The E.E.C. - Fact and Fiction

Many people may not know that the case against entry to the E.E.C. is fundamentally dishonest and seems to be based on the concept that if a lie is repeated often enough it will be accepted by some. Many people, not knowing enough about the facts, are unable to distinguish between fact and fiction. I would suggest to these people to assess the standing of those for and against.

The following are for entry to the E.E.C. — the two main political parties, the Federation of Irish Industry, the Chambers of Commerce, Macra na Feirme, Irish Farmers Association, Irish Creamery Milk Suppliers Assoc., Muinir na Tíre, the Co-Operative Movement and the Livestock Mart. These are all responsible bodies and it isn't by accident that they all support entry for theirs is an informed decision.

Against we have the Labour Party, the Trade Union Movement with notable exceptions amounting to 40%, Sinn Fein and a scattering of other elements. It isn't too difficult to decide whom to believe.

The main points at issue are . . . JOBS. If we

don't go in, the Home Market cannot maintain present employment, the English Market will be closed to our export industries. Workers can no longer freely go to England for a job. If we go in, there will be some dislocation of jobs but this can be put right. All parts of Ireland will qualify for generous E.E.C. grants to help establish new industry plus our own established incentives.

SOVEREIGNTY — We will gain sovereignty by having a say in the Council of the E.E.C.

AGRICULTURE — If we go in we gain an assured Market, good prices, 20p per gallon of milk and generous help for small farmers. If we stay out, we have no market, 4 or 5p for milk and extinction for small farmer.

THE BORDER becomes irrelevant if we join as social services and incomes on both sides level up. Outside the E.E.C. it will become permanent as the North prospers and we become poorer. Our culture and way of life will not be affected; this is a matter for ourselves alone. The experience of small nations who have been members for 15 years has been good.

There has been no wholesale take-over of land etc, as suggested by some, might happen here.

Food prices vary in the E.E.C., dear in Germany and Italy, only 2½% dearer than here in Holland. In fact meat in Ireland has already reached E.E.C. levels.

So, things are not as bad as seem to be, but remember well, there will be no second chance for voting for entry. The Danes will not want us competing on the British Market and can veto a second application. Neither is the Labour Party alternative of association as easy as they would have you believe. Austria is 11 years negotiating one and is still without it. Can we wait 11 years?

This is not a choice between 'Yes' for entry and 'No' to ~~the~~ To vote 'No' is to invite a situation we have never had before. Sensible people will vote 'YES'.

Augustinians In Dungarvan

1292 - 1972

(By REV. T. C. BUTLER, O.S.A.)

(Continued)

DUCKSPOOL HOUSE:

1790-1970

a) Its Past

The purchase of Duckspool House in 1969 evokes a curiosity about the origins and history of this imposing Georgian mansion. Built by George Boate about the year 1790, its history reflects in miniature the history of the county and of the country in general. Originally part of the Nugent-Humble Estate which covered over 4,000 acres in this part of the county with its centre at Cloncoskeran, it was built on a farm of about 140 acres. The Nugents were of Norman stock and are reputed to have been benefactors of the Abbey in the 13th cent. They married into the Humble family around 1750 (1).

George Boate retained the house until his death in 1812. The Beate family then left Duckspool and went to live in the neighbouring house at Tournore (also part of the estate). An advertisement appeared in the Waterford newspapers early in 1814 offering the house and demesne of Duckspool to let for a term of 13 years.

The Galwey Family The next tenant was John Matthew Galwey. Since the year 1800, the Galweys were the most influential Catholic merchants in Dungarvan. They were engaged in the corn, butter and bacon business and, like most big merchants of those days, they owned their own sailing ships. Between 1800 and 1814, when the Napoleonic War was at its height, John Galwey's father, William, was at the head of the business, so the danger to his merchant ships was always a real one. In the "Waterford Mirror" for Feb. 2nd, 1807, we read that Mr. Galwey's sloop "The Happy Couple," left Dungarvan for Portsmouth laden with a cargo of oats, pork and butter, but had been captured by a French privateer a day or two after she had sailed. Her ultimate fate is not known. The sloop of those days was a rather small vessel with a single mast and rigged somewhat like the yawl or yacht of today.

The 1826 Election The years 1814 to 1820 were years of Catholic agitation concerned with the rights of Catholics to education, to hold property, to enter the professions and to have freedom to practice their religion. In short, they agitated for a relaxation of the Penal Code. They found their champion and leader in Daniel O'Connell. In 1823, he founded the Catholic Association with the object of making it an organisation of the whole people and not merely of the upper classes. Branches were formed all over the country. John Galwey took an active part in the work of the Association by organising a branch in Dungarvan. The fruits of his

work, inspired by O'Connell's leadership, were to be put to the test in 1826. An election was due to take place in Co. Waterford, the candidates being Lord George Beresford and Henry Villiers Stuart. The Beresford family had held the representation of Waterford for over 70 years. "Nothing could more strongly mark the degradation of the Catholics than the conduct of Waterford under the Beresfords. Though the constituency was almost exclusively Catholic, the representative chosen was almost invariably an Orangeman" (2). The Catholics found that, at best, they had a champion in Villiers Stuart, who was a supporter of liberal principles and friendly to their cause.

