Will Contribute **IN DEBT** £4,000 Towards Bridge

Waterford Co. Council will contribute a sum not exceeding £4,125 towards the estimated £80,000 reconstruction of Carrick-on-Suir's main bridge, Dillon Bridge. This was decided despite a blank refusal by Kilkenny Co. Council to contribute anything towards the reconstruction.

Co. Secretary, Mr. J. G. Dowling said there would be a State Grant of 75% for the reconstruction of the bridge and that left about £15,000 to be financed from rates. South Tipperary Co. Council had asked Kilkenny Co. Council to share 72% of that cost with them and the Waterford Co. Council to pay the remaining 27%, which would represent an approximate contribution of £4,125.

Mr. Dowling said the Kilkenny Council had refused, however, to make any contribution. Mr. Austin Deasy said it was disgraceful that a town the size and importance of Dungarvan should be without so essential a unit. It was a most important step forward, however, to know that four doctors would operate the service round the clock and he hoped this would expedite the matter.

Waterford Co. Council's debit balance has risen from £31,596 in 1969 to a record £112,250 in March 1971, while the present capital debt was almost £2,500,000. This was stated in a report before last Monday's meeting of the Council at Dungarvan.

The report said that for the past two financial years expenditure had exceeded receipts and consequently the Council's debit balance had steadily increased. This largely arose from wages and salary increases and that the increase in the size of the debit balance, the report stated, was a factor requiring special attention in future budgets.

Mr. K. O'Ryan said it was a report that should bring them crashing down to earth. Their debit balance had escalated alarmingly, their capital debt was in the region of £24 million and clearly they would want to move with extreme care and caution in the months ahead if their finances weren't to worsen still further.

Mr. C. A. O'Connor, County Manager, said it was unrealistic to take the £24m. capital debt on its face value. In fact the Council had considerable assets and to be objective about the situation, he said, they should be taken into account in any assessment of their overall financial position.

Would Operate 24-Hour Casualty Service

At Monday meeting of Waterford County Council, held at Dungarvan, Mr. Charles Curran said he could now state that four doctors in Dungarvan were prepared, subject to certain conditions, to operate a round the clock casualty unit in Dungarvan.

Mr. Curran, one of the Council's two representatives on the South Eastern Health Board, said the need for a casualty unit in Dungarvan to serve the vast region of West Waterford could not be overstressed. He said he wished to point out that contrary to what seemed to be asserted, that the provision of a maternity unit in Dungarvan was not in any way related to the closure of the town's casualty department. The simple truth of the matter was that Dungarvan hospital wasn't sufficiently well equipped to operate such a unit nor was there a full time doctor available for it.

He said he would be raising the matter at the next meeting of the Health Board and it was hoped to resolve the matter as soon as possible. Mr. Austin Deasy said it was disgraceful that a town the size and importance of Dungarvan should be without so essential a unit. 1869-1904:

CONSOLIDATION

The history of the Friary for those 35 years is centred mainly around the personality of one remarkable man, Fr. James Williams. A quiet, unassuming man, Fr. Williams combined in his character all that is best in the qualities of a capable administrator and zealous priest. Aggrieved on leaving Limerick Friary for Dungarvan in 1869, he expressed his feelings to Fr. Robert Dore, his Provincial, who remarked to him: "You are going to as good a people as are in Ireland. I lived for many years with them. You will never be sorry for the change." Fr. Williams, in his memoirs, adds: "Nor have I been sorry."

Appointed Prior in 1871, he felt that his immediate task was to provide a suitable home for his Community. With his extraordinary courage, he undertook not merely the building of a Priory but also the setting up of a secondary school to provide additional education for the boys of the town. (I shall deal with the school in a separate article.) This was a tremendous step forward from the thatched cabin of a previous generation to the princely Priory that still stands as a monument to his memory. Work was commenced on September 3, 1871 and the Priory was ready for habitation in September 1872. The total cost of the work was £2,275, a substantial sum in those days. He found it difficult to make ends meet, and so he had to look around for funds and means of raising funds. We have on record one ingenious method he employed.

