Witness Failed To Turn Up in Court

JUDGE'S WARNING

A witness in a Criminal Appeal Case who failed to turn up to give evidence, when the case was heard at Dungarvan Circuit Court on Tuesday morning, was told by Judge S. Mac D. Fawsitt, when he appeared in Court later in the day on a Bench Warrant, that he felt he should send him to jail for three months.

The witness was Michael Moore Rusheen, Old Parish, and he was to have given evidence in an appeal case brought by Matthew N. Kiely, Old Road, Kilmacthomas, who was convicted at Dungarvan District Court in May of drunken driving and was fined and disqualified from driving for 12 months.

Moore told Judge Fawsitt that he had mistaken the date of the Court, and thought it was Wednesday

and not Tuesday morning the appeal was to be heard. Judge Fawsitt told him: "What made you think it was Wednesday morning. Was there anything in the document you received to make you believe the case was going on on Wednesday."

Moore: No.

Judge Fawsitt said if people were not going to turn up in Court for criminal proceedings, then the whole system breaks down. He would either have to send Moore to jail for three months or impose a fine. When citizens did not answer a summons to come to court the system completely broke down, and his feelings at the moment were to send Moore to jail for 3 months.

Asked by the Judge if he had anything to say, Dr. D. R. Counahan, State Solicitor, said he had been informed by the gardai that Moore was semi-illiterate and this might explain his mistaking the day of the Court. He felt that the issuing of a Bench Warrant for his arrest was a warning in itself for him, while the publicity this would receive would also serve as a warning to all others who received summonses for such cases.

the case was on Tuesday, Judge Fawsitt said he could not help feeling that this witness may have stayed away to ensure that the accused would not be convicted or alternatively to ensure the "other thing."

Inspector Murtagh said there was no attempt on the part of the accused in this particular case to try to keep Moore away from the Court.

Judge Fawsitt said he

wanted it to be let known that it was in the interests of the accused in criminal trials that those who were issued with summonses turned up in Court. In view of what had been stated in Court he would give Moore a chance this time, but warned him to answer any Court Summons he might receive in future. He warned that he would not take this line of action in every such case.

Newspaper Libel Action Settled

A Libel Action against Thomas Crosbie & Co. (Printers) Ltd., trading under the name of the "Waterford News and Star," Industrial Estate, Waterford, was settled at Dungarvan Circuit Court on Tuesday. The action was brought by 17 year old Edward Acheson St. Joseph's, The Folly, Waterford, suing through his father, also Edward Acheson of the same address, following the publication of a

Court Case in the issue of the News and Star of October 11th, 1968.

In his claim for £600 damages for Libel, the Plaintiff alleged that the following incorrect report appeared in the News and Star on October 11th last: "A 17 year old Waterford youth, Edward Acheson, St. Joseph's, The Folly, Waterford, was fined £10-0 and ordered to pay £4 compensation at Waterford District Court on Friday, when he was convicted of aiding and abetting another youth in the theft of a motor car from Woodstown Strand. Acheson pleaded guilty."

The Plaintiff in his claim stated that by the said words the Defendants meant and were understood to mean that he was a self-confessed party to a criminal offence, and that by the publication of the said words, he had been much injured in his credit and reputation, and had suffered damage.

The Plaintiff's father, Edward Acheson, in direct evidence, told the Court that his son was not in fact before the court nor was he legally represented. His son was however now prepared to accept a sum of £76 lodged in court by the Defendant in settlement of the action.

Judge Fawsitt said it was the wisest course to take. He also ordered that the Plaintiff be allowed the costs of the action. He ordered also that the money be put into Post Office Savings Certificates for the Plaintiff.

Stage Finish To Big Cycle Race in Dungarvan

The Eight Day International Tour of Ireland Cycle Race commences on Sunday next from O'Connell Street, Dublin and concludes again in the capital on the following Sunday, 10th August. All the leading Irish Cycling Federation cyclists will be competing, and the race will be given a really international flavour by the inclusion of teams from England, Scotland, Poland and Belgium. In all 111 top class riders will take part in this show piece of the Irish Cycling Federation.

