Brilliant Weather Favours Festival

IN glorious sunshine, Dungarvan's annual Shark and Shanty Festival was officially opened on Sunday last by the Chairman of Dungarvan Urban Council, Mr. Thomas A. Kyne. On opening day several thousands of visitors thronged the town and when the halfway mark had been reached on Wednesday night one could already say that this year's event will be an overwhelming success.

On the platform for the Official opening on the Square on Sunday were Mr. Kyne, Mr. Austin Hallahan, President, Dungarvan Junior Chamber of Commerce, the Organisers of the Festival, Mr. John Coleman, Chairman of the Festival Committee; Mr. Eoin Goode, J.C.C. Secretary; Mr. Tom Ryan, of the Festival Committee and Mr. Vincent Byrne, the Junior Chamber's Public Relations Officer.

In opening the Festival, Mr. Kyne said the Dungarvan Festival was now one of the most firmly established Annual Festivals in the country. He thanked the Junior Chamber for all they were doing to boost the town, and paid a special tribute to them for the opening of a new Children's Playground at Quann's. He appealed to all attending the week long Festival to maintain the high degree of good conduct which has been a feature of their previous Festivals.

Mr. Kyne went on to congratulate publicly the Dungarvan Brass and Reed Band and its Conductor Mr. A. Hennebery on winning All-Ireland honours at the recent Brass and Reed Band Championships. They had brought further honour to the Old Boro, he added.

Then, to the strains of "Dungarvan My Home Town" played by the Brass and Reed Band, the Festival was officially opened.

Prior to Mr. Kyne's address however, Mr. Austin Hallahan, President of J.C.C. extended a cordial welcome to all their visitors. This year's festival, he said, had been postponed to coincide with a three day International Gold Medal Sea Angling Competition being held this coming Friday, Saturday and Sunday. They in Dungarvan, he said, believed that the town had the potential and amenities to make it the leading sea angling centre in the country. The entries from Ireland, Britain and the Continent for this event, he said, was adequate proof that that belief was well founded.

Mr. Hallahan went on to thank their local and outside sponsors, but expressed his regret that the overall contribution to the Festival Fund was not all it should have been. The Festival, he said, was a community effort and deserved more of a community effort than had been shown.

EVENTS

Among the spectacular events of opening day was a splendid Water Skiing Exhibition in the harbour by members of the Cork Power Boat and Ski Club. There was also a Car Safety Rally the overall winner of which was Mrs. Terry Donnelly, Connolly Row, Dungarvan.

The Child/Teenagers Art Exhibition is a tremendous success and it goes on for the entire week. However, as a mark of respect to the late John Brett, Dungarvan, the Go Kart Racing scheduled for Sunday last, was postponed, and will now be held on Sunday next.

TALENT COMPETITION

One of the main attractions however of the Festival has been the "Seven Up Steps to Stardom" £200 Talent Competition, sponsored by Messrs. Kiely's of Tipperary. The standard of the entries generally speaking, has been very high, and the packed audiences for the heats at the Friary Hall were loud in their praise of this event.

WANTS SEA RESCUE UNIT FOR DUNGARVAN

A request that a Sea Rescue Unit on the same lines as that in Tramore be based in the Dungarvan Harbour area, was made by Mr. Austin Deasy at last Monday's meeting of Waterford County Council in Dungarvan.

Mr. Deasy said practically every coastal area in the County had some kind of facilities, but none at all existed in Dungarvan at present. Since the withdrawal of the Helvick Lifeboat last March there were no lifesaving facilities in the Harbour, including the much-used Clonea Strand. This was a matter of vital importance, he added.

The Chairman, Mr. Curran pointed out however, that the provision of a Sea Rescue Unit was not the function of the County Council, but it was agreed that a report on the situation would be available for the next meeting.

Regretted Demise of John Brett

CROUGH, COLLIGAN

It is with feelings of profound regret that we record the tragic death of 34 year old John Brett, Crough, Colligan, Dungarvan, which occurred on Wednesday night, 9th July, following a tractor accident on the farm of Mr. Patrick Spratt, Coolcormack. An agricultural contractor by occupation, John was son of Mr. and Mrs. Pierce Brett.