On New Year's Day, 1826, John M. Galwey gave a magnificent banquet at his residence (Duckspool) to the Bishop, Dr. Kelly, and about 35 priests and leading laymen. The dinner was held in connection with the forthcoming election. It was one of many such banquets given for the cause. The result of the election was a victory for Villiers-Stuart and the Catholic cause, a victory which paved the way for the great Clare election of 1828 when O'Connell himself was elected.

In July 1830, there was another election in Co. Waterford. Daniel O'Connell was proposed as one of the three candidates for the two seats. T. S. was the first occasion for him to visit Dungarvan. He was met at Cusheen (Pike) outside the town by John M. Galwey, who wore a multi-coloured costume and a conical hat, for which he was famous, and drove his own carriage. O'Connell got out of his carriage and into that of Mr. Galwey, went to Dungarvan where he spoke and then returned with Galwey to Duckspool House. He remained there that night and next day issued an Election Manifesto to the people of Co. Waterford (dated July 25th). Duckspool, thus, has the distinction of being the only residence in the county from which O'Connell issued an election address. The two other candidates were Robert Wyse and George Beresford. The liberal (or Catholic) interest in the county was not sufficiently powerful to elect two Catholics, so Wyse resigned his place and O'Connell and Beresford were returned. Next to his return for Clare (in 1828), O'Connell considered his return for Co. Waterford as the most memorable incident in his life.

Another Election In December of 1832, the English Parliament was dissolved and an election followed. Since 1826, the Borough of Dungarvan had been represented in the English Parliament by George Lamb, an Englishman and brother of Lord Melbourne. O'Connell's choice of a repeal candidate for Dungarvan fell on his old friend, follower and one-time host, J. M. Galwey. So important was that election that O'Connell came specially to Dungarvan to support the repeal candidate. He stayed at Duckspool as before. Mr. Lamb, the anti-repeal candidate, was proposed by Sir John Nugent-Humble and seconded by Fr. Doran, P.P. of Dungarvan (afterwards Bishop of the Diocese). Both Humble and Fr. Doran had supported O'Connell up to Catholic Emancipation, but no further. The two curates in Dungarvan also supported Lamb. Feelings ran very high in the election. The voting went very heavily against Galwey on this occasion, and even O'Connell's reception in the town was one of the worst he ever received in Ireland.

Immediately after Galwey's defeat, it was arranged by the Repealers that he should stand for the county, and Sir Richard Musgrave retired in his favour. The other County candidates were Robert Power and Sir Richard Keane of Cappoquin. Power tried hard to get Galwey to withdraw his candidature but failed. The election began and went on from day to day in the slow manner of elections in those days. The outcome was that Galwey and Keane were elected, Galwey comfortably topping the poll. (3).

On Good Friday evening, April 26th, 1842, John M. Galwey passed away after returning from devotions in the new Parish Church of Dungarvan. He was buried outside the wall of the old Abbey ruin at Abbeyside. His widow and family continued to reside at Duckspool until 1847.

It was next taken by P. C. Howley, the Resident Magistrate, and in 1852 it passed to Richard Hudson. In 1858, the Boate Estate was sold under the Encumbered Estates Act. At that sale, Duckspool and Tournore with 140 acres were bought by Roger Baker. He resided there until 1868 when it passed for a short time to other owners. It was vacant for nearly 40 years, except for a brief spell when it was occupied during the "Tan War."

In 1928, the late Joe Moloney bought it and renovated it. He kept a magnificent garden, with apple and pear trees, green houses for tomatoes and tropical plants, and many other fruit trees. In a letter I received from Mrs. J. Moloney, she states: "We used to sweep the boards at the local Shows. Our black grapes were famous. We made that garden and the grounds out of a wilderness... Galwey's Lane, off Main St., was called after J. M. Galwey, and it was he who owned 'Moloney's premises'."

Mrs. Moloney left it in 1955 and moved to Dublin. The next occupant was Mr. Gordon. In 1961, a German family called Lange moved in to Duckspool House. It remained in their possession until it was purchased by the Augustinians in 1969.

