NO 'PULL' INVOLVED

Mr. John Torpey, an Inspector attached to the Dublin Office of the Irish Land Commission, told a meeting of the County Waterford Committee of Agriculture that there were about 60,000 farms in the country in need of enlargement to make them fit to maintain families in economic security.

Mr. Torpey denied that there was pull attached to the dividing of estates among local farming applicants. He was accompanied by two inspectors from the Cork office, Messrs. P. Ryan and J. Cronin.

The Chairman, Mr. J. Fahey, T.D., welcomed the three men and went on to say that among the main criticisms of the L.L.C. was their slowness in going after the big estates that came up for sale in Co. Waterford and their delay in having other estates divided up.

FOX DESTRUCTION DEPUTATION

A Deputation from the Co. Waterford Sheep Breeders' Association, led by its Chairman, Mr. T. Fahey; Vice-Chairman, Mr. J. Harrington and Secretary, Mr. J. O'Grady, outlined the gravity of the situation of destruction of foxes, to a meeting of the Committee of Agriculture, on Monday last.

Mr. Fahey said that the number of foxes in the county was steadily increasing and they felt that if the present bounty of 10/- was raised to 15/- plus the 5/- given by the Committee of Agriculture, they would be giving an incentive to eliminate them. The first three months of the year, January, February, and March are the mating season, and for the remaining months to revert back to 10/-.

Mr. M. Hartly said that the fox population had trebled in Co. Waterford in recent years. The loss of sheep in the county was upwards of £10,000 yearly through destruction.

Mr. G. Frost (C.A.O.) said a letter had been received from the Dept. of Lands, stating that the Forestry Division would co-operate in any local schemes for the eradication of foxes. They would not ban any bonafide persons from entering onto State Forests for this purpose.

APPOINTED TEMPORARY INSTRUCTOR
Mr. Daniel Kenny, Mullinahone, Co. Tipperary, was appointed Temporary Instructor in Agriculture.

Replying to Mr. K. O'Ryan Mr. Torpey denied that there was any pull used in the allocation of the land. He also denied that deputations which came to the Land Commission had influenced them in their decisions.

