LATE JOHN O'DEA

Ex-Garda Sergt. Cappoquin

The death took place of Ex-garda Sergeant John (Jack) O'Dea, at his residence, Strandside South, Abbeyside, last week-end after a very brief illness. Deceased was a native of Middleton and a member of a highly esteemed East Cork family.

Deceased served in Mooncoin and Knocktopher, before coming to Dungarvan in 1936. He was appointed Sergeant in Cappoquin in 1961 where he served until his retirement two years ago. He was scrupulously impartial in all his dealing with the public for which he won the respect and esteem of all.

A keen G.A.A. supporter he was one of the principal officers of the Old Boro club in their halcyon days of the late thirties, forties and fifties and he always had a soft spot for the Rebel County.

Large and representative gatherings attended the removal of the remains to Abbeyside Parish Church on Saturday evening and Mass and the subsequent funeral to Ballinroad for interment on Sunday.

Very Rev. Fr. Farrell, P.P. Rev. Fr. Walsh C.C. and Rev. M. Enright C.C. officiated.

The chief mourners were: Mrs. Ellen O'Dea (wife); Liam, John and Jimmy (sons); Mrs. Hardiman, Dublin; Joan and Kathleen (daughters); Mrs. Kelleher Middleton (sister); Robert, Maurice, Teddie and Gerard (brothers).

Union Deputation Wants Local Labour Employed

A deputation from the local branch of the Amalgamated Transport and General Workers Union consisting of Messrs. J. Byrne, Chairman; P. J. Breen, Secretary; and John Kiely came before Monday night's meeting of Dungarvan Urban Council to protest that local labour was not being employed on the Council's sewerage scheme at Abbeyside.

Mr. J. Byrne said they wanted to voice the strongest possible protest to the fact that local labour was not being employed on the sewerage scheme despite the fact that it was being financed by the ratepayers of the town.

Mr. P. J. Breen said representation should be made to the contracting firms by the Council. There were many unemployed men in town who would have welcome employment on this scheme.

Mr. John Kiely said there were 90 unemployed men in the town and 15 men had been brought in from outside on this scheme.

In reply to Colr. Whelan who asked was there a clause in the contract that local labour should be employed, the Co. Manager said there was not, the only condition being that they pay trade union wages. The Co. Manager went on to point out there were two sides to the coin; very often Dungarvan contractor obtained contracts outside the town and they brought their own work force with them.

Colr. Wade said he asked the foreman if he would employ local labour and got the reply that if he wanted men he knew where to get them. We should have a clause that local men should be employed he continued. Dungarvan is a haven for any contractor. It was something that wouldn't be tolerated in any other town.

Mr. Byrne said their branch secretary had written on several occasions to the sewerage scheme contractor about employing local men but hadn't received even the courtesy of a reply.

HOUSING SCHEME
The Acting Town Clerk, Mr. B. White, said at Monday night's meeting that the Architect was going ahead

with plans for 20 3-bedroomed and 10 4-bedroomed houses at Quanns on a six-acre section there which could be developed and serviced at the lowest cost. When these plans were ready they would be submitted to the Council.

DOWN MEMORY LANE

Dungarvan G.A.A. Club have a long and storied existence going back to the days of the famed Hops and Rovers. It has been generally accepted in Gaelic circles down the years that Dungarvan has been and is today the heart of Gaelic Waterford.

It could boast of one of the best G.A.A. grounds in Ireland at Shandon and what memories this bastion of Gaelic evokes. Many great Gaels have been associated with the club as administrators and players. It came through difficult periods successfully. One has only to go back to the days of the war of independence when many members were on the run or in goal and quite a few were interned at Ballykinlar, including Dungarvan and Ireland's greatest Gael, the late Dan Fraher (R.I.P.) who, few knew, helped to purchase Croke Park.

Many memorials commemorate Gaels at Croke Park, yet this great Gael's memory remains unhonoured and unsung at Croke Park. I fear I am disgracing.

Gaels spoke with pride of the Blues. Players such as Michael Cahill, Mike McGrath, Fr. Roger Walsh. Later years I recall being told about the feats of Taffy Connors, brother of the late Mickey Connors of honoured memory, who donned the Waterford colours with distinction for many years. Michael "Fisher" Whelan was another outstanding player. He was starting for Waterford round 1915. His well-known brother, Pax Whelan, played a big part in guiding the destinies of the club.

I well recall Dungarvan meeting Clashmore in the semi-final of the Waterford senior football championship. Pax had been on a long hunger strike in the 20's at Wormwood Scrubs and on his release came back after a few days rest. He turned out with his brother "Fisher" to give a great display. Clashmore won a great game.

The senior final that year was the best I ever witnessed. The finalists were Clashmore and Rathgormack. It was a cracking pace from the start that day. Clashmore had great players in Cal Keane, Richeen Tobin, Patsy Torpy, Barron, Mulcahy and Fr. Hannon. Rathgormack won this game. I recall their stars Curry and Tyler Norris. The pity is one only rarely sees games like those today.

Around this period Dungarvan and Aglish played some great games, usually at Whitechurch. Dungarvan had a star goalkeeper in Monnie Noonan. I also recall Willie Sandford who was a wonderful player and entertainer. Others I recall were Lugs Loughlin—a wonderful footballer, Fox Greany—the best forward I ever saw in the county, Eddie McCarthy, Joe Wyse, Jimmy Barron, Jack, Pats and Phil O'Donnell, Paddy "Buckeen" Byrnes, Bill Organ, Paddy Fraher, Johnny Callaghan, Pat Condon.

