## County Council Discusses Northern Situation

### "Ashamed at Sectarian Aggression"

— Says Protestant Member

THE Protestant Community in the South were both  
horrified and ashamed, and deplored and condemned  
the sectarian aggression in the Six Counties, Mr. H.  
R. Dowd, the lone Protestant member of Waterford  
County Council stated at the specially convened  
meeting of the Council in Dungarvan on Friday last.  
The meeting was called to discuss plans to help the  
victims of the recent happenings in the Six Counties.

At the outset, the Chair-  
man, Mr. Charles Curran  
said that since their last  
meeting a very serious situ-  
ation had developed in the  
North, where, after 50 years  
of persecution their own kit  
and kin had now been at-  
tacked, gassed and even  
murdered simply because  
they had sought their basic  
rights. In their hour of need  
and agony they in the 26  
Counties were all they had  
to turn to for help and they  
couldn't desert them. There  
was an obligation on them  
to help these people and to  
try to find a solution to the  
whole problem.

Mr. Curran went on to  
say that the happenings in  
the North had proved con-  
clusively that very little se-  
parated Fianna Fail, Fine  
Gael or Labour, for they all  
had a deep love of their  
country. This sectarian bit-  
terness had been propagated  
over the years to keep the  
Catholic minority in subjec-  
tion and now it had led to  
murder.

Mr. Curran added that he  
decided to call this special  
meeting because local Au-  
thorities all over the country  
had taken similar action.  
Mr. William Kennelly,  
T.D., said it was deeds and  
not words that were now  
needed. It should be their  
aim to help in every way pos-  
sible those people who had  
lost their homes and be-  
longings. Waterford Corpor-  
ation had already held a  
Public Meeting to form an  
aids society and if the Coun-  
ty Council could co-operate  
with the Corporation it  
would be an excellent idea.

In Waterford City they were  
channelling everything re-  
ceived through the Red  
Cross and the Knights of  
Malta, and it would be a  
good thing to see the County  
and City united on this  
project.

Mr. Norman Walsh, leader  
of the F.G. Party on the  
Council, said this was the  
most important specially con-  
vened meeting ever held by  
Waterford Co. Council. They  
were dealing with a highly  
delicate and explosive situ-  
ation in the North, and here  
in the Republic, irrespective  
of politics, class or creed,  
they were all of the one  
mind in this matter. As the  
premier Public Body in the  
county it was only right that  
they reiterate what the Gov-  
ernment had already stated  
when they announced not for  
the first time that they laid  
claim to the sovereignty of a  
32 County Ireland. To that  
claim they would not budge  
an inch and it was to their  
deepest sorrow that British  
Troops were to-day patrol-  
ling the cities of Derry and  
Belfast, and no true Irish-  
man would rest until they  
had realised a 32 county  
Ireland.

Mr. Walsh said it was a  
small clique that was causing  
all the trouble in the North.  
This county, he said, was  
one Geographical Unit, but in  
recent weeks they had seen  
tragic instances of man's  
inhumanity to man, and  
could anyone believe, he ad-  
ded, that the happenings of  
recent weeks could take  
place in a country once  
deemed to be an island of  
saints and scholars. All in the

South should join with the  
Ecumenical Churchmen in  
the North, Catholic and Non-  
Catholic in offering prayers  
for peace in honour and jus-  
tice in the Six Counties.

Mr. Walsh said the people  
who imposed partition on  
their country were the Brit-  
ish and they were the people  
that must ultimately remove  
it. They could do so, he ad-  
ded, by refusing to give the  
substantial assistance which  
they are presently giving to  
the North's Puppet Govern-  
ment. Mr. Wilson should  
have done far more than he  
has done up to the present  
time.

Mr. Sean Whelan, the  
Council's vice chairman,  
said he found it hard to get

words to express the horror  
of the Six Counties in recent  
times. It was terrible to see  
fellow Irishmen and Catho-  
lics being murdered by a  
band of hoodlums. It was the  
Black and Tan era all over  
again with B Specials roam-  
ing the streets shooting in-  
nocent people in their  
homes.

Mr. H. R. Dowd, the lone  
Protestant member of the  
Council, said he would like  
to speak firstly as a South of  
Ireland Protestant and a  
member of the Church of  
Ireland. What he had to say  
was shared by the vast ma-  
jority of his co-religionists.  
Mr. Dowd went on: "We,  
the Protestant community in  
the South believe in the  
right of every man to wor-  
ship according to his own  
conscience, and we also be-  
lieve that every man is en-  
titled to defend his life, fam-  
ily and property against at-  
tack. We deplore and con-  
demn and are horrified and  
ashamed at the sectarian ag-  
gression in the North of Ire-  
land and fully support Dail  
Eireann in the steps it is  
taking towards giving relief  
to the sufferers, and in ob-  
taining justice and peace for  
them in the future."

