Bishop of Yola Laid to Rest in Dungarvan

The death occurred on Saturday night, 29th November, at St. Joseph's Hospital, Clonmel, of Most Rev. Dr. Patrick Joseph Dalton, O.S.A., who was Bishop of Yola, Nigeria, for the past seven years. He was aged 61.

Born in Powerstown, Clonmel, Bishop Dalton had spent more than 30 years on the Nigerian missions. He was educated at Powerstown N.S. and St. Augustine's College, Dungarvan. He entered the Augustinian Novitiate, Orlagh, Templeogue, Dublin, in 1928 and was later a student at U.C.C. and the Gregorian University, Rome. He was ordained priest in Rome in 1935.

With the exception of short periods at Good Counsel College, New Ross; St. Augustine's College, Dungarvan and St. John's Priory, Dublin, he was to spend the rest of his life in the mission territory of the Order in Nigeria.

He was one of the pioneer missionaries appointed to Yola in October 1938. From 1939 to 1950, he was religious superior of the Augustinian missionaries in that area. He was appointed Prefect Apostolic of Yola in 1950 and in addition became Administrator Apostolic of Maiduguri in 1954.

The Diocese of Yola was established in 1962 and Dr. Dalton was named as its first Bishop. His Episcopal Ordination took place in Dublin on Sept. 29, 1962, and coincided with the centenary celebrations of the Augustinian Church in Thomas Street. Bishop Dalton had to return to Ireland recently because of a serious illness.

He is survived by his sisters, Sister M. Philomena, Sisters of Mercy, Stradbally, Sr. Theresa, Assumption Convent, Port Elizabeth, South Africa and Mrs. Rose McGrath, Laganmore, Clonmel, and his brother, Edward.

His remains were removed to St. Augustine's Church, Dungarvan, on Sunday evening and a large and most representative cortege were in attendance.

AMBULANCE FOR DUNGARVAN AND WEST WATERFORD

Dear Sir,
In reply to an open letter from Mr. Richard Walshe, U.D.C., in last week's 'News & Star' regarding the Ambulance Service in Dungarvan and West Waterford, I wish to state as the one responsible for sending the ambulance to scene of the accident at Shandon, on 10th October, 1969, that the fault was not in the Ambulance Service, but with the public who failed to ask for the ambulance. I am informed that this accident happened at 7.30 a.m., on 10th October, 1969, and there was much confusion in searching for a doctor, but no one asked for the ambulance until the doctor rang at 8.10 a.m.—that was 40 minutes that the patient was lying on the roadway. Our ambulance reached the patient in exactly 11 minutes after the call reached the Hospital, but had we been notified when the road accident occurred, the patient would have been spared all the exposure on the roadway. We maintain a very vital ser-

vice for the public and our Ambulance Drivers cover 24 hours of the day and have first class certificates from the Department of Health on how to manage road accidents, so when you witness a road accident, as well as ringing for the doctor, please notify the Ambulance Service and any doctor will be very happy to see the ambulance there as soon as himself.

In Dublin the public are asked by the Dept. of Health to dial emergency 999. The Dept. are concerned that the country people do not have an emergency telephone service for accidents, but it is coming, combined with Television Instruction; meanwhile, Dial Dungarvan 2 and we shall have a much better service all round. I wish to thank the Observer for their courtesy in publishing this vital information to the public.

EX-GRATIA PENSIONS FOR THE WIDOWS AND CHILDREN OF LOCAL AUTHORITY OFFICERS

The Minister for Local Government proposes, subject to the enactment of the necessary legislation, to introduce a scheme of ex-gratia payments for the widows and children of certain Local Authority Officers.

Widows or children of former pensionable officers who had at least five years pensionable service on the date of retirement or death and who retired or died before 23rd July, 1968, may qualify for payment under the Scheme.

Applications for benefit under the scheme must be made on the prescribed form which can be obtained from the last employing local authority of the deceased officer.

Payments will be made with effect as from 1st October, 1969.

