1815-1829: RE-BIRTH AND RESTORATION
The year 1815 is well known to every schoolboy as the year of Waterloo. It was also a significant year for the Augustinians of the Spring house, as in that year they opened their first public chapel in town. Admittedly it was a modest beginning—a thatched storehouse in Church St., converted into a temporary chapel. They continued, however, to live at the Spring until 1829. Fr. James Tierney was Prior, with Fr. John Wall as his assistant. One of the few relics of that period is an old worn holy-water font, inscribed "J. Wall, 1820," is still in use on the left side of the main door of the church.

In the meantime, they began to make active preparation for the building of a new church. The Bishop of the diocese, Rt. Rev. Dr. Walsh, when applied to for his sanction for the proposed undertaking, most willingly granted it. The brief, granting the Augustinians this right, was as follows:—
"We approve of having and erecting a chapel in the town of Dungarvan on the part of the Rev. Augustinian Regulars. Fr. Robert Walsh, Dungarvan, Oct. 18th, 1818." (1)

Having obtained the Bishop's sanction, the Augustinian Fathers commenced without delay to collect subscriptions and material for the intended new church. A site was obtained off Clubberts Lane (now Priory St.), and building was commenced in 1823. By this time Fr. John Wall was Prior. Through his exertions and the co-operation of the people of the town and its neighbourhood, the new church was completed in two years. However, circumstances did not permit the Priars to open their church immediately for public worship.

In the meantime the building used "as a temporary church had collapsed and the Fathers were obliged to make use of an old brewery, "with in a stone's throw of the site of the new church." (2) In a letter dated July 18th, 1823, Dr. Daniel O'Connor, Provincial, writes: "Fr. John Wall has taken Dillon's old brewery in the town of Dungarvan for a chapel at £10 per annum" (3). According to Fr. Williams it measured about 30 ft. by 15 ft., had a thatched roof, and was situated at the South corner of the present chapel-yard. He himself recalls seeing it many years later when it was repaired and slated and turned into a barn.

At length, on the Sunday within the Octave of St. Augustine in the year 1829 the new Friary Church was officially opened for Divine worship. A letter from Rt. Rev. James Doyle, O.S.A., Bishop of Kildare and Leighlin (J.K.L.) congratulates the Prior and

Provincial on their efforts. The Penal days were now over. The "Second Spring" had arrived. **1829-1869: THE "SECOND SPRING"**
The opening of the present church (in 1829) heralded the "Second Spring" for the Augustinians in Dungarvan. Although unable to fulfil their cherished ambition to return to their original foundation in Abbeyside, they were fortunate to have acquired a site in the town itself. This was also the occasion for the Community to take up residence in the town. At a Visitation held two years previously by the Provincial, Dr. O'Connor, the following observation was made:—
"In consequence of the heavy expenditure and debts of the house and the necessity of living convenient to the chapel, we recommend that the house and farm at the Spring be let as soon as possible and that the Community reside in the town." (4). A house was rented from John Kiely in Church St., and here the Fathers were to live for forty years.

We are indebted to Fr. James Anderson (whom we shall treat of later) for a description of Friary St. (or Clubberts Lane) as it appeared when the church was built. Writing in 1894, he was able to recall, with the aid of older people of the town and former members of the Community, details of the shape of the church, as well as from local tradition, that this side of Friary Lane had its line of thatched cabins in front of the church. A narrow passage led from the late into the church." Fr. Martin Crane, in 1854, removed several cabins which had become unoccupied, from the church gate to the present Priory House. The new chapel had a thatched roof which caved in about 1853, so Fr. Crane raised the walls seven feet all round and put a slate roof on the chapel. The tower, however, had not yet been built. This was built during the Priorship of Fr. Patrick Toomey in 1859 and we are told that it was fitted with "a sweet-toned bell," which got cracked some time later and was replaced by another bell of the "same size and with the same beautiful tone."

Successive Provincial Visitations record the urgency of building a permanent dwelling-house to replace the rented house. In 1846, for example, Dr. Stuart, Provincial, has this remark: "The Community have made an offer for some old houses near the chapel and they expect their offer will be accepted. In that case they will have ample space for a dwelling-house, and also to enlarge their very good chapel." Their expectations were not yet realised, however, because in 1861 the same Dr. Stuart, on his Visitation, remarks:—
"The only thing wanting... is a convent-house for which there is a very good site immediately adjoining the church. The site was got from the late Marquis of Waterford at the annual rent of £5. If the houses were built, three or four priests could have ample support."
Finally, we find this entry in a Community House-book of 1869: (The Augustinian Fathers left the house in Church St., and took possession of a house in Main St., near Temple Lane, belonging to Mrs. Curran, on March 25th, 1869, for which they agreed to pay the annual sum of £26." They remained here for the next three years until the new Priory was completed.