Mr. Dowd said his com-  
munity here further believed  
that true justice and peace  
would not be attained in Ire-  
land while the border and  
foreign control remained.  
They too wished to see the  
unification of their country,  
so long as it was achieved  
without either coercion or a  
minority by a majority or as  
could happen visa versa.  
They believed also that unity  
could in time be achieved  
by gradually increased co-  
operation in matters in  
which their interests coincid-  
ed.

### RIFLE RANGE — "NO ACTION"

For some weeks past the matter of alleged danger to the public from stray bullets from the local rifle range, got great prominence in the press and elsewhere. At a recent meeting of the Urban Council the matter was again raised and on the proposition of Mr. Lynch, seconded by Mr. Hickey, it was agreed that no action be taken and that it be left as it is for the use of the Army and F.C.A. One member remarked, and quite rightly,

"there was never any objection when British Forces operated at the range."

### HOUSE NUMBERS

Duplication of house numbers in the same streets is giving rise many comments for some time past with the result that the Irish Medical Association requested Urban Councils for a review of street designation and house numbering, etc. This was agreed to at the last meeting of the Youghal U.D.C., the Co. Manager remarking that occupants must do the necessary numbering of their premises. The Council plan to take steps to implement the decision arrived at.

### N.I. TENSION VICTIMS

Patrick Yellop (34), his Belfast-born wife and two children, aged 10 and 23 years, are refugees from Belfast, not because they were burned out, but because of the unbearable tension brought on by fear of what new terror might develop there. The family came to Youghal last week, where Patrick was born and reared and the family had only what clothes they wore and a few shillings in their pockets. In a short time the people of Youghal adopted them when the Directors of Ferks Caravans put a fine four-berth caravan at their disposal until a flat is available, and Patrick who is a weaver by trade will start at Youghal Carpets Factory on Monday next.

### HELPING THE NORTH

This past week 460 employees of Blackwater Cottons Ltd., and Seaford, Gentex Ltd., have donated one hour's wages to the fund for the relief of Six County Refugees. The Urban Council thanked the workers for their generous gesture and expressed the hope that others would do likewise.

### YOUGHAL BACKS ACTION ON THE NORTH

The following resolution was unanimously adopted at a recent meeting of the Urban Council on the proposition of Mr. Lynch, seconded by Mr. T. Hickey "That the Youghal U.D.C. unanimously support the Taoiseach and his Government on his statement on the situation in the North. We also support his action in setting up field hospitals with units of the army. On behalf of the people of Youghal we pledge our support of any action taken to protect the rights of innocent people being slaughtered in the streets. We are in full agreement with Mr. Lynch's views that the basic cause of the present trouble is partition."

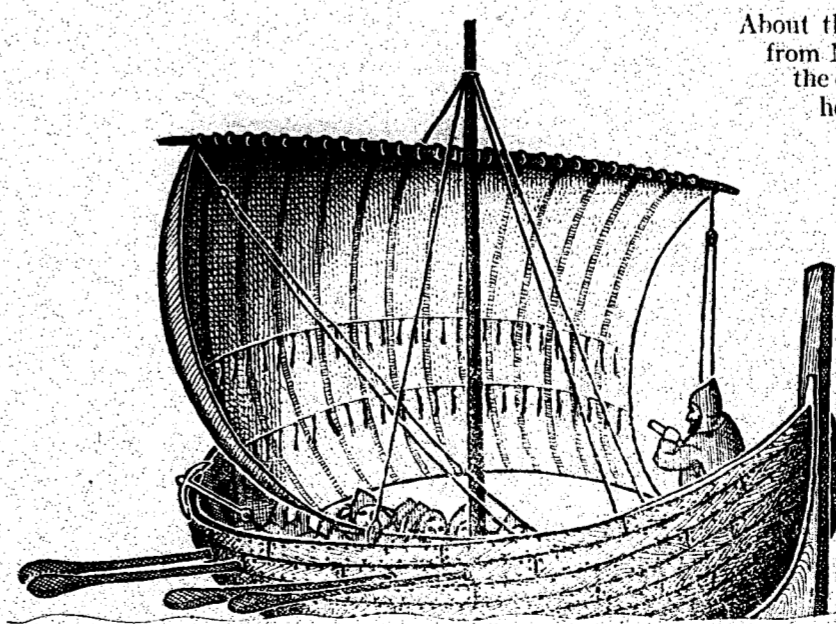

SUCCESSFUL DAON SCOIL NA nDEISE

Relations between Government and rural bodies were too often characterised by suspicion, mistrust, misunderstanding, some goodwill and regretfully, in the past few years, by sporadic but open hostilities, stated Mr. Thomas Rosingrave, National Director of Muintir na Tire, when he officially opened the annual Daon Scoil na Deise under the auspices of Dáil Mumhan at Ring Irish College, Dungarvan, on Friday night last.

