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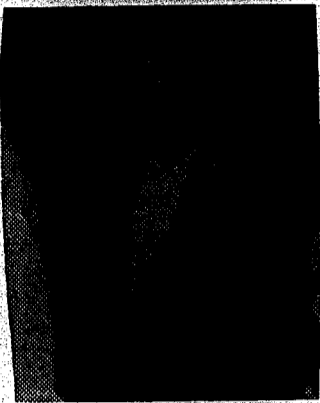

LATE MICHAEL KELLY

"Coolrea," Abbeyside and Devonshire Arms Hotel, Dungarvan



The town of Dungarvan and surrounding districts were deeply shocked by the unexpected death of Michael Kelly late of "Coolrea," Abbeyside and Devonshire Arms Hotel, Dungarvan. His illness was of very short duration, having only been removed to the Bon Secours Hospital, Cork, on Saturday evening and his death taking place later the same evening.

The deceased was well known and respected by all sections of the community and also by a large commercial and visiting populace. He was joint Prop./Manager of the well known and old established Devonshire Arms Hotel, where he was always ready to receive and cater for his large clientele.

To his sorrowing wife, son, daughters, mother, brothers and relatives and friends we tender our deepest and most sincere condolences. His remains were removed on Sunday evening to St. Mary's Parish Church, Dungarvan and were followed by a huge cortege, representative of all sections of the community, and were blessed and received by Rev. W. Callanan, C.C., assisted by Rev. M. Walsh, C.C., Abbeyside, V. Rev. T. C. Butler, O.S.A., Prior, and Fr. Carolan, O.S.A.

Requiem Mass was offered at 11 o'clock on Monday morning, the celebrant being Fr. Eustace, C.C., Ferns (cousin), and immediately afterwards the interment took place in the adjoining cemetery amid manifestation of very great sorrow from the very large concourse present. Fr. Eustace, C.C., also officiated at the graveside, assisted by V. Rev. M. Farrell, P.P., Abbeyside, Rev. M. Walsh, C.C., do., Rev. W. Callanan, C.C., Rev. J. Murphy, C.C., V. Rev. T. C. Butler, O.S.A., Prior, Fr. Carolan, O.S.A., and V. Rev. James Lawn, P.P., Kilgobnet.

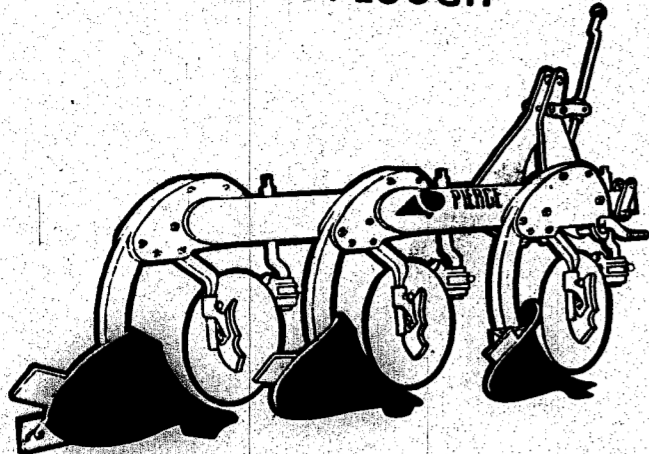

Augustinians In Dungarvan 1292 - 1972

(By REV. T. C. BUTLER, O.S.A)

In the glorious but chequered history of the Irish Church, the ancient abbey, monastery and convent have played a significant part. In a series of articles over the next few weeks, we shall deal with the story of one such Abbey — the old Augustinian monastery in Abbeyside, whose history spans a period of almost 700 years in this diocese of Waterford and Lismore.

THE NORMANS
Many students of history today have come to regard the Norman invasion of Ireland as one of the greatest disasters to befall our country. More discerning historians, however, who have weighed the pros and cons of the case, are of the opinion that it was a blessing in disguise.

The Normans, unlike the Danes, came not to plunder and destroy, but to build and organise. They granted a highly-cultured Christian civilisation on to the weakened remnants of a refined Celtic one. They brought with them a genius for organisation, for military efficiency, for building in stone and carving in wood that was unknown to the Celts. It was to the Normans we owe the introduction of many of the Religious Orders into Ireland.

Rev. F. X. Martin, O.S.A., in "The Course of Irish History" has this to say: "The Norman invasion produced a new wave of religious activity in the wake of Norman arms. The Normans, who were always quick to seize on what was new, practical and progressive, also welcomed the friars to Ireland in the 13th century—Dominicans, Augustinians, Franciscans and Carmelites. These were the new Religious Order, men dedicated to preaching, to popular religion, beloved of the people. Wherever the Normans went, clusters of friars followed; their churches and friaries sprang up throughout the Norman territories; they even penetrated ahead of the Normans into Gaelic territory where they were also welcomed."

