APPEAL AGAINST DISTRICT COURT CONVICTION DISMISSED

An appeal by Gerald Hallahan, Emmet St., Dungarvan, against the severity of a two-month jail sentence imposed on him at the District Court, for common assault, was dismissed by Judge S. Mac D. Fawcitt, at Dungarvan Circuit Court on Tuesday.

Mr. J. Counahan, State Solicitor, said that Hallahan had been convicted at Dungarvan District Court in September last, on assaulting Mr. John Doyle, proprietor of an amusement centre, Grattan Sq., Dungarvan. Mr. Doyle heard some youths using bad language on his premises and rang the gardai to have them removed. On doing so Hallahan came up to him and struck him on the chin. Mr. Counahan added that the appellant seemed to specialise in assaulting.

Sept. M. English said that the accused had previous convictions going back as far as 1961. These included breaking and entering and larceny charges and he had also served a three months prison sentence with hard labour for assaulting a Garda. The Supt. added that the appellant was not really a bad type and that most of the trouble arose from the company he was keeping. He also said that Hallahan was intending to get married and he was going to emigrate.

Judge Fawcitt said that he could not keep the appellant away from bad company by any other way than by confirming the District Justice's sentence. Whatever he could do, he would try and stamp out assaults and could see no reason for interfering with the two months sentence.

Mr. Eamonn F. Keane, M. Phil., M.A., M.Ed., D.D.E., has been appointed Research and Planning Manager of Bord Failte Eireann. He is aged 35 years and is a native of Youghal. He received his early education at Youghal C.B.S., and St. Colman's College, Fermoy. He received his M.A. Philosophy and H.D.E., at U.C.C. He taught for City of Cork Vocational Education Committee and held the Teastas Tímhre Gaeilge qualification.

He went to London University as a post-graduate student in 1958 and was awarded a distinction in the Academic Diploma of that University. He did a study and lecture tour of West German educational establishments in 1959, and was appointed to a lectureship in Woolwich the same year.

Subsequently he became Head of Dept. and Vice-Principal of a College of Further Education in Bristol and for a time was Secretary of the Bristol Irish Club.

He then moved to Bath as Educational Administrator responsible for Technical Education and Teacher Training for the city and county. He was promoted to Establishment and Training Officer and acted as head of the Management and Central Services Unit responsible for all aspects of Industrial Relations, Productivity, Recruitment, Training and Management development and efficiency.

He combined these posts with post-graduate studies in industrial administration and management as well as education economics and acted as visiting lecturer at Bristol University and Bath University of Technology, and was awarded a higher degree for thesis on the Economics of Decision and Planning in Public Administration.

Mr. Keane then left to take up a senior post with a group of companies specialising in industrial management and marketing consultancy and was promoted executive director of one of the companies in the group. He served on the education and management committees of the Institute of the Motor Industry and on various national and regional planning and development committees.

Mr. Keane married, with two children. His wife is a doctor, specialising in paediatrics. She is also magistrate in Gloucestershire.

Mr. Keane replaces Mr. Robert Irvine, who resigned as Marketing Manager of Bord Failte. Mr. Keane will direct Bord Failte market, economic and operational research and guide the formation of marketing and development plans. His department will provide a data processing service for the whole industry and is currently involved in studies into a national accommodation reservation system possibly on a computer basis. The consultancy services of the Board will also come under his control.

He is brother of Dr. Sean Keane, who has recently been appointed to a senior surgery consultancy course in Milwaukee.

He is nephew of Mr. John Keane, Ballycoo.