TWO PEN PICTURES:
Fr. Philip Crane (1747-1823) Mention has already been made of Fr. Philip Crane, a member of the Community at the Spring. Coming from an old and respected Wexford family, he bore a name which gave nine priests to the Church (5). Before coming to Dungarvan (about 1765), he had been in charge of the College of San Matteo in Merulana, Rome, a house of the Augustinians. It was a notifiable and house of studies from 1656 to 1715 when it was temporarily lost to the Order. Regained in 1739 through the influence of James III (Pretender) and

his mother, it remained in Augustinian hands until taken over by the French in 1798, when they invaded Rome. Fr. Crane, having returned to San Matteo about 1798, was forced to leave Rome a second time. A contemporary said of him: "He governed the college and conducted studies with such ability and zeal that he invariably attracted to himself and the establishment the esteem and consideration of the highest dignitaries of the Church" (6). He was again appointed to Dungarvan for a short time and afterwards transferred to New Ross. His powers of endurance were such that on Sundays he used to say an early Mass in New Ross and then set forth fasting, on horseback, to Dungarvan to say a second Mass. When it was no longer necessary for him to do so, many Dungarvan people covered the 45 miles to New Ross to avail of his advice as a confessor and of his reputed healing powers. He filled the office of Provincial twice, from 1807-11 and 1819-23.

Fr. Patrick Toomey (1799-1867) —Sagart Aroon
A brief sketch can hardly do justice to one of the best loved priests of the Friary of those days. Fr. Toomey spent almost 40 years of his priestly life in Dungarvan. He was educated in Perugia, Spain and finally Rome. An accomplished linguist, he was fluent in seven languages. He came here shortly after the opening of the new church and set to work to reduce the debt. He was appointed Prior for the first time in 1835 and soon became well-known as a very zealous priest and devoted confessor. He was a great source of comfort to the people of the town and district in the dark days of the famine, when so many fell victims to the dread scourge of cholera. A strong local tradition says that while the victims of the cholera were being brought out, unconfined, from the old Workhouse, he stood for hours every day at the gateway (now bricked up) blessed each corpse with water from the "Holy Well" and recited the prayers for the dead. The victims were then laid on common carts and conveyed to Reilig a'Sle where they were buried in a mass grave.

The famine made an indelible impression on Fr. Toomey and for the remainder of his life he gave his heart and soul to ministering to the poor and needy of the town. It was an age of simple faith when people resorted to the use of blessed water from "holy wells" for curative purposes. According to Hansard (who was not a Catholic): "The holy well at the rear of the Union Workhouse, is much frequented by people who come to Dungarvan for the benefit of the sea. Among the many old and fanciful superstitions embodied in the traditions of the peasantry of old Ireland, some of the most poetic are those connected with springs and wells, which have been invested with something of a sacred character. The one to which we have alluded is the "Friars Well" in memory of the Rev. Patrick Toomey, a good priest of the Augustinian Order, who, anxious to perpetuate one of the old customs of the land, had, in the year 1860, this well cleaned out and a stone cross affixed near it. Crowds of people resort to it" (7). (Fr. Toomey would, no doubt, be amused at some of the expressions used by Hansard.) The waters of the well gave relief from many infirmities to those who made a pilgrimage of faith there.

The then Abbot of Mellary Dom Fitzpatrick, said of Fr. Toomey: "He was an ornament to the Church and a very learned man." He used to dress in a "bracked" or half grey coat, wearing an ordinary collar and tie, "from which fact," says Fr. Williams "I inferred the fear of the priest-hunter was still in his heart." He was again Prior in 1859 and during his term of office the tower was built. After his death in 1867, a monument was raised over his grave.