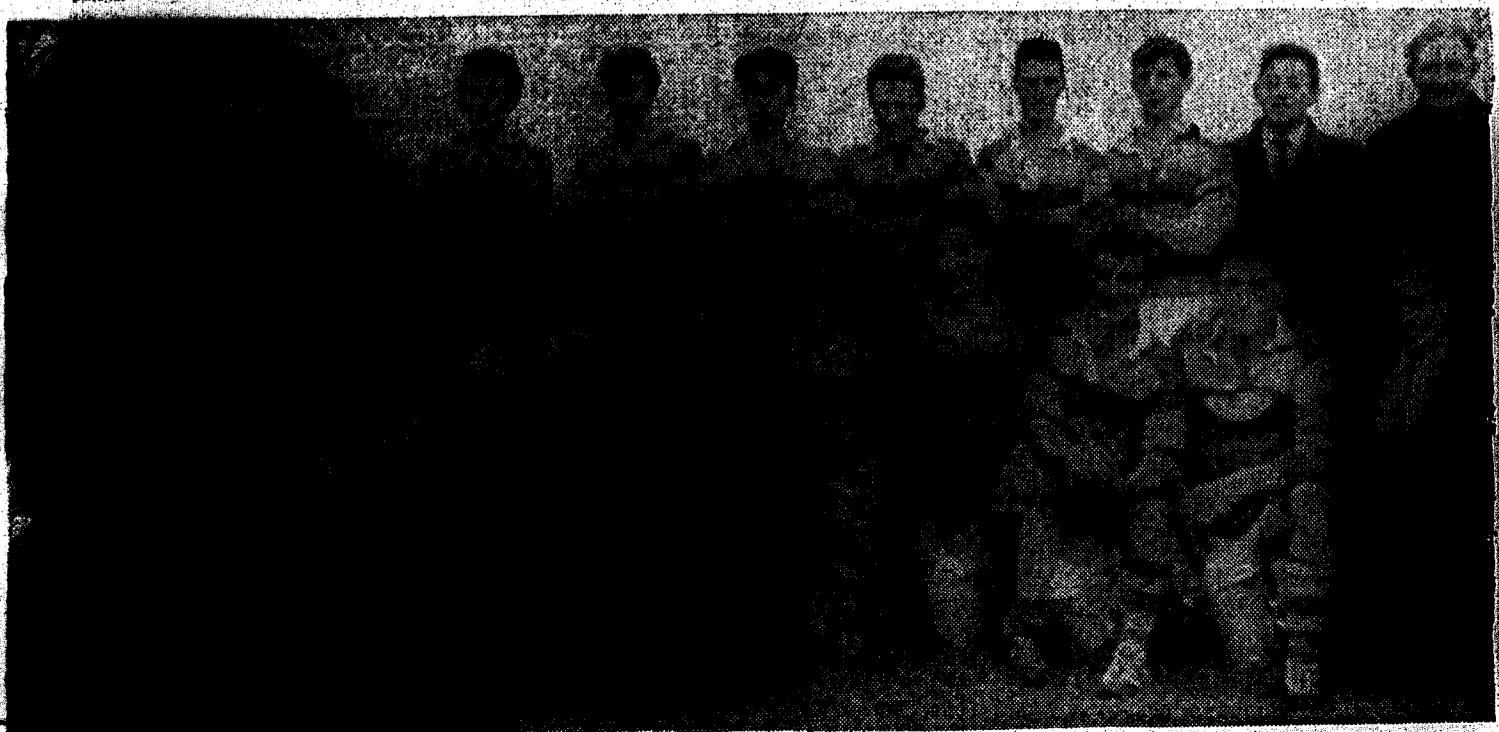

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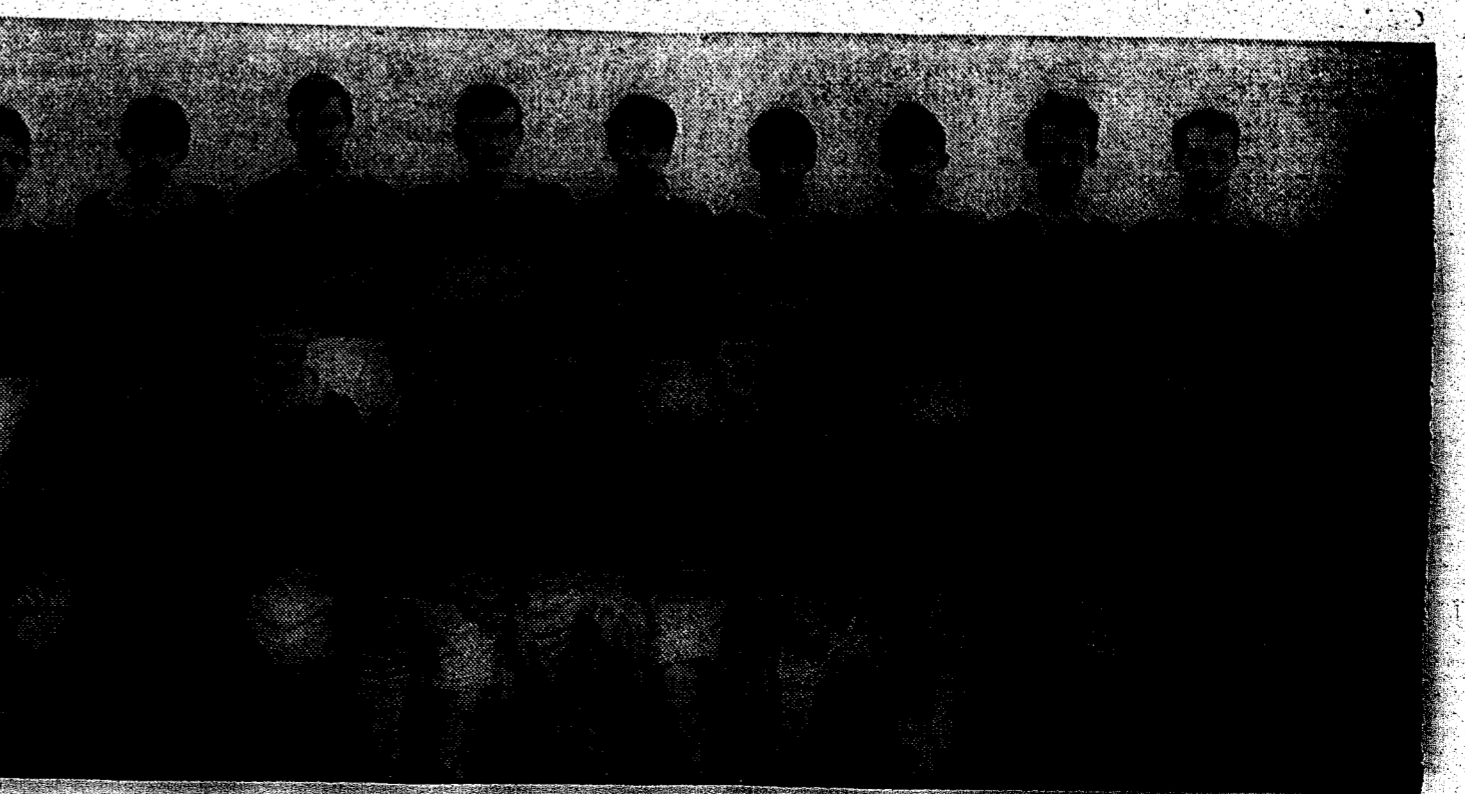

NATIONAL FINALS OF BREAD BAKING COMPETITION

There will be 27 excited young ladies in the Abbey Theatre on Sunday, 7th Dec., when the National Finals of the Schools' Breadbaking Competition, sponsored jointly by the ESB and Electrical Industries of Ireland Ltd., will compete to find the champion breadbaker of 1969.

Over 15,000 girls, from 450 secondary and vocational schools throughout the country have competed in the preliminary stages, the first stage taking place at school level.

