Dept. Inspector Praises success of A.I. Scheme

At Monday's meeting of Co. Waterford Committee of Agriculture, Dr. A. Mescal, in an address on A.I. breeding of dairy cattle, said that it was important to find defects, if any, in this service, as soon as possible in the service, on account of Ireland's application for entry to the E.E.C.

He stressed the importance of cattle and what it means to the national economy. He said that cattle and beef made up 25% of our exports and that dairy exports were in the region of £40m. per annum. He stated that every effort should be made to ensure that this export potential is maximised.

He also said that Ireland was the only country in Europe to export cattle to America on account of our cattle being disease-free. This export market means £15 million.

Speaking on the importation of animals, Dr. Mescal said that every cow imported was a risk, but one which had to be taken, to raise the standard of cattle in Ireland. This risk was minimised by the placing in quarantine of the cattle in Spike Island, Cork Harbour.

The importation of semen was a far greater risk, he said, because in order to detect any disease it contained, the semen would have to undergo extensive tests which would take too long and the only practical way of testing the semen, would be to examine its results.

Dr. Mescal stressed the point that the bulls being used were selected from the best animals available in Ireland and Great Britain. He said that their representatives attending the Reading Sale, which is the biggest in these islands, and in order to get good bulls many are examined before a choice is made. The sire of the bull chosen would have to have a good record and the dam would have to be a cow with a good yield.

Dr. Mescal said that the increased importation of Flevie and other European breeds would enable Ireland to meet the demand of the European Market when Ireland gained entry to the E.E.C.

Dr. Mescal stated that low milk yields were an account of mismanagement. The two prime factors which influenced milk yields were time of calving and the level of feeding. Milk yields in Ireland have risen in the past decade said Dr. Mescal, and let no one say otherwise. Between 1960 and '70 the amount of increased by 115 million gals. milk supplied to Co-ops has

When asked by Mr. Cusack what the best method of improving a herd would be, Dr. Mescal said the best thing to do would be to take 50% of top grade cows and mate them with the top bulls in A.I. By doing this you would be raising the standard of your herd, whereas, if you mated the top grade cows with low class bulls, and the low class cows with top grade bulls, no real improvement would be made.

Next week we will be giving a forecast of the likely outcome of the elections, as well as taking a closer look at the motions.

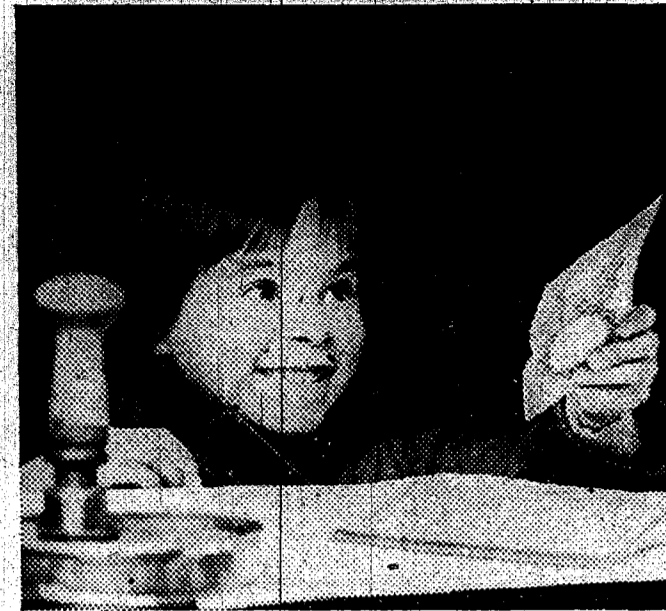

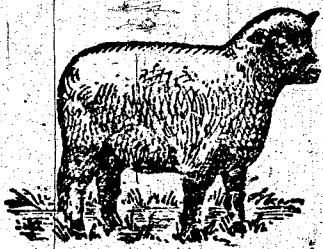

LETTER TO THE EDITOR

Dear Sir,
I wish to refer to an article which appeared in one of last Sunday's national newspapers re the proposed airstrip adjacent to Waterford city.

This article seeks to infer that if the South East Regional Development Organisation does not avail of the option on the site at Greenville, Kilmacow an airstrip would be lost to the area. Surely the technical sub-committee of S.E.R.D.O. have surveyed other alternative—and perhaps more suitable—sites in the area. Furthermore, I cannot visualize anyone purchasing a site on the off-chance that it would be selected for an airstrip—and with only this end in view.

The area at Coolfin near Portlaw which was mentioned at a recent meeting of Waterford Co. Council, has been described as the only suitable site in the region or this project by highly qualified advice in the aviation field.

It is ideally suited for development as an airport due to its proximity to Waterford city and Tramore, as well as the major industrial towns of Ocmel, Dungarvan, Carrick-on-Shannon and Portlaw.

It is situated on the banks of the river Suir, is free from highway development and possesses ideal approaches for craft landing. This must, surely, be an area worthy of consideration by the investigating sub-committee.

I trust that the South East Regional Development Organisation will deliberate wisely on this vital issue and that all factors will be weighed carefully before a decision is reached.

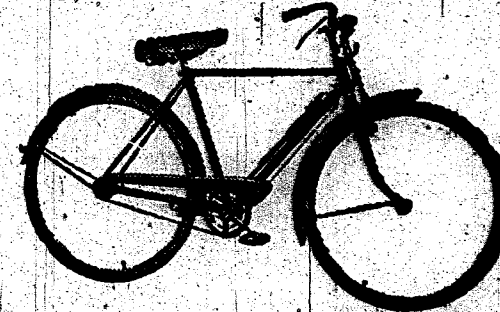
