## Gold Medals for Co. Council Drivers



THE presentation of six gold medals for ten years accident free driving was the highlight of the annual dinner and social of the Waterford Co. Council Drivers and Yard Staff held in the Devonshire Arms Hotel last week.

Mr. J. D. Hally, Co. Engineer, welcomed His Lordship the Bishop, Most Rev. M. Russell, Rev. D. P. Kennedy, S.J., President of the Safety First Association and the many other guests, and said the Council's record of safe driving will stand comparison with any association in the country.

Dr. Russell replying, said that the Waterford Co. Council drivers had proved by what they had achieved that in their hearts they had concern for others. Quoting the work of a well known writer, he said: "A tractor is ugly, yet it is strong and I need it. (8-11) But it needs me — it needs

man, it needs man to exist, it was men who made it, it needs man to move it, it needs man to start it, it needs man to go forward, it is man who steers it, it may be consecrated, For it has no soul, Lord, and it is man who must lend it his own."

Concluding, Dr. Russell said: "Through your Certificates you have lent your tractors your souls."

Fr. Kennedy said it is a lack of concern for other people on the roads, especially by pedestrians, that leads to death and injury. Fast moving traffic is always

menacing their lives. This is a difficult task to bring home to young people and lack of experience is the most dangerous part of their make up. You that are parents should get them to pledge that they will not drive more than 40 to 45 miles an hour. You men who have set such a high example, can be an example to the rest of us, who are only amateurs.

Other speakers at the function were: Mr. F. J. O'Leary, Acting Co. Secretary; Mr. C. Curran, M.C.C.; and Pat Veale (Chairman) and Michael Flynn on behalf of the driving staff.

The following were presented with gold medals: Edmond Burke, John Milward, Patrick Veale, Liam Meehan, Thomas O'Connor and Andrew Drohan. A silver medal was awarded to Laurence Markley.

Inspector Power's parents served with the Drug Squad at Headquarters until January 1969, when he was post-

