Quigley Magnesite Turn Down Option

The Quigley Magnesite Division of Pfizer Chemical Corporation has turned down an option on the 40 acre nine-hole golf course adjacent to its £3½ million Sea Water Plant at Bullinacourty, Dungarvan, which was offered to them for £80,000 by the Dungarvan Golf Club.

In view of strong objections to the proposed acquisition of the links, the company has issued a statement announcing that it has decided not to take up the option and aggravate the situation further.

It was pointed out that 20 acres had already been purchased in the area during the year, which has increased the existing site by 40%.

In the statement, the company said that objections had been publicly voiced and had

carried a certain amount of weight. Taking all these into account, it was felt better that the option should not be taken up.

Originally the Dungarvan Golf Club had decided to sell the land by a majority of two votes at an extraordinary general meeting of the members. The club had secured an option on an 80 acre farm for an agreed £40,000, from Mr. Richard Condon, Colligan, about five miles from Dungarvan. It had been planned to pay out an 18 hole course and build an up to date club house. This deal has now been called off.

Mr. P. J. Breen said the Trade Unions would support any move by the company to extend its plant and give more employment in the area.

Development Plans LOCAL HAPP'S for Dungarvan

Dungarvan Urban Council is awaiting Departmental sanction for the proposed lay-out of 28 acres of lands, to incorporate a major housing type sports complex.

The land was purchased by the Council earlier this year from Mr. Jackie O'Donnell, Voughal Road, for £40,000. It is proposed to allocate 18 acres for housing development, and Waterford County Manager, Mr. C. A. O'Connor has estimated that a 184 house scheme will be a practical proposition.

The remainder of the land is being set aside for amenity purposes. The Council has invited applications from local sporting organisations interested in acquiring some of the land. Already the local soccer club, and both G.A.A. Clubs have made application to the Council for playing pitches, while Dungarvan Athletic Club is also interested in acquiring a running track. In addition, it is understood that layout plans for tennis and basketball courts is also envisaged.

It is intended to facilitate as many different sports as possible within the 10½ acres available.

It is hoped that the layout and development will have got well under way by early summer.

The sporting fraternity of Dungarvan, who have been denied facilities for so long, will welcome this development.

MUINTIR NA TIRE DRAMA FESTIVAL

Waterford Co. Federation—Muintir na Tíre will hold an open Drama Festival, beginning on Sunday, February 6 and will run for approximately two weeks. There will be two main sections, i.e. Rural and Non-Rural, with perpetual trophies and individual prizes and certificates for merit awarded to successful groups and individuals in each section.

The Festival director will be Rev. Michael O'Shane, C.C. and Adjudicator will be Mrs. Aileen Coughlan of the lone Little Theatre Group, a well known drama critic, teacher and producer.

Only full length plays will be presented on each night (apart from Fridays and Saturdays). The adjudicator will give a criticism after each performance. The Amateur Drama Council of Ireland will have observers present and if they deem the standard high enough, this festival will be recognised as a qualifying drama festival for the annual All Ireland finals.

The venue for the Festival will be the C.B.S. Hall, Dungarvan.

We in Muintir na Tíre feel there is need for such a festival in this South East corner of Ireland. The Waterford Co. Chairman of Muintir na Tíre, (Fr. O'Shane) undertook a survey of Co. Waterford, East Cork and South Tipperary in the past few months and found that several amateur drama groups (especially in rural areas) in this region have died out completely over the past decade. The number of new groups formed during that period was negligible.

People point to several reasons, such as T.V., dancing during Lent (once a traditional time for amateur productions in Ireland), decline in rural population, etc., to explain this fall-off.

One deep sighted reason was offered and we in Muintir na Tíre put forward the following after our study of the festival: Leadership in the form of an able and dedicated producer is all too often lacking. In former times the task of producing the local play (annually) fell to either the local dramatist, or teacher or some professional person.

Many of the clergy seem loath to tackle this job nowadays, and unfortunately the old system of National Teachers living in the parish in which their work seems to have been almost abandoned. We feel such teachers should be encouraged to reside near their rural school especially.

(b) The social life (including amateur drama) of many country areas is just now at an all time low. This is often due to the utter lack of proper parish hall facilities, or community centres. One cannot readily always excuse the local clergy of all blame in this matter, when one considers how slow they are in converting all abandoned schools into parish halls (as repeatedly recommended by our bishop). We in Muintir na Tíre also bemoan the fact that so many of our professional people simply opt out when it comes to getting involved in local voluntary organisations.