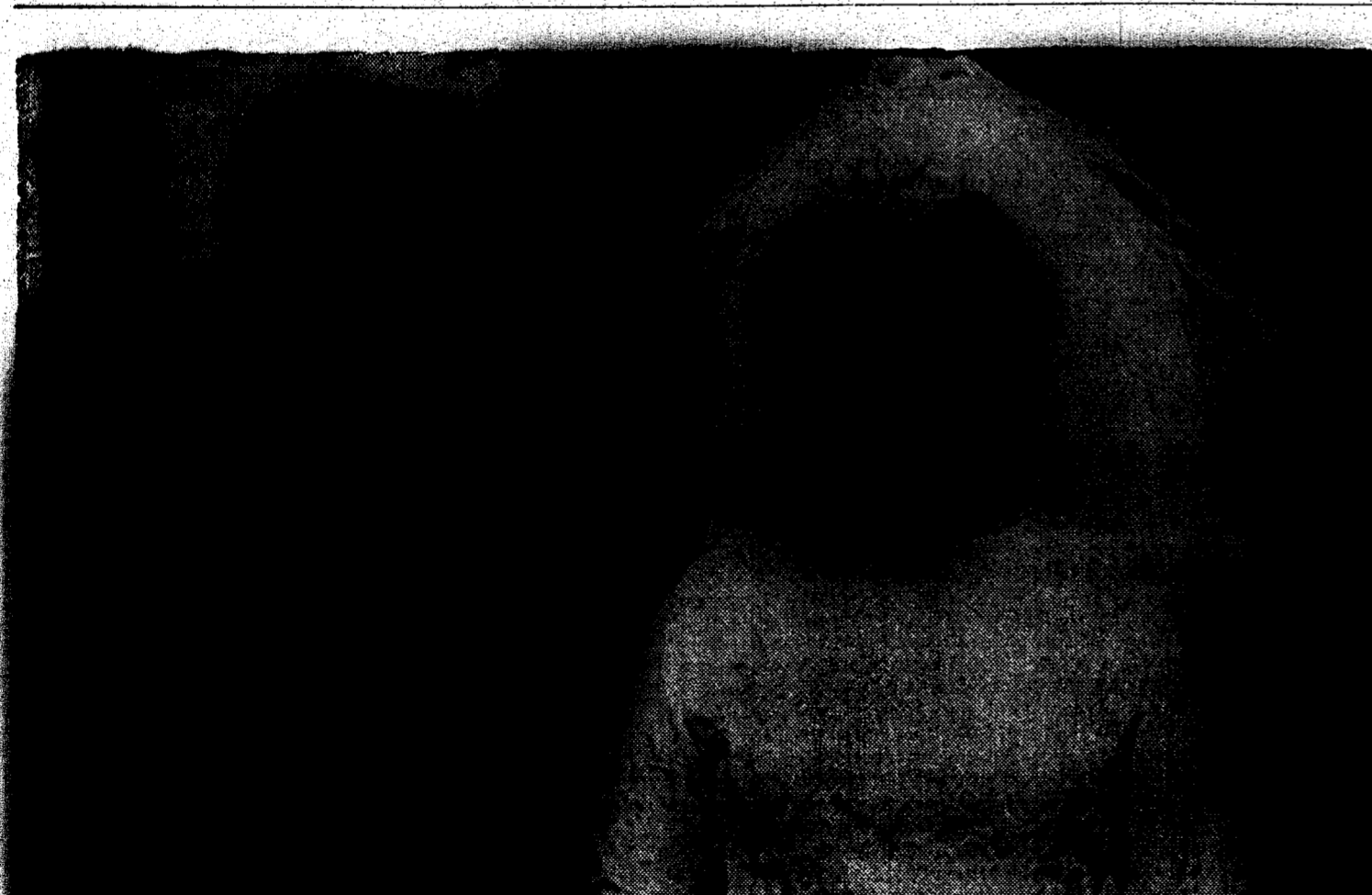

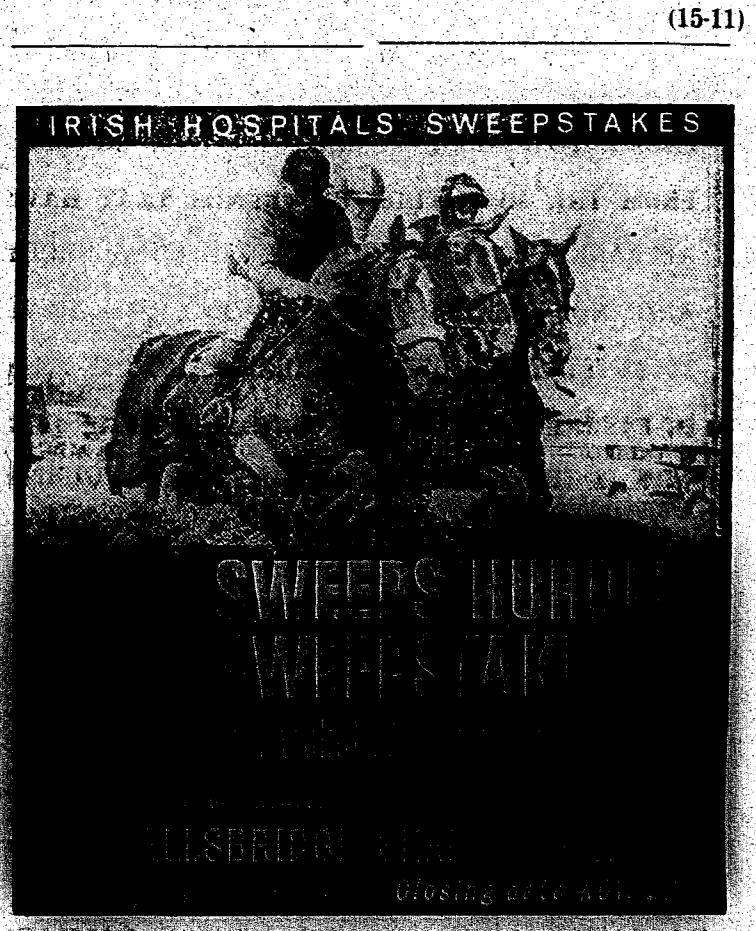

**BOARD OF CONSERVATORS DISCUSS
FISH MORTALITY**

The recent heavy mortality of fish life in the river Blackwater between Mallow and Fermoy, was the main business of the new incoming Board of Conservators for the Lismore No. 4 District at their meeting on 23rd October, at the Grand Hotel, Fermoy, under the Chairmanship of Mr. James Villiers Stuart.

Dr. A. Went, Chief Scientific Adviser to the Fisheries Division of the Dept. of Agriculture, attended the meeting.

Before the meeting was the Inspector's report and the results of analysis of water samples taken from the river by the Inspector, Mr. H. D. Thornton, B.Sc., the analyst, however, was not able to make any observations on the results of the analysis in time for the meeting.

The Inspector reported that on the 6th inst., fish were found dead one mile downstream from Mallow Bridge. He collected two salmon one brown trout and one roach and sent them to the Dept. for post mortem examination. This examination, which took several days, did not reveal the cause of death, but stated that U.D.N., the current disease of salmon and trout, could be ruled out.

On the afternoon of the 6th inst., the Inspector found evidence which suggested that the fish may have died as a result of pure cement getting into the river at Mallow Bridge. The level of the water in the river at this time was as low as at any time for many years.

On the afternoon of the 7th inst., a further small outbreak of mortality occurred upstream of Mallow Bridge. This second mortality could not have been caused by cement which apparently entered the river at Mallow Bridge.

On the 8th October no mortality was evident. During the night heavy rain fell.

On the morning of Thursday, 9th October, the river had started to rise and was five to seven inches above the extremely low level of the previous weeks. During the afternoon a heavy mortality of fish was observed from a point about three miles downstream of Mallow Bridge to a point one mile downstream of Killavullen Bridge. Oxygen readings were taken at several points and revealed a serious depletion below Mallow town. No mortality occurred on 10th, 11th, 12th and 13th of October.

