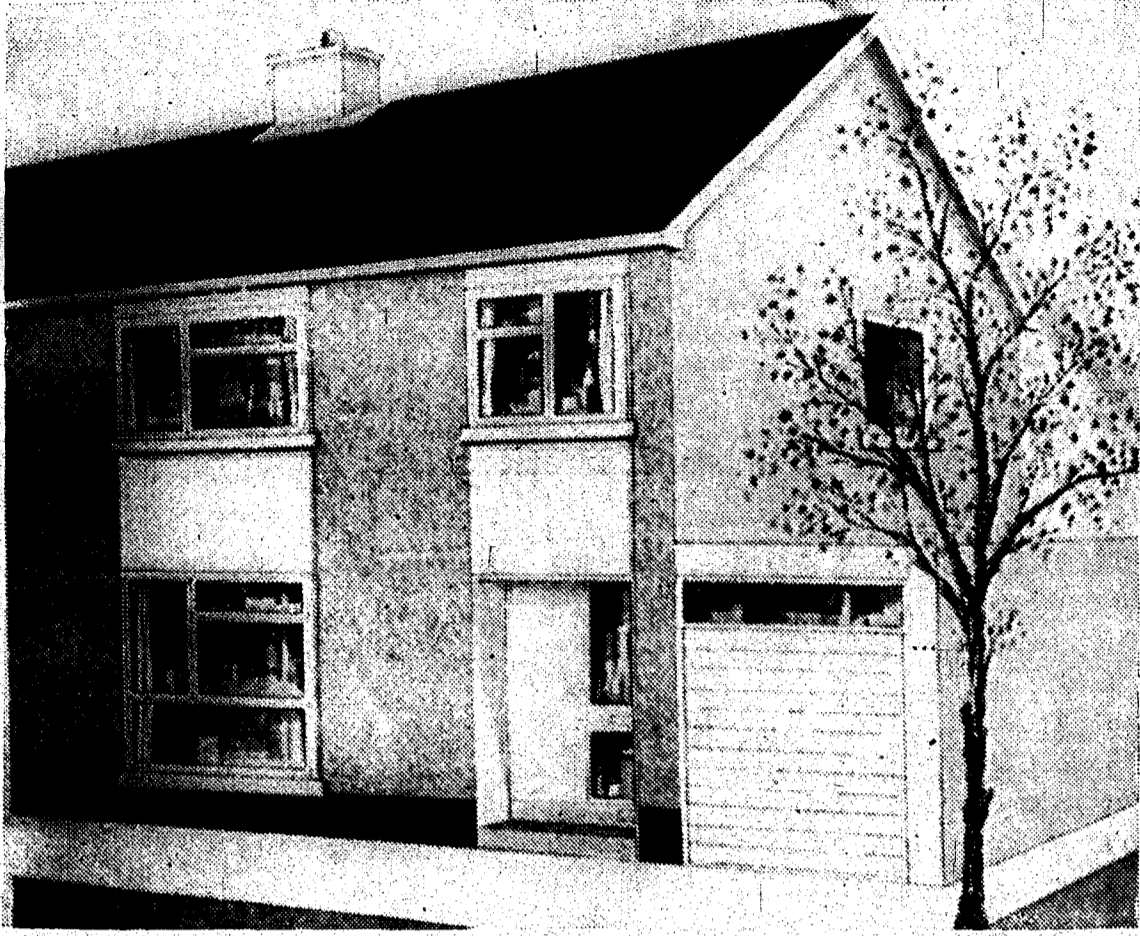

FOREST FIRES - Warning to Farmers

Spring is the period of greatest fire damage in a forest

It is illegal to burn vegetation growing within one mile of a wood or plantation without giving at least 7 days' notice to the owner and to the Sergeant-in-Charge of the nearest Garda Station.

Offenders are liable to prosecution and to payment of Compensation for any damage caused. Farmers who intend to carry out Moor and/or bog-land burnings this year within one mile of State plantations are therefore warned in their own interests to give advance notice to the Forester-in-Charge and to the Gardai.

Foresters will co-operate to the fullest possible extent to ensure that such burnings may be carried out without damage to plantations.