(c) Finally we feel that Amateur Drama today in order to be attractive, calls for

a getting away from the old kitchen-sink stuff. Many Irish people are born actors and actresses and a little encouragement and training would go along way to revive the rural groups (the Amateur Drama League of Ireland run summer courses each summer in Gormanstown College). We also feel that a good healthy competitive spirit between groups would awaken the old local pride ("for the honour of the little village") and make groups more determined to better themselves drama-wise under the constructive criticism of good adjudicators.

These are reasons which spurred us in Muintir na Tíre to abandon our own confined annual competition in favour of a proper Open Drama Festival. We hope it will lead to an amateur drama revival in this region.

On Monday last the annual Christmas Hunt Meet of the West Waterfords attracted a good crowd. Favourable conditions contributed to the day's enjoyment.

£2 Increase for Council Workers

The total wages bill for employees of Dungarvan Urban Council in the current year will be approximately £3,000 greater than what was originally budgeted for. In a report to the recent Council meeting, the Town Clerk, Mr. J. P. Robinson outlined details of a £2 a week increase for all employees from January 1.

He stated that an exceptionally big amount of money had been paid out this year under the Council's sick pay scheme, due to a considerable amount of lengthy illness among members of the outdoor staff.

As a result of this the amount provided in the estimate for wages will be considerably higher than was estimated. The Council also agreed recently to employ two additional carpenters and a general worker, and due to this increase in staff the wages bill for the year would be £3,000 greater than the original budget.

Mr. Robinson, in his report stated that there would be savings in respect of loan charges for sanitary services as the estimates had provided for the Shushoon and other schemes and the savings on loan charges would therefore cover £2,500, while refunds under the sick pay scheme will meet a further £300 approximately.
The Council unanimously agreed to pay the £2 weekly increase from January 1 and to sanction additional expenditure for wages in the coming year.

Very many Mass cards, telegrams and letters of sympathy were received. Many floral tributes were placed on his grave.

