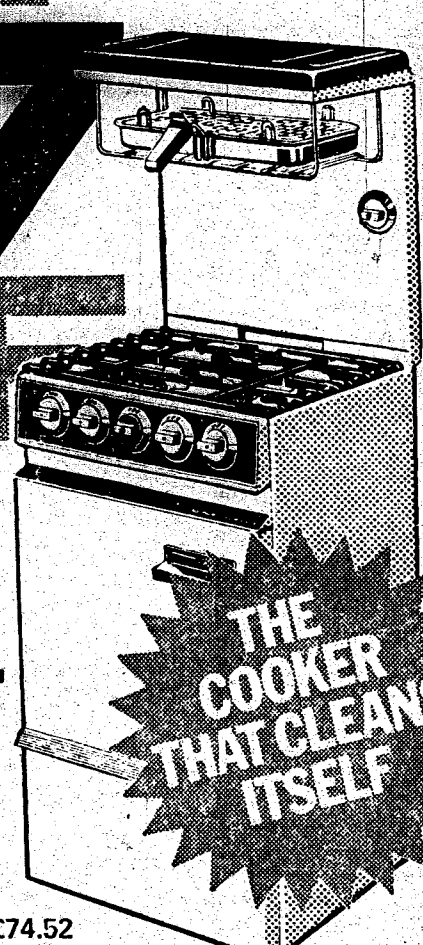

HORTICULTURAL GRANTS SCHEME

The Minister for Agriculture and Fisheries announces the introduction with effect from 2nd June of a scheme of grants for:—
(a) approved accommodation and equipment for the storage, grading and packing for market of apples and onions,
(b) approved irrigation equipment for soft fruit, vegetables and outdoor nursery crops,
(c) the formation of horticultural producer groups and for the development of group activity for the production and marketing of horticultural crops.

The grants which are subject to maximum are at the rate of 33 1/3% of approved costs in the case of (a) and (b) and 33 1/3 to 50 per cent in the case of (c) depending on the nature of the item involved.
Details of the scheme and application forms may be obtained from the Secretary, Department of Agriculture and Fisheries, Section 4, Dublin 2.

NOXIOUS WEEDS ACT, 1936

Owners and occupiers of land are advised to destroy noxious weeds (thistle, ragwort, dock, common barberry and the male wild hop plant) Weed control and eradication should be undertaken in time to prevent seeding. Advice on methods of control and eradication can be obtained from the local Agricultural Instructor.

It may be said they are not available. That is not true. Men have to go to Waterford for work and the Urban Council has plenty of work for them.
 Nowadays we hear a lot about all the men that are going to the Labour Ex-change. Yet there are two two sewerage schemes going on in the town sponsored by the Urban Council and not one local man employed on them. I have worked on sewerage schemes and local labour got first preference on them. It is being said the men em-ployed on them by the con-tractor are key men. CONTROLS ON MOVEMENT OF CATTLE

As from 1st June, 1972

FEMALE ANIMALS OF 12 MONTHS UPWARDS AND BULLS OF 9 MONTHS UPWARDS MAY NOT BE MOVED INTO COUNTY MEATH UNLESS THEY ARE

- moving under permit direct from a Brucellosis (Certified) Herd, a similar herd in the Six Counties or a clear herd in the Disease Free Area (Counties Cavan, Donegal, Leitrim, Mayo, Monaghan and Sligo)
- OR
- moving direct from another part of the Brucellosis Clearance Area (viz. Counties Longford, Louth, Roscommon, Westmeath and the portion of Co. Offaly lying north and west of the River Brosna) accompanied by the relevant brucellosis yellow cards
- OR
- accompanied by an official certificate that each has passed a brucellosis test within the previous 14 days
- OR
- moving under permit direct to a registered slaughtering premises, or to a destination outside the county.

The necessary permits and certificates are issued by the District Veterinary Offices of the Department of Agriculture and Fisheries or in appropriate cases by the Ministry of Agriculture in Belfast.

Anyone who infringes the controls is liable to prosecution and a heavy fine.

LISMORE

By Octogenarian JOHN O'REGAN

The "Great" Earl of Cork

To revert back to the building of the school in Ballysaggart, folklore records that as Father Fogarty was looking for a site to build his school, he met with bigoted opposition from the local landlord and it is recorded that on one occasion the landlord told his workman that the next time he saw Fr. Fogarty coming up the road he was to tell him immediately. On the next occasion that workman told the landlord that the priest was coming up the road, he told the workman to bring out his gun loaded but as the priest was passing, his eyesight failed him and so Fr. Fogarty escaped.

