## Good Response to Kilmac' School

THE reponse to the new Kilmacthomas school opening next September was quite good, Mr. Thomas F. Maher, Acting Chief Educational Officer told this week's meeting of the County Waterford Vocational Educational Committee in Dungarvan.

Mr. Maher said it has now been ascertained that forty-five pupils from outside the three miles radius would be availing of the free transport service to the new school. It was not yet known how many inside the three miles radius would be attending the school, but there would be no grounds for fearing that there would be insufficient pupils for the school. This, he said, was a very good start to new school.

### EQUIPMENT

Mr. Maher said he had received quotations from various firms for equipment for the school and a total of £9,022-18-9 would be required to purchase the necessary equipment. In addition, they could use some of the equipment from their former school in Cappoquin.

On the proposal of Mr. L. Comerford, seconded by the Chairman, Ven. Archdeacon D. Power, P.P., V.F., the Committee unanimously agreed to purchase the equipment as outlined by the C.E.O.

Mr. Maher went on to say

that they were also dealing with the question of staffing the school, and they would be advertising for French and General Subjects, History and Geography, and General Subjects, Commerce and Shorthand and Typing.

### CARETAKER

The Committee also unanimously decided to seek Departmental Sanction for the employment of a full time caretaker at the school. The applicants will then be interviewed by an interview Board to be set up by the Committee. The interviews, it was decided, will be held in the Courthouse, Kilmac.

Mr. Michael Hennebery asked now that the day classes at Portlaw were ending, would the caretaker there become redundant and if so would she receive any financial payment. She had been employed there for the past 13 or 14 years, he said.

## TOM KYNE'S UNEXPECTED DEFEAT

# F.F. WINS TWO SEATS

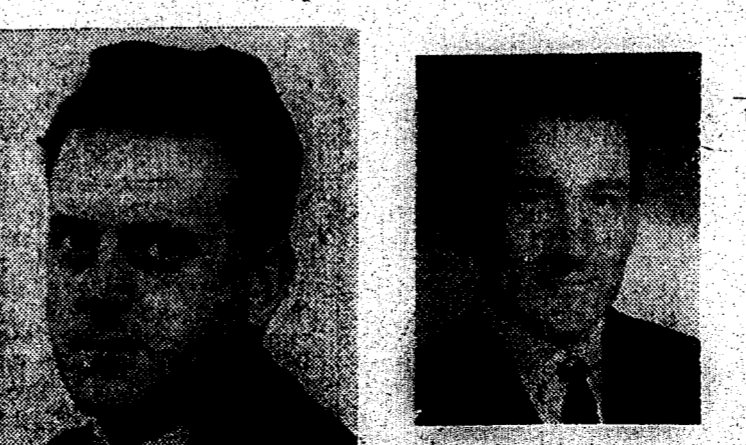
THERE was a sensation in the Waterford Constituency in the General Election to-day when Fianna Fail, against all predictions, retained their two seats, through the outgoing Deputies, Billy Kenneally and Fad Browne whilst Fine Gael's Eddie Collins who headed the first preference votes secured the third seat.

The biggest upset of all, however, was the failure of the Labour party to retain its seat, and after 21 years of excellent service Abbeyside's Tom Kyne lost his seat. Thus the folly of the Labour Party's decision to put up two candidates in the Constituency was fully borne out.

The total poll was 30,220 and with 352 spoiled votes, the total valid poll was 29,868. The quota was 7,468 and no candidates reached the quota on the first or second counts.

The young Fine Gael Candidate Eddie Collins headed the pole on the first count, just pipping the outgoing Fianna Fail Deputy Billy Kenneally by a couple of hundred votes. Lurking close behind in third place was the second outgoing F.F. Deputy Fad Browne.

The third F.F. candidate, Sean Whelan, who was contesting the election for the first time, polled 2,118 first preferences, but this was not sufficient to save his deposit.

On the fifth and final count the distribution of Collins' surplus, Browne received 131 giving him a total of 6,967 whilst Kyne got a massive 1,024 giving him a total of 6,866. Thus with 101 votes to spare over the Labour man, Browne was elected without reaching the quota.

