**Pensioned Teachers
Association Formed**

At a meeting in Lawlors Hotel last Friday night a branch of the Pensioned Teachers' Association was formed. Mr. Dave Hanley of the Dublin Branch addressed the gathering. Mr. M. Brennock, Abbeyside was elected Chairman of the newly formed branch with a committee consisting of Mrs. Condon, Ballinamuck, Mrs. O'Mahony, Mrs. W. Hayes and Miss K. Brennock, Abbeyside.

A resolution was passed asking the Minister for Finance to give effect to the promises made by him in his Budget statement in which he acknowledged the principle that pensions should increase in the same proportion as salaries.

Appointed Dean

Rev. Michael G. Olden, B.A., B.D., D.Hist. Eccl., a native of Cappoquin, was elected Senior Dean of St. Patrick's College, Maynooth, at the meeting of the Irish Hierarchy, on Tuesday last.

Ordained in Maynooth in 1960 he worked as Curate in the Diocese of Southwark, and later in the Waterford Diocese, before joining the academic staff of St. John's College, Waterford.

In 1966 he was appointed Junior Dean at Maynooth, and has since been Editor of the Irish Catholic Directory.

£7,191 Increase in Agricultural Estimate

At a meeting of the Co. Waterford Committee of Agriculture in Dungarvan last Monday evening, a provisional allocation of £46,000 was adopted to run the affairs of the committee in the county for the coming financial year (1970/71). This allocation represents an increase of £7,191 on the current year's figures, and will require a county rate demand of 1/5d. in the £. This represents an increase of 2d. on the present year, but most of this increase is due to the expenditure of the Committee's new offices.

POOR RESPONSE

being built in Dungarvan. In itemising the allocation, Mr. Cadogan, Inspector Dept. of Agriculture, said one of the most unsatisfactory aspects of agriculture in Co. Waterford in recent times was the poor response to the scholarship schemes. Last year only seven girls

applied for the ten scholarships, and of these only 3 actually accepted them. Eighteen boys applied for scholarships, but because of subsequent fall outs the Committee found itself in the position of being able to give all the male applicants scholarships.

This trend, he said, was not uncommon, but Co. Waterford came very low in the league, in this respect. The members of the Committee should do everything possible to get boys and girls to take advantage of these scholarships.

There were many young men who were going to stay in agriculture and who did not apply for scholarships, and every effort must be made to attract them to the scholarships.

Referring to instructors, Mr. Cadogan said that at the moment the Committee had two temporary Home Farm

Instructors employed and there was a possibility that one of these would be leaving shortly. An entire temporary staff meant instability and the Dept. did not consider instability in staff as the most desirable of positions to be in. He urged the Committee to appoint a permanent instructor, thus having an all permanent staff.

Their position in relation to agricultural instructors was their best ever, he said, and with a C.A.O. five permanent and two temporary, they had the right ratio. Farming efficiency had improved considerably in recent years, he said, and for this instructors must be given due credit for it.

Finally, on the proposal of Mr. Curran, seconded by Mr. P. Kenneally, the Committee unanimously adopted the provisional allocation as presented to the meeting.

Young Farmers To Get Free Transport For Classes

The present day tendency is to spoon feed everyone, and this free transport for education, amongst other things, will be the ruination of us today, stated Mr. Norman Walsh, at a meeting of Co. Waterford Committee of Agriculture in Dungarvan.

The members were discussing the Provisional Allocation for the coming financial year, when they were told by the Dept. Inspector, Mr. J. Cadogan, that the winter farm schools and the classes for the young farmers would cost an estimated £860 in the coming year as against £300 in the current year.

Mr. Walsh said that they were absolutely spoon feeding the young farmers. In effect they were paying them to come in for the free instruction and this was a very sad reflection on the young farming community.

Mr. T. Frost (C.A.O.) said this was done in other countries. If they had thirty in a class it would cost no more than £10 per pupil per year.

Mr. Walsh: It all boils down that they have to be paid to come into classes that are absolutely free.

Mr. Cadogan said that children had free transport

and this was a facility that was now being given to the young farmers that attended the classes.

Mr. A. Fenton, B.Agr.Sc., who conducted those classes last year on behalf of the Committee, said that anything they could do to encourage young farmers to attend these classes they should do so. The value of these classes were of incalculable help, and the cost of running mini-buses to bring the pupils would be well worth while.

