ALL SET FOR DUNGARVAN FESTIVAL

Varied and Attractive Programme

WHAT promises to be Dungarvan's most spectacular and elaborate Annual Festival to-date gets under way on Sunday next and will conclude eight exciting days later on the following Sunday, July 20th. This year's event has been entitled the "Shark and Shanty Festival," in honour of the major three-day International Sea Angling Competition which takes place on Friday, Saturday and Sunday of next week and which it was decided should co-incide with the annual festival. Once again the entire event has been organised by the Town's Junior Chamber of Commerce, the members of which have spared neither time nor effort to ensure the continued success of this now firmly established festival.

All over the country in recent times every town and hamlet seems to be holding a Festival, and in many cases one takes from the other. But such is happily not the case in Dungarvan, whose Festival is rightly regarded as one of the leading ones in the entire country. For months past various Sub-Committees of the Junior Chamber have been spending the hours nightly on the mammoth task of drawing up a programme of events and in finalising all arrangements. All this has now been successfully achieved, and if the weatherman decides to be kind for the week, then the Old Boro can prepare itself for an influx of very many thousands of visitors. This year's programme of events is undoubtedly the most varied and appealing ever. The entire week long programme appears elsewhere in our advertising columns, so it is therefore a pointless exercise in outlining again in detail its contents. But there are some major attractions that merit particular mention.

TALENT COMPETITION
The Organisers rightly decided on a major talent competition for this year's event and with £200 in prize money it is not surprising that very many entries have been received from various counties including far away Kildare. This competition has been kindly sponsored by Messrs. Kielys Bottling Company, Tipperary—the famous "Seven Up" people, and fittingly the competition has been entitled "Seven Up Steps to Stardom Talent Competition. Details of the entries are given on this page.

Then of course there is the International Sea Angling 3-Day event that has attracted anglers from many European countries. It is without doubt one of the biggest events ever to come to Dungarvan, and with prizes valuable to say the least, a feast of top class fishing is in store.

NEW INNOVATION
A new innovation at this year's Festival will be the Marquee Dancing, and for seven of the eight nights marquee dancing will be held to the music of top line Showbands. On each night too there will be a heat of the Miss Mermaid Beauty Competition, with the grand finale on Sunday night, when "Miss Mermaid" will be chosen.

Also deserving of mention is the child/teenagers Art Exhibition, which will be held all week, and on the closing Sunday at 3 p.m. there will be an auction of the exhibits with the proceeds going to the Dungarvan St. John's School for Mentally Handicapped Children.

The Festival too will have all the other events which in former years have helped so considerably to build up its present reputation. Such events include the 7-a-side football, Barman's races, rings and dart competitions, sailing races and water skiing exhibitions, given this year on the opening Sunday by the members of the Cork Power Boat and Ski Club.

One could simply go on and on outlining the various events, but a perusal of the advertisement in this issue, or a study of the free Festival programme available, will be well worthwhile. Suffice to say that the Junior Chamber have come up with a Festival worthy of the town and for that they deserve the thanks and appreciation of all. Whilst many have con-

tributed largely to the organising of the Festival, Committee Chairman John Coleman; the P.R.O. Vincent Byrne and the Chapter's President, Austin Hallahan, must come in for special mention.

The Festival will be officially opened at 2.30 p.m. on Sunday and the opening ceremony will, as in former years, be performed by the Town's Urban Council Chairman Mr. Thomas A. Kyme.

In welcoming everyone to our town for the week we wish them an enjoyable stay and a real swinging, happy Festival Week. But in doing so we also appeal to all for a continuance of the exemplary behaviour that has been part and parcel of every Dungarvan Festival in the past. The town's reputation in this respect is second to none, so let's not have it sullied in any way in the coming week.

Tragic Passing of Popular Colligan Man

LATE JOHN BRETT

A 24-year-old Agricultural Contractor, John Brett, of Clonmel, was killed on Wednesday night last, when the tractor he was driving overturned, pinning him beneath it. The accident occurred around 7.30 p.m. on the farm of Mr. Patrick Spratt, Cookcormack, Dungarvan, where allage making was taking place.