Once again Dungarvan will play a major part in this mammoth sporting event, and under the dynamism of Con Roche, Mary Street and other members of the local

Deise A.C., all plans and preparations have been finalised for the finish of the second stage of the race in the town on Monday next at about 2.45 p.m. The stage will be from Clonmel, via Knocklofty, Ardinnan, Cloughan, The Vee, Lismore, Tallow, The Pike, Youngal Road, Kinsalebeg and into Dungarvan for the finish on the Square. The stage is a distance of 62 miles.

Then that night Stage 3 of the Tour will be held in the town with 8 laps of a three mile circuit. It will start on the Square at 7 p.m. with a total distance of 24 miles. Race Director J. J. Lackey has gone on record as saying that last year the Stage finish in Dungarvan was the

most successful of them all. Thus in recognition of that it has been decided to give the town this added "plum" of a special stage around a 3-mile circuit in the town.

To round off what should be a memorable day there will be a grand dance in the Town Hall that night. And finally, just a few requests to the general public: kindly keep all animals off the streets for the Third Stage around the town Circuit on Monday night; also, all car owners are requested not to park their cars over the route, which will be as follows: from Square, via O'Connell St., Shandon, Bherenarua, Springmount, Mitchel Street, Mary St.

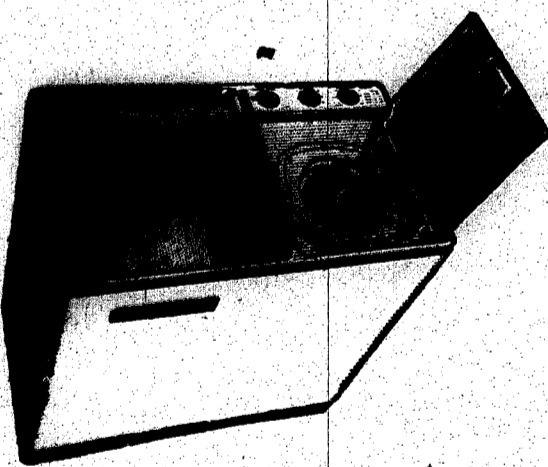

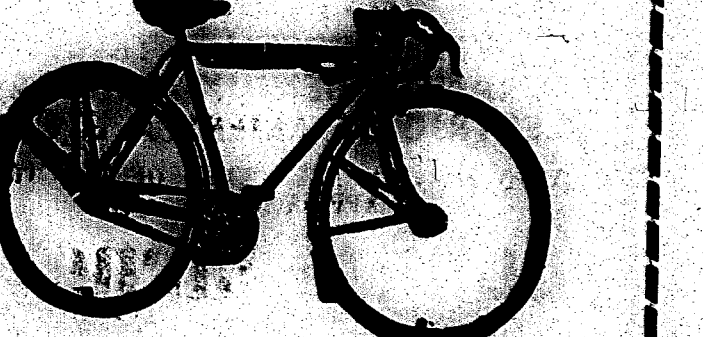

In the intervening years, the ship had been captured by Barbary pirates who imprisoned her Captain and crew and used the ship for their own purposes. Later the Irishmen, under their Captain, recaptured their vessel, now laden with booty, and sailed for home. For various legal reasons it was impossible to say to whom the treasure belonged. An arbitration court decided on a fund for the "alleviation of mercantile distress in Dublin", and the Ouzel Galley Society was thus formed, from which grew, in 1783, the Dublin Chamber of Commerce. Your ship came home too — with a fortune.

