Youth posed as Garda

An eighteen year old Co. Waterford youth, who posed as a Garda to a 70 year old man and demanded money from him as well as attempting to arrest him on a charge of drunkenness, appeared before Justice L. B. Skinner, at Dungarvan District Court, on Wednesday.

The defendant was Edward Glavin (18), Briskee, Leamybrien, and he pleaded guilty to demanding £6 with menace from Maurice Fennell, at Kilneen, Dungarvan, on June 22nd, and on the same occasion attempting to arrest Fennell on a charge of drunkenness by pretending to be a member of the Garda Síochána.

Inspector J. O'Shea prosecuting, said Glavin approached Mr. Fennell who was over seventy years of age and told him he was a Garda and that he was going to arrest him for being drunk. Glavin had a motor cycle with him and he pretended he was using a Radio on the bicycle to contact the Garda barracks. He asked Fennell for £6 but he told him he had only 10/- and he gave him that amount. When arrested, Glavin admitted the offence.

Inspector O'Shea said Glavin had a previous conviction for housebreaking and lar-

ceeny. This was at the Trammore Court on June 10th last and he had been put back for sentence to the September Court in Trammore.

Inspector O'Shea said Glavin lived on his own at Leamybrien and both his parents were dead.

Justice Skinner convicted the defendant, but adjourned the charge to see if the 10/- compensation would be paid. He also ordered that this conviction be noted for the Court in Trammore when Glavin's case was being dealt with in September.