Medical and spiritual aid was summoned immediately and Mr. Brett was attended by Dr. Brendan McCarthy before being removed by ambulance to Dungarvan District Hospital, where he died within a short time. An inquest will be held.

The deceased was closely associated with Macra na Feirme, Dungarvan Go-Kart Club, and the Colligan G.A.A. Club. As a mark of respect, the Annual field Evening and dance of Dungarvan Macra na Feirme, due to be held this Friday, has been cancelled, as has the Go-Kart Racing scheduled for the opening of Dungarvan Festival Week on Sunday.

The remains will leave the District Hospital at 8 p.m., this (Thursday) to Colligan Church, and burial will take place in the adjoining cemetery on Friday morning.

He is survived by his parents, brothers, sisters and relatives, to whom sincere sympathy is extended on their tragic bereavement.

Sinn Fein Statement on Rents Issue Golf Win

Following a meeting of the Dungarvan Sinn Fein Cumann to discuss the Rents issue, the following statement was issued to the Press:—

It is painfully obvious from the attitude of the Co. Manager expressed at the last U.D.C. meeting discussion of the Rents issue that if the workers are not to be further exploited a more radical involvement by the Tenants' Association is an immediate necessity.

Mr. O'Connor's reaction to opposition to the increases was a glib crack about teething troubles—a typical dictatorial civil service attitude. If Mr. O'Connor could float down from his ivory tower of bureaucracy he might be forced to realise that his idea of teething troubles may mean bread and butter to families in this town and every town in Ireland.

Top priority should be given to the setting up of a hard line action committee with a view to positive action. This committee would visit all council tenants and compile a list of grievances, rents, state of repairs, age of house, original cost of construction, etc., as the door to door method of rent collection is being used not merely for rent collection, but to collect data on workers living standards, with a view to petty exploitation, and the committee should advise tenants to refuse to avail of this system and encourage them to pay their rents at the Town Hall, thus breaking an important link in the chain of the establishment.

In the event of a confrontation it would be expected that at least moral support would be had from the Trade Union movement, and that U.D.C. members, regardless of Party affiliations, would stand up and be counted.

The committee could count on the full weight of "The Rerubican Movement" at national level, so that any money forced from workers to provide huge salaries for overpaid underworked officials would be dearly bought.

The defendant said it would be okay and told him to take the car to the garage. Coming out of Mass later he (witness) explained to the defendant where he was wrong and also showed him the mud on the road from his car. He (witness) was eight feet out from the kerb when struck.

Supt. English said he told Walsh that they could get an Independent Garda to investigate the matter because he did not want Walsh to be under any duress, but Walsh decided not to send for the Guards. He (witness) took the car to a garage in Waterford and it cost £10 to repair which he paid for. He presented the bill to Walsh but he refused to pay it.

Supt. English said Walsh Cross-examined by Mr. E. P. King (for the plaintiff) admitted telling the Supt. that it would be alright to send the car to the garage. He did not want to get involved with the law because people belonging to him also

were in the law. Justice Skinner to Walsh: When you are pulling out it not it your job to see that traffic is coming and to give a signal? You did not look to see if there was any traffic coming?

Mr. Walsh: I did not think it was necessary because I was not pulling out into the line of traffic. I was going straight ahead to go around the corner.

Mr. John Creed said he was selling flags for the Brass Band outside the church gates that morning. He saw Walsh's car which he thought was coming up the road and he felt that one of those cars sliced in a bit and struck Walsh's, which was in by the kerb.

Michael Walsh, son of the defendant, said he got out of his father's car at the top of Mary Street. He did not see any flow of traffic coming, and he beckoned his father to come forward, when, suddenly English's car came at a speed in excess of what the Supt. had stated and he seemed to be making for the same parking space as he was guiding his father into. The plaintiff's car then struck his father's.

Replying to Mr. King, Solr., witness said he did not see the Supt.'s car until it struck their car.

Justice Skinner to witness: Yet seconds ago, in direct evidence, you said you saw the Supt.'s car coming at a speed in excess of what he had stated.

Witness: It is only a matter of words.

Justice Skinner: It is a matter of the Oath.

Justice Skinner granted the plaintiff the £100 decree, together with costs and expenses.

