Tourist Caravan Stays On Square A 'Mini Monster' Says Colr.

The controversial Tourist Information Caravan at Grattan Square, Dungarvan, was again the subject of lengthy discussion at last Monday night's meeting of the Urban Council, when a motion, tabled by Mr. Noel Hackett, requesting that the Caravan be moved off the Square to Davitt's Quay, was defeated on the casting vote of the Chairman, Mr. T. A. Kyne, T.D.

In moving his notice of motion, Mr. Hackett said this Caravan, belonging to the South Eastern Regional Tourism Organisation, was a traffic hazard because it took up five car parking spaces. It was also an obstruction to some premises on the Square all of whom, he said, were ratepayers paying their 85/- in the £. He asked the Council to reconsider its decision on this matter. A similar move had been defeated 12 months ago, but he felt the members should now reconsider that decision. He was not against Tourism, but was against the location of this Van.

Mr. Deelan Goode said whilst he had been a member

of the Council no one had ever come to him about the location of the Caravan.

Mr. Patrick Whelan said he agreed with the views expressed by Mr. Hackett. At present if one stood on one side of the Square it was not possible to see the premises on the other side because of the location of the caravan. It was also filthy and dirty on the street and they as a Council were contributing to that.

Mr. Goode said they were benefiting in this country to the extent of £80 million a year from tourism and he disagreed entirely with this

ver know. If the Council had seen fit to do away with the weighhouse, he could not see why they should now condone this Tourist Caravan.

Mr. Austin Deasy said he too would support its removal because of the fact that it took up five car parking spaces on the Square. It was vital, he said, that they had the maximum car space on the Square in the summer season, and it would be advisable too if the traders did not park their cars on the Square during the summer. Was there any reason to believe, he asked, that there would be less calls to the Tourist Caravan if it was sited at Davitt's Quay.

Deputy Kyne: I believe there would be considerably less calls.

Mr. Goode then proposed an amendment that the Caravan remain in its present position and when this resulted in a tie 4-4. Deputy Kyne gave his casting vote in favour of the amendment.

The voting was: For the retention of the Tourist Caravan on the Square—Cols. Kyne, Goode, Walsh and Kenneally; Against—Cols. Hackett, Wade, Deasy and Whelan.

All-Ireland Honours For Dungarvan Band

The Dungarvan Brass and Reed Band, under the Baton of its accomplished Conductor, Mr. M. A. Henneberry, scored the most notable achievement of its distinguished career in Dublin last week end, when the band won the all Ireland Intermediate Championship for Brass and Reed Bands, with

a grand total of 82 marks, in doing so the Band carried off the coveted R. and W. Williams Cup, and Mr. Henneberry was presented with a special gold medalion for being conductor of the winning band.

By this wonderful achievement the Band has certainly brought further honour and

glory to the Old Boro. This was only their second time to compete in these championships, and last year at the very first attempt finished a very creditable fourth. But this time the band members and conductor Henneberry pulled out all the stops to put on a musical display that brought lavish praise from

the adjudicator Mr. J. Johnson, Belfast.

In announcing the result, Mr. Johnson said he had been highly impressed by the Band's choice and style of playing. The overall tuning and balance of the Band was superb, he said, and in awarding them full marks for strict interpretation said this was something he often found lacking even in senior bands.

The adjudicator went on to praise highly the solos and accompaniment in the Band's own choice piece—Scottish Gems. The solos given by Nicky Noonan, Kieran O'Regan and Francie Kenneally were top class, he said. The adjudicator also said he was most impressed by the superb handling of the Fest Piece—Folk Song Rhapsody, by Conductor Henneberry.

To mark this momentous and memorable achievement the Band will stage a victory parade in Dungarvan and Abbeyside on Saturday night leaving the Bandroom at 8 p.m. The trophy will be on display during the parade.

MALICIOUS DAMAGES CLAIM SUCCEEDS

The damage was clearly malicious and the plaintiff was entitled to succeed, said Judge Sean Mac D. Fawcitt at Dungarvan Circuit Court on Tuesday last, when he awarded a decree for £12.10.0 and costs and expenses to Roderick Mulcahy, Youghal Rd., Dungarvan, in his malicious damages claim against Waterford County Council brought as a result of damage to the plaintiff's car on the night of January 25th last.

The plaintiff, Roderick Mulcahy told the Court that on the night of January 25th last he had his Fiat car parked at two places during the evening. It was parked first at Davitt's Quay and later at Strandside North. On

the following morning he noticed that his car aerial had been removed and the cable cut. It had cost him £12.10.0 to have the damage repaired.

Mr. J. Fennelly B.L. for the plaintiff, said a number of other cars were also damaged in the town that night.

Detective Michael Bowen said he had received a number of complaints of damage to cars in Dungarvan that night. Several car aerials had been damaged on the cars and it was vandalism.