The C.A.O. said classes would be held in Ballymacbray and Kilmacthomas and they were hoping to have a third in Lismore.

Mr. P. Kenneally said that compared with other countries they were well behind in agricultural education and if they ever joined the E.E.C. they would find themselves "in the soup."

Schemes such as this therefore should be given all the help they could give them. Mr. Walsh: It is still spoon feeding, a practise that I am not in favour of. This free transport for education will be the ruination of us one day.

However, on the proposal of Mr. J. Keane, the Committee decided to provide

mini-buses to transport the young farmers to these winter classes.

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WATERFORD HEALTH AUTHORITY AMENDMENT OF ACTS relating to CHILDREN IN FOSTER HOMES, ETC.

Attention is directed to the important changes effected by the Children (Amendment) Act, 1957, in the law relating to children placed in foster homes, or in certain employment, by a person or by a body other than a local authority.

By reason of these changes, all the existing requirements regarding children up to age 9 accepted in foster homes for reward now apply to such children up to age 16 and apply in addition to illegitimate children accepted in foster homes, other than the homes of relatives, irrespective of whether the child is received for reward or not.

Other new provisions relate to:—(a) the placing of new obligations on persons or bodies arranging fosterage; (b) the extension of the period of notice to be given in connection with the placing of a child; (c) notification to the appropriate local authority of any arrangement (made by a body or a person other than a relative of the child) for the employment of a child under 18 years of age in circumstances which require the child to reside in premises other than those in which he or she previously resided; (d) supervision by the local authority of the welfare of children.

None of the foregoing provisions applies to a child who has been legally adopted, i.e. in respect of whom an Adoption Order has been made in pursuance of the Adoption Act, 1952.

Robbed Man who Gave Lift in Car

Two brother, Stephen and Patrick Hogan, Tinabinna, Ardsallagh, Youghal, were each sentenced to 12 months imprisonment at Youghal District Court when they pleaded guilty to robbing Frederick Kearns, Cappagh, of £81.10.0 in cash and a suit valued £20, at Muckridge Demense, Youghal, on the night of Sept. 13 last. Justice L. B. Skinner took a number of other charges into account. Suplt. P. McMahon, Middle-ton, prosecuting, said that Kearns made a statement in which he said he was driving to his home. When near Youghal Bridge he discovered he had no cigarettes. He turned back for Youghal and saw a girl thumbing a lift towards the town. He stopped to give her a lift when the two defendants came over to the car and also asked for a spin to Youghal. They all got into the back of the car, but he asked one of them to get into the front because he had a suit of clothes in the back. He felt a bit uneasy with them in the car, and when he let them out they thanked him and said his suit was in the back. The statement went on: 'When I couldn't see my suit in the car I got out, and got a flash lamp from one of them to look for it. I was then asked if I was accusing them of stealing the suit, but I said no. I then saw the suit on a fence, but as I reached for it one of them jumped on me and struck me on the head with the lamp. I was knocked to the ground and punched. My wallet was taken from me and I was told that if I did anything I would get struck.'

The statement added that he reported the matter to the gardai, who took him to a house where he saw the two defendants and the girl. Suplt. McMahon said that the defendants were taken into custody and had been in custody since. They denied all knowledge of the incident. As a result of a conversation with the girl the gardai went to a dump where they got a roll of notes to the value of £81.10.0.

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The President of the N.F.A., Mr. T. J. Maher, said in Cork that the National Dairy Publicity Council had failed to increase substantially the quantity of liquid milk being consumed and one had to pose the question: Is it doing an effective job?

Mr. Maher, who was addressing a large attended meeting of Cork liquid milk producers, deplored the fact that with surplus milk readily available in our cities, there were many leading establishments serving snack and cold luncheons that could not provide a glass of milk on request.

Mr. Maher said it was clear that a great deal more could be consumed on the home market to the benefit both of the farmer and the general public and it would also relieve the taxpayer of having to help in disposing of extra dairy produce in a difficult world market.

It was up to the Government to give the lead, he felt, in ensuring that milk and milk products, such as cheese, were used in all establishments under their control.

Mr. Maher said that the N.F.A. subscribed to the view that the supplies of liquid milk to large centres should be on a rational basis and that the achievement of a rational system should be left to farmers themselves.