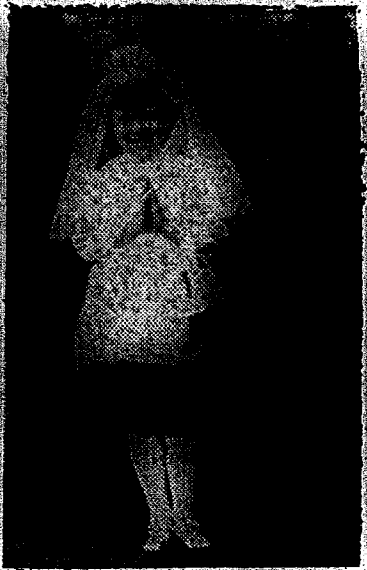

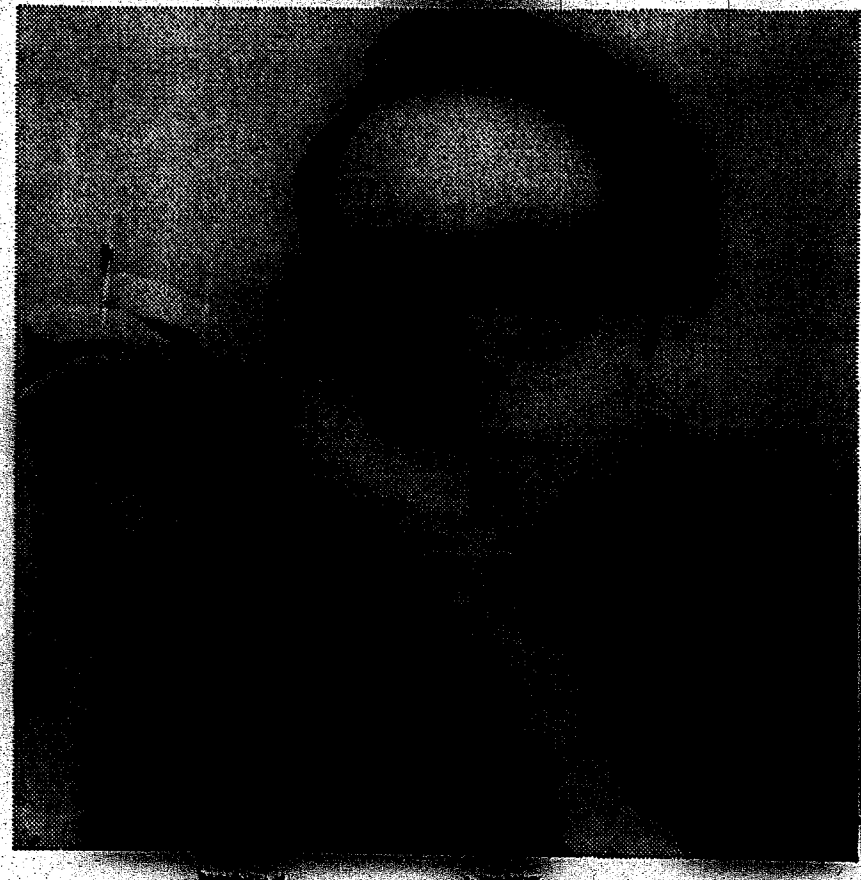

LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

Dear Sir, Before I proceed to tear Mr. Curran's reply to my recent letter apart, I would like to point out that I do not purport to represent either of the Opposition Parties in the present discussion, but wish to express my own opinion, which may or may not concur with the present policies of Fine Gael or Labour, but which certainly are unlikely to be in line with Fianna Fail policy (possibly because none appears to exist).

Mr. Curran says that the system whereby most large farmers produce beef and large quantities of milk is best for the national economy, and leaves it at that, with no justification whatsoever. In other words he says that I am wrong and he is right, although I at least gave some reasons why I thought I was right, and he does no such thing. Another example of the Fianna Fail "we can't be wrong" attitude! I still maintain that it would serve the country better if the large farmers specialised in beef production, and the smaller farmers in dairying, as this would ease somewhat the export subsidy caused by dairy overproduction, and might also help to fill our quota for store cattle under the Anglo-Irish Free Trade Agreement, which quota represents about the only praise-worthy clause left in that ill-fated agreement, and which also represents just about the only demand left in the world for any kind of agricultural product.