Judge Fawcitt said the damage was clearly malicious and he awarded the plaintiff a decree for £12.10.0, costs and expenses. He ordered that it be made a County-at-large charge.

LETTER TO THE EDITOR

A Chara,
Recently the F.G. spokesman for Agriculture stated that much of the money provided by the present Government for that industry "was going to waste." This is an interesting statement that requires clarification.
Agriculture is our principal industry. It provides the bulk of our exports. Those engaged in it work seven days a week.
Yet our main industry would collapse only for the fact that the Exchequer provides massive price supports and subsidies—£80 million in present year. It is well known that many F.G. and Labour Party leaders are strongly opposed to this policy on the part of the Government.

Before the F.G./Labour dominated Government collapsed in 1957 they were considering the abolition of all state grants for the relief of rates on agricultural land. They stated that the money provided for this purpose "was going to waste."
The Opposition promise to provide all sections of the community with more and better services which cost an extra £50 million p.a. (without any extra cost to the taxpayers). They also state that if elected to Government they will introduce legislation to have the Health Services financed by Insurance Contributions. It should be realized that this would cost each worker and small farmer an extra 30/- per week.
Let us be realistic. There is no such thing as "free services"—they all have to be paid for in full by the community.

Kieleys Bottling Co. (Manufacturers of Seven Up) Tipperary, for the sponsorship of this £200 Ballad Competition which will be known as "Seven Up Steps to Stardom." Details of entry will be announced shortly by the Organising Committee.

The Competition will be divided into three sections: Under 16 (1st prize £30; 2nd £15; 3rd £5); Over 16 (1st, £70; 2nd, £25; 3rd £5). There will be a special £50 prize for the Best Ballad Group, details of which will also be announced shortly.

SUCCESSFUL ANNUAL DUNGARVAN HORSE FAIR

Favoured by fine weather conditions, the fourth Annual Horse Fair under the auspices of the Co. Waterford Horse Breeders Association was held in Dungarvan on Friday last and attracted close on five hundred animals. The prevailing prices were not as good as in previous years, but this year more than ever before the emphasis was on quality. There was also a very large attendance of buyers both from Ireland and England.

Overall, the event was a spectacular success, and the Horse Breeders' Association deserve the thanks of all for making this one of the foremost such fairs in the country.

The Ledingham Perpetual Trophy for the best riding animal at the fair was won by James Whyte, Cutteen, Kilrossanty, and the Bellard Cup (presented by M. J. Connors) for the best riding pony, was won by Mr. James J. Ledingham, Ticknock, Kinsalebeg, Youghal.

The Horse Breeders' Association Perpetual Trophy for the best two or three year old lead animal was won by Mr. Martin Curran, Ballyknock.

YOUTH'S SENTENCE REDUCED BY HALF

A 19-year-old County Tipperary youth who promised that if given one more chance he would "go straight" had a six months sentence in St. Patrick's Institution reduced to three when he lodged an appeal against the severity of the sentence at Dungarvan Circuit Court on Tuesday.

The appellant, John P. Williams, Ballought, Bansha, was convicted at Lismore District Court on May 7th, with the larceny of a lady's pedal cycle, the property of Mrs. Margaret O'Brien, Bansha, and sentenced to six months in St. Patrick's Institution.

Dr. D. R. Counahan, State Solicitor, said the appellant had a number of previous convictions. Garda Paul Cummins giving a history of the appellant's record, said he had previous convictions dating back to 1967. He had been convicted of housebreaking, larceny and burglary, and had already served two years in Daingean Reformatory, two six-month terms in institutions and had also been sentenced to 14 days imprisonment which had been suspended however, by the District Justice.

Garda Cummins said Williams lived with his mother who seemed to condone his actions and had very little control over him. Judge Fawcitt said if he left Williams out now he would break into someone else's house.

Williams said if given this chance he would go straight in the future and would get a job. Judge Fawcitt said he would reduce the District Court sentence from six to three months. However when the appellant returned to St. Patrick's he need not tell his friends there that he would do the same in their cases because he could be sure he would not.

He warned Williams that if ever he came before him on appeal again he would not reduce the sentence.

£1,000 FOR NEW DUNGARVAN DUMP

Dungarvan Urban Council is to purchase two and a half acres of land at Ballinamuck from local business man Mr. M. V. Morrissey for £1,000 for conversion into the new Town Dump, which in time will replace the present one at Shandon. This decision was taken at last Monday night's meeting of the Council, despite objections to the price by Mr. Patk. Whelan.

Mr. J. P. Robinson said he and other Officials and the Council Chairman had met Mr. Morrissey in connection with this land and they were asked for a sum of £1,000 for the two and a half acres of land between the Railway Track and the Borheen at Ballinamuck, where they had got permission to dump, following an appeal. They told Mr. Morrissey that that was a big jump from the original price he had asked for some time ago, but he said that was the best of the land there. After discussing it fully with him, he (Mr. Morrissey) would not budge from his figure of £1,000.