In later years outstanding players such as Dec Goode and Christy Moylan were blazing the trail, Mickey Clancy (now in U.S.A.), Tommy Parsons, whom we all knew as "The Clog"—Tommy was a wonderful footballer; Jimmy Mountain, Eddie Fitzgerald, Andrew Sandford, Paddy Dooley, Mick Foley, Tom (Murray) Mahoney, Eddie Hayes, Jim (Bepo) Keohan, Johnny Murphy, Nick Noonan, Gus Noonan, La Noonan, Fr. Paddy Noonan, Vin Morrissey, Seamus Hayes, Eddie Hayes, Pa-keen Whelan, Garda Jim Furlong Wexford and a host of others. Others who rendered great service to the club were the late Jim Foley, Jimmy Lyons, Michael (Pinchers) Duggan, Tommy Boyle.

Yes, those were golden days for Dungarvan Gaels. It was my pleasure to see some great football matches between local town rivals—The Minors and Wasps. The Minors were led by Lugs Loughlin and Jimmy Barron, a local baker, and the Wasps were composed of star footballers such as Jim Keohan, Tommy Butler and local celebrity "Lord" Duggan and Cossack Kiely in later years.

The late Mick Arrigan of Tipperary fame played for them and they crowned all their effort by winning the town league in 1928. I know that Lord Duggan, over a drink, always regales me with the fame of the Wasps.

Yes, Dungarvan have won many titles, but I think their greatest achievement was in defeating a star T. F. Meaghers team at Waterford in the early 20's, as Meaghers were king-pins of Waterford hurling at that period. Meaghers could boast of hurlers such as my old friend Dotty Power (R.I.P.) Dotty was a hurler par excellence. I still believe it was on the 1938

Waterford team we would have beaten Dublin in the final.

I recall a few amusing incidents away back in the middle 20's. Waterford were playing Kerry in the hurling league late on Friday evening. A telegram intended for Lord Duggan to travel to Tralee was delivered in Dungarvan. Another Dungarvan player received the wire by mistake, but Lord to this day still talks about it.

Old Boro Gael recently wrote of a great game between Briceys and Fenor played at Fraher Park in 1928. Yes, it was a thrilling game. I spent a Sunday afternoon in 1947 at Fraher Park watching two Waterford junior football teams, who shall be nameless, keep us all enthralled, excited and amused. Backs and forwards were out of the question wherever the ball went the teams went. Men crashed, all in good sporting manner. Time was running out with neither side able to score. Dead on time the victors were acclaimed reminding one of a Greek saga, when the ball hopped off one of the player's shoulders over the bar. When the white flag went up, Fraher Park erupted with cheering that could be heard at Mizzen Head. That great Dungarvan character, Jack Wyse, who was on the line with me, said he had seen many games, but for sheer amusement and thrills he thought this game was memorable. Sad to relate Jack has now crossed the great divide.

It will not be out of place to record the great service rendered by the Wyse family to the Dungarvan Club. Also no record of the Dungarvan Club would be complete without a tribute to Paul Lannon, who played for the Blues for many years. Paul in later years trained Dungarvan and county teams.

Another great Dungarvan stalwart was Mickey Landers (now mine host in Dungarvan town). The Landers family were generous to teams playing at Ballinroad. Their ground was always available and they never charged for use of their ground—great Gaels.

Tipperary's great football team of the years 1917, '18 and '19, always trained at Dungarvan previous to finals. They always stayed at McCanthy's Hotel, O'Connell St. They were looked after whilst training at Fraher Park by sterling Dungarvan Gael Jack Murphy, now located at St. Joseph's hospital, Dungarvan hospital, Dungan van. P.J.'s Jack struck up a great friendship with Tipperary footballer Michael Hogan, who was killed by Crown Forces at Croke Park in 1920.

Dungarvan, around this time, had wonderful men like Johnny Byrne, Dan Hanrahan, Tommy Hackett, Jack Murphy, Tom Francis Morrissey and that veteran Dungarvan Gael John Broderick and last but not least Bob Tutty, who worked on the turnstiles at Fraher Park. Bob, God rest his soul never kept a Gael outside the ground if money was inadequate. Great Gaels all. As readers will understand, it would be impossible to mention all connected with the Old Boro Club. In passing I share with all other local Gaels the hope that the Fraher field will be retained by the Gaels of Waterford.

I quote the following lines, written many years ago, on Munster hurling final played at the Shandon Ground, Dungarvan, in August 1913:—

"'Twas on an Autumn day and the sun shone down, With a cheerful ray, o'er the seaside own,

And dense the crowd that thronged them there, And joyous the shouts that rent the air.

For there were gathered our country's pride, From Lee, Suir and Shannon side And came they too from Sarsfield's town, And forth from the Shadow of Knockmeakdown. E'en from the West were gathered there,

Young men and comely maidens fair And with anxious step and eager pace, Hurried they on to the trysting place, For here today in contest fleet, Tipperary's best and Cork will meet Here beneath the Comeraghs frown, Their's cross camans for the Munster crown."

In conclusion it is good to know that the Gaelic standard still proudly floats over Dungarvan town.
