Won McCalmont £10,000 Offered for Cup at Dungarvan Site Kilkenny

Messrs. Thomas and Michael Hearne, Kilmachomas, won the McCalmont Cup at Kilkenny on Friday night last with Seafiel Mink, a brindled September 1967 Seafiel Flash out of Seafiel Mink.

The winner came from the last bend to win by two lengths in 19.60 from Ground Limestone, which beat the 5/2 joint favourite Prairie Sunrise by half a length for second place. The other joint favourite, Granada Gold, was fourth, half a length away.

In the first round of the Shandon Sweepstake, at Cork on Saturday night Seafiel Mink won in 30.05.

Soccer's Club Application for Site Deferred

An application from the Dungarvan Soccer Club to purchase the approximate 10 acres at Shandon, currently being used as the town dump, for conversion into a playing pitch, was considered by the members of the Urban Council on Monday night last.

The Town Clerk, Mr. J. P. Robinson said they had now acquired a new dump and this present one at Shandon would be closed up at a future date.

The Chairman, Mr. T. A. Kyne, said that they also had in mind making a bid for the nearby railway station grounds and have them both made available as industrial sites.

Mr. P. Whelan said that he would like to support the soccer club in any way possible. They were talking about building youth clubs in the town and here was a club that was doing just that and that their application for a site should be given consideration.

Mr. Kyne said that because of the expense involved he could not see any club being able to reclaim the land on their own expense account.

The County Manager, Mr. C. A. O'Connor, said that their first aim should be the development of industry and that this site was earmarked as a possible industrial one.

Replying to Mr. Deasy, the County Manager said they were at the planning stage for the Health Authority to take over the site at present used as a playing pitch by the soccer club. It would take some time yet, however, before the club would have to leave.

Mr. Deasy said that the club had been very good tenants on the present site and they had done a lot for the youth of the town.

The application was deferred but it will be considered again at a future meeting of the Council.

Joint Survey of School Needs Proposed

Two years ago there was to be great co-operation in post primary education with integration from the different schools, but all that had now fallen on its face, the co-operation had ceased and school had retreated into its own shell. This was stated by Mr. A. Deasy at this week's meeting of the Co. Waterford Vocational Educational Committee in Dungarvan when it was decided to set up a joint council consisting of the heads of schools, teachers representatives and members of the committee to carry out a survey into the educational needs of the various schools in the county.

The Acting C.E.O., Mr. T. F. Maher, read a letter from the Department which said that they were not satisfied that the anticipated requirements of the committee's proposed music teaching scheme warranted the creation of a permanent while time teacher of music.

Mr. Maher said that the minimum amount of hours that a permanent whole time teacher must put in must be 25. Yet between the Kilmachomas and Dungarvan schools there were 14 separate classes and if a teacher gave only two hours weekly to each class, it would mean a total of 28 hours.

Mr. Liam Comerford said the Department had overlooked the obvious adult demand for such a class. He proposed that all heads of schools be asked, together with teachers representatives of the Vocational Committee on a joint Council to carry out a survey to ascertain the needs of the various schools in the county.

PAY INCREASES GRANTED

Increases amounting to £975 in the recent financial year were unanimously granted to the officials and outdoor staff of the Dungarvan Urban Council at a meeting of the Council.

The Town Clerk, in a report said that the increases had been negotiated between the Congress of Traditions and the Council and the City Managers' Association. The increase, generally speaking would be 4% for the outdoor staff and this would cost the Council about £700 in the current year. The proposed increase for the officials was 4% on salaries not exceeding £1,800 and 3% on salaries exceeding £1,800 with a minimum increase of 2%.

The estimated cost of implementing this would be £275.

Mr. Robinson said that there were five full-time and two part-time officials involved and 12 outdoor staff.

Mr. N. Hackett proposed that both increases be granted. Mr. T. Wade seconded.

Re-Opening Turned Down by C.I.E.

A call by the Dungarvan Urban Council in support of the Cork Rail Study Groups suggestion that the Waterford to Dungarvan rail line be re-opened, has been turned down by C.I.E.

In a letter to the Council, Mr. M. Flannery, Area Manager, C.I.E., said that the decision to withdraw the general railway services between Waterford and Dungarvan was taken after the most careful consideration of all factors. Since the line was closed more satisfactory and economical services had been provided.