School champions then competed in the county championships and at the Finals in the Abbey Theatre the county winners will receive their Co. shields and a prize of a deluxe hair dryer. Already they have received cash prizes to cover the cost of their expenses to come to Dublin.

ESB demonstrators from the country will accompany the children to Dublin and will act as guides, mentors and friends during the competition.

The competitors will appear on stage in the Abbey Theatre, each with her individual cooker and wearing the sash of her county—much like the beauty queens in the Miss World competition. They will be introduced by RTE Continuity Announcer, Nuala Donnelly, and following these introductions, the centre curtain of the stage will be dropped and the girls will get on with their task.

During the actual cooking time a top-class stage show will be presented featuring many well-known TV and Stage personalities.

Immediately prior to the interval, the judges, Miss M. Bonfil, Chief Inspector, Dept. of Education, Miss E. Mills, Chief Demonstrator, ESB., and well known TV personality Jimmy Flahive, will be introduced to the audience.

During the second half the judging will be carried out and the concert will continue. The finale will see all girls back on stage with their cookers for the announcement of the results, and, on an Olympia style podium, the prizes will be presented as follows: First Prize, £100 and the ESB Promotional Shield; Second, £50; Third, £25.

All competitors in this competition are between 12 and 18 years of age and the requirement for the competition is to bake a wholemeal cake.

The judges at previous competitions which have been held in Limerick, Cor k and Dublin, have been loud in their praise of the quality of the girls' baking.

The enthusiasm of domestic science teachers in schools has contributed largely towards the success of this competition and these teachers believe that the famous Irish tradition of home baked bread is being usefully served by a contest which gives it a new and vital interest.

In case you wonder why there are 27 competitors, it is because Co. Tipperary has two administrative regions—the North and South Ridings—and each of these nominates a competitor for the final.

Damage To Livestock

The members of Waterford Co. Committee of Agriculture were told at this week's meeting, in Dungarvan, that valuable livestock were being shot wholesale in the West Waterford region. The cause of the damage was put on people using shotguns when dazing for rabbits.

Mr. P. Kenneally said that several livestock had been found with bullet holes in them and more recently this practice was being carried out wholesale in the West Waterford area. He also said that they should call on all the farming community to outlaw this people. Mr. W. Dowse said that unfortunately the farmers themselves had not cooperated fully in this matter. The garda had caught some people, but instead of the farmers helping them, they turned their backs on them and said that they had given them permission to go into their fields.

The Committee agreed to write to the Co. Executive of the N.F.A., Maera na Feirme and the Supt. of the Garda in the area for their views on the problem.

Money Passed for Fox Destruction

A sum of £85 was agreed to be paid to the fox destruction scheme so as it may be continued for the coming year, at a meeting of Co. Waterford Committee of Agriculture, on Monday last. £25 of this will be paid to the outstanding applications for foxes already killed and the remaining £60 will be given to future applicants at the end of the financial year, 31st March.

Mr. G. T. Frost (C.A.O.) told members that their allocations for the scheme had been exhausted some time ago and if they are to continue the scheme to the end of the financial year, it would be necessary to allocate this money. The Committee unanimously agreed that the money be allocated.

New Clerical and Typing Posts

At a meeting of the Waterford Health in Dungarvan, the Secretary, Mr. J. A. Hynes, said that there had been an inadequate number of clerical and typing staff at Ardkeen Hospital for a while now to deal with the ever-increasing amount of work. In the last two years the amount of patients has increased considerably (13%), while at the same time the number attending the clinics have also risen. Because of this increase in clerical work, he recommended the creation of new posts. Mr. Hynes said that the total cost per annum would be £1,130, but only £500 of that would have to be borne out of the rates.

Mr. K. O'Ryan said that as being one of the Visiting Committee some of the staff were doing nothing and he was opposed to the creation of the posts.

Mr. K. Kenneally said that Mr. O'Ryan's remark was very unfair and nursing was a vocation rather than a profession and that the remarks of Mr. O'Ryan were unwarranted.