(1) The opening of the Beet Campaign on 1st October, when the river was too low a state to receive the heavy demand made on its available oxygen supply by the effluent from the Beet Factory.

(2) A small but significant demand on the available oxygen by the effluent from Ballycogh Creamery.

(3) A heavy demand on the oxygen supply by crude untreated raw sewage, allowed to enter the river by Mallow Urban Council.

The meeting expressed the view that complacency existed at Government level in matters of pollution of our national rivers and streams, and that industry was encouraged with little thought for the long term effects and dangers of its effluents on the 23 million Inland Fishing Industry.

The Board directed that a letter be sent to the Minister for Agriculture and Fisheries stating that if the Government's serious and wish to perpetuate our valuable Inland Fisheries, he should appoint to his staff in the Fisheries Division a fully qualified analyst and expert on industrial and sewage effluents; that the appointed person or persons be equipped with a mobile laboratory; that anyone wishing to set up a factory or processing plant on or near a river or watercourse be required not only to apply for planning permission but to directly acquaint the Dept. of Fisheries and local Board of Conservators of their intention, and that it should be an offence for any persons to change the composition or quantity of an effluent for which approval has been obtained, without first seeking approval of the Dept. of Fisheries and local Board of Conservators. Further that a Board should be set up composed of members of the Industrial Planning Authority and Departments responsible for Fisheries and Public Health, to examine the existing state of pollution in the State and advise on immediate remedial action, and should in future sit to examine plans of new industry before it is set up, with the sole view of examining the disposal of waste and abstraction of water.

The Board also directed the Clerk to forward to the Minister a request for the holding of a Public Sworn Inquiry into the causes of the recent pollution on the Blackwater, with the view to preventing a recurrence.

On Saturday, 11th October, Miss J. Doyle, Biologist of the Fisheries Division, accompanied the Inspector on an investigation of the affected part of the river.

By the morning of 14th October the river had risen by three feet. It was reported that fish were dying at Ballyhooley. On arrival the Inspector found large numbers of all species of river fish dying on top of the water. This heavy mortality spread down the river at a rate of about one mile per hour and reached Fermoy in the early afternoon. The turbulence of the water as it crossed Fermoy Weir seemed to have the effect of recovering the oxygen content of the water, and no mortality was evident below this point.

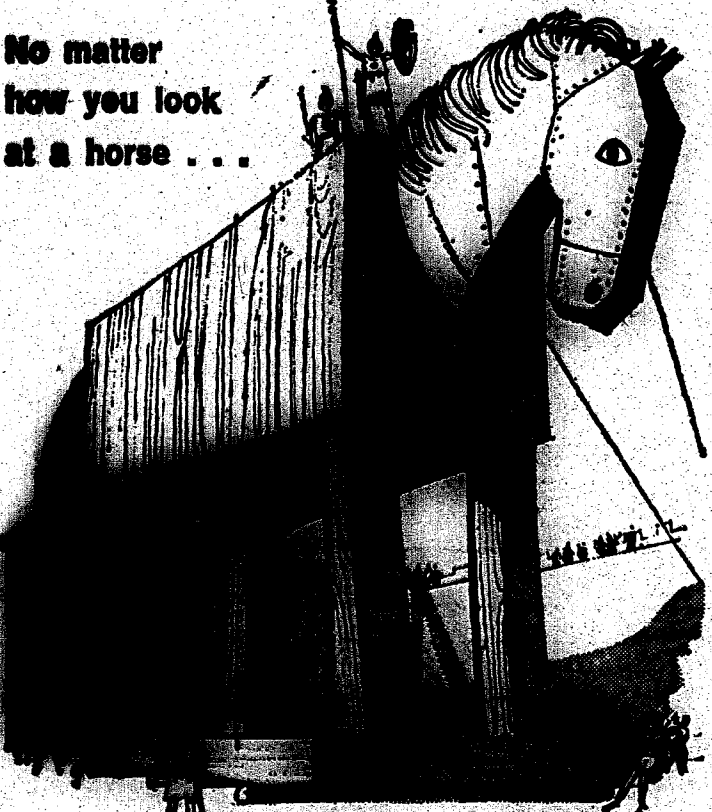
Dr. Went, in answer to questions, stated that an industrial or sewage effluent did not necessarily show its full effect on a receiving river in the immediate vicinity of the outfall, as there was a gradual build up of bacterial activity as the mixing of the river water and the effluent took place. Dr. Went also pointed out that if there had been a long dry spell, and the river was very low, it is common to get vegetable matter settling to the bottom of the river and becoming temporarily inactive. On the river rising after rain, this material will be stirred up by increased flow and decomposition will commence with consequent demand on oxygen content of the water.

If industrial waste or sewage effluent with a heavy oxygen demand is added to this already oxygenated water, the river water may reach a state whereby it is unable to support fish life.

It will be noticed that both times the rain caused the river to rise from its very low level, mortality was at its severest. If, however, a heavy sustained flood after two or three days continuous rain had taken place the effects of the pollution would in all probability not have been so severe.