The accident occurred during the making of silage, when the tractor he was driving overturned, pinning him beneath. Medical aid was rendered by Dr. B. McCarthy and he was removed by ambulance to Dungarvan district hospital, but died within a very short time.

The deceased was one of the best known, most popular and respected figures in the county. He was a man of gay, but unassuming character, and one who enjoyed the admiration and friendship of all. Behind the youthful buoyancy he portrayed, he was a man whom anyone could honestly be proud to call a friend. He never knew when to stop obliging others and it was this particular trait of character of his that made him such a respected figure.

John was prominently associated with a number of local organisations, to all of whom he gave loyal and valuable membership. For many years he was a member of the Colligan Rockies and Emmets G.A.A. clubs and was a former Chairman and Treasurer of the Club. But undoubtedly he was best known through his Association with Macra na Feirme and by his untimely passing the Dungarvan Branch has lost one of its most dedicated members. Almost inevitably too his love of cars led to him becoming a member of the local Go-Kart Club. Fittingly too all three organisations cancelled fixtures scheduled for last weekend as a mark of respect to him.

family are held was illustrated on Thursday evening when the removal of remains took place from the local hospital to Colligan Church. The cortege was the largest and most representative ever seen in the Colligan Parish. At the church a guard of honour was formed by members of the Colligan G.A.A. Club, the Dungarvan Macra na Feirme and Go Kart Clubs. The coffin was also draped in the Black and Amber of the Colligan G.A.A. Club.

