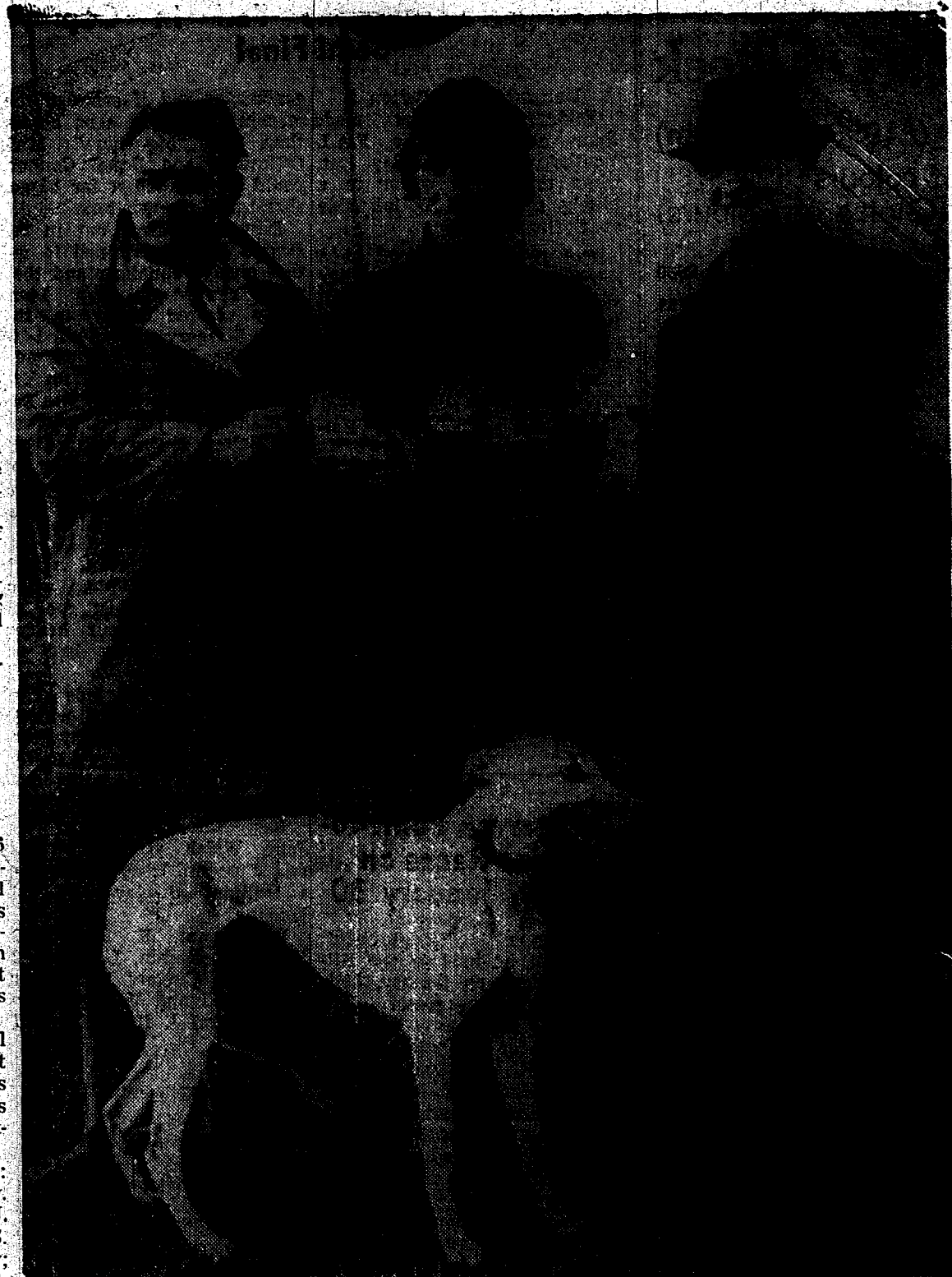

SECRETARY'S REPORT
 Once again the Western Board Secretary has submitted a very detailed and comprehensive report to next Sunday's Western Board Convention and a few points from his report are worth noting:

AFILIATIONS—In 1971 a total of 71 clubs affiliated a total of 131 teams, as well as championship entries there were 28 team entries for the League and in all over 140 matches were played in all competitions.

The success of this dinner dance cum drinking session type of function measured by the attendance and almost invariably gives a false image of the club's status in the community. This type of status is merely on loan and like everything else on loan it becomes a liability.

Interment—Two motions on an opportunity of voicing the agenda will afford clubs their feelings and abhorrence at the awful plight of our fellow countrymen in the North who have been interned without trial. I would be failing in my duty if I did not refer here to the splendid work undertaken by the clubs in helping in the National collection for the relief of distress to the families of these Irishmen. Here the Association become the agency through which the people of our county and country could give meaningful expression to their feelings in this matter.

Referees
 During the year a total of twenty-two referees performed the onerous task of managing our games in the Division and while the reports from the majority of these were of a satisfactory nature, several told the old story of lack of co-operation and a refusal to accept discipline on the field. In a few cases, referees became a frustrating experience when players and officials were not prepared to accept the authority of the referee and of his subordinate officials. In apportioning the blame for such a situation we are all at fault. The ignorant offender who cares little about embarrassing and losing respect for his club is probably least of all to blame.