## New Express Bus Service

On Saturday, 14th June, and on each Saturday until 13th September, a new Express Bus Service will operate between Wexford and Cork.

This new service has been inaugurated to meet a demand for a direct and speedy link between the important cities and towns of Wexford, New Ross, Waterford, Dungarvan and Cork. It is expected that the service will prove to be invaluable to holidaymakers, and is deemed to local people wishing to make the through journey to Cork or to intermediate points served.

A saving of almost one and a half hours between Wexford and Cork has been achieved, as compared with existing schedules, and the new service is being provided at attractive fares.

An express service commenced between Waterford and Galway in 1968, and support in the first year of operation was quite satisfactory. It has been found that our growing network of express services is proving to be extremely popular with tourists and holidaymakers who want to travel in a care-free manner, and who do not want to join an organised tour. These people often avail of our wide range of day and half-day trips which operate from the main tourist centres.

This new service is yet another step forward in providing faster and more frequent services throughout the country, and we are confident that public support will justify the continued operation of this service.

# Overstrength Ardmore Well Beaten Disappointing Football Replay

GAULTIER ... 3-5 ARDMORE ... 1-2

RESET by a series of circumstances that forced them to field without a number of regulars, Ardmore proved absolutely no match for Gaultier in their first round championship replay at Dungarvan's Fraher Field on Sunday. From the moment the winners took the lead they dominated matters in practically every sector and were in no way flattered by their decisive three-goal winning margin.

As a spectacle it was a flop and certainly far less entertaining than the drawn tie, when at least the closeness of the scoring retained spectator interest to the very end. But on Sunday it was quite apparent from a pretty early stage that weakened Ardmore had not the ability to match the Easterners and this air of inevitability about the outcome did nothing at all for the game.

Had Ardmore the services of the Carbons, John Joe, Paddy and Mickey, and the injured Jim Rooney, they would undoubtedly have made Gaultier's passage to the second round a far more difficult one. But even at full strength I doubt if they would have reversed the result to superior were the winners, who must now await their second round meeting with Geraldines with reasonable confidence.

The issue had to all intents and purposes been settled by half time when the winners led 3-3 to 1-0. Admittedly their efforts had been backed by a stiff breeze, but the ease with which they mounted their attacks suggested that they would have sufficient in hand after the interval to contain any Ardmore resurgence. And thus it materialised. Ardmore did enjoy an improved ratio of the territorial exchanges, but so intent was their attacking formation that Gaultier's defences had little difficulty in containing them. Both sides shared four points in that thrillsome second half, but that was sufficient to ensure Gaultier of their place in round two for the first time in many years.

## GREAT START

If Ardmore had hoped for a satisfactory start to this game, then they could not possibly have got off on a better footing than they did. Having contained early Gaultier attacks, they swept upfield in their first movement of note in the 9th minute, and corner forward Jim Flynn availed of a defensive blunder to slam home his side's only goal.

But three minutes later Gaultier were on level terms when Martin Morrissey slammed home a very good goal, and from that moment onwards they were in complete command. Their midfielders, Jack Sullivan and

Tony Cummins held almost complete sway and up front their two Ned Flynns simply tore the Sessiders defence to shreds. In the 17th and 18th minutes, full forward Ned Flynn had points, and his namesake at corner forward raced through for goals in the 22nd and 25th minutes, the latter score following a disastrous piece of midfield play by Con Troy. A minute later Morrissey fisted a point and unflatteringly the winners led 3-3 to 1-0 at the interval.

Ardmore restarted with Richard Hennessey substituting for Donal Lenane, but it made little appreciably difference. They did open the second half scoring with a John Hennessey point, but when Morrissey negated it in the 9th minute, it was quite evident that Ardmore were making precious little progress scoring-wise. Slowly but surely the game was dying a painful death and the only other scores in the remaining 21 minutes were an exchange of points between Hennessey and Willie Lodge.

## TROUBLE FREE

For the Gaultier defence this was a relatively trouble-free hour, but on the odd occasion when danger threatened Eugene Dunphy, Joe and Tom Flynn were equal to all demands.