"I will make my statements in public," said Mr. O'Ryan, "and will stand over them. Ardkeen is top heavy with staff and it is little wonder that we are £1 million in debt to the bank. Anyway, you are always clipping my wings," he said.

Mr. Fahy, T.D., said that he had had the experience of being there for some time and at no time was he ever neglected.

Mr. O'Ryan: I would not expect any other statement from a T.D.

Mr. P. Cahill proposed that the posts be created, and Mr. T. Galvin seconded. The proposal was passed with Mr. Ryan, Mr. N. Walsh (Acting Chairman) and Mr. J. Quirke, dissenting.

Committee Reject Increase in Travelling Allowance

At a meeting of Co. Waterford Committee of Agriculture on Monday last, a motion, tabled by Mr. P. Cahill, requesting the committee to reconsider its previous decision of not accepting an increase from 1/6 to 1/6 in their mileage allowance and 10/- increase in their subsistence allowance, was defeated by a 9-5 vote.

In moving the motion, Mr. Cahill said that he did not think that the ratepayers would object because they were well aware of the good work the committee were doing for the community. Mr. P. Kenneally seconded.

Mr. N. Walsh said the ratepayers in the county were the highest rated people per capita in the country and that they should try to run their affairs efficiently, economically and prudently. As the preachers of economy they had a duty to set a headline, he said.

Mr. G. T. Frost (C.A.O.) said that the total cost per annum of the increases would amount to about £200 extra.

Mr. P. Cahill pointed out that they were the only committee in the country that had rejected the increases.

Mr. N. Walsh, in reply, said that they should be proud of themselves for rejecting the increases.

A proposal by Mr. Walsh that they reject the motion, was seconded by Mr. Wm. Dowse.

Mr. Cahill's motion was then put and rejected by nine votes to five.

Abbeyside-Ballinacourty Field Development

For several weeks now the Abbeyside/Ballinacourty Clubs have been laying their plans for the 70's and while in the main these plans relate to club field activities, there is quite an amount of their planning devoted to field development.

At their annual social on 8th December, details of these plans will be announced and will be of interest to both ladies and men.

A report of development and finance, which was announced at their meeting last week, is both interesting and informative. It could be taken as a guide to other clubs.

Their field is now eight years in the hands of the Club, who acquired the grounds in 1962. Land came on the market at the Burgery in 1961; this comprised three small fields with many fences. In 1963 these fences were knocked and in the following year the field was levelled and the grounds were vested in the G.A.A. Grass was sown in 1965 and a playing pitch was marked out. The following year the club used the grounds for training, and a grass cutting machine was purchased. In 1967 the present club pavilion was erected.

Since 1966 the field was used extensively by the club's ten teams, in preparation for the championships, while at the same time eight juvenile leagues have been played there.

Call For Expansion Of Sheep Numbers

A call for a dynamic effort to increase the national sheep flock and to expand our exports of mutton and lamb was made by the President of the N.F.A., Mr. T. J. Maher.

Mr. Maher who was addressing the annual dinner of Wicklow Co. Executive NFA, said at the moment we supplied just over 6,000 tons of mutton and lamb annually to the British market while New Zealand supplied over 580,000 tons a year. This tremendous gap was something we must be seriously concerned about and it was something that called for firm action.

There were those who adopted the head-in-the-sand attitude that it was no good increasing sheep production as it would not be possible to find export outlets. But the New Zealanders had succeeded in building up a lucrative export trade to the British market and we should be able to expand our exports also to other areas.

"When Britain enters the Common Market, some of its traditional suppliers will have to turn elsewhere for outlets for their mutton and lamb. That is why New Zealand and Australia are moving into the south-east Asian countries. Unless we act now, we will find ourselves in a situation where suddenly we will find ourselves with outstanding export opportunities and we just will not have the mutton or lamb to meet demands."

Mr. Maher said that the sheep industry should never have been allowed to run down to the extent that the sheep population is now one million less than it was four years ago.

