Successful Diocesan Pilgrimage To Lourdes

THE 11th Annual Waterford Diocesan Pilgrimage to Lourdes which took place on May 14th-19th was another outstanding success and was led by His Lordship, Most Rev. Dr. Michael Russell, Bishop of Waterford and Lismore.

Three hundred and forty pilgrims, which included 82 Invalid Pilgrims, undertook the pilgrimage to Lourdes. The party left Waterford by a 10.20 a.m. special train, and later that day were flown to Lourdes on four separate flights from Dublin Airport.

In particular, Dr. Russell paid a special tribute to the great number of ordinary pilgrims who gave of their time and service, even at the most inconvenient hours, in order to lessen the burden of work on the staff and nurses of the invalid section, and who thereby were privileged to enter all the more into the true spirit of Lourdes and to share in its blessings.

Very Rev. P. J. Flavin, P.P., Ring and Old Parish was Spiritual Director to the Pilgrimage, and also included in the party were Rev. Fr. Cunningham, C.C., Clonmel; Rev. M. Farall, C.C., Ballybricken; Rev. Fr. Wall, C.C., Newtown; Rev. Fr. Callanan and Rev. Fr. Hopkins, C.C.

For the Invalid Pilgrims the day in Lourdes had an early beginning, with the Invalid Breakfast at 6.45, and then around 7.30 they were taken to the Grotto for 8 a.m. Mass. After Mass they were taken to the Baths, and lunch followed at 11 a.m. Following lunch they again returned to the Grotto and the Baths (usually around 1.30), returning around 3.30 to the Square fronting the Basilica for the Procession of the Blessed Sacrament and blessing of the Sick. Tea followed at 6 p.m. and the day generally drew to a close for them with a Torch Light Procession at 8.30.

The general body of Pilgrims were free to take part in the various ceremonies as they wished.

On Ascension Thursday Concelebrated Mass was held in the Underground Basilica of St. Pius 10th, with five bishops (including Dr. Russell) and 50 priests taking part, which on the following Sunday there were from

20,000 to 25,000 in the Basilica for Concelebrated Mass. Generally speaking the weather was kind for the Pilgrimage, but on wet days the Procession of the Blessed Sacrament was held in the Underground Basilica.

Finally on Monday, 19th May, the Pilgrimage came to an end, and the party left Lourdes on 3, 5 and 7 o'clock flights. Those travelling on the 3 and 5 p.m. flights were subsequently taken by special train from Dublin to Waterford at 9.15, and those on the third flight (7 p.m.) were also taken by train to Waterford at 11 p.m. All the Pilgrims were taken to their final destinations by car from Waterford.

Next year's Diocesan Pilgrimage will take place from May 21st to May 26th.

Speaking at the Grotto on Ascension Thursday at the official opening of the Pilgrimage, Dr. Russell said: "We come to learn at this hallowed spot a simple but yet difficult message, the message Christ gave us, the message Mary recalled for at this place, the message that our own St. Patrick took as his breastplate, a call to penance and inward change of hearts."

"Christ with me; Christ before me; Christ behind me; Christ in me; Christ beneath me; Christ above me; Christ on my right, Christ on my left; Christ where I lie, Christ where I sit, Christ where I rise; Christ in the heart of everyone who thinks of me; Christ in the mouth of everyone who speaks of me; Christ in the eye of everyone who looks at me; Christ in the ear of everyone who hears me."

"Here at Lourdes it is for us to look, to listen, to learn as children of Patrick and of Mary, our Mother." To mark the official closing of the Pilgrimage on the following Monday, Concelebrated Mass was held. There were also Stations of the Cross for the Invalids in the Ward that evening, followed by a most enjoyable "sing-song."

