Rubber Boots Sale Of Shambles Site Again Deferred

On the proposal of Mr. Austin Deasy, seconded by Mr. P. Whelan, it was agreed to defer the sale of the Shambles site, pending talks with the Brass and Reed Band, at Dungarvan Urban Council's meeting, held on Monday night last.

The Co. Manager, Mr. C. A. O'Connor said that they had no

alternative accommodation at the moment, but that a site at Quann's could be made available to them. Also, that the premises of the Credit Union could be put at their disposal, if and when they find other accommodation.

Mr. T. Wade said if better accommodation could not be found for the band, then they should not be moved at all. He went on to say that they should not sell the Shambles at all, because when they look for another site in the future they

will have to pay much more than £10,000.

Mr. N. Hackett then asked if the go ahead could be given for the band to be put out on the road, to which the Co. Manager replied that it could.

The Co. Manager said that it was up to the members of the Council solely to accept or reject this offer, but he felt that in the interest of the people of the town, the £10,000 was needed.

Mr. R. Walsh said that he too did not want to see the Brass and Reed Band thrown out on the street.

Mr. A. Deasy then proposed that they defer the matter to the next meeting, seeing that there was only 5 of the 9 members present.

Loan Raised from A.C.C.

At a specially convened meeting of the Waterford Co. Committee of Agriculture in Dungarvan on Monday last, it was agreed, on the proposal of Mr. C. Curran, seconded by Mr. P. Kennelly, to raise a loan of £35,000 from the Agricultural Credit Corporation for the financing of the Committee's new offices, now under construction, at Shandon.

The C.A.O., Mr. G. T. Frost, said that the loan would be repayable over 35 years and would mean an increase of 1.36d. in the £ on next year's rates. Mr. Frost said that the building was well advanced and would be completed next March or April.

Music Practice Held

On Thursday, December 11, a music practice in preparation for the introduction of the new Mass rite was held in the Assembly Hall, Convent of Mercy, Dungarvan. It was attended by priests, teachers—religious and lay—choir mistresses, organists and choir members from parishes in West Waterford, and was conducted by Very Rev. Thomas Canon Cassidy, S.T.L., President, St. John's College, Waterford. A Mass suitable for small parishes was prepared, with Entrance hymn, 'Lord, have mercy,' 'Offertory Hymn,' 'Holy, holy, holy,' 'Lamb of God,' Communion Hymn and Recessional.

As nothing helps so much as music to create a sense of community, and as it is as a community and not as isolated individuals that we offer Mass, it is hoped that those who were present at the rehearsal will act as a musical leaven on congregations, so that, in time, all may become familiar with the tunes and "with gratitude in their hearts sing psalms and hymns and inspired songs to God" (Letter of St. Paul to the Colossians).

ENGINEER WALKS OUT IN PROTEST

Figures submitted by the Town Engineer, Mr. Patrick Walsh, regarding two new toilets for Abbeyside and Dungarvan, was severely criticised by Mr. T. Wade, at this month's meeting of Dungarvan Urban Council.

Mr. Wade said that by submitting a figure of £3,000 as the estimated cost of each toilet, the Town Engineer must consider the members of the Council and the general public "complete fools."

Mr. Wade said that he was quite convinced that anyone would be glad to build the proposed toilets for less than half the cost estimated by the Engineer.

Mr. C. A. O'Connor (Co. Manager) said that the Council had a Town Engineer, and the members could either accept or reject his estimates.

Mr. Wade—No one will sell the engineer to me. I know what he is capable of.

At this stage, Mr. Walsh (Engineer) asked the Acting Chairman, Mr. R. Walsh, if it

was necessary to listen to these remarks, and Mr. Wade interjected saying "You will have to."

Mr. Walsh (Engineer) then said that he would not sit in the Council Chamber and listen to Colr. Wade castigating him. He was leaving the meeting in protest, he said.

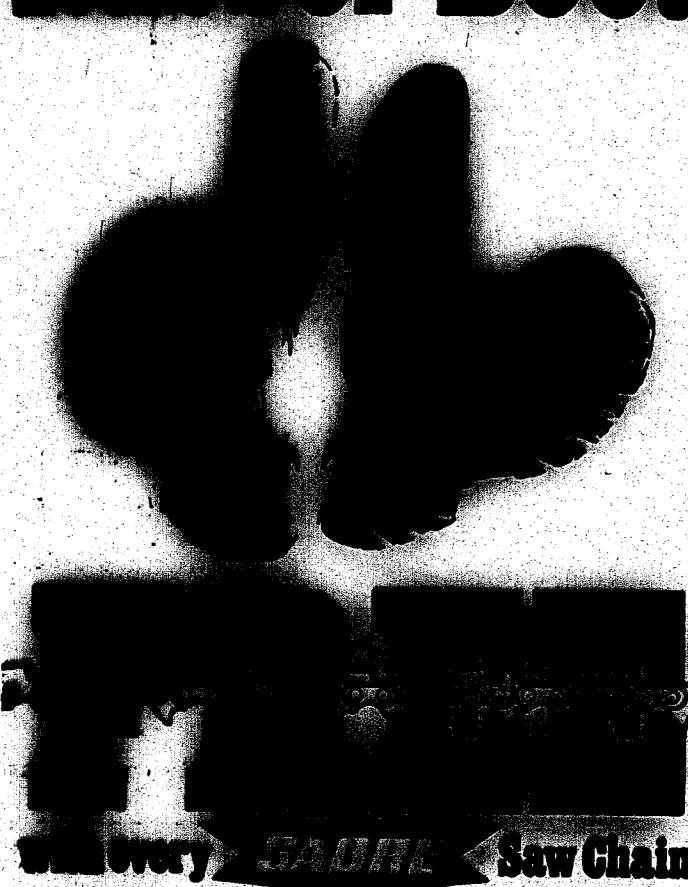
Mr. Wade—Run away. You did that again at a previous meeting.