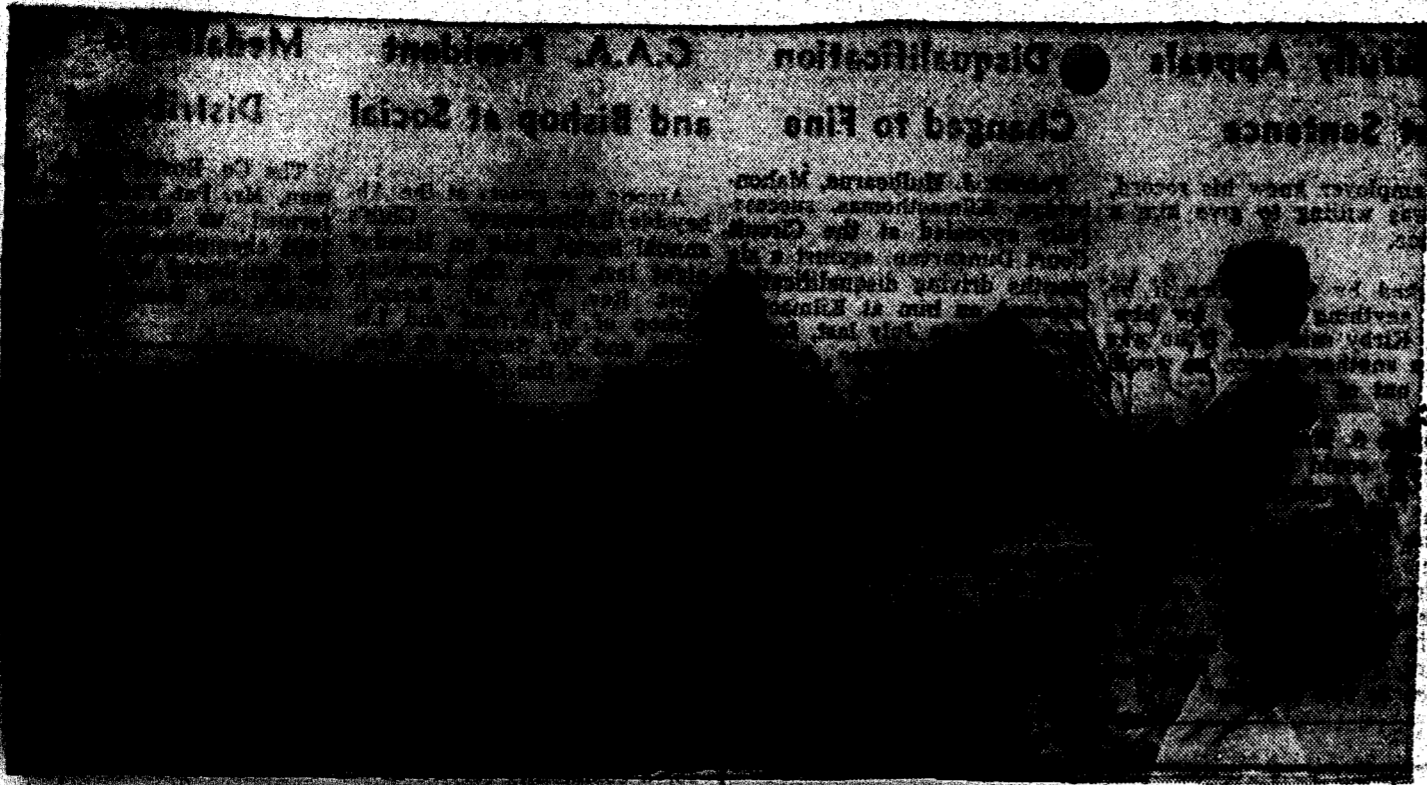

CORK MOTORIST Dungarvan Man Successfully Appeals AWARDED £362 Against District Court Sentence

A collision on a narrow country road between two cars had a sequel at the Circuit Court, Dungarvan, on Wednesday last, when Michael McCarthy Gurrane, Banteer, Co. Cork, was awarded a decree for £362 with costs and expenses, against Michael Scannan, Cooldoody, Ballyduff. McCarthy had claimed £440 damages for negligent driving by the defendant at Ballyduff on 18th July last.

Mr. McCarthy said that while on his way to Kilmachomas, he took the wrong turn on the road and was travelling on a narrow country road. However, he knew that the road would bring him back on the main road again, so he was driving very slow so as he would not miss the right turn. As he was approaching an acute bend on the road, another car came around it at the same time, at the wrong side of the road. A collision then occurred which resulted in his car being a "write-off." He had had the car only three months and he was still paying H.P. for it, he said.

Miss M. O'Connell, a passenger in the car, said she was in the back seat of the car talking to another passenger, Miss J. Kenny when the accident occurred. All she saw was the other car coming for them and she shouted: "It's going to hit us" and that was all she remembered.

Miss Kenny said she was sitting in the front of the car and had her back turned to the driver when the accident occurred, and all she could remember was hearing Miss O'Connell shout.