After prolonged discussion the Board took the view that the disastrous mortality of fish life was caused by—

FIRST YOUTH LEADERSHIP COURSE AT DUNGARVAN OPENED BY MOST REV. DR. RUSSELL

Opening the first course in Youth Leadership organised by the Waterford and Lismore Diocesan Council for Youth, His Lordship the Bishop reminded the participants that "Leadership is, first of all, sharing with others what you yourself believe in."

Speaking in Dungarvan on Friday last, October 31st, the Bishop was addressing about 80 adults and young people from youth clubs in all parts of the Diocese, from Cahir to Clashmore and from Passage East to Tallow, who had come to spend a week-end together listening to talks on youth club work, holding discussions among themselves, and praying and singing together at what many of them spontaneously described as the most enjoyable and worthwhile event that had ever taken part in.

Referring to the Gospel of Saturday's Mass — The Eight Beatitudes, His Lordship said that the aim of any leadership course was simply to help us to appreciate better how to put these basic Christian principles into practice. "What kind of life do we live? We're all different, for Our Lord said 'In my father's house there are many mansions; yet we're for a purpose and the purpose that I believe in is the glory of God in the place in which I live and with the people with lives for the glory of God, means above all, sharing what you have with others, and that is leadership. Remember that the Gospel says about the blind leading the blind, and then think of the man who is a convicted Communist and remember he can be a very good man, the first test of his belief is that his conviction must be shared with other people. He judges himself by the extent to which he can share what he believes in with others."

The catering end of it came under Nuala Lynch who is catering manageress in Bord Fáilte and she was ably assisted by R. Donnelly R. Dwan, R. Russell, T. Bailey, E. Nealon, B. Tobin and A. O'Reagan. These seven girls did trojan work and even though some of them were just home on holidays for the weekend they were the main factors in what was a most enjoyable and beneficial get-together.

The cost of the weekend worked out as follows: Every junior member paid 5/-, senior members 10/-, plus the sum of £2 per head, which was paid by the individual clubs for each member they had represented. His Lordship, the Bishop, said that he would meet any deficit that may be remaining.

The purpose of this leadership course is just the very same. Do you believe in the Eight Beatitudes? Do you believe that part of your life, part of being a young man or woman is sharing that happiness, that life with other people? And if you can share it, then you are a leader. I believe that God will ask me, when I meet him, 'what did you do for other people?' How much and how far did you share with other people what I gave you? We talk a lot about Christian love. But this doesn't simply mean putting your hand in your pocket to help someone out, or going to visit someone who is in hospital, it means first and foremost, giving oneself. I hope that this leadership course on which you are embarking will help you to learn just this, and if you do learn it, then you are a leader, and I will have no worry about the clubs and the parish that you come from. In thanking the committee for the trojan work which they have put in to the organisation of the course, I only hope that at the end of it (and I don't mean just the weekend but also to follow up to it which will test the endurance of so many of you) that they can say that it has produced young people who can share