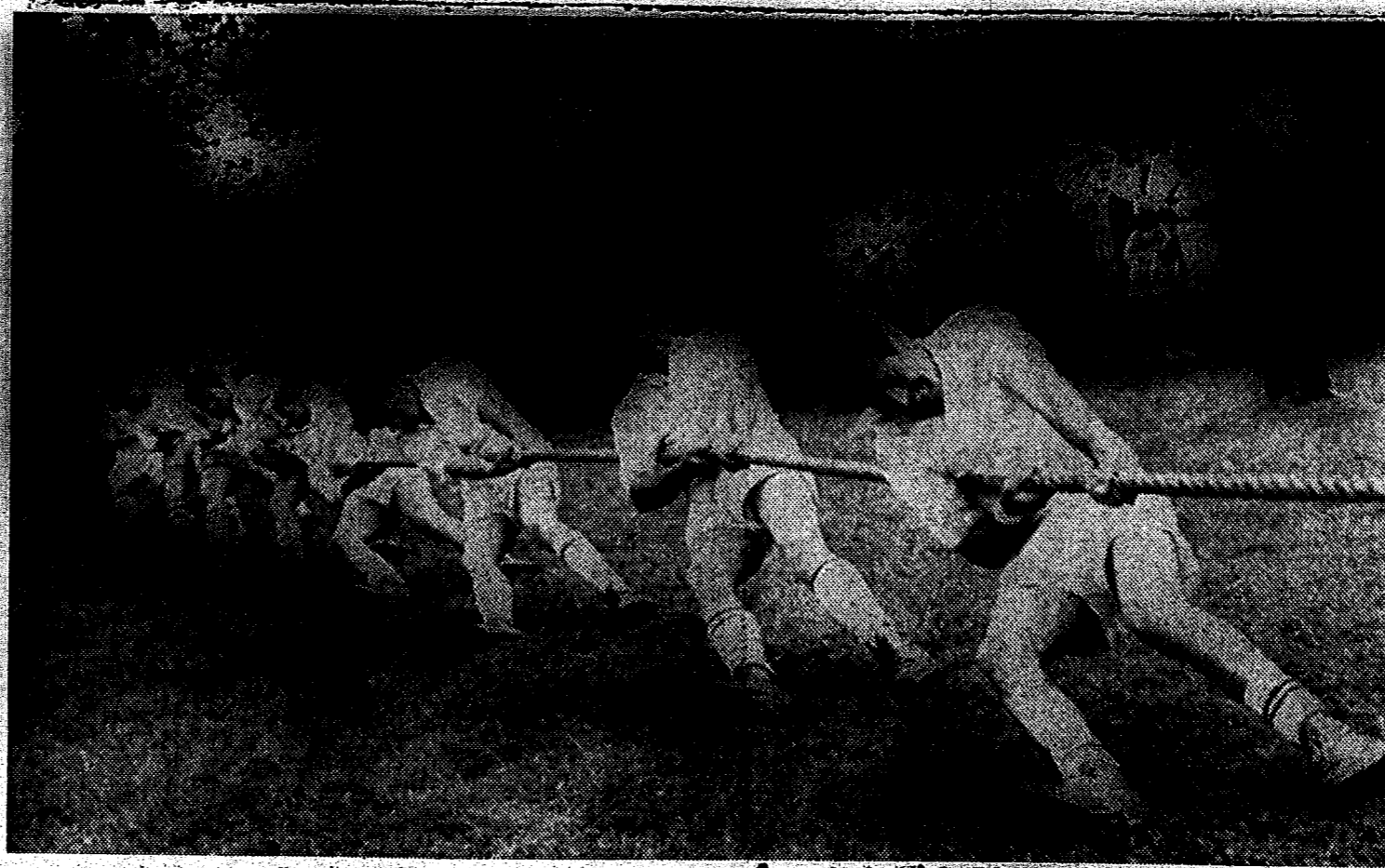

(b) Infra-red Brooding unit for a minimum of 100 chicks — 50% of cost up to a maximum of £3.
(c) Brooder-Heater or Infra-red Heating Element — 50% of cost up to a maximum of 15s.
CONDITIONS OF THE SCHEME
Chicken House: Night Ark—
(1) An applicant may not receive a grant for more than one chicken house or one night ark.
A person who has previously received a chicken house grant of £22.10s. or less under the Scheme and who provides a new house equipping for a larger grant may be awarded an additional grant equivalent to such larger grant less the amount of the grant previously received. No person may however receive grants exceeding £40 in all in respect of chicken housing under the Scheme.
(2) The grants at (a), (b), and (c) are alternatives and an applicant may not be awarded a grant for more than one of any of these items.
(3) A second equipment grant may however be considered in respect of the cost of replacement of an item of equipment which after a normal period of use has become ineffective. Judge Refuses to Set Aside Deed of Transfer of Farm

In an equity civil bill at Clonakilly Circuit Court, Patrick O'Donnell (86), a farmer of Billereagh, Aragon, Mitchelstown, sought to have set aside a deed of transfer of his 64 acre farm to Michael Hynes, Rianacullagh, Lismore, Co. Waterford, stated to have been made in August 1965.