TALES OUT OF SCHOOL

A number of farmers gave him a calf each and reared it for him. When the calves were yearlings, he put them all on grass on a farm which he rented. It happened that the owner of the farm was in debt and in the course of time his goods and chattels were distrained, amongst others the calves that Fr. Williams had grazing on the land. One day, news reached the Friary, that Fr. Williams's cattle were being driven to the Pound. Fr. James called on the aid of some schoolboys and went out to meet the bailiffs driving the cattle. The schoolboys rushed in among the cattle and drove them pell-mell away in different directions. Each batch of cattle was driven into a farmer's place where the bailiffs dare not enter and thus the field was won.

In 1875 he was sent to the United States by his Provincial to collect funds for various building projects taking place in the Province, among them his own Priory. In the meantime, Fr. James Nowlan was appointed to Dungarvan. He saw another problem to be

tackled, that of intemperance. He was instrumental in forming the first Pioneer Total Abstinence Association in the town in 1876. He had 1300 members on roll. Its immediate success was evident from the results—peace restored to families, children kept at school, and a regular wage packet secure each week. Fr. Nowlan also initiated the practice of evening devotions at the Shrine of Our Lady of Good Counsel, assigning to reliable laymen the duty of reciting the Rosary for the congregation (1).

Meanwhile, Fr. Williams had returned from his tour of the States. The debt was now fully paid off, but he did not relax. His next task was the erection of a worthy High Altar. This was built of marble and was consecrated in 1881 by Most Rev. Dr. Cleary, Bishop of Kingston.

A GREAT BENEFACTOR

In 1884, the ground on which the church, priory, garden, part of the yard, and a barn stood, was purchased from the Marquis of Waterford. This was made possible by the generosity of a great benefactor of the Friary of those days, Michael Power. A native of Tramore, he had emigrated in early life to Australia and after a lapse of many years, had returned to live in Dungarvan. He lived for 17 years in the home of a Mrs. Condon (aunt of Michael Clancy). A very retiring man, he spent his time in a hermit-like manner, reading, taking regular walks alone and spending many hours in the Friary Church. Among his many gifts to the Fathers were vestments, Church furnishings, and chalice. He is buried in the churchyard plot—the only lay person buried there—and a magnificent granite cross was erected over his grave.

In 1884 also, a new organ was installed in the church. For some years previously on Sundays Solemn Vespers had been chanted alternately by the choir on the gallery and select members of the Confraternity.

We have the names of some of the early organists and choir-mistresses: Ellie Gough (afterwards Sister Stanislaus, O.C.D.); Maggie Ryan (afterwards Mrs. Burke); Mary Power (Sister Agatha); two Miss Hannigans (both became nuns); Mary O'Brien (Mrs. O'Riordan); Agnes Curran (Mrs. Williams) and Dora Coen. The bell of the church was blessed in 1889 by Rt. Rev. Dr. Reville, O.S.A., Bishop of Sanluis, Australia.

