COUNCIL'S TRIBUTE TO RETIRING RATE COLLECTOR

Mr. James Harty, Ballinacorney, Dungarvan, tendered his resignation to last Monday's meeting of Waterford County Council from the position of Rate Collector for the Dungarvan and Youghal Rural districts.

The Acting Secretary, Mr. F. J. O'Leary said this Rate Collection area represented the biggest single Rate Warrant in the county, and would bring over £88,000 in rates in the current year. It was now up to the Council to make an appointment or alternatively to have the rates for the districts collected through the Office.

Mr. O'Leary said it cost £1,551 last year to collect rates through the Office and this represented about 2d. in the £ on the rates. Even if it was decided to collect this area through the Office they would have to appoint an additional Clerical Officer.

Mr. Charles Curran (Chairman) paid tribute to Mr. Harty who had proved himself a quite extraordinary man in this job. He collected the rates efficiently and in a

humanitarian way as well and it was only proper that the Council pay tribute to him. The Harty family, he added, had been connected with rate collection in the county for almost a hundred years.

The Council unanimously agreed to the reappointment of Mr. Patrick Hogan as the Office Rate Collector. It was also decided to collect the Dungarvan and Youghal Rural districts through the Office, and these areas will also be allotted to Mr. Hogan.

Mr. Curran said the Office Rate Collection involved a substantial reduction in administrative costs, and therefore was a help towards keeping down rates.

Best Wishes to Secretary

Mr. J. G. Dowling, County Secretary, who is presently indisposed, was the recipient of many good wishes for a speedy recovery from the members of Waterford Co. Council at last Monday's meeting in Dungarvan.

97.81 per cent. RATE COLLECTION

The average rate collection in Co. Waterford for the financial year ended 31st March last was 97.81% and this was an improvement on the previous twelve months. Mr. F. J. O'Leary, Acting County Secretary, told the members of Waterford Co. Council at last Monday's meeting in Dungarvan.

Mr. O'Leary said that the total rate warrant for the financial year 1968-'69 was £552,429 and of that £540,345 had been collected. A sum of £12,082 remained uncollected and the Council regarded £5,386 of that irrecoverable.

The average percentage collection was 97.81%, and the lowest collection was 94.6% and the highest 99.64%. They had an improved situation from the previous year, when the average collection was 97.75%, and that represented a total collection of £508,646. The in-

crease in the rate last year would however explain to some extent the increased collection for '68/'69.

Dungarvan Cheque Dated 1846

Comdt. Tom Cooney, formerly of Mitchel St., Dungarvan and now attached to Clancy Barracks, Islandbridge, Dublin, has sent us a most interesting Bank of Ireland (Dungarvan Branch) cheque dated May 16th, 1846. Whilst clearing out rubbish from a house in Dublin a man came across this historic cheque and knowing that Tom was a Dungarvan native, passed it on to him. The cheque was made out on behalf of William and John M. Galway, and despite being 123 years old, is still in remarkably good condition.

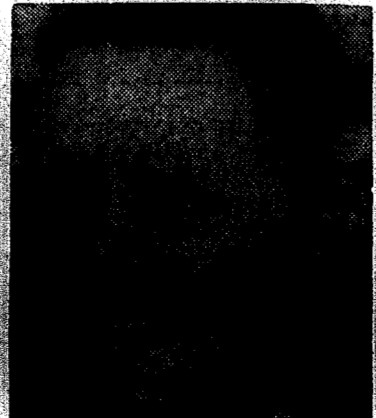

The following statement has been issued by the Dungarvan Branch of the Post Office Officials Association:

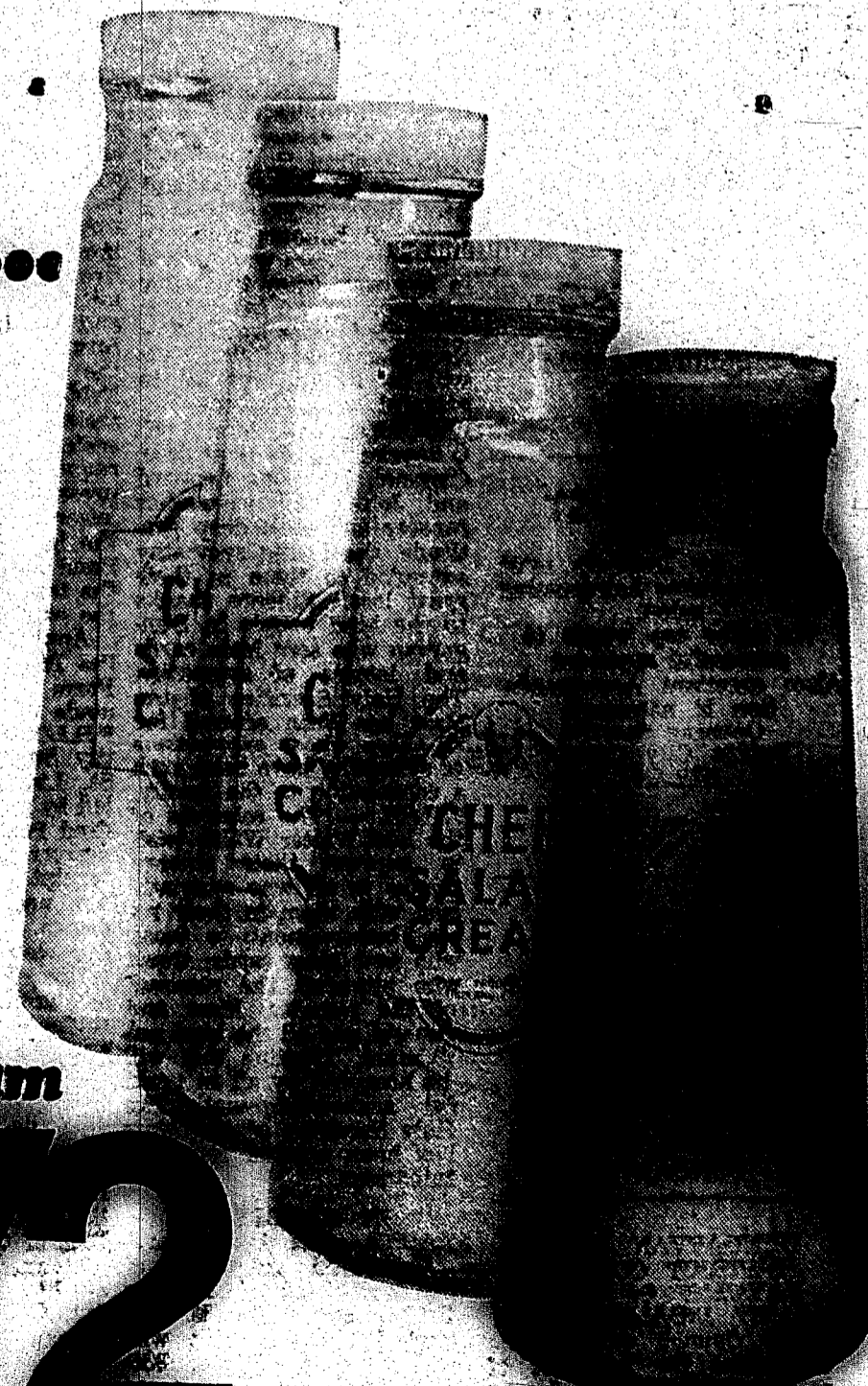

The blame for our action does not rest with this Association, but with the Dept. of Posts and Telegraphs, which, by its campaign of victimisation and subsequent denials of such action has provoked this dispute.

