Bogus Call had Gardai on Wild Goose Chase

42 YEARS OF FAITHFUL SERVICE

A bogus telephone call, received on November 6 last, which claimed that an arms shipment, destined for the North, was being landed on the East Coast, resulted in a full scale garda alert. Justice B. J. Carroll, was told at Dungarvan District Court on Wednesday last.

Charged with the offence was James O'Reilly, Glencast, Stradbally.

SYMPATHY

Sgt. J. Cahill, Kilmacthomas, said he was on duty in the Garda Station on the night in question when he received an anonymous telephone call. The caller said that an arms shipment was being landed along the East coast and they were intended for the North. Sgt. Cahill then alerted Gardai in Waterford and Tramore. Shortly afterwards the caller rang again, but was found making the call from a kiosk at Mitchell Street, Dungarvan, by Sgt. T. Cahill, who said the man had a lot of drink taken.

The defendant did not make an appearance and was not legally represented.

Land league Meeting

Supt. M. English said that as a result of the call certain garda action was taken which must have cost the State around £25. All calls of this nature had to be fully checked out, he said.

The Justice said they couldn't have the Gardai sent on fool missions such as this one, when they could be needed urgently somewhere else.

He imposed a fine of £10 on the defendant, with £2.50 expenses and sentenced him to 14 days imprisonment, the warrant not to be issued if defendant paid £25 to the Department of Justice by way of compensation.

Training Centre for Mentally Handicapped Girls

It will no longer be news for most of the local people, the Bon Sauveur Sisters at Carriglea have opened a Residential Training Centre for Mentally Handicapped Adult Girls, for this Centre, though not yet officially opened, has been functioning for some time.

It is the only institution of its kind in the South Eastern Region and caters for girls of 16 and upwards. While continuing the education already received in special Day-Centres, these girls are trained in Arts and Crafts, Domestic and Industrial tasks. Future plans include the erection of sheltered Workshops.

At this stage it is proposed to form an association of "Parents and Friends of the Mentally Handicapped" and a meeting for this purpose will be arranged in the near future. Meantime, anyone interested in this very deserving work is invited to contact the Sister-in-Charge of the Mentally Handicapped, at Carriglea Convent.

DEFENDANT QUESTIONS VALIDITY OF GARDA RADAR

Before Justice B. J. Carroll, at Dungarvan Court on Wednesday last, was Mr. Liam O'Keefe, a work study officer from Ring, who was charged with driving at 40 m.p.h., in a 30-mile zone. The defendant pleaded not guilty to the charge.

Garda M. Coughlan, in evidence, said that on December 22 last, he was on duty at the Youghal Road and that the speed radar revealed that the defendant was travelling at 40 m.p.h.

Defendant, in evidence, said he would like to question the validity of the Garda Radar. It would have taken the Garda six seconds, he said, to walk out onto the roadway, to flag him down, and had he been travelling at 40 m.p.h. he would have covered the distance between the speed sign and the Garda Car in 4.4 seconds. He had drawn sketches of the area and he also had figures in his possession to substantiate his evidence.

Justice Carroll asked the defendant how long it had taken him to conclude this evidence. Defendant said about half an hour, and the Justice replied that half an hour of any man's time would be more than the ordinary penalty for this offence, so, because of it I will apply the Probation Act, he said.

Waterford Drama Festival

On Sunday, February 6, after the official opening of the first Waterford Open Drama Festival by His Lordship Most Rev. Dr. Russell, the Carrick-on-Suir players performed "The Price," a 3-act drama by Authur Miller, at the C.B.S. Hall, Dungarvan.

The festival, so far, has been of an exceptionally high standard, with the two best performances to date being "The Bugle in the Blood" by the Blackwater Muintir na Tire Group, and the Glenbow Theatre Circle's production of "Many Young Men of Twenty."

This opinion is only given by an ordinary member of the audience, and so has no official bearing, but to my mind these two plays were the most enjoyable of the performances seen so far.

I am sure that even though Aileen Coughlan's criticisms may seem harsh, they are appreciated very much by the players. After all, constructive criticism can only do good.