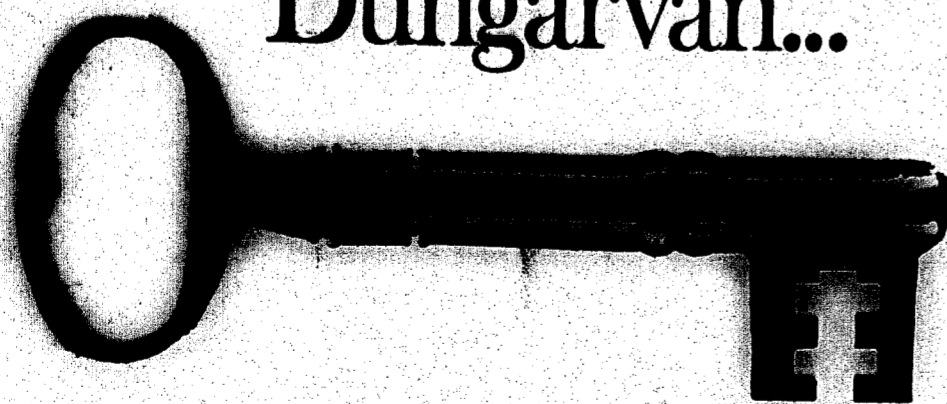

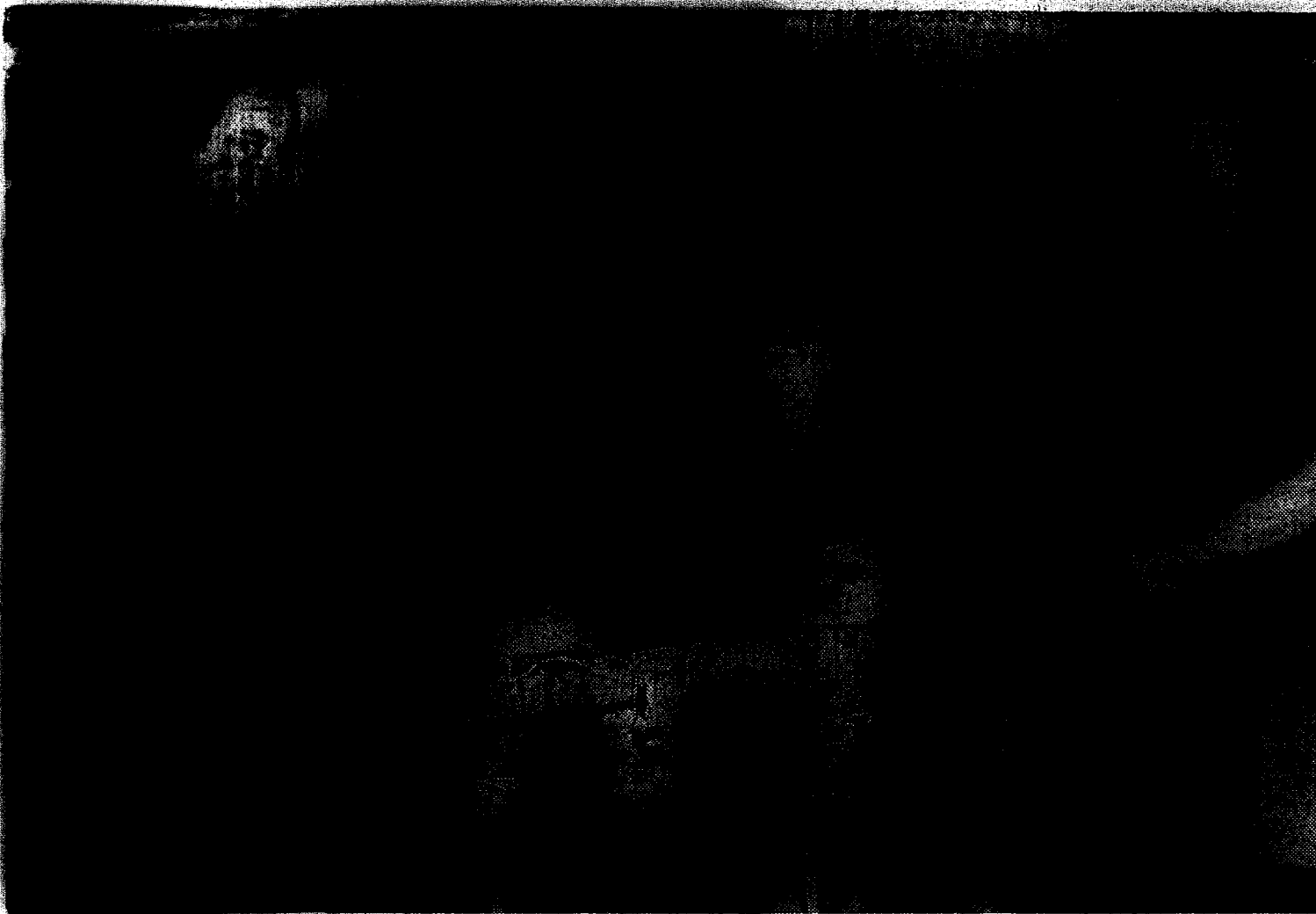

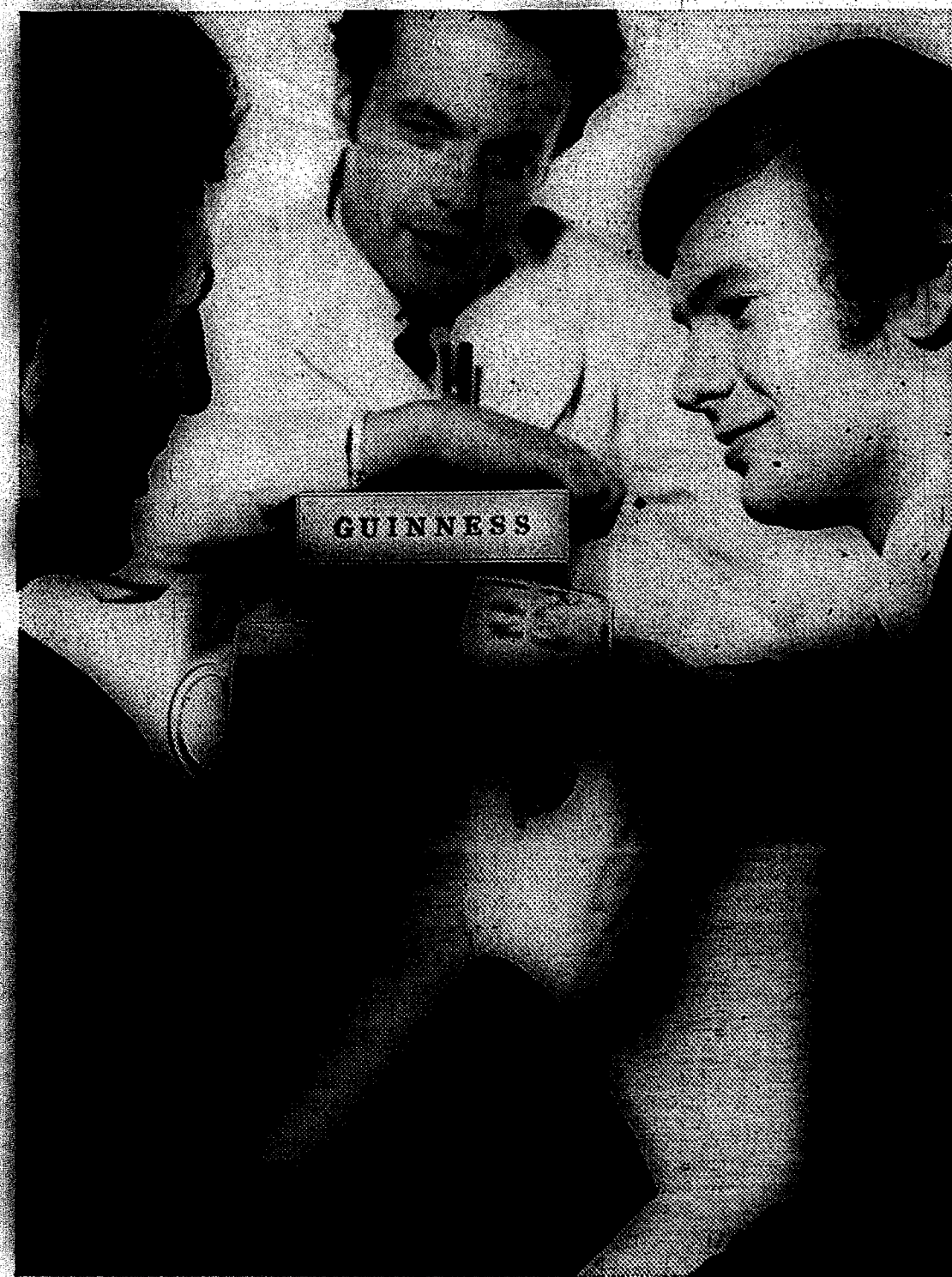

**THE "NEW LOOK"  
CLONMEL  
RACECOURSE**

People are talking about the many improvements being carried out at Clonmel Racecourse over the past few months. Each Meeting ushers in another scheme and now the Park is taking on a new appearance. The New Look starts with the name. Hitherto known as Powerstown Park, it is now Clonmel Racecourse. In the past it was often mistaken for Proudstown Park before it officially became Navan Racecourse.

Improvements are taking place under three headings: the course, the grounds and patron amenities—and in 3 phases—the present, the immediate future and long term planning. Under each heading there are plans for each of the three phases.

There are few more scenic locations for a Racecourse and its ability to cater for the public in its spacious grounds is second to none. The racing surface is first class, being carefully tended by Jimmy Ryan and four of a permanent staff. The stands, entrances, weigh room and bars are all newly decorated. **DOUBLED  
AFTER  
REMARKS**

When a defendant was sentenced to three months imprisonment at Cappoquin District Court, on Thursday last, arising out of a fracas in a Dungarvan hotel, on 22nd October, he remarked to Justice L. B. Skinner: "Why don't you make it two years?" and the Justice then doubled the sentence to six months.

Before the court was William Costigan, unemployed labourer, 15 Cathal Brugha Place, Dungarvan, and he was charged with being guilty, while drunk, of disorderly behaviour, at Bridge St., Dungarvan, on October 22; on the same occasion assaulting a Garda in the execution of his duty; causing malicious damage to the extent of £1 to the door of the Devonshire Arms Hotel, and failing to quit a licensed premises when requested to do so.

Garda E. Lyons said when he went to the hotel the defendant and two others were there and they were roaring and shouting, and using obscene language. After about ten minutes trying to persuade them to leave he got them out, but the defendant smashed a bar on the door. The defendant butted him with his head on the cheek bone and struck him on the lip.

The defendant William Costigan told Justice Skinner if he had been served a drink he would have left the premises quietly and there would have been no trouble. Justice Skinner: Three months in jail.

Defendant: Why don't you make it two years?

Justice Skinner: Okay, I'll give you six months.

Defendant: You said three months first, now you are going back on what you said.

The Justice fixed recognisances in the event of an appeal.

Powerstown House has been demolished and in its stead there is a first class car park for C.I.B. and private horse boxes. At the August Meeting new traffic arrangements were tried out so successfully that the car park was clear of heavy traffic within 15 minutes of the last Race.