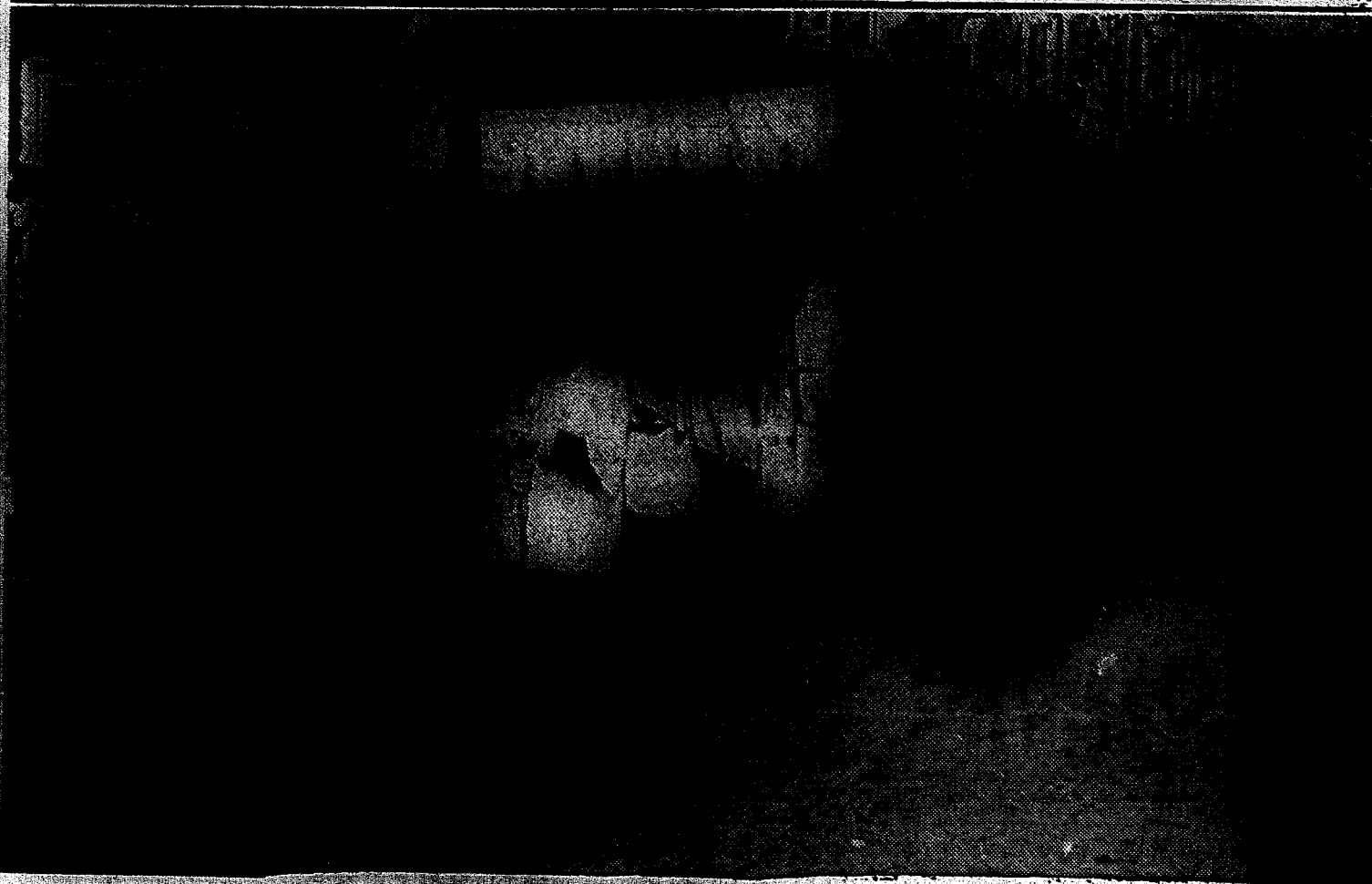

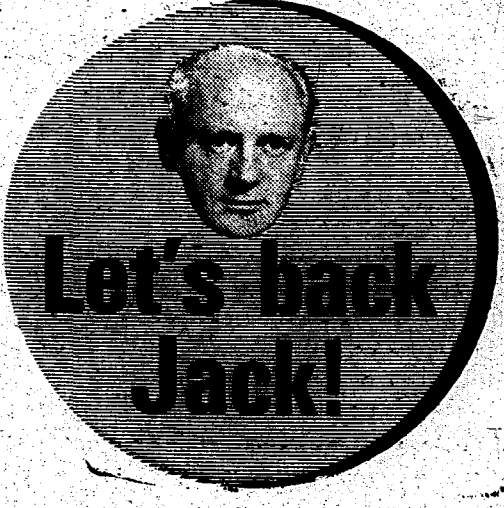

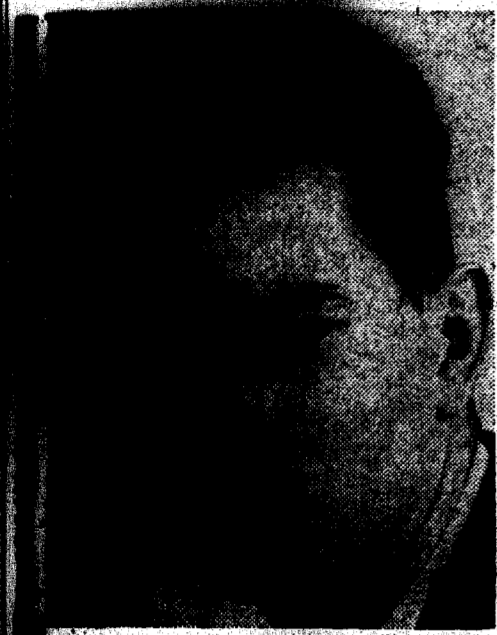

TO SEEK GRANT FOR CLOSING LISMORE DERELICT SITES

Derelict Sites at Lismore, Cappoquin and Ardmore were again discussed at last Monday's meeting of Waterford Co. Council in Dungarvan, when on the proposal of Mr. H. R. Dowd, it was agreed to seek a 50% grant of the derelict sites at the demolition and clear-Church Lane, Lismore - described by Mr. Dowd at a previous meeting as "soul destroying surroundings."

In a report on the Church Lane area, Mr. Hally, County Engineer, said the acquiring of these sites had been the subject of negotiations for two years past, with the owner Mr. George Heskin (not the Co. Colr.). They had now received an offer of this property at quite a reasonable price, but he had felt it would be desirable to buy out the interest of a sitting tenant in a two storey house on the property in order to make the best use of the site.

Mr. Hally said the cost of acquiring the full site would be about £3,000 and the cost of demolishing and clearing it would be about £500.

Mr. Dowd said these unhygienic eyesores would have to be dealt with and he proposed that immediate action be taken to buy out this one tenant in the area. This matter had already been delayed for two years and he could not see why there should be further continuous delay. This was not an unreasonable request because the matter was of vital urgency to the town and people of Lismore.

Mr. Hally said there was no problem in clearing the sites but to obtain the full advantage of the area they should buy out all other interests in the area.

Mr. Hally said there were 50% grants available for Site Clearing, and it was agreed to seek this Grant as a first step towards clearing and developing the area.

CAPPOQUIN AND ARDMORE

Mr. Hally said it would make for a big improvement if the derelict sites at Green Street, Cappoquin were demolished. A public toilet could be erected on the site but this was not acceptable to some of the residents in the area. The cost of clearing the derelict sites would be about £750. Referring to the derelict

sites at Ardmore, Mr. Hally said they could be used as a building site by the Council.