Students Walk to Cork

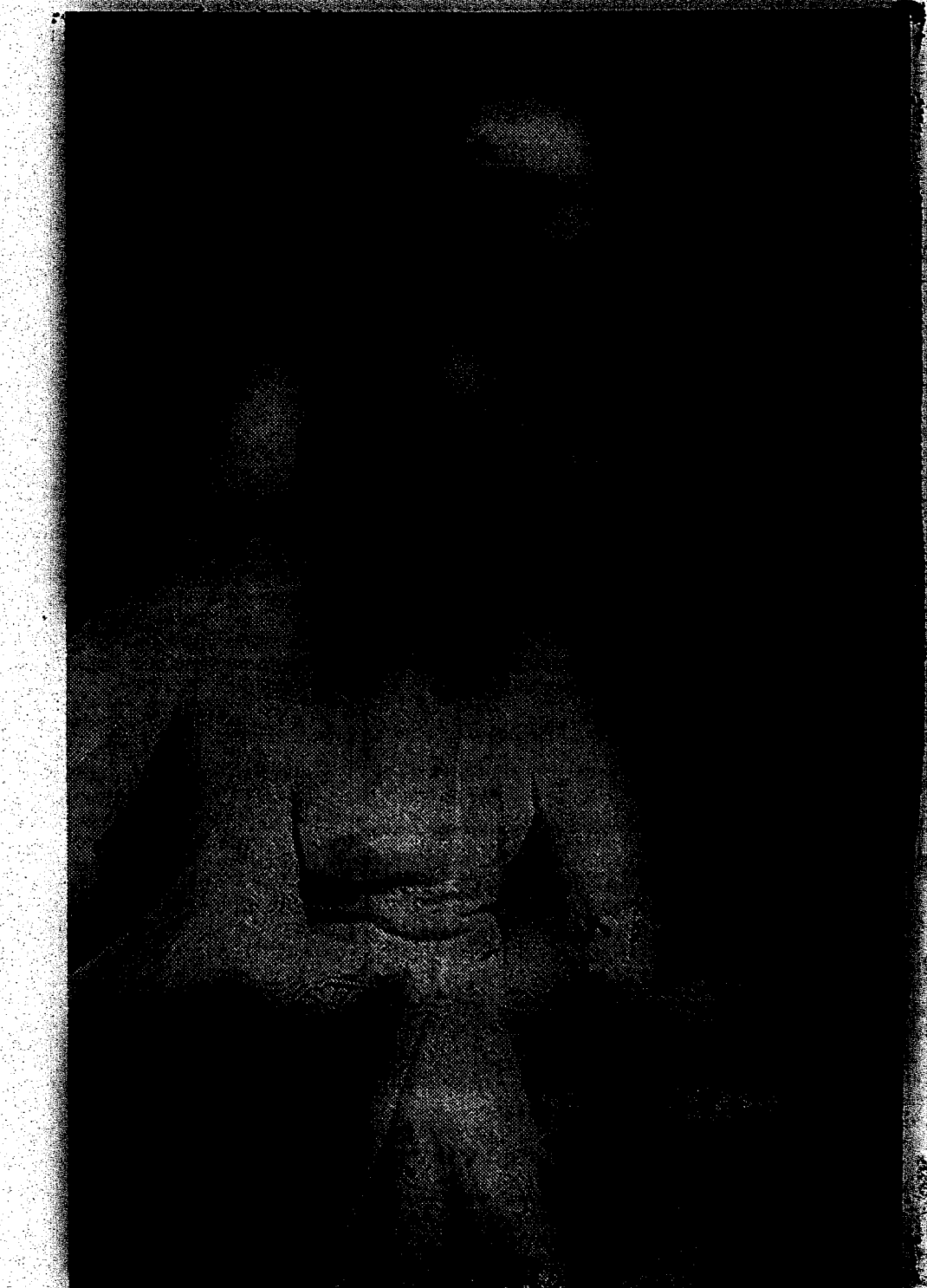

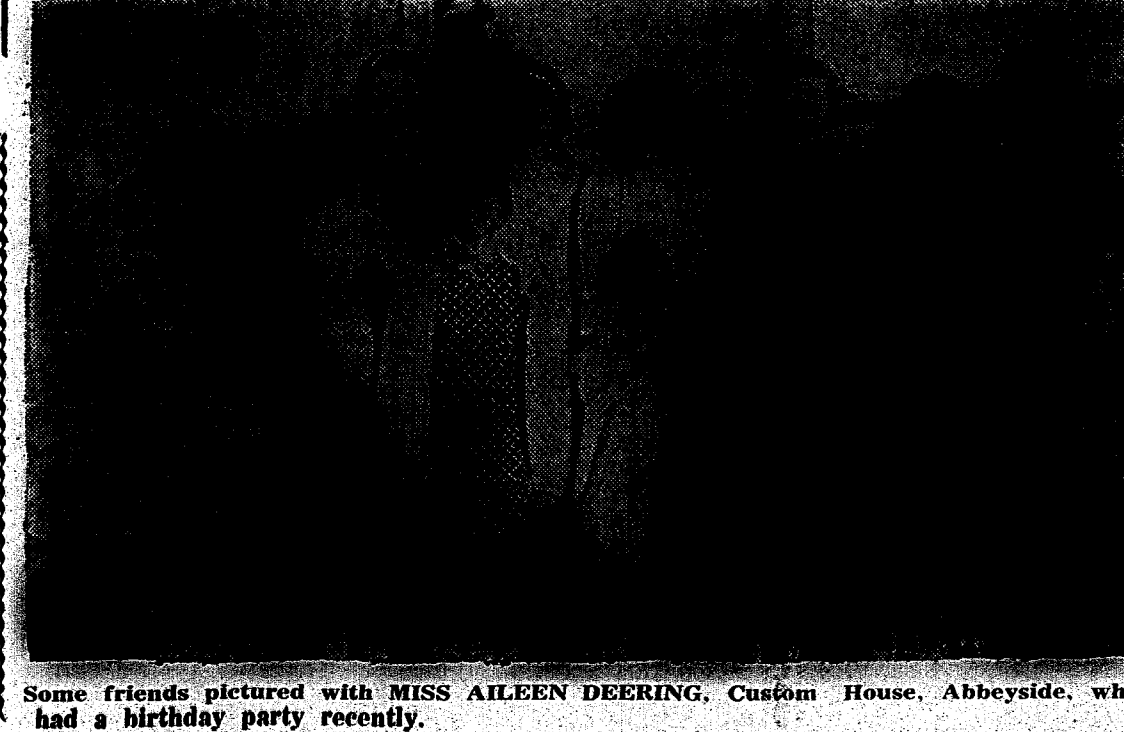

LETTER TO THE EDITOR

I have been in Ireland for just over a month now and have spent a large part of my time on the many beautiful walks that may be taken out of Cappoquin into the surrounding countryside. As I've absorbed this little bit of Ireland on foot, which is really the only way, I have increasingly been struck by an atmosphere different, yet very reminiscent of Virginia and the southern United States, from which I come.

