## Inquests at Dungarvan

At an inquest held in the Court-house, Dungarvan, on Wednesday last, a verdict in accordance with the medical evidence, of the death of John Brett, Colligan, Dungarvan, due to accidental death, was returned.

Mr. J. Dennehy, Coolcorrack, said in a statement that on the 9th July last, he was in Mr. P. Spence's field, Coolcorrack working on silage. John Brett was driving a tractor and it seemed to be rolling down the slope leading into the pit. He was standing at the other end of the pit and saw Brett making an attempt to get off the tractor. While trying to get off he was lifting his left leg and in doing so his knee hit the steering wheel. He also had his left hand on the steering wheel, but did not succeed in jumping clear. The tractor rolled down the side of the pit, and came to rest upside down. He then ran to the tractor and found John pinned underneath with the mudguard resting on his chest. Other workmen and himself then removed the tractor and went for medical help.

James Brett, Colligan said that on the 10th July, he visited the morgue and identified the body of his brother.

Sgt. T. Carthy, in a statement, said that on the 10th inst. he visited the scene of the accident. He saw a tractor between the pit and the ditch and on top of the pit of silage. He could see the mark of the wheels where they veered towards the

edge of the pit. Dr. B. McCarthy said that on the 9th July when he went to the scene of the accident he found John Brett was extremely shocked and had an extensive crush injury to the chest and the right ribs. His condition deteriorated en route to the hospital and he died before reaching the hospital. The cause of death was shock and internal haemorrhage, due to lung damage and rupture of the pulmonary veins.

The Coroner Mr. Daniel Healy said that he extended his sincere sympathy to the parents of the deceased on this unhappy occasion.

### HOSPITAL PATIENT'S DEATH

Dr. M. K. Cusack, in a report, said that on the 6th June last, he performed a post mortem examination on the body of Miss Florence Earle, Stradbally, a patient of St. Joseph's Hospital, Dungarvan, and found that death was due to increased intracranial pressure due to haemorrhage.

Nurse K. Curran, in a statement, said that at 7.57 a.m., on June 5th, she heard that Miss Earle had fallen out of the bed. On going to her assistance she found that she had fallen out of the bed and apparently her head had hit the bed locker. She had a small wound on the right side of her head and was bleeding profusely. She then dressed the wound and helped her back into bed. She was fully conscious and did not appear to have any other injuries at the time.

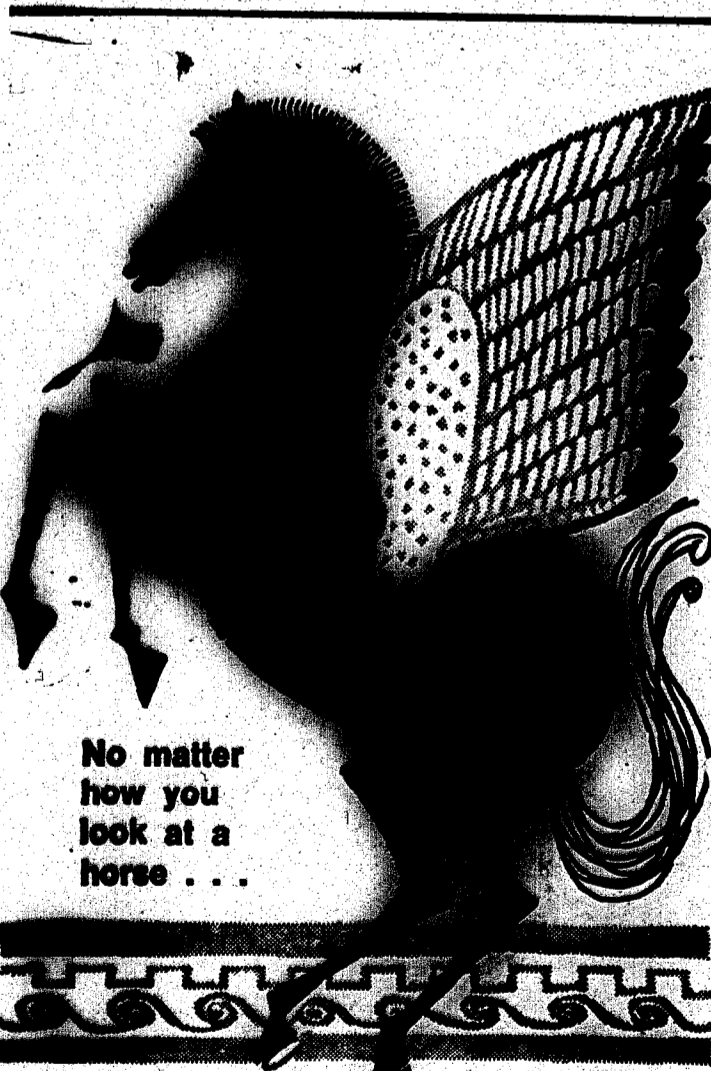

Waterford Branch of I.S.P.C.C.

