JAIL SENTENCES FOR DUNGARVAN BROTHERS

Sequel To Assaults

A fracas at Grattan Square, Dungarvan, on Thursday of last week had a sequel at Cahir District Court on Friday when two Dungarvan brothers, Patrick and Edward Costigan, 15 Cathal Brugha Place were each sentenced to two months imprisonment. They were charged with assaulting Christopher Keohan, also of Cathal Brugha Place at Grattan Square, thereby occasioning him actual bodily harm and they were further charged with being drunk and disorderly on the same occasion.

Mr. Michael O'Kelly told the Court that he was Prop. of the "Beehive" Restaurant and on the date in question the Costigans had tea and sandwiches. Later they told the waitress they had no money and when he went to them they told him the same thing. He then ordered them to leave.

Witness went on to say that when he got them out of the street he locked the door because he could see trouble coming. A fracas then took place in which the two defendants and two others were involved, and he saw one man being struck on the head with an empty milk bottle which was taken

from a crate outside his premises. Several bottles were broken in the melee, and the place was littered with glass.

Christopher Keohan said an argument took place between him and the Costigans and Patrick Costigan struck him across the face and broke two milk bottles off his head. He fell to the ground and Edward Costigan kicked him twice or three times.

Garda T. Lyons said when he arrived on the scene Patrick Costigan's shirt was wide open, and Keohan was

bleeding from the nose, his right jaw was swollen and he had a cut on his scalp. The defendants had a deal of drink taken and used abusive language. They resisted arrest when being put into the Garda car to be taken to the Barracks.

The defendants, addressing the Justice, said they never touched Keohan and had nothing to do with the assault. The smallest child in their area would beat Keohan, they said.

Justice Skinner, convicting both defendants, sent them to jail for two months.

DECISION DEFERRED ON LOCAL FOOTBRIDGE

The members of Dungarvan Urban Council again considered the suggestion of the Co. Engineer, Mr. J. D. Hally, to erect a footbridge at the Causeway Bridge linking the town and Abbeyside, at last Monday night's meeting, but a firm decision was deferred to the next monthly meeting.

The Town Clerk, Mr. J. P. Robinson said that since the last meeting, the Co. Manager had discussed the matter with Mr. Hally and in a report the Co. Engineer now stated that a sign warning traffic would be erected approaching the Bridge whilst a new footpath might also be put on the bridge.

Mr. Tommy Wade said the erection of the footbridge

was the only 100% safeguard to life and there was no point in dilly dallying around with human life. The bridge at present was a real hazard to life, and there was no point in putting a footpath on the bridge and then when a life was lost to come along and say it was not a success.

Mr. Austin Deasy said he believed they had no option but to erect this footbridge without delay.

However, in view of the absence of the Chairman, Mr. T. A. Kyne, who had to leave the meeting some time earlier, on business, the members agreed to defer the matter to the next meeting, when a final decision would be taken on it.

Robinson (Town Clerk) said a letter had been received from the Junior Chamber stating that the Chapter also felt that the Council Chairman should have a Chain of Office because of his many commitments. They were prepared to give a contribution of £15 towards purchasing one, provided other local organisations would also give a contribution.

Mr. Declan Goode said the Junior Chamber were to be congratulated not alone for this wonderful offer, but also for what they were doing down Quann's for the children in providing a Children's Playground. He too, felt they should have a Chain of Office, but they were not allowed to purchase one from Council funds. He hoped that any local organisations who would have funds would follow the example of the Junior Chamber.

The Town Clerk said the Junior Chamber's Chain of Office cost about £90.