Of course, I've seen and experienced those things for which Ireland is noted and for which even the passing tourist has spread her fame abroad: the wonderful Irish hospitality, the graciousness and courtesy of Irish manners, the green pastoral gentleness of some scenes and the wild almost frightening grandeur of others.

My own Southland is also marked with some of these blessings of culture and nature, but beneath the surface there are more subtle parallels. I hadn't spent a week walking before I began to sense a certain wistful poignancy about the people,

which seemed a part of the very land itself. I began to feel as if the mountains, the stone fences and the green pastures themselves had ancient memories. Cattle grazing around ancient ruins is a powerful image. I began to sense something of the historical reality that can be expressed, perhaps, only by the folk tales.

While I have little factual knowledge of Irish history, I began to understand that history, nevertheless, as a living compelling, vibrant fact. It began to dawn on me that no one from outside can really come to know Ireland; that true Irish history is in the blood of the Irish. All an outsider can ever hope to realize is, at best, a sort of translation.

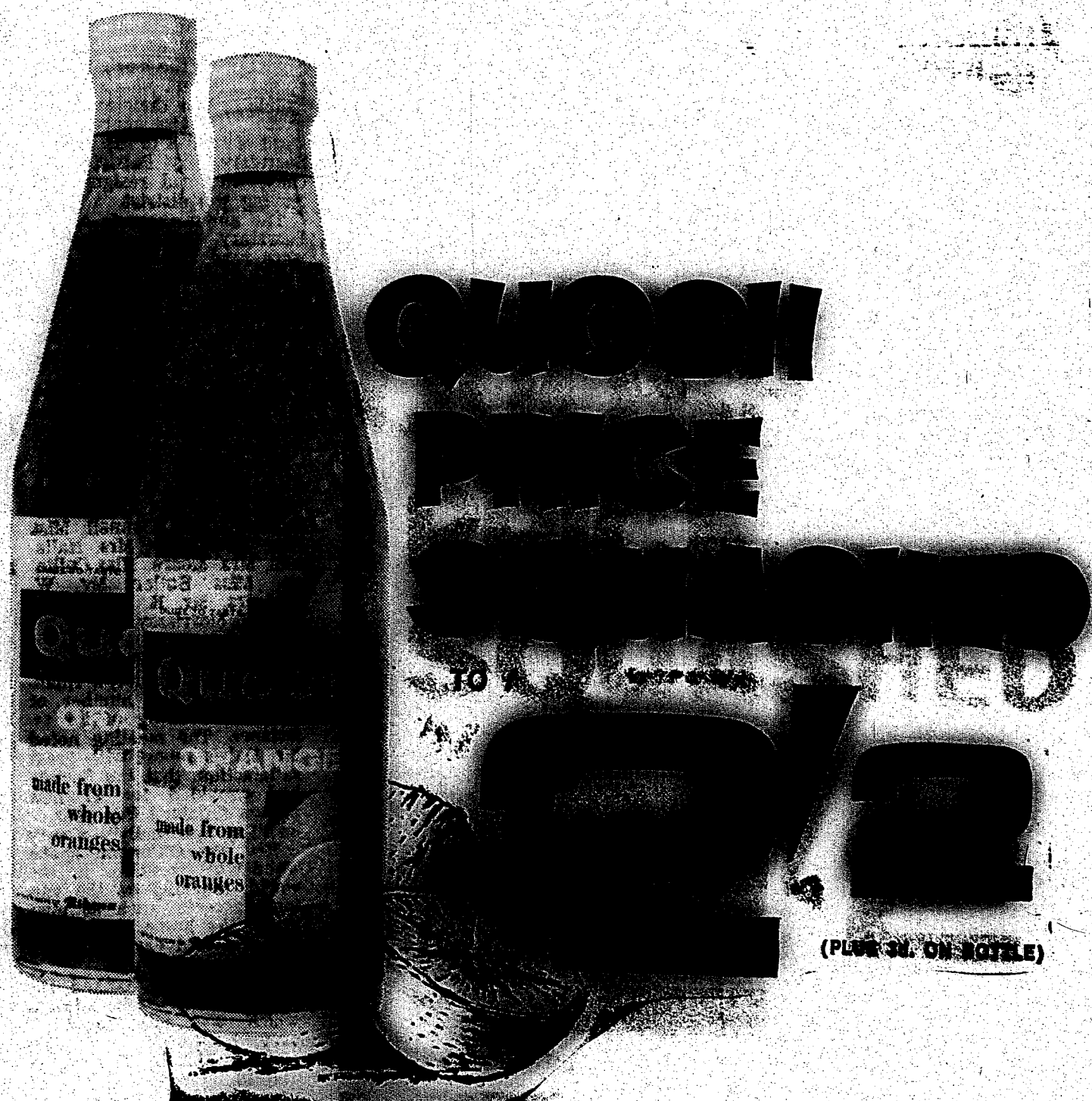
As the ruminations skip ped in and out of my mind, with the usual seeming point lessness of all vagrant thoughts, except occurred to me that I had copied down years ago from a political speech of an uncle of mine. I rummaged about among some personal papers that I usually carry about and found it. I think it makes quite explicit those similarities of feeling for which I had been vaguely groping. Here it is:—

"The South is a land that has known sorrows: it is a land that has broken the ashen crut and moistened it with tears; a land scarred and riven by the powshare of war and billowed with the graves of the dead; but a land of legend, a land of song, a land of hallowed and heroic memories.

