Co. Council Agree to Salary Increases

Salary increases for various grades of employees of Waterford County Council were unanimously approved of at the June meeting of the council in Dungarvan. In some instances, the increases will carry more than two years retrospective pay. Those benefiting under the revisions are the county accountant, staff officers, rent and rate collectors, engineers, office assistants, foremen, storekeeper and second fire officer.

The County Manager Mr. C. A. O'Connor, said they were subject to the approval of the Minister for Local Government. Mr. K. O'Ryan said as one who had consistently opposed these exorbitant increases, he was taking a different stand on this occasion. He believed the increases were the fault of their national legislators, who had set the ball rolling by looking for increases for themselves of more than £1,000 a year. It was difficult then to blame the ordinary workers for seeking pay revisions.

Traders Win S.A. Competition

Dungarvan Traders team emerged as thrilling winners of the O. Bowman Perpetual Trophy and replicas with a total catch of 413 lbs. of fish in the first ever inter-firms Deep Sea Angling competition. The competition, organised jointly by Dungarvan S.A.C. and the inter-firms committee was favoured by pleasant weather conditions and created quite an amount of local interest. The Traders team fished close to the shore where a hundred of pollock, some in excess of 15 lbs were landed. Runner-up with 300 were Waterford Co-Op, while Waterford Glass with 87 lbs. were third. Hard luck story of the day was that favourites Dungarvan Leathers and outsiders, Public Bodies failed to reach the fishing grounds due to engine trouble.

The winning team comprising of MI. Moloney (capt.), Sev. Baumann, Frank O'Beirne, Martin Landers, Frank Mulcahy and John Morrissey will now represent Dungarvan S.A.C. at future angling competitions.

All competitors were guests of Dungarvan S.A.C. at a function sponsored by Lawlors Hotel and R. A. Merry & Co. at the Angling Centre where Mr. Nicholas Cleary, Chairman Dungarvan S.A.C. presented the prizes.

Urgent Need for Paediatric Unit at Ardkeen

The urgent need for the immediate establishment of a paediatric unit in Waterford city was stressed at Monday's meeting of Waterford County Council.

Mr. W. Kenneally T.D. said that already one clinic had gastroenteritis and it was died in Waterford city from only through the grace of God that they had not two more infant deaths from the same cause recently. A paediatric unit, separate altogether from Ardkeen Hospital was urgently needed in the City and the County Council should use all its powers to obtain nothing less than that.

Mr. C. Curran, one of the Council's two representatives on the South Eastern Regional Health Board supported Deputy Kenneally and said a suggested temporary unit was not satisfactory as far as the Health Board was finally on the proposal of concerned.

Mr. Curran, seconded by Deputy Kenneally it was agreed unanimously to call on the Minister for Health to take up a separate paediatric unit in Ardkeen Hospital and that a paediatrician and supporting staff be assigned to it "as a matter of extreme urgency."

Dept. Sanctions Group Water Schemes

Widespread dissatisfaction at the rate of progress in the provision of minor water supply schemes throughout the county was expressed by members of Waterford County Council at Monday's meeting. A report from the County Engineer Mr. J.D. Hally, B.E. outlined details of proposed group schemes which had been sanctioned by the Department of Local Government and would cost an estimated £48,000.

In a scathing attack on the water supply in the Cappoquin-Lismore region, Mr. H. R. Dowd said that every dry spell of weather heralded a chronic water shortage in the area. In addition there were a number of major leaks in the scheme which resulted in a wastage of thousands of gallons of much needed water.

It was finally agreed to raise a sum of £50,000 to commence work on the schemes presented by Mr. Hally.

National Wages Agreement

I have read with interest statements by Officials of the I.C.T.U. that there is an attempt in the proposed new National Wage Agreement to narrow the gap between higher and lower paid workers. They must be joking. The facts are clear for all workers to see for themselves. Under the first phase of the P.N.N.W.A. (Proposed New National Wage Agreement) workers earning basic weekly pay of £25 or under will receive £22.25 per week increase. This group of wage earners are unquestionably those referred to as the lower paid workers and officials fare under this proposed new agreement? I include a few examples:

Basic pay per week	Increase per week
£25 or under	£2.25
£30.00	£2.70
£35.00	£3.07
£40.00	£3.45
£50.00	£3.85
£60.00	£4.25
£70.00	£4.65
£80.00	£5.05