Garda P. Looney said he arrived on the scene of the accident and saw that Mr. McCarthy's car was in as close as it would be to the ditch. On the other hand, Mr. Scannan's car was at an angle on the road.

Mr. Michael Scannan said that he was going about 20 to 30 miles an hour when the collision occurred and admitted that he was in the wrong.

Mr. C. Taggart, Garage Proprietor said that he sold McCarthy the car for £350 and that it was in good condition at the time of the sale. The car was worth £20 salvage and at the moment he was hiring him a car for £3 a week.

Thomas Kirby, Cathal Brugha Pl., Dungarvan, had a one month prison sentence lifted on appeal, at the Dungarvan Circuit Court, on Tuesday last. Instead he was bound to the peace for two years, or, in default, ordered to serve a two months sentence.

Dr. D. R. Counahan, State Solr., said that the sentence was imposed on Kirby following a row at the Town Hall Dungarvan, when Kirby and another man tried to gain entry, without paying, to a dance. John Hourigan, Abbeyside, was the caretaker at the dance, and when he went to intervene, Kirby attacked him.

Supt. M. English said that the accused had previous convictions, but Garda Nector had now secured a job for him in Ballinacourty, where he would earn a weekly wage of £12. The Supt. went on to say that these people were inclined to hang around in groups and then fell into trouble. If they could be separated, he added, then these incidents might not happen.

Appeal Dismissed

Judge E. Mac D. Fawcitt dismissed an appeal brought by William Carey, Fort William, Glencainr, Lismore, against John Muir, Fortwilliam Estate, at Dungarvan Circuit Court, against a decision dismissing without prejudice his claim against the Estate Land Steward for damages of £50 for assault and battery.

Carey said that while bagging barley with two other employees and Mr. Muir at Fortwilliam Estate on 13th August last, some barley spilled and the defendant abused him. As witness went to get up on the trailer to argue it out with Mr. Muir, Muir struck him with his fist in the ear. Because of the severity of the blow he was out of work for seven weeks.

Brian Shanahan and Thomas Hannon, who were also working with Carey, gave similar evidence during cross-examination.

Dr. James Gallagher said on August 13th, Carey called to him and he had laceration on the lower part of the right ear. The lobe of the ear was also severed. He told Carey not to go to work until he saw him again. On a following occasion when he visited Dr. Gallagher the wound was almost healed.

Mr. Muir said he had nearly always found Carey unsatisfactory at his work and had given him notice on a number of occasions. On the day in question Muir said that he did abuse Carey for spilling the barley. As he was standing on the trailer, Carey came at him and shoved him. He then threw Carey off the trailer and on doing so, Carey said that he would kill him. Carey went on the trailer again, where they tussled for a while and eventually he (Muir) managed to throw him to the ground. The three workers then left the field and left the estate's employment.

The Judge said he was satisfied that the workers goaded Muir when they told him that they had not seen any barley spilled. He went on to say that there was no doubt that there was an assault by Muir and he was satisfied that it was not for the purpose of merely arguing it out that Carey went up on the trailer and Muir was also entitled to hold that view and use force to defend himself.

The appeal was then dismissed and Muir was allowed costs and expenses.

Mulhearn told the court that he thought that the tractor was insured.

Dr. D. R. Counahan said that he was either fooling the court or the insurance agents were fooling him.