Throughout the hour Cummins and Jack Sullivan reigned supreme at midfield, and the two Ned Flynns were the stars in an attack that was also well served by Martin Morrissey. Ardmore disappointed, and I say that mindful though I am of the severe loss that their absent regulars were to the side. They had a really tonic start, but once the tide of battle began to flow against them they seemed to fall completely asunder.

The game marked the return of their great veteran defender Eddie Mooney and though he hasn't had a great deal of match practice, he emerged as their number one defender. John Colbert was again superb in goal, and besides Mooney, Pat Fender and Bertie Hallahan tried hard in defence.

Despite all the efforts of Michael O'Reilly, they were always in trouble at midfield and in an attack that was blatantly short of scoring potential, only Finbarr Halla-

han and Liam Lincoln made any impression.

## N.F.A. NEWS

# Concern At Drop In Milk Prices

The drop in prices which dairy farmers are receiving for their milk continues to cause increasing concern to the N.F.A.

In recent weeks clear and concrete evidence has come to the N.F.A. from the dairy counties that creamery milk suppliers are now accepting a reduction of about 2d per gallon on average.

So strongly did the N.F.A. National Dairy Committee feel about the situation that the President of the Association Mr. T. J. Maher wrote to the Taoiseach seeking an urgent meeting to discuss the whole question of the rapidly deteriorating position of the country's 110,000 dairy farmers.

The Taoiseach had replied that he would be out of Dublin for a few weeks because of the Election Campaign and Mr. Maher then intimated to the Taoiseach that he was prepared to travel anywhere in the country to meet him.

Subsequent to that the Taoiseach's private secretary wrote to Mr. Maher pointing out that Mr. Lynch had been in touch with him by telephone and he had conveyed to the Taoiseach the content of the N.F.A. President's letter, expressing a willingness to journey to any centre to discuss in full the dairying situation.

But the Taoiseach pointed out that the Government's position on the milk question and farm-income policy generally had already been set out clearly in the statement issued by Mr. Blaney.

The Taoiseach said that there was nothing that he could add to that statement at this juncture, even if it were feasible to arrange for a discussion with Mr. Maher.

Mr. Blaney in his statement, which was referred to by the Taoiseach in his latest letter to Mr. Maher, had admitted that the total cash income from dairying (excluding value of calves) might be somewhat down this year. He indicated that if there was a further deterioration this year in the income position of creamery milk suppliers "appropriate steps" would be taken to adjust the balance.

The refusal of the Taoiseach to grant the request for an urgent meeting brought a sharp reaction from the President of the N.F.A., Mr. T. J. Maher. Dairy farmers had been treated, he said, as if their case was not worth hearing at the highest level.

A promise "to keep the situation under close and continual review" was not going to prove acceptable to dairy farmers as they looked at their milk cheques and saw how the milk price had been cut by factors outside their control. It was now that they wanted action when their losses might be made good—not when the peak season was over.

Meanwhile, delegates from all the Munster counties met in Charleville to discuss the situation. Mr. Maher, who was in Dublin for a meeting, travelled specially to Charleville to speak on the dairying situation and the Vice-President of the N.F.A. for Munster, Mr. John Barry and the Secretary of the N.F.A. Dairy Committee, Mr. R. V. Hourigan were also present at the meeting.

Not alone have the 110,000 creamery milk suppliers suffered a setback through a drop in prices brought about by rising production and processing costs, but liquid milk producers have also been hit.

## N.F.A. DISCUSS WORSENING MILK PRICE

At a meeting held on 10th June, Waterford Co. Executive N.F.A. discussed the worsening creamery milk price. Delegates pointed out that the decrease in price between April 1968 and April 1969 was just about 2d per gallon.

While it was obvious that farmers were at last becoming really concerned about the drop in their income, Mr. D. Hourigan said too many farmers were being conditioned by propaganda into accepting that there was too much milk. This was a very dangerous position as it could lead to a lack of confidence in the dairy industry with a resulting drop in cattle numbers. Nobody could deny that the export of cattle both live and as dead meat was of vital importance to the economy of the country and likewise nobody could deny that the bulk of those cattle came from dairy farms.

