Double Holiday Tragedy in Ardmore

WITHIN a matter of hours on Monday night last, the August holiday week-end was marred by a double tragedy in the Village of Ardmore when a 15 year old Belfast youth and a 23-year-old Cork City girl lost their lives in tragic circumstances.

The youth, Samuel McKee Irwin, 45 Cooleen Way, Cregagh Rd., Belfast had only arrived in Ardmore on the previous Saturday with his family for a two weeks fishing holiday, fell thirty feet into a hole and was washed out to sea by a freak wave, only minutes before help would have reached him. He was walking along the cliff top at Ardmore Head with his younger brother and they were returning from fishing together further down the coast. Suddenly he slipped and fell about thirty feet down a hole in the cliff. He landed among the rocks at the bottom of a gorge just above the level of the sea.

The younger brother screamed for help and was heard by an Englishman fishing nearby and he raced to the scene immediately. He began climbing down the dangerous cliff surface but when he was only a few feet from the ledge on which the unconscious youth lay, a huge wave surged along the

gorge and washed the body out to sea. Despite frantic efforts by the rescuer he could not recover the body. Within a very short time local fishermen set out in their boats to search for the body, but falling darkness foiled their efforts. The body was recovered on Wednesday night by divers from the Garda Sub Aqua Club.

SECOND TRAGEDY

Within a matter of hours another holidaymaker in the Village died when a motor cycle crashed into a parked car, on the Dungarvan road in the Village. Miss Patricia Haughey (23), 54 Marion Park, Blackrock, Cork, was a pillion passenger on the motor cycle that crashed into the car. Rev. Fr. Thomas Dreaper, C.C., Ardmore, administered Extreme Unction at the roadside, and the girl was rushed to Ardkeen hospital, Waterford, but was found to be dead on arrival. The rider of the motor cycle, the girl's fiance, was unhurt. His name has not been released.

Was One of Dungarvan's Best Known Figures

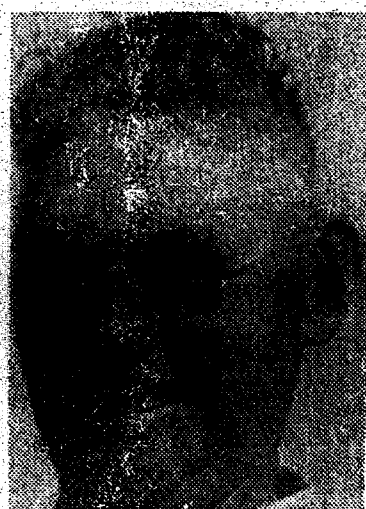
LATE THOMAS O'MAHONY

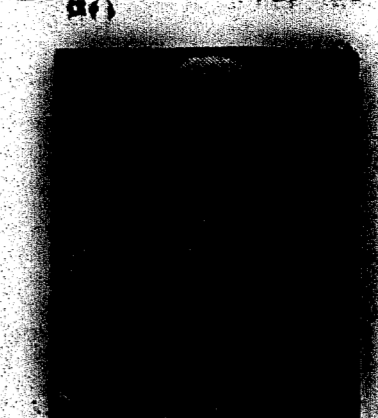

County Waterford Committee of Agriculture
SHEEP BREEDING SCHEME, 1969

For the purpose of improving the breeds of mountain sheep in County Waterford, the Waterford Committee of Agriculture are prepared, subject to the approval of the Department of Agriculture and Fisheries, to locate a limited number of high-grade black-faced rams on the commonage areas of the Comeragh and Knockmeal-down Mountains on the following conditions:—

(1)—The Committee shall grant 3 premiums of maximum £40 each towards the cost of Scotch Imported rams and 60 premiums of maximum £8 each in all other cases, within the limits of the allocation. The value of the premium in each case shall be less by £5 than the cost price of the ram.

(2)—In the allocation of rams preference will be given to applicants who apply on behalf of sheep owners who are prepared to mate the rams to selected ewes.

(3)—The Committee will endeavour to secure that only rams of a high standard of quality will be supplied, but they cannot undertake responsibility in case any animal should subsequently prove unfruitful or unsatisfactory for breeding purposes.

