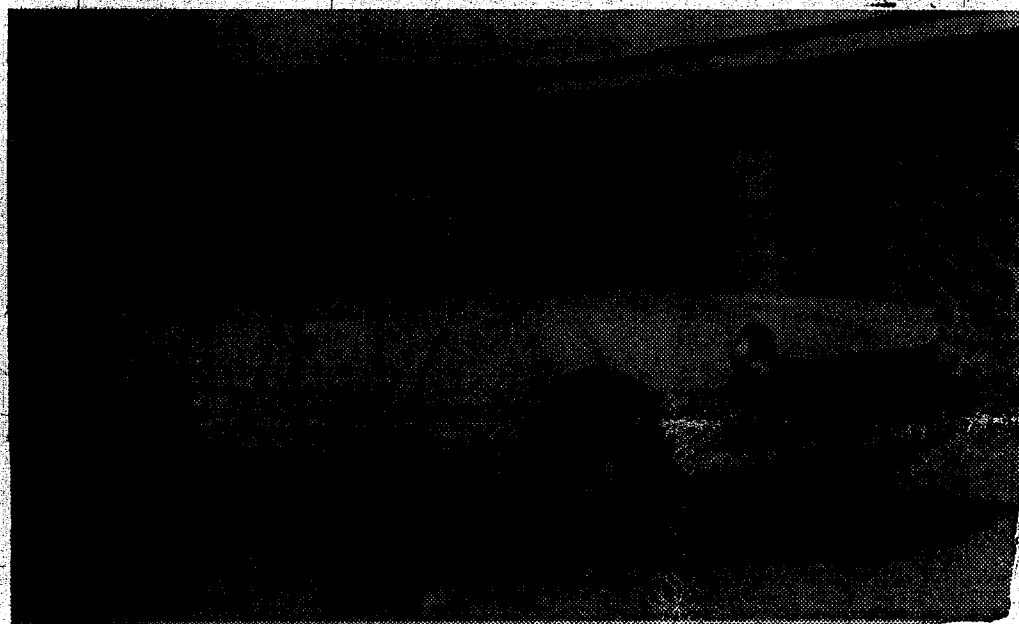

DUNGARVAN PAYS TRIBUTE TO DERRY DEAD

There was a general cessation of business in Dungarvan on Wednesday last from 11 a.m. to 2 p.m. Approximately 2,000 people took part in a parade to express sorrow and sympathy with the people of Northern Ireland in connection with last Sunday's mass murder of Derry citizens at the hands of British Paratroopers.

The parade was headed by the Dungarvan Brass Band, behind which marched members of the Urban Council and practically all workers in the town, many of whom carried black flags with white crosses. The parade marched down Main St., up Church St., to the Parish Church, where Requiem Mass was celebrated by Rev. Canon Guiry, P.P. The church was filled to capacity and many of the marchers stood in the church grounds and listened to the Mass in pouring rain. A meeting held in the Square afterwards was addressed by Mr. T. A. Kyme, Chairman of Dungarvan U.D. Council and three representatives of the trade union, Messrs. J. Byrne, T. Mansfield and P. Walsh.

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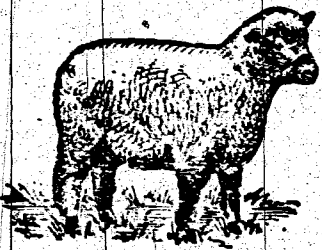

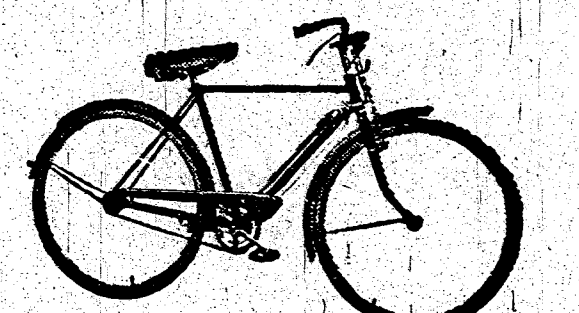

Urban Council Condemn Derry Killings

At a special meeting of Dungarvan Urban Council on Monday night, the members expressed their horror at the thirteen deaths in Derry by Army "murder gangs".

Mr. T. A. Kynne (chairman) said he had been asked to hold a special meeting by some people in town to condemn in the strongest possible manner the callous murder of 13 Derry people at the hands of British soldiers.

Mass was held on Wednesday at 12.15 at the request of the Council, and a general closure of all premises in town occurred between 12 noon and 2 p.m.

At the meeting on Monday night, Mr. Declan Goode said that all the talk in the world would do no good, but at least a Mass would be of some benefit.

Mr. Patrick Whelan suggested that the trade unions call a one day of mourning of all workers in town.

Mr. Kynne said that one day out of work would be a loss to the workers and to the nation, but Mr. Whelan said that it was unfortunate that there were others who were counting the cost in lives.