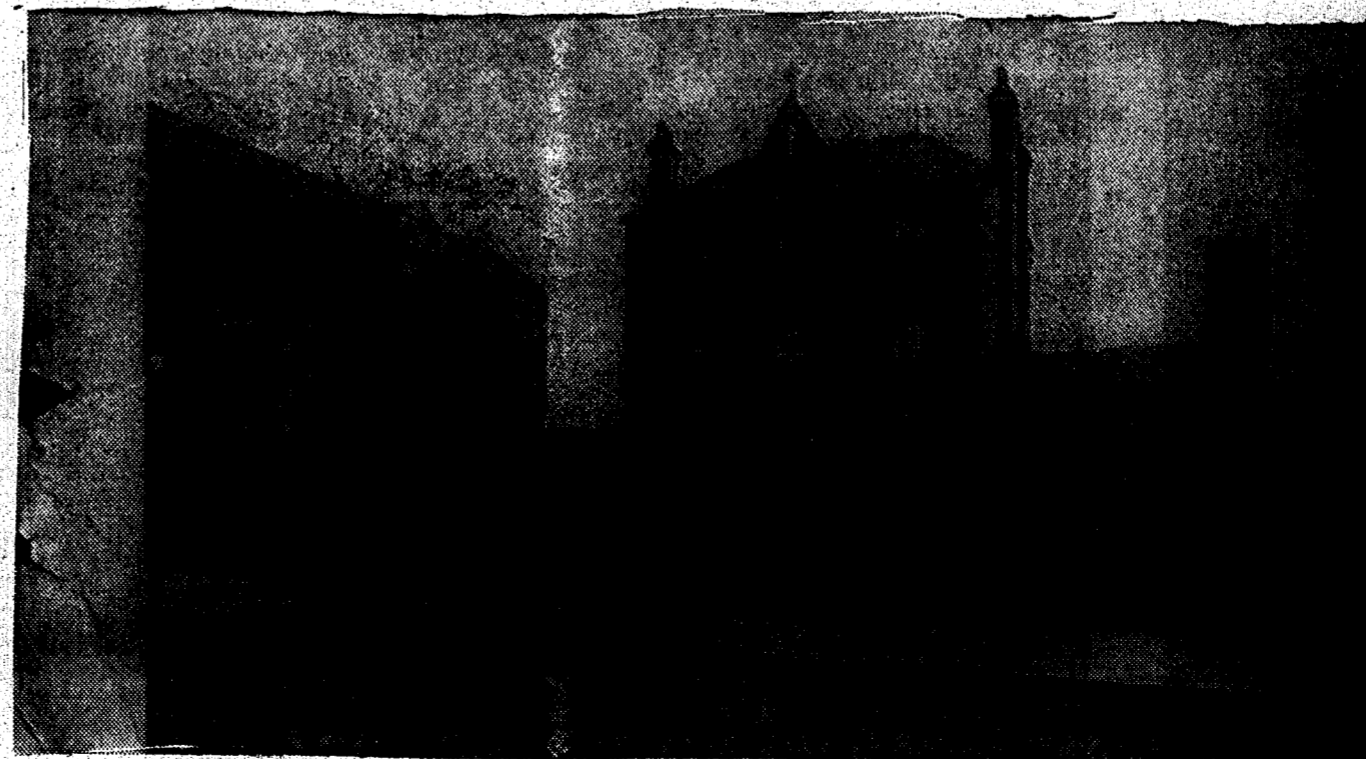
PIONEER SISTERS

In 1888 a unique event occurred in connection with the Friars. Rt. Rev. Dr. Hutchinson, O.S.A., first Vicar-Apostolic of Cooks Town, Australia, who had spent some time as a young priest in Dungarvan, invited the Sisters of Mercy to his diocese. On a return visit to see his friend, Fr. Williams, he had an interview with the Rev. Mother, Sister de Sales Maher. He told her of the conditions of his Vicariate, that he had only five priests to minister to an area as large as Ireland and that "the young children were running wild like animals, without the word of God." Mother de Sales not only approved of sending Sisters to serve in the diocese but said she herself would lead them out. So great was the enthusiasm engendered that the entire community volunteered for the missions. Mother de Sales carefully chose a band of five nuns, one a musician, another a nurse, another a teacher, etc. It was remarked that the Australian women, Catholic

COST OF LIVING—OLD STYLE

Searching through old House-books can be a boring occupation for some people, but when we compare prices and wages to-day with those of a century or more ago, figures such as the following can be very interesting. In 1846, a farmer would have purchased a good working-horse for £8-10-0; he could have employed a labourer for one shilling a week. The housewife would have paid 7d. a stone for potatoes, 6d. a lb. for butter; 10/- for a pair of blankets or a mattress; £1 for a bed; 5/- for a kitchen table; 2/- for a pair of sheets; a leg of mutton (8 lbs.) for 2/2 and a ton of coal for 15/-. Wages, on the other hand, were in proportion; a cook or house-keeper got £3 a year, 20 years later £4, and 50 years later £12; a plasterer received 4/4 for 5 days, while a painter charged £6 for painting the church. If cost a Retreat-Master, Fr. Rossiter, only 1/6 for a bed in a hotel (without breakfast, we presume) for 1 night. A working-man would get his pint of Guinness for 2d.