Among the grounds on which the civil bill were based were physical inability, undue influence, not having proper legal advice and that defendant, his servants or agents failed to maintain the plaintiff as specified in the deed of transfer.

Mr. S. Brosnan, B.L. (instructed by Mr. E. P. Finn) was for the plaintiff and Mr. A. G. Murphy, B.L. (instructed by M. J. Lavan, Messrs. E. A. Ryan & Co., Dungarvan) for the defendant.

Plaintiff told Judge T. J. Neylon that some years ago he went to live with the defendant and his mother, who were neighbours. In August 1965 he went to a solicitor in Mitchelstown to transfer his farm to the defendant. He had three or four drinks before he went to the solicitor's office. He went to the office on a second occasion about the same time and he had a few drinks on that occasion also. He never received food or clothes from the defendant, who got married and went to England for a short time and was now living with his wife's people.

Witness added that he wanted someone he could rely on to have the farm and he wanted to sign it over to Ellen Hynes, a sister of the defendant.

Cross-examined, witness said he was living in defendant's place before he transferred his farm and he had always been well cared for there. He was not drunk when he went to the solicitor's office and he knew what he was doing.

"No one influenced me or pressed me to go to the soli-

tor's office," the witness said.

He added that defendant had been running his farm and paying the rates. After defendant got married there was trouble between him and his mother for a long time. After some kind of a family squabble defendant and his wife went to England, where they stayed for three weeks.

Answering further questions, witness said that no one put him up to giving the farm to Ellen Hynes. Defendant was not at his home place because his mother would not let him in.

Ellen Hynes said she had lived at Kilworth for the past 15 years. Plaintiff's farm house was not habitable and the defendant, her brother, had made no effort to repair it. She knew nothing about the transfer of the farm to her brother. Her mother left the place when her brother and his wife came to live there, and her brother cashed the creamery cheques.

Cross-examined, witness denied that she was the cause of "all the trouble."

What do you want in this case?—I want land or money.

Defendant in evidence said that long before the case he used to give plaintiff a hand in running his farm. The farm house became too bad to live in and the plaintiff came to live in witness's house 12 years ago. One day in Mitchelstown he said he was going to a solicitor's office to give over his land to witness. Witness did not go with him or influence him. On a second occasion witness went with him to the solicitor's office and the deed of transfer was prepared. There was nothing wrong with the plaintiff and he was not under the influence of drink.

Cross-examined, witness said that after getting the land he did not change his attitude to the plaintiff or to his mother.

Judge: When did all this trouble start?—When I got married.

Mr. Murphy: You are still friends with the plaintiff?—Yes.

And there is someone else behind this?—Yes.

Hearing heard the evidence of Michael O'Callaghan, solicitor, Mitchelstown, who prepared the deed of transfer, the Judge said he was satisfied that there was no influence brought to bear on the plaintiff. He was a good old age, but he was a good businessman all the same. Defendant got the land charged with a right for

INCREASES IN SOCIAL ASSISTANCE PAYMENTS AND OTHER IMPROVEMENTS IN SOCIAL WELFARE SCHEMES

The Social Welfare (Miscellaneous Provisions) Act, 1969, makes provision for increases in the rates of payments and for other improvements in the Social Assistance Schemes as follows:

OLD AGE AND BLIND NON-CONTRIBUTORY PENSIONS
As from 1st August, 1969, all rates of pension as well as the addition of 45/- payable to certain incapacitated pensioners will be increased by 10/- a week. The increases will be paid as follows:

To pensioners whose pension order books expired in June: Orders dated 1st August, 1969, onwards in basic pension books and pension books marked "Relative" are over-printed "Pay 10/- extra."

To all other pensioners: Supplementary pension books at 10/- rate are being sent to Post Offices for distribution to pensioners on production of their existing pension books.

The means limit for receipt of pension is being raised from £195.15.0 yearly to £221.15.0 yearly and for persons with qualified children is being further increased as follows:

Persons with one qualified child ... £247.15.0

Persons with two qualified children ... £286.15.0

The limit of £286.15.0 is further increased for each qualified child in excess of two.

Persons who have been refused a pension because their means exceeded the former limits are advised to apply again if they feel they may now qualify for pension.