The Town Clerk said that Mr. Morrissey also told them that he had been offered a portion of the railway track there by C.I.E. for £25. They told him they would like to get that piece of property with the dumping ground, because it would give them access to the dump from two sides, and he (Mr. Morrissey) told them that if they wanted to purchase the land and wanted to take up C.I.E.'s offer, he would not stand in their way.

The Co. Manager said the acquiring of a new dump in Dungarvan was an urgent problem. If the Council agreed to the proposal to purchase the land for the £1,000, they would be able to go ahead with it on the 1st June. This he added would be the first step to eliminate the present town dump.

Mr. Patrick Whelan said £1,000 for two and a half acres was too much, and one could buy building land for that kind of money, he said. Mr. Thomas Wade said they had to acquire a new dump, and provided this site was a suitable one, he advised the

Council to get it. Mr. Whelan said they were all concerned about getting a new dump, but they should also be concerned about the price they had to pay for one. People knowing that the Council needed something always came along thinking they could get them to pay what they liked for it.

Mr. T. A. Kyne, T.D. (Chairman) said they had tried to get this land for less, but there was no hope. He had made him a top bid of £650 and was told that was out. They could either take it or leave it for the £1,000.

Mr. Declan Goode said they had been originally offered 14 acres there by Mr. Morrissey for £800. He felt the gun was being put to their heads in this matter.

Deputy Kyne said the other portion of the 14 acres was only a swamp and was of no value. The Town Clerk said there were another 31 acres there that Mr. Morrissey might have squatters rights to, and if he had, these would be included in the £1,000.

Mr. Goode: So in effect we might be getting almost six acres for the £1,000. Deputy Kyne: We might, but we don't like to put it like that just now.

The Co. Manager said this land was as valuable to them as building land. Mr. Noel Hackett proposed that they purchase the two and a half acres from Mr. Morrissey for £1,000. Mr. Patrick Whelan proposed that they look for a better deal. This throwing of money down the drain was going on all the year round on this Council, he said.

Mr. Hackett's proposal was carried by 7 votes to 1, Colr. Whelan voting against. Mr. Whelan said he was not against the acquiring of a dump, but was against the price.

The Co. Manager said that with regard to the financing of this land, they had received £2,000 from the National Building Agency for land at the Railway Road and they would utilise £1,000 of that money for this purchase.

Abbeyside Housing Scheme Ready

Mr. J. P. Robinson (Town Clerk) told the members of Dungarvan Urban Council at last Monday night's meeting that the new 32 house scheme at Abbeyside would probably be handed over to the tenants today (Thursday).

Mr. Robinson said they had got the keys of the houses from the Contractor and the E.S.B. were now installing the meters in them. Deputy Tom Kyne said the sooner the tenants went in the better for the Council because there was a weekly loss of about £100 in rents.

To Re-sell Site to Health Authority
Dungarvan Urban Council unanimously agreed at this week's meeting to resell to Waterford Health Authority their site at Springmount for the £200 which the Council had originally paid the Health Authority for it.