Following Requiem Masses on Friday morning the interment took place in the ad-

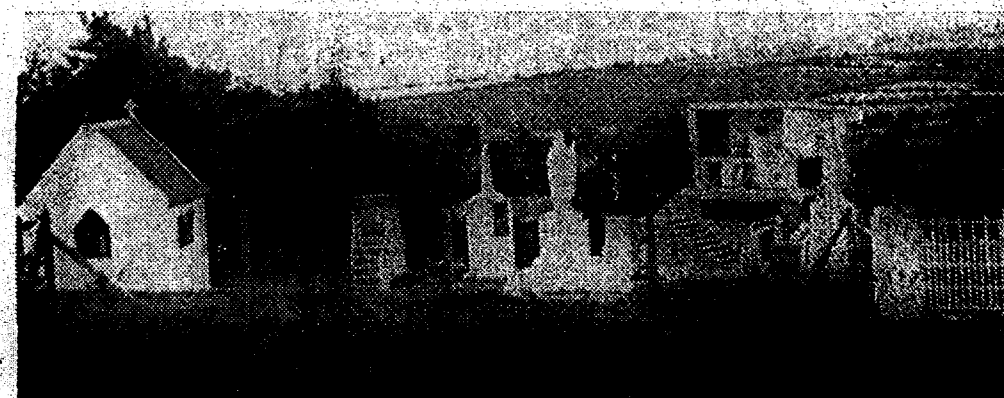

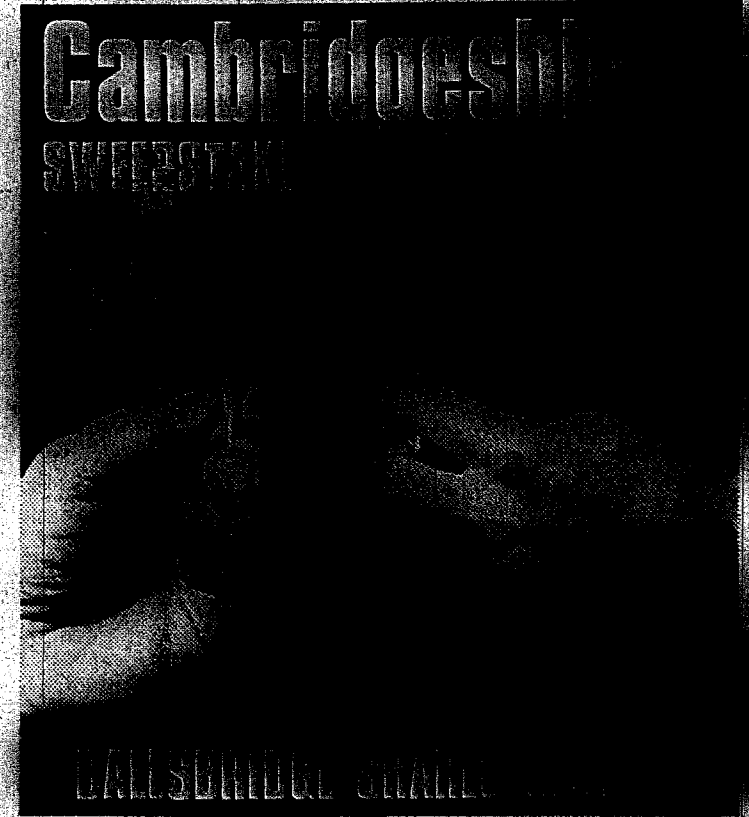

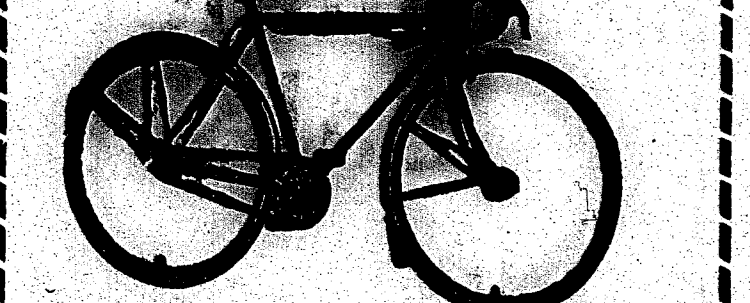

CHAIRMAN RE-ELECTED . . . VICE-CHAIRMAN LOSES BY ONE VOTE

MR. CHARLES CURRAN, F.F., the outgoing Chairman of Waterford County Council, was, as expected, unanimously re-elected for another 12 months term of Office at last Monday's meeting of the Council in Dungarvan. But the outgoing Vice-Chairman, Mr. Norman Walsh (F.G.) was beaten for the post by another F.F. nominee, Sean Whelan, by 12 votes to 11.

Mr. Curran's re-election was proposed by Mr. J. Fahey, T.D., and seconded by Mr. W. Kenneally, T.D. Proposing Mr. Walsh for the Vice-Chair, Mr. Austin Deasy said it was a pity that they couldn't have a rotational type of Chair thus giving all parties a crack of the whip in this. Fianna Fail, however, had the majority on the Council and because of their superior numbers were entitled to the Chair. He felt, however, that they should unanimously re-elect the outgoing Vice-Chairman, Mr. Walsh.

Mr. M. J. Shalloe seconded.

Mr. W. Kenneally, T.D., proposing Sean Whelan for the post said that whilst he agreed with Mr. Deasy about rotating the Chair, the middle of a five year term of office was not the time to decide on that.

Mr. J. Fahey, T.D., seconded Mr. Whelan's nomination. Mr. Whelan was then elected by 12 votes to 11. He received the votes of all 12 F.F. members whilst Mr. Walsh received the votes of the 10 F.G. members and that of the lone Labour member Tom Kyne.

THANKS

The Chairman, Mr. Curran thanked the members for re-electing him unanimously and said this would be his last year as Chairman for several reasons. He also congratulated Mr. Whelan on his election but expressed personal regret at Mr. Walsh's defeat because he had given wonderful service in his capacity as Vice-Chairman over the years.

Mr. Whelan said there was nothing personal in his allowing his name to go forward for the Vice-Chair and said Mr. Walsh had always acted very fairly and capably in that post. Thanking those who voted for him, Mr. Walsh said he bore no ill will against those who opposed him. This was democracy, he said, and he accepted the majority decision of the Council. He congratulated Mr. Curran on his reelection which he said was an honour richly deserved as he had acted with dignity and impartiality at all times. Mr. Curran was also economy minded and what was needed most in this County and Country were economy minded representatives. He assured the members that he would continue to do his best in the capacity of an ordinary Council member.