COMING OF THE FRIARS
The coming of the friars could be said to have given a spiritual blood-transfusion to an anaemic Church, still very weakened in the aftermath of the Danish hegemony. St. Malachy had introduced the Cistercians in 1142. They were a strictly enclosed Order of monks. The friars, who were neither monastic nor secular clergy, brought something of the spirit of each, the contemplative and the active, to the Irish Church. They brought the Gospel to the people by their preaching, mission and retreat-giving, and ministering to the sick and the poor in hospital and home. But they brought something more also. "The advent of the friars brought a new world of learning to Ireland. Through the Norman colony the medieval Papacy was brought into closer contact with the Irish than ever before" (1).

CANONS REGULAR
Thus it was through the Normans that the Augustinians came to Ireland. The name of St. Augustine was not unknown, however, to the pre-Norman Celtic Church. Almost from St. Patrick's time, there were numerous houses of Canons Regular of St. Augustine throughout the land. The Canons Regular were not friars but clergy living together in common under the Rule of St. Augustine.

In Co. Waterford, for example, there were two great Priors of Canons Regular, Mothel (near Rathmore) and Molana (on the Blackwater). The latter was founded in the 6th century by St. Molanfidhe. He is represented as habited according to the Order of St. Augustine (2). St. Garvan, from whom Dungarvan is reputed to take its name, founded a Priory of

Canons of Augustine on a site near the corner of the present Church Street, and portion of the walls of that church can still be seen in Merry's garden and also in Barrack Lane. The Augustinians, as we know them today, were known officially as the "Hermits of St. Augustine" (or more popularly "friars.") Their monasteries were called Abbeys, e.g. Fethard, Ballyhunis, Red Abbey (Cork), but in post-Reformation times, particularly were sometimes referred to as convents or priories.

FOUNDATION
Dungarvan was the site of the second foundation in Ireland of the Augustinians. According to authentic sources (3) the families of MacGrath and O'Brien were the founders and benefactors, respectively, of the Abbey.

The founder of the MacGrath family was Thomas, Lord Offaly, in the year 1295. In him the friars had a powerful friend and his descendants continued the tradition set for them. The McGraths were chieftains in West Waterford from earliest times. They lived at Tallow (Glenaboy) and at Lismore. Steady Castle was built by Philip McGrath. The O'Briens of Comeragh, patrons and benefactors of the friars, were a powerful family of ancient Gaelic stock. They were later to afford shelter to the friars when persecution deprived them of their Abbey and drove them forth as fugitives.

ABBEYSIDE
The site of the new Abbey was on a promontory of land separated from the town by the sea. This was later to become known in official documents as "the Abbey side of Dungarvan." The name "Abbeyside" was called "Dun na Mainistreach" by the Gaelic-speaking natives. Before the Normans came, tradition says that there was an earthwork "dun" on that side of the estuary (4), and that it was on this site a castle was afterwards built by the McGraths as a protection for the Abbey from sea-raiders (5). The word "dun" could also refer to the castle as the "strong-house" or fortress for the Abbey. The friars built their church and monastery on the edge of the sea. In those days there was open strand from the present Causeway wall over to the point of the promontory, with a small cove, known as Cul a' tSaillin, opposite to the Look-out (6). A crossing was made from the town by ferry at this point, while further up, the river was forded at low tide. The channel of the river passed close to the town-side of the estuary, and away from the Abbey.

According to her, there was a leper hospital and a holy well dedicated to St. Brigid near the site of the Abbey. Leprosy (as it was then called) was a common disease of the coast-dwellers of South Waterford. It was supposed to be contracted from eating too much fish. On an old Ordnance Map there is mention of a well called St. Catherine's Well in the field opposite the church in Abbeyside, but it has now disappeared;

(5) The most famous seapirates of that period were the O'Driscolls of Baltimore, who frequently made raids on Dungarvan and the south coast of Waterford. The Deise fishermen often retaliated by going in pursuit of them. Of the sack of Baltimore, and the reference to "Hackett of Dungarvan, he who steered the Algerine"; (6) The old name for all this area was "Thiar na Tra". The main road to Waterford skirted the shore as far as the Modern Sarsfield and then continued up that street, known as the "Bothar Mor."

There is a tradition that the first friars came by sea. They looked for a sign from God (after the manner of St. Declan) for a possible site for their house. On the strand below the Abbey found a stone head, which they recognised as their own St. Augustine. There is a weathered stone head still to be seen set into the western wall of the Abbey. Fact or fiction, the tradition is worth preserving!