"To that land every drop of my blood, every fibre of my being, every pulsation of my heart is consecrated forever.

"I was born of her womb, I was nurtured at her breast, and when my last hour shall come I pray God that I may be pillowed upon her bosom and rocked to sleep within her gentle and encircling arms."

It seems to me that many an Irishman might have written these very words about Ireland.

Successful Financial Year

Receipts, he said, amounted to £50,332. State Grants totalled £27,191, and the Co. Council's contribution was £22,000 odd. On March 31st 1968 they had a credit of £2,006 in the Bank.

Mr. Maher said the excess of receipts over expenditure was due principally to the closing down of the Tramway and Tallow Schools, but this would be offset in the current year by the opening of the new Kilmacthomas School and by the employment of extra teachers.

Young Priests' Society's A.G.M.

The annual general meeting of the Dungarvan Branch of St. Joseph's Young Priests' Society was opened with the usual prayers, led by the Spiritual Director Rev. Fr. J. Murphy. The Branch President, Mr. J. G. Dowling welcomed Rev. Dr. O'Connor, St. John's College, Waterford (guest speaker), delegates from Waterford Branch and a large number of members. Those present included Ven. Archdeacon Power, P.P. V.F., Fr. Murphy, Fr. Butler, O.S.A. and Mr. Brendan Daly, Waterford (representing Headquarters).

The Chairman reviewed the year's work of the Branch and reminded the members of the importance of local branches in the Society's organisation and thanked the Promoters for their excellent work. He also expressed a word of thanks to the former Secretary, Miss Patricia Mulcahy, who had resigned on leaving the district.

The annual reports of the Secretary and Treasurer were read and adopted. The Treasurer reported an increase of £8 over the previous year in the amount remitted to Headquarters, reflecting the steady increase in the Branch's progress.

Friary Pupils Stage "St. Joan"

"St. Joan," which is being presented on Thursday and Friday nights of this week in the Friary Hall, is one of Shaw's best known historical plays. The first scene portrays Joan as the leader of the victorious French armies against the English, while in the second scene she is being brought for trial before the ecclesiastical court at Rouen, and subsequently burned as a witch.

The part of Joan is beautifully interpreted by Donal Lynch, while Michael Hanrahan plays the part of Dunois, her favourite counsellor. The part of the Archbishop of Rheims is admirably portrayed by Kieran Dolan. Other local boys taking part as principals are Charles Lawn as the Earl of Warwick and Joseph Dalton as the Executioner. The epilogue is the piece-de-resistance of the whole play with R. G. Long acting superbly as the cleric De Stogumber.

The play is presented by the Fifth Year of St. Augustine's. On May 30th, 1431, Joan of Arc was burnt at the stake, convicted by the Holy Inquisition of heresy. It is significant that on the 538th anniversary of her death there is a performance of her story at the Friary.

The production is directed by Mr. Jeremy Ward, a professional Director from England who has moved to Aglish with his wife and two children, because, as he says himself "I feel that this country is a far better environment for my children to grow up in. I hope this will be a success," he added, "not only on account of the tremendous effort which has been given by all connected with this production, but because I hope to use it as a guideline to judge how a professional theatre season would be received in Dungarvan."

Mr. Ward is negotiating with Mr. Richard Huggel who is at present appearing in London in his own play "The First Night of Pygmalion," to bring this Dungarvan prior to its going to New York, in July.