The last bend following a downhill run from the top of the course is considered a hazard by trainers and jockeys. Course improvements have been discussed with Mr. J. Cleary, Inspector of Courses. When the suggestions made by him have been implemented, the course will be much improved.

One final improvement, as yet in the planning stage, is the conversion of the Popular Stand into a luxury one, incorporating glass fronted panels, a bar and tea rooms.

Dungarvan travel to Cashel on Sunday next to play the local side in the first round of the Garryowen Cup. This will be the Club's first venture this season in Cup rugby. The local side have performed admirably in their last two outings, accounting for such formidable sides as Waterpark and Thurles. On Sunday however, they will be playing against one of the better cupteams in the Province and so they can expect to get a very trying match. Cashel are always noted for the fine heights they can rise to on the big occasions and indeed, have

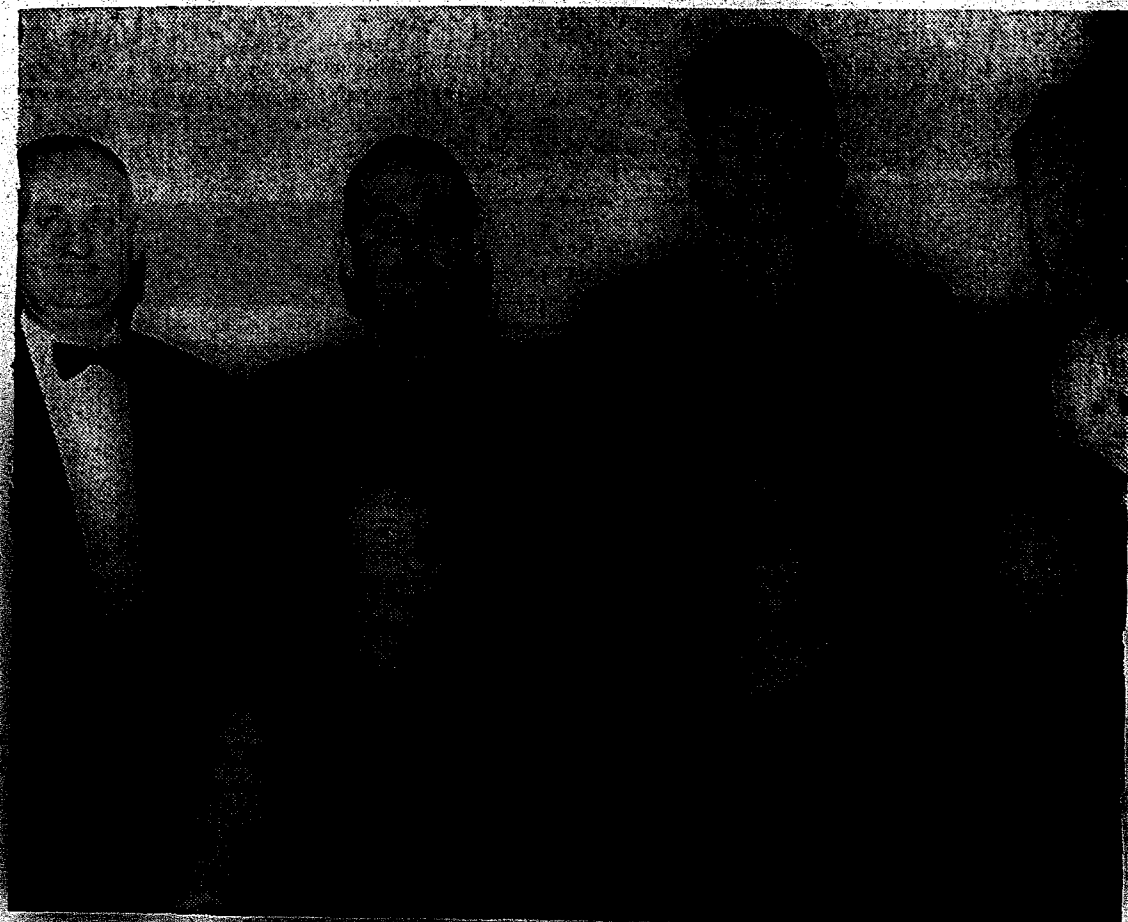

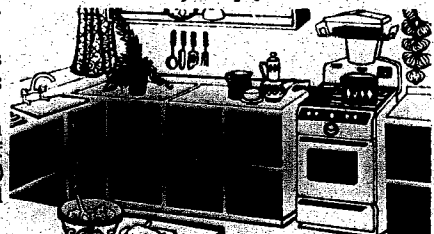

The Breathalyser

What it means to the driver

On the 3rd November the new law on drinking and driving comes into force.