Colr's Query on New Dump

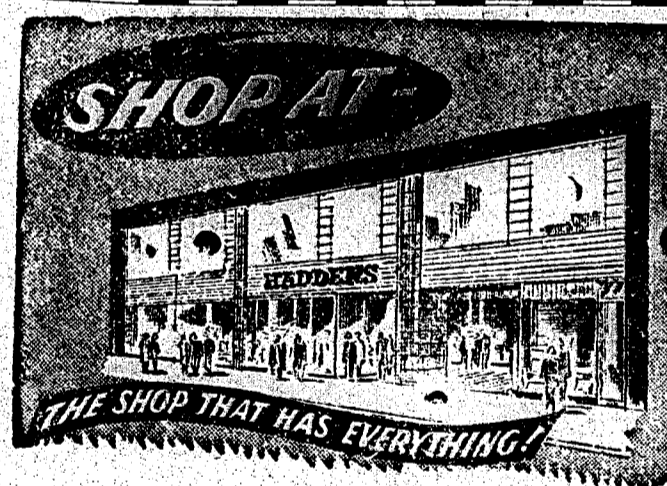
We have paid £1,000 for 2½ acres and it is not worth £50 said Patrick Whelan at this week's meeting of Dungarvan Urban Council when referring to the Council's new Dump at Ballinamuck.

The question of the new dump was raised by Colr. Austin Deasy, who asked at what stage they were now in relation to the new dump. The Town Clerk (Mr. J. P. Robinson) said the Contract for its Sale had been prepared and the money had been lodged in the Bank for the dump. An application had also been made to the Irish Land Commission concerning the sub-division of the land and they hoped to be going into possession of it almost immediately. They also expected the arrival of their new Refuse Truck on Tuesday of this week.

Colr. Whelan complained of the difficulty there was in gaining access to the new dump. He also did not think that the Council was taking into account what it would cost to provide a proper access to it. He went on to refer to the condition of the roadway and the danger of flooding from the nearby river. The dump will be flooded down to the quay, he added.

The Chairman, Mr. Thomas A. Kyne, said they had been assured by a Dept. Inspector that this would not happen. They had tried everywhere to get a dump and could not get one. The Sale had gone through for this dump which was out of town and that was what the people wanted.

AMENDMENT OF ACTS

CHILDREN IN FOSTER HOMES, ETC. Attention is directed to the important changes effected by the Children (Amendment) Act, 1967, in the law relating to children placed in foster homes, or placed in employment in certain circumstances, by a person or by a body other than a local authority.

By reason of these changes all the existing requirements regarding children up to age 9 accepted in foster homes for reward now apply to such children up to age 16 and apply in addition to illegitimate children fostered in foster homes, other than the homes of relatives, irrespective of whether the child is received for reward or not.

Other new provisions relate to: (a) the placing of new obligations on persons or bodies arranging fosterage; (b) the extension of the period of notice to be given in connection with the placing of a child; (c) notification to the appropriate local authority of any arrangement (made by a body or a person other than a relative of the child) for the employment of a child under 18 years of age in circumstances which require the child to reside in premises other than those in which he or she previously resided; (d) supervision by the local authority of the welfare of children.

None of the foregoing provisions applies to a child who has been legally adopted, i.e., in respect of whom an Adoption Order has been made in pursuance of the Adoption Act, 1952. 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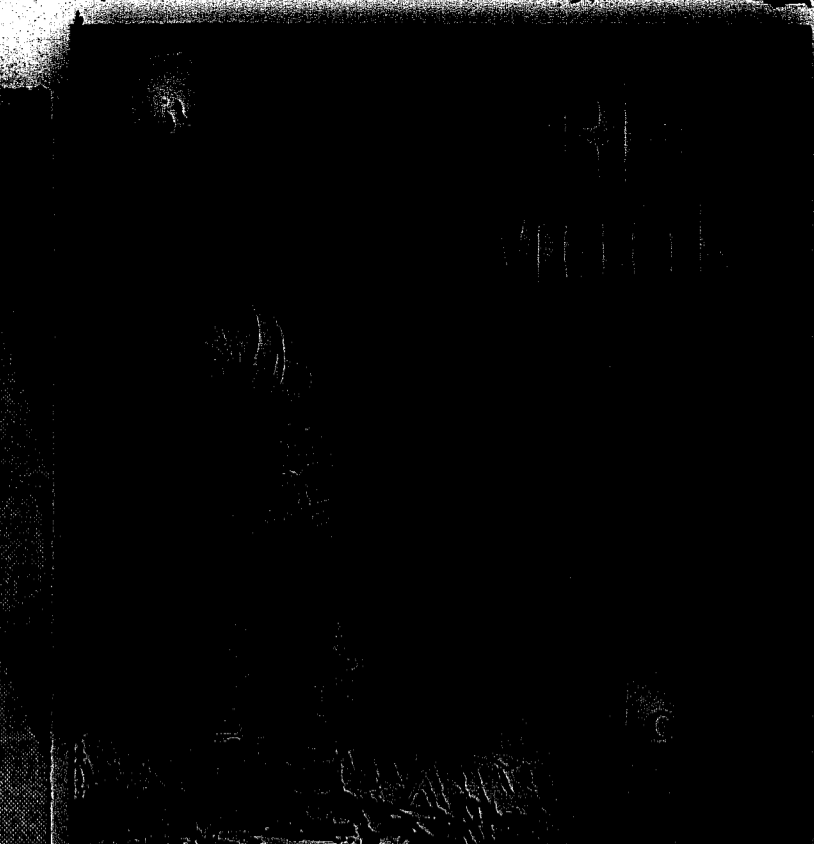