DUNGARVAN CREDIT UNION

The third annual general meeting of Dungarvan Credit Union Ltd. was held at the Courthouse, on Wednesday last. Mr. D. O'Sullivan, vice-chairman, who presided in the absence through illness of Mr. E. P. King, Chairman, welcomed the members and also representatives from Lismore Credit Union Ltd.

Mr. O'Sullivan read the report of the Directors, in which he stated that the Directors had met regularly during the year, and whilst most of the objectives were achieved, the acquisition of the premises still remained unsuccessful. Shareholdings increased by 30% to £59,540 and the membership stood at 793. Seminars were held for Credit and Supervisory Committees, at which the President of the Credit Union League of Ireland, Mr. D. Cogan, attended and praised the efforts of our Credit Union in the organisation.

Mr. J. Cody, reporting on behalf of the Credit Committee, said that 554 loans totalling £51,407 had been granted during the year.

Mr. P. Ryan submitted the Treasurer's and Auditor's Statement. Income for the year was £6,137 and expenses, £1,955, leaving a surplus of £4,182. A dividend of 5% was recommended, the remainder of the surplus to be distributed between the various reserves. The assets amounted to £67,543.

Mr. J. G. Dowling read the Supervisors' Report, stating that they had kept the accounts and other aspects of the Credit Union's working under constant review and were very satisfied with the results.

ELECTIONS

Seven vacancies occurred on the Board of Directors and as there were only seven nominations, the following were declared elected: Messrs. E. P. King, M. Curran, J. Cody, D. O'Sullivan, P. Hehir, P. Ryan and Mrs. R. McAllister.

The outgoing Supervisors, Messrs. J. G. Dowling, T. D. Boyd and J. J. Cullen were re-elected and the Auditor Mr. Leonard was re-appointed. The Treasurer, in a Statement explaining the appointment of a part-time Staff Officer during the year, said that the voluntary workers could not cope with the increasing volume of business

and that the general body of members needed a better service. Consequently, when a very suitable person became available, the Directors took the opportunity to make the appointment. The office is now open all day on Friday and also on Saturday morning and this is much appreciated by the members. However, there are peak periods when voluntary help is needed, but sadly lacking. It should not be left to a few people to carry the burden of an organisation of 800 members.

The Treasurer went on to say that the apathy of the members was also shown by the fact that only one person was nominated for the Board of Directors, although every member received a Nomination Form. Referring to a few members with long outstanding loan balances, he stated that despite all efforts of persuasion, the Board had to resort to Civil Proceedings to recover some debts, and it was intended to give full publicity to such Court proceedings.

To her sorrowing sons, daughters, son-in-law, daughters-in-law, brother and relatives we tender our deepest sympathy.