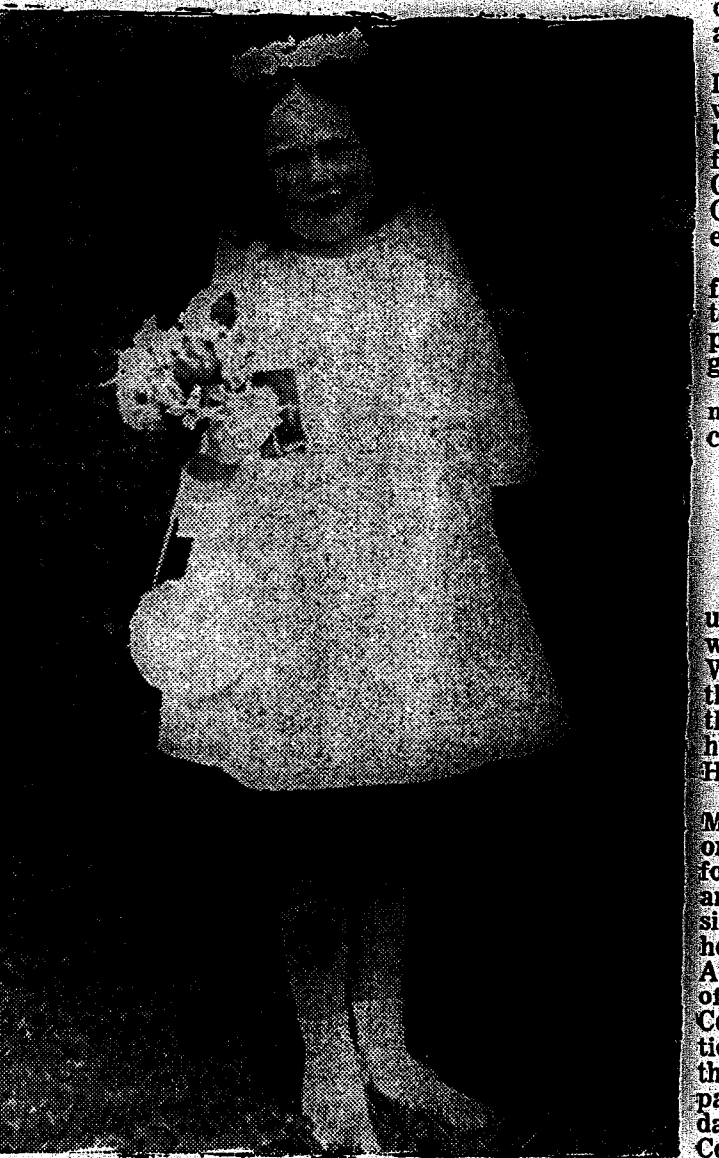
Mr. Charles O'Connor (Co. Manager) said this site had originally been earmarked for housing by the Council, and later as an industrial site. The immediate problem however was that the Health Authority had the problem of the provision of separate County Home Accommodation, and they (Health Authority) felt that bed-ridden patients should be accommodated separately to other Co. Home patients. They wanted the Council to transfer back this site to them for the £200 for which they had previously sold it to the Council, so as to to build a 30 to 50 bed unit on it.

Mr. Thomas A. Kyne, T.D. (Chairman) said he would be all in favour of acceding to this request. It was the old, bed-ridden people who would benefit. The Council had obtained the site from the Health Authority for the price they had paid for it, thirty years previously, and they should return the favour now.

The Town Clerk said if the Council agreed to it they would have to get Department sanction. Mr. Declan Goode proposed and Mr. Patrick Whelan seconded that they resell the site to the Authority for the £200.

Mr. Noel Hackett asked if the unused farm land at the present County Home could be used for this purpose. The Manager said it was proposed also to erect a 100 bed unit on it. However, this 30 to 50 bed unit for the bed-ridden patients would have to be separate to the other building.

Mr. Goode's proposal was agreed to unanimously by the Council.

**FATHER AND SON Support for Irish
KILLED IN NEW Music Class
YORK**

The news of the tragic death in New York following a road accident on Sunday last of Mr. Edmond (Ned) Power and his nine year old son Pat, has been received with shock and regret in Co. Waterford, but particularly in his native Kiely's Cross.

Mr. Power, who emigrated to the United States fifteen years ago, was returning from the New York - Connacht football game in Gaelic Park on Sunday evening last, when the fatal accident occurred.

The remains of both father and son were flown into Shannon Airport this (Thursday) morning and were removed by Road to Grange Church. The interment takes place in Grange Cemetery tomorrow (Friday) morning after 10.30 Requiem Mass.

Mr. Power is survived by his wife, four daughters and two sons, the youngest of whom is only three months old, to all of whom sincere sympathy is extended on their loss.

For too long now the Arts had been sadly neglected in this country, said Mr. Ted Buckley, N.T., at Monday's meeting of the County Waterford Vocational Education Committee when he proposed the appointment of a full-time music teacher.

Before the meeting was an application from the Dungarvan Branch of Comhaltas Ceoltóirí Éireann for a Traditional Irish Music class in Dungarvan at least one night a week, next term. The Branch stated that such a class was necessary and the interest in traditional Irish music in the town would ensure the success of it.

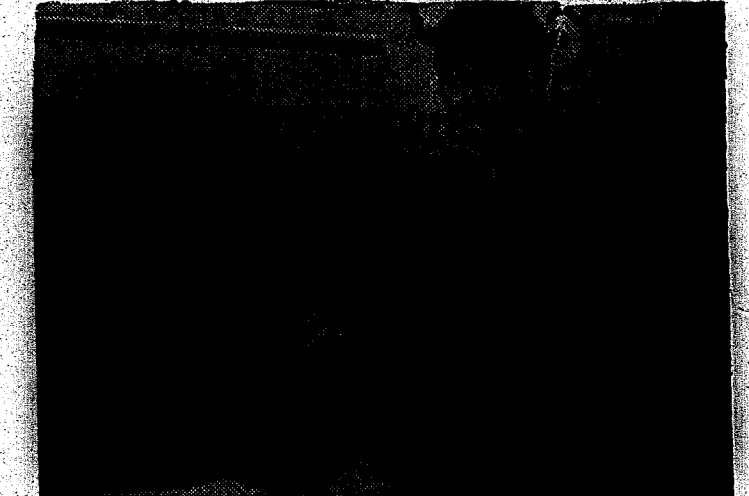
The Acting C.E.O., Mr. T. F. Maher said they had only one Traditional Irish music teacher, and he was available only two nights weekly. He had one class in Ballymacarby once a week, whilst Kilmacthomas had been seeking a similar class for a very long time. The only way it could be worked, he said, was to have classes in Ballymacarby and Kilmac' from Sept. to Xmas, and in Dungarvan and Ballymac' from Xmas to Easter.