DUNGARVAN'S gallant bid to wrest the coveted Marquis of Waterford Soccer Cup for the first time ended in honourable failure at Ozier Park, Waterford, on Friday night last when the Club's Third Division side went under by the odd goal in three to Carrick in a first class decider. Again however the true fighting spirit and tremendous determination that had hallmarked the side's passage to the final came to light. They literally threw "the book" at the winners defence in the hectic closing stages, and it was only as it should have been when Jim Byrne rose to a Sheridan cross eight minutes from time and headed home a fine goal. That score was the signal for even more intense Dungarvan pressure, as they pulled out all the stops in a great bid to avert defeat.

Wing halves Tony Mountain and Monny Lennon who had done so much to rally the side in that second half, moved up now as extra attackers. But it was not to be. The Carrick rearguard stood firm and at the call of time Dungarvan's superb effort had been all in vain.

All credit however to Carrick who took their chances, and then had the defensive strength to hold on to their advantage.

No doubt Dungarvan were bitterly disappointed at losing, for every man on the side put a tremendous amount of effort and energy into it. They had the chances to wrap up the issue, of that there can be no doubt, but even so it was a heartwarming, courageous display by a side that confounded many in reaching the ultimate round of the competition.

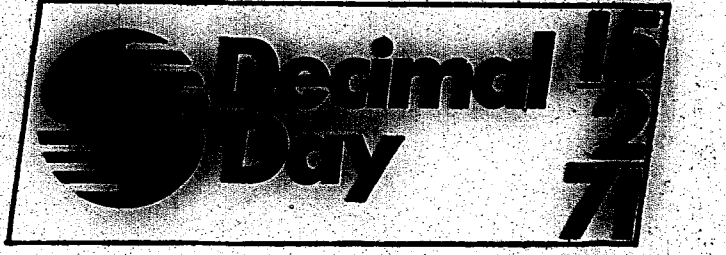

COUNCIL OVERRIDES MANAGER ON PLANNING APPLICATION

Under a section 4 Order, Dungarvan Urban Council has decided to grant Planning permission to Mr. Joseph Foley to re-open a petrol filling station at Sexton Street, Abbeyside. This action was taken by the members of the Council after the Co. Manager, Mr. C. O'Connor, had refused to grant Mr. Foley planning permission on the grounds that the station would constitute a traffic hazard because of its proximity to a complex road junction...

In a report on the entire matter to the meeting, the Town Clerk, Mr. J. P. Robinson, said an application in respect of the pumps had originally been made in July, 1966 on behalf of Shamrock Petrol Ltd. for permission to re-open the site, but this was refused. The Company appealed this decision to the Minister and the Minister refused the appeal on the grounds of a traffic hazard and on the grounds that the sale of petrol across the public footpath would tend to obstruct and endanger the safety of pedestrians.

Mr. Robinson said in April this year Mr. Foley reopened the pumps without getting planning permission, and when he was advised of this he made application for planning permission on April 14th. He was refused on the grounds outlined above. A further application was made by him on June 13th. Mr. Robinson said a motion before the meeting signed by Cols. Kyne, Hackett and Whelan, instructing the Co. Manager, under Section 4 to grant this application, was discussed with the Co. Engineer and he has stated that if planning permission is granted there is still very little that can be done to improve the situation because the main danger would arise from the location of the filling station itself. The situation however might be improved, the Co. Engineer stated, if no service was carried on at the station.