If a Garda suspects that a driver has been drinking he may require him to undergo a breath test on the spot.

You will be asked to breathe into a Breathalyser. This is only a screening test. But if the Breathalyser indicates an illegal quantity of alcohol you will be required to go to a Garda Station.

At the Station you may be required to give a sample of your blood or urine. If you are unable to provide a urine sample then you must provide a blood sample.

YOU ARE ENTITLED to ask the Garda doctor to provide you with a separate sample of your blood or a portion of the urine sample for independent analysis OR to call in your own doctor to take an additional specimen, at your own expense.

Subsequently, you will be sent a statement by the Medical Bureau of Road Safety stating the concentration of alcohol in your blood. If dissatisfied, YOU ARE ENTITLED to require a second analysis to be carried out by the Bureau on payment of a fee

and you can be present or have your representative present. Should this second analysis show a lower concentration than the first then the lower figure is the one which will be used.

If the blood alcohol level exceeds the legal limit of 125 milligrammes per 100 millilitres of blood you will then be prosecuted.

If convicted under this new law you will be liable to a maximum of six months' imprisonment or £100 fine or both. You will lose your driving licence for a minimum of one year for the first offence and for not less than three years for a second or subsequent offence.

If you refuse to provide a sample of blood or urine you will be liable to the same penalties.

Note: Refusal to take the Breathalyser Test renders you liable to arrest without warrant and to prosecution. And you still may be required to undergo the blood or urine test.

