## Kilrossanty Man Gets 12 Months

At Dungarvan District Court on Wednesday—

Richard Glavin, Briskey Upper, Kilrossanty, was found guilty, at the same court, on the following charges: (1) on the 18th May, 1969, breaking and entering the dwelling house of 48, O'Connell Street Clonmel, and stealing cigarettes to the value of £20; (2) on Sept. 12, breaking into the offices of Clonmel-Timbers Ltd, and taking cash to the amount of £15.12.3; (3) on Nov. 1, taking a car, property of Ellen Walsh, Kilrossanty, without the consent of the owner; (4) on the same date, charged with dangerous driving, not having any insurance, no driving licence, and with failing to report an accident; (5) breaking and entering the dwelling house of Mary B. Waal, Kilrossanty and stealing goods to the value of £7; (6) same date breaking into the national school, Kilrossanty and stealing a pair of gloves, valued 5/-; (7) breaking and entering the dwellinghouse of Mrs. Mara O'Shea; (8) on Oct. 31, breaking and entering into a dwelling house at Crough, Leamybrien and stealing £5 in cash; (9) on Nov. 2, stealing a gold watch to the value of £50 and a wallet, valued £1, the property of Wm. Walsh, Kilrossanty; (10) same date, stealing an engagement ring, valued £50, and one pair of gloves, valued £6; (11) breaking and entering the dwelling house of John Crotty, Leamybrien and stealing £6 in cash and a cigarette lighter valued £6; (12) stealing a record player valued £21 and a radio valued at £19 the property of Patrick Queally, Ballynamult.

He was sentenced to twelve months in prison.

**DANGEROUS DRIVING CHARGE**  
Daniel O'Brien, Tallow, was fined £3 for dangerous driving at Shandon, and a further £3 for failing to give his name, by Justice Skinner, at Dungarvan District Court, on Wednesday last.

**DAMAGED CAR**  
William Coleman, 4 Boreenatra, Dungarvan and Eddie Costigan, 15 Cathal Brugha Pl., do. were both fined £5 each and 10/- each for causing malicious damage to the car of Ambrose Bell, Mary Street, Dungarvan.

Mr. Bell, in a statement, said that on 30th October, he went down to Seanelons Yard, where he had his car parked, and saw two men tampering with his car. One of them was sitting behind the steering wheel and the other was doing something under the bonnet. He then went back to his house and phoned the guards.

Garda Galvin said when he came on the scene he saw Eddie Costigan in the driver's seat and William Coleman under the bonnet. When he approached them he heard Coleman saying to Costigan: "pull the other thing now." He then brought them to the Station.

William Coleman, in a statement, said that they went near the car to have a laugh and that they were only trying to get copper from the car so as they could go to England, where they could get work.

Eddie Costigan, in a statement, said that on Oct. 30, William Coleman and himself went into Seanelons Yard, and when they saw the car they decided to have a bit of a laugh.

In direct evidence William Coleman said that they had about nine drinks taken and they were pretending to be millionaires. He had been promised a job in the E.S.B. and wanted another chance to re-join it.

Mrs. Coleman said that she would be very grateful if her son was given another chance, as he was getting a job very soon. If he fails again she would be finished with him.

## ROBBERY CHARGE DISMISSED

Thomas Kirby, 18 Cathal Brugha Place, Dungarvan, was charged at Dungarvan District Court, on Wednesday last, with robbing William Fraher, also of Cathal Brugha Place, of £3.10.0, at Shandon, Dungarvan on the night of Nov. 6th last.

Fraher said that while cycling at Shandon he was pulled off his bike by two men, one of whom he recognised as the defendant. He was kicked and beaten and £3.10.0 was taken from his pocket. He was moved to hospital as a result of the attack.

On being questioned by Mr. E. P. King, Soir (for defendant) Fraher denied he was drunk or incapable. He had six glasses of cider taken, he said, by Cornelius Dempsey, Shandon. Kirby said that he had been out lamping that night and was never nearer than three miles to where Fraher said he was assaulted.

James Street said he was with Kirby all that night.