WIDOWS' NON-CONTRIBUTORY PENSIONS AND ORPHANS' NON-CONTRIBUTORY PENSIONS
As from 1st August, 1969, the weekly rate of non-contributory pension payable in respect of each widow and of each orphan is being increased by 10/-. Supplementary pension books have been sent to Post Offices for distribution to pensioners on production of their existing pension books.

The means limit for receipt of widow's pension is being raised from £182.15.0 yearly to £208.15.0, and for widows with qualified children is being further increased as follows:

Widow with one qualified child ... £247.15.0

Widow with two qualified children ... £273.15.0

The limit of £273.15.0 is further increased for each qualified child in excess of two.

Persons who have been refused a pension because their means exceeded the former limits are advised to apply again if they feel they may now qualify for pension.

RAISING OF AGE LIMIT FOR INCREASES OF PENSION IN RESPECT OF CHILDREN OF WIDOWS AND FOR ORPHANS' ALLOWANCE AND PENSION

As from 1st August, 1969, an increase of pension is payable to widows in receipt of a contributory or non-contributory widow's pension or contributory old age pension or non-contributory old age or blind pension in respect of children between the ages of 16 and 21 years who are receiving full-time instruction by day at any university, college, school or other educational establishment. This increase is payable also in similar circumstances in respect of orphans. Application for the increase should be made without delay to the Secretary, Department of Social Welfare, Aras Mhic Dhiarmada, Dublin 1. The application should state the type of pension being received and the pension number. Where a pension was reduced or terminated because a child attained 16 years application should be made if it is considered that the new provision applies.

UNEMPLOYMENT ASSISTANCE

As from 30th July, 1969, all weekly rates of Unemployment Assistance are being increased by:

10/- in the personal rate;

20/- where the person has an adult dependant

Increases of the same amount are being given from 31st July, 1969, in the special rates of Unemployment Benefit which are the equivalent of maximum urban rates of Unemployment Assistance.

Payment at the appropriate increased rate will be made in all cases without special application.

CHILDREN'S ALLOWANCES

Changes in the Children's Allowances Scheme will come into operation on 1st August, 1969.

The rates of allowances are being increased as follows: Allowance of 15/6d. a month for the second qualified child increased to 30/.

Allowance of 26/6 a month for each subsequent child increased to 40/.

The present allowance of 10/- a month for the first qualified child remains unchanged.

The increased rates will be paid by means of gummed receipt slips at the new rates, issued to payees for affixing to the usual receipt space on orders in their existing allowance books before presentation for payment.

A grant of £100 will be paid on the birth of triplets, and £150 on the birth of quadruplets or greater multiple births. This grant will be in addition to the monthly allowance payable in respect of these children, which is double the normal rate.

OCCUPATIONAL INJURIES INSURANCE : DEATH BENEFIT

The qualifying age for children undergoing full-time day education who receive orphan's pension or who are paid for as child dependants is being raised from 18 to 21 years as from 1st August, 1969. A claim should be made to the Secretary, Department of Social Welfare (O.I.B.), Aras Mhic Dhiarmada, Dublin 1, in respect of any orphan or child to whom this extension applies if a claim was not previously made for him or her.

CHEAP FUEL SCHEME

Under this scheme, which is operated by Local Authorities with Government assistance, regular supplies of fuel are made available for necessitous households in certain cities and towns. Up to now the scheme has operated from November to March. In future it will operate from October to April, inclusive.

TALLOW BID FOR COUNTY TITLE

It's quite a long trek from Tallow to Walsh Park, Waterford, but hundreds of followers from the Brideside area and surrounding area will travel to the city venue on Sunday next for the U-21 hurling county final between Tallow and reigning champions Clanna Gael. It is unfortunate that the Western champions must travel the entire length of the county for this game, but because of the ridiculous East-West arrangement on alternate years, they have no option but to journey to Walsh Park. Dungarvan, half way from both Tallow and Clanna Gael, was unquestionably the most suitable venue for this final.

However, that much said, let's proceed with an analysis of a game that should provide patrons with a sparkling hour's hurling. Clanna Gael, champions since last year, still have no less than 12 of that successful side on view, and such was the ease with which they trounced a highly fancied Mount Sion side in the Western final that they will continue to be firm favourites to retain their title.