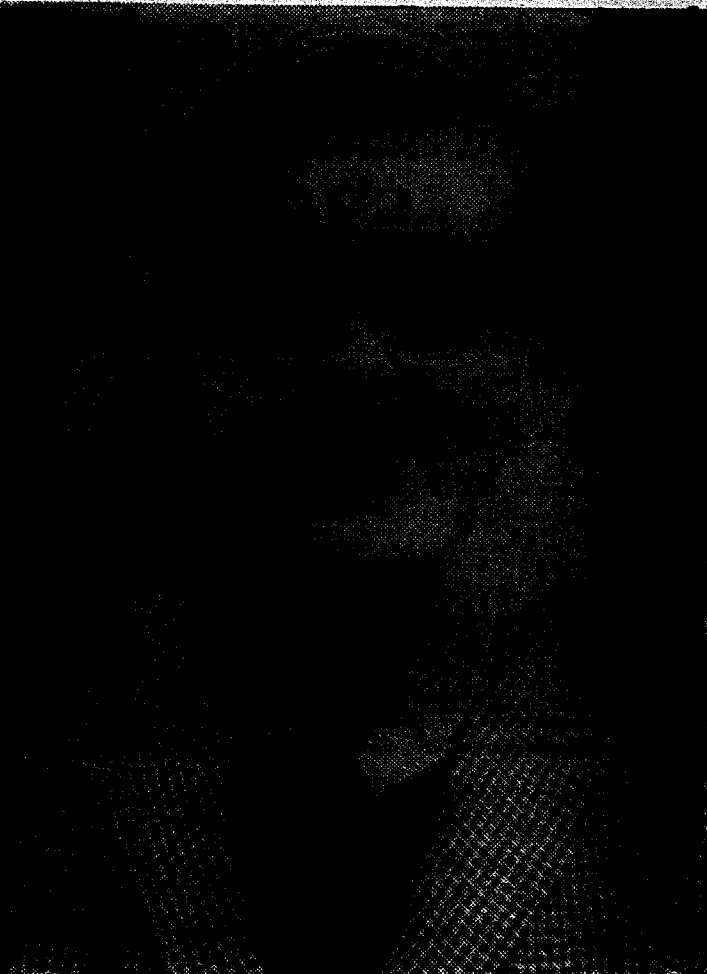

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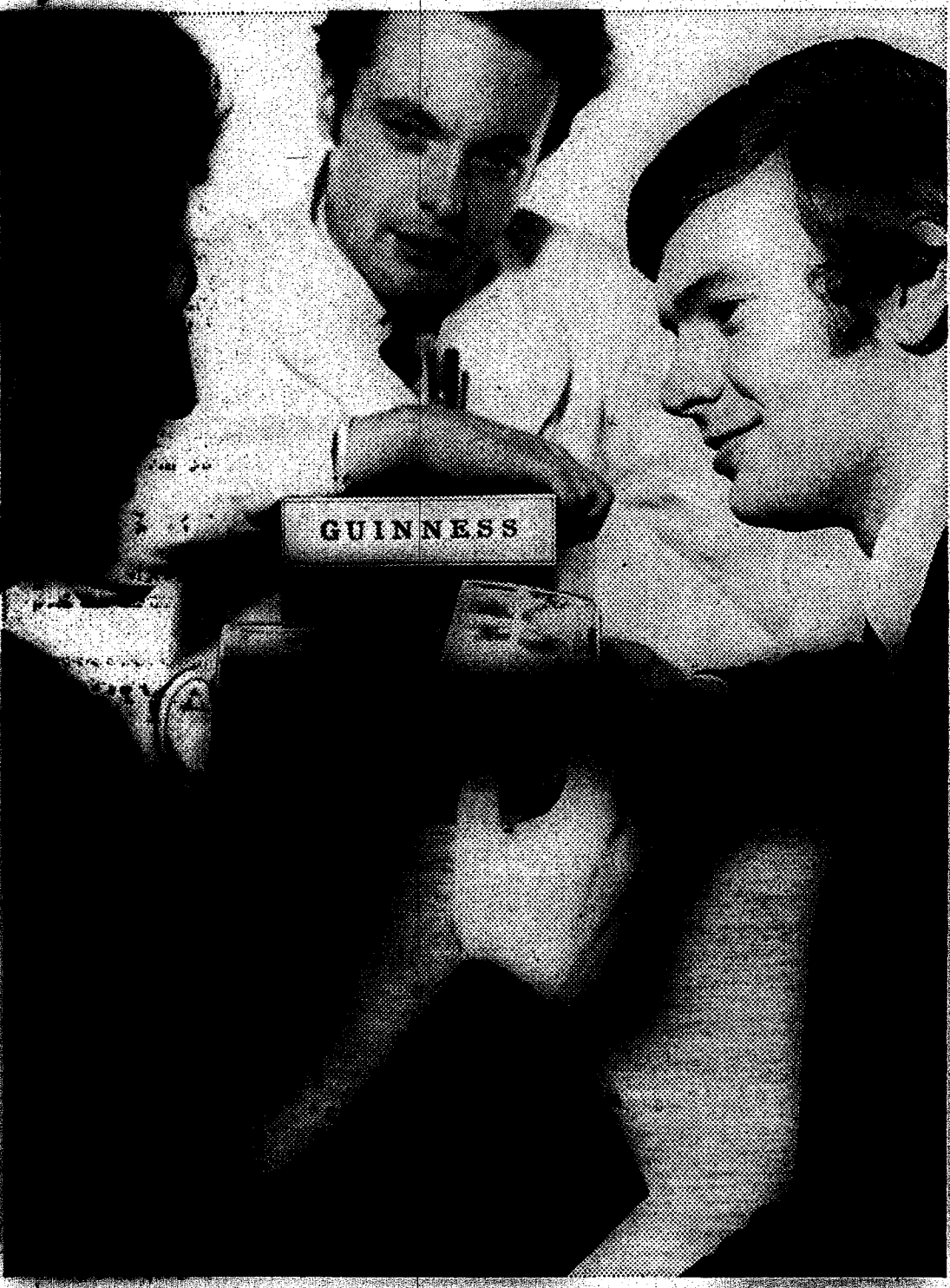