(4)—The ram must be maintained in good and healthy condition and retained in the flock for two breeding seasons.

(5)—Each applicant shall be required to lodge with his application a deposit of £5. Of the amount so lodged one half may be retained by the Committee where a sufficient supply of rams being available, a selected applicant fails to procure a ram.

(6)—In all cases of dispute in matters connected with this Scheme, the decision of the Minister for Agriculture and Fisheries shall be final. Application Forms, which must be returned on or before the 1st September, 1969, may be had from the undersigned.

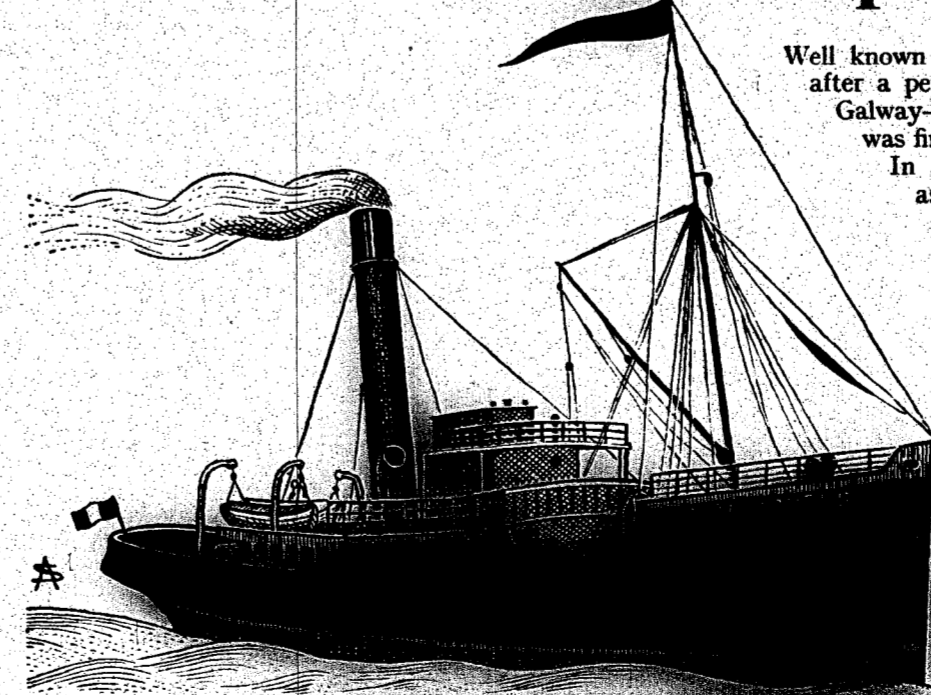

SALMON FISHING.

Now that the net season for salmon is over since 31st July, the return of catches for that month is anxiously awaited. The catches for June as well as seen hereunder are indeed a record for that month and July returns should exceed that of the preceding month by a very big margin. The total catches for June being 1,872 salmon weighing 19,533 lbs., and 11,290 grilse weighing 65,338 lbs., almost 38 tons of fish. The catch for the same month in 1968 was 1,386 salmon 14,040 lbs. and 4,991 grilse, 28,887 lbs., so that in June this year there was an increase of 488 salmon and 6,309 grilse.

THE LATE MRS. NORA FARRELL.

Deep regret was felt over the announcement of the death at an advanced age of Mrs. Nora Farrell which took place at the Youghal District Hospital. The deceased lady was a member of a well-known farming family at Millmount, Frogmore, and was relict of Bill Farrell. The remains were removed to the Parish Church where Solemn Requiem Mass was celebrated on Monday morning and the funeral which was both large and representative took place on that day to North Abbey Cemetery. She is survived by her two sons, Messrs. John and William Farrell to whom sympathy is extended.

ELECTION OF FISHERY CONSERVATORS.

The tenure of office of the members of Lismore Board of Conservators will expire in October next and the Conservators to hold office for the ensuing five years will have to be elected, i.e., six members for the tidal division and six members for the freshwater division. The following dates have been selected : Press and Poster Notice of Election on August 30th; last day for receipt of nominations, September 16th and last day for receipt of voting papers October 1st. Persons entitled to vote are holders of rod and net licences for current year and rated occupiers of fisheries who have paid the current fishery rate.