Mr. A. Deasy said that the decision to close the line was a bad one and that the only way that it could be re-opened again would be for the local business people to band together and give an undertaking that they would utilise the rail services.

The Chairman said that he had been told by reliable sources that C.I.E. was going to lay a second line direct from Waterford to Mallow at enormous expense. All along they on the Urban Council, as well as other local bodies had been against the closure of the line. It was a decision however, that was now being regretted.

Presented Paintings To Urban Council

A Dungarvan man, Mr. Sean McCarthy, now resident in the United States, presented four beautiful hand-painted views of Dungarvan, to the members of the Dungarvan Urban Council.

The paintings will be placed in the Courthouse temporarily and permission will be sought to have them placed in the new library when the building is completed.

Sean said that the four pictures were painted in Naples by two great artists and he wanted them to be a memorial to his family. He said that he was horrified at the state of the Town Hall and also by the derelict site of the Old Castle.

The Chairman, Mr. Kyne, said that it was with great pleasure that he accepted this gift on behalf of the Council.

The other members of the Council also thanked Mr. McCarthy for his most kind gift to the people of Dungarvan.

Month's Jail for Assault

Thomas Kirby, Cathal Brugha Place, was sentenced to one month's imprisonment on a charge of unlawfully assaulting John Hourigan, 58 Murphy Place, Abbeyside, on 28th August last.

In a statement, John Hourigan said that he was taking the tickets at a dance in Dungarvan, when Denis Daly broke in the door and hit him a few times. Then Daly ran away and Kirby then attacked him with a knife and asked him to come down the Quay to finish it off. When Hourigan refused to go with him, he said that he would get him on the way home.

Cross-examined by Kirby, who conducted his own defence, Hourigan said that when Daly attacked him first he had a chain in his hand.

A witness, who was a member of the band said that when he heard that his friend was in trouble he went down to the door and saw Hourigan and Kirby on the ground. When he tried to separate them Kirby threatened him with a knife and said that he would get him too.

The Defendant, Thomas Kirby said he saw Hourigan and Daly fighting and one of them had a chain in his hand. He was struck by Hourigan several times and it was then that he took out his lighter so as he might frighten the others away. He admitted asking Hourigan down to the Quay and said that the whole trouble had been started by Daly.

Justice Skinner sentenced Kirby to one month in prison and said that he would have to stamp out rows at dances. He fixed recognisance in the event of an appeal.

Incident Outside Marquee

An incident outside a dance marquee at Killeen, Dungarvan, on 28th August, had a sequel when Robert Hartery, 47 Pearse Square, Carrick-on-Suir appeared before the court charged with using bad language, calculated to lead to a breach of the peace and with being drunk and disorderly on the same occasion.

Garda McDermott said when on duty he saw a group of men around a car and they were using bad language. When he approached them, he saw that the man behind the wheel was drunk and said that they had better go into the dance rather than go driving. When he (Garda) moved away he saw Hartery and another man at the back of Hayes' Licensed premises. Hartery had a large bottle behind his back and when the Garda asked him what he was doing, he heard him say: "I'll get him." When he was asked to drop the bottle he refused and eventually he got them into the car and they drove away.

The Justice imposed a fine of £20, mitigated to £2.10.0 on the first charge and bound the defendant to the peace for 12 months, and fined him £2 on the second charge.

Waterford County Council Meeting

NEED FOR SEA RESCUE UNIT
At a meeting of the Waterford County Council, on Friday last, Mr. Austin Deasy said that since the withdrawal of the Helvick Lifeboat, a sea rescue unit in Dungarvan had become an urgent necessity.

Mr. F. J. O'Leary, Acting Co. Secretary, said that he had been in touch with the Tramore Committee who were operating such a service, and they had expressed the view that to set up one in Dungarvan, or any other area, was a matter for voluntary effort by the people concerned.

Mr. Deasy agreed that the service should be a voluntary one, but that the Council should give a generous grant to the provisions of such a service.

Mr. P. Coffey said that the Civil Defence might be interested in this kind of work.

Mr. C. Curran (Chairman) said that he did not think that they would have any function in the matter.

Mr. J. D. Hally (Co. Engineer) said that the R.N.L.I. might be induced to place an inshore rescue boat in Dungarvan.