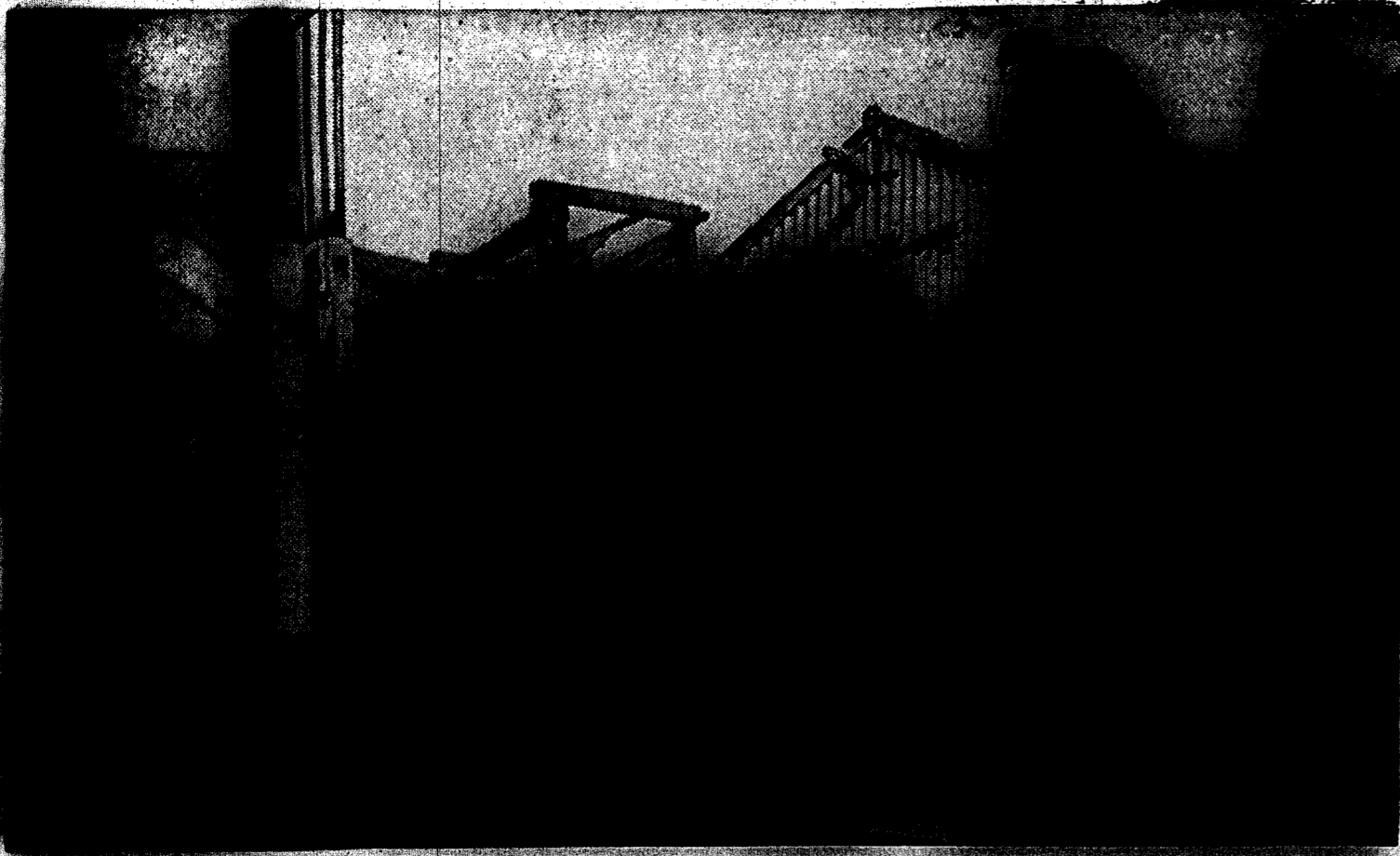
Dear Mr. Editor,

EDITOR
FOR BLIGHT

A Chara,
I am sure your readers are not a little amused at the inane attempts of Mr. F. A. Walsh, Dublin, to refute my recent criticisms of Fine Gael and Labour Policies. His statements are indicative of the confused thinking of the Opposition Parties, whose agricultural policies are vague and ambiguous and could mean anything.

Mr. Walsh suggests that farmers should switch to beef and thus ease pressure on the Exchequer. Most large farmers already indulge in beef production, but also produce large quantities of milk. This policy is best for the national economy despite the high cost of subsidisation.

The statement of the F.G. spokesman on agriculture that the bulk of agricultural subsidies were "going to waste" is ominous and has not been satisfactory explained. It should also be noted that F.G. and Labour spokesmen in Dublin stated that elected to office they would review the present policy on agricultural subsidies and grants "with a view to relieving the burden on the taxpayer." Clearly this was a device to capture the city vote.

One F.G. spokesman stated that the Grant for the relief of rates on agricultural land should be abolished. Another rise? One wonders! Similar action was contemplated by the Coalition Government in 1957, when we were confronted by a grave economic crisis caused by over spending and gross mismanagement.

With regard to the Calved Heifer Scheme, 85% of the grants went to farmers of under 75 acres. The average was for two heifers. It was proved to be an admirable scheme which resulted in a big increase in cattle production and in milk production as well it led to a considerable improvement in farm incomes.

The majority of Opposition party leaders are Dublin based lawyers, who are completely out of touch with the needs of rural Ireland.

Mr. Walsh wonders where I got the "nice round figure of £50m. in extra benefits." This is easy. This was the figure given in Opposition policy documents circulated in Dublin. A week later it rose to £60m. (with no extra taxation?). Amusing? Both F.G. and Labour promised to introduce a Contributory Insurance Scheme to pay the cost of their proposed Comprehensive free-for-all Health Scheme. Such a scheme would cost at least double that of the present one. The figure of £475,000 quoted by Mr. Walsh represents only 44% of the present scheme in Waterford. Hence my figure of 30/- per week appears to be realistic.

I note Mr. Walsh's comments on the present system of local taxation and fully recognise that this is a major problem that will have to be corrected soon. It should be realised however that at present all land valuations of £20 and under are totally derated. All land valuations of £33 and under are practically totally derated, while all land valuations over £30 are derated to the extent of 50%.

My policy on the Co. Council is well known—it is to strike the lowest possible rate and thus bring the maximum relief to the taxpayers.

With limited authority that is all any Council can do. The alternatives are (1) to strike the highest possible rate; (2) to strike no rate, which, in effect, would mean striking highest possible rate. Apparently, Mr. Walsh favours the total abolition of rates. Such a decision would create many other problems, not the least of which would be a considerable increase in national taxation.