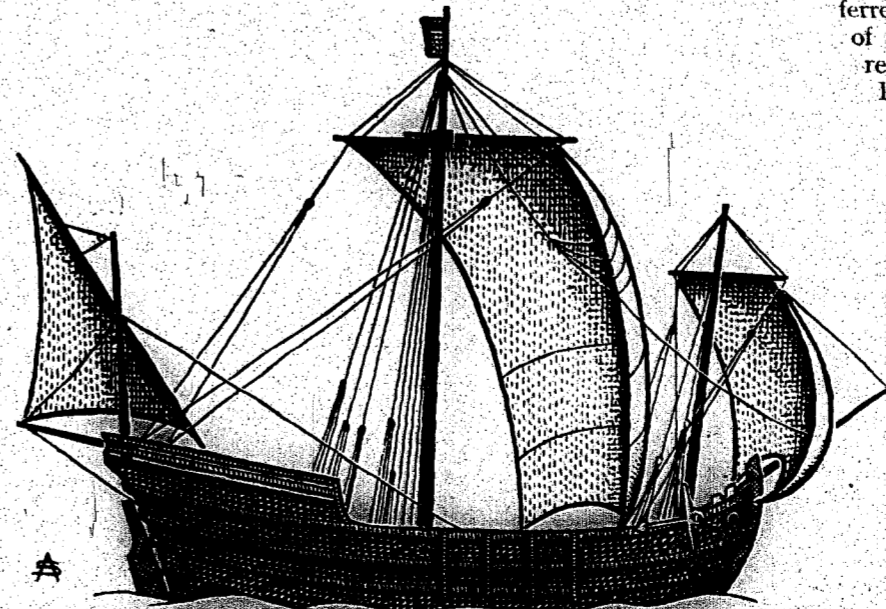

"Water Emergency in Ballylanean"

PROMISES were no longer any good because there was a water emergency in the area, Mr. Patrick Cahill told last Monday's meeting of Waterford Co. Council in Dungarvan when he introduced a deputation from the Ballylanean area over the inadequate water supply servicing the people there.

Mr. Cahill said there were about 20 families involved and something would have to be done to improve the supply there. There was now a water emergency in Ballylanean and it was useless to tell them that something would be done next year. Action was needed now, he added.

Mr. Kieran O'Ryan said in his area of Ballymacarbery there were several places without a water supply, and yet the Council had decided to finance a scheme to the extent of £100,000 at Ballinacourt for a multi-millionaire concern. It reflected shame on the Council, he said.

Mr. Phil Cusack, supporting the Deputation, said they should have been before the Council three years ago.

Mr. John Keane said this was something he had been pressing for since he became a member of the Council. The present supply was disgracefully inadequate and something would have to be done for these people without delay.

Mr. J. Fahey, T.D., said these people were in a desperate plight for water, and he was appealing to the Council to do everything possible to bring relief to these people.

Mr. H. R. Dowd said the worst day's work they ever did on this Council was when they decided not to go ahead with their planned Regional Water Schemes for the County.

In a report on the situation in Ballylanean, the County Engineer, Mr. J. D. Hally said he was aware that the present Supply was unsatisfactory and that it had been for some time past. However, the water was being used for milk cooling and the supply was not capable of meeting that demand and that was part of the problem. If it was only used for domestic purposes it would go a long way towards meeting the demand.

Mr. Hally said a Minor Water supply such as this was designed for domestic purposes only, and this was the only failure out of forty similar cases. There was about 7,000 gallons coming from the supply a week.

Col. Bull, chief spokesman for the Deputation, said the

position was really drastic and something would have to be done to improve it, and the sooner the better. They were here he said to demonstrate the importance and seriousness of the situation.

Mr. Hally said as soon as he could get an alternative source for the supply he would go ahead. They would do what they could as quickly as they could, but they just could not conjure up water like thin air.

Mr. Norman Walsh said this problem existed all over the county. They had to admit that they made a major mistake in not going ahead with the Regional Schemes.

Mrs. Margaret Phelan said she had eleven children and was in a desperate plight for water. They were not getting 700 gallons a week, not to mind 7,000 and that was a ridiculous statement by the Co. Engineer.

Deputy John Fahey said with the exception of Tom Kyne they all yielded to outside pressures when scrapping the planned Regional Schemes and that was a major blunder on their part. It was time, he said, that they took a good look at all their Water supplies in the county.

Mr. Hally said if he could get an adequate alternative source of supply in Ballylanean he would take immediate action. They had been check-

ing on sources, but had not come up with anything definite yet. He agreed to look around the area with members of the Deputation and local Cols.