Mr. Wm. Kenneally, T.D., said there was enough of pop music going in the country and now that they had a chance of keeping their own traditional music going they should grasp it. He would be all in favour of classes in Dungarvan, Kilmac' and Ballymac'.

Mr. Buckley said it was very bad that they had no fully-qualified music teacher on the staff. For too long now the arts had been neglected in this country and they should have a full time music teacher, for all kinds of music, on the staff.

The Committee unanimously agreed to advertise for a music teacher and to provide the traditional Irish music class in Dungarvan.

The handful that turned up at Dungarvan's Fraher field on Sunday last got little in the way of entertainment from this standard and pretty one-sided Under 21 football championship tie. Tourin deservedly advanced to round two, but so unimpressive were they in defeating a Kilrossanty side that had absolutely nothing to offer footballwise that they can hardly hope to make much further progress in the title race.

Tourin enjoyed by far the better of the first half exchanges and points by Donal Landers, Richie Ormonde and Bernie Scanlon to which Kilrossanty replied with a pointed free by Tom Keating on the stroke of half time gave the winners an unflattering 0-3 to 0-1 interval lead.

The Big Charity Walk in Dungarvan, on Sunday last, was an outstanding success. Close on 150 walkers took part, and all but two finished the 16 miles route. Most of the walkers took the "grub" along with them and broke the journey. The walkers took off on the journey between 10 and 11.30 a.m.

**Increase for Town
Engineer**

Dungarvan Urban Council agreed by six votes to one at last Monday night's meeting to a 9% salary increase for the Town Engineer, Mr. Patrick Walsh. The increase will cost £183 in the current financial year, for which no provision has been made in the Estimates.

Mr. J. P. Robinson (Town Clerk) said this 9% increase had been granted to all other Officials of the Council late last year, but the Engineers were excluded at the time from the claim, pending an increase for them. The Minister had sanctioned in other cases the granting of the 9% for the Engineers generally.

Mr. Robinson said it was proposed to backdate the increase to 1st June, 1968. To cover the retrospective period a sum of about £85 would be required, whilst in the coming full year it would cost about £98. That meant that the total cost in this coming year would be £183 and no provision had been made for this in the estimates.

Mr. Patrick Whelan said he had to disagree with this because it was going back almost twelve months. These claims should be dealt with within a month of they being made, he said.

Mr. T. A. Kynne, T.D. (Chairman) said the machinery dealing with these claims was slow moving at times. Usually the increase backdated to when the claim was made.

Mr. Declan Goode said the work of the Town Engineer was increasing two fold and as he saw this claim it was a Statutory demand on them, a claim, he added, which had been met in respect of all the other Council Officials. He proposed the implementation of the increase and Mr. R. A. Walsh seconded.

Mr. Whelan: We are making a good start to the coming year after our recent estimates meeting. We will have to draw the line if our rates are not to be over 100/- in the £ next year.

Mr. Goode's proposal was carried by six votes to one, Colr. Whelan opposing it. Mr. Thomas Wade abstained from the vote.