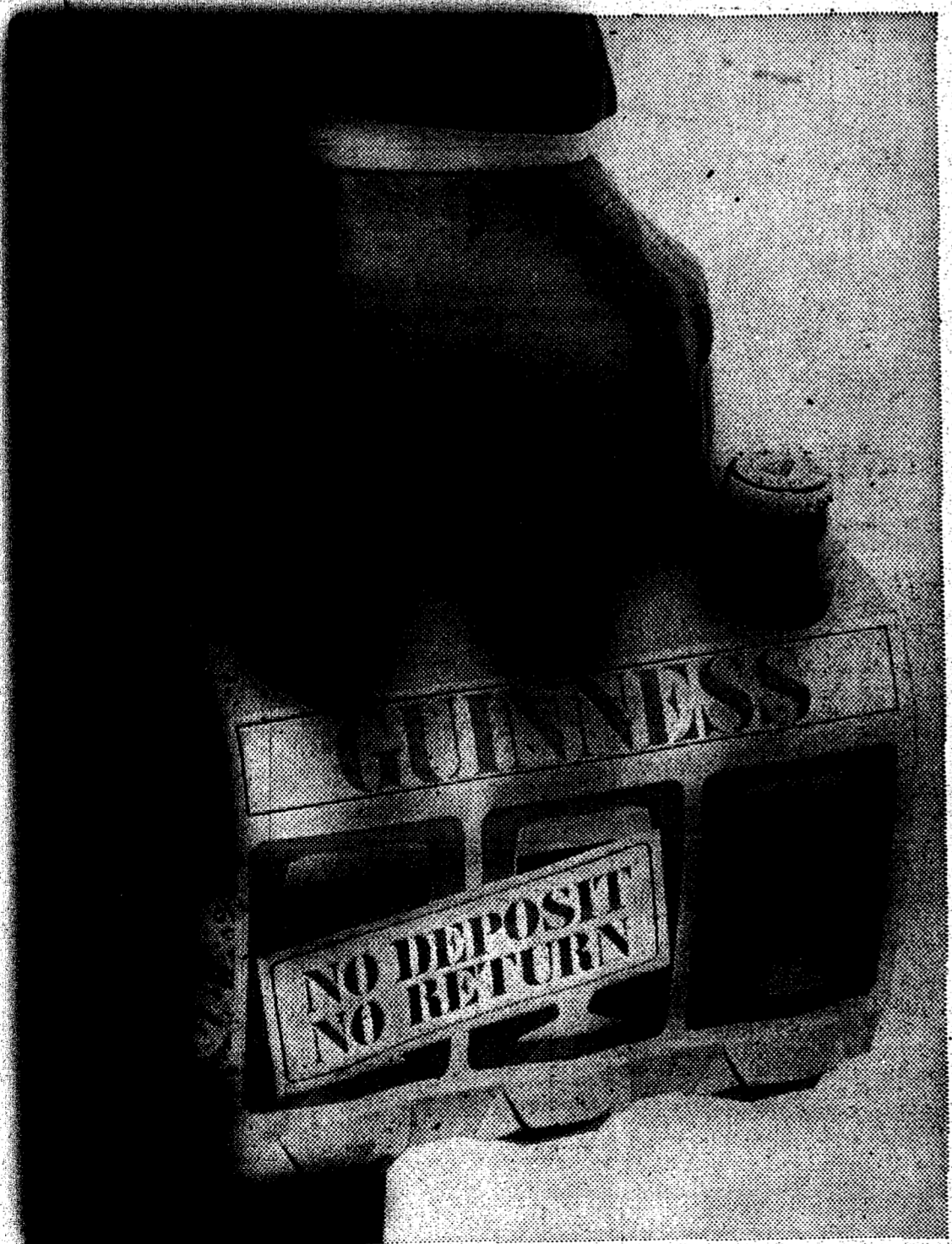

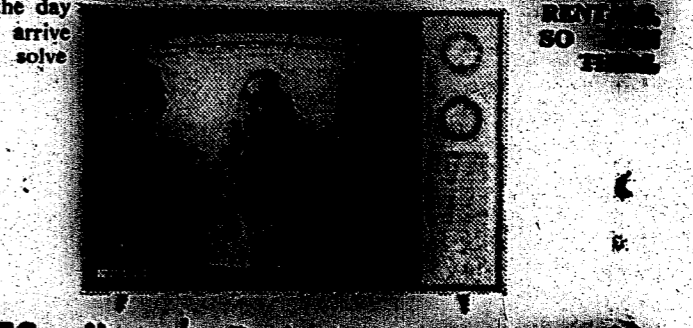

TRAMORE'S FIRST SENIOR FOOTBALL CROWN

TRAMORE, the team with the odds against them, created a major upset on Sunday last when they beat fancied Geraldines in the Waterford senior football final. This was not a classic display but the fact that the two teams were so evenly matched added an exciting flair to the game. Disaster struck Geraldines in the first minute when their centre forward Jim Joe Landers had to retire with a leg injury and this surley had an upsetting effect on the Aglishmen. This was a tough uncompromising final and if the exchanges were contended with fervour and intensity, it was sportingly done so. Tramore deserved this two point victory because they had the team power and had some fine scores to ensure that the Geraldines would be behind for most of the game.

