Villierstown, the picturesque West Waterford village, will have a major attraction for dancing fans from 26th May to 11th June inclusive.

A top-line dancing programme, featuring several of the big names in the Irish entertainment world, is being sponsored by Mr. and Mrs. Joe Gray who operate An Cruiscin Lan, a local public-house which is already well known over a wide area. Since their arrival in Villierstown, a relatively short time ago, Mr. and Mrs. Gray have embarked on a vigorous programme of expansion aimed at making An Cruiscin Lan one of the leading businesses of its kind in the county. Construction is currently in progress to enlarge lounge space and to provide modern toilet facilities for customers. Meals and snacks are readily available on the premises and there are facilities to cater for all types of social occasions and functions. Bed and breakfast accommodation is also available.

In planning the forthcoming festival of dancing, high standards have been observed. Both Mr. and Mrs. Gray are experienced in the operation of marquee dancing and the fruits of this experience are evident in the present venture. Dancing will take place in a 600 feet by 60 feet fireproof marquee which will have an independent lighting system. An additional attraction is the Co. Waterford heat of Miss Honda Teen Ireland, 1972, which takes place on June 11th, the last night of the dancing festival in association with Ardree Promotions. Three girls will be chosen at each dance during the festival and all the girls chosen in this manner will then participate in the heat on June 11.

Apartment from annual gala events organised by local committees, this dancing festival is perhaps the largest entertainment venture ever to be undertaken in the village. The sponsors of the event have made every effort possible to ensure that it will be highly successful and in doing so, they are reflecting the progressive mood which has become evident in the village in recent years.

It is obvious that Villierstown has considerable potential as far as tourism is concerned. In a setting of great natural beauty, it can provide the holidaymaker with all that

The winner of this heat will receive a cup, crown and sash and will go on to participate in the national final. Candidates will be judged on the basis of general appearance, scholastic achievement and accomplishment, services performed on behalf of civic and or charitable organisations; poise and beauty and ability to communicate ideas. Candidates must be Irish and born of Irish parents. They must also be single and under 19 years of age on July 31st, 1972. Over-age candidates will be disqualified and it should be noted that birth certificates must be produced on request at the National final.

Prizes at the National final include a Honda scooter, a trip to Berlin (all expenses paid) for the International Teen-Princess Pageant on July 6th-12th, Revlon cosmetics, wardrobe of clothes, modelling course etc.

The judge for the Co. Waterford heat on July 11th at Villierstown will be Miss Thelma Mansfield, the well-known Telefis Eireann announcer.

A big step forward in the development of the village, was taken last year when the reconstruction of Dromana Bridge was completed and the bridge became available to road users. This modern structure replaced an old bridge which has been closed to all vehicular traffic for some time before the construction of the new bridge actually began. It is confidently hoped that the new bridge will enhance the prospects of Villierstown in tourism, as it provides access to a route well worth travelling if one is in search of scenic beauty. Indeed, the route between

Cappoquin and Youghal, via Villierstown should become a favourite with many tourists within a short time. If local achievements can be regarded as an indication of local ability and enterprise, one can confidently expect that any opportunities presented to the community in the future, will be fully availed of. Indeed, a great deal of credit is due to local enterprise that the village has reached its present stage of development. Every effort is being made to provide amenities for residents and visitors alike. In the past fifteen years, significant steps have been taken to ensure that the village would be developed in every possible way.

In the 1960s, the theme of development was accentuated by the building of a hall in the village and by the formation of committees to further policies of development in several spheres. The establishment, in October, 1969, of Villierstown Handicrafts—a cooperative enterprise which produces knitted, crochet and tapestry products—contributed to overall development and helped to publicise the village and enhance its image.

As far as tourism is concerned, any publicity gained will probably prove to be helpful. Catering for the tourist and providing entertainment for the general public are business which are, in several ways, inextricably linked. If we view the situation in this light, it would seem that Villierstown is a natural choice for an event such as this festival of dancing. The sponsors of this event are displaying a keen awareness of the potential of the village as a location for entertainment and it is more than likely that their confidence in this respect will be justified.