Concluding his report, Mr. Robinson said that permission had also been refused by the Manager for the erection of an erection of a garage on the opposite side of the road, but this had been granted on appeal by the Minister, subject to the condition that a large forecourt be provided, which would enable traffic to pull up to the road whilst being served. Mr. Patrick Whelan, in moving that the Manager be instructed under Section 4 to grant Mr. Foley permission, said he could not understand why this permission was being refused. Yet permission had been given to a garage on the opposite side of the road. Mr. Foley was a young married man, trying to make a living for himself and this permission should be given to him. Mr. Thomas A. Kyne seconded and it was agreed to unanimously by the Council. Mr. Thomas Wade asked why it was necessary to move Section 4 against the Manager in this matter. Mr. Kyne: I can assure you it is. This now makes it mandatory on the Manager to grant Mr. Foley planning permission.

A revised Rent scheme for Urban Council houses, which came into operation in Dungarvan this week, was strongly criticised on a number of points by members of the Council at last Monday night's meeting. At the outset the Chairman, Mr. Thomas A. Kyne said it had been agreed that an increase of 2/6 would be put on houses presently on fixed rents, whilst houses on differential rents would have their rents assessed on the income. It was also stressed he said, that tenants on fixed rents would have the option if they so desired of going over to the differential rents system.

The Chairman said that it had been said to him that rents on fixed houses had been increased by 100% in excess of the agreed 2/6. He had no proof of this, but he would like to know if that was correct.

Mr. Tommy Wade, the Tenants' Association Representative, said many of the tenants were being penalised by this revised rent scheme. In some cases it was not just a question of a 2/6 increase but was quite considerably more.

Mr. J. P. Robinson (Town Clerk) said that all houses on Fixed Rents had been increased only by the agreed 2/6 a week, plus the increase in rates. It was incorrect to say that any fixed rents had been increased by more than the 2/6.

Mr. Patrick Whelan said that four years ago they had a Deputation from the Casey villa tenants before the Council about their rents and they were told then that their rents could not be changed, and yet they had been altered under this new scheme.

The Town Clerk said that the rates increase had also been included with the rent increase, though both were shown separately on the slip for the tenant. The minimum rate increase they had this year was 1/3 a week, and in some cases it was as much as 2/2 weekly.

Mr. Wade said he would not advise anyone on fixed rents to opt over to differential rents.

The Chairman said that anyone with a small income would be well advised to change from fixed rents to differential rents. Mr. Austin Deasy said it should go out from this meeting tonight that people such as Old Age Pensioners and others on small incomes would be well advised to opt for differential rents.

Mr. C. A. O'Connor (Co. Manager) said that whilst there were increased rents under the differential rents, they also had forty cases of reductions in rents under this system, and some of the reductions were as much as 17/- weekly. There were bound to be teething troubles with any new scheme but the Town Clerk would be available to all the people if they had queries to make about their rents. He also intimated that a circular would be coming from the Government about Relief Rates for necessitous people. The meeting finally agreed that any queries on rent increases would be considered by the Town Clerk, and if in any cases an error had been made it would be rectified.

THE site the Libraries Committee wanted for a new Library was being sold down the river to a State Combine seeking a Post Office site, said Mrs. Louise Maher, when she addressed last Monday night's meeting of Dungarvan Urban Council as a member of a Deputation from the County Waterford Library Committee. The deputation consisting of the County Librarian, Mrs. Hayes, Mrs. Maher, H. R. Dowd, M.C.C., Kieran O'Ryan, M.C.C. and William Foran expressed complete dissatisfaction at the site offered them beside Arus Brugha for the building of the town's new library.