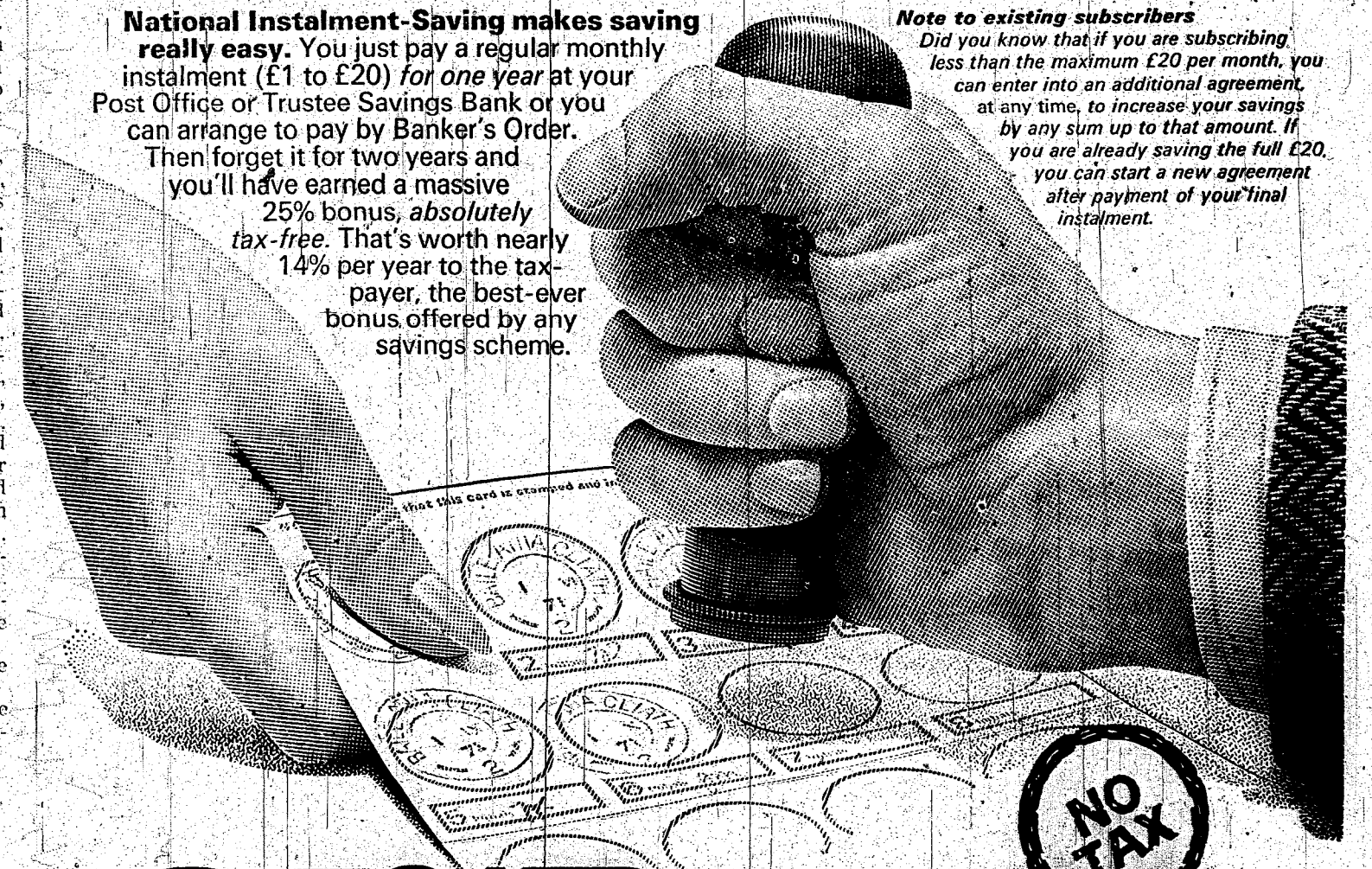

The announcement by Waterford County Engineer Mr. James D. Hally, that the proposed extension of the Co. Council's domestic refuse collection service would be operative on January 1, has drawn a sharp rebuke from Fionna Fall Co. Councillor, Thomas Foley, Stradbally.

It had been agreed at a meeting of Waterford County Council earlier this year that an extension of the service would come into operation on January 1, 1972. However, in a letter to Colr. Foley, the Co. Engineer said that this will not now be possible, because of a delay in getting tenders for an additional vehicle which will be required to implement the service.

Colr. Foley strongly criticised the failure to get the service under way to all parts of the county. He refused to accept as valid Mr. Hally's reason for the delay and said the people of the areas concerned were in desperate need of this service and as ratepayers were entitled to get it.

Colr. Foley accused the senior officials of the Council of delaying tactics in the matter and said he intended to raise it again at the January meeting of the Council.

LETTER TO THE EDITOR

Throughout the present year I have written letters on this paper expressing what I considered to be anti-Gaelic activities by some members and officials of the Co. Board. I have served under seven County Board Chairmen and three County Board Secretaries, excluding the present Co. Board officials. I was never refused a hearing by any one of those whom I requested one because they were Gaelic but never felt that they alone were the Gaelic Athletic Association and never tried to impose their views on other Gaelic, but gave them an opportunity of expressing their views.

To me 1971 is the blackest page in the history of the G.A.A. in Co. Waterford. We had the Western Board referees ignored; the referee of the Geraldines v. Affane senior football match was attacked and would probably have been seriously injured only for the Secretary of the Western Board coming to his assistance, while at the same time an official of the Co. Board was present and never raised his hand to protect the referee. That same referee sent in his report on the match and within days he was approached to alter his report but refused to do so.

Only for the displays of our senior footballers this year in showing that they can compete with the best, we would have to hang our heads in shame.

At present you have a special under 17 football league under way. It is in the form of Groups and there is a member of a committee formed by the Co. Board in charge of each Group. Some of those in charge of Groups are already members of other Committees and Boards, and from my experience this is a bad policy as it should be a case of one man one job and do it well.

There are two people I would like to see in charge of some Groups—Tony Mansfield, Abbeyside (who is giving every minute he has to the underage groups), with the result he has brought the juvenile colbat title to the Village this year) and Martin Curran of the Brickets, who, in the past year has organised some half dozen leagues and tournaments for the youth in the area. The latter also brought his teams into other counties with the expenses coming out of his own pocket.

These are the men that are going to reduce our future footballers and hurlers, if encouraged to do it and if given the opportunity by the Co. Board. I am well aware why such Gaelic are ignored by some officials of the County Board—they are doing now what some officials of the Board should have been doing when they were playing members of their clubs.

I see where the gate receipts for the year have increased considerably. That is no surprise to me, as admission charges have done likewise and there were many drawn games. A further boost was the "taking of sweet money" out of the schoolboys' pockets.