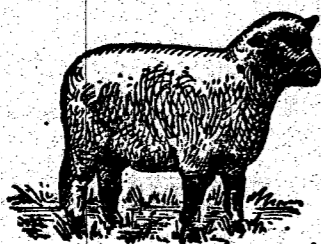

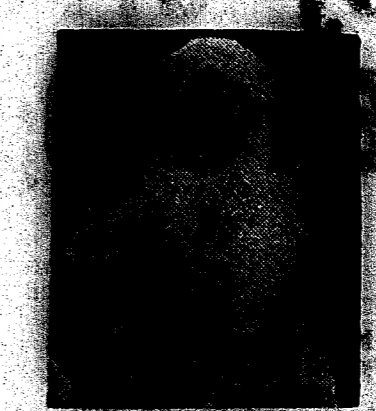

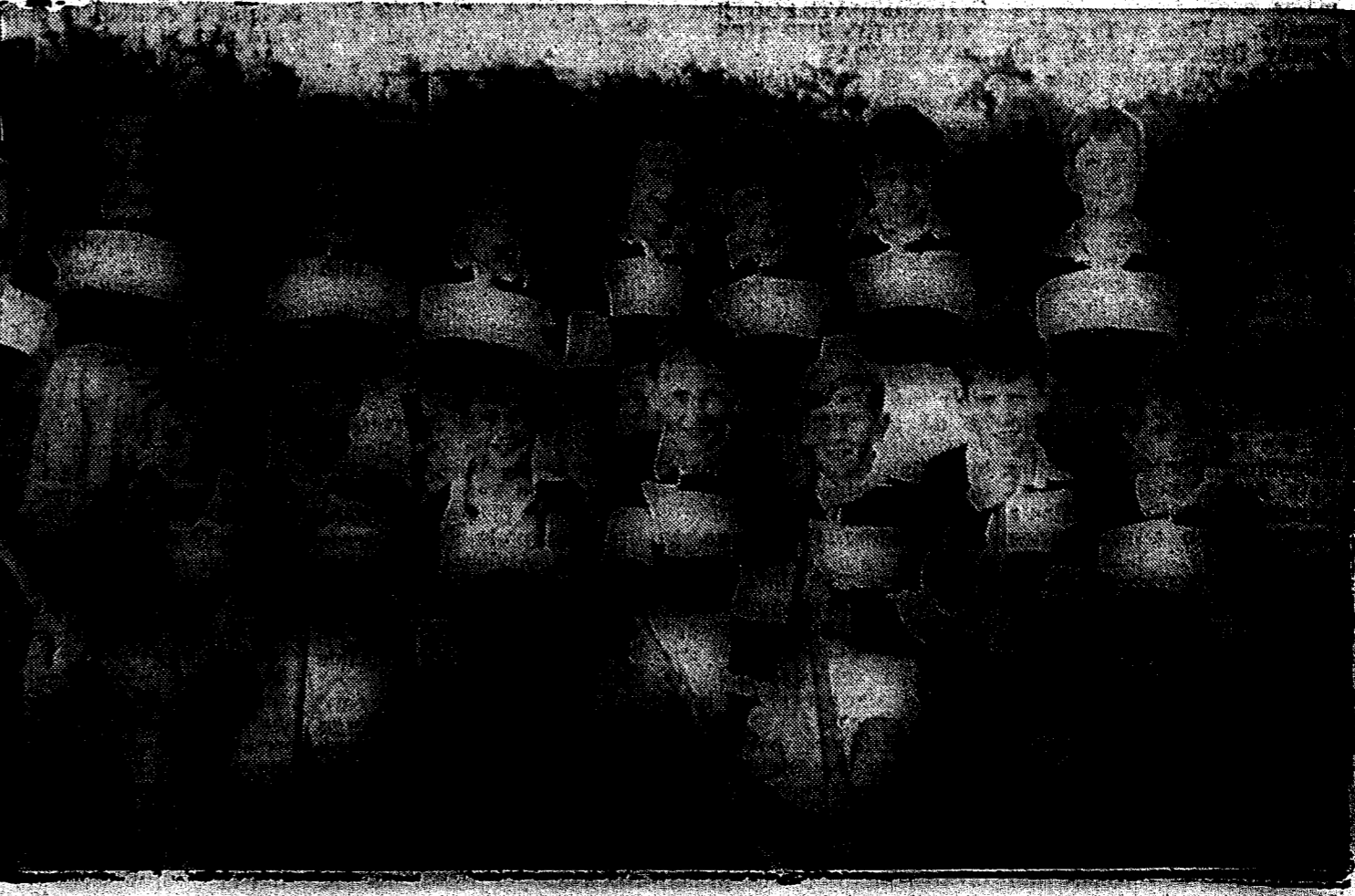

Wally J.F. Win For Johnville-Abbeyside Saga still Undecided Abbeyside Fail in Tournament Final

IRE OG 1-6
KILGOBINET 0-1

IRE OG, hotly fancied to take Junior football honours in this year, only to be round two, at the Fraher Field on Sunday night. The form shown in their defeat of Kilgobinet is an accurate assessment of their real worth, and the Dungarvan men were to wait a little longer before taking their first football title. From the tactical advantage they enjoyed they should have won this game by a very safe goal early in the second half. It is the issue beyond that.

The winners led 0-4 to nil at half time, when in fact they have been at least 1-1. They frittered away chances in the most wasteful manner imaginable, and to add to all they failed to convert a penalty. Kilgobinet on the other hand, tried very hard in that opening half, but were clearly inferior to the opposition, and must have been very thankful to the referee by these mere four points at half time.

IRE OG too had the assistance of a nice breeze in that half, and it was not beyond the bounds of possibility that they might ultimately say very dearly for the loss of that first moiety. Within minutes of the restart came their lone goal, and a very easy one it was, and thereafter the issue was in doubt. But if the IRE OG attack did show improvement in the final quarter, there were still far too many missed chances that could only have disastrous consequences against a team of lower calibre.

Even before the game got under way, Kilgobinet were in trouble and the non-availability of Tommy Power and Paddy Dunford, weakened their forces quite considerably. They were further hampered by an early injury to Moran which eventually led to his retirement, and the loss of Eire Og's attack and stress quite early on, and under no circumstances had Kilgobinet the ability to win this game.

NEVER IN ARREARS
