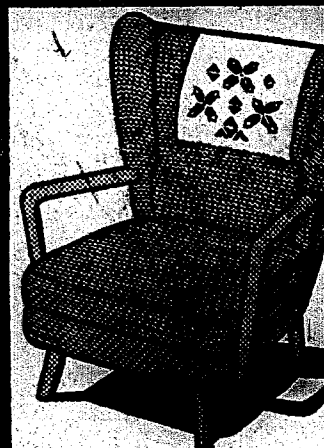

Important Notice to Parents and Guardians

A. Free Transport to Post-Primary Schools

is your child eligible? nearest school providing such education; you must, of course, live at least three miles from it.

What you must do If your child will commence post-primary education in September, 1972, you should apply for transport now on a special form which you can obtain from the Head of the post-primary school he or she will attend. Do not apply unless you are sure that the child is eligible on age and distance grounds.

Eligible pupils at present attending post-primary schools should apply for an application form now to their school head.

Eligible pupils intending to commence a Leaving Certificate Course next year at a centre other than that in which they studied for their Intermediate Certificate should apply for an application form now to the head of their new school.

The parent or guardian must in each case complete the declaration on the application form and return it to the school head not later than Friday, 19th May, 1972. Transport arrangements will be based on the total applications for transport as on that date. Late applicants may have to wait several weeks after the schools reopen in September before transport can be provided for them. Make sure, therefore, that you apply in time.

(Continued)

ST. AUGUSTINE'S COLLEGE: 1948 - 1972

In 1948, Fr. Nicholas Duffner came back as Rector. His first task, like that of a great predecessor, Fr. Williams, demanded great courage, the task of extending the college. In fact, Fr. Duffner resembled Fr. Williams in more ways than one: as an administrator, as a builder, as a man of vision, and, foremost of all, as a zealous priest. Having acquired the property known as Moloney's corn store and stables, he set about re-constructing this huge fabric. Michael Keane, a native of Dungarvan, was his choice of architect. To the credit of both men working hand in hand, they succeeded in making "a silk purse out of a sow's ear"; a new and extensive wing emerged from the shell of the old store, consisting of dormitories for 100 boys, refectory, kitchen, locker rooms and a magnificent concert-hall, fully equipped with all modern accessories. Faced with the immense problem of meeting the debt thus incurred, Fr. Duffner brought all his energy to bear on reducing it and in less than four years had shorn it down.

During those years, he continued to guide the college through a period of academic progress and success in all spheres of education in the broadest sense — spiritual, cultural, intellectual and physical. No aspect of a boy's education was neglected. The college's first opera, "H.M.S. Pinafore" was successfully staged in 1951 in the new concert hall. Various other cultural activities were encouraged under his guidance, while the discipline of the school was in the capable hand of Fr. Vincent Lyons.

In those years, too, the college reached a very high standard in Gaelic football in Munster and also in athletics, due to the enthusiasm of Fr. Lyons, who had as his able assistants, Frs. Michael Leahy and Otteran O'Keefe. The number of boarders had increased by 50% with the addition of the new wing. Successes were apparent also in the academic sphere, while the extraordinary increase in the number of vocations to priesthood was a sure proof that the spiritual side of education was being equally well attended to.

On being elected Provincial in 1954, Fr. Duffner was succeeded by Fr. Geary as Rector for the next three years. The great impetus given to education by Fr. Duffner in the school from 1948 to 1954 continued into the sixties and has brought the college to its present state. A new and unprecedented system of discipline in this country was introduced into the Friary in 1957. Known as the Prefect System, it transfers much of the discipline to senior boys called Prefects. For this purpose the school is divided into three or four zones with a priest, called a Housemaster, in charge of each zone or House. He is not a dean of discipline but rather a father figure or counsellor to the pupils and guide to the prefects. With the increase in the number of pupils from 120 boarders (in 1957) to 162 (in 1965) and from 20 day pupils to 130 in 1972, extra facilities for games were needed. Two basketball-cum-tennis courts were laid in 1960, cross-country competitions were introduced and all grades of hurling and football encouraged, while, in more recent times, soccer rugby have been added to the list.