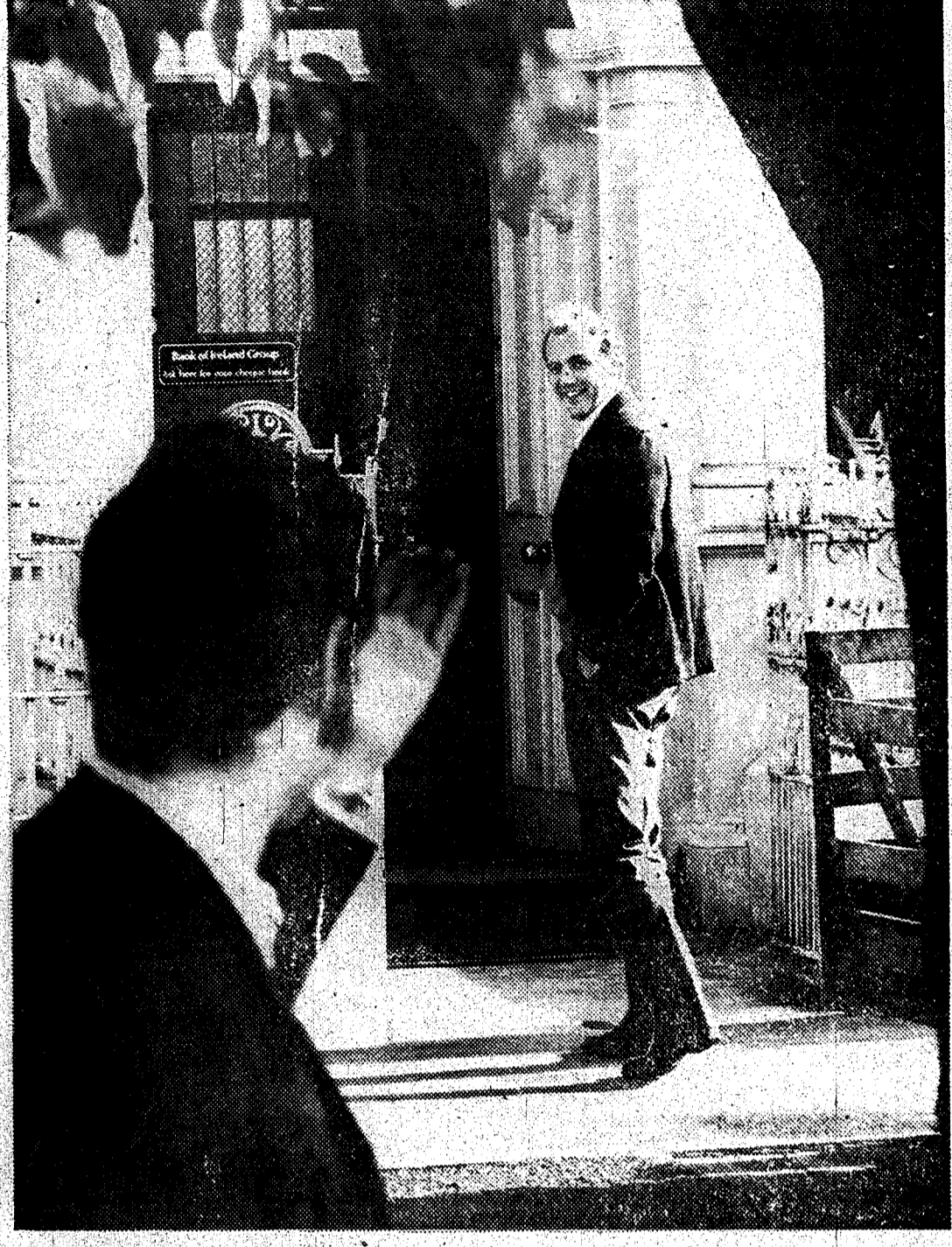

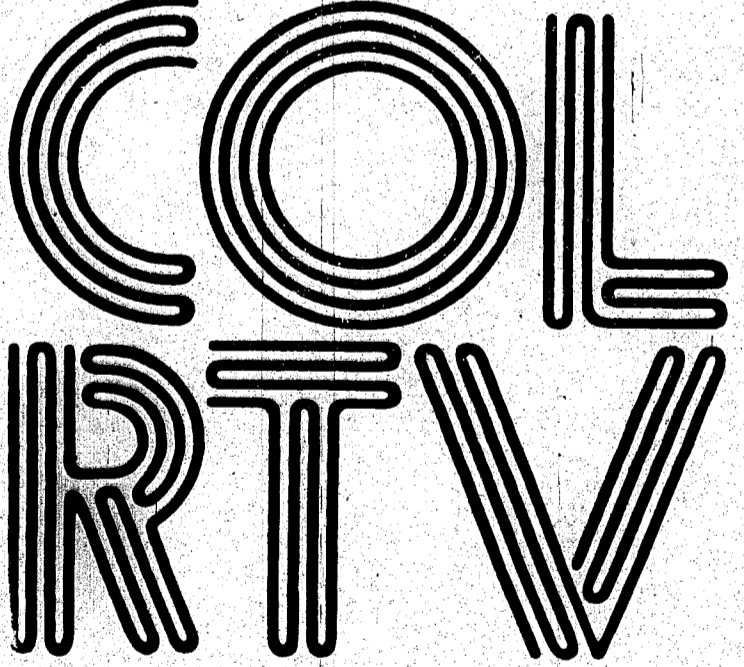

At a time when we hear so many depressing stories about failures and staff redundancies in and around Cork, it is pleasant to have a success story to record.