The Engineer then left the meeting.

Mr. J. P. Robinson (Town Clerk) said that a public toilet built some time ago in Dungarvan had cost £2,100. They had already been told by the Co. Manager that it was unlikely that a subsidy would be forthcoming from the Dept.

It was then unanimously agreed to ask Bord Fáilte for a subsidy towards the erection of the toilets, in view of the town's high rates.

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Mr. W. Foran and Mr. K. O'Ryan strongly criticised the expenditure of such an amount on a mobile unit, but by a majority vote the members approved of the expenditure.

Dump Site Development Cost Criticised

A report from the Town Engineer, Mr. P. Walsh regarding the new dumping site at Ballinamuck, was criticised by Colr. T. Wade, at this month's meeting of Dungarvan Urban Council. The Engineer in his report stated that when the proposed new dumping site was first inspected and the feasibility of using it examined, it was obvious that access to it would have to be either along the Boreen leading from the public road at Ballinamuck or else along the abandoned railway line. Neither of these access roads could be utilised before a considerable amount of development work was carried out. If the boreen was used, the report went on, all the bushes at both sides would first have to be cut and the roadway trunked up, rolled and tarred. If the railway line is used, it would have to be graded, cambered and tarred. In both cases a certain amount of development work would have been necessary so that the scavenging truck and other trucks who would have to gain entrance to the dump, could safely get in and out. At no time was it visualised that the proposed dump could be used without carrying out this work.

The report went on to say that when they first examined the site they did not visualise having the use of the portion nearer the public road, which is owned by Mr. Curran. If they had this, the cost of providing a suitable entry to the dump would be reduced by something in the region of £200 to £250 because the distance involved would be shorter. "I have a quotation for doing the necessary work from Dungarvan Sand and Gravel Co. (1969) which I regard as reasonable," the Engineer's report concluded.

Mr. T. Wade said he objected very much to this report, and stressed the point that they were never told of this extra cost before.

Mr. R. Walsh (Acting Chairman) said that they did not expect to use helicopters.

Mr. Austin Deasy said it was a fact that this extra cost was never brought up before and said that they would now have to pay out more money than the initial cost of £1,000.

Mr. Deasy then proposed that they expend the extra £870, and Mr. J. Kenneally seconded. A proposal by Mr. P. Whelan that no money be spent on development work, failed to gain a seconder.

Mr. Wade said that in future when an official of the Council negotiated on behalf of the Council, any further charges in relation to the negotiations should be surcharged on the official. In this case the Engineer should be surcharged to the extent of £870, he said.

Mr. R. Walsh: That is a resolution I cannot accept.

Turkey Sales off to a Good Start

The first of the nationwide series of turkey markets organised by the NFA to win a better deal for the country's 50,000 turkey producers proved an outstanding success. Two hundred turkeys were put up for auction in Tulla, Co. Offaly, and there was a complete clearance. The average price realised was 4/8 for hens and 3/3 for cocks, but individual prices went as high as 4/6 for hens and 3/6 for cocks.
Producers expressed general satisfaction with the prices they obtained and with the marketing arrangements.
"Considering that it was the first venture of its kind in this country, the sale can be described as marking the beginning of a new era for the country's 50,000 turkey producers," said Mr. Joe Alymer, Chairman of the Co. Offaly Turkey Marketing Committee and also Chairman of the Co. Committee of Agriculture. "Up to this year they were at the mercy of circumstances, with no order in the market, no grading and no element of competition to ensure a fair deal for them. The quality of the birds on offer at this sale was first-class and the producers have gone home happy with the outcome."
The success of the initial sale has shown that there is no reason why producers should accept less than an economic return for their turkeys.
The NFA made it clear in a statement that there is no question of this being too early in the marketing of turkeys. The new marketing arrangements have created the necessary confidence and what happened last year, when too many birds were directed into Dublin over a period of a few days, will certainly not be repeated this year.
In a word, the series of thirty markets in thirteen counties has taken the pressure off Dublin and brought into the trade the element of competition which was so badly needed.
The NFA in its battle to win a better deal for producers, does not wish that the ordinary housewife should suffer in recent years, when producers were forced to sell at rock-bottom prices, and at the same time it was still paying a high price in Dublin and other large cities. Someone was reaping the profits — but not the producers.
In the long run the order in the turkey marketing industry which the NFA is aiming to achieve, will be to the benefit not only of producers, but of all other interests as well.
What is learned this year in the first big venture will bring even greater success in coming years. But producers must band together under the banner of the NFA and be united as one voice.
The small farmers know full well themselves that the recent measures, when coldly analysed, mean nothing concrete for them. They have a right to forward-looking measures designed specifically to inspire the potentially viable to making their enterprise a viable and encouraging them to reach a standard of efficiency that will be required more and more in coming seasons. The emphasis will have to be on quality if we are to compete in Europe.
"We in the NFA have advocated that help for the small farmers, be they in creamery milk or any other field of production, must be on the basis of proper incentives tied to a National Small Farms Plan that would be far more dynamic in its approach than the Small Farm Plan now in operation, commendable though this plan is in its own way. The philosophy behind the present Small Farm Plan is quite acceptable to us, but its incentive bonuses, its qualification levels and its targets are not sufficiently high to bring in the men who could really benefit from it.
"I want to see the potentially viable small farmers playing their part in a viable agricultural industry in the seventies and I want to see them given the assurance through a proper Government Plan that they have a stake in their own industry and that their future in farming—if they want to stay on the land—is assured, provided they have the ambition to make the best use of the opportunities being offered to them. There will be no place in the E.E.C. for those not willing to obtain a competitive level.
"A hand out approach of small increases tied to nothing public to conclude that the farmers' national organisation is getting us nowhere in the seventies. Agricultural policy should

