Reaching The £1M. Target

But all farmers must have their applications in quickly if they want to benefit from this insurance venture.

There will be a special discount on premiums for all shareholders in the new company and therefore it is to every farmer's advantage who has the future of his family at heart to invest in this venture right away.

Company Heads Visit Ballinacourty Factory

Promise of Fair Deal For Workers

THE promise that all their employees would receive a fair wage and everything that went with it, was given by Mr. John J. Powers, junior, Chairman of the Board of Chas. Pfizer and Co. Inc., when he spoke at a reception in Lawors Hotel, Dungarvan, on Friday last during a visit to observe progress at their new Seawater Magnesite Industry at Ballinacourty. He was accompanied by Dungarvan-born Mr. John A. Mulcahy, head of Quigley Steel Inc., the man who first mooted the industry for the area.

Mr. Powers and Mr. Mulcahy travelled to Dungarvan by helicopter from Cork. However, because of foggy conditions they landed in Colligan and then hitched a spin to Dungarvan. They subsequently returned and boarded the helicopter and made a landing in the C.B.S. grounds, Mr. Mulcahy's Alma Mater.

At a reception in Lawors Hotel, Mr. Mulcahy said that once the Ballinacourty plant went into production it would be the realisation of a dream for him. Following the merger between Pfizer and Quigley Steel he suggested that they should have a plant in Ireland and Mr. Powers readily agreed, and was now prepared to help Ireland just as much as he himself was. It was wonderful, he said, to be back in Dungarvan again to meet all his old friends.

Mr. Powers said that the establishment of their plants in Ballinacourty and Ringnaskiddy in Co. Cork was a wonderful opportunity for the Pfizer Co. Ireland would soon become part of the Common Market and it was his Company's intention to make it one of the great chemical bases to serve the United Kingdom and Europe.

Everyone working in Ballinacourty, he said, would be paid a fair wage and everything that went with it, and his Company intended to become part of the Dungarvan community. This project, he added, would be a wonderful success, and he concluded by expressing the hope that Pfizer would become part of Dungarvan and that they would grow together over the years.

The Chairman of Dungarvan Urban Council, Mr. Thos. A. Kyne on behalf of the townspeople expressed appreciation and admiration for what the Pfizer Company was doing in the area. Mr. Mulcahy, a native of Dungarvan, and Mr. Powers, whose ancestors came from Tramore, were translating their love of Ireland into practical patriotism. They in Dungarvan were very proud of both of them and he assured them of the full support of the Urban Council in this project.

Mr. Charles Curran, Chairman of Waterford County Council also assured Mr. Powers and Mr. Mulcahy of the full support of Waterford County Council. When completed this Ballinacourty project would be one of the finest chemical plants in the world, and he hoped that many other would follow.

When Mr. Powers again addressed those present later on at the reception, he said that originally Pfizer's financial interest in the country was intended to be in the region of 20 million dollars. However, between Ringnaskiddy and Dungarvan it would now be between 35 and 40 million dollars.

The Ringnaskiddy plant would be completed in about two years time whilst it was hoped to have the Ballinacourty plant in production in the Spring of 1970.

LATE LUKE BRENNAN

OLD PARISH

The death, unexpectedly, of Luke Brennan, of Old Parish, which occurred at his son's residence in Abbeyside on August 4th was a shock and a cause of sorrow to a wide sector of West Waterford. Mr. Brennan was one of the best known and best loved members of the business life of the County since he arrived from his native Sligo in 1924. From that date until 1967 he was manager of the Old Parish Branch of Dungarvan (later Waterford) Co-Op. Creameries. Glowing tributes on his retirement over two years ago, after 43 years of invaluable business and social service to the community were renewed last week at the news of his death.

Luke Brennan's life's work was marked above all else by extreme efficiency. His greatest quality was his outstanding charity, his sympathy and understanding of all human problems. His single best characteristic was his extraordinary personality which made him thousands of life-long friends. A considerable sportsman in his youth, he was to be found, even to his last days, attending sports events regularly. He was one of the staunchest and longest supporters of Old Parish football. There were, indeed, few enterprises in that area in which he was not totally involved.

A native of Tubbercurry, Co. Sligo, and always proud of his Western origins, he had long since come to consider himself an Old Parish man, and it was there that his interment took place on Wednesday morning, August 6th. On his removal to Old Parish Church from Abbeyside on Tuesday evening an enormous funeral paid final and fitting tribute to a man who in all his dealings had endeared himself to