(b) Brucellosis in Cattle (Movement Control) (Supplementary Provisions) (Amendment) Order, 1972

The Minister for Agriculture and Fisheries has made two Orders, entitled as above.

The Order at (a) which is operative from 25th May, 1972 by amending the Brucellosis in Cattle (Disease-Free Area) Order, 1968, adds County Mayo to the Brucellosis Disease-Free Area and extends the existing controls on the movement of animals in the Area with regard to restricted herds and to public sales to include all female animals regardless of age.

By amending the Brucellosis in Cattle (Movement Control) (Supplementary Provisions) Order, 1971, extends to Co. Meath the controls which already apply in Counties Longford, Louth, Roscommon, Westmeath and the portion of Co. Cavan lying north and west of the River Brosna.

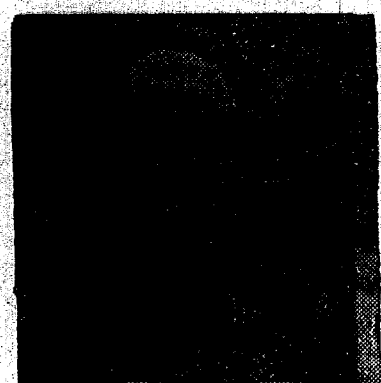

Late Very Rev Peter F. Walsh



It is with deep regret we record the death of Very Rev. Peter F. Walsh, P.P., Touraneena and Nire, who died on Friday evening, May 19th, at the Medical Missionaries of Mary, Clonmel, after a brief illness but at the ripe age of eighty four years. 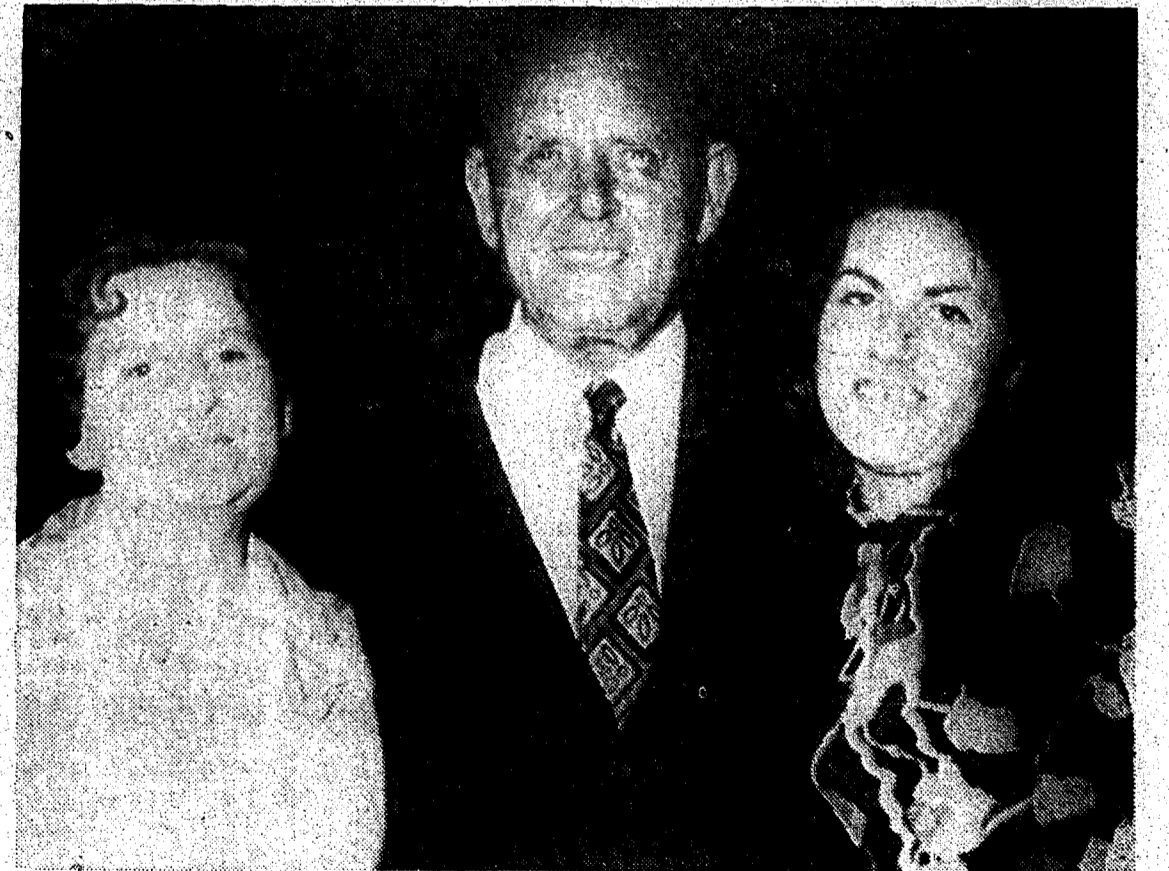