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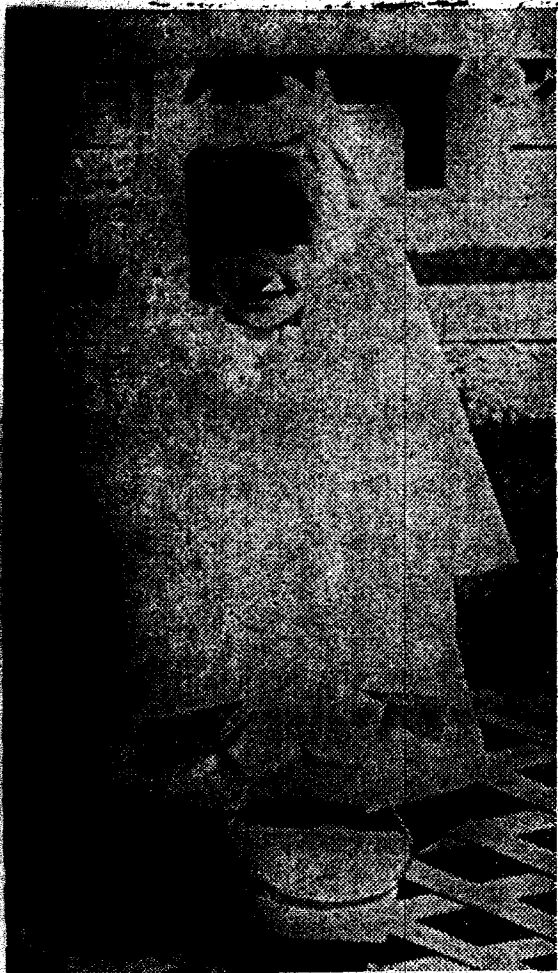

Clear Cut Win For Geraldines

GERALDINES 2-6 **TRAMORE** 0-8

A superbly unyielding defence; a tireless and effective midfield partnership and above all an attack that took its chances in expert style, were the major contributing factors to Geraldines surprise but fully merited victory over last year's beaten County finalists, Tramore in last Sunday's first round senior football championship game at Dungarvan's Fraher field. Never once during this hour were the Agglishers in arrears and producing a brand of football best suited to the occasion, won just as convincingly as the final scoreline indicates.

It was not a game marked by any great football, but it proved quite conclusively what a difficult proposition these Agglishers can be when championship time comes round. On Sunday they never once allowed Tramore to play their open and fluent brand of football. Instead they marked closely, hit hard but let me stress, absolutely legitimately, and the net result was that Tramore were thrown completely out of stride. Geraldines in achieving all this struck me as one of the real "dark horses" of this championship race, and certainly if the same grit and determination marks their future outings, they could leave quite an impact on the championship scene.

The Agglishers had first use of the breeze, and made most of the running in that opening half. They had an absolute tonic start and were five points clear with little over ten minutes of the game gone, and were still 1-5 to 0-2 ahead at the interval. Tramore were now clearly in trouble, and in an effort to break Geraldines stranglehold of midfield, John O'Brien was moved to the sector with Bernard Power taking over in the half line of defence. The move did improve matters considerably for the Seasiders, and they spent much of that second half on the offensive. But a goal within eight minutes of the restart by Michael Treacy proved a matchwinning tonic for Geraldines, and they were never in serious danger of defeat subsequently.

Tramore can have no alibi. They never reproduced the form that carried them so successfully to last year's final, but being one who believes in the maxim that any side can play only as well as it is allowed, one must then give Geraldines their due credit. Particularly in the second half, when Tramore made all out onslaughts in an effort to whittle away their deficit, the Geraldines defence rose to the occasion splendidly, and never allowed even an inch of freedom to a potentially dangerous attack.

GREAT START

Geraldines, backed by the breeze, took up the running from the very start. Willie Joe Treacy put them ahead with a pointed free after three minutes, and though Johnny Flynn levelled from a free a minute later, Geraldines again quickly reasserted their superiority. Treacy had point number two in the 8th minute, and a minute later Michael O'Brien smacked home their first goal past an unsuspecting Tommy Fleming. The Agglishers were now rampant and further points by Joe Baily (2) from frees and one from play by Willie Joe Treacy to which Billy Fleming replied with a Tramore point, left them very deservedly in front by 1-5 to 0-2 at the interval.

Tramore restarted with John O'Brien at midfield and Bernard Power at left half back, and it was a switch that benefitted both players considerably. Within two minutes O'Brien had a point, and in the 4th minute Liam Kelly had a goal disallowed for a very definite and obvious square infringement.

But then, in the 8th minute came the game's most vital score, a superbly taken goal by Michael Treacy. The remainder of the half was virtually all Tramore, but though they tacked on points by Billy Fleming, Johnny Flynn (2), O'Brien and Greg O'Neill, they never seriously threatened the Agglishers lead, and when Baily pointed another free six minutes from time, the issue was well and truly resolved.

OUTSTANDING

The Agglish defence on Sunday was superb, and though all six played well, Paddy Kenneally at full back and Mick Tobin as pivot stood head and shoulders over all others. Midfielders Johnny Cotter and Ned Merrin both played superbly throughout, and for

STRADBALLY 1-7 **KILL** 1-5

A four year unbeaten championship reign in Deise football came to an end at Walsh Park on Sunday last when Kill were sensationally beaten in the first round of the senior football championship by a Stradbally side that has fully matured in a football sense. There was no fluke at all about this result and had Stradbally wound up with an even bigger margin of victory, few indeed could have argued at the justice of it.