An event of significance not only for the College but also for the town was the ordination to the Priesthood of four students (three past-pupils and a local C.B.S. boy) in the Friary Church two years ago. This was the second ordination ceremony to take place in the Friary. (1) Frs. Michael Brennan, Pat Moran and Brendan McDonnell came back to the Friary to be raised to the Priesthood, together with Dungarvan-born Fr. Padraig Daly. It is worth recording, too, that the Friary was, for at least three years (1936-39), a house of formation and studies for clerical students. Thirteen of our students having returned from Rome because of ill-health, were housed in rooms over Millar's shop and Williams's offices in Main St. Some were even ordained from there in the Cathedral in Waterford. They were taught theology and philosophy by the priests in the Friary.

In 1967, Fr. O'Mahoney, Provincial, gave reality to a hope long-cherished in the minds of many Rectors and priests of the Province over the years, when he proposed to build a new college. This was an undertaking that only a man of almost superhuman courage could face, yet Fr. O'Mahoney, with a determination characteristic of him, set about the work with the utmost confidence. A suitable site was chosen and work was commenced in April 1970. By September, 1972, the new college will be ready for the official opening. The end of an era had come. Now as we departure to "fresh fields and pastures new," the Friary college can look back with justifiable pride on the achievements of a century in education and the Order on its service for almost seven centuries for the people of West Waterford. "Forsitan et haec olim meminisse juvabit." (2).

THE FRIARY AND THE FOREIGN MISSIONS

There is no record of any foreign mission activity by the Irish Augustinians until the middle of the last century. With the appointment of Dr. Gould O.S.A. (Cork) as first Bishop of Melbourne in 1847, our missionary work really begins. Dr. Gould invited a number of his brethren in the Irish Province out to help him in his work. One of the first to volunteer was Fr. Matthew Downing, who was Prior in Dungarvan from 1843 to 1847. A couple of years later (when he was Provincial Councillor), he left Ireland for Tasmania. There he became chaplain to Irish convicts for three years. After serving in various parishes throughout the diocese, he eventually became Archdeacon of Melbourne and died in 1870.

The next link between Australia and the Friary was the appointment of Dr. Hutchinson, O.S.A., as Vicar Apostolic of Cooktown. He had spent a short time in Dungarvan and, while here, got to know and appreciate the work of the Mercy Sisters. He came back in 1888 to invite them to North Queensland, to initiate what was to be, under Providence, a most fruitful apostolate in the Church of the Antipodes. One of the early pioneers of the Australian Bushland was Fr. Joe Phelan (a pupil from 1896-99) after his ordination in 1906, he was sent to N. Australia. Soon he became a famous builder. Churches, schools, convents and presbyteries sprang up like mushrooms all over the Vicariate. In those days, he had to

trek long distances on horse-back over dust roads or ford through swollen streams to supply Mass or confessions, or even to answer sick-calls. Often he travelled for hours before taking breakfast to celebrate a second Mass in some distant Mission station. He returned to Ireland in 1949 (after 43 years in the "Bush") and for the last 23 years has been attached to Limerick Friary. In a chat I had recently with him, he recalled those far-off days that seem to our generation so remote and primitive. He reminisced, too, on his years at the Friary where he had as one of his fellow-classesmates the late Canon Hammersley, P.P., Goleen.

In 1914, Dr. John Heavey, who had been prior and teacher in the Friary up to 1907, became Bishop of Cairns. He invited out more Sisters of Mercy and postulants to help him in schools and hospitals throughout his vast diocese. Many past pupils of the first decades of this century, among them Mr. Pat Coffey from Dungarvan, went to the Australian Mission.

THE NIGERIAN MISSIONS

Around the years 1911-1914, two small boys, who were destined to start a momentous venture in the Irish Augustinian Province, wended their way each morning to school at the Friary. Tom Cooney from Carriglea and Tom Whyte from Monard. They had as contemporaries at the Friary, two other boys, who were to implement the work begun by them. John O'Donoghue from Knockmaune and Denis Redmond from Mullinahone. It was in the year 1938 that Fr. Cooney, as Provincial (with Fr. Whyte as Secretary) promptly responded to a request from the Congregation of Propaganda Fide to open a Mission-field in Northern Nigeria. This area was well known to be a particularly difficult one since it was governed and peopled mainly by Muslims, who are notoriously fanatical in matters of religion. Fr. Cooney accepted of three of his brethren to reconnoitre the area with a view to establishing a Mission Station: Fr. Denis Redmond (who had by this time spent several years on the Australian Mission), Fr. Paddy Dalton (a former Friary boy also, and later Bishop) and Fr. Gabriel Broder (from London). Another veteran of the Australian "Bush", Fr. Luke Maddock, together with Fr. Berkie Power had visited Southern Nigeria earlier in the year and remained for a few months.