One admits that it is difficult to separate economics from politics, and Mr. Curran may be correct when he describes as "a device to capture the city vote" the F.G. and Labour statements that if elected to office they would "review the present policy on agricultural subsidies and grants, with a view to relieving the burden on the taxpayer." Well, I say that not only would this policy be reviewed and many of the grants and subsidies be cut out, but also that any farmer with the ability to pay should be taxed and rated the same as any ordinary worker. It is about time that the farmers of this country, and many other people besides, realised that farming is an economic enterprise and should be treated as such, and not as some sort of God-given, indisputable right that has to be protected by the Government at all costs.

But, of course, as long as over 30% of the population continues to live on the land, no political party is likely to act sensibly with regard to farming. However, as soon as the ageing farmers of the West, most of whom have no successors, due to celibacy or emigration, begin to die off in the near future, then the great stronghold of the F.F. Party will begin to disappear rapidly and that Party will find its dominant position untenable.

Mr. Curran refers to the gross mismanagement of the second Inter-Party Government. Now, while I do not like delving into the past, I must point out that that Government established the Industrial Development Authority and the scheme of incentives for attracting foreign industry, which together have been the principal reasons for the tremendous buoyancy of the economy ever since, for which the present Fianna Fail regime has claimed sole responsibility.

Statistics can be great bars and so one should not be fooled when it is pointed out that 85% of the grants went to farmers of under 75 acres, under the Calfed Heifer Scheme, for one big farmer with 100 heifers can make the same money as 50 small farmers with only 2 heifers apiece. Thus the differential between the big and the small farmer is increased greatly. I have been told of a number of cases where big farmers bought up hundreds of heifers when they were cheap before the scheme was announced, and so called in to a considerable extent, subsequently. Then, while Mr. Colley speaks of the need for integrity in high places, the purse of TACA becomes swelled even further. Why, the Government might as well appropriate money directly from the Exchequer for Party purposes!

The figure which I quoted as the Health Bill to be paid in Waterford in the current year from the rates, (£475,000), was given to me by a leading county council official. Mr. Curran says that this is only 44% of the present scheme in Waterford. Then, either the official or Mr. Curran is misinformed, or else the balance of the scheme is paid for from the Exchequer. Whichever is correct, I claim exemption from any discrepancies which may appear in this matter. But

During her voyage she averaged seven knots and consumed 450 tons of coal. The Sirius arrived at New York on April 22nd.