The pattern of this tie was set from the very start with IRE OG in full control in most sectors. This was particularly true of the half back line, where the positioning of the re-instated John Moylan had a tremendously effective influence on the line. In addition, for all the positions they were given, the forwards floundered and generally broke loose to second best against the unyielding Kilgobinet defence.

Four minutes Moylan was the winners account for a point, and despite injury it was not until the 15th minute that they scored their second from Tony McGillicuddy. Seven minutes later Mick McGillicuddy had a third IRE OG point, and then in the 18th minute came another goal, this time directed from a Tony McGillicuddy free. The half broke loose to IRE OG forward who were properly fouled inside the 15. However, from the "spot kick" Tony McGillicuddy blazed the ball into the goal. Then, just on the half whistle Willie Terry had a fourth IRE OG point for a lead that should have been so much greater at that half way stage.

DECISIVE SCORE
With the wind behind them on the restart, one felt that Kilgobinet would fare infinitely better, but after four minutes it finally ended as a defeat when a good drive by "Pierrie" Walsh was blocked on its way to the net by substitute Matt Hayes, Walsh and Mickey Fraher added points, and Kilgobinet's reply, in fact their only score of the game, came from a Peter Power free, three minutes from time.

On's strong senior on their half back line, Michael Woods, John Walsh and Des Hayes, Moylan, and far the best play-view and Woods and Walsh were forceful wing players. Reilly and Tony were held the middle grip

for most of the hour, but bouquets are few and far between when it comes to the attack.

"Pierrie" Walsh and Willie Terry were the best of a sector that must be improved considerably if their ambition of a title in the grade is to be realised.

Considering the amount of pressure on them for so long the Kilgobinet defence stood up manfully to it, and first class displays were given by Bernie Lonergan, John Walsh, Simon Hanley and Eamonn Byrnes. But unfortunately for them the remaining sectors did not measure up to that defence.

Despite the promptings of Peter Power they were well beaten at midfield, and Kevin Fleming, until his retirement were the best of a very disappointing attack.