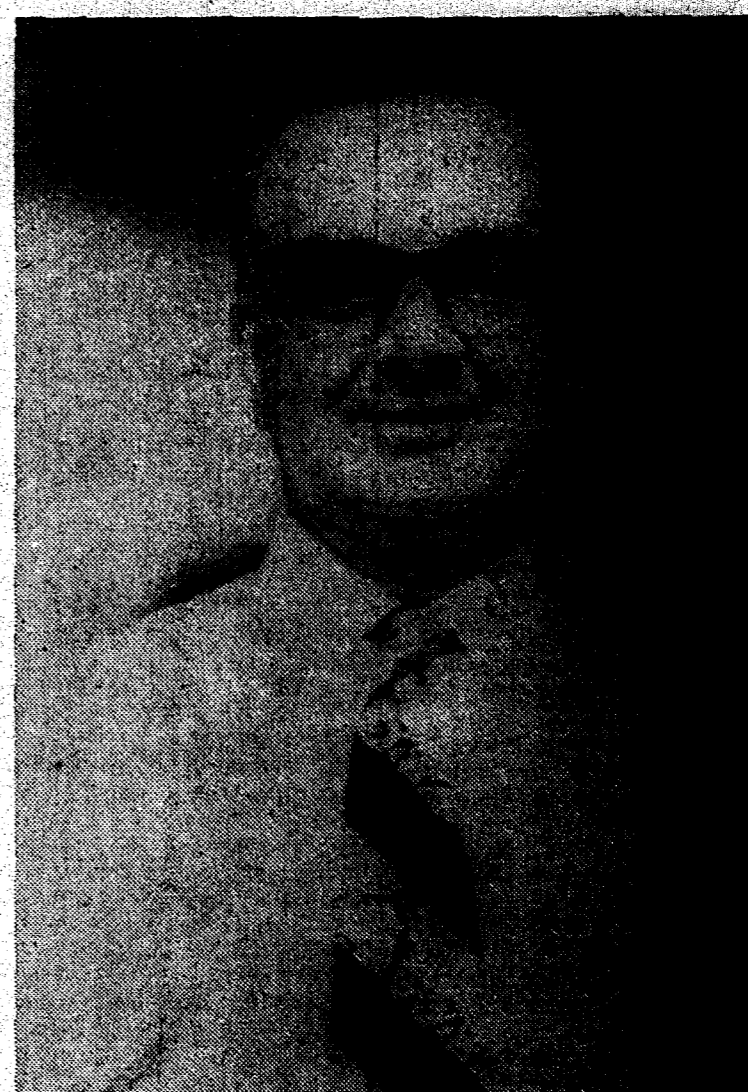
These examples clearly show that the gap between the lower and higher paid workers will in fact once again be widened as percentage increases always favour the higher paid. Surely our Congress officials must be aware of this.

Other clauses in this proposed agreement which leave much to be desired, as in the previous one, are those dealing with "Conditions of Employment" and "Incentive Payment Schemes."

Ray Treacy had to endure the disappointment of finishing 4th in the senior 200 metres steeplechase but he never came to grips with the water jump which caused many a headache during the afternoon-ground every time at the water and this in the end proved to be his downfall. Liam Hennessey of St. Augustine's College did very well to take 3rd place in the junior pole vault and once again he showed his undoubted ability to make it to the top.

Nuclear Development

There has been a certain amount of newspaper speculation on the question of a site for a nuclear power station in this country. The Government has not yet taken any decision regarding a nuclear station nor has the E.S.B. made any recommendation to them on the matter. The E.S.B. however, is continuing its studies and will submit its conclusions to the Government in due course. It is understood that no decision will be taken until the Government has considered all aspects of the matter and has reached a conclusion that a nuclear station is necessary and practical.

Site investigations have been carried out by the E.S.B. at Salterstown, Co. Louth, Carnore, Co. Wexford, Whiting Bay, Co. Waterford; Esker, Co. Sligo, and near Kilrush, Co. Clare. It should not be concluded, however, that if a nuclear station is being built it will be sited in one of these areas as the decision of the Government will be based not alone on the expert advice of the E.S.B. but also on that of the Nuclear Energy Board which has yet to be established, and it will have regard to social considerations also before a final decision is reached.