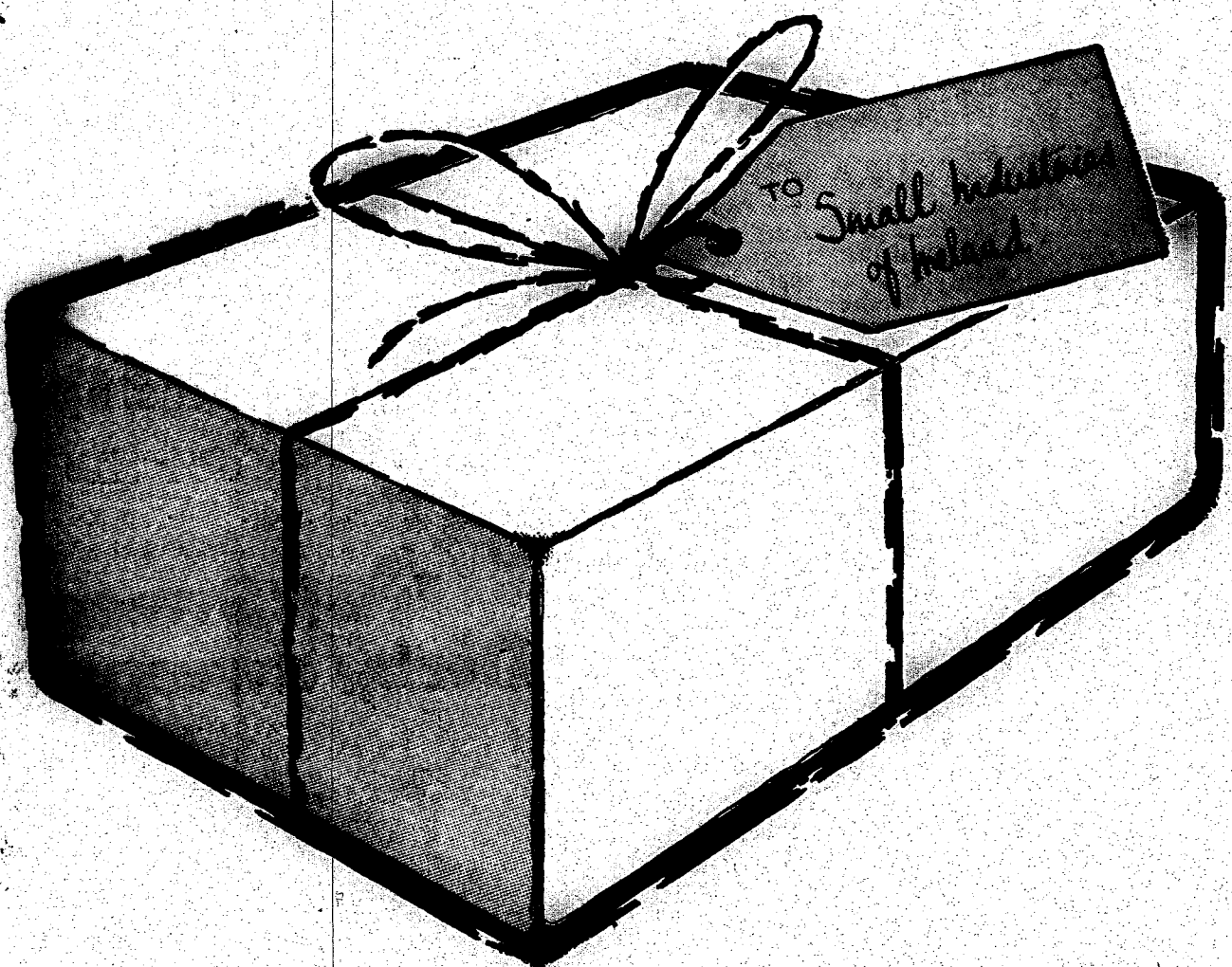

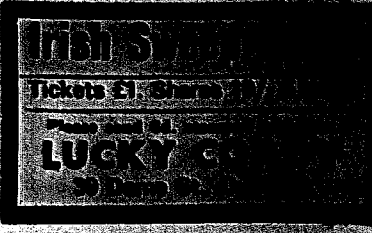

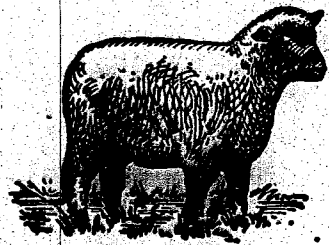

NO DECISION ON TOWN FOOTBRIDGE

At this week's meeting of Dungarvan Urban Council the proposal of the County Engineer, Mr. J. D. Hally to erect a footbridge on the Causeway Bridge on the downstream side of the Causeway Bridge linking Dungarvan and Abbeyside was fully discussed, but no final decision on whether such a bridge should or should not be erected, was taken at the meeting.

Mr. T. A. Kyme, T.D. (Chairman) said the Causeway Bridge was about 24 feet wide, but if the present footpath on the bridge was widened by three or four feet, it would still be wider than the average width of the ordinary main road. They all realised there was a danger on the bridge, but his main objection was that he would have to see such a beautiful bridge lose its effect or destroyed in any way.

Previously he said it was suggested that the Causeway bridge be replaced altogether, but that proposal was defeated, and this latest suggestion of a footbridge was something of a compromise. Were it the Co. Engineer, added Deputy Kyme, "I would be ashamed to say that had not erected a sign warning of a narrow, dangerous bridge ahead if it is as dangerous as he says it is."

The Co. Engineer, in his report, said the bridge was a danger, particularly to pedestrians, and with the increasing traffic that danger was increasing. He had obtained a quotation for the erection of a footbridge on the downstream side of the existing bridge for the sum of £3,700 and he recommended the erection of such a bridge.

Mr. Thomas Wade said the erection of this footbridge was very necessary and should have been erected years ago.

Mr. Austin Deasy said that just because a serious accident had not occurred did not mean that one was not going to occur on the existing bridge. With the heavy traffic that was using it now it was only a matter of time before something serious and tragic did happen on it.