Mr. Maher, who was addressing a meeting of Cork liquid milk producers, said that it was both logical and rational that only the necessary amount of surplus should go into any liquid milk centre so as to avoid unnecessary and costly haulage of milk to and fro. We also agree, he said, that any other milk should be directed from the farm to the manufacturing centre. The farmers must have the right either to produce milk for the liquid milk trade or for manufacturing purposes.

The market for liquid milk was limited and unstatic, he said. There, it was only reasonable that the traditional suppliers should now be producing more milk than was required for the liquid trade. Furthermore, it must be borne in mind that in view of the fact that had not got an increase for over two years, farmers would increase production to offset increased costs and must endeavour to do so if they are to remain in business.

Any attempt to stop producers following the present system on diverting surplus milk to creameries could only lead to chaos and the N.F.A. would view with extreme concern any decision to bring about a change at this time.

Mr. Maher concluded by reiterating the claim for an increase in liquid milk prices presented by the N.F.A. National Liquid Milk Group along with the Leinster Milk Suppliers' Association and the Cork Liquid Milk Producers in the pre-Budget talks with the Minister for Agriculture last April.

Mr. R. V. Hourigan, B.Agr.Sc., Secretary of the N.F.A. National Dairy Committee represented the Association at a meeting of the International Dairy Council in Mercury House, London.

In view of the difficulties being experienced at present in disposing of surplus dairy products in a highly competitive international market, this meeting was of particular importance to the country's 10,000 dairy farmers as the N.F.A. representative had an opportunity of assessing what our competitors are doing in the present situation.

Amongst the thirteen countries represented at the conference were Britain, France, Denmark, the Netherlands and New Zealand.

The Conference discussions covered the world dairying situation and outlook and the present international trends in the production of creamery milk and dairy products.

The N.F.A. National Grain Committee wishes to draw the attention of wheat growers to the importance of ensuring that their full names and addresses are available to the Grain Board for the purpose of refunding the balance due for the 15/- per barrel deducted pending a final decision on the levy.

The Committee was told that many names and addresses were incomplete, which caused much confusion and misinformation and it was in the farmers' interest

est to ensure that the correct information was recorded at the intake point where his wheat was delivered.

The Committee agreed that a TheCommitteeagdtbaee all branch secretaries be circularised and instructed to inform members that speedy return of their cheque could best be brought about by their supplying full details at the intake points.

MORE AGRICULTURAL EDUCATION FACILITIES

Government awareness that the facilities for agricultural education must be developed to the fullest is reflected in Mr. Gerry Cronin's address at the presentation of prizes to the winners of the National Farm Management Competition in Dublin.

The Parliamentary Secretary to the Minister for Agriculture and Fisheries said the provision of more agricultural education facilities for the 4,000 young men entering farming annually was high among the aims of the Government's Third Programme.

"Agricultural education does not of itself guarantee success as a farmer," he continued, "but it does provide a young farmer with essential knowledge and understanding and perhaps some of the skills exhibited by the farmers who scored well in this competition."

Speaking on productivity, Mr. Cronin said there was a great potential for producing more from the land, especially livestock, and producing it more efficiently.

Given the wise use of credit, and a readiness to apply new farming methods, Irish farmers could set up many more units of sufficient economic strength to meet the competitive production and marketing conditions of the future.

Mr. Kieran Curtin, President of Macra na Feirme, said a good knowledge of farm management techniques and the keeping of farm records were blueprints to better farming.

He hoped to see short residential courses on farm management organised by Macra in conjunction with the agricultural colleges or advisory services. "Specific training in management is needed if we are to make real progress," he added.

Dr. J. F. Dempsey, Director Bank of Ireland Group, which sponsors the competition, said that while the National Farm Management Competition has made a very significant contribution to the promotion of better farm management, its full potential as an instrument of improvement had not been exploited.

"We should like to see greater participation from many counties and we are, through the Farm Management Committee of Macra, endeavouring to extend its application and benefits."

The prizes for the first and second placed competitors in each of the three classes was £50 with the 3 winners also qualifying for a 15 day education trip to Denmark and Sweden to study Scandinavian farming methods. NFA members figured prominently in the prizelist.