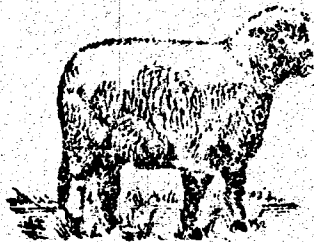

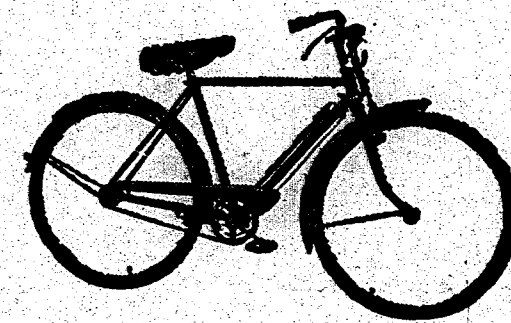

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LISMORE

By Octogenarian JOHN O'REGAN

In 1775 Lismore Bridge was erected by the fifth Duke and it might interest County Councilors and others that the cost was 9,000. In 1814 the castle was practically rebuilt and the Carlisle Tower was added to it in 1856. The foundation stone was laid by George, 7th Earl of Carlisle. In April 1869, Prince Arthur Patrick, Duke of Connaught visited Lismore on which occasion a grand ball was given by the Duke of Devonshire. Later on the castle was honoured by the temporary residence of H.R.H. the Duke of York. King Edward VII was also the guest of the Duke at the start of the present century. About 1902 '03, Lismore had given birth to many eminent persons including the Hon. Robert Boyle the Philosopher, the Earl of Orrery, the Mathematician; D. B. Dunne, one time secretary of the Royal University; Mrs. E. A. Walsh, author of the "Joint Adventure"; Julia Crotty, author of "Neighbours"; Rev. Dr. Ahern; Charles Smith the historian; W. H. Gratian Flood, the composer; Patrick O'Shea of the Carl Rosa Opera Company; Maurice Neely, the lawyer; M. P. Edward Downing, chief of inspection under the national board; Miss F. E. Currey, the watercolour painter.

The historic recollections of Lismore are not confined to its ancient renown as a literary institution or the fame of its castle. Here, according to Matthew Paris, Henry II first promulgated English law in Ireland in 1172. After landing in Waterford he marched to this place where he was met by the Chiefs of Munster who with the Archbishops, Bishops and Abbots of Ireland swore allegiance and gave him charter confirming the Kingdom of Ireland to him and his heirs for ever. The record of this important transaction are both scanty and contradictory but the weight of evidence goes to prove that the Irish Prelates on this occasion sacrificed the independence of their country to a foreign monarch, on condition of having their ecclesiastical privileges maintained against the usurpation of the Irish chieftains. The Reformation of religion was the pretence offered in the Bulls of Popes Adrian and Alexander for granting the sovereignty of Ireland to the monarch of England and this reformation was interpreted by the Prelates to mean investing their order with the same political power in Ireland which it possessed in England. The eagerness of the clergy to tender allegiance to Henry in Waterford, Lismore and Cashel strongly confirms the assertion that the English sovereignty was sought by the hierarchy, and this is indeed subsequently asserted by their body in complaints of the violation of the contract addressed to the Court of Rome. Matthew Paris expressly declares that the terms on which Henry was to obtain the sovereignty of Ireland was arranged in a synod or council in Lismore, the bishop of which See was the Pope's legate.