Mr. Declan Goode said the hump on the present bridge was better than any 30 or 40 mile speed sign, because even if one was never in the town before they would see that it was necessary to slow down approaching the bridge.

Mr. Noel Hackett: Is there any hope of building a bridge under the present one? Town Clerk: It would cost a fortune.

Mr. C. O'Connor (County Manager) said he too was most impressed by the beauty of this Causeway Bridge when he first saw it. If they considered widening the footpaths on the bridge and erecting Danger Signs they might think of experimenting with them for six or twelve months.

Mr. Whelan: I would not support anything that would be experimenting with life. Mr. Wade: The sooner we

get under way with this footbridge the better. He proposed they erect one on the downstream side of the Causeway Bridge.

Mr. Austin Deasy seconded. The Co. Manager asked the members that before taking any firm decision either way he be given the opportunity of again discussing it with the Co. Engineer in view of what he had heard at the meeting.

The members unanimously agreed to this, and the matter will be considered again at the next meeting, when a final decision will be taken on it.

Conaghan, told the Court that the appellant also failed to turn up at the March sittings for her appeal. He had written to her telling her to be present at to-day's sessions.

Garda O. Croke said he investigated the case at the time. It was the general opinion that the appellant had now gone to England. Judge Fawcitt then ruled that the order of the District Justice would stand.

Last Minute Point Sees Limerick Through

Kilrossanty To Beat Weakened Mitchels

Stradbally Oppose Co. Champions

It is extremely doubtful if the County Board has ever witnessed three games of such widespread appeal on the same day as the first round senior football championship which goes on at the Dungarvan and Walsh Park venues on Sunday night. The Fraher Field meeting of Kilrossanty and the Mitchels (7.30) brings the great rivals into direct opposition for the very first time; earlier in the year, Geraldines throw down the gauntlet to last year's senior finalists, Tramore, whilst at Walsh Park, the rejuvenated Stradbally will be endeavouring to do what all others have failed to do in championship honours for almost four years—halt the triumphant march of tonight's Kill.

On any other occasion any one of these games would be rightly billed the "game of the day," that takes on Sunday must rest with parish neighbours Kilrossanty and Mitchels, and given a fine evening, the Dungarvan venue should house a near record attendance for a club game.

The great split of opinion which resulted in the formation of the Mitchels, two sides have only met twice in Phelan Cup competition. The first meeting was at Walsh Park when the Mitchels club were a few months "old" and all predictions pointed to a certain defeat on Kill's part. The second meeting at Sunday's venue was the Mitchels' consolation game, which confirmed their position as the masters.

All the time, however, the rivals seemed to elude one another in the championship until Sunday that is, and there is a fierce determination in both camps not to bow the knee to the other.

It is unfortunate then that the Mitchels must enter the fray without their star centre-back, Wally Connors. Wally Connors is playing for the County team in Clonmel on Sunday and is likely to be out of action for at least a month. His loss cannot be assessed so greatly, and it certainly means that the Mitchels have a very definitely in Kill's favour.

It seems probable that the two men will discard the

return of Pa Walsh who missed the Phelan Cup replay against Kill is bound to strengthen the sector. Walsh will probably line out on the forty flanked by Pat Coffey and a very much in form Tom Riordan. Nearer goal, however, Kilrossanty have major problems and apart from Gort Walsh at full back, the line seems to lack the necessary drive. At full strength I must admit that I would have a slight fancy for the Mitchels but I cannot now see them overcoming a Kilrossanty side intent on victory, without Connors. So in giving Kilrossanty the vote I look forward to an absorbing struggle between them—and above all let us hope a sporting and manly one.

GERALDINES STIFF TASK
The unpredictable Geraldines commence their championship campaign also at the Fraher field on Sunday afternoon and it is doubtful if they could have a much stiffer first hurdle than that which last year's beaten finalists, Tramore, will provide. The odds undoubtedly weigh heavily in Tramore's favour and it is in such a situation that these Aglishers are most dangerous.

Geraldines have trained reasonably hard for Sunday's game and certainly if encouragement is needed it is provided in the return of Ned Merrin and Mick Tobin, both of whom recently underwent a one month term of suspension. The side has not participated in the Phelan Cup, a factor that may militate against them but Tramore on the other hand have slumped to rock bottom form in the same competition.

For Sunday's game the Aglishers will field their strongest possible fifteen, although a definite non-starter will be their former dependable corner back Jim Kelleher. As I see it, much will depend on how the Aglish defence copes with Tramore's very speedy and effective forwards. Close marking is absolutely essential and the outcome may depend on how Paddy Kenneally, Ned and Feeney Merrin and Mickey Downing measure up in this respect. On their day Johnny Cotter and Jim Merrin can expect to hold their own at midfield and in attack Joe Bally, Johnny Grady, Mick Tobin and the Treacys will stretch the Tramore defence.

