In a report to Dungarvan Urban Council meeting on Monday night last, Mr. J. P. Robinson (Town Clerk) stated that a house purchase scheme under the 1966 Housing Act, has now been prepared in respect of all Council houses, in the town, with the exception of St. Martin's Terrace.

Tenants who have been in occupation of the houses for more than five years qualify for a discount of 2% from the purchase price for each year after that. The maximum discount is any case is 30%, where the tenant has been in occupation for 20 years or more.

Boreenatra, St. Patrick's Crescent, Cloneey Villa, Fenian Place and McCarthyville will not qualify for discount as they are all relatively new housing schemes.

A lively discussion followed the introduction of the scheme and Mr. Thomas Wade said he wanted it placed on record that he objected in the strongest possible manner against this revised House Purchase Scheme.

Mr. Wade wanted to make

a proposal, but was refused by the Chairman, Mr. T. A. Kyne who explained that this was a statutory order and they could not change it.

The new scheme also shows a marked increase in some weekly rents.

Folklore being sadly Neglected

At a meeting of Waterford County Vocational Education Committee, held on Monday last, Mr. Austin Deasy said that it was a very sad fact that the distribution of knowledge concerning folklore was being sadly neglected in the county.

He said that some attempt should be made to retain the folklore in the county, and possibly have it published in the local papers every week, or have it taught in the schools, as it is part of our history.

Mr. W. Kenneally, T.D., said the "Munster Express" had published some.

Mr. Deasy said it had only dealt with the Eastern part of the county.

Mr. Micheal O'Donnell said it was very unfortunate that this part of our heritage had been sadly neglected and forgotten in the tempo of modern life.

Mr. T. Buckley proposed that the Folklore department should gather all the local history in the different counties and issue the publications in booklet form to the respective areas.

This proposal was seconded by Mr. Deasy.

Road Works Estimate Passed

At a meeting of Dungarvan Urban Council, on Monday night last, the Co. Engineer, Mr. J. D. Hally, submitted his estimate for road works for the year 1972/73, which come to a total of £3,450 (2,750 for Maintenance and £700 for Footpaths). This is an increase of £550 on the 1971/72 figure.

The increase of £550 on costs is mainly due to wage increases granted to road workers during the year.

The Council also decided to accept the Co. Engineer's recommendations to carry out the following road works with the Urban Road Grant:—

(1) Surface dress road from Youghal Road to Spring (£300); (2) Surface dress Strandside North from Mulcahy's Grocery to Knockateemore (£600); (3) Improve visibility at Abbeyside Church (£300); (4) Improve visibility at Parknagappul (£252).

Mr. Noel Hackett objected to (1) above, but was defeated 4-2.