Much was being made of the increased milk prices this year but because of the severe spring weather, this increase just about covered the cost of extra feeding stuffs which every dairy farmer had to buy. The meeting felt the situation now was that dairy farmers, having had a decrease in income together with a rise in production costs, were getting to the stage where they would be prepared to take strong action in support of their

## SALMON FISHING.

We are pleased to report that catches of grilse mixed with fine quality salmon are being taken by the various nets in the Blackwater estuary and bay. 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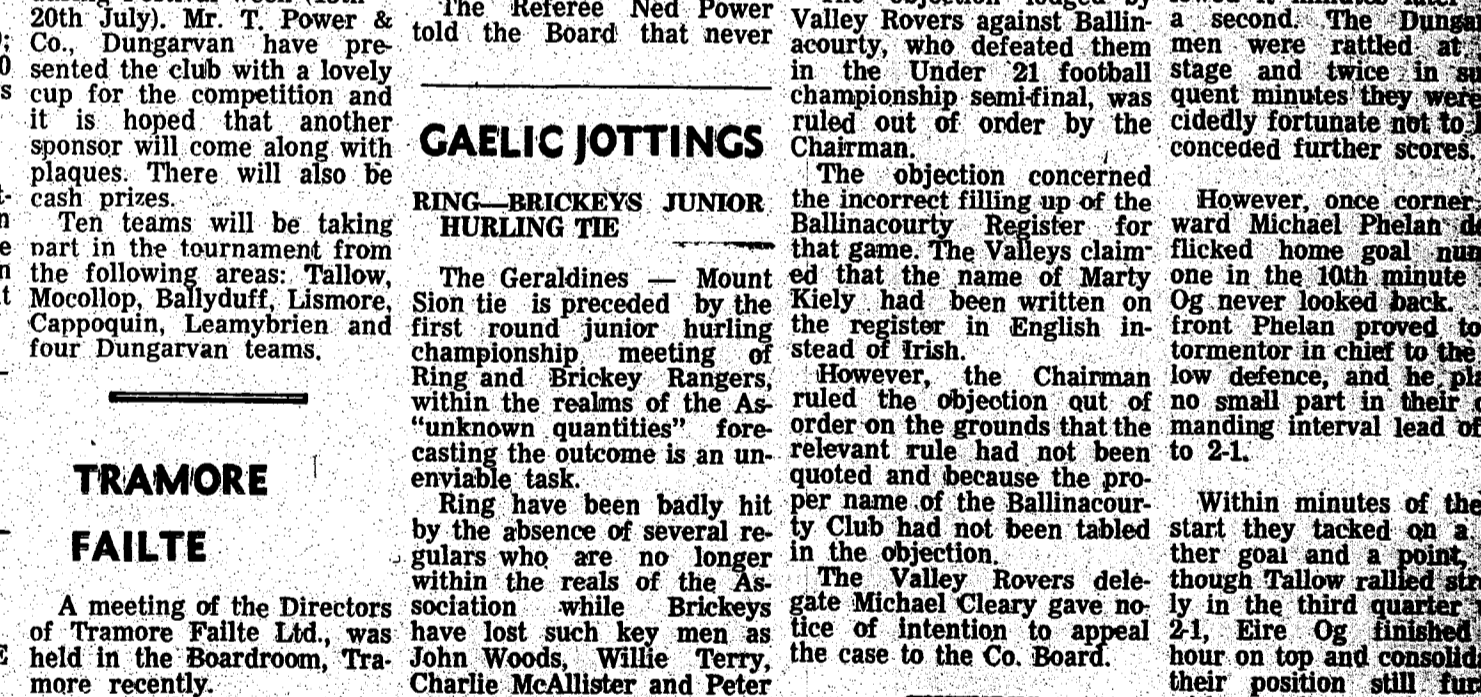

LETTER TO THE EDITOR

Dear Sir, Regardless of the fact that this letter cannot appear in print until after the General Election, I would like to make some comments on a letter from your Co. Council Chairman, Mr. Curran, which appeared in a recent edition of the Observer (May 24th).