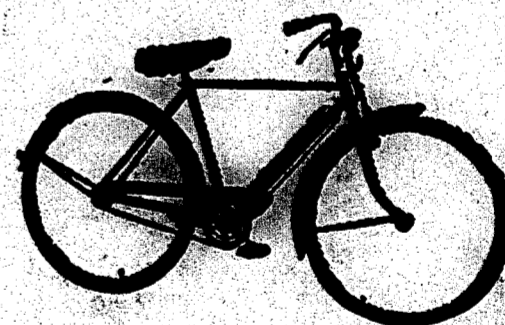

LISMORE

By Octogenarian JOHN O'REGAN

Robert Boyle, son of the Earl of Cork and father of modern chemistry, was educated by private tuition and at Eton. At an early age he made a tour of Europe spending a year or more in study at Geneva while he resided at Forence in 1641 when Galileo died there. The event sent Boyle to study the great astronomer's works with the result that his mind received a distinctively scientific, combined with theological trend. By 1645 he had become in London the centre of a philosophic coterie which later developed into the Royal Society. Thence forward—for the rest of his life—he devoted himself entirely to the study of natural science and made many important discoveries in, among other things, the properties of air and sound and in chemistry. His interests were by no means confined to science; he thought much and deeply on theological matters. Having extracted the secrets of earth, air and water, animal and vegetable life, he died in London in September, 1691, at the age of 65. For his age and upbringing, Robert Boyle was pious, kindly and tolerant. His best known works are "New Experiments" and "Seraphic Love." His somewhat heavy style has been satirised by Swift in his "Pious Meditations on a Broomstick." By his will he endowed the Boyle Lectures to demonstrate Christian truth against Atheists, Pagans, Jews, and Mahomedans. It is to be expensed of publishing an Irish translation of the Old and New Testaments. Some lines, quoted by Smith, will bear quotation in this context:—

Lismore, long since the muse's ancient seat. Of piety and learning the retreat. Her Alma Mater shone as bright as noon. As Oxford, Cambridge or the great Bourbonne. Time shifts the scene. No longer now she boasts. Her churches, colleges and learned hosts, nature, propitious to the favourite soil. Restored her losses with the birth of Boyle. Centred in him her ancient splendour shone. Who made all arts and sciences his own. Roger Boyle was an elder brother of Robert. He was born in Lismore, acquired some fame as a soldier and statesman and became Earl of Orrery.

Thomas Carthage Walsh was a relative or connection of John and Michael Paul Walsh, who were both Capponquin poets of no mean standing. Among John Walsh's racy ballads was "The Old Cornerstone." "A Capponquin Girl," "Hamrock" and "Lismore." One of his most popular ballads was "I wish I were home in Ireland" which has been erroneously ascribed to Dalton Williams and it was actually included in the first edition of the latter's poems.

Thomas Carthage Walsh was born in Lismore in 1855 and

went to school in his native town with Messrs. Timothy and Maurice Healy. Before his emigration to America in 1886 he had written verse for various Dublin papers and in America he wrote for "The Sunday Democrat," "The World," "The Daily News," and "The Catholic Times."

Major Henry Eeles, a resident of Lismore for many years, was a fairly well-known scientist of the late 18th century, who specialised in the study of electricity. On this subject he published a now forgotten volume in 1771. By his will he was buried on the summit of the Knockmeal-down where the mountain at 2,700 feet overlooks the Blackwater valley and even the heights of Drum beyond. The popular tale that he was buried with his dog and gun is a picturesque fabrication.

Timothy M. Healy's name is so well known that its mention at once brings to mind one of the outstanding Irishmen of the century—Advocate, Politician, writer, orator and, it may be added, wit. Though not actually a native of Lismore he was brought thither at the age of three and was educated in the local school and moulded by Lismore air. At the age of thirty, he was called to the Irish Bar in 1869. He sat in the British Parliament as member successively for Waterford, Monaghan and Longford. He is author of "Stolen Uster," "The Great Fraud of Ulster," "Letters and Leaders of my Day." Tim Healy was probably best known as a master of extempore banter and satire. Upon establishment of the Irish Free State he became its first Governor General, 1922-27. He died in 1929 and lies buried in Glasnevin.

Maurice Healy, younger brother of Tim, was born in Bahrty, Co. Cork, but like his brother, he was brought up and schooled in Lismore. Like his brother, too, he adopted Law as a profession, with politics as a side line. He represented Cork City in the British Parliament and died in 1923.

William Henry Gratton Flood, a well-known writer of Irish music and history, first saw the light at Lismore in 1839. He was therefore in his 69th year at the date of his death in 1908. His best known works are "History of Irish Music" (1905), "Story of the Bagpipe" (1911), "History of Ennisceorthy" (1898), "History of the Diocese of Ferns" (1916). There are a few minor books and in addition, he contributed articles and notes to the leading Catholic magazines and Irish Historical journals—"The Irish Theological Quarterly," "Ave Maria," "Studies," "The Musical Times," etc. Possessed of a phenomenal memory, Dr. Gratton Flood had stored up from his wide reading a prodigious amount of musical and Irish historical data. He moved to Ennisceorthy in 1895 to become organist of the Cathedral there.