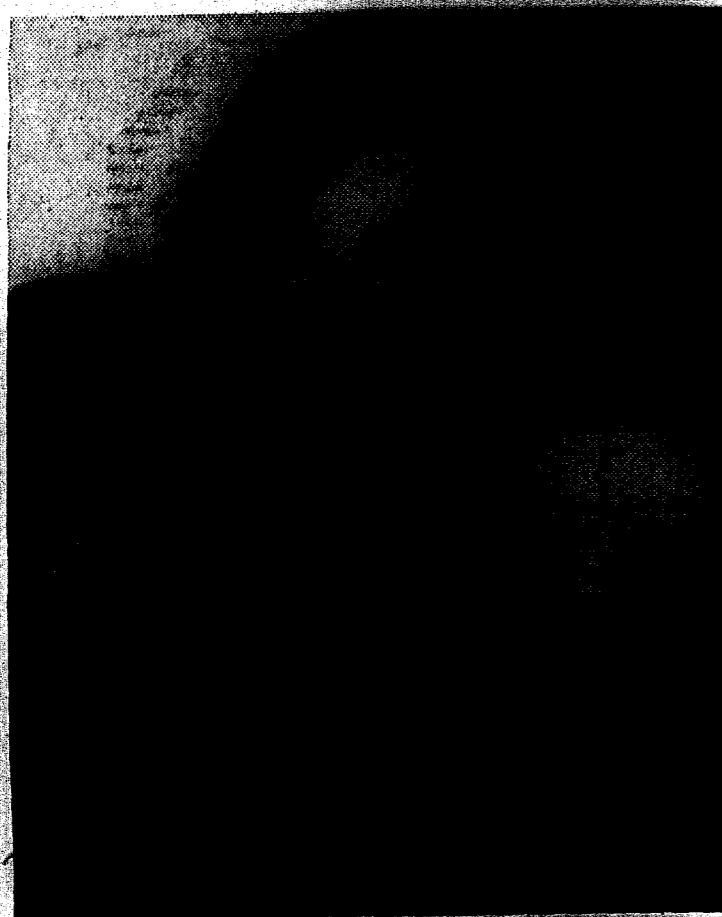

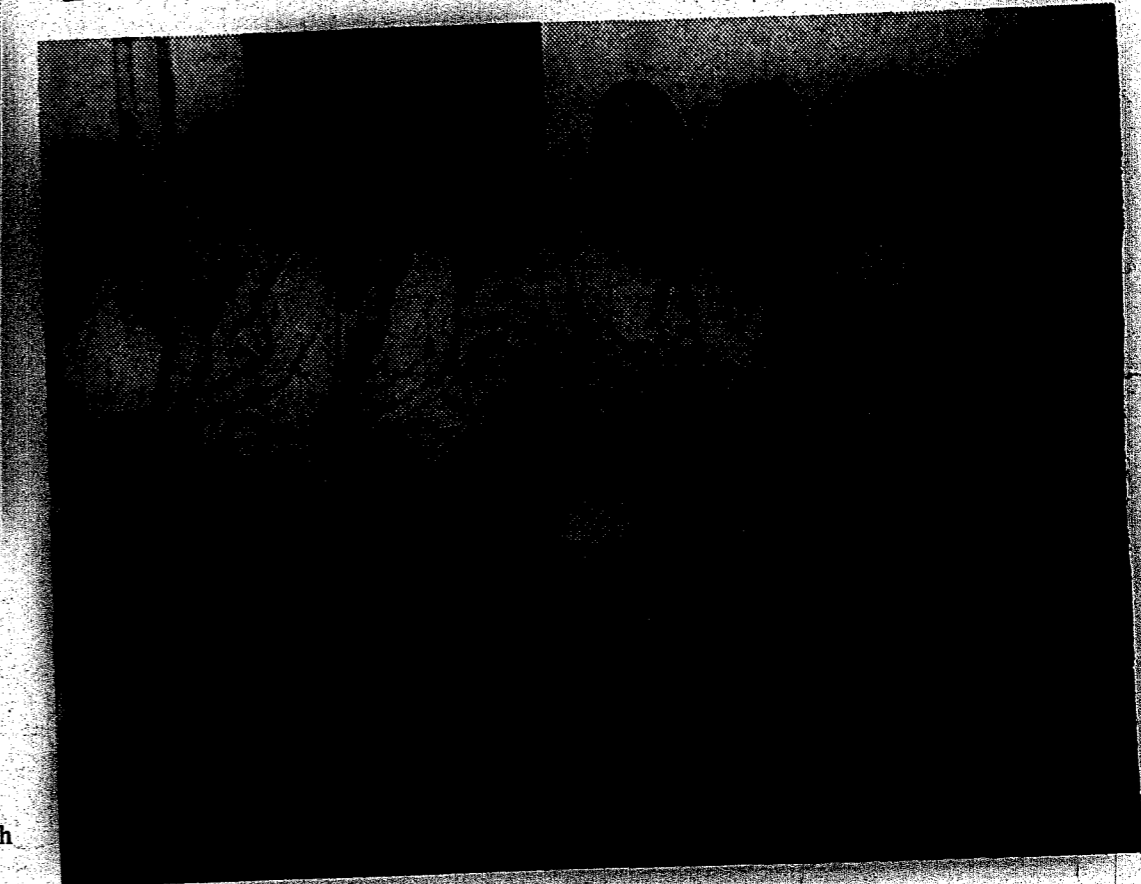

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CAPPOQUIN

By OCTOGENARIAN JOHN O'REGAN

I mentioned earlier in this brief history how Boyle, the Earl of Cork, through chicanery, acquired the Tower and Castle with Estates of Lismore which at the time included Cappoquin and all its surrounding countryside. The previous owner, Sir Walter Raleigh having been attained in 1610. On the 3rd July, 1738, Right Hon. Richard Boyle, Earl of Cork and Burlington, demised unto John Keane and Matthewiales Esq., Castle, Town and lands of Cappoquin and Estates which at the time consisted of 11,398 acres 2 roods and 21 perches and stretched from Meoul, which to present-day inhabitants locally is known as the Mountain Barracks and was manned by R.I.C. police at one time. It was near Bay Lough of legendary fame on the Clogheen Road and near the Vee of tourist renown.

It might be interesting at this stage to refer to the unusual grave which is on the side of the mountain of Major Grubb, formerly of Castle Grace and he decreed before he died that he be buried standing up. As he said at the time, he wanted to be always looking down on the beautiful valley below.

The Estates on the Meieray side stretches out to Knocknaasack and at one time down to Ballinacourty, Ballytemon and Grawnfadda and part of the land of Cooishal. The last four places by indenture of lease dated 13th June, 1731, were demised unto John Keane Esq. by Beverly Usher junr. I also know that John Keane leased to Valentine Greatrakes, the lands of Affane Hunter, also known as Mount Rives for "three lives." I don't exactly know when the Keane Baronetcy was conferred but I remembered reading of a battle in the Punjab in which a Keane commanded a company of British soldiers and even though they suffered losses, they eventually won the day. It may be through this that the title was conferred. However, the first mention of Sir John Keane, Bart., I can obtain is 1806.

Cappoquin at one time had a stage coach operating. The stables were opposite where the present Curate lives. The mails were conveyed by coach as far as Cahir and from there to Dublin. The journey took from three to four hours. Evidently that was while the police had the Barracks on the Clogheen Road. The writer remembers two houses which existed about 100 yards past what was known as Owen Keefe's on the Melleray Road and in one lived a small man who was known as "Gomman Oge."