First, he says that the Fine Gael statement that much of the money provided by the Government for agriculture is going to waste, needs further clarification. Doubtless, the export subsidies are necessary; otherwise, much of our produce would have to be poured down the drain, and that would indeed be wasteful. On the other hand, there is also no doubt that many of the other types of agricultural subsidy are quite unnecessary. The calved heifer subsidy scheme is a classic example, for it made quite a lot of money for the big farmers who did not need it anyway, whereas the smaller farmer had neither the money nor the capacity to cash in to anything like the same extent.

Of course the latter were supposed to be the beneficiaries of the scheme. It would benefit the country better if the big farmers concentrated on beef production for which there is a definite export market; this would still leave them with an acceptable income level, while saving some of the heavy subsidy burden on the Exchequer.

Mr. Curran then suggests sarcastically, that the Opposition, on accession to office, are going to increase benefits and provide better services with no extra cost to the taxpayers. Well, Senator Dooge, when speaking at the Fine Gael meeting in Square, Dungan, on Sunday last, took care of this when he stated expressly that increased taxation would be necessary to meet the cost of Fine Gael's proposed improvements in the social services. However, if Government spending were rearranged so that priority would be given to the most needy sections of the community, if speculators, who seem to thrive under the present F.F. regime, and companies and institutions which are making excess profits were taxed adequately, then the burden on the ordinary man in the street would not be so great. It is under these circumstances where Mr. Curran gets the nice round figure of £50 million in extra benefits, as will be shown below, any figures quoted by him must be quite open to question.

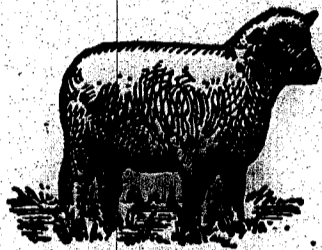

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# KERRY'S EXPECTED WIN First Round I. H.

## But Waterford gave fine display

KERRY ..... 1-18 WATERFORD ..... 2-7

**BEATEN** but not disgraced. That surely is applicable to Waterford's senior footballers whose bid to emulate the feat of their predecessors of 1957 by inflicting a shock defeat on Kerry ended in honourable failure at a rain lashed Fraher Field, Dungarvan on Sunday last. Thus on Monday last these Kingdom footballers flew out for New York happy in the knowledge that yet another Munster championship final place had been assured, but mindful too no doubt of the great battle that Waterford made of it in a semi-final that never lost interest.

The Dungarvan venue looked something of a sorry sight on Sunday as torrential rain fell for practically the entire hour. It made matters exceedingly difficult for those on the field of play, though one must stress that Kerry, physically stronger than the homesters, were less effected by the winter-like elements. Notwithstanding the conditions, the sides served up an hour of football thrills that kept the huge attendance "hot" and which saw Waterford, even in defeat, emerge with reputation enhanced.

Undoubtedly victory went to the better footballing side but seldom have I seen a Deise Co. side display such footballing skills as the one that represented them on Sunday. They were in no way overawed by Kerry's reputation; they matched strides with them for practically the entire first half and but for the most tragic of "own goals" there would have been precious little in it at the interval.

### "GIFT GOAL"

Instead Kerry turned over 1-11 to 1-4 in front, thanks in the main to their first half "gift" goal just on the quarter hour. The sides were at that stage locked in scoring equality, 1-2 to 0-5, when real tragedy befell the Deise defence. Full forward Mick Fleming centred perfectly but Waterford's full-back Tom Brady seemed to have it covered perfectly. However, the ball glanced off his fingers and past a bewildered Tommy Fleming who made the cardinal error of advancing too far from goal. That seemed to demoralise Waterford for the remainder of the half, and with a majestic Mick O'Connell lording it at midfield they tacked on a further six points to Waterford's two for their 1-11 to 1-4 interval lead.