Will try to arrange transport for students

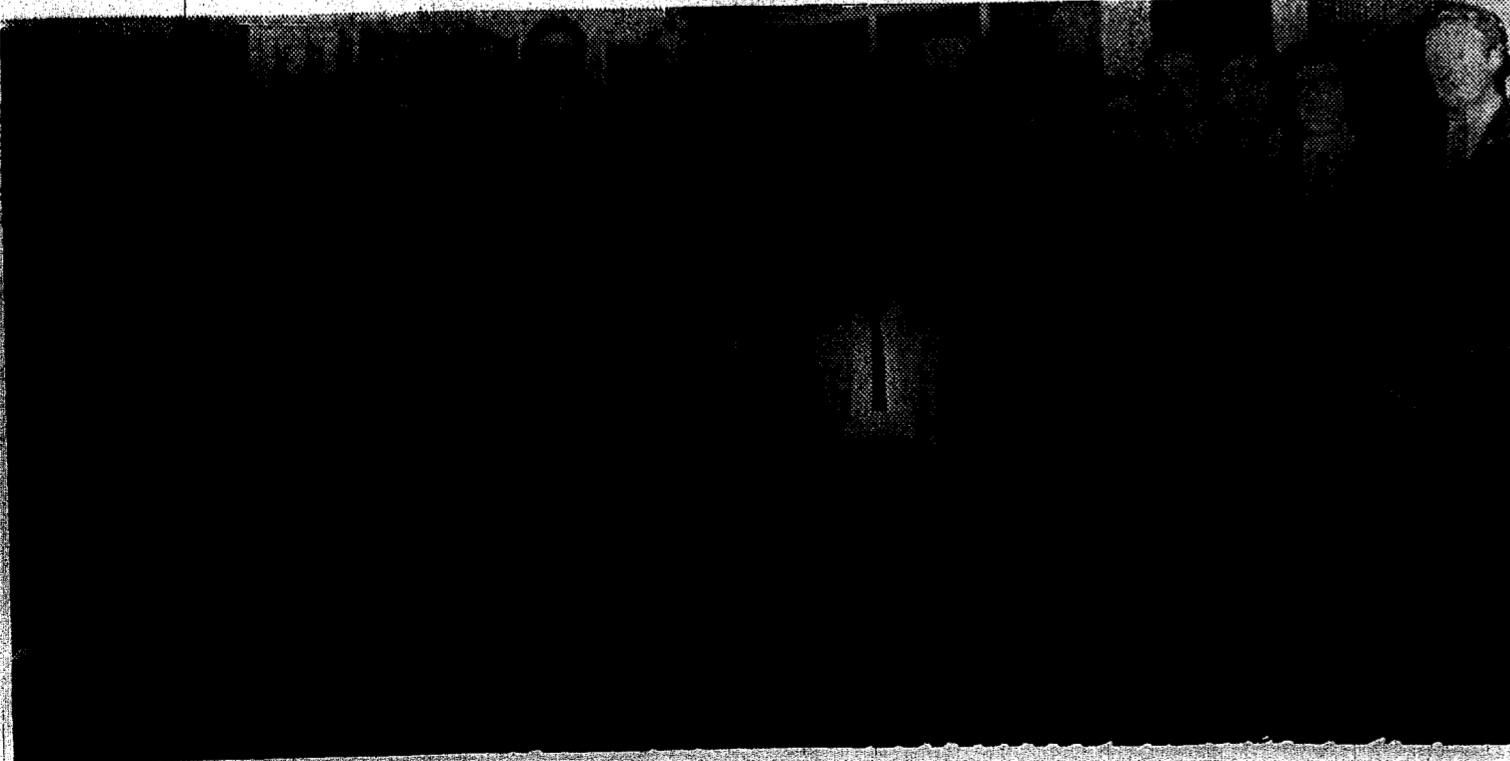
At Monday's meeting of Co. and Knockanore.

It is the ambition of these youngsters to be entered in the Waterford league and to get the feel of competitive football.

It would be in the interests of the Soccer Club to enter these youngsters in the league as this would ensure a continuous pool of under age players for the future.

The number of these youngsters in training at the moment is thirty. After next year the bulk of the present Dungarvan Youths side will not be eligible for under age competitions, therefore it is logical to assume that if the present u-14s are not recruited by the club their supply of young talent must dry up. Of course it is a well known fact that youngsters are the foundation of any club, no matter what sport they play.

It would be a step in the right direction if these youngsters were entered in the Waterford league.

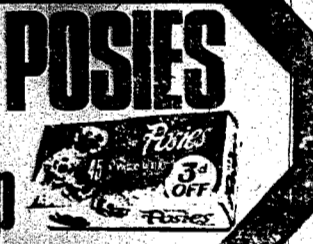

FATAL MOTOR ACCIDENT

About 11 p.m. on Sunday last, a local housewife, Mrs. Mrs. Hennessy (50) of Sarsfield's Tee, Youghal, was knocked down by a car while crossing the road at Kennelworth near Redbarn. She received spiritual and medical attention and was removed to the Cottage Hospital, Youghal but was dead on admission.

The remains were removed to the Parish Church where Requiem Mass was celebrated on Wednesday morning at 10 o'clock and the funeral took place that afternoon to North Abbey Cemetery, followed by a large cortege.

She is survived by her husband, son and daughters, to whom deep sympathy is extended. The deceased was a well known figure in the town being second daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. C. Roche. Her tragic death cast a gloom over the town.