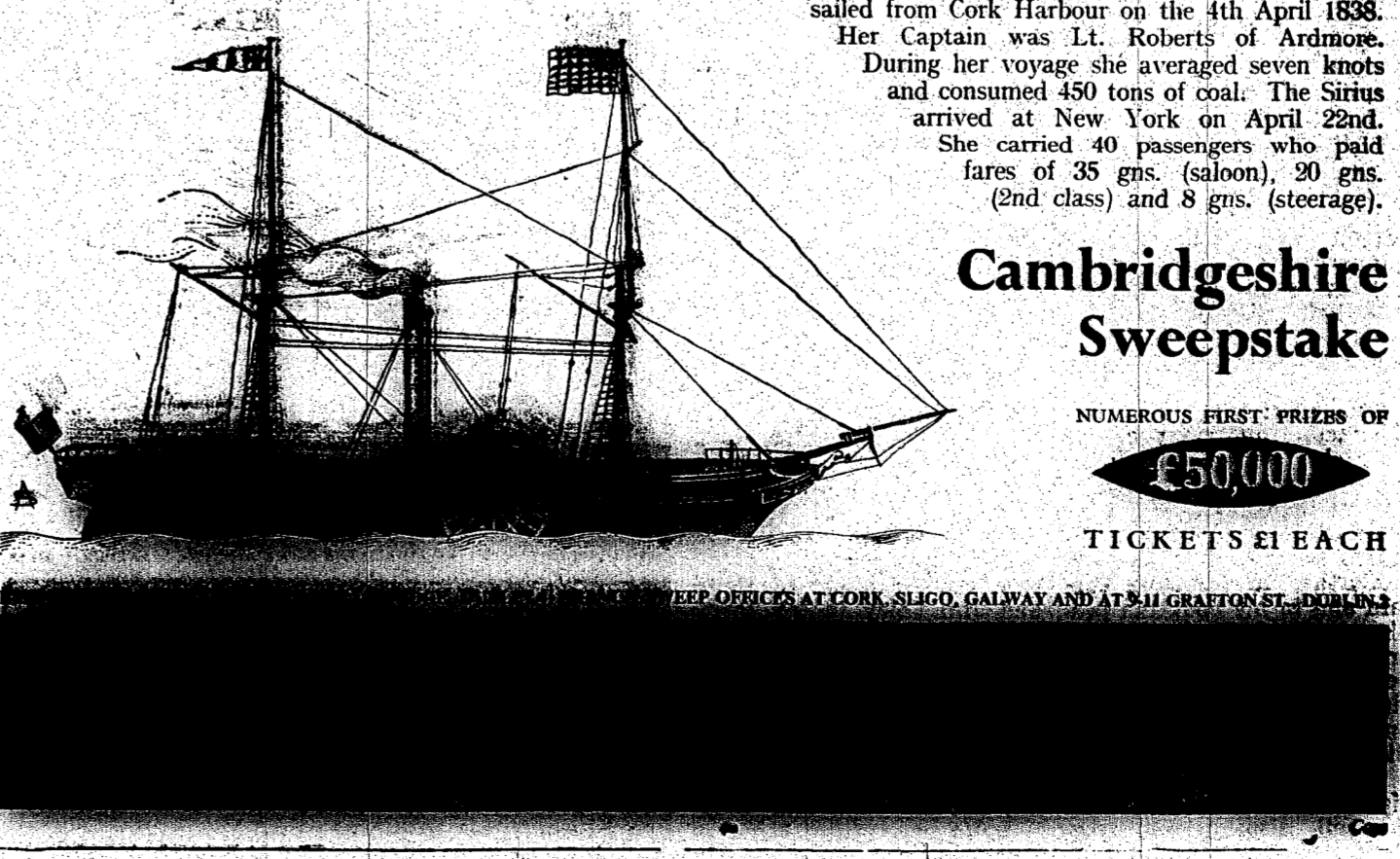

The Nire Win as Dugarvan Fade in Second Half

DUGARVAN 1-3

DUGARVAN'S failure to "stay the pace" put to rest their intermediate football championship hopes at the Fraker field, Sunday last, and as expected the Nire qualified for a second round "show-down" with the Stradbally team. It was a victory they deserved however, for since the team had been in the game since the start, they were the more masters of the field.

This Dugarvan's hopes of a championship title in this year have been dashed. The non-appearance of their outside based players Michael Lewis and John Sheehan threw an extra burden on their already limited playing material and after a highly professional first half display, they fell away on the second half.

Down the middle the Nire were strongest, and it was this strength in the key positions which ultimately paved the way for their clear cut win. The defensive rampart formed by Jim Wall and Eamon O'Ryan was too much for the Dugarvan attack, and their dominance of the field took its inevitable toll and constant pressure eventually paid off in the nature of match-winning scores.

It would no doubt have been a much closer affair but for Dugarvan's failure to pick off some glit edged points chances in the opening half. On at least three occasions these minor scores were there for the taking, and if capitalised on would have made for a more stern brand of second half resistance. But in fairness to the Nire too it must be stressed that on the day victory was richly the reward of the better all round side.

EMMETTS BEGINNING
For a team endeavouring to cause an upset, this tie was a disastrous beginning for Dugarvan. Within minutes Paddy Joe Ryan fastened onto the ball past Frank O'Keefe. Nevertheless Dugarvan came much more into the game subsequently and when the Nire defence twice committed indiscretions, Jackie Sandford obliged with points from the resultant free.

The homeside now moved with confidence, and when Sandford snatched up the ball chance on the quarter hour to crash home a fine goal a shock result was very much on the cards. The Nire hit back however for points by Austin Barron and John Fraker, and at the interval the score was no nearer solution with the sides level at 1-3 each.