At the other end of the town, the place now known as Tivoli House was then "Shea's Orchard" and was occupied by Henry Dennehy in 1841 by lease from Sir Richard Keane. Also I know that Jeremiah Day was leased a plot of ground and slated dwelling house on 11th June 1849. The house is now occupied by Miss Winnie Murray. The present Parochial House was leased to the Rev. Michael Keating in 1782 and was formerly owned by Cuddy Morrissey. I can remember the old house which was a one storey building. The present house is built between 70 and 80 years. The Rev. Michael Spratt got the eight houses and yards and Mill Street and also the field known as the "Cinders" leased on 31st March, 1855. I also know that what is known as the Mill was leased to Edward Acres in February, 1855. The Old R.I.C. Barracks was, in my younger days, situated where is now Walsh's Hotel owned by Rory McLoughlin and comprised all the ground now occupied by Carthage Murray as far as the Boreen.

Then there's the question of a decent dance hall. One has only to read a certain Waterford weekly paper to see dances advertised with the best showbands playing at such places as Clonmel, Carrick-on-Suir, Tramore and New Pass but Dungarvan is lucky if it caters for a dance on the odd holiday night and when it does, let's be truthful, the music is served up by second-rate showbands.

The cinema in my opinion, gets up to date films quickly, but the sound could be improved.

All in all Dungarvan hasn't even got the basic forms of entertainment, while other towns of its size are striving for, and succeeding, in getting heated swimming pools, pitch and putt courses and Community Centres. Most of these towns I may add could not compare with Dungarvan in relation to scenery. In Clonlea we've got a beautiful beach, but who in their sanity would spend a holiday there. You'd end up talking to yourself.

So Dungarvan, wake up and put a finish to the "there's nothing to do but drink" saying. We're not afraid to spend our money but we'd like a chance to spend it on something else besides drink. I'd like to hear other peoples' opinions on the problem.