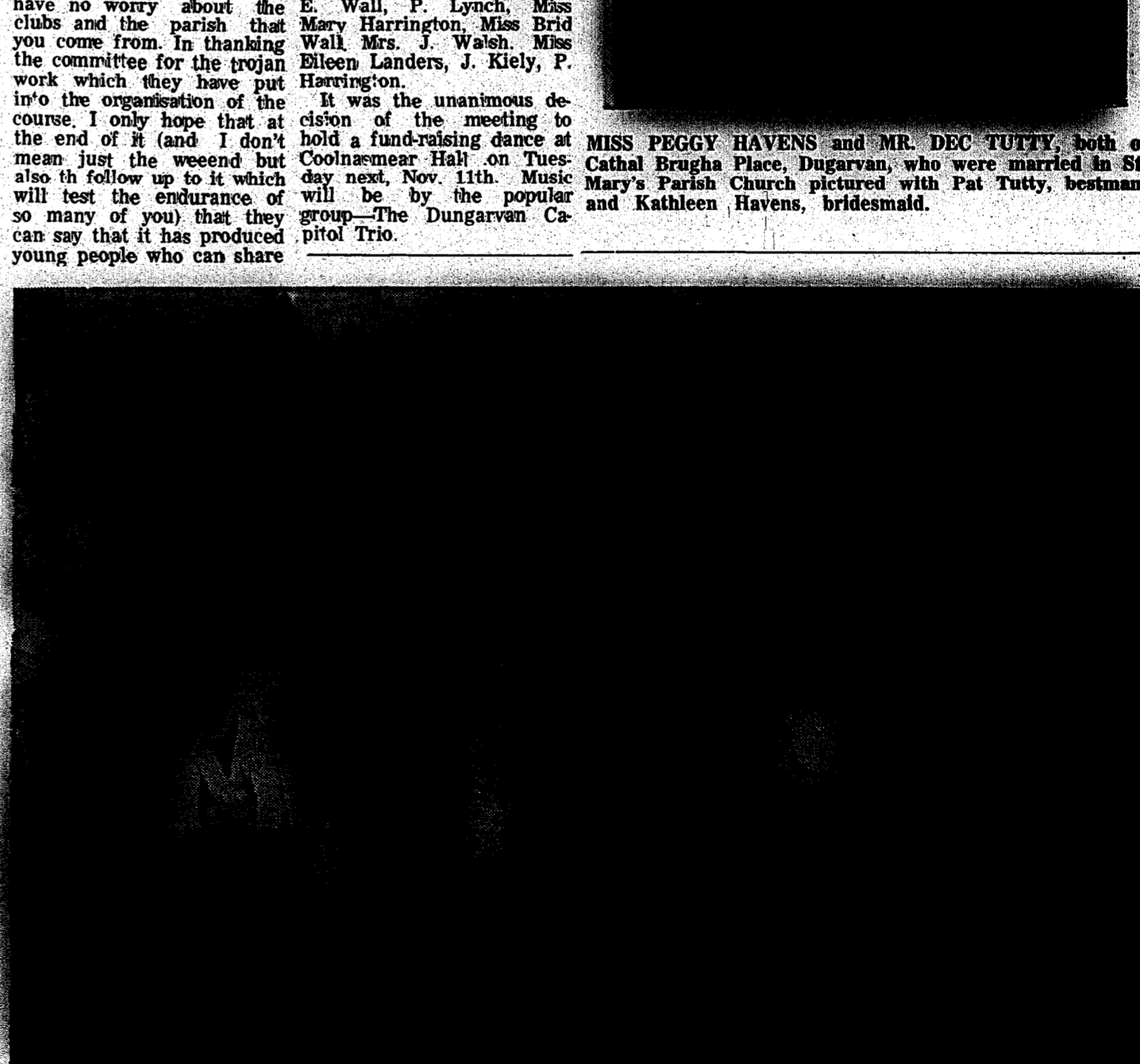

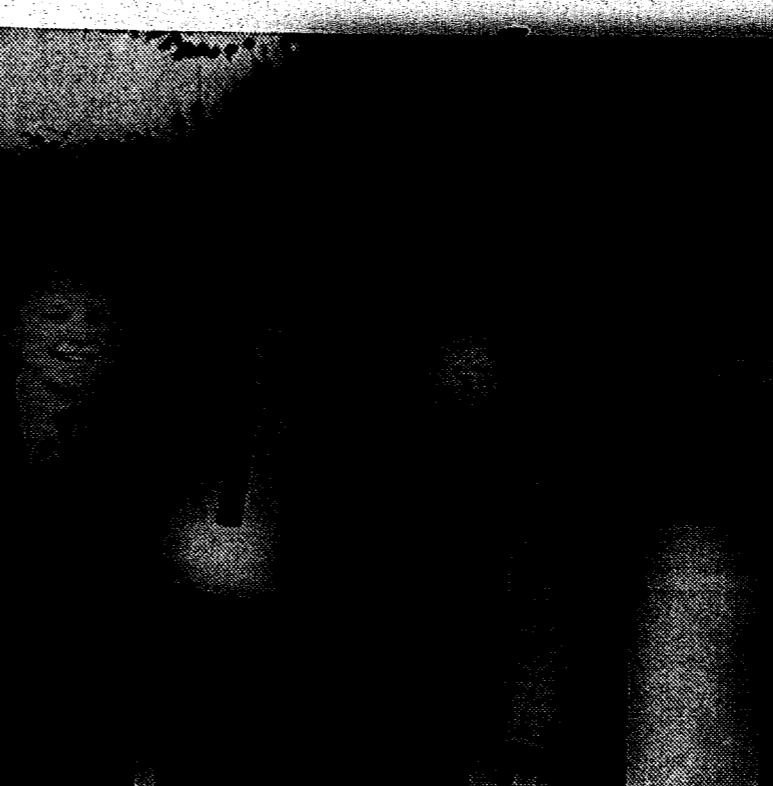

N.F.A. NEWS
N.F.A. Wants Same Rights as Unions

"Irish farmers desire to know whether their own organisations are entitled to be heard individually as the workers' unions and employers' organisations are heard." So said Mr. Tom Blake, Acting President of the NFA in an official reply to a speech made in Limerick by Mr. Gerry Cronin, T.D., Parliamentary Secretary to the Minister for Agriculture and Fisheries on the role of the rural organisations.

"Is the Taoiseach now insisting too like Mr. Blaney, asked Mr. Blake, "that 'consultative machinery' must be established before recognition is given? If so, then we can only assume that there is one kind of democracy at work in Ireland now for the unions and the employers' organisations—and another for Ireland's 200,000 farmers."

Mr. Blake emphasised that despite the claims made in that address of the value to the Government of rural organisations "as consultants in the formulating and implementation of Government policy" the fact must be faced that the Minister for Agriculture and Fisheries, Mr. Blaney will not allow meetings between the Dept. and the NFA, except under his own specific conditions and when he considers it necessary for his purposes.

Since the pre-Budget talks Mr. Blaney has not acceded to requests for urgent meetings on creamery milk, pigs, grain, livestock and sheep," Mr. Blake pointed out.