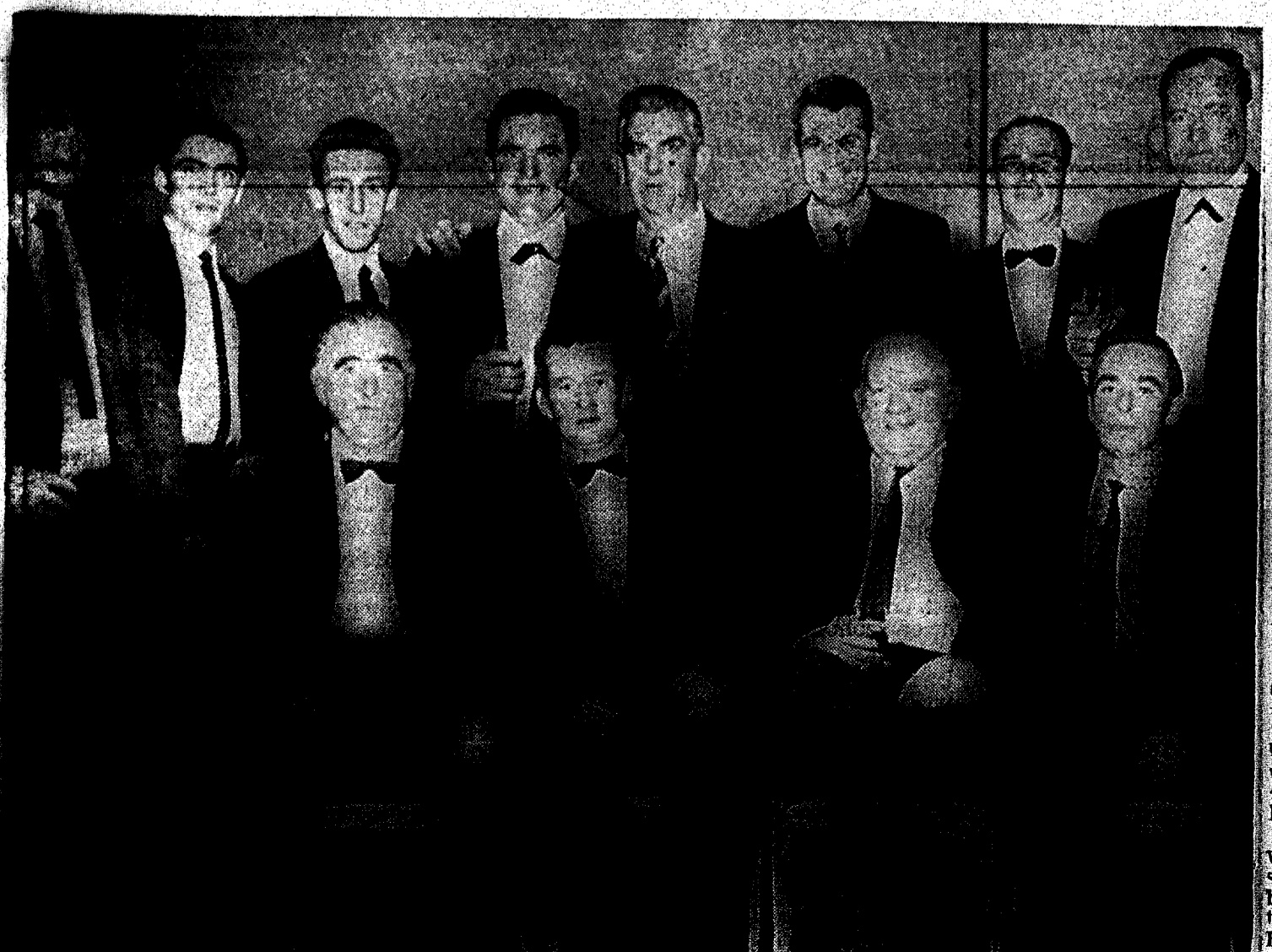

**MASTROUS** is the only word that can describe the fate of Ballinacourty in their senior football championship match at Waterford on Sunday. 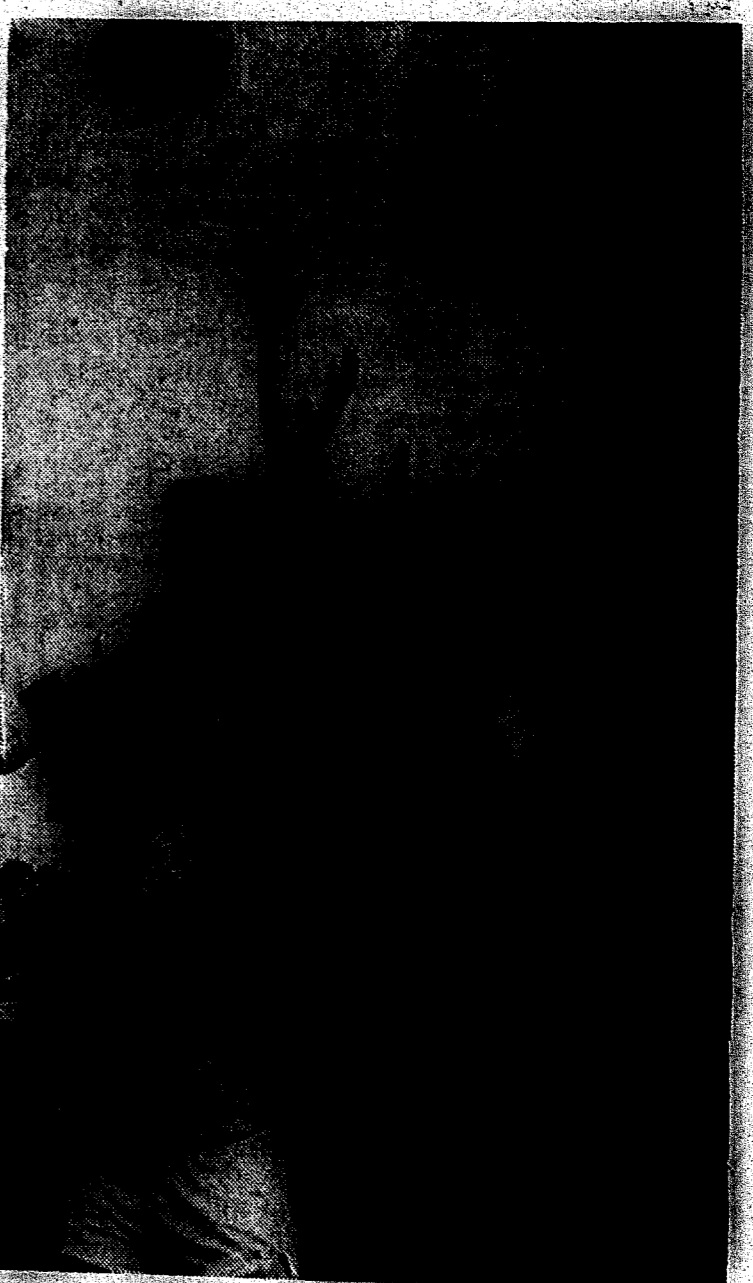