Water for Factory - None for People

They could see fit to finance a water scheme at Balinacourty to the extent of £98,000 for a millionaire factory whilst they were told there was no money available for minor water schemes in the county, said Mr. Kieran O'Ryan at last Monday's meeting of Waterford County Council, when he proposed that a special meeting be held to deal specifically with their water supply programme.

The Chairman, Mr. Charles Curran said there was no point in anyone being two-faced. The plain and simple fact was that they could not give the services without putting up the necessary money. A very easy way to solve this problem would be to put up an additional £100,000 for services, but the Council would not do this.

Mr. O'Ryan said he was not being two-faced, and the suggested solution was not as easy as the Chairman had stated. A special meeting was necessary to consider their water supply programme and he proposed that this meeting be held.

Mr. Patrick Kenneally seconded. Mr. Curran said it was very necessary that this special meeting be held. He was not however suggesting that Mr. O'Ryan was being two-faced. The public must be told that if the services were to be provided then the necessary finance would have to be put up.

The Council unanimously agreed to hold the special meeting.

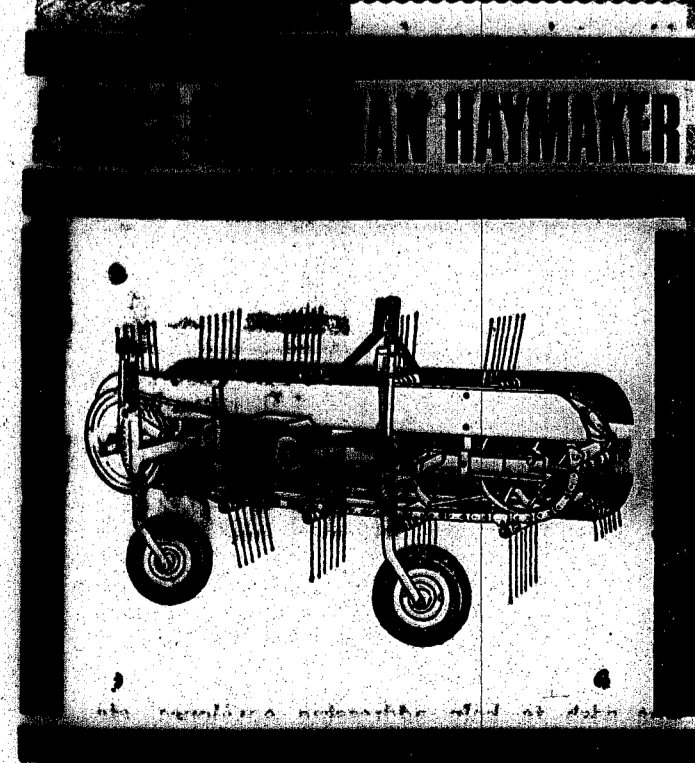

Waterford - By a Point Kerry Come To Dungarvan

WATERFORD ... 0-15

TIPPERARY ... 0-14

As pulsating a finish as the famed Dungarvan venue has ever seen, Waterford edged home narrow but deserved winners over Tipperary in a most exciting first round senior football championship replay on Sunday night last. From beginning to end it was an exciting contest but tension reached near unbearable heights in the closing stages as Tipperary staged an all out rally to save the game and mere inches prevented the teams having to go to extra time to decide the issue. Now as their reward Waterford are at home to Kerry in the semi-final on Sunday next and a bumper attendance is assured for the visit of the Kingdom.

It is difficult to stress how close Tipperary came to snatching a last gasp draw, but in truth, anything less than an outright Waterford victory would have been a case of justice. They set the pace from the very start when aided by the breeze, they never once during the game were they in danger of being swayed by the wind in the vital midfield sector, and it was this dominance more than anything else that paved the way for victory. Seamas Keavans and Pa Walsh ensured a plentiful supply of the ball to forwards who seemed capable of running up a really big tally, and then in the hectic closing stages a most judicious switch was made when Pa Walsh moved to full forward and a rejuvenated Tom Walsh joined forces with Keavans in the middle of the field.