Mr. H. R. Dowd said many of them on the Library Committee did not feel at all happy about this site between the Provincial Bank and Arus Brugha, which had been kindly offered to them by the Provincial Bank Ltd. They would however like to hear the views of the Urban Council members on the merits or demerits of that site, and also the one known as "The Shambles," near the Courthouse, which it was originally intended to give as the Library site. They, he said, were dissatisfied with the change of site allocation, as they had been allocated the Shambles site but now as an alternative were given the one at Arus Brugha.

Mr. Dowd went on to say that the Co. Libraries Committee played a very important part in the life of the town and it should be given a degree of priority over the Post Office Authorities for this site at the Shambles.

Mrs. Maher said she was mainly responsible for bringing this Deputation before the Council and but for being indisposed they would have come to the Council last March or April. Her main objection to the siting of Dungarvan's new library at Davitt's Quay was that it was too far removed from the town centre and as a result would be a hardship on the elderly people using it. This was also an isolated area and not a residential one and children would also be using the library. She could not see parents being very happy about their children going there on a dark winter's evening. She would like to know, she added, why the Shambles site was whisked away from them.

Mr. Thomas A. Kyne (Chairman) said the Shambles site was not going to anyone yet. Mrs. Maher: I hope the Council will give serious thought to all that has been said by the Deputation tonight.

Mrs. M. Hayes (Co. Librarian) replying to Col. Declan Goode, said portion of the Shambles site had been promised to the Committee verbally by the Urban Council some years ago. There was no direct offer of the site however by the Council, but negotiations seemed to fluctuate over a period.

Mr. Austin Deasy said it might be said that the Urban Council went back on its word with regard to this site, but they were not in the Urban Council at the time. Mrs. Maher criticised strongly what she termed a severe lack of communication somewhere, and said it was this lack of communication that had led to the present unsatisfactory situation. Col. Goode said he would not favour siting the new library on the proposed Bank site near Arus Brugha. Mrs. Maher: Why is the site which we want for the new library being sold down the river to a State Combine seeking a site for a Post Office? They could buy a complete block in the town if they so desired, and what function has the Urban Council in providing a Post Office for the Authorities.

Mr. Kyne said the Shambles site was still the Council's property and has not been sold to anyone yet. Mrs. Maher said she was sure the Deputation would be given the full consideration of the Council.

Having thanked the Council members for receiving them the Deputation members then withdrew. The Council subsequently deferred to the next meeting further consideration of the matter.

Addressing a meeting of the Dungarvan Junior Chamber of Commerce, Mr. H. J. Morrisson, Head of Public Relations, Irish Decimal Currency Board, stressed the need for early planning by the business community for the change to decimal currency which will take place in Ireland on 15th February, 1971. Business people should be aware that unless they took action immediately, they would find themselves involved in last minute efforts to have their machines and stationery adapted before decimal day.

Machine companies, because of the large volume of work which will be thrust upon them by decimalisation will not be able to meet requirements for new machinery or conversion of existing machines unless they receive instructions in the near future. Decimalisation of our currency was a positive step forward and should bring with it many benefits for the commercial and business sectors. Not least among them will be the opportunity it affords for a general review of existing accounting and other internal business procedures to see if they can be streamlined in any way. Decimalisation should also serve as a reminder to all of us that careful planning and preparation are essential for the successful implementation of any new programme not least such a far reaching one as a change in our currency system.

Mr. Morrisson stated that the Government had now decided to have a coin rather than a note for the new 50 pence (value 10/-) denomination. This will bear the woodcock design already familiar from the 1d. coin which had now practically disappeared. It will be issued early in 1970 and used as 10/- up to Decimal Day. The halfpenny will be withdrawn from circulation on 1st August next and the half crown from 1st January, 1970. Mr. Morrisson added that the art details prepared by Miss Gabriel Hayes for the three bronze coins were magnificent examples of coinage design and would further enhance our coin range as being among the finest in the world.

COLR. WARNS - "TENANTS ARE READY TO MARCH"

The people in Dungarvan were ready to march and that was no idle talk, said Mr. Thomas Wade, the Tenants' Association representative on Dungarvan Urban Council when he opposed the granting of a 9% increase to the Council's Veterinary Inspector and Clerk of Works at last Monday night's Council meeting.