Distinguished names who were either born or had special associations with Lismore would fill many columns but as we have already mentioned famous ecclesiastics, to these we must now add a few laymen of note — some of whom played a prominent part in Lismore history; all of whom reflect honour on their place of birth, abode or burial.

Richard Boyle who died Earl of Cork in 1643 is so closely bound up with Lismore that, in local historic résumés, he rivals Mochuda himself. In the Castle precincts one almost expects to meet him around the next corner or walking on "the terraces" attended by his faithful Thomas Badnedy and attired in his black cloth cloak laced with fine satin laces embroidered. He was born at Canerbury in England and in his 22nd year came to Ireland in search of fortune. Being a young man of ability and push, he quickly overtook and even outstripped the fortune he pursued. Indeed fortunes were not hard to win by adventure in the unfortunate Ireland of that age and Richard Boyle would have won in most places in any age. It must be admitted that unlike most of his class, Boyle gave something of his land in exchange for what he took. He was none too scrupulous in his Irish dealings and acquisitions, but he was generous of gifts and mild bribes. When he landed in Dublin he had just £27 in his pocket. Before his death he had become the richest man in Ireland. His first Irish employment was in a Government office where his task was the drafting of legal conveyances and other such public documents. Here he acquired a knowledge of law which stood him a staunch friend in later years. Here too, he learned where and how Irish land might be acquired at nominal rates or picked up for nothing at all.

His opportunities enabled him to purchase—and almost for the proverbial song—Sir Walter Raleigh's enormous estate of over 42,000 plantation acres with its wealth of tillage and pasture, woods, minerals and not to speak of towns like Lismore and Youghal. To give Boyle his due, he developed his Irish property, of which he saw, as did few of his contemporaries, the latent potentialities. He cut it into areas from 500 to 1,000 acres which he leased to English settlers who, in turn, subdivided and resold to English working tenants. He built farmsteads and bridges (Cappoquin, Tallow, Coona and Fermoy) houses and even towns like Bandonbridge, Cappoquin and Tallow. He worked mines of iron, lead copper and silver at Lisfinny, Araglen, Helvick, Ardmore, Ballygarron, Cappoquin, Killahalla, etc. erected smelting works, refineries, foundries etc. at Cappoquin and Tallow, besides developing fisheries (deep sea and inland) linen weaving, tanneries and salt-works. He made knives, scythes, reaping hooks, metal pots and presumably other articles of husbandry and household use at Ballinacray and Tallow and cast cannon at Cappoquin. It is estimated that his ironworks alone brought him in £100,000 (equal to more than a million in modern currency). He could well afford to pay a single fine of £150,000—imposed on him for illegal appropriation of Church property in Youghal. A single order in pipes/ars ran to over a million finished pieces and another deal (in agricultural produce) was for 3,000 sheep. Boyle's wealth was added to by confiscated church property of which he secured a

lion's share, warships, sea-wrecks, felons goods, dead-ends and strays. In the mid-seventeenth century war, Boyle himself defended Youghal against the Irish, while his son, Lord Broghill held Lismore which, however, the Irish captured and burned. He hated the Catholics and when he became Lord Justice vicariously with his son-in-law, Vincent Loftus in 1629. Almost his first use of the Sword of State was against them. He took office on Oct. 25th and exactly a month from that date, he notes with satisfaction that he "had ransacked the house of fryers in Dublin." On January 1st following, he records that he has committed to the Castle on Patrick Cahill, Priest, for having "Seales of Office" graven in Dublin for "Patrick Ridley, the Primste, and on Jan. 19th, he congratulates himself on his success in "suppressing the idolatrous houses in Dublin." Later still Boyle boasts (to himself) of having arrested the high-born members of a Dublin convent, of having forced them to walk through the streets and of having (unsuccessfully) opposed the proposal to return them to their home by horse carriage when walking would have been so much greater humiliation. (From his Diary.)

The poor Earl himself must have suffered the extreme of humiliation when in 1630 his son-in-law to be, the Lord Viscount Barry (Barrymore) insisted on being married by a priest, although the Earl had his own brother, the pseudo-bishop of Waterford, present at the ceremony. Resulting soreness was hardly eased through subsequent baptism of the marriage issue by "Preest Darby Quinlan" of Lismore.

The Great Earl had places of residence in Lismore, Youghal, Dublin, London and Stallbridge, Dorsetshire. It was at Youghal that he died September, 1643, in his 76th year and he was buried within St. Mary's Protestant (formerly Catholic) Church in the ugly tomb which he had himself designed and erected. Though of prodigious appropriating capacity, Boyle could be generous of cash and service. God was constantly on his tongue and on the tip of his pen. Yet he held unlawfully an

enormous amount of church property. He did much for the material welfare of his adopted country, though he had no love for its people and hated their religion. He had been called an unscrupulous statesman and personally a hypocrite and his piety was certainly rather of old than new Testament type. Boyle's Plantation was unusually successful and premanent. Even to the present day the number of Dorset and Devon names quoted in the "Diary" and still to be found up and down the Lismore-Youghal region of former Boyle domination, is remarkable.