INTERVAL LEAD

And yet, for all their first half pressing, Waterford's interval lead of 0-9 to 0-5 looked precarious to say the least. Considering the territorial advantage they enjoyed it should have been an infinitely greater advantage, and in the opening six minutes the forwards had no fewer than six wides, many of them inexplicable. In the closing ten minutes of the half Tipperary also wisely placed Michael "Babs" Keating at centre forward, and the Irish star proved a real menace to the home defence. But even with the breeze behind them on the restart, Tipperary found few loops in a close marking Deise defence. Within 12 minutes the Waterford lead had been stretched to five points, and entering the closing quarter the interval four points advantage was still intact. But then Tipperary put on the pressure in earnest and the points began to come.

Twice Keating fisted over tremendous scores, one from over forty yards range, and though Waterford twice caught valuable points, the gap had been narrowed to the minimum five minutes from time. But again Waterford hit back, and Pa Walsh, now at full forward, shot what proved to be the game's winning point in the 27th minute. Tipperary again reduced the lead, and just seconds from the end a great Keating effort was only inches away from a dramatic equaliser.

To describe this tie as a close would be letting one's imagination run away with oneself, but certainly what it meant in finesse was more than compensated for by the constant exchanges. Waterford found themselves in trouble even before the game started, when it became known that Mick Connolly had to cry off through injury, and this meant in effect that half their actual defence set up—Connolly, the injured Wally Connors and the suspended Achill Lannon, were all missing from the sector. In a re-arranged defence Pat Clancy moved from centre back to right half, and Ger Mooney took over as pivot. Stradbally's Michael Coffey came on at right half back, and acquitted himself quite well.

WELL ON TOP

With the wind favouring

seconds later, and the deficit had now been cut to an insecure two points. In the 19th minute Pa Walsh had a Waterford point, and when Kirwan scored a great minor nine minutes from time, a Waterford victory seemed virtually assured.

However, Tipperary staged a grand finish in an effort to salvage the game. Substitute Anthony Cahill pointed in the 23rd minute; Cummins and full back Mick Egan had one each by the 25th minute and many in the big attendance must have been thinking in terms of extra time. However in one of their now sporadic upfield sallies Pa Walsh shot a wonderful point, and though Cummins pointed a Tipperary free in the 28th minute they failed to snatch an equaliser. But, just on the hour, Babs Keating came mightily close to it with a fine effort.

FORWARDS SHONE

For once the oft criticised Waterford forwards took the main honours on Sunday, and seldom have I seen Vinny Kirwan, Michael Power and Tom Riordan perform so effectively as a half forward unit. Inside them Tom Walsh fielded some spectacular balls and shot some glorious points for good measure. Tom Cunningham was by far the better of the corner men, but a change in this sector seems pretty imminent.

At midfield Seamas Keavans and Pa Walsh teamed up splendidly, and Walsh had, for my money, his best ever game in the county jersey.

There can be no denying the loss the absent trio were in defence, but nonetheless, sterling displays came from Jim Wall, a heroic full back,

Noel Walsh, and Pat Clancy. One of the real Tipperary stars was goalkeeper John O'Donoghue, who proved himself just as accomplished as he is at the hurling code. The defence however was not all it might or should have been and only Mick Egan and Paddy O'Connell emerged with reputations enhanced.

Tipperary were never happy at midfield, despite the many switches made. However, in fairness to them they sadly missed Dick Strang who retired injured early in the second half, and who had proved himself the most successful of those tried in the sector.

Up front Babs Keating was their real danger man, and in John Cummins and Paudie Blythe he had other first class accomplices.