Scanning the Tramore side individually, it is doubtful if Geraldines can claim parity with men like Michael Power, John O'Brien, Greg O'Neill and the Flemings. But if these can be even reasonably curtailed then Geraldines will have gone quite a way towards achieving victory. However, one finds it difficult to oppose the Seasideers and in all the circumstances Tramore are entitled to start firm favourites. But particularly at the Dungarvan venue, the Aglishers are capable of rising to the occasion and they could well spring the first major surprise of this campaign to date.

STRADBALLY CONFIDENT
The Kill-Stradbally game at Walsh Park has all the makings of a battle royal. In many quarters Kill are regarded as virtual certainties to retain the title for another year but if any side has the potential to beat them it is surely Stradbally. And not for one single moment would I rule out the possibility of their triumphing over the champions on Sunday. Stradbally's form in the current Phelan Cup campaign has been such that no opposition has come within striking distance of them. They simply toyed with Ballinacourty and Killrossanty in turn and in the process of doing so their forwards have totted up huge tallies. That in itself is encouraging for followers of the Reds for in the past it has been forward fallings that has cost them dearly. They have now adopted a far more direct and positive approach and provided they forget about their short passing and over elaboration up front, men like Matty Reilly, Virgie Power, John Kiely and Tom Cunningham have it in them to stretch the Kill defence.

Their own defence too is playing quite competently right now. Full back Pat Clancy must be just about one of the best defenders in the County and he has able colleagues in Joe and Aio Curran and Joe Power. I have deliberately left mention of their midfielders Tom Hearne and Michael Coffey to last, for if this pair can hold their own with Kill's Seamus Keavans and Martin Kennedy (who may be fit enough to resume in the sector) then I am quite prepared for a shock result. The champions on the other hand must field on Sunday without their new recruit, Clare and Munster star, Paddy McMahon, who is presently under suspension. There are also rumours that a back injury may keep Monty Guiry out of action, and should this be so then Kill are in deep trouble. But when analysing this tie I prefer to think in terms of full strength sides and then weight up the outcome on that basis. Frankly anyway, I believe Guiry will take his place in attack and as always will be the man the opposition will have to pay closest attention to.

Having seen Kill overcome Kilrossanty in the recent Cup replay, I had inwardly settled for them to win this championship for the fourth time on the trot. I still believe they can do so but on Sunday they are up against their stiffest obstacle in all those four years. And should the brilliant Guiry be absent then I am prepared to forecast a Stradbally win. However, on the basis of full strength sides doing duty Kill must be favoured to prevail after what bids to be a real miller of a game.

LIMERICK 2-9 WATERFORD 3-5

ALTHOUGH the end product—a home defeat, was a very bitter disappointment, Waterford and Limerick served up a highly entertaining hour's hurling in the Munster Intermediate hurling championship replay at Dungarvan's Fraher field on Sunday night last. It was a game Waterford looked like winning for long spells—a game too they could have won, but all credit to Limerick for staging a last quarter rally that saw them come from four points down to snatch a sensational victory in the dying moments of the hour.

The all important score, a Sean Burke point was scored in the 59th minute, a mere few seconds after they had snatched an equaliser following a bout of sustained pressure. It was a thrilling finale to an at all times exciting game, and until that very belated point it looked odds on the game going to extra time.

Waterford's hopes received a blow even before the game got under way when one of the cars carrying players failed to turn up at the venue on time. This meant that Waterford had to start without Jim Irish and Sean Reid, and in truth to tell, the selectors made very feeble efforts to bridge the gaps. When eventually Irish and Dwyer followed with an exchange of points, Limerick took up the running and Pat Nash pointed two frees in the 24th and 25th minutes.

But then, two minutes later came the game's first goal, scored by midfielder Michael McGrath, who was proving himself in a class apart in this game. A minute later Nash had a Limerick point and just on the stroke of half time full forward

Dwyer rammed home a fine goal to give his side a 1-5 to 1-3 interval lead.

But with a rampant Michael McGrath turning on a display of hurling par excellence at midfield, Waterford took control in the third quarter. WATERFORD 1-7 TIPPERARY 0-10

WITH five minutes remaining in this first round Munster senior football championship game at Clonmel on Sunday last, Waterford seemed poised for a deserved win—and an attractive home semi-final against League champions, Kerry. But in that brief remaining spell, Tipperary staged an all out rally that was culminated in Brian Callaghan kicking the equalising point from a '50' with what proved to be the second last kick of the game.

If only for that belated rally when their position looked nigh hopeless, Tipperary deserved to do battle on another day. But really, a replay should not now be necessary, because Waterford, over the hour, were the better side, and had chances galore in the first half to run up an unassailable interval lead.