The Town Clerk (Mr. J. Robinson) said the proposed increase was one which had been granted to all other members of the Council staff. In the Veterinary Inspector's case a total of £40 was involved in the current year and £125 for the Clerk of Works. These increases, he said, would be chargeable on the loan charges for sewerage or housing schemes.

Mr. Wade said that from now on he would fight these increases for officials all the way, irrespective of who the officials involved were. This week Council tenants had their rents increased from about 3/- upwards and they must ask where the money to pay these increases would come from. It can only be put on the rents and rates of

THE Intermediate hurling championship provided yet another shock result on Sunday last when Tallow, so strongly favoured in many quarters, had to give best to a Colligan Rocks side that played with an authority and composure that had all the marks of prospective champions about it. This was unquestionably the best display in a long time, and enhances considerably their hopes of figuring prominently in the final hunt for Divisional honours.

By any standards this was yet another first class game, with Tallow's grit and determination not to cave in when the tide was running strongly against them, always keeping them there with a chance. Old Parish Score Gaelic Clear Cut Win

FOR the first quarter of this first round Intermediate football championship game at Dungarvan on Sunday last, Ring, resplendent in their new jerseys, handed out a football drubbing to arch rivals, Old Parish. But even at that stage the forward lills that so beset them throughout this game, were in full evidence, and once Old Parish got to grips with the task on and they simply tied with a beaten and outclassed opposition.

Just how one-sided a "local derby" this turned out to be can be assessed from the fact that Ring, two points up after six minutes play, did not raise another flag for the remainder of the hour. Furthermore those two points came from frees by midfielder "Bilest" Murray, leaving the entire attack without a score to its credit for the entire game.

Yet the complete and methodical manner in which Old Parish dominated most of this game was surprising in view of Ring's early clear cut superiority. The ball scarcely went into Ring territory for most of that opening quarter and so superior were they at that stage, that the fancied Reds looked in real trouble.

TRANSFORMED But once the winners opened their scoring tally with a John Leahy point after eighteen minutes, Old Parish became a transformed side. From that moment onwards they proceeded to play some delightful football and set themselves up as the probable favourites to take Divisional honours in the grade.

Of all the sectors, it was their half forward trio of Harry O'Donnell and in particular Matty Cronin and Pat Terry who literally tore the Ring defence to shreds. Cronin and Terry waltzed through almost at will and O'Donnell's accuracy from placed balls punished the Ring indiscretions.

Within seconds of Leahy's equaliser Pat Terry edged the side in front, and Maurice Wade, O'Donnell (free) and a fisted effort by Leahy brought further points for a deserved Old Parish lead of 0-5 to 0-2 at the interval.

But it was on the restart that Old Parish served up their real vintage football. The subjected Ring to a

Their football in the early stages of that second half was such that to me at any rate they are one of the top, if indeed not the top contender for Divisional honours. They possess an attack laden with scoring potential, and if the half forward trio of O'Donnell, Cronin and Terry took the major honours, the inside trio of Maurice Wade, John Leahy and John Cronin also played very well.

After a very shaky and uncertain start, Pat Flavin and Tony Hallahan took control at midfield and in a defence that had no apparent flaws, John Dower, John Terry and Michael Joseph Power excelled.

Without question the Ring hero was goalkeeper Liam Walsh whose superb ability between the posts averted an even heavier defeat for his side. The defence was at all times hard put to contain the opposing attack, but Sylvester and "Shamieen" Murray and Sean Maher all tried very hard.

After a promising start, "Bilest" Murray and Tom Maher had to play second fiddle at midfield but attack was undoubtedly the side's weakest sector and only Brendan Byrne could be said to have had a satisfactory game.

Decisive Win For Eire Og

WHEN a side wins a championship game by eight clear goals it may seem ludicrous to state that they were less than impressive. But that's the way it was at Dungarvan, on Sunday last, when Eire Og literally romped to the second round of the intermediate hurling championship at the expense of Ardmore. True, there was seldom any real doubt about the outcome of this game, but well beaten though they were, Ardmore nonetheless exposed flaws in this Eire Og set up that could be severely punished by an opposition of better hurling calibre.