Mr. T. J. Maher, President of the N.F.A.; Mr. S. and Mr. B. Power, Deputy do., were among the attendants.

ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING

The annual meeting of the N.F.A. National Council will be held on Monday next, October 13.

The President Mr. Maher will make a major policy address setting guidelines for Irish agriculture as we enter a new decade.

WANT RISE IN PIG PRICE GUARANTEES

The N.F.A. called on the Ministers for Agriculture Mr. Blaney to make an early announcement on the necessary increases in pig prices following the rise in the price of barley this year's harvest.

The President of the Association, Mr. T. J. Maher in a letter to Mr. Blaney, pointed out: "At the meeting between the N.F.A. and yourself on the 1st April, 1969, you agreed that discussions on the price increase would take place in May, as soon as the esti-

ated acreage under barley was known.

Since 23rd May, 1969, when we had the relevant information on the barley acreage, we have been pressing unsuccessfully for a meeting with officials of your Department. Now we find that the price of pig meal has already gone up by 25/- per ton and there is still no knowledge of the compensation you intend granting.

"Our National Pigs and Bacon Committee discussed this question on Tuesday, in common with many other interests in the pig industry the Committee has been working for the last two years in trying to rebuild confidence in pig production and to restore output to its former level. The Committee is of the opinion that this work is being undermined and confidence badly shaken by the delay in announcing the new prices."

ative or group farming and what it could mean for small farmers facing a stern battle for survival in face of increasing competition. These can enjoy facilities similar to larger farmers if they are willing to pool resources.

"There are many forms the idea can take. It can involve one commodity (on several farms) or a range of commodities. It can even embrace the pooling of farms by voluntary consent of the farmers themselves.

"And this, of course, would also mean the pooling of ideas, brain power and technical know-how to the benefit of the group.

"Co-operative endeavour in this sense would give smaller farmers added strength in the market place and might well give a new lease of hope to many, who now doubt whether there is a future for them in agriculture.

SMUGGLING HITS PRODUCERS HERE

The smuggling of pigs from Northern Ireland, estimated to run sometimes at 4,000 a week, was discussed by the N.F.A. National Pigs and Bacon Committee.

It was pointed out that smuggling of pigs was costing Irish taxpayers in the region of £20,000 a week and besides this was giving a false impression of overall pig production figures in the South.

The Committee called for tighter control measures at the Border in order to discourage this illegal traffic which was also indirectly depressing prices for the producer here in the South.

CO-OPERATIVE OR GROUP FARMING?

Speaking at the 75th anniversary dinner of the I.A.O.S. in Dublin, the President of the N.F.A., Mr. T. J. Maher paid tribute to the efforts of the I.A.O.S. in the field of co-operative endeavour in the past 75 years.

Most of those efforts, said Mr. Maher, had been concentrated in the sales sector beyond the farm gate. Now he believed, the I.A.O.S. should turn its attention to the vital necessity of co-operation in production at farm level itself and improving farmer participation in marketing.

"I have in mind especially the question of cooper-

"Progress need not be slow, although it would mean a change in longstanding attitudes and a turning away from the individualism that has been a characteristic trait of Irish farmers in the past. Recently, however, Irish farmers, spearheaded by the N.F.A., the I.A.O.S. and Cork Marts, all working in close co-operation, collected the £3 million capital needed for a successful movement into the processing end of the meat industry. And more recently still, they have shown their readiness to combine together in the establishment of a Farmers Insurance Company.

"The individualism of the past has been replaced by a new-found spirit of co-operative endeavour.

"There is no reason now why this spirit of endeavour cannot be directed into the field of group farming.

"In our current review of N.F.A. policy, we are giving close attention to the possibilities of using group action of this kind as an instrument of improving the economic and social conditions of our small farm families."