Finally, it was decided to leave the matter in the hands of the Co. Engineer and local Colrs. A. Deasy and T. A. Kyne, to explore the possibility of organising a local voluntary effort to provide the sea rescue unit in the town.

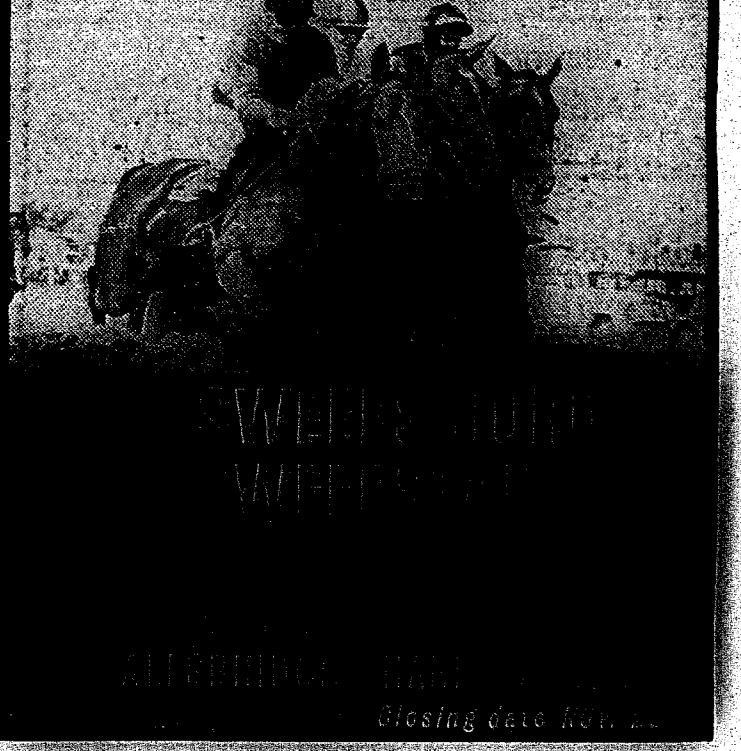

JUVENILE SENT AWAY FOR ADDITIONAL TWO YEARS

A 15½-year-old Dungarvan inmate of St. Joseph's Industrial School for some time and he and another youth broke out and from Dungarvan District Court, on Wednesday last, where they stole the watches money and the penknife.

The youth pleaded guilty to breaking and entering the house of Laurence Fitzgerald, Ballinacuck, Dungarvan, on 16th October and stealing £6.26 in cash, three watches of the value of £23; a penknife, valued 5/-, and causing damage to the extent of 10/-. He also pleaded guilty to breaking into Newtown Manor National School, and stealing 18/-, the property of William Corcoran. Inspector A. Murtagh said that the Youth had been an inmate of St. Joseph's Industrial School for some time and he and another youth broke out and from Dungarvan District Court, where they stole the watches money and the penknife.

A member of the Staff of St. Joseph's said that they would prefer not to take him back again as he had been a bad influence on the other youths at the school. Some time ago he escaped with a youth and he has not been seen since.

Justice Skinner said that he would send the defendant to Daingean for two years, where he might get psychiatric treatment.

May have Car Park Corfk Lorry Driver Fined £30

Waterford County Council is to support Dungarvan Urban District Council in its efforts to obtain Scannlan's Yard, for conversion into a major car park that would be able to hold about one thousand cars.

Mr. J. D. Hally (Co. Engineer) said that because of the lack of sufficient car parking in the Square in Dungarvan, there were many visitors who were passing through. Most of the cars parked on the Square were there much more than an hour and that some of them were there all day.

He went on to add that the site should be purchased and converted into a car park and he believed that there would be a grant available. The factories in the town could start the good example by providing off-street parking for their staff as well. It was agreed to submit details in a report to the Dept., as well as a report of the traffic survey carried out in Dungarvan some time ago.

Mr. M. J. Lavan, Solicitor, said the lorry had been off the road and was only on a trial run when the garda stopped it. Imposing the fine the Justice said he would take into account a number of other charges relating to defects on the vehicle. He also ordered him to pay £1.14.3 expenses.