This game died as a contest almost before it started. Ardmore, the victims of internal trouble, found themselves with only fourteen players, and Mossy Hallahan long retired, had to stand in goal fully clad in his ordinary clothes. In such circumstances there could only be one result, and there was little surprise at Eire Og's decisive winning margin.

However, for quarter of an hour Ardmore fared surprisingly well, and it was dur-

ing this spell in particular that a number of Eire Og weaknesses were in evidence. These were in defence and but for some fine goal-keeping by Lar Harte in those early stages, Eire Og might well have found themselves some scores in arrears.

But if flaws were evidenced, it is only fair to say that the potential of the side was also often to be seen. This was particularly true of an attack that picked off some great scores over the hour, whilst the competence of the midfield pairing of Dee Hayes and John Reilly always gave them control of the sector.

FLATTERED TO DECEIVE Ardmore flattered to deceive early on, for when Jim Rooney, twice, and Noel Rooney had points within ten minutes of the start, it looked as though Eire Og would have quite a task on hands. But once they got on terms in the 11th minute through a John Reilly goal, they never again found themselves in trouble. They went on to lead 3-4 to 0-4 at the interval, and in absolutely facile fashion tacked on a further 3-9 in a one-sided second half. Ardmore's reply was a meagre two points, scored by Jim Quinn and Jim Rooney, and that scoring differential between them crystallised the gulf in class between the sides.

There can be no denying the fact that Eire Og's passage would have been infinitely more difficult had Ardmore had the services of the Hallahans and Carltons. As it was they were very hard pressed to field a team and did as well in the circumstances as might be expected of them.

From an Eire Og point of view the most encouraging feature of the display was the excellent form shown by forwards Brendan Crowley, Mickey Fraher and Tony McCarthy. All three helped themselves to sizeable tallies with Crowley "heading the field" in that respect with a personal total of 1-7.

Dec Hayes and John Reilly were always on top at midfield, and in a defence around which must stand question marks, Monny Co-ward, Tony Moore and Tom Drummeey fared best. Behind them Lar Harte had yet another fine hour in goal.

ARDMORE'S BEST The half time decision to

transfer Noel Rooney from attack to defence paid off well for Ardmore, and Rooney hurried very well at centre back in the second half. His brother Jim Rooney was by far and away their most effective forward whilst Pat Pender, Richard Hennessey, Jim Quinn and goalkeeper Mossy Hallahan also tried valiantly to the very end.

BRICKEYS OR BALLINA-COURTY FOR SENIOR SEMI-FINAL

Barring a draw (and it's not an impossibility) the first of the senior football championship semi-finals should be known on Sunday evening next when Brickey Rangers and Ballinacourty meet in an intriguing second round game at Dungarvan.

To the best of my knowledge it is the first championship meeting of the clubs in the premier grade and on that count alone is certain to create quite a degree of interest. It is one of these wide open affairs also, with both sides capable of advancing many reasons why victory should be theirs.

In reaching this second round the Brickeys have surprised many, for candidly they were ranked outsiders in their first round meeting with De La Salle. It was one of the very few, however, to give them a real chance on that occasion, and I again respect in a very big way their prospects on Sunday next.

It seems probable, however, that they will have to field without Ned Lenihan, one of their stars in that first round triumph over De La Salle. The highly competent midfielder has emigrated to England since then and it seems most unlikely that he will be home for the tie.

Certainly Lenihan's absence would be a serious blow to Brickey hopes and would undoubtedly instal Ballinacourty as favourites to reach the semi-final for the first time in the club's history. They had a first round bye in this championship and though their form in Phelan Cup competition has been of a tippy turvey nature, many will fancy them to reach the penultimate stage of the campaign.

If Lenihan is an absentee—and it seems most probable that he will be, a change in their midfield set up will be inevitable. But elsewhere I expect very little change from the formation that fared so successfully against De La Salle.

The inclusion of Terry Carty at right full back has considerably bolstered the defence and on the evidence of his first round display the Dugarvan based Sergeant is a real "capture". Nicolas MacCraith, Fintan Goe and Paddy Joe Killobinet will also occupy key berths in a defence that seems certain to be sorely tested by the Ballinacourty attack.