not be the plaything of politicians.
"If the Government persists in backing the retarding philosophies now being propagated by the Minister for Agriculture, I must warn that the consequences will be very serious, not only for the agricultural industry, but for the economy as a whole. The controversial milk price measures will hit not only the progressive dairy farmers, but could have serious effects for our livestock industry.
"I will defend to the last the right of the family farmer, be he small, medium or large, to increase production in his own country. I do not defend the entrepreneur industrialist, who is really only taking the incentives that should be going to the family farmers of this country. Mr. Blaney has chosen to confuse for his own purposes the larger family farmers with the entrepreneur industrialists. I deplore the effort to dislodge the Irish farmers into sections as we stand on the threshold of a new decade. We must go into Europe as Irish farmers, as an integrated body, the small, the medium and the large—all depending on one another—not one section taking from another to no concrete purpose."
WANT TRADE IMBALANCE RECTIFIED
Concern at the continuing imbalance of trade between Britain and this country, was expressed at a meeting of the Munster Counties of the NFA, in Charleville, Co. Cork.
A resolution unanimously adopted at the meeting urged the Government to press for substantial increases in Irish agricultural exports to the British market, particularly of dairy products in the next round of discussions on the Anglo-Irish Free Trade Agreement to be held in June.
The meeting also expressed dissatisfaction with the controls introduced recently and agreed that these hit at progressive dairy farmers whom so much would depend if we were to make full use of the opportunities that will present themselves in Common Market conditions.

LETTER TO THE FALLOW NOTES

CRIME PREVENTION MEASURES AT CHRISTMAS

Dear Sir, I would feel greatly obliged if you would be so kind as to publish the following items of advice for the information of the business community and general public in respect of the Christmas period:-

PROPRIETORS OF BUSINESS PREMISES

1-When leaving, ensure that all doors and windows are locked. If there is nothing in the safe leave it open. Otherwise ensure that safe is locked and that key is removed.

2-Do not leave large sums of money or other valuables on the premises. Make full use of banking facilities.

3-Windows of stores and back windows of shops should be fitted with suitable bars, except where people are living on the premises.

4-Make occasional visits to your premises during the holiday season.

5-If for some reason you have to leave large sums of money or valuable property on your premises inform the Garda who will arrange for special visits.

6-Ensure that display windows in which jewellery or other valuables are exhibited, are protected externally by a grill or shutters which cannot be easily removed.

RESIDENTS GENERALLY

1-Observe the above in so far as applicable. Do not leave cash or valuables in places where they are likely to be found, such as drawers, cash boxes, etc.

2-If leaving on holidays ensure that absence from home is not advertised by drawn blinds, milk bottles piled up (through failure to notify the milkman, etc.) Notify Garda that house will be vacant and leave forwarding address. Ask neighbours to keep an eye on house.

GENERAL

1-When conveying large sums of money, vary the time and route taken in so far as possible. Employ an able-bodied trusted person for this work. It is advisable that he should be accompanied by another person if possible.

Persons conveying money should be especially on the alert for attack when leaving or entering premises and should not allow their attention to be diverted by ruse.

Shoppers should be wary of pickpockets and bag snatchers. Ladies should carry handbags under arm with hand through strap and should not leave handbag open with purse exposed. Delinquent youths are often on the watch for an opportunity in this respect. Do not leave property in car, but leave same in boot.

ROAD SAFETY

Pedestrians and cyclists on poorly lit roads at night are strongly advised to wear luminous arm bands which ensure perfect visibility by motorists.

If attending a party or other function where intoxicating liquor is available, get a non-drinker to do the driving, or if that is not feasible-hire a taxi.