Thus, a link was forged that bound together the pioneers of the Australian "Bush" with the pioneer priests of Nigeria, covering a span of almost a century. "Incomprehensible are the ways of God" says the Psalmist. This new venture opened up fresh horizons for the Augustinians in Ireland; from 1938 onwards, there was an upsurge of vocations in our schools and the boys of the Friary responding wholeheartedly to the call of the Missions. Fr. John O'Donoghue succeeded Fr. Cooney as Provincial in 1939 and continued the work of his predecessor. Among the first to volunteer for Africa was another native of Dungarvan, and a C.B.S. boy, Fr. Jim Harnett. He was joined by many Friary past pupils among whom were Frs. Kevin Cullen (Wexford), Joe Fitzsimons (Athenry), Eddie Roche (Cork), Jim Martin and John O'Connor (Limerick) and Brendan Kennedy (Dublin).

In 1946, the first past-pupil from the Decies to arrive in Nigeria was Fr. Michael Flynn (from Ring). Fr. Michael recently celebrated the Silver Jubilee of his priestly work among the coloured people. For some years he has been in charge of a Major Seminary for clerical students from many dioceses. Last year saw the first fruits of his great work coming to maturity when seven young African students from his seminary were raised to the Priesthood. This year, he will have the added pleasure of seeing two from his own diocese of Yola, among others, ordained. Attached to

his teaching staff are three ex-Friary boys: Fr. Denis Mason (Cappoquin), Fr. Seamus Downey (from near Bantry) and Fr. Michael Fitzgerald (Ballylanders).

In 1962, the Prefecture of Yola was raised to the status of a diocese, with Fr. Paddy Dalton as its first Bishop. Demands continued to be made for more and more priests as the number of converts increased especially among the wonderful Ibo people. The call reverberated throughout the entire Province and the Friary College had to sacrifice some of its best teachers: Fr. P. J. O'Keefe (Waterford City), to take charge of a large secondary school; Fr. Senan O'Donnell (Wexford) to be President of a Teachers' Training College, Frs. Sean Slattery (Meath), Gabriel Stibbles (Dundee) and Ailbe Brennan (Dublin) to teach. A former Prior, Fr. John Coffey became Vicar Provincial (for Nigeria). Another past pupil, Fr. Michael Sexton (Timoleague) is Rector of a Minor Seminary (for aspirants from different dioceses), while Fr. Kevin Cullen (Wexford), a former veteran who recently returned there, has special apostolate in the training of married deacons. An old colleague of his, Fr. John O'Connor is now Vicar-General of Maiduguri Diocese.

Over the past 33 years, forty past pupils (among them two lay brothers, John O'Connell, Ballymacoda, and Michael O'Halloran, Knocknagree, including 15 from Co. Waterford alone, have played an important part in building up the Church in our two dioceses of Yola and Maiduguri. (3). Dungarvan is represented to-day by Frs. John Gough and Pat McCarthy, both C.B.S. boys, Abbeyside by Fr. Dan Kelleher, who is Rector of yet another Secondary School; Af-fane by Fr. Dick Fitzpatrick; Stradbally by Fr. Michael O'Flynn, and Touraneena by Fr. Jim Kiely. Is it any wonder that the people of West Waterford are so attached to our Foreign Missions. Some-where, too, in the heart of Yola, far from his native Kilmacthomas, lie the mortal remains of Fr. John Butler who died in 1959 at the early age of 28. Go dtugaidh Dia suaimhneas siorraí d'a anam.

