining the history of the scheme, said it was originally estimated to cost £75,000 on the basis of 1,200,000 gallons daily for the Company. When it became known that the Company's daily demand would be 50% more it was estimated that the scheme would then cost £98,000.

Mr. Dowling said it was then agreed that the Council and the Company would share the cost of this figure, but when the scheme was put to tender it was found that it would cost £120,000. The Company had then agreed to pay 50% of the original £98,000, and 75% of the excess £22,000, and this would mean that the Company would be paying £65,500 (54.6%) of the £120,000 and the Council the remaining £54,500 (45.4%). The Company, said Mr. Dowling, were not prepared to pay any further contribution in excess of the £120,000.

Mr. Kieran O'Ryan asked if there was any danger that the County Council would have to pay more by virtue of the scheme costing in excess of £120,000. They had already gone too far, he said. Mr. Thomas A. Kyne, F.P., said they were being asked to pay 25% of the excess £22,000, which was £5,250 extra.

Mr. Austin Deasy said Contracts invariably cost more than was stated initially and the clause whereby the Company would make no further contribution in the event of the scheme costing in excess of the £120,000, could be very dangerous.

Mr. O'Ryan: What will happen if the whole thing flopped?  
Mr. Charles Curran (Chairman) said that was a very pessimistic view.

Deputy Kyne said at least sixty people would be employed there.  
Mr. O'Ryan: They are supposed to be multi-millionaires.

Deputy Kyne: Could we be given the likely valuation on this place when the factory will be built.

The Manager said whilst he could not give a figure, it would be very significant. The tenders were fairly high but he felt that this was so because the tenders were of the opinion that there was something that would have to go on.

Mr. Deasy said this scheme would put 3d. on the rates, but it was quite likely that the income rates from this project would offset that.

Mr. O'Ryan: That is a bit optimistic.

The Secretary said that for seven years the Company would only have to pay two-thirds of their rates.

Deputy Kyne said it was not a question of the Company being short of money, because they would be paying back much more in rates eventually. The Company had come to the Council in the first place because the Council would be able to

get permission to go through peoples land for this scheme.

Mr. O'Ryan said they were being very liberal with money. But he knew of several areas in the county that had been looking for minor water schemes for years and could not get them because the money was not available. Now, however they were giving big money to a multi-millionaire Company.

Mr. Curran: This scheme is for an industrial project.  
Mr. Declan Ahearne said he was supporting Mr. O'Ryan's views.

Mr. Curran said no one stood up at the start and said they should not finance this scheme for the industry. They should be consistent.

Mr. Norman Walsh said that whilst he was all in favour of this very important industrial project for West Waterford, it was fair to say that it was only since the estimated cost of the scheme had been changed that members were expressing certain views.

Mr. P. Coffey: Is it possible that this scheme will cost in excess of the £120,000.  
Co. Manager: It is quite possible. This £120,000 tender has a clause in it for variation of wages.

Mr. J. D. Hally (Co. Engineer) said that whilst there was a wages variation clause in the tender, he could not see the scheme costing anything more than £10,000 in excess of the £120,000.

Mr. Austin Deasy said it had been stated at the last meeting that the lowest tender for the scheme was not successful because of lack of experience of this type of work. He asked if it was stipulated when the scheme was advertised that only people with this type of experience need apply.

Mr. Hally: It probably wasn't.  
Mr. Deasy: That was unfair to people who went to the trouble of drawing up plans and specifications, the cost of which must have run into hundreds of pounds.

Mr. Hally: All the plans and specifications were provided as was the Bill of Quantities.

Mr. Deasy: You still got people to tender who had no chance of getting the contract. Surely you should have specified that people of work need only apply.

Mr. Hally: We did not ask any firm to tender. We advertised for tenders and I do not think there is any reason to question the manner in which we advertised for tenders.

When the Manager said that Tramore Faite was paying the Council £2,000 a year in rates for its property, Deputy Kyne said that surely the Ballinacourty project would bring in double that in rates. There were 55 working on it at the moment, he said, all drawing good wages and there could be 100 working there when

it got under way. Houses would also be springing up in the area, which would mean more rates for the Council.

Finally, on the proposal of Deputy Kyne, it was agreed to finance the scheme on the terms set out by the County Secretary in his letter to the Company, i.e., £65,000 by the Company and £54,500 by the Council, but should the scheme exceed the £120,000 the Council's total expenditure on it shall not exceed 50% there.

The terms will now be sent to the Company for approval.

### Tallow's Housing Problem

They were conscious of the fact that no houses had been built in Tallow for over eighteen years, but they were not lying down on it, the Co. Manager, Mr. Charles O'Connor said at last Monday's meeting of Waterford County Council, in Dungarvan.

Mr. Norman Walsh said the people of Tallow were very dissatisfied. Nothing had been done for them on the question of housing and a Public Convenience for the town, and they were considering sending an open letter to the papers to more or less take the matter up with the Councilors. Their case was that they were making constant representations but that the Council was just ignoring them.

The Manager said they had anticipated that this would be raised. There was a legal question over sites for houses still unresolved and they had plans for houses in Tallow. They were trying to get the land question clarified and they would try to have it settled between now and the next meeting. However, as far as housing was concerned in Tallow they were not lying down on it, and were conscious of the fact that no houses had been built in the town for over 18 years.

Mr. George Heskin said people were coming to him saying that the Councilors were doing nothing about the situation in Tallow. They had been trying to push this for a long time, but were getting nowhere.

Mr. Walsh said they had made constant representations when asked by the Tallow Development Committee.

Mr. Heskin said the people of Tallow were blaming the Councilors and the Council for the delay, but the facts should be put in the Public Press to let them see where the blame lay.

Mr. H. R. Dowd said the housing situation in Tallow was a disgrace and was a reflection on the Co. Council.

The Manager agreed to try and have the land problem settled for the next meeting, at which he would present an up to date report on the situation.

### Being Brought Up in "Soul Destroying Circumstances"

People in parts of Lismore town were being brought up in "soul destroying surroundings," Mr. H. R. Dowd stated at last Monday's meeting of Waterford Co. Council, in Dungarvan, when he urged the Council to clear the derelict sites at Church Lane, Lismore.

Mr. Dowd said these ruins were rat infested and dangerous and took up about three quarters of an acre in size. There were a number of small occupied houses nearby, most of which had been reconstructed by the owners hoping that these ruins would be demolished. These were soul destroying surroundings for these people and he appealed to the Council to have them removed.

Mr. James Quirke seconded.  
Mr. Charles Curran (Chairman) said there was no provision in the estimate in the coming year for Derelict Sites.

Mr. Dowd: Something must be done. These ruins of century old houses are unsanitary and rat infested rocks. The young children particularly are being brought up in soul destroying surroundings.

Mr. C. O'Connor (Co. Manager) said the only way he could see of getting round the problem was to declare it a clearance area.

Mr. Dowd: The place is also being used for dumping purposes. It is a cancer in a little town.

It was agreed that a full report would be presented for the next meeting.

A report will also be available at the next meeting, on Mr. Norman Walsh's request, for a clearance of sites at Grey Street, Cappoquin.

THEIR ability to take whatever chances came their way was one of the prime factors in Brickey Rangers first round senior football championship victory over De La Salle at Fraher Field, Dungarvan on Sunday last.