"The point has been made that hill sheep farming as we have known it up to recently is a way of life no longer attractive to young people. But I hold that if the incentives were there, people would change their systems of hill sheep farming to win the full benefit of these incentives. There is no sector of the agriculture industry where farmers have not responded to calls for increased production provided they have been given confidence in the future. What has held back the sheep industry is this lack of confidence. It is imperative that confidence be restored by a concerted effort now on a national scale."

"The hill sheep farmers are a vital link in the chain of production. Production of good breeding stock in the hills and adequate store lambs will be absolutely necessary in expanding sheep production."

Mr. Maher said that not alone was it wise policy to pay subsidies for the production of foundation stock on the hills, but encouragement must be given to sheep producers in the foothills and store producing areas if a vital upsurge was to be achieved in raising quickly the national sheep flock.

INCREASED ACREAGE UNDER VEGETABLES
Irish farmers are being asked to grow a further 3,000 acres of vegetables by the Irish Sugar Company next season.

This will bring the total to 14,500 acres of vegetables being grown for the company with an anticipated turn-over of £7.5m., apart altogether from the involvement in beet grown.

By meeting the call to grow more vegetables, Irish farmers will be helping the export drive and also the economy. Last year direct Erin Foods sales overseas rose by 40% to £1.7m., while those of Heinz Erin—the marketing company established two years ago—are expected to reach £1.2m. this year. On the home front Erin sales have risen by 20%.

For the first time in the 27 years history of the Irish Sugar Company, farmers grew more than 1 million tons of beet last year—and in addition they grew 10,000 tons of vegetable. Beet yields increased by more than 4 tons for almost 17 per acre.

The machinery division at Carlow, which specialises in building beet and vegetable harvesters, now employs more than 100 men, and has an annual turn-over of £1 million (much of it earned in sales overseas).

The NFA appreciates the contribution that the Irish Sugar Company is making to

boosting the economy of the West and welcomes the doubling of the capacity of the Tuam processing plant at Galway and also the acquiring of limestone quarries in the West.

FIXED FINAL WHAT LEVY
The announcement of a final levy of 8/3d. per barrel on millable wheat of the 1969 crop, leaves a balance of 6/9d. per barrel to be refunded to growers out of the provisional deduction of 15/- per barrel which was made from their wheat cheques at harvest time.

The wheat levy goes towards covering the loss which is involved in putting surplus millable wheat on the feed grain market. The figure of about 70,000 tons of surplus millable wheat mentioned recently by the Minister for Agriculture, Mr. Blaney, is rather surprising. With their year's reduced wheat acreage and the general impression of a reduction in yields as compared with last year's record level of 36 cwt. per acre, one would not expect a surplus of more than about 35,000 to 40,000 tons.

Either the grain growers were quite a bit off the mark in their assessment of yields, or else there is much more smuggled wheat in the country than was thought to have got through the net of official and voluntary Border patrols.

MR. MAHER SPEAKS ON LAND ALLOCATION
Speaking in Carlow about the Land Commission programme, the President of the NFA, Mr. T. J. Maher said that the weakness had been that too little land was given to too many people. People dealt with in previous years were now back on the problem list for the second or third time.

While the Land Commission may have increased the acreage of certain small holdings, they were working within a rigid set of rules that did not take cognisance of what was really required to support a man and his family and made no allowance for sharp upward changes in the cost of living. Neither was a proper estimate made of the potential and quality of the land allotted, or its possible utilisation.

"Land was given to many people who did not, in fact, make full use of it. At the same time many able farmers and farmers' sons were denied access to land which they could have used with great profit.

"The criteria of land allocation should be based on the ability of the individual farmer to utilise the land allo-

TURKEYS FOR AUCTION

The NFA has now finalised its plans for the auctions in various counties and the County Committees of Agriculture are co-operating in what has become a very important venture.

Some points for producers to remember: turkeys should be

Support for Pigeon Destruction Scheme
Co. Waterford Committee of Agriculture have agreed in principle to support a scheme to be introduced by the County Waterford Gun Club and Games Protection Association, commencing in January next, designed to eliminate a total of 5,000 pigeons. The scheme will run for 18 to 20 weeks and will cost about £400.