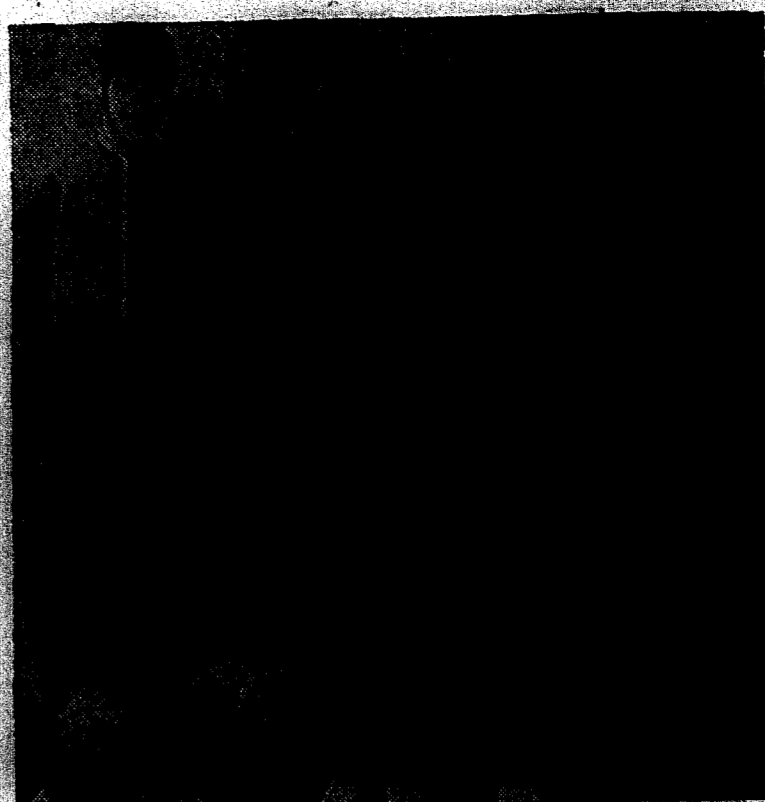
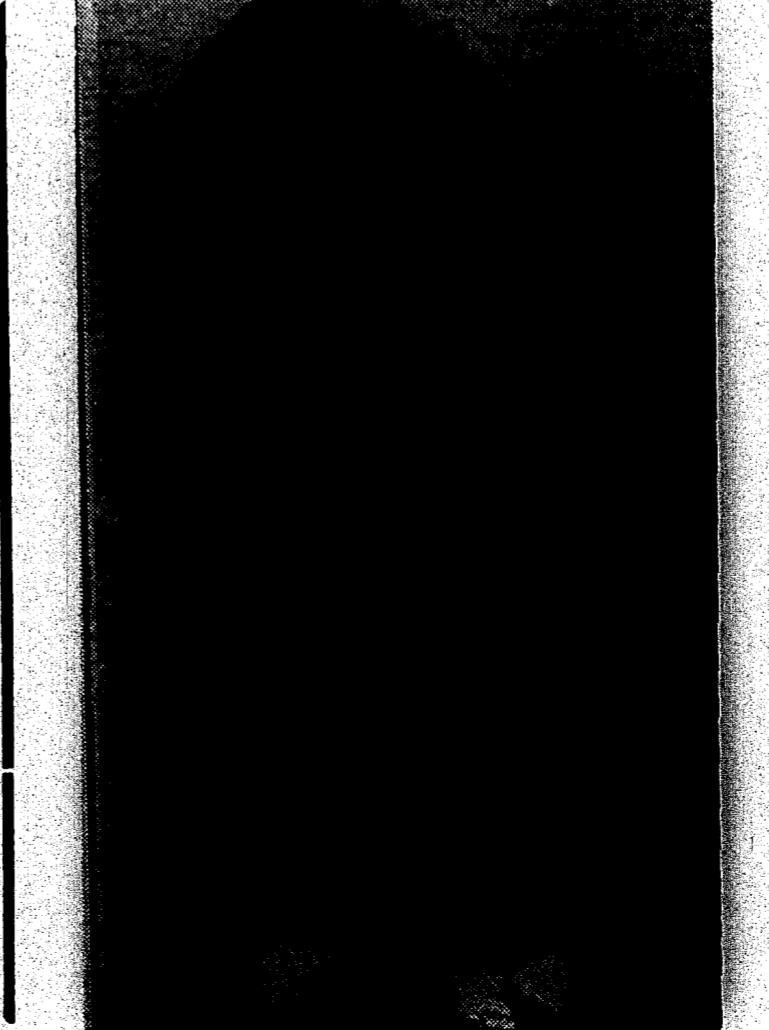
RAY TREACY ON WINNING IRISH TEAM