THE SISTERS OF MERCY

Eighty one years had slipped by since Dr. Hutchinson issued an invitation to the Sisters of Mercy to help him in Australia. Now in 1969, for the second time in the history of the Friary, the call went out again to the Mercy Sisters from another Augustinian Bishop, (Dr. Dalton) to assist him in Africa. The response again was wholehearted. The Mother Superior, Sister Rosario, was overwhelmed by the response of her community to the invitation, so she arranged for three volunteer Sisters from her own convent to join another Sister from their Convent in Waterford to set out for Africa. The Departure Ceremony was truly a memorable one. The Bishop of the Diocese, Dr. Michael Russell, presented a Mission Cross to each of the Sisters and to three Augustinian priests and a lay-brother, during a Con-celebrated Mass. With the departure of Sisters Philomena Kelly, Gerard Flynn, Joseph Sheehy, Emmanuel Ahearne and more recently, Sr. Augustine Foley, another chapter has been added to the history of the Friars in Dungarvan and their close association with the Foreign Missions.

REFERENCES

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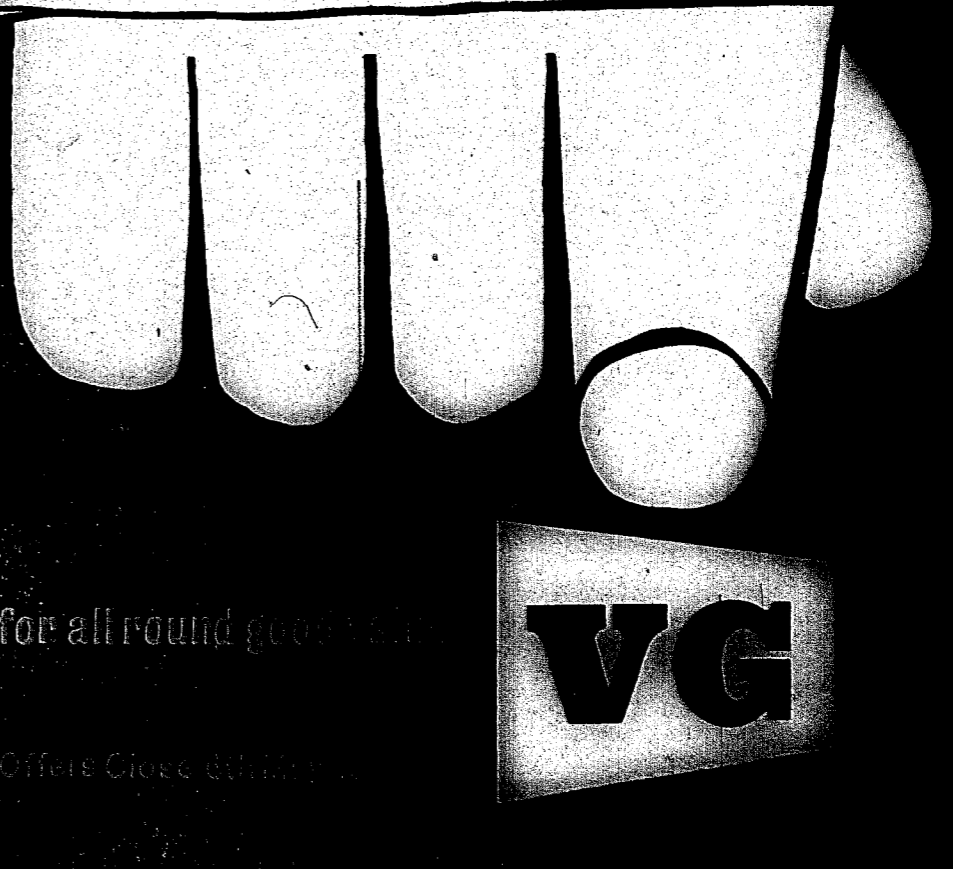

THE STORY OF OUR LADY'S VISIT TO KNOCK
At about 8 o'clock on the memorable evening of the 21st August, 1879, Our Lady, St. Joseph and St. John the Evangelist appeared at the south gable of the church at Knock; beside them a little to the right was an altar with a cross and the figure of a lamb.

The Apparition was seen by fifteen people, young and old, who watched it for two hours in pouring rain and recited the Rosary. It was so real that an old lady, Brigid Trench, went up to the gable and tried to kiss the feet of Our Lady.

Most Rev. Dr. John McHale, Archbishop of Tuam, only six weeks after the Apparition set up a Commission of Inquiry. Fifteen witnesses were examined and the Commission reported that the "testimony of all, taken as a whole, was trustworthy and satisfactory."