YOUGHAL FAIRTE OFFICES

Youghal Fairte Ltd., a local tourist organisation, recently set up to try and attract a greater volume of the tourist trade to the town, is to ask Iverna for permission to use the Clock Tower as office premises.

Iverna has already got its offices there and if Youghal Fairte could use the premises in conjunction, it would be very suitable for all concerned.

AMENITIES SCHEMES

The Urban Council is to submit three proposed amenity schemes costing £11,620 to the Department of Local Government for the coming year. The following have been recommended by the Council's Engineer: (1) carry out the town wall works at Dunne's Park with provision of flowerers and seating at the river-side; (2) continuing the promenade at the front strand (estimated to cost £5,250) and (3) providing facilities and improvements at the diving beach area of the lighthouse (estimated to cost £620).

HOUSING SANCTION

The Urban Council has been notified that Department sanction has been given for the lay out of 109 private housing sites at Knockaverry on the southern end of the town. It is hoped to start clearing the 18 acre site next week and to seek tenders for development within a month.

GALES

For the past week a south easterly gale has swept over Youghal and certainly would have done damage to the promenade but for the huge limestone boulders, hundreds of tons of which have been piled on the beach to offset the pounding of mountainous seas which protect the new works on the foreshore, now being carried out by the Coast Erosion Scheme.

Council Discuss Community Centre

At Monday night's meeting of Dungarvan Urban Council, Mr. Austin Deasy proposed that the Council should take the initiative in establishing a Community Centre in Dungarvan.

In an address to the meeting, Mr. Deasy said that there was a lack of recreation facilities for young people in Dungarvan. You could go up to the Square any night, he said, and you would find dozens of youngsters hanging around with nothing to do. There should be some form of healthy recreation provided these youngsters he said.

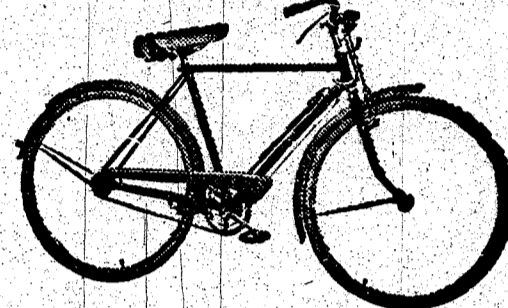

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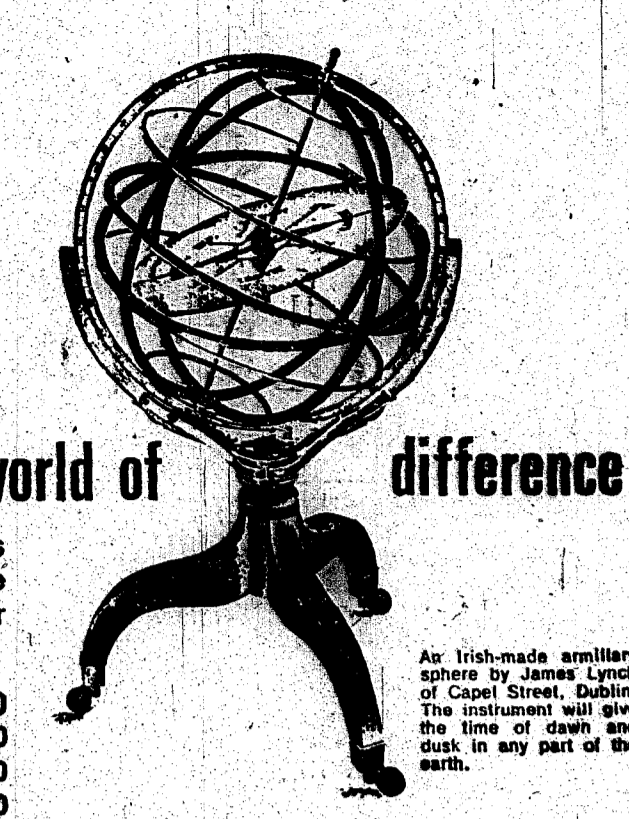

CHAIRMAN'S ADDRESS

In his address to the Convention, Chairman Kieran O'Ryan stated that Convention was an occasion to review the work of the past year and to make plans for the coming season. He said that the co-operation of all the clubs in the division was necessary to make the administration of the Board more efficient.