**INQUEST TOLD OF BELFAST
 YOUTH'S DEATH**

At an inquest on Samuel McKee Irwin in the Court-house, Dungarvan, on today (Thursday) a verdict in accordance with the medical evidence that death was due to asphyxia, caused by drowning, was returned by Dr. Daniel Healy, Lismore, Coroner for West Waterford.

Dr. M. K. Cusack, Dungarvan, said he carried out a post mortem examination on the body at 10 p.m. on Wednesday night. There were extensive abrasions on various parts of the body, and in particular there were horizontal linear abrasions on the right side of the back of the trunk, and on both arms and forearms and around the right eye. There was a wound two inches in length in the right temple area of the scalp and a fracture of the base of the skull. Underlying that was a small subdural haemorrhage covering the whole area of the brain.

Dr. Cusack said that on opening the chest there were large amounts of fluid in both lung cavities. The lungs were also very congested, but the heart was quite normal. There was also a slight fracture of the right

STRADBALLY WERE COMPLETE TOWN'S NARROW WIN

MASTERS Now Through To Semi-Final

STRADBALLY 1-10 KILROSSANTY 0-6

PLAYING a delightful brand of open, attractive and above all constructive football, Stradbally marched on in brilliant fashion to the senior football championship semi-final with a decisive seven points victory over their great rivals Kilrossanty at a crowded Fraher Field, Dungarvan, on Sunday night last. It was a victory as richly deserved as the decisive margin of victory suggests and it was etched out by a side that has well and truly brought back memories of the glory days of the famed Stradbally club.

The brand of football served up by the Reds on Sunday was as good, if not better, than anything I have seen from any club side in the County over a decade of years. Superbly fit, they utilised the open spaces of the Dungarvan venue to put on a display of combined and utterly effective football at its very best and Kilrossanty, hard though they tried, were without answer to it for most of the hour.

Stradbally on Sunday, would, I believe have beaten any other contender for this coveted title. They swung the ball about with rare abandon, notched some absolutely perfect scores and overall let it be known in crystal clear fashion that they were the complete masters of their Comeragh rivals. If there was a fault, it was the old tendency of the part of their forwards to try and walk the ball to the net instead of picking off points in the closing quarter but so far in front were they at that stage that just this once I would be prepared to forgive them on that score.

Kilrossanty in marked contrast laboured at the start, sputtered briefly in the second quarter and then folded up completely when the Reds piled on the pressure in the second half. They lost the vital midfield duel which was a severe blow to them, but an even greater set back was the inability of their vaunted half-forward trio of Tom Riordan, Pa Walsh and Pat Coffey to find any way past a positively superb half back line of the Currans, Alo and Joe and Joe Power. Beaten in these key sectors, the Comeragh men were simply contesting a lost cause, and in the closing stages they had to suffer the ignominy of being played about with by far superior opponents.

Thus a game of which so much was expected, fell completely flat. True there was much to admire about the winners play, but because of the inevitability of the result for most of the hour, the game suffered greatly. However, though the exchanges were tough and keen the standard of sportsmanship was admirable, and the sending off of Kilrossanty's Tony Coffey ten minutes from time was one of the very few incidents of a sporting encounter.

FLYING START

One could almost cut the tension that shrouded the venue when this game was set in motion and from the opening seconds Stradbally turned on their football power in full. Robin Hearne had a fistful point after two minutes and then seconds later Matty Reilly was on hand to pluck the ball in the Kilrossanty net. Hearne potted again in the seventh minute and the Reds were literally flying at this stage.

Mitters Casey from a free opened the Kilrossanty tally in the 8th minute, but back came the winners and Tom Cunningham who so sorely distressed the Kilrossanty defence for the hour, landed a superb point. And still they attacked and in the 13th minute only a wonderous save by Sean Ormonde when he palmed a Cunningham pile-driver onto the crossbar prevented Kilrossanty from falling further into arrears.