Tramore, quite obviously had more faith in themselves than the opposition, as was clearly demonstrated in the second half, when centre forward Thomas Butler distributed the ball with remarkable precision and opened up yawning gaps in the Geraldines defence. Playing against the wind in the first half, Tramore went straight into the attack and came very close to scoring on numerous occasions. For the first ten minutes they caused complete havoc in the Geraldines defence and were looking a much more competent side. The Geraldines were simply not in it at this stage and in fact Tramore let many good scoring chances go amiss. It was not until the 10th minute that Tramore opened their scoring and it was Billy Fleming who took the honour with a well taken 14 yards free, which was given after Sean Flavin had been fouled. Tramore increased their lead with a further point by Michael Fleming in the 15th minute and it seemed possible at this stage that Geraldines would be swamped.

However, the Aglishers were at last beginning to settle down and soon were mounting their own attacks on the Tramore citadel. 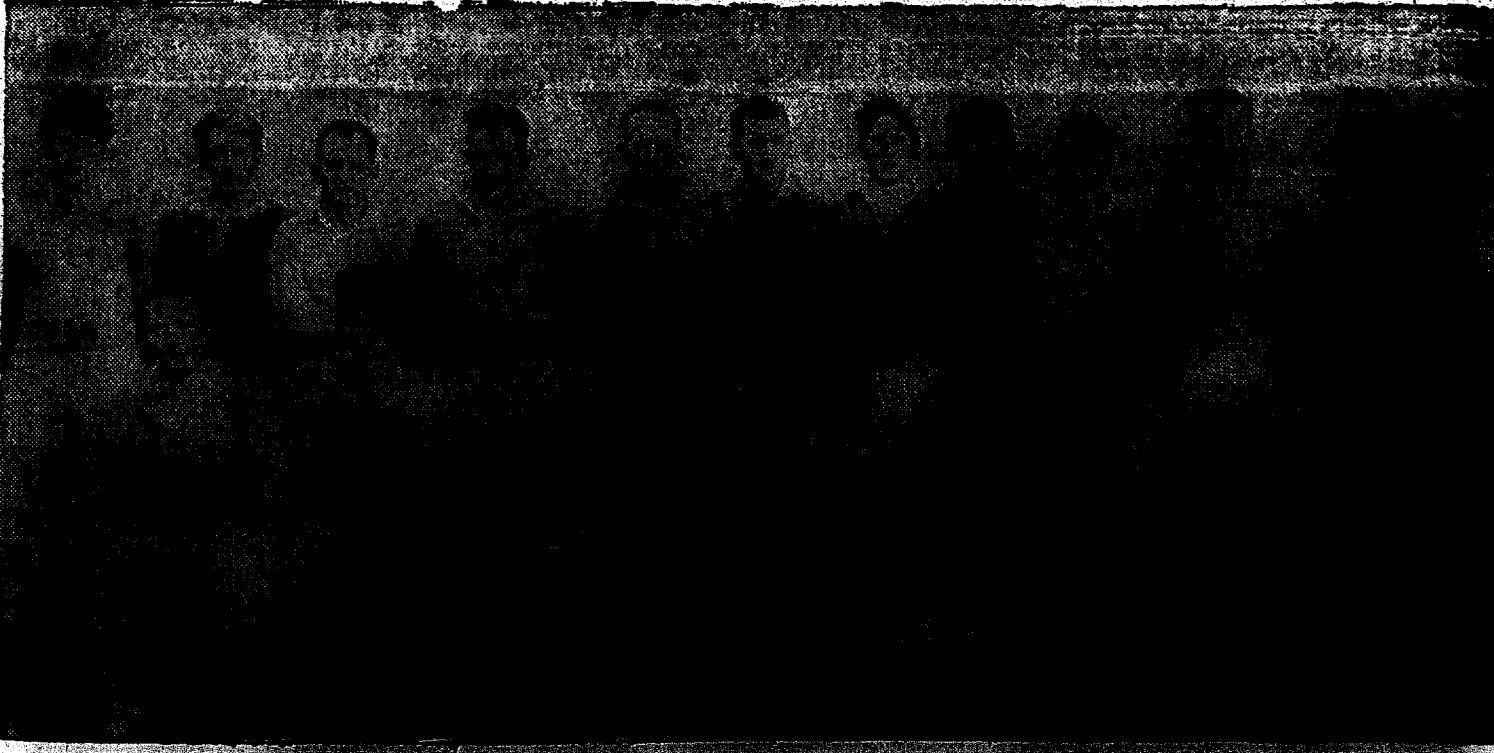