### LED TWICE

Twice however, in that exciting opening half Waterford had led. The game was only seconds old when Vinny Kirwan, whose finest game this was to be in the County jersey, coolly waltzed past Mike O'Shea and dropped the ball over the bar. By the 10th minute Kerry had forged 0-3 to 0-1 in front, but just one minute later the homesters were back in front again. Pa Walsh fielded superbly about fifty yards from goal and his high lobbing centre deceived the entire Kerry defence and goalkeeper Culloty and

got more than it must have bargained for over the hour. 2-7 was a hugely respectable Waterford tally from a not too lavish amount of possession and even men of the calibre of Donie O'Sullivan, Mike O'Shea and Seamus Murphy were often caught out.

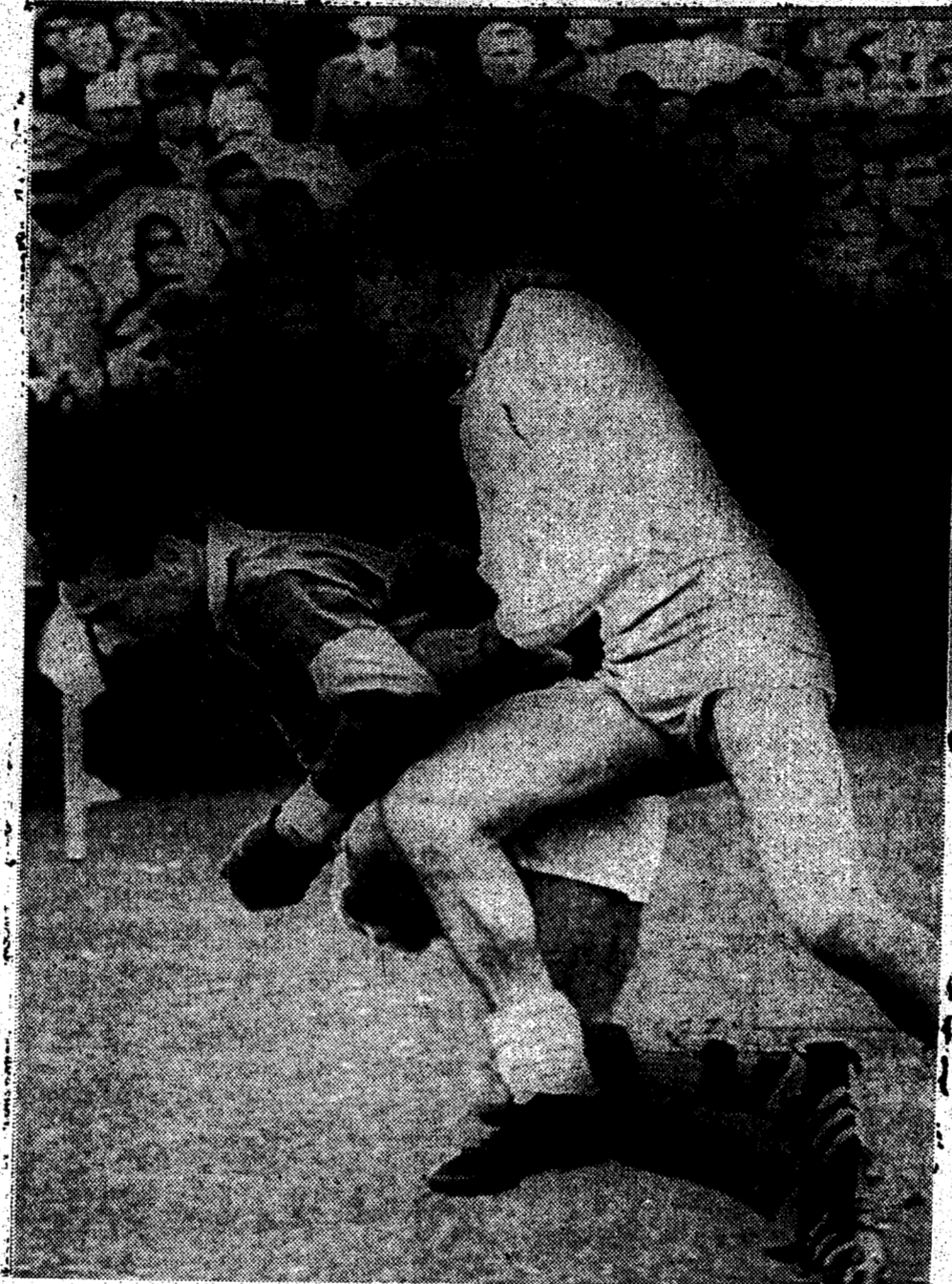
### MANY STARS

Waterford started with Mickey Fleming in goal but his brother Tommy, who had been delayed in getting to the venue, took over nearing the end of the first quarter, and despite his one major error, played a fine game. hurling since then, and they even unsuccessfully sought regrading to Intermediate status. Should they field, they can be expected to try gallantly for the hour, but beyond that one cannot go. It is one of these real cut and dried affairs and even a good display will satisfy the most ardent Aglish follower.

### A SPLENDID PERFORMANCE

Although defeat was their unrewarding lot, Waterford's senior footballers served up one of the best displays I have ever seen from a County football side when they went under by eight points to Munster champions Kerry in last Sunday's Provincial semi-final at Dungarvan. For long spells they matched the Kingdom in every facet of the game and there were on the Deise side on Sunday players who looked capable of holding their own in any company.

Victory undoubtedly went to the better all round side, but if ever there was honour in defeat this was the occasion. The lone Kerry goal was a tragic "o.g." and had Kerry not had the benefit of that when Waterford took control midway through the second half, there could well have been a grand finish to this game.