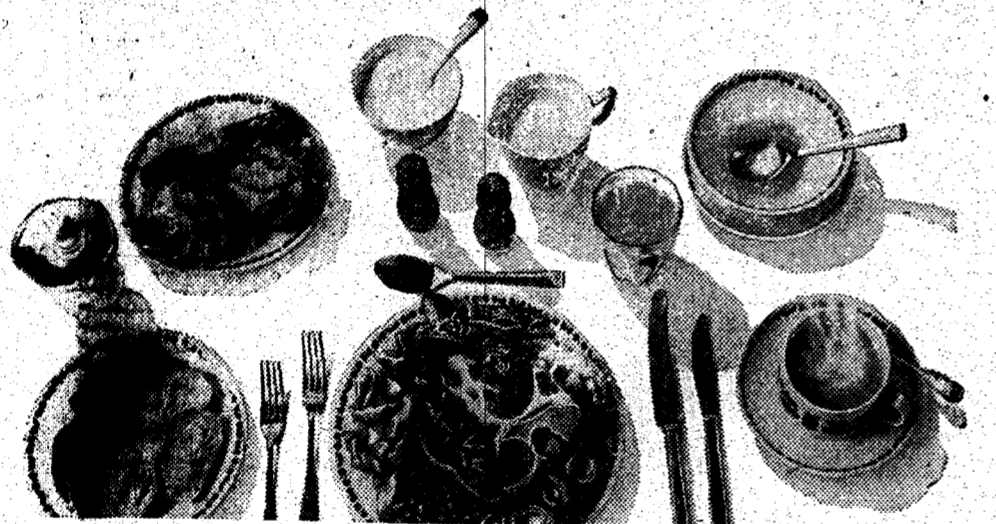
everyone. Mr. Brennan's loss to his family and surviving relatives is especially grievous. He was a notably devoted family man. Their consolation has been in the innumerable messages of sympathy, Mass cards and telegrams which have arrived from all over the country.

Immediately after the celebration of Masses the interment took place in the adjoining family Plot. Very Rev. P. Flavin, P.P. also imparted the absolution at the graveside assisted by An Ath. O'Cuircin, Rev. Fr. Sexton, O.S.A., Rev. M. Walsh, C.C., Abbey side; Rev. M. Enright, C.C., Rev. M. Kennedy, C.C., Clashmore, when another very large and most representative concourse were present.

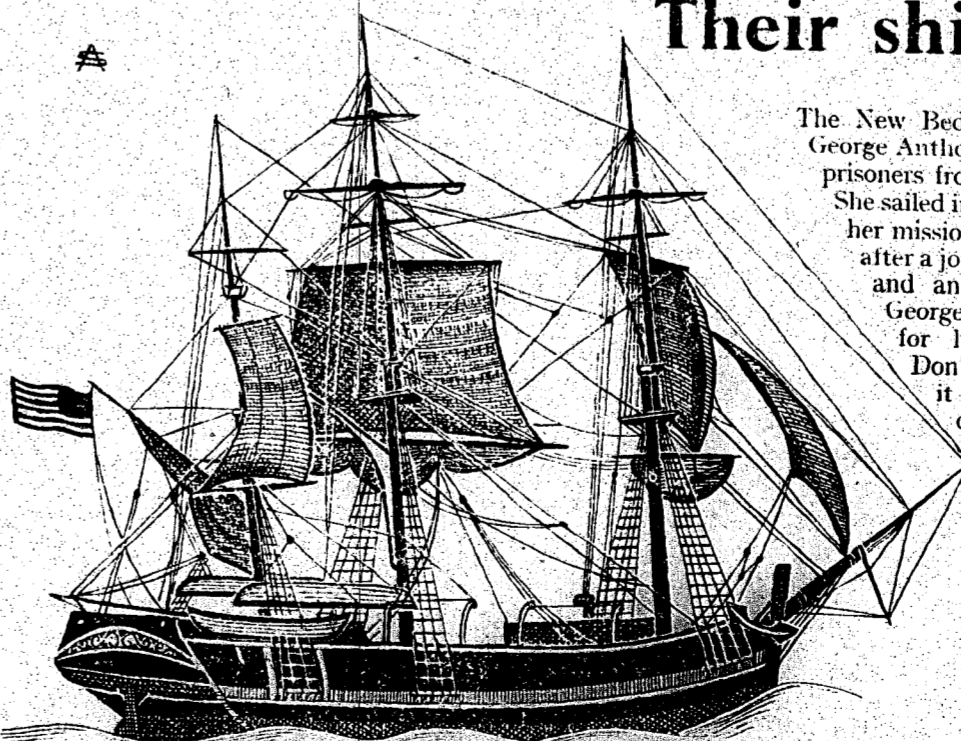

THE EDUCATION GAP

It is estimated that 6,000 boys enter agriculture each year as future farmers—yet there are places for only 560 students in our nine agricultural colleges. Agricultural science was introduced into secondary schools in 1943 (26 years ago) and yet only about 3% of boys take it as a subject in the Intermediate Exam and only 8% for the Leaving Certificate. Relatively few boys who return to the land complete the Intermediate or Vocational Group certificate and one survey has shown that 86% had no post-primary education—that is more than four in every five.

SUNDAY'S JUNIOR CHAMPIONSHIP GAMES
 The bill on next Sunday's championship is the meeting of Eire Og and Tallow in the junior football final at Lismore (2 p.m.).

Both sides are undoubtedly the most strongly fancied candidates for title honours and had the luck of the draw on their side then they would most likely have been in the Divisional final.