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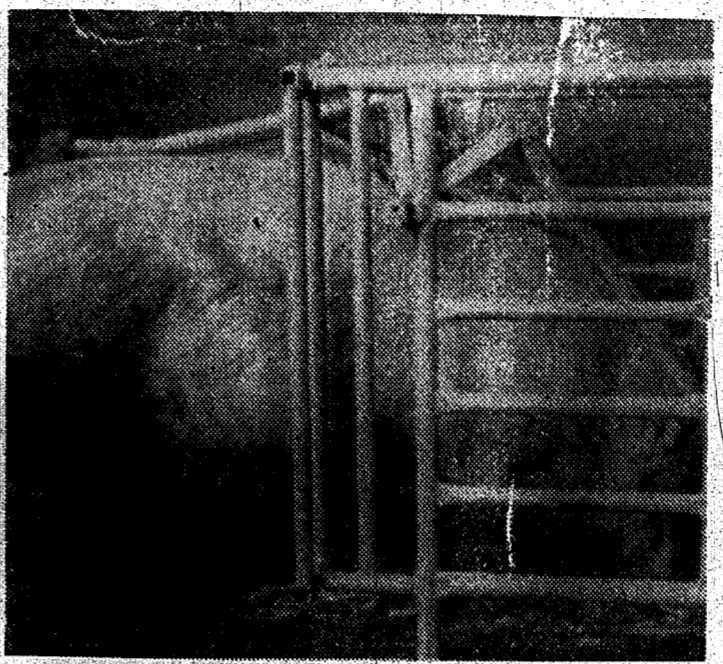

MUNSTER CHAMPIONSHIP FIXTURES

The Munster Council at its meeting at Mallow last Saturday made a number of championship fixtures concerning Waterford. The meeting decided to play a number of their competitions on week-evenings and this is a move which will be welcomed by our own harassed fixtures committees.

Waterford's championship programme commences on Wednesday, April 12, at Lismore, when our junior footballers take on Cork. One week later, on April 19, our intermediate hurlers play Cork at Cappoquin and on the 26th April we will also have home advantage when our u-21 footballers play Tipperary at Walsh Park.

Our senior and minor footballers travel to Kilmallock on Sunday, May 14, to play Limerick and on the following Sunday we will be on the move again when our senior and minor hurlers take on Cork at the Cork Athletic Grounds and our final team in to action in the Munster championship will be our u-21 hurlers who take on Tipperary at Cashel on Saturday, June 3. These then are the dates to mark down in your diary.

INTERMEDIATE HURLING

The first round games in the intermediate hurling championship should provide some interesting contests. Geraldines, who won the county title in this grade in 1967 meet last year's junior champions Ballyduff, who were successful away back in 1964 and this is a game which will create tremendous interest. Last year Geraldines came mighty close to defeating Tallow and they are sure to be a strong force again this year, while Ballyduff's performances throughout last year's successful junior campaign showed that they are well fitted for the intermediate grade and the winners of this tie will go forward to play the winners of the Fourmilewater v. This was a tremendous performance by the Dungarvan boy and it proved once again that in time he will follow Dessie O'Connor as Youths Champion of Ireland.

The course on Sunday was a very tough one and added to that was the fact that the race was run in wind and rain. Still, these young athletes were undaunted and showed their mettle in trying conditions. Tony Ryan ran as an individual and his performance was a joy to all the Waterford people present and further joy came with the team effort of St. Nicholas A.C.

It was a case of so near and yet so far for the Ring boys yet so far for the Ring Club in their efforts to capture that elusive all Ireland title, as a mere two points separated them from the winners Leevale A.C.

This was heart breaking for the athletes themselves, but when their initial disappointment is over, no doubt they will feel proud of their achievement. To take runner-up position in an all Ireland contest is something to be proud of and so we salute Ray and John Treacy, Seamus Drummy and Paddy Kelly, who have had such a wonderful season. The two Treacys finished 7th and 8th and they were always in the hunt, with Ray just finishing ahead of his younger brother. Next came Seamus Drummy, exceeding all expectations and revelling in the conditions, to finish in 14th position, four places ahead of Paddy Kelly, whose performance is all the more meritorious when one considers that he was a doubtful starter during the week.

Down Memory Lane

When one speaks of great Waterford footballers of past and present, I recall the many outstanding displays of Bill Organ, Abbeyside, Billy, as he was popularly known, wore the Dungarvan and Waterford colours with distinction. He was on the star Dungarvan team which defeated Tramore in the final of the Waterford junior football championship in 1919, in which he played distinction.

For many years he was a regular on the Dungarvan senior team and on the county team. Memory takes me back to a June day in 1926 when Waterford played Cork at the Cork Athletic Ground in the Munster football championship. Bill was playing at midfield for Waterford and he surpassed all his previous displays that day when playing the Cork midfielders out of the game.

One hears of much vaunted Kerry midfielders past and present, but Bill Organ stood up with the best of them.

I think the outstanding feature of his play was getting possession in the air and he was rarely beaten in that sector. Possessing wonderful ball control, he was a most unselfish player and always brought his team mates into the game. As a player he possessed rare qualities that inspired his team to victory.

Yes, Bill, on and off the field, done his native county proud. An exemplary sportsman, he joined the Garda in the late 20's and was based in Co. Wicklow, where he continued to show his skills to the Gaelic fans around the famed Wicklow hills.

Bill now resides in Co. Wexford and still continues to follow the fortunes of Waterford football.

Thanks for the memory Bill of your great days in Waterford football.