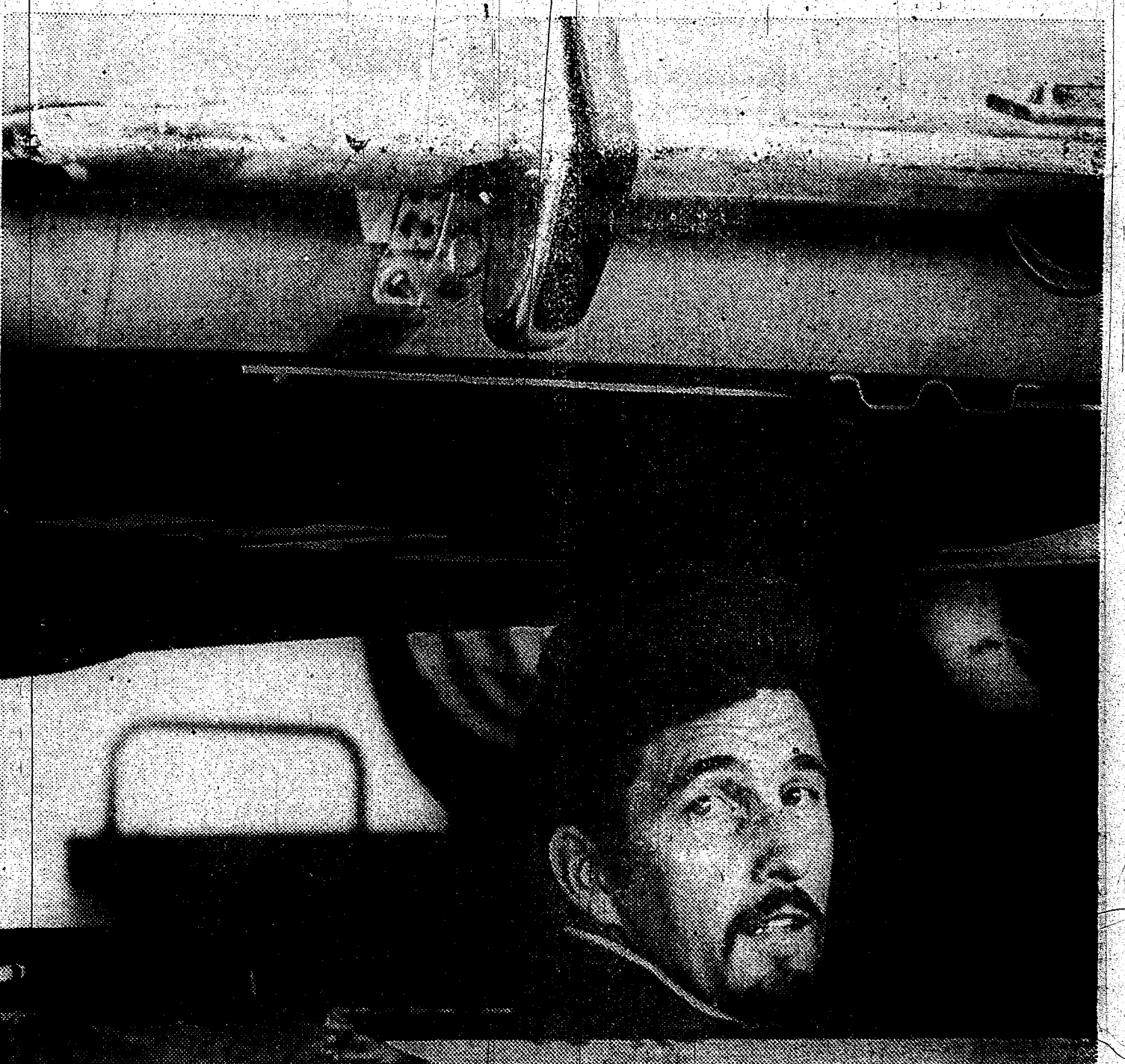

"BLOODY SUNDAY" IN DOIRE CHOILMILLLE

The Comhairle Phortlairge Committee of Conradh na Gaeilge at its specially convened meeting of 3u Feabhra at Ostan Devonshire, Dungarvan, added its voice to the nation-wide condemnation of the heinous mass murder perpetrated on 13 unarmed Irish citizens in Doire Cholmille on Domhnach 30u Eanáir. This horrendous crime, coming as it does on top of the devilish and maniacal tortures carried out by Crown forces on our manacled, helpless and already weakened fellow countrymen and women in our most historic province, must surely herald a turning point in the thinking of all Irish people. Let us resolve, among other things, to give an equal place with the tongue of the "Paras" in our daily lives to our own proud and beautiful language. During its two thousand years history it has seen many tyrannies come and go, but it is still with us, virile and hearty, buichas na Dia.