Considering then the splendid effort that was forthcoming from them on Sunday, the irritating inconsistencies of this side deepens mysteriously. They fail when least expected and in marked contrast, pull out all the stops when few expect anything really worthwhile from them.

Such was the case on Sunday.

## Games Shock Results Possible

ALL the "big guns" in the race for Intermediate hurling championship honours will be in action on Sunday next when no fewer than four first round ties are down for decision. Three of them go on at the Lismore venue, two in the afternoon and one at 7.30, whilst the remaining tie is at Dungarvan (7.30) when Fourmilewater will be strongly favoured to beat unpredictable Stradbally.

The afternoon programme at Lismore sees Dungarvan throwing down the gauntlet to reigning champions, Shamrocks, and this will be followed by one of the real intriguing clashes—Tallow and Colligan Rockies. For this game Dungarvan are bringing back their outside players, Michael Lewis, Eddie Sheehan and Michael Norris, and with Mick Mahony, Jim Dee, John and Michael Clancy, Sean Murphy and Sean Franklin also "on call" they will be anything but a push-over. The odds yes, favour Shamrocks and I for one would not oppose them, but Dungarvan, determined to lift themselves from a present rut, will make a mighty bold bid to unsettle the odds being so freely given against them.

### TALLOW START FAVOURITES

The Tallow-Colligan Rockies tie bids fair to be one of the best games of this entire championship campaign. Tallow in the eyes of most neutrals will start favourites to march on but if any side can halt their progress it will be the inconsistent Rockies.

The Rockies present something of a problem to any would be forecaster. They can be good, and very good, on their day, but equally so they are prone to off days, and nothing less than their very best will be good enough to ensure "survival" on Sunday.

Colligan having to field without some of their most accepted regulars on Sunday but candidly I find that difficult to accept. They were one of the unlucky sides of last year's championship when going under to Shamrocks by a mere two points and one must remember too that they had to finish that hour with only thirteen men, one less than Shamrocks.

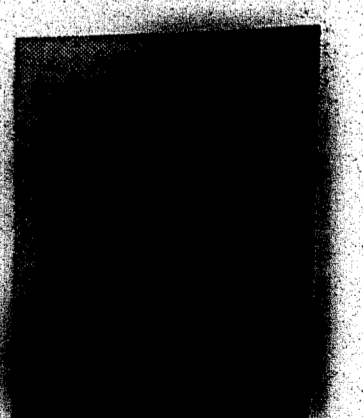