There has been a sharp increase in the number of cases of cruelty reported to the Waterford Branch of the Irish Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Children, during the nine months ending on 31st Sept. last.

The Society Inspector in Waterford enquired into 104 complaints of neglect, assault, ill treatment, beyond control and other wrongs of childhood, all of which were found to be true. A total of 379 children were affected, and 130 offenders were detected. The Society Inspector made 715 visits of supervision during the nine months.

A Report issued by the Waterford Branch last week says that there is a great need for increased funds and more voluntary helpers in the area. Funds raised for the Society in Waterford City and county last year were the second lowest in Ireland. An appeal has been issued for second hand clothes and blankets for needy families, and will be called for by telephoning 4547.

What use Dungarvan might have made of the strong breeze in the second half will never be known due to the referee's unfortunate injury.

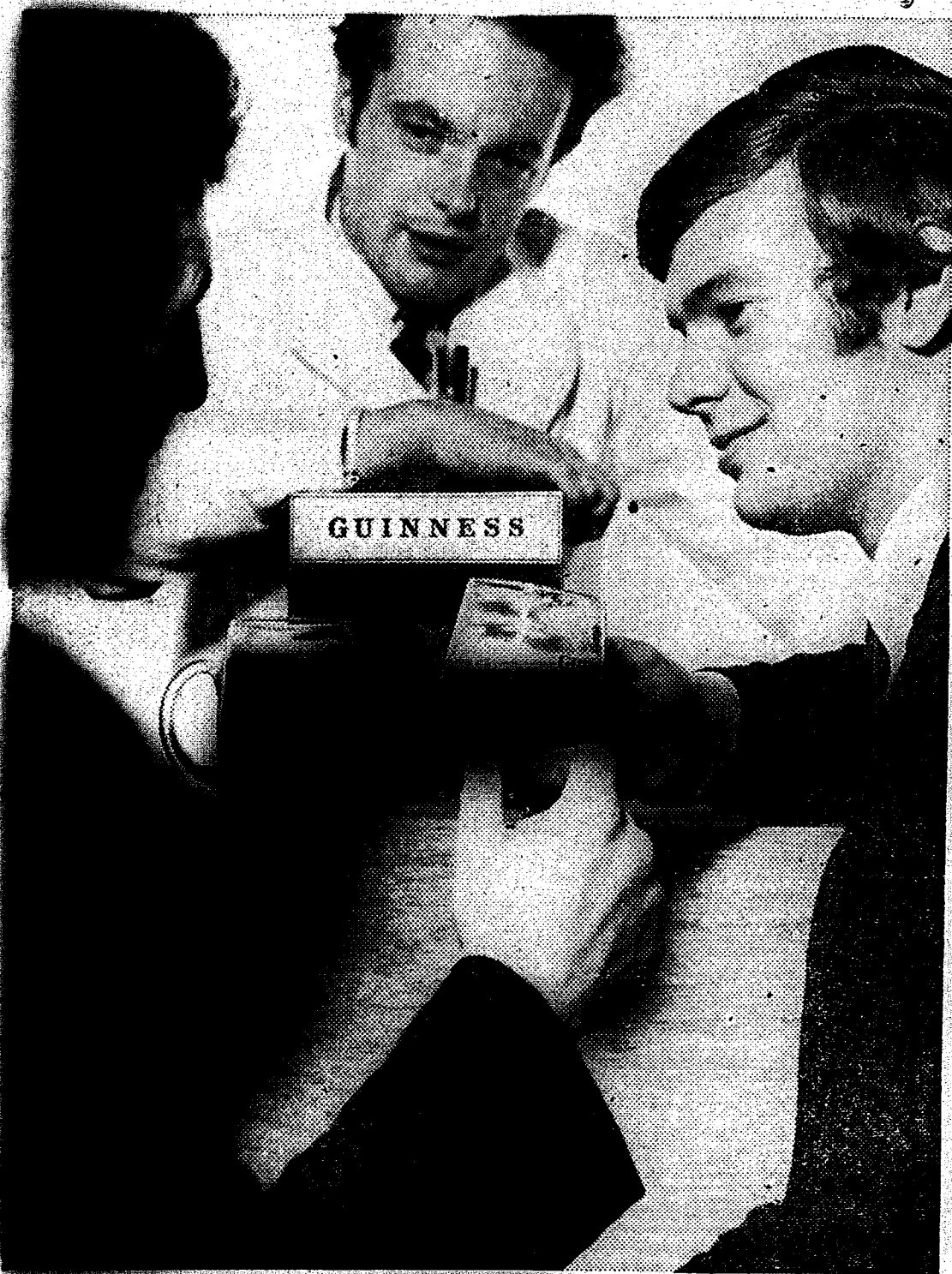

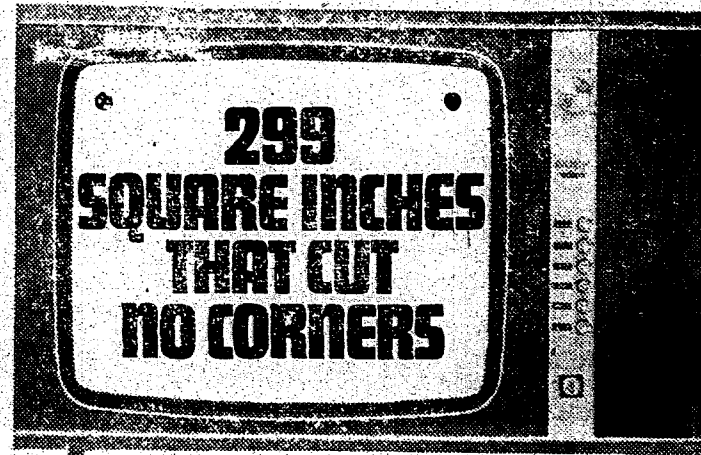

of Pat Enright, playing at centre forward. Enright can undoubtedly be the match winner if he received the proper proportion of assistance from his attacking colleagues. Nonetheless Donal Whelan, Joe Flynn, Tony Mansfield, Mick Kiely and Lar Cummins can make and take scores. I have just been informed that John McGrath (who is suffering from a knee injury) and Lar Cummins are unlikely starters on Sunday. Here no doubt a serious problem arises for Abbeyside and even though they can find good men to fill vacant places, they will surely be a big loss to them.

Mount Sion on the other hand are injury free and they will surely field the same team as that which very comfortably eliminated De La Salle in the semi-final. In goal Sion will have inter-county man Mick Foley. Their side is back-boned by players of vast senior hurling experience in Phil Fanning, Larry Guinan, Mickey Walsh, Martin Og Morrissey and Pat Kelly. If these men can dominate next Sunday's game to the same extent as they have done up

to this, then Abbeyside could well find the writing on the wall from them at an early stage of the game. Sion will enter the fray quietly confident and in all the circumstances that confidence is justified. While I expect an unchanged defence on duty from that which beat De La Salle, midfield and attack are likely to have some changes. Sion will be without star minor D. Murphy who was sent to the line in Sunday's County minor hurling final.