Criticises R.T.E.

"The Irish language is the most treasured part of our heritage and if we allow it to be lost, then we are lost as a nation." Thus stated Brendan Feiritor, newly elected cathaoirleach of Comhaltas Ceoltoiri Eireann's Munster Council, at Rathluirc on Sunday last. "We in Comhaltas should strive to restore the Irish language to its former greatness. I do not wish to use the word revival because this implies that the language is dead and this most certainly is not the case. In promoting Irish music and traditions we should try to use as much Irish as possible, because they go hand in hand and are inseparable, phrases such as "Dia dhuit," "gabh mo phardun," etc., would not place an undue burden on anybody.

This year's convention of Comhairle na Mumhan was well attended, with representatives of each branch from all of the six Munster counties. Many delegates criticised R.T.E. on the production, content and personnel of the weekly programme of traditional music and song: "Ag Deanaimh Ceoil," which they claimed was biased in projecting a certain style of playing traditional music.

During the past year sixty-seven branches were affiliated in the Province, with a total membership of 3,039. This was an increase of three in the number of branches and an increase of 679 in the total membership. 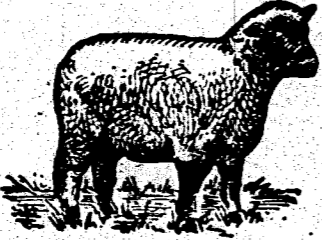

Co. Council Condemn Derry Killings

At a specially convened meeting of Waterford County Council on Monday last, the Chairman, Mr. Norman Walsh said that they were there to pass two resolutions, one of sympathy and the other of protest, in connection with Derry's "Bloody Sunday". Mr. Kieran O'Ryan said that even though it may be a bit late holding the meeting now, they could speak not from emotion but with reason. Mr. O'Ryan called on the Government to break off diplomatic relations with England; to release all political prisoners in the South and to recall the remainder of the Irish Army serving as a peace-keeping unit with the U.N. in Cyprus. Mr. O'Ryan said that when he expressed the view in '69 that the Irish Army should have moved into the Bogside, he was termed a hot-head. If that action had been taken he said, would there be 13 dead citizens in Derry today?

North and would not vote out; that the Labour Party in Britain were our only hope of a united Ireland; and that the problem must be settled by Irishmen. Mr. Austin Deasy said that all the political parties should be congratulated on the stand they have taken, even if it was a bit late. When the Chairman refused permission to Mr. O'Ryan have propose a resolution, Mr. O'Ryan said that was undemocratic. Mr. Walsh said that the meeting was called to pass a resolution of sympathy and protest, and for no other reason. 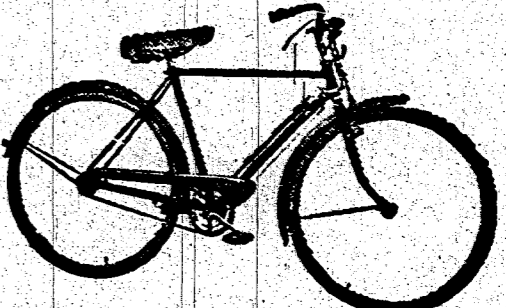

Aims Of "Cosac"

The following is a statement made by Mr. Michael O'Kennedy, Chairman, COSAC (Cosac when translated means "Council for Sport and Physical Recreation." Mr. O'Kennedy states: "When I established Cosac earlier this year, I predicted that this council would concern itself with the formulation of a national policy on the provision of recreation facilities. "Subsequently one of the primary objectives of Cosac has been to seek to ensure that the maximum benefit is being derived from existing facilities, and that future ones be planned with a view to maximum and efficient usage. "A special sub-committee of Cosac has been set up to compile a list of existing recreation facilities. This committee has already made considerable progress with its work and hope to complete its survey soon. "There after, it should be possible at any time to identify areas of any particular activity as well as particular requirements in any part of the country. "All this work involves co-operation and co-ordination between Government, local and national authorities. I also confidently expect the full support of farming organisations, trade unions, industry and private associations. "I realise that facilities, as they exist at present, have not been developed in a planned way. We must now take into account the needs of small groups throughout the country, who, for one reason or another, have not managed to overcome the problems connected with the provision of recreation facilities.