In his opening address, the speaker said it was clear that the full potential for industrial and agricultural development could not be realised without a co-ordinated approach between Government and non-government agencies.

"Government Authority and Rural Organisations" was the theme of Mr. Rosingrave's opening address. It was in the interests of both the Government and non-government agencies that harmony should exist if the effective promotion of responsible individual and group activity was to take place, and if such activity was to be harnessed for the achievement of the common good, he said.

At this level, he said, relationships between the Government and rural bodies was far from satisfactory. Relations on both sides were characterised far too often by suspicion, mistrust, misunderstanding, some goodwill and, regretfully, on too many occasions in the past few years, by sporadic but open hostilities.

The functions and duties of the Government were clearly defined mainly by Acts of the Oireachtas, but because of their structure and objectives, they tend then to resist what they consider an encroachment, and have built in resistance to change. On the other hand, Rural Organisations in most cases have grown up to meet current needs, and very often up to recent years they had been weak where organisation was concerned.

Mr. Rosingrave went on to state however, that many State sponsored bodies maintained excellent relations with rural groups, and he referred to the success of the Tidy Towns competition to indicate the acceptance and success of the principle of local voluntary action. The major emphasis in Government relations with voluntary organisations ought surely to be to help people to help themselves, he said. Helping people to help themselves should be part and parcel of the skills of their public administrators.

Over 100 people from all four provinces attended this Adult Education week, which concluded on Thursday night. This time for the first year ever there was an Art Exhibition to coincide with the Daon Scoil, and it was officially opened on Sunday last by Mr. Seamas de Hyde, Uachtarán Dáil na Mumhan.

This Exhibition, which was carried out with the co-operation of the Cork Arts Society, had thirty paintings on display, and were the work of about 16 artists, from all over Munster.

In opening the exhibition Mr. de Hyde said it should be the object of every Irish home to have at least one or two paintings by Irish artists, local or national on display. That was what Conradh na Gaeilge were trying to achieve as well as endeavouring to ensure that the people would have an appreciation of Irish artists and their work.

Death of South Tipp Co. Manager

Mr. Padraig de Buitleur, County Manager for South Tipperary, died on Monday at St. Joseph's Hospital, Clonmel. Aged 64 years, he was a native of Kilmarnock, Co. Waterford.

Educated at the Clonmel High School (Christian Brothers), he secured a post with the Great Southern & Western Railway Company in 1923, and having worked in Cork, Skibbereen and Kilkenny, was transferred to the headquarters staff in Dublin. In 1938 he entered the local Government services as rates inspector with Waterford Co. Council.

In 1943 he went to the Dublin Board of Assistance as staff officer and was appointed accountant to Carlow Co. Council in 1944. Two years later he was appointed secretary to South Tipperary and in 1956 became assistant Co. Manager.

On the retirement of Mr. J. P. Flynn in 1964, he became Manager for North and South Tipperary. In April last he became Manager for South Tipperary.

A fluent Irish speaker, his interest in the language began when as a boy he attended classes started by the late Pearse McCann, the first Sinn Féin T.D. for East Tipperary. He was an active member of Conradh na Gaeilge.

He is survived by his wife, the former Miss Kitty Farrell, West Gate, Clonmel, two sons, Donal and Michael and a daughter Eileen.

It was no day for hurling finesse on Sunday last. The rain which fell relentlessly for hours before the Lismore-Stradbally Intermediate championship game at Dungarvan made sure of that. Yet these well equipped sides succeeded in turning in one of the most entertaining games seen at the venue for a long time and full marks to them for overcoming conditions that would have excused any standard on the day.

That Lismore deserved to win is beyond question, and here and now I fancy them to go the distance and take the Divisional title. They fielded without no fewer than six of their most established stars for this game, and among those absent was inter-county man Michael McGrath. Because of this crippling adversity many believed that Stradbally would pip them, but well though