Justice Skinner said that he would have to dismiss the charge on the evidence before Fraher seemed to be in severe

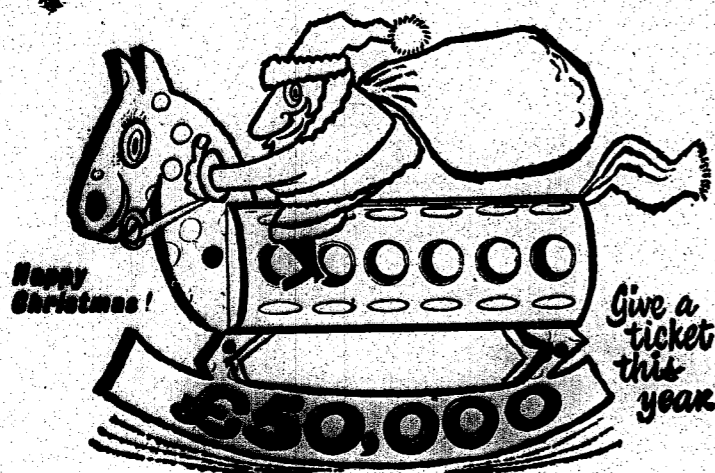

Comhaltas Ceoltoiri Eireann

There was a most enthusiastic attendance at the monthly meeting of Dungarvan Branch Comhaltas Ceoltoiri Eireann, held at the C.B.S. Hall, on Thursday, 8th November.

E.S.B. INCREASE

The increase in the prices of electricity which was forecasted in the Board's Annual Report will come into effect on 1st January, 1970, it was announced by the E.S.B. on Tuesday.

The off-peak night heating rates, which include heating by domestic storage heaters and the 'Electricaire' system, are not being increased; all other tariffs are affected, the increases being spread as evenly as possible over the three main classes of supply, i.e. General Domestic, Commercial and Industrial.

Formal notice of the increase was given to the Minister for Industry and Commerce some months ago in compliance with the Prices Acts, and detailed enquiries on behalf of the Minister on the reason for the increases have been answered by the Board.

The increases are necessary to cover increased costs under the headings of payroll, materials, services, as well as the increased cost of capital for new works. The Board's capital programme is now running at the rate of £20 million per annum, covering the cost of new generating stations as well as extensions to transmission and distribution networks.

The increases in charges will not place an undue burden on any section of the Board's consumers. This is best demonstrated by way of examples: the city flat-dweller paying 6/10 per week, will pay a further 5d. per week or 7/3. The average 6-roomed house in urban areas paying 9/8 per week will pay a further 7d. per week or 10/3. (Electricity charges for similar consumers in Liverpool and London would be 11/- and 13/5 per week respectively).

The effect on commercial office premises is more difficult to assess because of the wide variations in the size and type of premises. The small shop or office now paying 22 per week will pay 23.0 per week under the new charges.

The Board's rates of charges for industrial purposes will continue to compare favourably with similar rates in other European countries, despite our low population density and a comparatively low level of industrialisation.

The increase in the Board's electricity charges over the years is much lower than the increases in the prices of other necessary commodities. 1969 to 1968 the consumer price index has risen by over 40% compared with increases totalling 20% electricity tariffs. By reason of the benefits of lower 'follow-on' rates and the economies of more wide spread utilisation of off-peak rates, the average price per unit received by the Board for electricity for all uses has, in fact, fallen by 33% over the same period.

Over the past year, industrial users have also had the benefit of these low off-peak night rates. The opportunity has been taken of making adjustments in tariff rates, within the limits of the over-all increase, so that when currency devaluation comes into effect in 1971 no further changes will be necessary in the vast majority of tariffs.

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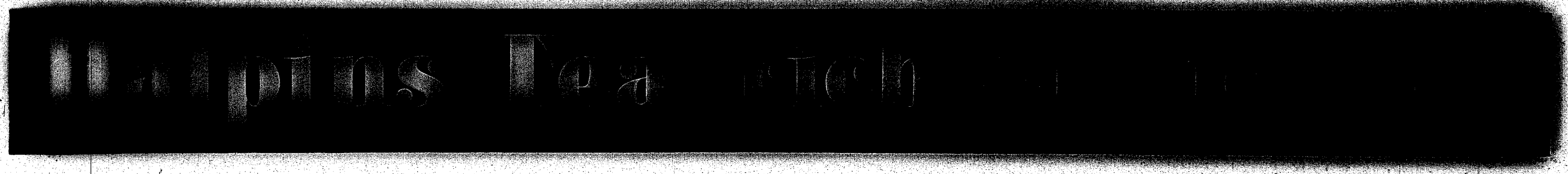

**Rate Collection to Continue Through Offices**

The appointment of rate collectors was a vicious thing and to reintroduce the old system would mean a reintroduction of politics into the Council chamber. Mr. Norman Walsh said at a meeting of the Waterford Co. Council, when he opposed a motion by Mr. P. Cahill calling for the appointment of rate collectors in the County to replace the present system of office rate collections.