The subsequent history of the Friary will be dealt with in conjunction with the school. In 1904, Fr. Williams left Dungarvan for Fethard built for the nuns. These Abbey where he remained un-

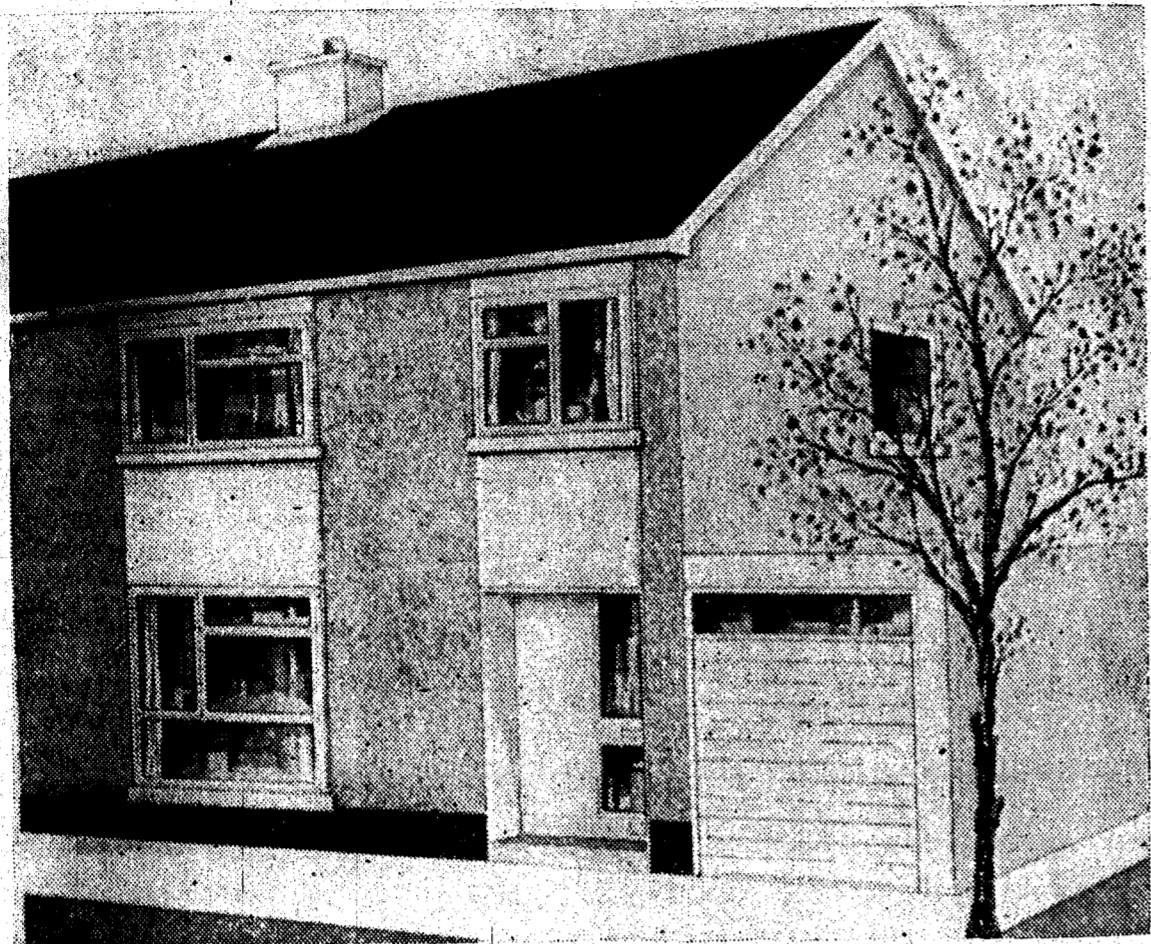

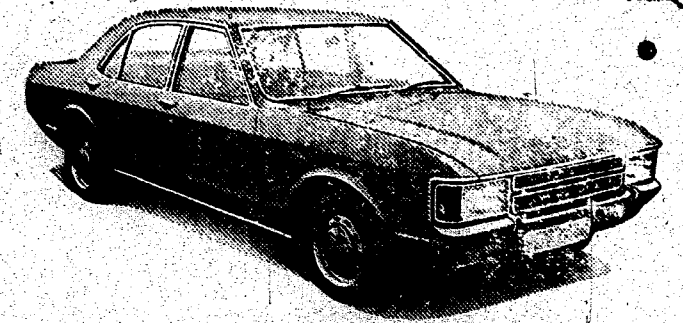

LETTER TO THE EDITOR
 Dear Sir,
 In reply to the criticism by "Townie" of the lack of social amenities in Dungarvan, I definitely agree. As a "once a year" visitor to the town I am astounded that little or no progress is made. The fault here must be placed with the Urban Council and the absence of any local development organisation.