Mr. Austin Deasy said that there was a certain ray of hope in as much as that the Civil Rights Association have shown their courage and determination and the Unionist Government and British Army have sent out "murder gangs" to gun down the people. He also stated that the people of Derry were very fortunate in having the two best public representatives in the country, namely John Hume and Austin Curry.

The Council unanimously decided to send a telegram to the Taoiseach abhorring this brutal murder, and urging him to take steps to ensure that such a brutal event does not occur again.

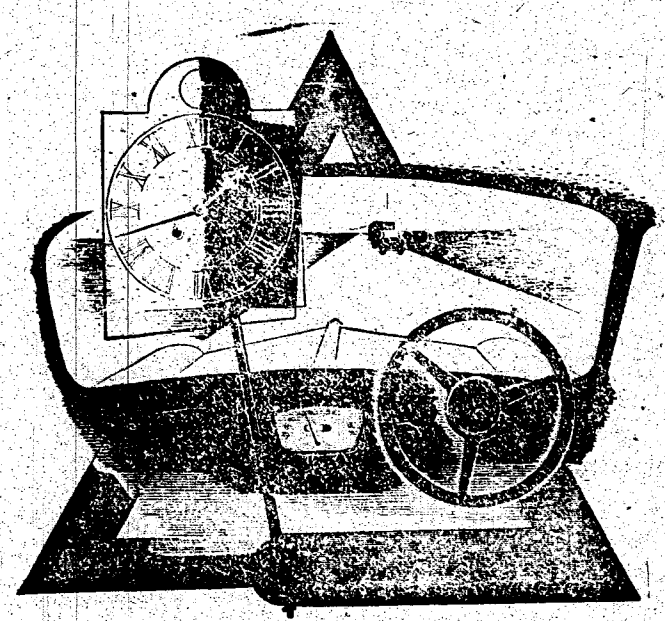

Commission's Report Main Interest At Convention

CHAIRMAN'S ADDRESS
In his address to Convention, Chairman Nicolas Mac Craith said that the Association had always been a medium for all national minded people and it was with a sense of pride that they had witnessed the measure of support which was afforded by the clubs of the county in the recent national collection for the relief of distress in the Six Counties. To date a sum of approximately £1,774 had been collected.

DEVELOPMENT FUND.
He stated that a small committee had been set up to examine the possibility of setting up a Development Fund as major capital expenditure would be needed in the near future as a major venue must be kept available to clubs.

COUNTY TEAMS.
He said that clubs should set their sights higher. Loyalty to the County was most important. Our players must condition their minds to succeed if the county was to succeed.

DISAPPOINTMENTS
Touching on a few points which had disappointed him during 1971, he said anonymous letter writers had criticised him. The name of one of these writers had come to his notice by accident recently. He was a person he said that we would have expected more from. He also mentioned the dispute with the Western Referees' Association and the fact that one club had attempted to use a difference of opinion with the Board as an excuse for not holding a collection for the Six County Relief Fund. He was glad to note that the club in question had now decided to hold the collection.

ACHIEVEMENTS
In 1971 the Board had set up Ceiste na nOg to deal with juvenile affairs. A schedule for all the fourteen championships had been drawn up and while this had not been a complete success it had improved the situation. Scor 72 had been an unqualified success. A panel of referees had been drawn up and an special awards had been presented to the top referees in both divisions. A county Youth Convention had been held while a year book for 1971 would be published shortly.

PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS
In addressing last Sunday's Convention, President Pat Fanning said he was happy and privileged to be present at his own County's Convention and he congratulated the Board on a most successful year in 1971 and especially on the manner that the reports were presented. It was a most efficient presentation, he stated. He also commented on the wonderful success of an Scor 72 competition within the county.

NEW ERA
He went on to say that the past twelve months had been the great legislative year in the history of the G.A.A. The G.A.A. had stated at the cross roads for a considerable time past and after a memorable Congress last year in Belfast they were now entering a new era. They were presented with an entirely changed situation internally and the manner in which the Association as a whole had coped with the situation demonstrated forcibly that the G.A.A. had geared itself for the needs of the seventies.

ADVANCE
Referring to the need for a new era and a total commitment to the G.A.A., he stated that there cannot be a share of loyalties. They had decided a new chapter had begun but before removing the prohibitions which had become so irksome to so many they had found that they would not discard the ideals for which the G.A.A. was founded. He felt that the Association could move forward with confidence towards its century.

U-21 CHAMPIONSHIPS
At a special meeting of the County Board which was held following last Sunday's Co. Convention it was agreed that the U-21 championships would not commence until April when Congress will have given its verdict on the question of minor clubs sponsoring U-21 team.

SPECIAL CONVENTION TO BE HELD.