"Turning down the requests for these urgent meetings, Mr. Blaney said when he proposed to meet the NFA in the autumn for a general exchange of views on the agricultural situation, but it proves how little he believes in consultation when we note that in the meantime he went ahead and finalised the controversial changes in the creamery milk price arrangements, without ever seeking our views or the views of the dairying interests as a whole. If he was sincere in welcoming consultation with the rural organisations, surely one would expect that he would even of his own volition seek the advice of the organisations before introducing such far-reaching measures."

"In a word, Mr. Blaney believes in dictation rather than in consultation. In effect, his approach is meetings will be held on my terms and when I wish to hold them or not at all." The legitimate claims of Ireland's farmers to be heard when they feel they are entitled to be heard on urgent matters are spurned.

"The only meeting that did take place after the Budget was a meeting during a crisis situation with the National Liquid Milk Group and on that occasion Mr. Blaney himself was present with his officials."

Mr. Blake went on: "Mr. Cronin, whether we are to accept it as his own personal view or not, is quoted in the official text of his speech as hitting at the idea that some people may have been misled in thinking that the present Government is for some reason reluctant to avail itself of the advantage of consultation with the rural organisations." He further hits at the declaration that 'policies are made in Merrion Street and the interests concerned are not consulted' and that the Government wants to dictate the form of any consultation and make it subservient.

"What other conclusion but this are we to draw from Mr. Blaney's entire approach? What other conclusion are we to draw, but that Mr. Blaney does not wish to avail himself of consultation when we note his reply to a letter of July 30th, from our President, seeking urgent meetings on milk, pigs, grain and livestock? Mr. Blaney said then that he was fully informed of the NFA's views and that 'nothing would be gained by having discussions at this particular time.'"

"Mr. Cronin reiterates what he describes himself as a 'retorted' Government point of view' outlining the basis for a resumption of normal Departmental—NFA consultations. In effect, while Mr. Blaney has tens to convey the impression that he would not pressurise the rural organisations into forming consultative machinery to have 'orderly consultations' with Government, let us make no mistake about the fact that he wants the organisations to establish this very machinery before there can be relations with his Dept. This is his policy as he stated it clearly in the Dail in December 1963.

"And yet on January 21st last the Taoiseach assured Mr. Maher of the Government's recognition of the NFA as having, at all reasonable times, the right of consultation with the Minister and Dept. of Agriculture on matters of concern to their members."

"The Government has not asked the unions to set up consultative machinery before giving them full individual recognition and before dealing with them in a mature and responsible manner. No conditions are demanded of the employers' organisations."

"Mr. Cronin applauds the recognised and honourable role as pressure groups which trade unions, both of employers and workers play in acting on their members' behalf, but there is no honourable mention for the economic farm organisations.

They are reminded of their responsibilities and they are asked in a subtle manner for seeking to express the views of a larger section of the public as is actually justified by the facts. It is furthermore insinuated that they have misled their members and that their value to the community at large is limited. These attacks by subtle innuendo must be totally rejected and deplored.

"The trade unions, both of employers and workers, are not asked to toe the line, so to speak, as Mr. Blaney would like to make the economic farming organisations bend before his whip."

"We insist on the democratic right to be heard in a mature manner by our own Dept. and not to have to meet conditions, demanded of no other section of the community, before that democratic right is granted to us. While the doors of the Dept. are closed by Mr. Blaney to normal relations between the Dept. on the one hand and the NFA on the other, then the great sentiments expressed by Mr. Cronin about the Government's recognition of the role of the economic rural organisations in our democracy mean absolutely nothing. And while the Taoiseach permits this situation to continue, then in effect the Minister for Agriculture and Fisheries is flouting the spirit of the agreement reached between Mr. Lynch and Mr. Maher, on January 31st last."

ERADICATING SHEEP SCAB
The NFA National Sheep Committee, unanimously agreed that it was vital to the interests of the country's sheep industry that the eradication of sheep scab should be taken over immediately by the Dept. of Agriculture and made a national scheme on lines similar to the Bovine TB and Brucellosis Eradication Schemes.

The NFA said that generally farmers had been carrying out the sheep dipping regulations and the incidence of the disease was not widespread. But the Association was concerned that there were still pockets which were continuing to be a source of the disease and spread it to non-affected areas.

It was pointed out at a meeting of the Committee that the Order enforcing the control of sheep scab had been in the hands of the local authorities since the foundation of the State.

An NFA spokesman said that the feeling of the members of the Sheep Committee was that the fundamental reason for the failure to achieve the total and final elimination of scab was that the enforcement of the regulations had been left in the hands of the local authorities. The law as it stands, needs to be amended. The local authorities just have not the interest or are not engaging the proper personnel to ensure a 100% effective scab dipping in their members' behalf. It is now clear to the members of our Committee that the proper and essential course is for the Dept. of Agriculture to take over the eradication of sheep scab and they will be in a position to ensure that it is carried out in the same planned manner as the Bovine TB Eradication Scheme.