But as the second quarter was reached, Kilrossanty for a while in the hour looked to be in with any chance of victory. In the 15th and 21st minutes the accurate boot of Casey kicked another brace of points from play and in the 25th minute he took a further point from play a minute later, Kilrossanty finished the half with a flurry and further points by Pat Coffey, Tom Walsh and Casey (free) left them trailing by a solitary point—1-4 to 0-6 at half time.

From the very start Stradbally took decisive materialised. From the very start Stradbally took decisive control of virtually every sector and the very fact that Kilrossanty failed to score for the entire half, was indicative enough of the game's trend.

ALL STRADBALLY

Within seconds of the throw-in Virgie Power flashed over a point and then Matty Reilly, having his best ever game in the club jersey, took over the scoring all to himself, and five further points in succession gave his side its 1-10 to 0-6 win. Understandably I suppose the forwards sought goals in the closing stages when points were theirs for the taking but the issue was by then a foregone conclusion and their passage to the semi-final for the second successive year had been signed, sealed and delivered.

No doubt this win will be recalled for many a long day by Stradbally followers and certainly this very youthful side—almost half of them are under 21, has arrived as a major football force in the County. The immaturity that plagued them last year is no longer there and there must now be a very bright future ahead for them.

SUPERB

Their defence on Sunday was superb, and gave away only two points from play.

Bill Dunford was the essence of coolness and confidence in goal and if a magnificent Pat Clancy stole the thunder in the full line, his flankers Nicky Powe and Ned Dunphy went quietly but effectively about the job on hands.

The original half line of Joe and Alo Curran and Joe Power was superb, and when Robin Hearne took over at centre-back in the second half with Joe Curran moving up, the line still retained all its effectiveness.

At midfield an inspired Michael Coffey gave his side a very definite pull in the sector. Coffey's fielding was superb and in Tom Hearne he had a most able and industrious partner. Between them they laid on a match-winning service for their attack.

And how those forwards thrived on that service. Tom Cunningham, listed at full forward, was more often than not nearer the halfway line, but his roving tactics disor-

ganised and ultimately brought about the collapse of the Kilrossanty defence. Cunningham to my mind was the winners man of the match.

It was far from being a one man attack, however. Robin Hearne, until his transfer to defence, was a major threat and his two points were superbly taken, and Virgie Power, despite being marked by a magnificent Noel Walsh, left a big imprint on the game.

For Matty Reilly, of course, it was a game to be remembered. Never before have I seen him in such sparkling form and his personal tally of 1-6 does all the speaking necessary for him.

These then were the stars of the sector, but John Kiely, too, had a fine game in the corner, although the other corner berth presented something of a problem, albeit I felt their mentors acted with haste in taking off Terry Guiry in the opening half.

Without question, Kilrossanty's defeat would have been of alarming proportions but for the goalkeeping brilliance of Sean Ormonde and his first half save from Cunningham was as good as I have ever seen.

Their defence, however, was overrun and only the great hearted Noel Walsh and to a lesser extent John Crotty emerged from the game with distinction.

Only briefly were they in it at midfield where Mitters Casey fared best of those tried there and in an attack that could never master the opposing defence, Pat Coffey and Gort Walsh were best.

On the rostrum to greet the riders was the Chairman of Dungarvan Urban Council, Mr. Thomas A. Kyne, whilst the bouquet of flowers to Foster for his stage win was presented by Dungarvan's International athlete Elizabeth Mountain.

In welcoming the riders to the town, Mr. Kyne said that irrespective of whether riders won or not, it was a wonderful thing to participate in an event of this magnitude and importance.

Once again the expertise in which everything was arranged for this event by the Local Athletic Club members, headed of course by Con Roche, drew very favourable comments from the Race Director John Lackey, and other Tour Officials. THIRD STAGE

The third stage—24 miles over eight laps of a special three mile circuit of the town, again proved a thrilling spectacle. From the very start the "whips were out" in this stage, and the cream of Ireland's cyclists, together with the riders from England, Scotland, Wales, Belgium and Poland, were given a tremendous reception by the huge crowd as they sped over the course.

In the end it was a triumph for the Liverpool Mercury Club with Ernie Potter and Pete Matthews of that club taking the first and second places respectively.

The prizes were subsequently presented to the winners at a dance in the