Mr. Cahill said that there were about nine to ten vacancies in the County at salaries of more than £1.00 a year. It was better to spend this money locally than to see nine or ten families taking to the emigrant ship. It was also unreasonable to expect poor people to try and get their rates into Dunganarvan. It often meant that they would have to spend money they could not afford on stamps and postal orders.

Mr. N. Hennehy seconded. An amendment was proposed by Mr. A. Deasy seconded by Mr. M. Shalloo, that they adhere to the present system.

The Acting Accountant, Mr. T. Cunningham, said the total rate warrant was about £334,000 and it was costing about £3,000 a year to have it collected, representing 2.2 pence in the £. Under the old system it would cost 8.9 pence in the £.

The Chairman, Mr. C. Curran, said that the present system was as near perfection as possible. The motion was defeated by 16 votes to 2.

**Deputation to Discuss Beet Loading Dumps**

A Deputation consisting of the five members of the Lismore electoral area, together with the Chairman and vice-do., of Waterford Co. Council, and the Co. Engineer, Mr. J. Hally, is to meet Mr. Jerry Cronin, T.D., Parliamentary Secretary to the Minister for Agriculture and Fisheries, to discuss the possibility of having beet loading dumps erected on the roadsides.

On the proposal of Mr. G. Heskin, it was also unanimously decided to send a resolution to the Dept. seeking an increase of 50% on the present grant for the erection of roadside beet loading dumps.

**PAINTINGS OF DUNGARVAN PRESENTED**

Four beautiful hand-painted pictures were formally handed over to Mr. T. A. Kyne, Chairman of the Urban District Council at a ceremony in the Courthouse, Dunganarvan, on Monday last. The four paintings were taken from views of the town over 60 years ago. The paintings which were the work of two Italian artists were presented by Mr. Sean McCarthy, a native of Dunganarvan, but now resident in the United States, as a memorial to his family.

Mr. T. A. Kyne, paying tribute to Mr. McCarthy, said that he had great pleasure in accepting the paintings on behalf of the people of the town. These paintings, he added, would bring back old memories to many local people and gave the public a chance of seeing some of the old buildings in the town.

The Chairman of Waterford County Council, Mr. Charles Curran said that he was delighted to be present on this historic occasion. The County Manager (Mr. C. A. O'Connor) said he was delighted to be associated with their presentation. Also present were Ald. S. McClure representing Waterford Corporation and Mr. V. O'Toole representing the Waterford Junior Chamber of Commerce.

In reply, Mr. McCarthy thanked the Council for accepting his gift and hoped that when the town's Library was built the town's people might contribute some of their old paintings of local scenes. He went on to say that he was grateful to see so many people had turned up for the presentation and he hoped that the people of the town would support the Brass and Reed Band who had provided music for the occasion.

### Poaching Damage Could Run in to Million Pound Mark

Mr. Austin Deasy again severely criticised the continued poaching along the Co. Waterford coastline, at a meeting of the Waterford County Council on Monday last. He said the damage being caused could well run into the million pound mark. The matter arose following a letter from An Roinn Cosanta in reply to a recent resolution from the Council calling for the provision of an adequate fishery protection service along the County Waterford coastline.

The letter stated that patrols of the area would be carried out as frequently as possible having regard to the resources available to the Naval Service for fishery protection duty and for fishery protection requirements generally around the coast.

Mr. Deasy said that while he was in sympathy with the Naval Service, the fact remained that the situation of the past few months is unchanged. Up to a few days ago foreign trawlers were to be seen operating within a mile of the coast and the extent of the damage they were causing ran into a million pounds.

The spawning beds along the county coastline were being ruined and they, as public representatives would have to keep the situation in the limelight until such time as something effective was done.