FREE ELECTRICITY ALLOWANCE FOR CERTAIN BRITISH AND NORTHERN IRELAND RETIREMENT PENSIONERS WHO ARE AGED 70 AND OVER

The Minister for Social Welfare has decided to extend the scheme of free electricity allowances administered by his Department to include persons aged 70 and over who are resident in the State and who are receiving a Retirement Pension from the British Department of Health and Social Security, Newcastle Upon-Tyne, and the Northern Ireland Ministry of Health and Social Services. An eligible retirement pensioner must be a registered consumer of electricity with the Electricity Supply Board and must be living alone or with the following classes of person only:

- (a) his wife,
- (b) an invalid husband or other invalid person who ordinarily resides with the pensioner,
- (c) other British and Northern Ireland Retirement Pensioners aged 70 and over,
- (d) persons receiving old age or blind pension or being aged 70 or over, widow's (contributory) pension from the Department of Social Welfare, Dublin,
- (e) a child or children under the age of 16 for whose maintenance the pensioner is ordinarily responsible or children over 16 who are attending school full time,
- (f) where the pensioner is an invalid or a semi-invalid or so infirm due to age as to require constant care and attention, one other person who resides with him for the purpose of providing that care and attention.

The scheme will come into operation on the 1st August, 1969, for those whose electricity accounts cover the August/September two month period and from 1st September, 1969, for those whose electricity accounts cover the September-October period. Application forms and further details may be obtained from the Secretary, Department of Social Welfare, Free Electricity Section, Arus Mhic Dhiarmada, Dublin 1.

FREE RADIO AND TELEVISION LICENCES

A retirement pensioner who has been awarded a free electricity allowance by the Department of Social Welfare will be eligible for a free radio and television licence from 1st August, 1969, and may obtain an application form at the Post Office at which he normally cashes his pension order. With a completed form he should produce at the Post Office:

- (a) his pension book and
 - (b) a notification from the Department of Social Welfare that he has been awarded a free electricity allowance.
- Retirement pensioners aged 70 and over who are not registered consumers of electricity but who otherwise would satisfy the conditions appropriate to the granting of a free electricity allowance may also obtain free licences. An eligible retirement pensioner who satisfies these conditions may obtain an application form (F.L.2) at the Post Office at which he normally cashes his pension order. The completed application form should be sent to Department of Posts and Telegraphs, General Branch, Harcourt Buildings, O'Connell Street, Dublin 1.

REFUNDS

Eligible pensioners who have current licences may obtain a refund on the unexpired portion on production of the unexpired licence at the Post Office.

Local Happenings **NEW BROCHURE LAUNCHED BY SERTO LTD.**

The new Regional Colour Promotional Folder published by the South Eastern Regional Tourism Organisation was launched in Waterford on Friday last, when Mr. P. J. Breen, Chairman of the Board of the Regional Tourism Organisation presented the first copy to Dr. Timothy O'Driscoll, Director General, Bord Fáilte.

Dr. O'Driscoll was in Waterford for a meeting with the Board of Directors of the Regional Company.

Presenting the brochure, Mr. Breen stated that with the production of this folder the Regional Company had come to the end of its first phase of Brochure production. To date a colour promotional folder in 3 languages, i.e., English, French and German had been produced for each country and these were receiving widespread distribution through the Bord Fáilte Officers abroad. 75,000 copies of the English version of the Regional folder were now being produced and also 15,000 copies each in French and German. "It is the policy of the Regional Company," said Mr. Breen, "to publish all promotional folders in 3 languages due to the increasing importance of the Le Harve/Ross-lare Continental Car Ferry."

He stated that the Regional Company was now finalising its plans for a Regional Advertising Campaign to be carried out in January of next year and that the promotional folders, both Regional and County, would play an important part in the servicing of this campaign.

Mr. Breen also stated that with the production of this new Regional Folder the Regional Tourism Organisation now had 28 pieces of literature produced by them consisting of promotional folders and brochures covering angling and shooting. These, together with brochures produced by voluntary organisations, commercial enterprises, hotels, etc., ensured that the South East, literature wise, was as well (if not better) equipped as any other Region in the country.