EARLY LEAD

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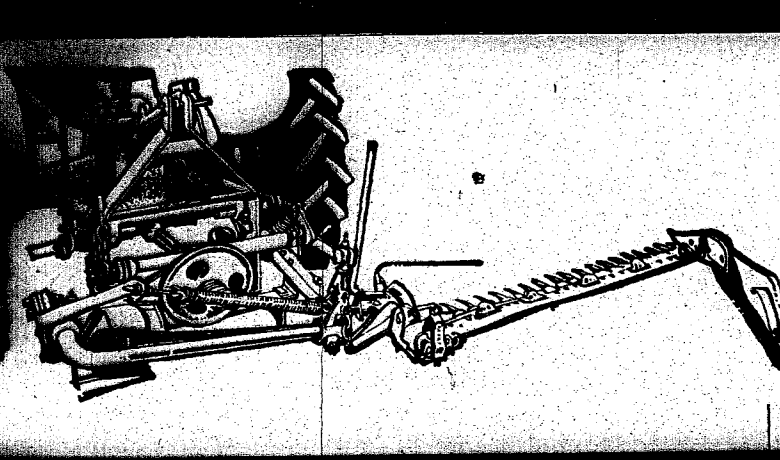

Late Capt. Patrick Higgins

It is with feelings of deep regret that we record the death of Capt. Patrick Higgins, Sexton Street, Abbey-side, which occurred at St. Joseph's Hospital, Dungarvan on Monday last, May 26th, after a somewhat protracted illness and at the fine age of ninety years.

Capt. Higgins or as he was more widely and popularly known, "Skipper" Higgins, was a member of an old Abbeyside seafaring family, and was in fact the last surviving member of the sea, from boyhood he took an active interest in thesea, "doubtless an interest which stemmed from his father who was also a Sea Captain. In the early 1900s, "Skipper" Higgins was captain of the "Sarah Bridg" and "The Village Girl" two Dungarvan schooners owned by the Curran family, the Quay. He was also captain of "The Charlewold" which ran down the Bay of Biscay to Cardiff. During the last world war was First Mate on the Irish Shipping Vessel "The Irish Rose."

He had retired from active sea faring for the past 20 years, during which term he resided in his native Abbeyside. However, he had not enjoyed the best of health in recent years but his passing has nonetheless occasioned deep and widespread regret in the area.

WATERFORD CO. EXECUTIVE N.F.A.

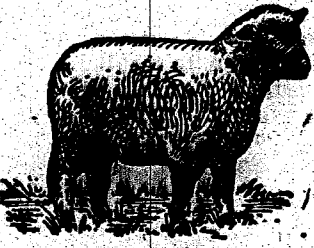

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THE ODDS FAVOUR TIPP

BUT REMEMBER '67

FOR Waterford hurling the real moment of truth is almost at hand. The period of experimentation is, out of necessity, now passed, and the County's seniors face the crucial and acid test at their own Walsh Park on Sunday next. Tipperary, bidding for a third Provincial title in a row, come to the City venue as firm favourites

to enhance still further their Munster championship hopes with a first round victory over the inconsistent Deise men. It is a mammoth task that Waterford have assiduously prepared to meet and despite their accepted rating as underdogs, there is an air of quiet confidence within the camp of shocking the fancied champions.

As a curtain raiser the same Counties meet in the minor hurling championship and with almost half the side that carried them to last year's Munster final still "in call," Waterford's chances of registering the first leg of a double seem better than average.

When analysing the senior hurling's mind almost invariably turns to the same year in 1967 when in almost identical circumstances Cork came to defend their Munster crown. They faced a Waterford side, virtually disorganised following a near disastrous league campaign, but it is history now that they were beaten by a decisive seven points margin. That in itself should forewarn Tipperary whom I have been assured, will in no way underestimate this Waterford challenge. But it is not Tipperary's history for history to repeat.

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The emergence of Noel O'Dwyer as a centre back of considerable potential will however solve one problem, for it now releases Mick Roche to team up with club mate P. J. Ryan in the formation of a powerful mid-field partnership.

In attack too, Tipperary are more than adequately served. Jimmy Doyle, Mick Keating and John Flanagan are amongst the games top forwards, and the probable return of Donie Nealon will also add to its scoring power.

Waterford on the other hand simply went from bad to worse following that defeat in Thurles. Wexford and Clontarf subsequently stunned them and at Dungarvan they made desperate last ditch work of beating

Of all the sectors however the greatest task falls on the shoulders of Michael McGrath and Jackie Whelan. McGrath is making his senior championship debut, Whelan has had but very little experience in the championship arena. To come up against a Mick Roche P. J. Ryan partnership is about the most formidable undertaking they could be given, and the side's chance will surely depend to a large degree on how they fare.