The house is a three-storey building with an annex at the rear. It consists of two large rooms on each floor, with the annex consisting of kitchen, pantry, small diningroom on ground floor, and two bedrooms and bathroom upstairs.

b) DUCKSPOOL HOUSE: Its Future The future of Duckspool depends on the future trend of education in the country. Here we were confronted with a gigantic undertaking, the building of a huge complex at a prohibitive cost, to cater for boarding and day-pupils. Since the plans were first drawn up three years ago, the educational system has undergone catastrophic changes, e.g. free transport, free tuition, and comprehensive schools. Is Duckspool already out of date? Has the system changed too rapidly to allow for development of such buildings?

The new St. Augustine's College has been planned to meet these changes. It will cater for pupils of all shades of ability and aptitudes. Whether a pupil may wish to follow a course in economics, art or science, whether his aptitude is for manual skills, such as woodwork, or, on the other hand, if he has a flair for languages, classical or modern, he will find in the new Friary school facilities to suit his tastes.

The College is divided into five main blocks:— a) Classroom section, comprising nine basic class-

rooms, Physics and Chemistry laboratories, Arts & Crafts, Woodwork & Metalwork, language laboratory, a Library and a Geography room.

b) Dining Block four diningrooms, two kitchens, kitchen prep. areas, domestic staff quarters comprising 14 private rooms and an infirmary.

c) Administration area: offices for headmaster, bursar and secretary, staff room, reference library, parlours.

d) Recreation block: gymnasium, assembly-hall, locker rooms, etc., hobby rooms, swimming-pool.

e) Dormitory section: four large dormitories fitted with cubicles, 14 private rooms for senior boys, housemasters' rooms and hangerooms.

In addition, there is also a Boys' Chapel and, of course, Duckspool House itself, now the residence of eight priests. Playing fields comprise 40 acres, and, when completed, will have four main pitches, with a special track for athletics. This, then, is to be the new St. Augustine's. Just as the "Friary" in the past imparted to every boy a liberal training that fitted him out not merely "for the life of business, but for the business of life," so let us hope that the new "Friary" will turn out boys who will be "sufficiently alive and elastic to master every craft to which they may be called, whether the craft of farmer, teacher, diplomat, soldier or the subtle and many-sided craft of the missionary" in other lands or that of the pastoral priest among his own people. (4)

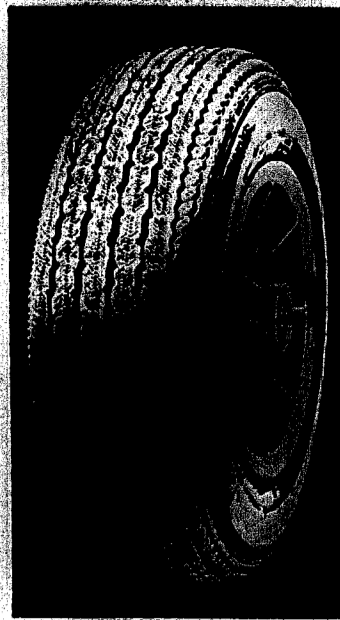

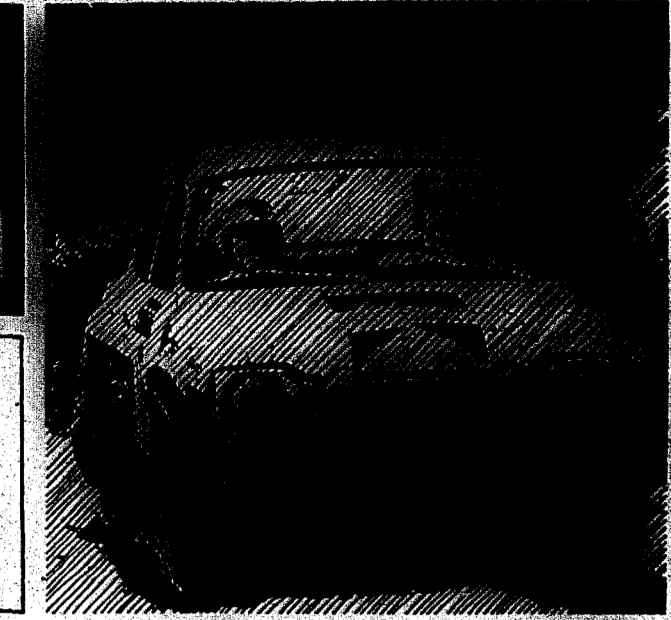

FRIARY P.P.U. ANNUAL RE-UNION

Secretary, E. O. Cathain (Dungarvan).

For the first time in the Union's history, a dinner-dance closed proceedings. This was an enormous success and all present were enthusiastic in their approval of the well-

come innovation. In particular, Mr. Tom Lordan welcomed the ladies on behalf of the P.P.U. Michael Veale, in the course of his speech, expressed the hope the Friary priests would still retain the old Friary traditions; he welcomed the new College, and the improved facilities it offered, but hoped that the Friary spirit would not disappear in the new surroundings.