But unknown to most Dugarvan had by now shot their bolt. A lack of fitness told on many once that second half got under way, and when Paddy Joe Ryan and Mick Connolly had quick points it was the beginning of the end for Dugarvan. In the 10th minute an Austin Barron goal was more or less the coup de grace for Dugarvan and they added a further goal and three points to Dugarvan's solitary point reply from Michael Sheehan.

For the Nire, Tom Crotty was an eminently sound goalkeeper, and if Jim Wall and Eamon Ryan stood out in defence, Walter Wall and John Ryan were also most effective. The combined forces of Mick Connolly and Johnny Fitzpatrick gave them a decided midfield pull, and up front the wiles of Paddy Joe Ryan, Jim Ryan and Austin Barron was too much for the Dugarvan defence.

After such a promising first half display, Dugarvan's subsequent total fade-out was as surprising as it was unexpected. Undoubtedly lack of fitness was a telling factor, but many of the side also wilted when the tide of battle began to flow against them.

Their really outstanding player was full back Eamonn McCarthy, an inspiring captain and in my book the best player afield. Even when all around him colleagues were being over-run "Mac" continued to perform heroically and his was a truly superb display.

Peter Hayes tried hard at right half back and John Fennell also played some good defensive football. Goal

keeper Frank O'Keefe was also faultless. Christy Stokes had a fine game at midfield, despite his tendency to roam out of position, and Jackie Sandford was the outstanding member of an attack that never really clicked.

STRADBALLY battled their way to the Western Under 21 football championship final at Dugarvan on Sunday night last when they scored a really hard earned two points victory over Affane, in a game that lived up to all pre-match expectations. It was tough and uncompromising; it was close and exciting, and above all it produced passages of first class football from both victors and vanquished.

Stradbally, the physically stronger side, just about deserved their victory, but really had Affane forced a draw there could have been few quibbles either. And it might so very easily have ended in stalemate had not Affane ridiculously overplayed the ball during a spell of second half ascendency when at least the two points, by which they eventually lost, were thrown away by virtual fooling around goal.

Three times the scores were level, and on six occasions a mere point separated the sides. But it was Stradbally who finished the stronger and they had the brace of decisive points in the closing ten minutes.

Affane had slightly the better of the first half exchanges and their half time lead of 1-5 to 1-4 was well deserved. With ten minutes of the second half gone they still led by a point—1-6 to 1-5, but during a subsequent spell of supremacy they simply endeavoured to walk the ball into the Stradbally net, and as a result lost quite a number of feasible scoring chances. Eventually the Reds got on level terms, and it was they who finished the game in command. Eight minutes from time John Kieley edged them in front, other minor—the game's final score, in the 25th minute.

For the winners Pat Dufford was an eminently safe goalkeeper and if Ala Curran was their hero in defence, the sector was also ably served by full back Michael Coffey and Pat Connell.

Tom Halpin did tropan work at midfield, and up front the real danger men were Robin Ahearne, Virgie Power, John Kieley and P. J. Coleman.

Affane, no doubt, will rate themselves decidedly unlucky to have gone under, and whilst this may be true to a certain extent, they have only themselves to blame.

Their defence was a solid, defiant unit, with Vinny Tobin, Pat Scanlon, L. Denn and Jim Foley in top form. Martin Arrigan and Michael Hackett both played top class football at midfield, and in attack the main threat was presented by Pat "Nappy" Morrissey and Denis McCarthy.

SENSATIONAL BRICKEYS Belated Goals Decisive

BRICKEYS ... 5-2 **BALLINACOURTY** ... 2-9
FOR many the trek homewards had already begun; less than fifteen minutes of this senior football championship game at Dugarvan on Sunday last remained, and Ballinacourty in complete control, were literally coasting to victory. They were ahead 2-9 to 2-1 and it could and should have been an even greater lead. All that remained to be determined was the final margin of victory. But then came a sensational, dramatic transformation that saw Brickey's crash home three goals in seven minutes to give them a victory that no one had believed possible for most of the hour.