The spokesman explained that the disease causes scabs in the skin of the affected sheep and may extend over a large portion of the body. If left untreated the sheep could eventually die. The mites, which cause this disease, breed on the skin and the affected sheep will pass on these to other sheep. This was the reason for the importance of the regulations on sheep dipping being carried out and it was generally recognised that the period for the second dipping of sheep was most important.

"AUTHORITY OF GOVERNMENT ACCEPTED"
"We have no quarrel with the present Government and fully accept its authority," stated Mr. Bill Diamond, NFA Vice-President, in Portlaoise.

Mr. Diamond said that while no quarrel existed, it did not mean any Minister was above criticism. He continued: "The attitude of the Minister for Agriculture is disturbing to say the least of it. The doors of the Dept. of Agriculture are closed as tightly to-day as when nine men were sitting on the steps of Merrion Street. "If disinfection of organised farmers has been the latest objective, the direct opposite has resulted."

Many great footballers have trod the Shandon field but Jackie, small in stature, but big in heart stood up-sides with the best of them.

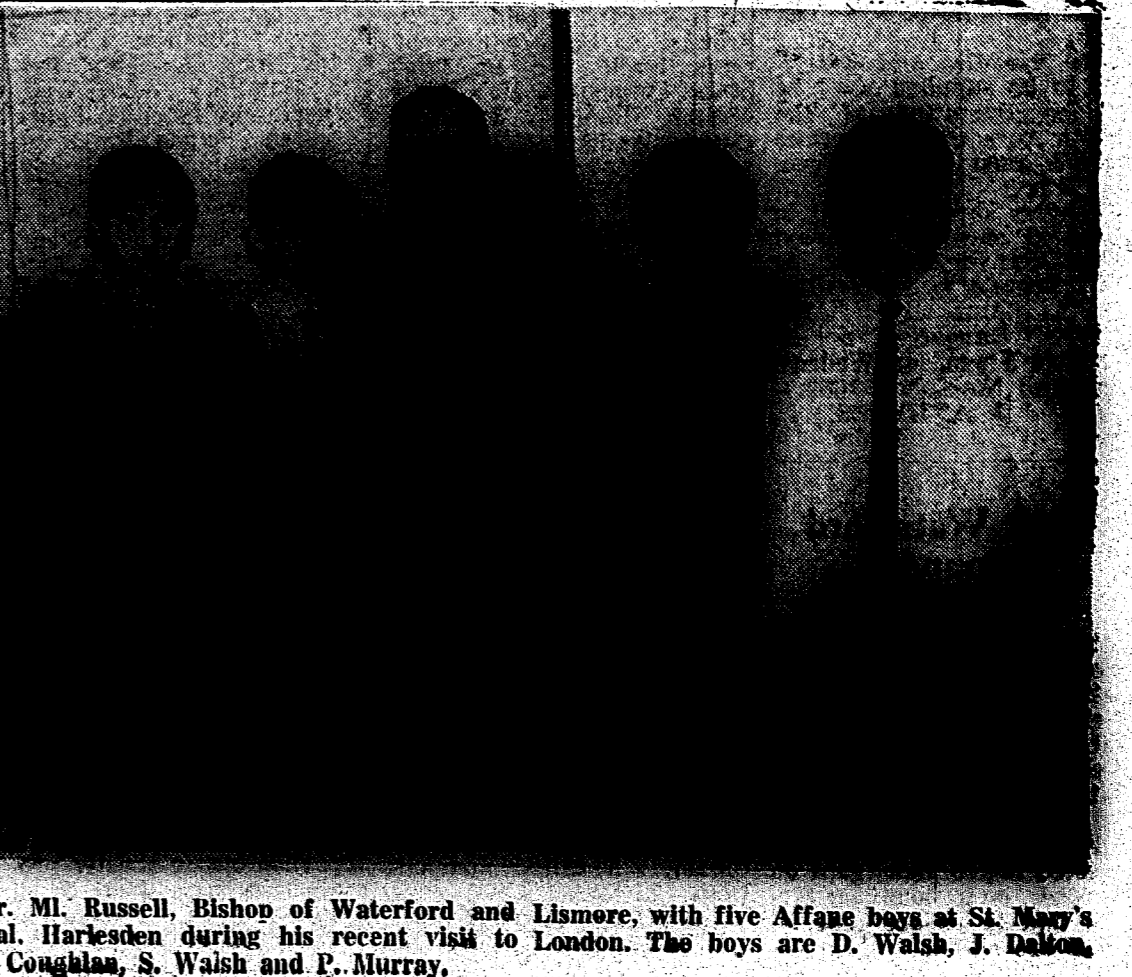

Waterford Flop in Lismore Strongly Fancied To Take Western Title

The first ever visit of a Wicklow senior football team to Dungarvan proved very profitable for them, when they took two valuable points in the National League, at the expense of a very poor Waterford side.

Wicklow had 90% of the play throughout the game and were it not for the inaccuracy of their forwards, they could have well added another point to their win. Playing good football at all times, they completely mastered Waterford and made them look well out of their depth.

Were it not for such players as Vinny Kirwan, Rogie Cashin (who seemed to be playing quite well until he was replaced in the second half), and Pa Walsh, they would not have put up any show.