The C.A.O., Mr. G. T. Frost told the Committee's meeting held on Monday last, that a bounty of 1/9 per bird would be paid. They had not been asked however for any specific contribution towards the scheme. The Gun Club were also discussing the question of financial contribution with the Co. Executive of the N.F.A., but they have not as yet, given any final decision on the matter.

A number of members expressed their views on the damage the pigeons had done in the county and they agreed to agree in principle to support the scheme. They will also write to the Gun Club asking them for more concrete information with regard to financial contribution.

game in the county have Tramore and Geraldines met at the penultimate stage in a senior championship. On three occasions before the coveted title was triumphantly borne to the village of Aghlish (1915, '22, '23), and none in this historic village have any doubts but that come Sunday evening they will be celebrating their fourth championship victory.

The last time Geraldines reached the final was in 1962 and on that occasion they went under to Kill on the score 1-11 to 2-2. But now they have a much more experienced side and if they were slightly overawed on the last occasion this certainly will not be the case on Sunday.

BETTER FOOTBALLERS

Of the two teams Geraldines are undoubtedly the better footballers and with the majority of neutral followers of the game, are firm favourites to win the title. When playing to form they can display all that

is majestic about the code, and can master the best on their day. En route to the final they have gone from strength to strength. They have a superbly unyielding defence, a tireless and effective midfield partnership and above all, an attack that can take their chances in expert style are the hall marks of this Aghlish side.

REAL TEST

However, the real test for the Geraldines was yet to come. In their semi-final clash with Stradbally they ended all square on the first occasion and in fact only got through by the narrowest of margins in the replay. In their first meeting Geraldines could only manage a three point lead at half time, after playing with a strong breeze, and when Stradbally quickly caught up with them after the break it looked as if Geraldines were on their way out of the championship. But rising magnificently to the occasion in the last ten minutes they came fighting back to force a draw 1-5 to 0-8. Stradbally got off to a dream start in the replay, when they went a goal and a point ahead after five minutes. But this was the occasion when the Aghlish men really showed they true fighting form and with goals from

Geraldines are brilliantly served in goal by Johnny Grady, but while P. J. Connelly, Patsy Kenneally and Mickey Downing are solid defenders, and form a hard tackling full back line, their inclination to give away free could prove costly, with sharp shooters Greg O'Neill and Sean Flavin well capable of capitalising on such scoring chances. Centre back Mick Tobin is presently playing well, while the Mernins in the wing half positions are also expected to live up to their expectations.

At centre field the pairing of Johnny Cotter and Tom Kelly looks very good, and well though Tramore's Fleming and Power may play hereabouts, a

pronounced Aghlish advantage is hoped for in this vital sector.

But it is to the attack that all Aghlish will look to for victory. If Jim Joe Landers, Joe Bailey and Michael Treacy hit it off in the half forward line, then full forwards, Mick O'Brien, Michael Kelleher and Willie Joe Treacy will make and take scores.

While the Tramore defence is comprised of a sextet of reliable footballers, Flanagan, Mernin, O'Brien and Power are undoubtedly the main stays of the sector. In the forwards their big men are Partridge, Flavin, Butler and Fleming.

Having summed up the relative merits and demerits of the side, I for one go in favour of a Geraldines victory. It will be hard eander, of that there is no doubt, but judging as their previous form, I give them a vote of confidence to take their fourth senior football title.

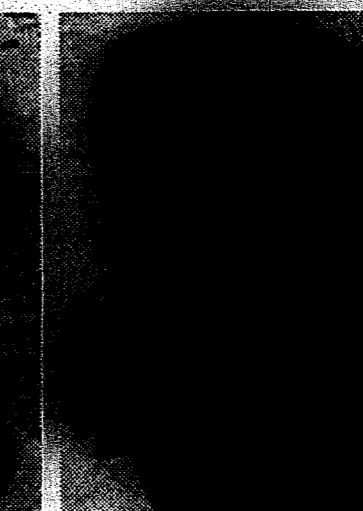