This was without doubt one of the most amazing championship results ever to emanate from this or any other venue in the county. It was little short of a travesty of justice for so clearly superior were Ballinacourty for so long that they should have won this tie with quite an amount to spare. But instead they were caught up in a whirlwind scoring spree, and in a matter of minutes the dominance they had exerted for so long was gone completely by the boards. It was truly a fantastic finale to a game that will be talked about when many others are long forgotten.

Just how 'Courty caved in so badly in view of the grip they held for forty five minutes, is almost impossible to explain. All credit must be given to the winners for their tremendous fighting comeback, but one must say too that some of the goals scored never have been conceded by a defence that was never really happy. The two Brickey goals in the first half came direct from '50s, and two of the second half goals in the closing stages came when forwards were allowed solo right through for cock shots at goal.

From the opening whistle Ballinacourty took firm control, and with Pat Enright and Rogie Cashin the complete midfield masters, the Brickey defence was subjected to virtually non-stop pressure. Within a minute Joe Flynn pointed and seconds later, Michael Power added a second. Rogie Cashin had a brace in the 4th and 8th minutes, and Pat Enright made it 6-5 without reply.

Already the transfer of Patsy Murray from centre forward to midfield was having its desired effect, and from the moment of his advent to that latter sector he succeeded in completely breaking the Enright-Cashin

stranglehold. He, above all, was the Brickey's inspiration and he more than anyone else must be accorded prime credit for victory.

Fourteen minutes from time came the first of the Brickey goals, when Justin Spratt was allowed solo through almost from midfield and his parting drive wound up in the net. The goal rush was under way.

Two minutes later Michael Spratt tapped home another Brickey goal past a hesitant Brian O'Connor, and the keeper merely looked on in virtual amazement as the same player scored yet another goal in the 22nd minute. Unbelievably Brickey's had hit the front, and they tacked on a point for good measure by Ned Lenihan in the 24th minute. 'Courty tried desperately to salvage the game in the closing stages, and might have done so had they not foolishly sought goals from two close in frees in the dying moments. But the Brickey's held on for a win that even their most avid followers will readily concede was hardly deserved on the overall run of the play.

But then in the 14th minute came the first of those gift Brickey goals, when Fintan Gee's well placed '50' was allowed go untouched to the net. However, Michael Power quickly replied with a Ballinacourty goal and further points from Cashin and Enright (free) consolidated their commanding position still further. Gee pointed a Brickey free in the 22nd minute, and four minutes later the same player had yet another goal direct from a '50' although it may have been deflected in by Patsy Donnelly.

Incredibly, 'Courty led by a mere three points despite enjoying at least 90% possession. However, two minutes from half time Duck Whelan gave the scoreline a more balanced picture of events when he crashed home a fine goal, and unflatteringly the losers led 2-7 to 2-1 at the break.

The restart brought a further continuance of Ballinacourty supremacy. Within a minute Enright pointed a free, and another Cashin point after eleven minutes left eight points between the sides. To all intents and purposes the issue had been decided, and many began to wend their way homewards. But the sensational side of this game was yet to come.

Up front the Spratts, Justin and Michael, were the scorers of the vital second half goals, and the return of veteran Patsy Donnelly at full forward added to the potency of the line.

Defensive flaws
Ballinacourty's greatest weakness was the flaws emanating from the net minding berth where Brian O'Connor had a nightmare hour, and must shoulder responsibility for at least two of the goals. The half back

trio of Joe Power, John McGrath and Larry Cliffe all had their moments, though major scores might have been averted had they fouled the Brickey forwards en transit for goal in the closing stages.

For forty minutes Pat Enright and Rogie Cashin played superb football at midfield, where they were complete masters, but faded from the scene when Murray arrived in the sector.

Up front the Ballinacourty forwards played well enough to win most games. All six thrived on the lavish service and some of the scores were brilliantly and skilfully taken. But, alas, all was in vain in the end.

Pintan Gee, apart from his invaluable first half scores, was their top defender, in a sector also well served by Terry Carty, Jim Spratt and Paddy Joe Killigrew.

Down through the years the Abbeyside school has been the nursery which produced some of the finest hurlers in West Waterford. This year's league is again being organised by Mr. M. Foley, N.T., in his usual efficient manner.