The big news arising from the Convention was the decision to hold a special delegate convention to decide upon the special commission on the G.A.A., which will be on the agenda for Congress which will be held in Cork this year and this special delegate convention which will be representative of all the clubs in the county, will make the final decision as to what way Waterford's delegates to Congress will vote on these all important motions.

MOTIONS
At last Sunday's convention 31 motions on the agenda which dealt with the Commission's report, were the last item to be discussed. The main speakers were Seamus Power (Mt. Sion) Pat Coffey (Portlaoigh) Tony Mansfield (Abbeyside/Ballinacourty) and Tom Cunningham (Dungarvan) and they all advised the convention to adopt a cautious approach to the 31 motions on the agenda and all spoke in favour of holding a special convention at which the county's position in respect of these motions and others at Congress dealing with the Commission's Report, would be decided. The Convention agreed to this line of action.

WISE DECISION
The President of the Association Pat Fanning felt that convention had made a decision and he urged all present to study the Commission's Report carefully. He said that some points might not find favour, but if they have effect to the broad principles of the report, they would be creating a new and more vigorous association.

OTHER MOTIONS
In all there were 24 other motions on the agenda and of these nine were passed, eight ruled out of order, five were defeated and two were withdrawn.

U-21 Championships. — The Lismore and An Gaeltacht motions which requested that minor clubs be permitted to sponsor U-21 teams, which were taken together, met with little opposition, although Portlaoigh spoke strongly against it and the U-21 championships will now follow the pattern of the minor championships over the last two years. It is a wise compromise.

Playing Rules. — Ballyduff Lower's motion which requested that playing rules could come up for discussion at Congress every three years, instead of every five years, as at present, was passed.

Umpires and Discipline. — Erin's Own steered through a motion which asked that for all senior games the umpires, as well as the referee, be nominated by the Fixtures Committee, and the same club were also successful with their motion which asked that a Disciplinary Committee be set up.

Secretary's Remuneration. — Johnny Murphy moved Dungarvan's motion which requests that the incoming Board review the remuneration basis presently applicable to the Co. Secretary. Tom Cunningham pointed out that this motion only committed the Board to a review.

Limber Up. — Mt. Sion were successful in asking that the Co. Board ensure the right of all teams to "limber up" prior to the commencement of all games. Denis Whelan spoke in favour of this motion and said that the big difficulty arose when teams were limbering up after the appointed starting time of a game.

Prescribed Notice. — Brian Power met with unanimous approval with their motion which asked that prescribed notice for all championship games be clearly defined and to become a county by-law.

ADVISORY COMMITTEE
Advisory Committee.—Pat Power's motion which asked that an Advisory Committee be drawn from junior clubs, be set up in both divisions, to make recommendations in relation to players playing with intermediate and junior teams, to the senior hurling and football collectors provoked some lively discussion and it was carried by a narrow majority, after two counts.

ELECTIONS
The only contests of the day were for the post of Registrar and the representatives to Munster Council, and the Central Council representative. However, the only change was the election of John Fraher (Cappoquin) as Registrar, when defeating the man in possession Michael Dowling (Erin's Own).

The elections resulted as follows:—
Registrar: J. Fraher (125); M. Dowling (111).
Central Council Representative: D. Whelan (160); B. Jones (79).

Munster Council Representatives: T. Cunningham (129); Seamus Power (90); Sean Power (John Mitchells) 19.
The results are a vindication of the popularity of our representatives on the Munster and Central Council's and of the efficient manner in which they carry out their duties, while John Fraher's election to the post of Registrar is a just reward for his long serving and popular official.

Last Sunday's Convention commenced at 1.35 p.m. with only 20 delegates present, as no doubt the snow had delayed many delegates. By 1.40 the balance sheet and statement of accounts had been adopted and John Murphy paid tribute to the Treasurer, Paddy Kenneally (Treasurer) told those present that it had been a team effort. Later in the day he told Convention that 1972 would be the last occasion he would be seeking re-election as Treasurer.

The delegates were now streaming into the hall and by 1.52 p.m. the Secretary's Report had been adopted. The President of the Co. Board Declan Goode then addressed Convention and congratulated the Board on a successful year. He was followed by the President of the Association and then the Co. Board Chairman.

CUP PRESENTED
Cappoquin Chairman Paddy McCarthy presented the Ned Lonergan perpetual cup to the Board. This will be used as a trophy for the U-14 hurling championship. He said the cup would be a fitting memory to a great Gael who always took a great interest in the youth of his adopted county.

The Chairman told Convention that the Board would shortly be presented with another perpetual trophy by the Barry family, Ballybar, in memory of Tim Barry. The first holders of this cup will be Teurin.

NORTHERN AID
Convention was told that the total collected within the county to date in aid of the families of men interned without trial in the North, was £1,744. It was expected that the final figure would top the £2,000 mark.

ADJOURNED MEETING.
The Abbeyside/Ballinacourty club adjourned their weekly club meeting as an expression of sympathy with the families of those murdered in Derry last Sunday.