THE sheer footballing brilliance of Mick O'Connell at midfield; the undoubted defensive prowess of Mick Morris, Donie O'Sullivan and Mike O'Shea and the scoring potential of forwards Brendan Lynch, Mick O'Dwyer and Eamonn O'Donoghue have moulded Kerry into one of the leading, if not the leading football combinations in the country at the present time. All of this then must surely crystallise the magnitude of the task confronting Waterford on Sunday next when they take on the mighty Kingdom in a really appealing "David versus Goliath" Munster championship semi-final at Dungarvan's Fraher Field. The visit of the reigning Provincial champions and recent National League home winners has aroused tremendous interest within the County and though the odds are heavily stacked against them, Waterford are prepared to play the game of their lives against the favourites.

This semi-final could not possibly come at a more psychological time for Waterford. The sweet smell of success over Tipperary in last Sunday's first round replay is still in the air and with the great advantage of a home venue now, followers will flock in thousands to the Old Bore Ground.

DILEMMA

At the time of writing the Kerry team has not been chosen, but I can say with certainty that their mentors are finding themselves in a real dilemma right now. A

definite absentee is centre forward Pat Griffin, who was suspended for two months last weekend by Central Council following his dismissal early on in the league final against Offaly. Furthermore, with the team due to fly out for New York on Monday next to play the league final proper on a two leg basis on June 22nd and 29th, Eamonn and Paud O'Donoghue, Seamas Fitzgerald and Denis O'Sullivan are suffering from the ill-effects of vaccination and must be considered doubtful starters.

So badly hit are Kerry in fact that a tentative approach was made to the Chairman of the Munster Council in the hope of putting off the game until after Kerry return from the U.S. But the game goes on on Sunday for definite.

Despite the position in which Kerry find themselves in however, one can rest assured that they will field a powerful side on Sunday. It is still a vivid memory in the Kingdom of their last trip to Deise soil for a senior football championship game. The year was 1957, the venue Walsh Park, and the whole thing seemed nothing more than a formality. But a late point by Dungarvan's Tom Cunningham brought about the shock result of the decade, so Kerry will be very much on guard against a repetition on Sunday.

CHANGES

The Waterford mentors met on Monday night in Dungarvan and announced one personal and a number of positional switches from

the team that beat Tipperary. Still unavailable are defenders Mick Connolly and Wally Connors (injured) and Achill Lannon (suspended), and there can be no closing one's eyes to the fact that the defence is visibly weakened without them.

Onto the side at full back comes De La Salle's Tom Brady, with Jim Wall moving to the right flank. Michael Coffey (Stradbally) somewhat unluckily loses his place at right half back, which is now taken by Ger Mooney. Pat Clancy takes over at centre back with Noel Walsh in his usual left half back position.

The midfield and attacking sectors remain unchanged from the Tipperary game.

which means that Pa Walsh and his brother Tom who switched places late in that game, revert back to midfield and full forward respectively.

When attempting to forecast the result of any game one must be realistic above all. Kerry were beaten in '57, and it is not impossible for that to happen again. But it is certainly highly improbable, and one cannot but pump quite confidently for a pretty decisive Kerry win. Waterford will undoubtedly be encouraged however by a huge home following and they could make it a highly interesting hour.

The Chairman said this was a kind of conduct that could not be tolerated, and both players would be asked to furnish an explanation for this. They arrived in Dungarvan with only two subs for that game, and had to ask Virgil Power (Stradbally) who was a spectator at the game to step in to strengthen their reserves.

"That much said," said Mr. Fanning, "let me congratulate our footballers on an inspiring display. The arrangements were perfect, except that the huge crowd was not anticipated, and the pitch was magnificent, and our players rose to the occasion. They played the type of football that would have drawn roars of approval from a Croke Park crowd."

The Chairman said this was a great night for Waterford football and they were now ready to meet Kerry on Sunday next at the same venue in the semi-final. He expressed the hope that the entire county would rally around the team, for it should be remembered, he said, that they beat Kerry before and they would go all out to do so again. Mr. Fanning said the defeats of their senior and minor hurlers were disappointing. The seniors were beaten by a better side but the defeat of the minors was even more disappointing.