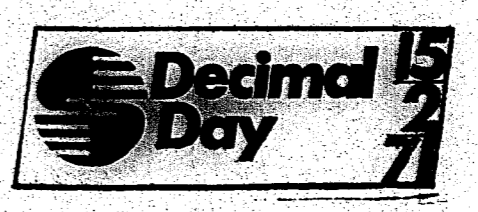

The NFA National Council at its annual meeting in Dublin, unanimously decided to call on the Taoiseach to set up a Commission to investigate the entire structure of the Dept. of Agriculture.

Mr. Sean Bolger (Kilkenny) said it could well occur that a 200 acre farmer would only produce 7,000 gallons of milk.

Mr. P. Fitzgerald (Limerick) who moved the suspension of standing orders, said the Minister's multi-tier proposals sought to divide the big and small farmer.

Mr. Paddy Lane, one of the newly elected NFA Vice-Presidents, said the milk price issue was the most important in Irish farming for the past ten or twenty years.

Mr. J. Bergin (Kilkenny) Chairman of the NFA Dairy Committee said it was a measure of the importance which members attached to the milk issue that standing orders had been suspended.

Mr. S. Hennessy (South Tipperary) said if efficiency was stifled the industry would come to a complete standstill.

Mr. Maher wanted to try and put it across that he was concerned about the small farmer. The NFA was concerned also about the small man and interested in helping the small man to help himself.

Mr. Maher said that the Minister had in effect told the progressive farmer that he would be penalised.

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E.E.C. PRAISE FOR IRISH FARMERS
Mr. Blaney's blow to the efficient farmer came just at a time when an E.E.C. publication went on record as stating that Irish farmers in common with their British and Danish counterparts are more productive and efficient than those in the six Common Market countries.

Gavin Gordon reported from Brussels that the "Irish Press" the four candidate countries for E.E.C. membership produce 3,000 dollars of value added per person engaged in farming, as against only 2,075 dollars in the six Common Market countries.

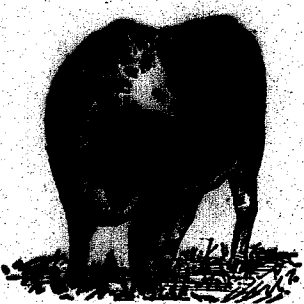

LETTER TO THE TALLOW NOTES

EDITOR

Dear Sir, "Old Borough Gael's" letter, which appeared in your issue of the 4/10/69 revived further vivid memories of those exciting hurling days around Dungarvan and Abbeyside and one must pay tribute to the sterling worth of all the hurlers mentioned by "Old Gael."

I have for many years maintained that the hurlers of Abbeyside and Dungarvan of that period were responsible for a great Waterford hurling resurgence in latter years. Of course Abbeyside was always a great hurling area. I recall a galaxy of hurling stars: men like Paddy Moloney, Percy Brett, Jack Sullivan, Tom Ryan, George Donovan, the Burkes, Cowmings, Forde, Waters, and others to numerous to mention.

Yes, I well recall Timmy Morrissey leading us onto the playing pitch. Yes, we had good hurling and good music in those days. Not alone did we have good mouth organ players like Timmy Morrissey and the late Paddy Hurler on the teams, we also had boxers, swimmers and athletes, who always maintained a high standard of sportsmanship. Spectators came from far and near to witness spectacular hurling feats at the Old Hall, Shandon, and the Minnows.

We had few attractions in those days and our main entertainment was Crotty's Cinema (adm. 4d.) or we would go to see a good boxing match at Scanlon's Yard. These fights were usually promoted by that great sportsman, the late Jim Hayes, Main Street.

Yes, Dungarvan was a great sporting town in those days. Re the hurling ability of John Cripps and Paddy Buckley, I find it difficult to assess their great hurling ability. Both are great friends of mine and for whom I have the highest regard. I do not agree however, with "Old Gael" when he states that Paddy Buckley lacked John Cripps' hurling ability. Yes, I know both were brilliant hurlers who would have shed lustre on Waterford hurling, if selected at that period.

The difference between them was that John Cripps played close hurling, whilst Paddy Buckley liked the open spaces and could break through the tightest defence. To prove my point Paddy Buckley played for New York, and that prince of hurlers, my old friend Charlie Ware, whom I met some time ago, stated that the ideal type of forward was one who could make room for himself in a tight defence.

I am sure all old hurling fans in Dungarvan recall those golden days in Waterford hurling.

It may not be out of place therefore to pen the following lines: Have you seen the teams parading. With the Pipers on before. Have you felt the hot blood coursing through your veins. Have you chafed and grew impatient. For the coming treat in store. As you listened to the pipers stirring strains.