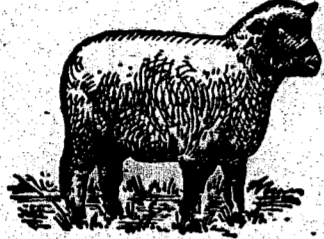

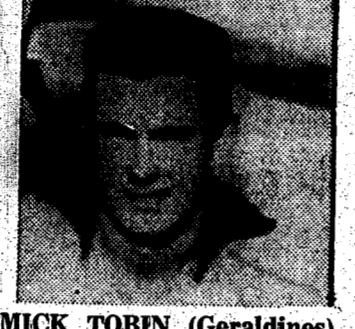

MICK TOBIN (Geraldines)

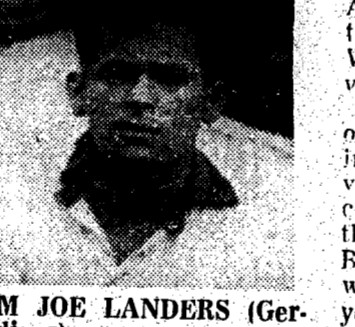
was superb on that occasion and this sector at least, will surely see little change.

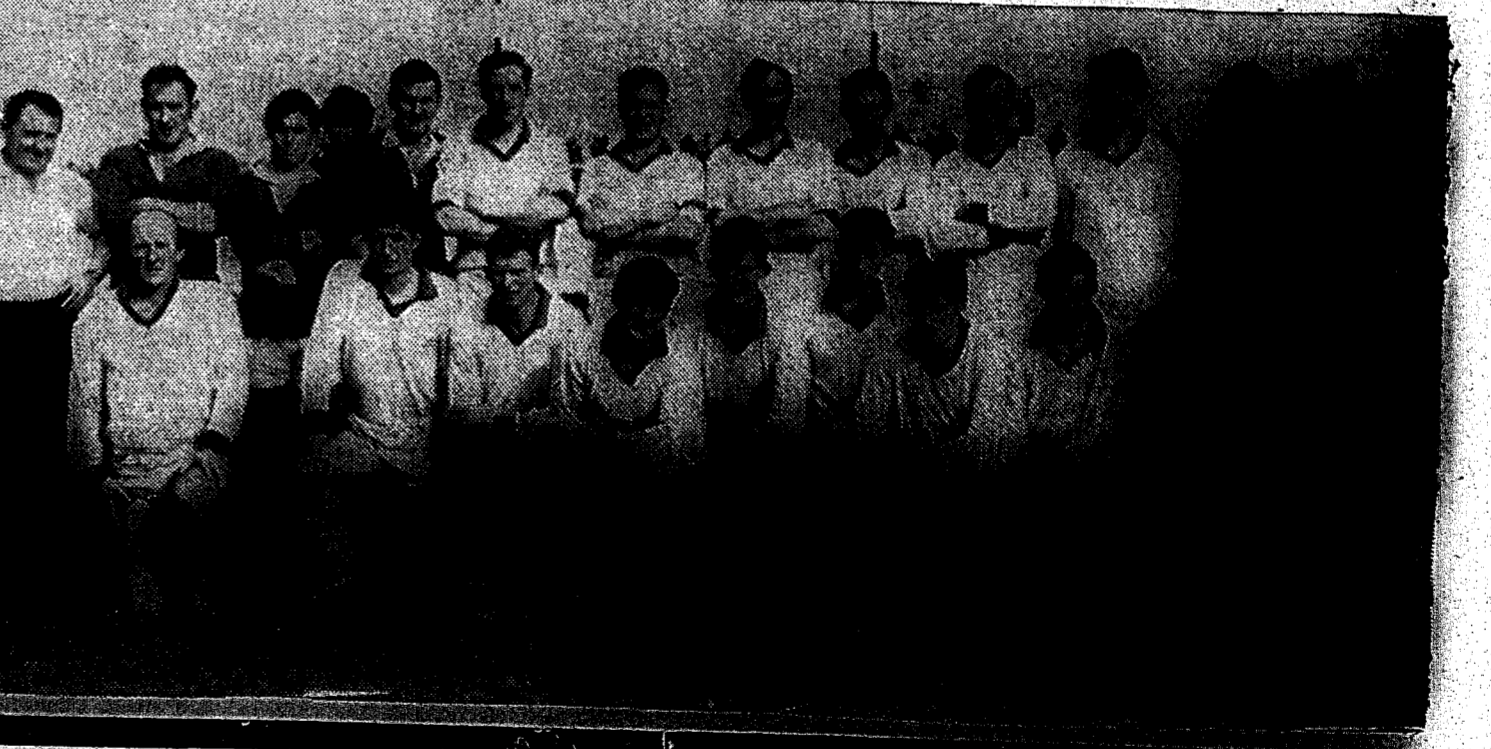