In a reference to medical

coverings at the venues under the Board's control, he stated that the lack of a consulting unit at Dungarvan Hospital was a major draw back, but he had been assured by the medical profession that there would always be a doctor on duty in Dungarvan on a Sunday.

Commenting on the G.A.A., he hoped that it would not mean that they would just be creating more highly paid jobs in Dublin and his opinion the money would be better spent among the clubs at large.

Speaking on the Six County position he said that it was the responsibility of every Irishman to speak out against the armed occupation of our country by the might of the British Empire which was resulting in brutality of an unsurpassed nature in the Six Counties where 700 Irishmen were interned without trial at present, while here in the South we had the spectacle of certain ballads being banned by R.T.E. and of our National Anthem not being played in certain Dublin theatres. Ours was a 32 county organisation and it was important that we assure the men interned without trial in the six counties and their families, that they had our support in their hour of need.

The motions passed, Shamrocks steered through their motion which will provide special competitions for teams defeated in the first round of the intermediate and junior championships.

The Abbeyside/Courty motion which asked the convention to protest in the strongest possible manner against the use of internment without trial in Ireland was passed unanimously, while Dungarvan's motion which was in a similar vein was also passed in an amended form.

Abbeyside's other motion requesting financial assistance for the Western Section of Board na Oge also found favour, as did Dungarvan's motion requesting a share of the gate receipts for the junior finalists and a review of the basis of remuneration for the Secretary. Lismore's motions dealing with umpires for championship games and their other motion which requests seven days notice to a venue, was passed in amended form.

CONVENTION SIDELIGHTS

Convention started at 2.40 p.m. approximately and concluded at 6.30 p.m. Cappoquin Chairman Paddy McCarthy welcomed the delegates, while the Co. Board chairman, N. McGrath, in a short address, urged every club to make an extra effort this year to strengthen their position and that of the Association.

Board na Oge chairman M. Culloo (Ballinameela) requested all the clubs in the Division to support the Board's efforts to further improve the organisation at juvenile level as it was most important that they did not turn their backs on our national games.

The Balance Sheet and Statement of Accounts showed that the Board made a profit of £754 on the year's Convention of 1972.

Ten sets of championship medals were presented. Tallow headed the list receiving four sets, while Abbeyside/Ballinacourty received two sets, and Tourin, Nire, Ballyduff and Cappoquin received one set each.

Next year's convention will be held at Dungarvan. The superb performance of Draws and Fixtures meeting John Treacy of St. Nicholas A.C., who finished 12th in such exalted company considering that nothing was in his favour. The course was definitely the toughest he ever encountered, with plenty of hills and stone fences, not forgetting a strong wind. Still, he did not wilt under such pressure and in no small way played his part in a great team effort.

The surprise of the day was the fact that Tony Ryan never hit his true form and had to struggle to finish in 14th place. Still, such an off day comes to the best of athletes at some time or another, but Tony will be back!

Next came Paddy Kelly of St. Nicholas A.C., in 17th position, ahead of no less an athlete than Tony O'Leary of Cork, and the thing to remember here is that Paddy is only running for a few months and already he has collected three Munster medals.

The vital scoring man for both Waterford and St. Nicholas A.C. was Seamus Drummy and what a delight to see him showing a return to something like his old form.

These then were the boys who brought glory to their county and clubs and showed that in time they will have few equals in Munster athletics. Spare a thought also for the other boys who ran for their county, Tom Aspel of De La Salle, Nicholas Sheehan of Dungarvan and Jimmy Walsh of St. Nicholas A.C., as they all made up a dedicated bunch with a great team spirit.

The girls of St. Nicholas A.C. did not have any luck in the girls U-18 race, but they are young and the experience will be of benefit to them on.

SENIOR MEN AND LADIES CO. CHAMPIONSHIPS AT RING

What should be one of the most exciting races of the cross country season takes place at Gortnadiha, Ring, on Sunday next, when the senior men's county championship takes place. On current form Tony Ryan of Dungarvan will start favourite to prove too good for the rest of the field.