Phelan Cup Final on Sunday

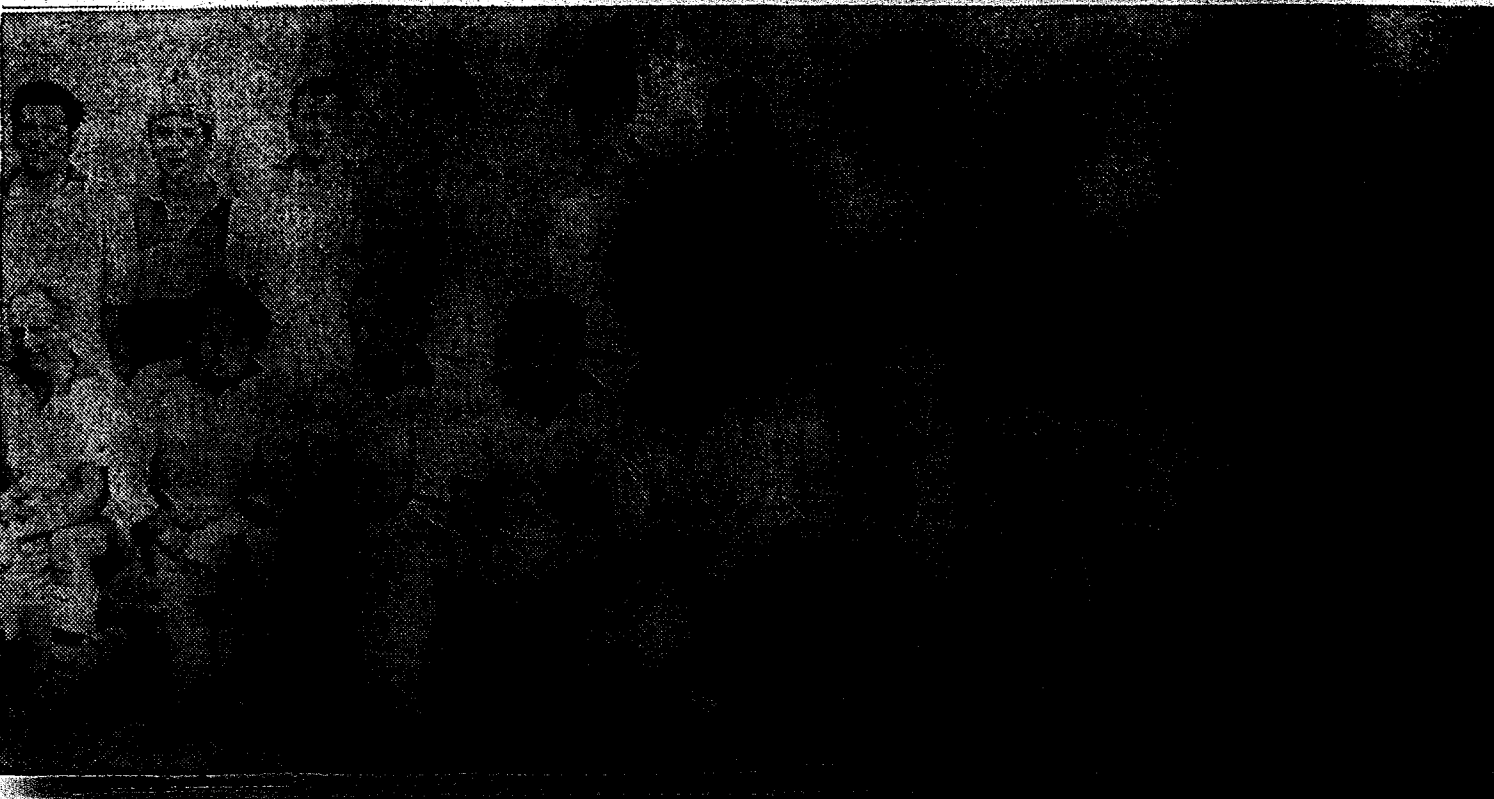

TRAMORE . . . the champions (above), Geraldines (below)