"In the future, and finances permitting," said Mr. Breen, "we hope to produce our literature in 3 languages and shall be investigating ways and means of streamlining and improving our Holiday Information Folders in particular to ensure coverage for all areas throughout the Region."

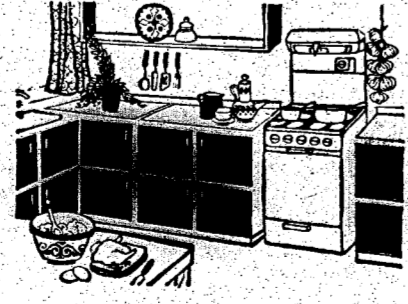

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N.F.A. NEWS

ELECTIONS OF PRESIDENT AND VICE-PRESIDENT

Nomination papers have been sent out to County Secretaries in connection with the N.F.A. Presidential and Vice-Presidential elections.

Following the closing date for receipt of nominations, ballot papers will be issued to affiliated branches early in August for completion and return to N.F.A. House before a date in mid-Sept.

With regard to the Presidential elections, the National Council in accordance with its prerogative under the Rules and Constitution, decided unanimously at a recent meeting that the President, Mr. T. J. Maher, would be entitled to go forward, if nominated and to act, if elected, for a second term.

Mr. Maher is the third President of the Association. The first was Dr. Juan Greene and the second Mr. Richard Deasy.

The four Vice-Presidents at present are: Mr. Tom Blake (Co. Meath); Mr. Jim Mullins (Co. Kilkenny); Mr. John Barry (Co. Waterford); and Rev. P. Brady, C.C. (Co. Roscommon).

Nomination Forms must reach the Returning Officer at N.F.A. House, no later than Monday, 21st July, 1969.

GREATER EMPHASIS ON EDUCATION

As the prospect of E.E.C. membership looms closer for this country, the need becomes greater than ever for the development and spread of technical skills and, furthermore, to put an even greater emphasis on education in the rural areas.

It is accepted by many of our most forward-thinking people that as agriculture becomes more and more a business, so will the demand increase for men of high calibre. It will no longer suffice to send the best brains of the family away to college and keep the backward boy on the farm. Neither will it suffice for farmers to be content with the fact that the generation that will follow them should merely have education up to primary standard and miss out the far greater benefits that must naturally accrue from secondary education, to Intermediate or Leaving standard as the case may be.

In this respect it must be pointed out that the Belgian Farmers Union is now endeavouring to see that the sons and daughters of farmers stay longer at school. There is a full realisation on the Continent that in an age when Dr. Mansholt has come up with some very advanced thinking on farm structures and the social aspects of the agricultural industry, it is essential that every farmer will know what he is about, both from a purely technical and business viewpoint. In a word farmers must have technical know-how on a par with those in other spheres and they must be able to talk to them on an equal level of education. They must not permit themselves to be regarded any longer as second class citizens in their own society. They must seek and work towards full integration and that means in every field.

CONCERN OVER WARBLE FLY MENACE

Concern was expressed by the N.F.A. at reports being received from branches in various parts of the country at the high incidence of warble fly this year compared with the past two years.

A spokesman for the Association pointed out that the result of warble fly infestation was less than in previous years.

Education is concerned. The approach is still rather haphazard to say the least of it.

A National Agricultural Educational Plan is an urgent necessity. This would assess the needs for the entire country and assess too how best to approach the problem in light of the numbers of those who need higher agricultural training and what stimulus would be provided by greater incentives.

This pre-supposes a land bank for those who in normal circumstances might have to wait a number of years before they can farm for themselves. The theory is one thing—being put in a position to be able to apply those theories is bound up with the question. In these days when land is making such high prices, the aspiring young farmer who cannot fall in for the family farm, finds it very difficult indeed to get off the ground.

This whole problem was discussed very fully when the N.F.A. met the Minister for Lands recently and will receive further examination.

PRESIDENT VISITS CORK SHOW

The President of the N.F.A., Mr. T. J. Maher, was among the visitors to Cork Summer Show on opening day.

The N.F.A. Stand depicted through a series of prints the Association in action and also the talks with the Government on farm income. It showed too the progress being made towards a united farm front. It emphasised what the N.F.A. has achieved for farmers and what remains to be won.