The midfield pairing too of John Reilly and Tony Moore is a first class one but the attack will be unable to afford the luxury of the many missed chances that featured their first round display. Individually, Tony McCarthy, John Walsh, "Pierrie" Walsh, Willie Terry and Dec Hayes can be very good but to hit it off as a unit is another matter.

This should be a close and exciting game with the issue likely to be very close. However, Eire Og to me have the potential to win this game—but only if their potential is realised in full.

TOURIN FANCIED
 The Eire Og-Tallow game will be followed at the same venue by the meeting of Shamrocks and Tourin, also in the Junior grade. Unfortunately, however, for Shamrocks, they must enter the fray without two of their best players, Billy Tobin and John Foley, both of whom were sent out in last Sunday's hurling tournament final against Lismore. With them on duty I would have opted for a Knockanore win but their loss is a grievous one and the scales now seem tilted in Tourin's favour.

DUNGARVAN
 The lone hurling game at Dungarvan on Sunday brings Brickey Rangers and Clashmore-Kinsalebeg into opposition in the Junior grade. Last year the latter exceeded all the expectations of everyone when they reached the Divisional final and gave Eire Og a rare fright before the Dungarvan men eventually took over. Now they are bidding to go one step better and victory over the ragged Brickeys would be a major step in the right direction.

However even though the Rangers will be minus a number of their former stars they can still call on experienced players in the Spratts, Nicholas McGrath and Paddy Joe Killigrew, all of whom have sampled hurling at senior level.

This should be a tough and uncompromising encounter and although Clashmore-Kinsalebeg will be fancied in many quarters, I would not be at all surprised at a Brickey win.

 The sparks flew in a big way at the Castle Farm grounds Lismore on Sunday night last when Lismore and Shamrocks, arch rivals at the best of times, met in the final of the hurling tournament held in conjunction with the Lismore Festival week. 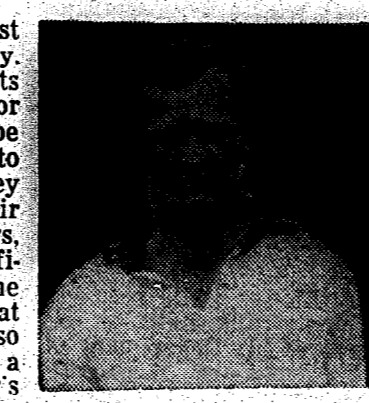

Geraldines Face Stiff Task Thrilling Under 21 Final Expected

UNHAPPY though they are over the choice of venue, Geraldines (Aglish) will travel with confidence to Walsh Park on Sunday next to meet Gaultier in a game that may provide them with their passage to the senior football championship semi-final. If memory serves me correctly this will be Geraldines first championship appearance at the City venue for over a decade of years and if they can repeat their sparkling first round form when beating fancied Tramore then they can march on to that place in the penultimate round.

But believe me they must tread very warily on Sunday. The venue is to all intents and purposes a home one for Gaultier and will surely be worth a couple of scores to them. This year too they have strung together their best side for several years, and they are quietly confident that they can add the scalp of Geraldines to that of Ardmore which they so successfully captured in a first round replay. Gaultier's main forte is their considerable speed which can be exploited to the full by a particularly effective attack in which the two Ned Flynn and centre-forward Willie Fodge are the key figures. This trio more than anyone else brought about Ardmore's downfall in the first round, and if given any scope on Sunday could also

Jack Sullivan and Tony Summins form an able midfield partnership, whilst a defence that contains a number of players of proven ability will not be outwitted. It also seems likely that their former, ineter-county player John Martin, will return to the side after missing the first round, and wherever he is played he will surely prove of benefit to the side.

IMPRESSIVE
 This then is an idea of the task confronting Geraldines. They themselves gave a most impressive first round display when defeating Tramore but one should remember too that that tie was played in Dungarvan, and outside of that venue Geraldines more often than not are below their best. However, the size of the task on hands will I'm sure be well drilled home to the players on Sunday and I will be surprised if they fail to rise to the demanding occasion.

FEW CHANGES EXPECTED
 At the time of writing there has been no announcement from the Geraldines camp with regard to the line-out to do duty, and indeed at this stage the odds are that the final fifteen will not be decided on until shortly before the game. However, so completely did the team perform against Tramore that I for one would not be at all surprised if that team was given a complete vote of confidence again.

Their defence in particular was superb on that occasion

and this sector will surely see little change. The half-line of Mickey Downing, Mick Tobin and Ned Merrin will almost automatically pick itself.

Had this game been scheduled for the Fraher field then I would go unhesitatingly for an Aglish win. But they will feel far less "at home" at Walsh Park and to what extent that may affect them remains to be seen.

However, taking a line on their respective first round displays, Geraldines unquestionably looked the better side. They have the happy knack of rising to the occasion when it is demanded of them and it will surely be so on Sunday. It will be close, and the issue may hang in the balance to the very end but for all that I believe Geraldines have the strength in defence and the power in attack to see them through to that semi-final meeting with Stradbally.

WHAT bids fair to be one of the best championship