Lismore, as the place where the compact which gave Ireland to English rule was made, will excite different reflections in different minds, but its historical associations, however various, must be equally interesting to all. The Cathedral Church is close to the Castle; the approach is from the town through an avenue with a fine row of trees. It is the only remaining ancient church of all formerly here. "Some say as many as twenty" and was dedicated to Carthage. This sacred edifice was often in considerable danger. In 1173 when Raymond Le Gros and Strongbow laid waste the Decies country, they extorted a large sum of money from the then bishop to prevent the Cathedral from being burned. The great care bestowed did not always avail, windows of the ch choir are of its sustained considerable damage in Elizabeth's reign from Edmund Fitzgibbon called the White Knight, so called most probably from the colour of his armour. It was restored in 1683 at the expense of the Earl of Cork. The entrance is at the extremity of the southern transept, under a pure Norman arch. The windows of the choir are of stained glass and the bishop's throne and prebend stalls son, was preached by Bishop William Fitzgerald of Ross. By 1884 the grand edifice was completed and the dedication ceremony took place on

others. Among the most striking are the tablets to the memory of Archbishop Ryan and Dean Scott. One ancient tomb, inscribed to the family of MacGrath, dated 1548, is richly sculptured. On the side stones are figures of the apostles in bas-relief, the upper stone is divided into compartments, time has nearly obliterated the design and inscription. Contrary to popular belief, Milar McGrath is not buried in Lismore but in Cashel. Near the Church are two small caves and one is the temporary residence of H.R.H. the Duke of York. King Edward VII was also the guest of the Duke at the start of the present century. About 1902 '03, Lismore had given birth to many eminent persons including the Hon. Robert Boyle the Philosopher, the Earl of Orrery, the Mathematician; D. B. Dunne, one time secretary of the Royal University; Mrs. E. A. Walsh, author of the "Joint Adventure"; Julia Crotty, author of "Neighbours"; Rev. Dr. Ahern; Charles Smith the historian; W. H. 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Another beautiful residence is Flower Hill once the mansion of Barry Drew Esq. Opposite is a tastefully planted demesne and handsome house, Fortwilliam, which before my time was the seat of J. Gumbleton Esq. and not far from this are the ruins of the castle of Ballygarron, one of the three forts built by Richard Boyle, afterwards created Earl of Cork. Glencairn Abbey, once the seat of the Bushe family, later occupied by the Right Honourable Dr. Keating, Judge of the Prerogative Court as his summer residence. It now belongs to the Cistercian Nuns, an affiliation of Mount Melleray. St. Carthage's Parish Church, Lismore, is a beautiful and harmonious building in roman-arch style and appropriately windows of the ch choir are of its sustained considerable damage in Elizabeth's reign from Edmund Fitzgibbon called the White Knight, so called most probably from the colour of his armour. It was restored in 1683 at the expense of the Earl of Cork. The entrance is at the extremity of the southern transept, under a pure Norman arch. The building is 140 feet long by 95 feet wide at the transepts with a campanile 120 feet high in North Italian style within, monolithic columns of red Aberdeen granite with Portland stone capitals carrying the arches between nave and aisles. The architect was Walter Doolin and the builders Messrs. Redmond of Wexford.


Late Mrs. Bridget Dennehy (Nee White)