Four teams are taking part and the captains are Brendan Hogan, Kevin Frost, Deckie Hourigan and Jim Kieley and the big question of the moment is which captain will lead his team to victory and receive the Jack Mulcahy Perpetual Cup on Final Night.

EMMETTS CAN ADVANCE

A game as open as the proverbial barn door is the most apt way of summing up next Sunday's Intermediate football championship game at Dugarvan (3.15) between the Collihan Emmetts and Clashmore-Kinsalebeg. Both are amongst the best equipped sides in this particular grade, but alas, only one can survive on Sunday next, and for what its worth Emmetts are my choice to advance to the next round.

There can be no denying the fact Emmetts were the unlucky side of last year's championship. They shocked Old Parish in round one and then did everything but beat the eventual Divisional champions Ardmore in round two. They were decidedly unfortunate to lose that game, and on that reckoning must be amongst the real front runners for ultimate honours this year. Their hurling win over Tallow has imbued the club with a tremendous spirit and they have trained quite diligently for Sunday's game.

Certainly they are not lacking in top class footballers, and players like Colin Bannon, Jim, John and Percy Ahearne, James Hickey, Faddy Walsh, Paddy Fitzgerald, the Tobins, Frank and Dick, and Jack Kieley, could hold their own in any company.

INTRIGUING U-21 HURLING FINAL

What bids fair to be one of the best Divisional finals of the year has been scheduled for the Lismore venue on Sunday next (3.15) when Tallow and Cappoquin meet to decide who takes over the vacant champion role since Lismore surrendered the title two months ago. Here, believe me, is a pairing capable of making this a really great final, and it is a very brave man indeed who would plump with any degree of confidence for either of them.

In reaching Sunday's final both sides have been impressive to a degree of near perfection. Tallow I know have fancied themselves in this grade from the very outset, and certainly when they routed Lismore in the quarter final, they became the favourites to take the title. In last Sunday's semi-final they had little more than a valuable training spin, and catered to an 8-7 to 1-1 victory over Geashlines. Their followers will not hear of defeat on Sunday, but deep down too there is a very marked respect for the opposition.

Tallow will field their full strength side on Sunday and that means the inclusion of their "big brass" Tom Doyle, John and Michael Hartigan, Pat Hegarty, Mutty Curley, but if these are the key men of the side the remainder too are very accomplished hurlers. Doubtless with this array of talent they must start favourites.

In reaching Sunday's final however, a feature of the Cappoquin side has been the magnificence of their half trio Frank McCarthy, Martin Arrigan and John Millea. They have proved themselves an unpassable barrier to date, and if they are to win Tallow will have to break down this defiant phalanx. They are powerfully equipped too at midfield, where Pat Morrissey and Vinny Tobin form a highly effective partnership, and no doubt it is around the brilliance of this quintet that Cappoquin will rely on most for victory.

The attack, despite containing fine hurlers in Monty Scaglion, Denis McCarthy,

Michael Hackett and Pat Scanlon, has not been over-impressive, but if the supply to them is good on Sunday, they could realise their full scoring potential.

Yes, view this final whatever way you will, and if all boils down to a classic hour. Tallow I suppose will start favourites, and certainly it is very difficult to oppose them. But even so the brilliance of that half back trio of Cappoquin's remains uppermost in my mind when previewing this game, and to win Tallow must succeed where all other half forward lines have failed to date.

EIRE OG STRONGLY FANCHED

In many quarters Eire Og are regarded as a pretty good proposition to take Divisional honours in the Junior football championship grade. But in Kilgobnet they face a pretty stiff first hurdle at Dugarvan on Sunday night next (7.30) and this could be a far closer game than many people expect.

Eire Og have been considerably strengthened by the inclusion of former Brickey men Peter Ferris, Willie Terry and John Woods on their side, and in addition Michael Woods has been transferred to them from Dugarvan. They also have first class footballers in midfielder Tony McCarthy, Dec Hayes and Mickay Frerher, whilst it is also probable that John Moylan's reinstatement will have been finalised by Sunday, thus allowing him to team up with Tony McCarthy at midfield.