I am well aware that admission charges must be increased, but not to the extent they were. In one case people were charged 30p, while in Thurles this year they could see the Conk V. Limerick senior hurling and minor games for the same amount, and seated at that! I am afraid that money is the main consideration with some members of the Boards and clubs. But in some cases when it comes to feeding a team they can't do it. Are such people under the impression that money makes teams? If so

E.S.B. Hope To Complete Rural Electrification Scheme By 1972

Between now and 1975, the E.S.B. will endeavour to complete the Rural Electrification Scheme, which was commenced in 1945 and which has, since then, seen electricity brought to nearly 250,000 homes and other premises in rural areas. The recent legislation introduced by the Minister for Transport and Power which provides for a State subsidy of £10 million over the next few years, has made it possible for the Board to embark on a firm programme designed to give all un-supplied rural houses one further opportunity of availing of subsidised supply.

The Rural Electrification Scheme was one of the most ambitious projects ever undertaken in this country. It involved the house-to-house canvassing of all potential users of electricity. To achieve this task, the entire country was divided into 792 Rural Areas of about 25 sq. miles each. Local voluntary committees were set up to assist in the canvassing and when the number of potential customers had been assessed a network was designed to serve each area.

A local headquarters was established, local labour was recruited to supplement skilled construction crew, and the job got under way. By 1963 all areas had been completed, 284,000 customers had been connected and a total of £34,028,602 had been spent on the project, of which £7,969,826 was by way of subsidy.

In 1962 the second stage of the operation, the Rural Post Development Programme, got under way. Many people who had not taken supply in the first development now wanted it, and, of course, there had been new buildings in all areas during the intervening years.

The only way in which the work could be carried out was on a planned and orderly basis, area by area. If this were not done, the overall job would take longer to complete and the costs would be enormous—possibly more than could have been made available to complete the task. Inevitably, this meant that some areas had to wait longer than others, but this was certainly the least of a number of evils which would result from a haphazard approach.

Up to March 1971 the Post Development Programme was planned on a yearly basis and the Government subsidy which could be made available depended on the economic climate prevailing. In 1968 more attractive terms for supply were introduced and this led to a substantial increase in the volume of applications. The combined effect of these circumstances was, regrettably, that the programme did not run to schedule in some cases and it became necessary to defer development of some areas for quite lengthy periods.

Under the new programme, areas which have not yet had a post development programme carried out, will now have a house-to-house canvass by E.S.B. representatives and the increased price of linen, in each case, firm terms for supply will be quoted. Because of the longer term planning now possible, it will be feasible to give realistic dates for development in each area which will be in aid of the so that prospective consumers Foreign Missions.

will be enabled to have their plans prepared for supply. Firm dates will be given for the receipt of applications, for supply and it is essential that such applications be received on or before the date specified for each area; applications received after the specified date cannot be quoted for supply on the present subsidised terms.

Consumers not yet connected but living in areas which have come under the post development programme, will also be given a further opportunity to avail of supply on the present subsidised terms. In the case of these areas, there will be extensive advertising in local newspapers and by way of notices in public places, advising of the date by which application should be made. Here again applications received after the specified date will not be eligible for supply on present subsidised terms.

The two activities—personal canvass in areas where there has been no post development work and advertising in areas where there has been such development—will go hand-in-hand. Some people will experience the benefits of this speeded-up programme very quickly; others will not reap the benefit for some years. It is an unfortunate fact of life that somebody has to be last.

It is very important that people without supply should watch out for the announcements in their local papers. These will be by way of large advertisements giving the name of the area, where possible, the parishes involved and the dates for application. It is essential that people desiring supply should send in a fresh application even if they have applied before.

E.S.B. District Staffs are now engaged in the final stages of planning the four year campaign. Some have already commenced the canvass and the advertising. Public co-operation will help to speed their efforts to bring the light to those who now want it.

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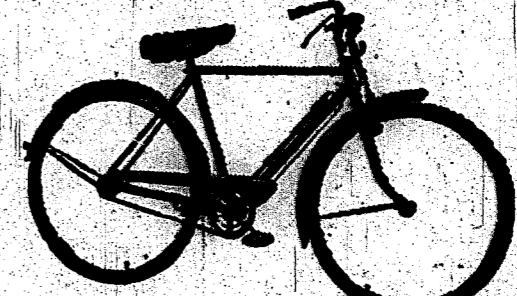