Archbishop Gilmartin set up a Commission in 1936 to examine the three surviving witnesses of the Apparition. Mrs. Mary O'Connell (Mary Byrne) Patrick Byrne and John Curry. All three confirmed their original statement of 1879. Mrs. O'Connell gave evidence under oath from her death bed and at the end of her statement she added: "I am quite clear about everything I have said and I make this statement knowing I am going before my God."

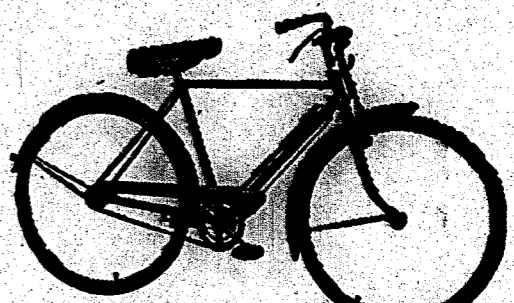

Dungarvan Fianna Fail Dinner-Dance

Mr. David Andrews, T.D., Parliamentary Secretary to the Taoiseach, speaking at the annual dinner of Fianna Fail Comhairle Ceannair, at Lawlor's Hotel, Dungarvan, on Thursday, 20th inst., spoke of the important role which Irish Trade Unions have to play in the European Community.

The International Confederation of Free Trade Unions (I.C.F.T.U.) and the World Federation of Trade Unions (W.C.T.U.) favour this enlargement of the E.E.C. They believe that the influence of Trade Unionism in future development of Europe will be strengthened by the addition of the Trade Union Movements of countries like Ireland. Indeed leaders of these great trade union movements had expressed their amazement at the attitude of the Community of some trade union interest here in Ireland.

Trade Unionists in Ireland share the same interests in making European institutions more democratic, the same objective of full employment and better employment and the same political attitudes towards the development of Community policies in the social and industrial relations fields.

Speaking of the beauty of the town and its surroundings, Mr. Andrews made mention of the great employment potential of the Waterford Co-Operative Society, Dungarvan Leathers Ltd., Waterford Glass, Pflizers, Dungarvan Sand and Gravel Ltd. Most of these very successful industries were export orientated and membership of the E.E.C. was vital to their even greater expansion and hence the flourishing of the viability of Dungarvan as a great industrial, agricultural and tourist area.

The agricultural community, farmers, small and middle, believe that the future of their interests lies in full membership of a greater Europe, and common increase in prosperity lead to the fruits of the intensive campaign of the people—a classless society.

THE STORY OF OUR LADY'S VISIT TO KNOCK

At about 8 o'clock on the memorable evening of the 21st August, 1879. Our Lady, St. Joseph and St. John the Evangelist appeared at the south gable of the church at Knock; beside them a little to the right was an altar with a cross and the figure of a lamb.

The Apparition was seen by fifteen people, young and old who watched it for two hours in pouring rain and recited the Rosary. It was so real that an old lady, Bridget Trench, went up to the gable and tried to kiss the feet of Our Lady.

Most Rev. Dr. John McHale, Archbishop of Tuam, only six weeks after the Apparition set up a Commission of Inquiry. Fifteen witnesses were examined and the Commission reported that the "testimony of all, taken as a whole was trustworthy and satisfactory."

Archbishop Gilmartin set up a Commission in 1936 to examine the three surviving witnesses of the Apparition, Mrs. Mary O'Connell (Mary Byrne), Patrick Byrne and John Curry. All three confirmed their original statement of 1879. Mrs. O'Connell gave evidence under oath from her death bed and at the end of her statement she added: "I am quite clear about everything I have said and I make this statement knowing I am going before my God."

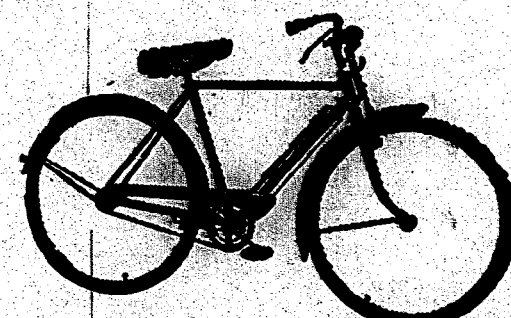