Barriers of the calibre of the Moores, Tom Casey and Ed Tyrrell are first class by any standards, and it is difficult in all the circumstances to oppose them. But Tallow, despite the magnitude of their task, are confident of bringing back the title to the West for the first time since 1897. They started past Lismore in round one, followed it up with a facile win over Geraghane, and then turned in a power packed hurling display in the Divisional final, when handing out a real hiding to Cappoquin. These performances speak volumes of the ability of a side that will contest every ball to the final whistle.

Although the Western champions lineup has not been finalised at the time of writing, one can expect very few changes from the side that took the Western title in such convincing fashion. Their defence, built around Billy Shannon, Pat Norris and Seamus Hannon, is a first class unit, although the enforced absence through suspension of full back Pat Heffernan is a grievous loss.

Curley and John Shanahan will most likely line up at midfield, and in the forwards, Tom Doyle, John Shannon, Billy Dineen and Seamus Walsh, can sorely test the Clanna defence. As already stated, the favourites will start favourably, and it is very difficult to oppose them. But in Tallow they meet worthy Divisional representatives who, if they reproduce their sparkling Western final form, cause a big upset. At any rate, here's wishing them all the luck in the world.

CLANNAN CLASH THE HIGHLIGHT

Abbeyside Through to Semi-Final

ABBEYSIDE ... 1-12 BALLYDUFF-PORTLAW ... 1-3

ABBEYSIDE, their reputation damaged by recent indifferent displays, rose majestically to the challenge presented by Ballyduff-Portlaw in the senior hurling championship at Dungarvan on Sunday night last, and confounded all the "pundits" by handing out a virtual hurling lesson to the red hot favourites. This was a different Abbeyside in action, a team intent on restoring its proud name and imbued with a near fanatical spirit to take yet another step towards the fulfillment of a burning ambition—to land the coveted senior title for the first time in the club's history.

That they succeeded in putting paid to a team of Ballyduff-Portlaw's stature by so decisive a margin as nine points, speaks volumes for the merits of this Abbeyside performance. From the game's opening whistle it was crystal clear that the Villagers meant business and with sweeping non-stop hurling they bemused, bewildered, and finally out-classed the Ballyduff-Portlaw men.

For the past two years the losers have been undeniably the unlucky team in the senior hurling championship scene. In any one of those years, they could, and in fact, should, have become champions. But on Sunday last the only resemblance to those sides was in the jerseys they wore, for once Abbeyside hit the front, the Easterners found themselves toiling and quite unable to cope with the demanding situation they found themselves faced with.

In fact they trailed for practically the entire hour, and but for a few fleeting moments midway through the second half, looked utterly incapable of matching strides with the rampant Villagers. But even then Abbeyside found the resources to counteract the pending danger and they finished the hour in a blaze of glory, and the complete and absolute masters.

GOOD START Almost from the throw in Abbeyside gave one the impression that this was going to be their night. They marked crisply and first time on the ball, and overall looked to have the beating of the opposition. They deservedly led 0-6 to 0-2 at the interval and though a firm believer of the maxim that a game is never won or lost until the final whistle, I was confident even at that stage that the Villagers were on their way to victory.

Early on the restart they consolidated their position still further with well taken scores, and though Ballyduff-Portlaw did reduce the lead to three points entering the closing quarter, Abbeyside again proved their worth by drawing away in the most impressive manner imaginable to chalk up their convincing nine points win.

But if Abbeyside rose to the occasion, one must point out that their task was made infinitely easier by the complete failure of Ballyduff-Portlaw to live up to the reputation which they carried into the fray. Certainly those of us here in the West who had not seen such a great deal of them, expected an awful lot more, and with so many inter county seniors on view, they were a sad disappointment.

DESERVED LEAD The game was five minutes old when Abbeyside took a lead they never lost as Rogie Cashin's drive from over 70 yards went straight and true for a superb point. Two minutes later Pat Enright pointed a free and already Ballyduff-Portlaw were in trouble. They did open their tally with a point from Martin Hickey in the 17th minute, but Abbeyside's reply was quick and decisive as Cashin (free), Enright (2, from frees) and Michael Kiely, reeled off invaluable points to which Tom Cheasty replied with a Ballyduff point, and at the break the winners deservedly led 0-6 to 0-2.