Mr. Maher visited various exhibitors and called to the Department of Agriculture Stand with Cork Secretary, Mr. Tom Carroll. He also visited the Macra na Feirme and I.C.A. Stands.

REGULATING POTATO MARKET

The experience of potato growers in recent years emphasises the need in this country for an overall body to undertake the marketing of potatoes, both ware and seed.

The present Potato Marketing Company is responsible for all exports, but activity in this field is mainly confined to seed exports.

The ideal situation would appear to be to have some such body to undertake the task of regulating both home and export sales and it should have adequate representation from all interests concerned in the industry—producers, traders, etc.

Producers should realise for their part that the production and marketing of potatoes can no longer be treated as a hit and miss enterprise. Producers are now at the stage where all crops must be marketed and there must be a completely businesslike approach.

Contract production with prices fixed in advance is a step forward, but positive steps need to be taken to ensure that prices are realistic and related to costs involved. Growers in many areas would be quite willing to increase production, if they could be assured of a remunerative price.

It is accepted that those who have had some training in the Agricultural Colleges are amongst our best and most progressive farmers in most parts of the country.

The Farm Apprenticeship Scheme too is a highly praiseworthy venture but at the same time it must be said that we have merely tapped the surface yet as far as advancing agricultural education is concerned.

The prize for the Championship Foal of the Show was won by Miss Brenda Roche, Woodhouse, Aglish.

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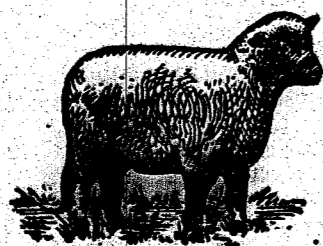

CORK MARTS PROMINENT AT BRITISH SHOW

For the fourth successive year Cork Marts will be strongly represented at the Great Yorkshire Show at Harrogate to be held on 8th, 9th and 10th July.

This year their promotion of Irish cattle in the north of England involves the assistance of two other Cork organisations. Part of the cattle exhibited at Harrogate will be supplied by well known store cattle exporters Messrs. Horgan of Cork and by the South Western Cattle Breeding Society, who have been successfully progeny testing their beef and dairy bulls for a number of years.

The cattle exhibit will consist of 3 pairs of yearling Friesian bullocks from the progeny tests at Bandon A.I. Station, together with 8 yearling Hereford bullocks from the same progeny testing centre. In addition, 2 year old Friesian and Hereford bullocks will be on show.

Personnel from Cork Marts, the cattle breeding stations, and the Department of Agriculture will be available at the stand to talk to British Farmers about Irish cattle, and exporters who trade at the society's marts will be offered facilities on the stand to discuss business with their regular customers in the north of England.

Basically, the Great Yorkshire Show at Harrogate is a rendezvous for cattle men from both sides of the Irish Sea and while British feeders do not necessarily come to the Show to do business directly, it has been the experience of Cork Marts and the regular cattle exporters that the opportunity afforded them for meeting and discussing business with their traditional and potential customers at Harrogate is well worth while.

At previous shows Cork Marts on average dealt with approximately two thousand enquiries and with the combination of interests this year they expect it to be their most successful "Great Yorkshire" to-date.

CORK MARTS' SHAREHOLDERS MEET
As a result of the recent Fund Raising Campaign, when a total of £34 millions was invested in Cork Marts in connection with the takeover of International Meat Packers Ltd. and the erection of a Meat Processing Plant at Middleton, Co. Cork, Cork Marts has now a total of over 27,000 shareholders covering the entire country.

Due to the vast increase in membership the Committee of Management of Cork Marts has decided to amend the rules of the Society to make suitable provision for representation of new members from the areas outside the established Electoral Group areas. The proposals put forward by the Committee have been sent to the Society's legal advisors with instructions to draw up revised rules to give effect to the changes.

Meanwhile, the Committee of Management of Cork Marts has made arrangements for the holding of elections at 22 centres in Leitrim, Ulster and Connaught and in those parts of Munster outside the established Electoral Group areas for the purpose of electing a total of 40 representatives so that shareholders in these areas may be associated with the Society's business, especially with the work of International Meat Packers Ltd. It is envisaged that these representatives will be elected on the basis of one member for each £40,000 shareholding.