Is there any reason as to why the existing swimming pool can not be converted into an indoor heated pool; that Abbesside "Park" cannot be transformed into a real park by raising it to road level; that the various little beaches cannot be cleaned of stones once a year; that a community dance hall is not erected; that a pitch and putt course is not laid out for all to play?

It is true that there are some social amenities such as golf, rugby and sea angling, but these seem to be reserved for the new rich. It is more than coincidental that membership of these organisations comprise almost the same people who come from the same income bracket and the 3-bedroom semi-detached. What about the working man?

The lack of hygiene in the public houses is disgraceful. "Townie" poses the problem of no ladies toilets in almost all the pubs. While this is true it might be remembered that most pubs do not have proper gents toilets and even where these exist they would seem to be cleaned about once a month instead of twice a day. Is it not the function of our health inspectors to constantly visit public houses and ensure adequate hygiene standards? Legal proceedings should be instituted where necessary.

It is shameful that the youth of the locality should be forced into pubs night after night because of a lack of local initiative in developing the area, but since this is the case, the publicans who are making big profits should be made comply with the law and forced by "pub strikes" to ensure that their premises are not hovels. Who could recommend Dungarvan to a stranger for a holiday?

Some local people may resent this letter, but I suggest that the main reason might be that they have not visited other towns of comparable size and investigated the position for themselves.

My visits to Dungarvan down the years suggests increased prosperity if one is to judge by the new houses, motor cars, fashions in clothes and of course our old friend, consumption of alcohol. The problem is that the outlets for this increased wealth have not been made available. It is time to take note of these things and stop taking a pride in the statement that "Dungarvan is the best drinking town in Ireland."

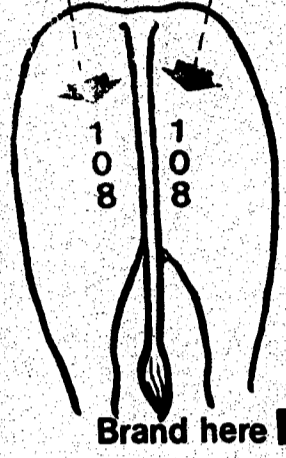

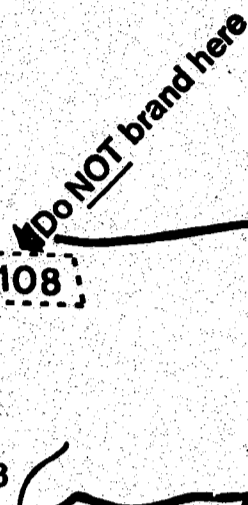

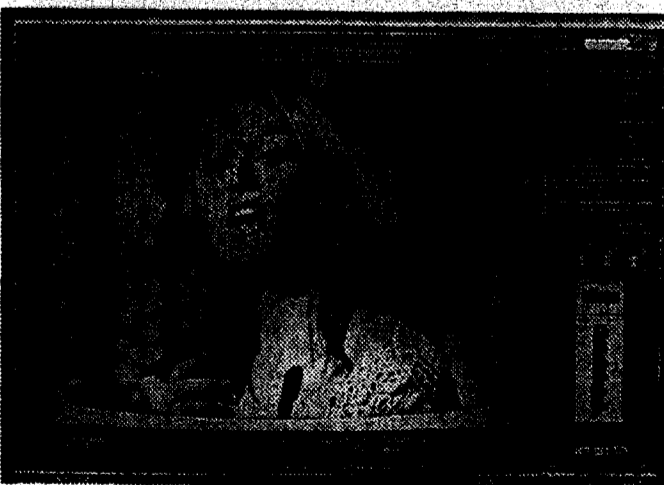