Mr. Deasy added that some time ago some natives were brought to court because they were caught poaching and were given very heavy fines. Their fines turned out to be twice as much as a foreign trawler charged with a similar offence.

As everyone knows there are only a few salmon around that district and the trawlers can take much more fish and do much more damage than any of those small time poachers.

Mr. Deasy's views were supported by all members of the Council.

**NET SEASON EXTENDED.**

The order is to operate for a period of three seasons 1970 to 1972, by way of experiment. Net fishermen in the Lismore fishery district voted 505/50 in favour of this change.

**YOUGHAL DISTRICT COURT**  
Before Mr. Justice Skinner, at Youghal Court, Patk. Coady, of Brown Street, Youghal, pleaded guilty to charges of interfering with parked cars and causing malicious damage to one car to the extent of £5. He was convicted and fined £2.

**FURNAL "WAKE" FRACAS**  
A family fracas during a funeral "wake" in which iron bars, sticks and stones were used; was related at Youghal District Court when a number of defendants appeared on charges of assault and robbery with violence. Evidence was given by a number of the Garda that on Monday he had beaten up a man who had been seen to be following him. He called to file complaints before the Court were Patrick Stephen and Jas. Hogan, of Timbanna, Youghal; John Hogan, Ballyhenesey, Clashmore and Wm. O'Driscoll, Railway Square, Dumanaway. Justice Skinner after a lengthy hearing said there was no evidence in relation to the robbery with violence and he dismissed that charge. He fined all four defendants £10 each for the assault charges and ordered them to pay £15.00 each expenses. He also fined John Hogan £1 for malicious damage.

Addressing the defendants Justice Skinner told them they were going very close to the line. If they came before him again jail sentences would be imposed.

# Farmers' Part In Success of Erin Foods

The progress of Erin Foods is one of the most heartening features contained in the Sugar Company's annual report and the reference in it to the growth in the acreage of vegetables is a tribute to the role played by Irish farmers in a welcome success story.

The acreage under vegetables went up in three years by more than half, to 9,200 in the year under review and to 11,465 in the current year. It is interesting to note that the total acreage for 1970/71 would be 14,500 acres, which allowing for crop rotation, leaves Erin Foods with a requirement of some 80,000 acres for vegetables here.

Irish farmers earned £900,000 from vegetable growing for Erin Foods in the year under review and payments for the current year are estimated to be £1,150,000.

It is a tribute to the fine efforts of Irish farmers that direct Erin Foods sales into Britain and Europe, jumped to the magnificent total of £1,700,000—an increase of 40% on the previous year.

Erin Foods—as a distinct from Heinz Erin—has reached the stage where it is among the leading suppliers of dehydrated products to the British market. Heinz Erin Ltd., the marketing company which is equally owned by Erin Foods and the Heinz Corporation and which was formed to market Erin Products in the British Retail and catering markets, is developing in accordance with expectations. Its catering sales are expected to reach £1,200,000 in the current year.

The sum total of all this is that Erin Foods, which had been operating at an annual loss of close on £2 million, 3 years ago, has progressively reduced that loss and it now stands at £299,000.

The NFA is fully backing the efforts of Erin Foods to expand these exports even further and earn more for the Irish economy.

But one point must be noted—those farmers who have contracts to grow vegetables for Erin Foods must be ready to observe the contracts to the full and not opt out of them when they think they can get a better return on the open market. If the contract gives them a better overall deal in lean times, they should not spurn the contract for the quick extra shilling that it may be possible to gain on the odd occasion.

A contract is a contract—a man's bond—to be fully observed and the Vice-Chairman of the Beet & Vegetable Growers Association, Mr. Jim Plunkett, put this point clearly when he spoke recently at a symposium in Tuam.

So let us hope that Erin Foods will go forward in 1970 to achieve even higher targets, with the unstinted support of Irish farmers in general and NFA members in particular. And let Irish farmers be proud of the role they are playing in one of our brightest success stories.

## FARM MANAGEMENT SURVEY

The NFA welcomed the publication by the Agricultural Institute of the results of its Farm Management Survey, 1968/69.

This low level of income meant therefore, that on average, there was absolutely no return for management or for investment on the farm. Working capital invested (i.e. investment in livestock and machinery) averaged £1,302.