And that is exactly what we got from Mr. John Farrell, Chairman of Imokilly Co-operative Creamery Ltd., in his statement to over 500 Shareholder farmers in Middleton on Friday night, where he presented his Annual Report and Statement of Accounts for the 12 months ended on December 31, 1971.

His story was one of increased production, increased sales, increased profits and increased employment.

And, his forecast for 1972 is equally bright. He attributes the quick growth and success to the following: 1) Efficient production of top quality products in a modern plant; 2) Intelligent farmer participation in their Co-operative; 3) Loyal operating staff with an excellent history of industrial harmony; 4) Efficient Management.

Mr. Farrell said that the 1971 growth rate of £500,000 over £3 million to over £3.5 million in 1971. The 1972 target is equally ambitious. He hopes to see further growth in exports to add to the £1,500,000 exported last year. His reason for this optimism is the higher targets set for production of new products developed in their Dairy in recent years and the reasonable hope for the production of at least one further new product in 1972.

While Mr. Farrell's report was mainly one of optimism, he had a few critical observations too.

He criticised the recent antics of Fertilisers Producers in Ireland. He cannot understand how the Fertiliser Manufacturers in their small select group with virtual monopolistic control can decide to import nitrogenous fertilisers themselves and then proceed to stop others from importing by, we are told, the rather doubtful, indirect method of using the fears of employees who have not had the exact implications properly explained to them by their employees.

Mr. Farrell agrees that as a Nation we must carefully watch imports where they can endanger redundancy in any Irish Factory. He questions, however, the equity of picking on fertilisers, an essential farm input, while the same approach is not taken regarding many other imported products, less essential for Irish production and more damaging to Irish employment.

Mr. Farrell also referred to his worry lest Irish farmers become apathetic in their approach to entry in E.E.C. He referred to half-truths about our existence if England joins and Ireland does not. He is worried about the wrong slant put on the New Zealand arrangement by those who wish to mislead. He believes we should not be comparing our situation now against what we hope to have in E.E.C. conditions but rather compare our experience in the mid-1930s, during the economic war, with what we look forward to

in E.E.C. Our farmers would be well advised, Mr. Farrell said, to look alive on this issue and indeed so should our employees, because, if we fail to gain entry into Europe the dairying industry, as we know it, will not survive and that would be the end of the Dairy Farmer, the Dairy processing plants and all the employment therein.

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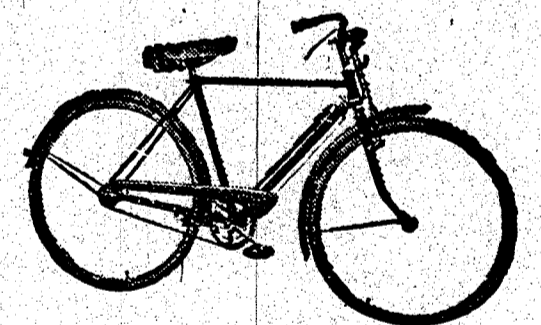

To his bereaved wife, sons, daughter, brother, sisters and relatives we tender our deep sorrow.

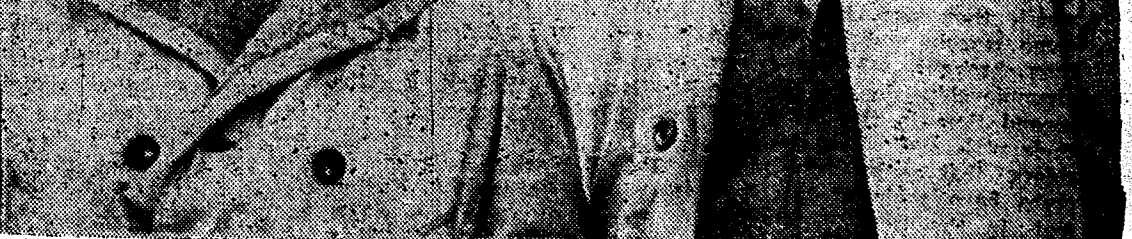