The defence has undergone a change, with Paddy Coady taking over at full back, Sonny Walsh and Joe Condon flanking him, and John McGrath now at right half back. John Kirwan continues at centre back, and an ever-improving Jim Greene

But much has been happening in the Deise training camp in the past three weeks which sends out more than a tiny ray of hope for followers. Under John Keane, the players have gone about their training sessions with a will and a purpose. Informative challenge games have taken place against Kilrossanty, Wexford and latterly Clontarf, with victories over the first two, and a not too creditable defeat by Clontarf on Sunday night last. The side were without key forwards Tom Cheasty and Larry Guinan for that game

on the opposite flank. The return of Tom Cheasty and Larry Guinan has added considerably to the all-round power of the attack. Guinan at full forward, and Danny Mahon in the right corner are the ones I could see causing Tipperary most worry, although Pat Enright and Chesaty too can take and make scores from the half line.

However, in most of the vital sectors, Tipperary seem better equipped. This is particularly true of their mid-field, and if lavishly supplied then Doyle, Keating and Flanagan will surely run up a winning tally.

Waterford, backboned by seven of last year's side which went under to Cork in the Munster final, must stand a fine chance of accounting for Tipperary, particularly with ground advantage. However, injuries have hit the Deise camp at a wrong time, and completely ruled out are G. Cunningham (Mt. Sion) and T. Reid (Carrickbeg). Another casualty is the Clanna Gael star Tom Casey, who was injured in the minor football championship game against Tipperary, but he has been included in the list of subs for Sunday.

Four of the defence were members of last year's panel although Pat Morrissey (Cappoquin) who came on in at half back. The others are Tallow's Pat Hegarty and Shemie Hannon and Danny Murphy (Mt. Sion). The other survivors from last year are John Hartigan (Tallow) at midfield, and forwards Tom Doyle (Tallow) and Andy Heffernan (Ferrybank).

The panel has trained very hard under Seamus Power, and wound up their preparations on Tuesday night with a fine win over Wexford in a challenge. They have also divided the spoils with Kilkenny in two other challenge games.

Little is known of Tipperary in this grade this year, but they are endeavouring to regain some of their lost glory in this grade. However, Waterford, with home advantage, should prove their masters on Sunday and set a winning headline for their seniors.

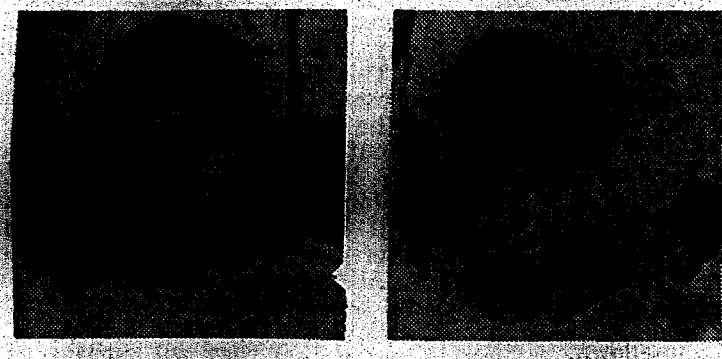

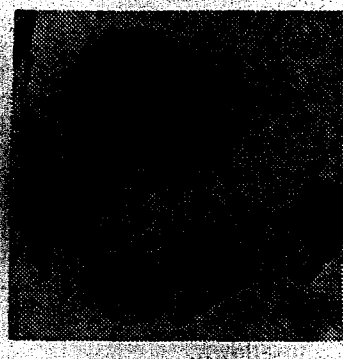
LATE PHILIP BERESFORD

Kilrossanty Foil Mitchels Rally

KILROSSANTY ... 3-10 JOHN MITCHELS ... 1-13
A vintage first half display, as good as I have ever seen from any side in the County, paved the way for Kilrossanty's deserved but ultimately hard earned win over parish rivals John Mitchels in an exhilarating first round senior football championship game at Dungarvan on Sunday night last. The Comeragh men could do no wrong in that unforgettable opening half as the simply pummelled the Mitchels into virtual submission and had them literally "set up" for a merciless drubbing. But what a transformation that second half brought and in the end the winners were hanging on grimly to a solitary goal advantage.

As a spectacle it was one of the best games seen at the venue for quite a while, and let me hasten to add a sporting contest one from beginning to end that reflected nothing but the highest credit on victors and vanquished. It was a night too for the respective attacks, for during their periods of ascendancy both simply cut the opposing defences to ribbons.

UNEXPECTED
In the light of the game's first half trend, that second half Mitchels rally was as unexpected as it was exciting. Throughout those opening thirty minutes Kilrossanty swung the ball about with an expertise and abandon that I have not seen from the wearers of the famed Green and Gold for many a long day. They were the undisputed masters with Mitchels very unwilling pupils. The losers' defence was twice caught spreadeagled for fisted goals—both gems of opportunism, and yet both scored following disastrous slackness by the Mitchels full line of defence. Thus, when Kilrossanty led by an unflattering 3-8 to 0-6 at the half way stage, we awaited an even further carving up of Mitchels on the turn over.

But when the game restarted Mitchels had wisely rearranged their side, and it was Kilrossanty's turn to feel the full pang of a virtual football avalanche. Mitchels took over just as emphatically as Kilrossanty had done in the first half, and point by point that huge interval gap was narrowed. By the 21st minute only three points separated the sides, but though