On all sample farms, of less than 50 acres, family farm income was considerably less than that which would have been required to pay family members at the agricultural

worker's rate. This is a significant point, since farms of less than 50 acres constitute over 63% of all farms in the country.

A spokesman for the Association stated that the type of information collected in the Survey was of vital importance in any discussion on agricultural policy. The Institute was to be congratulated on this publication, which will be followed by a similar publication for each of the years 1967/68 and 1968/69. The Association urged that a survey of this kind should be carried out on a continuous basis in order to provide a constant flow of reliable and useful information, and further recommended that all possible steps be taken to reduce the time lag in publishing the results.

The Association, noting that the Survey was carried out by the Farm Management section of the Institute's Rural Economy Division, recommended that a special budget be provided for continuous Surveys of this kind.

## EXTRA MEASURES TO COMBAT PIG SMUGGLING

Fat pigs are being smuggled into the Republic from Northern Ireland as everyone now knows. What is not appreciated is that an illegal trade in Bonhams is also in full operation now and an extra watch is to be maintained on the routes through which it is believed bonhams are being smuggled across the Border.

Extra measures to combat the problems of smuggling fat pigs were discussed for two hours at an expanded meeting of the NFA National Pigs and Bacon Committee.

It was agreed that there should be an intensification of Border patrols and the members of the Committee welcomed the fact that other counties had promised to give every assistance to the Border counties in maintaining the patrols.

## FIELD GRAIN PRICES

The NFA Grain Committee is seeking to have the present price of 48/- per barrel to growers of feeding barley increased to 55/- for next year's crop.

In a letter to the Dept. of Agriculture, the Committee points out that in view of the sharp increase in production costs and overhead expenses which growers have had to meet in recent years, the price increase which is being recommended, is necessary to provide a reasonable income from this crop.

The NFA has asked that prices for other feed grains should also be raised to the same level, i.e. £27.10.0 per ton to the grower. The other grains concerned are: (a) wheat which is classified as unsuitable for flour milling and (b) oats which is marketed through the floor price scheme introduced in twelve Western-type counties a couple of years ago.

The NFA grain price claim includes a specific recommendation that pig producers should be compensated for the increase in their feeding costs which would follow a rise in grain prices as from the 1970 harvest. The other grains concerned are: (a) wheat which is classified as unsuitable for flour milling and (b) oats which is marketed through the floor price scheme introduced in twelve Western-type counties a couple of years ago.

sequently, in announcing an increase of 2d. per gallon on contract milk in Dublin and Cork Milk Board areas, the Minister had introduced measures withdrawing the Milk Price Allowance, and Quality Bonus from milk surplus to the requirements of the liquid trade—measures which meant, in effect, that producers would suffer a net loss, when all the factors had been taken into account. After this had been pointed out to the Minister at a meeting with the National Liquid Milk Group, he announced that he was deferring the introduction of any of the controversial changes.

The NFA statement pointed out: "We wrote to the Minister on August 21, requesting a meeting and reminding him that on May 15 we had got a promise from him that he would discuss with us before October 1, any changes in the price structure for liquid milk producers. Producers are still in the dark, as to what the Minister proposes to do and that is why we have written to him again seeking an urgent meeting."

## THE FARMER OF TOMORROW

Dr. Tom Walsh of An Foras Talmhais made an important point when he said in Cork that the effects of education at the post primary level play an increasingly important part in moulding and developing the farmer of the future.

With the integration of farming into the economy as a whole there would, he pointed out, be a deeper involvement by farmers with the community, not only for business of farming but for education, recreation and general living. All sections of the community will see more clearly their interdependence.

Tomorrow's farmer will require more knowledge and more know how. The road to progress will continue along the lines of specialisation and intensification in farming enterprises. Intensification will throw up problems for which we certainly have not got the answers today.

Dr. Walsh was speaking at the annual banquet of Cork County Executive of Macra na Feirme.

more District those net licence  
holders who voted did not  
show any marked preference  
either way. In the circum-  
stances the Minister has decid-  
ed to proceed with alteration  
of seasons.

The Minister is having  
amending by-laws prepared  
which will bring into effect  
the alteration of seasons pro-  
posed. At the end of the pe-  
riod of three years, for which  
according to law the proposed  
by-laws must remain in force,  
the position will again be re-  
viewed.