Probably the astute Earl secured a better than usual class of colonist for his fat and fertile lands. Anyhow, the Plantation prospered and, being Protestant and English, it was hardly disturbed at all in the subsequent Cromwellian settlement. Despite his pre-occupation with affairs of State and private business, the Earl found time for outdoor sports that illustrate the times — hawking, deer hunting and even chase of the wolf along the base and up the sides of Knockmealdown. In the Diary are references by the score to goshawks, tarcels and genets, to imports of deer and export of wolf-dogs and to his deeparks at Lismore, Park (near Youghal) and Ardmore. The parks at Lismore and Ardmore are still enclosed by stone walls but the enclosure at Park was by oaken posts which had been floated forty miles down the Blackwater from O'Callaghan's country — Duhallo. It is probable that the enclosure at Park was reserved mainly for horses, of which the Earl bred great number. The Earl is, possibly the last reference to the wolf in Ireland.

Robert Boyle, son of the Earl of Cork and father of modern chemistry, was an even more distinguished man than his "great" father. His excellence, moreover, was of a different and higher order. He was born at Lismore in January, 1627 — the 14th child of the Great Earl. An infant prodigy, Robert, as a child of eight, spoke French and Latin as well as English.

Cashmore was once the site of a big distillery, which operated until 1857, in which years it produced 20,000 gallons of whiskey. It was owned by the Denehy family. Part of the walls is still standing while the main chimney is in an excellent state of preservation and is a local landmark. Its broad base is of limestone while the chimney proper is constructed of brick. In the village are the ruins of an old Protestant Church which building was constructed in 1818, when the number of persons attending service there was 42. The old tower of the church is still preserved.

Tragic Fire

At Ballynoe

A 33-year-old woman died with four of her children and her elderly aunt because she refused to jump to safety while still inside her burning house last week-end. It happened at the village of Ballynoe near Tallow, and four hours later firemen found the family huddled in two groups in the gutted house.

Mrs. Annie McAuliffe, her children, Catherine (9), Dan (8), William (4) and Mark five months, and her 84-year-old aunt, Mrs. Annie McAuliffe, were lost in the blaze which swept through the home, a licensed premises.

Mrs. McAuliffe's husband, Bill (35) a farmer and publican, and his children, Marie (6) and Matthew (3) who escaped are staying with relatives in the village. Mr. McAuliffe suffered burns in his attempt to get from the house to summon help. He was said to be severely shocked.

Tragedy struck Ballynoe when everybody was asleep. Next door neighbour Mrs. Kathleen Walsh was aroused by her sister who smelt smoke. At that time Mr. McAuliffe was still inside the house.

A local girl, Mary McCarthy (25) and her boy friend John Hartly (27) who were returning from a dance in Fermoy, were first on the scene. Mary McCarthy saw the children's mother at one of the windows. She handed down two of the children into their arms. She went back for the others but that was the last they saw of her.

Miss McCarthy rushed to the local Garda station and Fermoy fire brigade was called. They were joined by units from Mitchelstown and Youghal. Firemen were almost helpless because of the intense heat which scorched houses across the street.

Rev. Richard Hegarty, C.C., and dozens of villagers stood and watched the huge blaze. They recited the Rosary many times during the hours that followed until the bodies were located and taken to the church.

PLEA BY HUSBAND

People told of the scene at the early stages of the blaze when Mr. McAuliffe jumped 12 feet to the ground and then begged his wife to follow him. Instead she went back into the room apparently to locate the rest of her family.

Mrs. McAuliffe was standing at one window and her husband at the other. The mother threw one of the children down to us before I rushed to get help. When we first stopped there, the fire was at one side of the house only, but when I came back it had spread right through in a matter of minutes. It was a most terrible experience.

Late Catherine Hally

Deep feelings of sincere regret were expressed at the news of the death of Miss Catherine (Kate) Hally, Knockenpower, Colligan, who died early on Saturday morning June 3rd at her residence after a rather brief illness but at the allotted span.

The deceased was a most lovable person and was the possessor of many outstanding qualities which endeared her to her legions of life-long friends. She was a kind and a most charitable person.

To her sorrowing brother, Tom and to her many relatives deep sympathy is extended.

Shoppers' Metric Conversion Chart