The composition of their midfield can be no more than guess work at this stage, whilst in attack, one of the suspect sectors of the side, Justin Spratt, Patsy Murray and Jack Cooney will carry more responsibility than ever before.

It is also on the cards that either Cooney or Spratt will be moved to partner Raymond Cantwell at midfield but that could turn out to be something of a "robbing Peter to pay Paul" act.

Ballinacourty, happy in the knowledge that they can field a full strength side, will start favourites to advance. However, they are a problem side and an inconsistent one too. As they showed in a Phelan Cup game against Killobinet they can be brilliant on their day, but then how does one explain their subsequent eclipse by Stradbally in the same competition.

They are intent, however, on putting themselves in line for a first-ever County final appearance in the grade, and when one analyses the material at their disposal—players such as Pat Enright, Pkies Hogan, Pat McGovern, John McGrath, Brian O'Connor, Tony Mansfield and many others who could hold their own in any company, then it is almost imperative that they be installed favourites on Sunday.

If the Brickeys had Ned Lenihan I would rate their chances considerably brighter, but in all the circumstances the odds must weigh in 'Court's favour. The exciting prospect of advancing farther than they have ever done in this senior championship will also act as a spur to them, and for what it's worth I take them to make football history and reach the semi-final for the very first time.

DUNGARVAN'S LAST CHANCE OF A TITLE

When Dungarvan's Intermediate footballers step onto their own Frater Field on Sunday next they seem cer-

tain to be imbued with a greater determination than has been seen from any of their other championship sides this year. For on the shoulders of these footballers, rest the club's last chance of a championship title this year.

It has been a most disappointing year for the club so far, so the anxiousness to do well in this last grade is understandable. They will be the rank outsiders—no one realises that better than the players themselves—but on home soil they are all set to give this hour everything they've got. They will be bolstered by the inclusion of M. Lewis and Eddie Sheehan, both of whom missed the Intermediate hurling game against Shamrocks and this pair will considerably strengthen the defence, which has Eamonn McCarthy again as the key man at full back.

They also will have John Fennell at corner back for wing half but this ex-Stradbally man is playing in top form right now.

Midfield could present a problem for the selectors, but it will not surprise me to see a Jim Dee-Chistry Stokes partnership in action.

Up front however, the forwards fact a huge task in mastering a defence that includes senior inter-county stars, Jim Wall and Mick Connolly. Nevertheless these same forwards have been showing good form in training and if properly serviced could keep the Nire defence at full stretch.

The return of Michael Singleton and Jackie Sandford will also be a tremendous filip to them.

The very presence of Connolly and Wall of course, on the Nire side, must make them firm favourites, and though this pair tend to overshadow the other members of the side, it is far from being a two man team. Kieran O'Riyan who missed the recent hurling championship game with Fourmilewater, is also likely to be back in action and Tom Crotty, Jim Ryan and company will also backbone a highly competent side.

It is impossible to go against the weight of general opinion which leans so heavily in The Nire's favour. But Dungarvan will be a team with a mission on Sunday, a team with a reputation to salvage and should they rise to the occasion and pull off a shock win then it will be the culmination of a spell of dedicated preparation.

TWO GAME PROGRAMME AT CAPPOQUIN

A two game hurling programme has been arranged for the Cappoquin venue on Sunday afternoon, starting with the Divisional Under-21 hurling semi-final between Tallow and Geraldines. No championship game can be really termed a "cut and dried" one, but it would be the shock result of the year so far were Geraldines to pull off a win here. Tallow, having already trounced last year's champions, Lismore, in the previous round, are red hot favourites to advance and this they should do with more than a little to spare.

This tie will be followed by the meeting of Fourmilewater and Lismore in the minor hurling championship, and Lismore, backed by County minors, Billy and Ducky Ormonde, must be given the vote.

But they can expect a tough battle from a Fourmilewater side that will also have a County representative in the grade in Paddy Joe Ryan. This could be quite a close and exciting game and though Lismore may be better equipped in key sectors, which should carry the day for them, they will get little easy from the Ballymac boys.

UNDER 21 FOOTBALL SEMI-FINAL