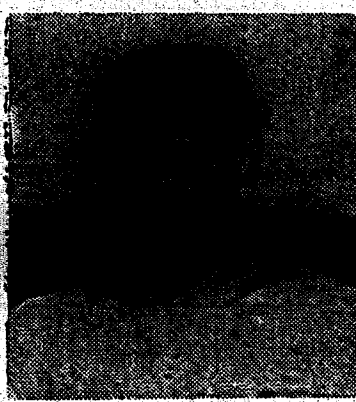
Lismore Fancied to Take Intermediate Title

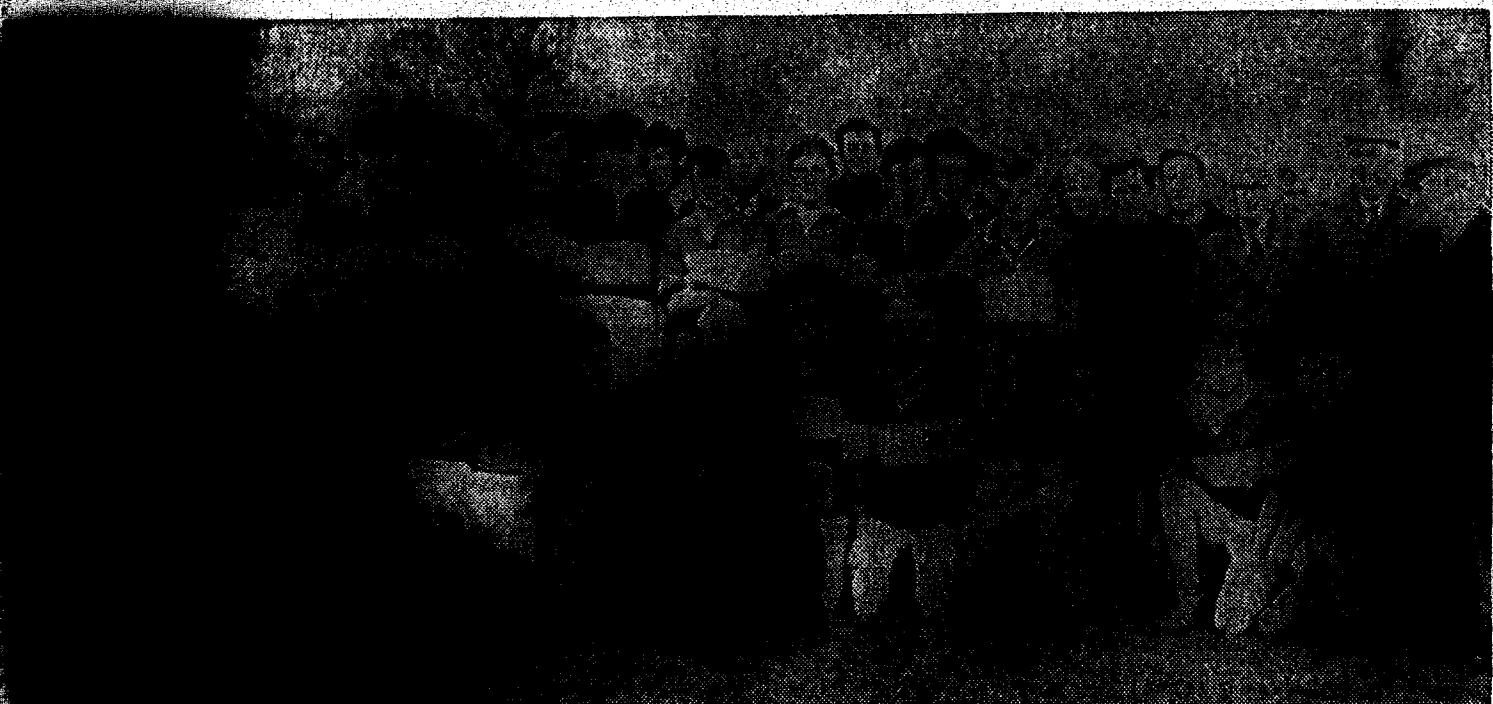