I find it very hard to believe that the Waterford selectors are not able to find players that will at least give a good account of themselves. It is a very sad reflection on the county that they cannot field a team that will be able to at least keep in touch with the opposition.

The whole blame of their defeat on Sunday cannot lie on the shoulders of the players, because from what

I could see, they were given very little chance to prove themselves. Greg Fives was put on the field for about ten minutes, and then replaced: how a player can be judged in so little time is beyond me. I have seen this player give a good account of himself in almost every game he has played this year, but even he was not the only player to be given little chance to prove himself. Rogie Cashin was in the corner forward position, and although he seemed to be playing his part quite well, he too, was taken to the line.

On the whole Waterford were indeed very bad and the selectors must have had a nightmare task trying to shuffle the players around so as they would be able to come back into the game.

Wicklow, playing with a very strong wind in the first half, seemed to take up residence in the Waterford half and their mid-fielders Brian Carty and Ken Melia were the complete masters of an always troublous area for Waterford.

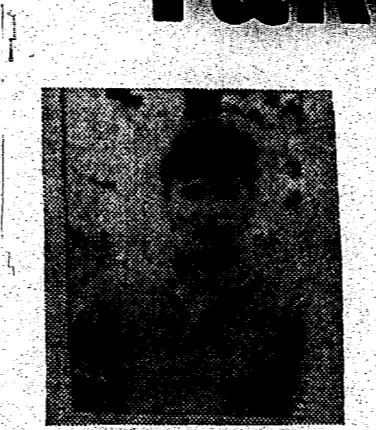
Their interval lead of 1-7 to 0-2 was in no way flattering to them, as during the half, Waterford failed to register a single score from play, both points coming

from frees. On the restart, Waterford cut their arrears by three points, and hopes of a close finish rose. DEC HAYES . . Eire Og's hard tackling half back.

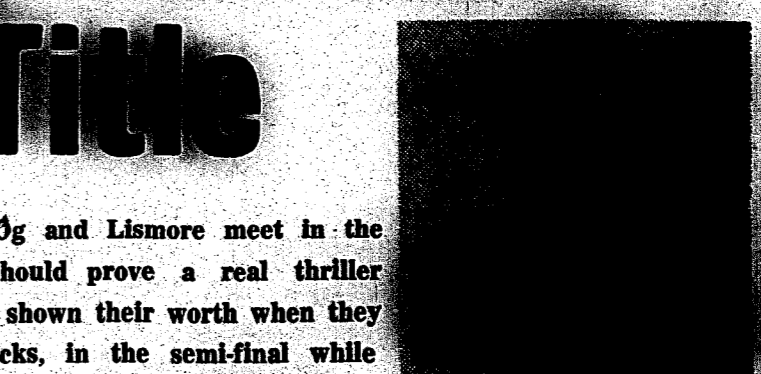
ON Sunday next at the Fraher Field, Dungarvan Eire Og and Lismore meet in the long awaited Intermediate hurling Western final. This should prove a real thriller with each side in with a very good chance. Eire Og have shown their worth when they beat reigning Intermediate hurling champions, Shamrocks, in the semi-final while Lismore came through to this final with a decisive win over a fancied Tourin side.

On their way to the top, Eire Og have shown great determination in reaching this final. As far as fitness is concerned they are in the pink. In preparation for this final they have had a number of practice matches but the results were a bit disappointing. They will have to show all-round improvement if they are to stop a very fancied Lismore team on Sunday.

They have some very fine players on their selection that should stand up sides with Lismore's best. In goal will be Lar Harte who in the past has helped them along in a big way and we can expect another fine performance from him on Sunday. At the time of writing the final Eire Og selection has not been made but I doubt very much if there will be any change from the team that beat Shamrocks in the semi-final. Somehow surprisingly Lismore selectors place Jimmy Geoghegan at full back last time out. This burly former inter-county player is eminently sound there but he may be needed more in attack. Denny Buckley is a very sound sound goalkeeper. Ronnie O'Donnell, still defying the years, will ably assist David McGrath and if they hit it off, very little should pass them. The midfield pairing of Michael Canning and Michael McGrath should prove very rewarding. In Jim Crowley, Liam Canning, Pat Foley, the Ormondas and Jarlath Daly they have a sexteth that will blend as a unit and can pack plenty of punch if they are given any opening to move.

So there we have two teams that should provide a feast of hurling skill and in what should prove to be a very closely fought game the winning team will certainly deserve their victory. If Eire Og can keep up the pace throughout the game and in the second half especially then they can be considered in with a good chance but any falling off here would mean complete downfall for them. Although they contend the issue to the bitter end quiet honestly I cannot see them ousting Lismore.

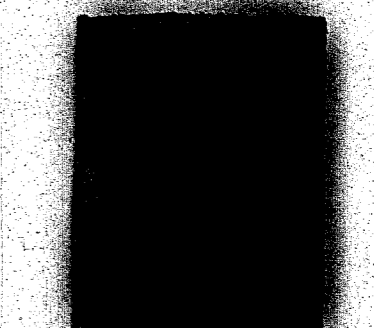