Abbeyside restarted the second half again in complete command. Within five minutes Enright pointed another free; a minute later Cashin had another long range spectacular one from

play and Lar Cummins quickly added another. That left seven points between the sides but a Paddy Hennebery point in the 14th minute and a Martin Hickey goal from a free on the three quarter hour left but an insecure goal between the sides.

But then it was that Abbeyside pulled out all the stops. Just as a tight finish seemed in store they took over the initiative in emphatic manner, and a quick brace of points by Cashin (free) and Mick Kiely, followed by a well taken goal by Tony Mansfield, set the seal on a splendid win. For good measure Enright pointed another free before the close, and at the call of time the Villagers had well and truly staked their claim to a semi-final place against champions Ballyduff-Portlaw.

SOUND DEFENCE On Sunday the sheet anchor of the Villagers line-out was a superb defence in which every man played his part, and the highly rated Ballyduff-Portlaw attack could only muster 3 points from play over the hour.

Pakie Hogan, Denis Flynn, John Cosgrave and John McGrath all raised their game considerably, but for me it was the splendour of Austin Flynn at full back and Rogie Cashin at left half that overshadowed all others. Flynn was as good as he has ever been, and that is praise indeed whilst Cashin looked just about the best defender on view. His clearances were lengthy and relieving, and his accuracy from long range was so deadly that it yielded him four magnificent points.

Behind them Brian O'Connor had one of his really good days and showed a welcome improvement on recent uncertain form.

At midfield Pat McGovern and Joe Power were more than held their own, and up front all six forwards tried very hard for scores.

Pat Enright, the subject of quite an amount of rough house treatment picked off invaluable points from frees; Mick Kiely, Lar Cummins and Tony Mansfield also got among the scorers, and Duck Whelan and John Flynn also played their parts.

DISAPPOINTED To say that Ballyduff-Portlaw failed to measure up to expectations, would be a gross understatement. They were ranked disappointing and seldom looked capable of matching a very fit, fast and determined opposition. Too many of their established players failed to leave an impact on the game and this failure cost them dearly in the final analysis.

Noel Sullivan was faultless between the posts and Hugh Maher, until forced to retire with a nasty head injury, John Kirwan and the Whelans Frankie and Jackie all tried hard in defence.

Midfield was the real problem sector for them however, and in an attack in which Tom Cheasty was completely blotted out, only Martin Hickey and to a lesser extent Michael Regan, met with any success.

Also on Sunday at Walsh Park is the equally eagerly awaited meeting of champions Kill and John Mitchels in a losers group replay that should provide yet another stirring struggle before it is known which of them will march on in quest of honours in the grade.

Unquestionably however, the Kilrossanty-Stradbally "showdown" tops the day's billing and I will be very surprised indeed if the Fraher Field is not thronged for a game that has aroused County-wide interest amongst followers. It is a game in which Stradbally pitch into the fray all their youthful resources, speed and no little skill against the more dour, teak tough and utterly dependable Comeragh men, and if that does not make for a game worthy of these arch-rivals then it is doubtful if we'll see a good game in the entire championship.

Last year's championship meeting between them provided a real epic, as Stradbally inspired by a tonic goal in less than sixty seconds, went on to snatch a victory by the slenderest of margins. Since then they have gained considerably in football maturity and their magnificent first-round victory over champions Kill, set them up as very possible titleholders this year. They are without doubt the form side and must in all circumstances start favourites on Sunday.

But what of Kilrossanty? For one thing, a more determined side than this latest one will never have left the Parish. The attendance at training sessions has been quite fantastic with enough players on parade to form two teams. They are free from any team worries and are quietly confident of reversing last year's result. They have also atone for a heavy Phelan Cup defeat by the Reds quite recently and though they fielded only a scratch side that night, the extent of that defeat irks them more than a little.

When the respective team mentors sit down at the week-end to select the sides to do duty, both will be in the happy position of being able to select from injury free panels.

Stradbally, in particular, will hardly make any changes from the side that shocked Kill in round one, although one corner forward berth seems rather open at the moment.

That defence of theirs is very strong, with a powerhouse half back trio in the Currans, Alo and Joe, and an equally reliable Joe Power.