View this game whatever way one will, it all adds up to an intriguing and interesting decider. Mount Sion are powered by a number of players capable of dominating this final. Abbeyside on the other hand, happy in the knowledge that they easily defeated three-in-a-row Ballygunner are adequately equipped to contain the Monastery men and make history on Sunday.

However, I expect but a score or two to separate the side and judging from past experience Mount Sion may just have the edge.

## Stradbally and Geraldines must meet again

AT the Fraher Field on Sunday last, Stradbally found themselves utterly outplayed for lengthy spells by the Geraldines, and even their most ardent fans will readily concede that they were decidedly fortunate to earn themselves a draw from a far from exciting and entertaining semi-final. The Geraldines seemed to lack accuracy in their shooting and in the first quarter of the game they missed many a score. Indeed they were very lucky that they had any lead going into the second half. On the whole the Stradbally back line was not very impressive and had the Geraldine forwards been more alert to the ball they could have had at least a goal to their credit.

In all circumstances the Geraldines can be well satisfied with a division of the spoils. But surely when analysing the game they will be kicking themselves for throwing a game away they should have won with a bit

ing the Stradbally men magnificently. Then disaster struck the Geraldines. At this stage it looked as though Stradbally had the game all sewn up, seeing as how they had played so well against the wind in the first half. They were only three points down on their opponents at this stage, so it seemed that all they had to do in the second half was to go out there and win the game. ## Injury-hit Cappoquin Fail In Final

For fifteen minutes the Western boys hurled with rare abandon and just as they were getting on top they were hit by a spate of injuries from which they just could not recover.

First of all down went "Nap" Morrissey, who was having a fine game and though he resumed playing after attention, he was not the same for the remainder of the game. Within a minute, star half back Frank McCarthy was on the ground with another severe head injury and was forced to re-

tire. In the spate of a few minutes from this upset Sion had hammered in four goals—a body blow from which Cappoquin could not hope to recover, even though they were well in the hunt right to the end.