The Committee of Management of Cork Marts has further instructed that immediately the 40 representatives are elected, this Group will in turn, appoint from among their number, members to represent the shareholders on the Committee of Management of the Society, and on the I.M.P. Board.

The first meeting will be held in Tralee on June 25th and the last in Wexford on Friday, July 4th.

In the already established Electoral Group areas the shareholders are represented on the present Committee of Management of Cork Marts and through them on the board of I.M.P.

As soon as a Special General Meeting has been held and the proposed amendments to the rules been approved by the Committee of Management of Cork Marts, it is envisaged that the usual elections will be held throughout the country.

Shareholders in the existing Electoral Group areas are currently being circulated informing them of what is taking place in the remainder of the country.

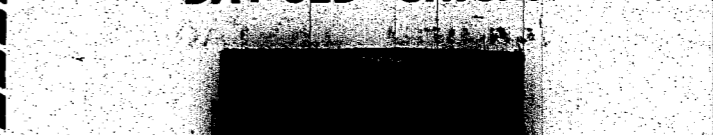
SOMEHOW

TWELVE months ago Stradbally caused the shock of the entire Intermediate hurling championship when they scored a sensational first round victory over Lismore at Dungarvan. On Sunday night last they returned to that scene of triumph and again upset all pre-match predictions with another shock win over Fourmilewater in the same championship. It was a victory well deserved as Stradbally led from the second minute and were never in arrears at any stage during the game.

From an early stage this unexpected Stradbally win was on the cards. They dominated the 1st half exchanges due in the main to the tremendous hurling of Tom Hearne, and their 1-5 to 0-2 interval lead was fully deserved.

Four of those five points came from a rampant Hearne while Matty Reilly had the fifth from a free. Their goal was scored by Noel Power after good work by Joe Curran. Fourmilewater's meagre reply was a brace of points by their most dangerous forward Paddy Joe Ryan.

Clearly Fourmile needed an early second half boost, and they got it within two minutes when Austin Barron goal. Jim Wall quickly palmed a point, and the gap had been narrowed to two points. But back came the Reds in fine style and Joe Curran pointed in the sixth

minute, and seconds later crashed home a great goal. Wall and Martin Walsh had Fourmilewater points before Curran again took a hand and placed Noel Burke for a goal in the 10th minute.

The losers had distinctly the better of matters for the remainder of the half, but found no easy way past a solid Stradbally defence. They cut the deficit again in the 12th minute when Barron slammed a 21 yard free to the net, but as the game entered the closing quarter, real tragedy struck for them, when Jim Ryan, by far their outstanding performer, had to retire with a head injury. True, Barron scored yet another goal in the 21st minute but points by Hearne and Joe Curran ensured Stradbally of their place in the second round.

MATCHWINNER

Undoubtedly their match-winner was midfielder Tom Hearne, one of the best hurling prospects in this county. He shot a string of superb points from long range, and without him I doubt if the Reds would have prevailed.

Goalkeeper Billy Dunford had many fine saves to his credit, and Pat Clancy, Michael Coffey and Alo Curran were outstanding in a good defensive set up.

Up front Joe Curran was unquestionably their top performer, and he received most assistance from Tom Cunningham and substitute Noel Rourke.

Fourmilewater's Jim Ryan first at wing half and later at centre back, was the best defender on view, and his departure midway through the second half with a head

injury (inflicted on him by one of his own defenders) cost the side dearly. They also had to field without the injured Kieran O'Ryan and he too was a grievous loss.

Besides Jim Ryan, Willie Walsh, Paddy Walsh and goalkeeper Tom Crotty all tried very hard, but Mick Connolly at centre back and midfield was well below his best form. Martin Walsh was best in a disappointing midfield sector.

Up front Austin Barron alone seemed capable of scoring goals, although Jim Wall, brilliantly adept at grabbing the dropping ball, also had some fine points to his credit. Paddy Joe Ryan too had a fine game, but alas the remainder of their attacking formation simply did not measure up to standard.