# Brilliant Lismore Take Western Crown

## Eire Og Outclassed In Intermediate Hurling Final

AT a windswept, rain drenched Fraher Field on Sunday last, Lismore emerged as Intermediate Western champions when they completely outclassed an Eire Og fifteen with a scintillating exhibition of power-packed

hurling. From the very start of the game Lismore were dominant in every sector and when they turned over with a two points lead after playing against a strong breeze, the writing was on the wall for the Dungarvan side.

It was a disappointing afternoon's entertainment for the very large attendance at the junior hurlers of Abbeyside and Kinsalebeg-Clashmore failed also to impress. Eire Og laid too much stress on the man and not the ball and some of their players were lucky not to have incurred the referee's displeasure as an amount of hurley-throwing went on.

It was Lismore who opened the scoring in the third minute, with Brendan Daly pointing. In the fourth minute Liam Canning sent them a further point ahead and in the sixth minute John Moylan opened Eire Og's account with a well taken point. In the ninth and eleventh minutes, John Moylan took two 21 yard frees, but failed to score on both occasions. In the twelfth minute Willie Terry equalised when he had a fine point from play. Shortly after, T. Ormonde had a goal for Lismore from a Michael Moore in the Eire Og goalmouth. Tony Moore had a fine point for Eire Og in the 17th minute when he swerved past three Lismore defenders for the best score of the game.

In the 23rd minute, Liam Canning broke loose and palm-off the ball over the bar, to put Lismore further ahead. At the other end Tony Moore was quick to reply with a point from play. In the 25th minute Jim Crowley pointed for Lismore from a free, to leave the score 1-4 to 0-4, in favour of Lismore.

A slight scuffle then broke out, which resulted in Tony McCarthy (Eire Og) and Ronnie O'Donnell (Lismore) being sent off. Just before half time John Moylan pointed for Eire Og to leave the score at half time: 1-4 to 0-5.

By now it was quite evident that in the second half Eire Og would have to pull out all the stops if they were going

to keep in touch with this strong Lismore side. As it turned out, they were able to keep up the pace, but as far as skill was concerned they were just not in the same category as Lismore.

For the first fifteen minutes of the second half it was all Lismore, and Eire Og could do absolutely nothing to stop the surge of their opponents. In the second, fifth and six minutes, Jim Crowley had three fine points from frees, to his credit. Keeping up the pressure, Lismore were rewarded with another point, by McGrath. But in the 11th minute came the score that really clinched this game for Lismore, when, from a free, Crowley buried the ball in the back of the net. From then on it was all Lismore and in the 14th minute J. Crowley was again the man of the moment, when he sent another bullet of a shot past a helpless Lar Harte.

In the 17th minute Eire Og had their only score of the half when Billy Monahan's 21 yard free rather luckily ended up in the back of the net. For the remaining minutes of the game it was again all Lismore and they added further points in the 21st and 28th minutes, from Crowley and Ormonde respectively.

Eire Og were too dependent on too few players and were it not for their class, the tally against them could well have been much higher.

The Lismore attack was at all times dominant and the man

that stood out most was Liam Canning. This man completely played havoc with the Eire Og defence. Others up front to play well for them were Brendan Daly, Jim Crowley, and D. Ormonde. At midfield Michael McGrath and Michael Canning combined beautifully and they had very little difficulty in supplying their forwards with the ball. In the backs there was hardly a man at fault and those that stood out most were Jim Geoghegan, Ronnie O'Donnell and Tommy Hilard. In goal Denny Buckley was well capable of taking care of anything that came his way, and got good cover from R. Ormonde and D. McGrath.

What of Eire Og? They were completely outburled by a superior side and although they had some fine players too, the margin of defeat could well have been much greater. In the back line for Eire Og Peter Ferncombe and Tom Drumme were best. These two men done their best to try to stop the onward surges of the rampant Lismore forwards, but with the little support they were getting from the rest of the backs, all their efforts were in vain.

At midfield the pairing of John O'Reilly and Des Hayes never seemed to hit it off. In attack John Moylan, Tony McCarthy and Willie Terry were best.

However, overall, Michael Woods was the man of the match as far as Eire Og were concerned and if every member of the team played with the same determination as he did, they would have given a very creditable account of themselves.