Abbeyside fail in second half

MOUNT SION 7-11 ABBEYSIDE 2-13

MOUNT SION captured their twenty first senior hurling title at Waterford on Sunday beating Abbeyside easily in the closing stages of the game. In a first half that had everything the large attendance (£800 gate) anticipated a thrilling finish but the end proved to be a real anti-climax. From the change of ends Mount Sion took over and scored 4-6 to Abbeyside's three points. This was Sion's fourth final victory over the Village, the other years being 1955, 57 and 63.

Abbeyside turned over with a two-point lead, 2-10 to 3-5, and following a devastating second quarter, looked a good bet to take their first title. Pat Enright was in brilliant form and was knocking off points from all angles despite the attentions of no less a man than Larry Guinan. 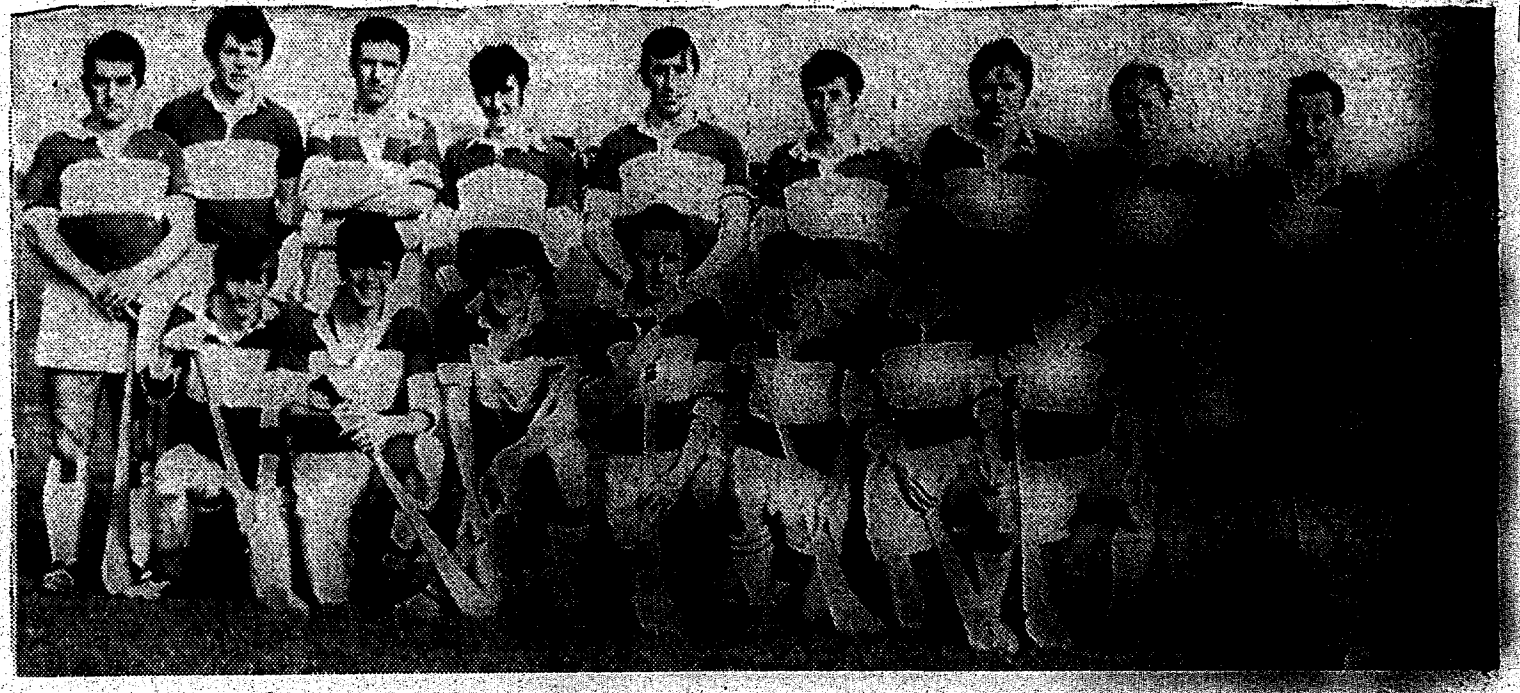