In that town he lived for the remaining 35 years of his life. The National University of Ireland had offered him with the degree of Mus. Doctor and The Pope had made him a Knight of St. Gregory and given him the title of Chevalier besides bestowing on him the Cross—Pro Ecclesia et Pontifice.

Sir Richard Musgrave of Tourin who died in 1818, was born about the middle of the preceding century. For 25 years or more he sat as member for Lismore in the Irish Parliament and for a job at £1,200 a year sold his vote in favour of the Union. He is chiefly remembered for his very prejudiced though valuable work—"Memoirs of the different Rebellions in Ireland" (1801). He displays bitter animosity towards his Catholic fellow countrymen, going so far as to defend flogging, burning and free quarters. So outrageous were his principles that even the Irish Government of the 98 period disowned him. Yet Musgrave is described as, in private life, a well loved and amiable man.

Julia M. Croft was a novelist whose work is, perhaps, better known in America than in the land of her birth. She was born in Lismore in 1853 and educated in the Convent school there. She contributed copiously to the "American Catholic World" and the "English World" and published about two volumes of fiction—"Neighbours" and "The Lost Land." The former is a collection of twenty short stories and the latter a powerful tale of Irish peasant life (and death) of which the scene is set in Lismore (under a fictitious name). Miss Croft (she spelled her name 'Crotchie') lived much of her life in Ramsey, Isle of Man, but she rests in the burial place of her parents in Lismore.

Charles Smith, M.D., wrote the first, which is also easily our best, "History of Waterford." Surprisingly, little is known of Smith's birth, life or death. Most probably he was a native of Co. Waterford and it is certain that he practised as medical doctor or Apothecary in Lismore or Dungarvan. He took his Doctorate in Trinity College in 1738. The first edition of his "History of Waterford" is dated 1746. The "History of Cork" appeared in 1750 and "The History of Kerry" in 1755. As we know so little of Smith's life and work, so we are also quite in the dark as to his place and date of birth. A second edition of Smith's "Waterford" appeared in 1774.

Deep sorrow was expressed at the news of the death of Michael Whelan, late Two Mile Bridge and Birmingham, who died on Friday, June 2nd, at the General Hospital, after a short illness and at the comparatively early age of sixty years. The deceased was son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Daniel Whelan. He was a member of a well-known and extremely popular family who were deeply involved in the affairs of the G.A.A.

To his sorrowing brothers, sisters and relatives we express our deepest sympathy. His remains were flown into Cork Airport on Saturday and from there were removed to St. Mary's Parish Church followed by a large cortege and were blessed and received by Rev. J. Murphy, C.C. The last Mass on Sunday was offered for the repose of his soul and the interment took place in the adjoining family plot. Another large and most representative concourse were present. Rev. W. Callanan, C.C., imparted the final absolution at the graveside.

Large sheaves of Mass cards were received and some beautiful floral tributes were placed on the grave.

I.F.A. Notes

A delegation from the Irish Farmers' Association led by the President, Mr. T. J. Maher, attended a meeting of the Praesidium of COFA (the Organisation of Farmers' Unions of the EEC countries) in Brussels last week.

The IFA is the only agricultural organisation in this country to be full members of COFA and last week the Association was represented at a Brussels meeting of a working group on the problems of hill and upland areas.

Before leaving Dublin, Mr. Maher said the delegation would take the opportunity during the visit to Brussels to make further contacts with the EEC authorities to explore new thinking on measures to assist farmers in difficult areas and on regional policy generally.

He said: "We regard our membership of COFA as a vital instrument in pursuing our role as defenders of farmers' interests. This is the framework in which we shall be putting forward, at community level, proposals which will take account of the special needs of our smaller farmers."

"I would like to take this opportunity of refusing recent allegations about I.F.A.'s attitude to small farm development. It has been alleged that, now that the Referendum is over, that the I.F.A. has 'admitted' that the prospects for the small farmer are not as bright within the EEC as they had been painted before the Referendum."

"These allegations purported of having been made by people who did not read my statement properly, or indeed by people who did not read it at all, but based their comments on remarks made by someone who showed that he did not understand the points which I clearly set out in that statement or worse that he caused he himself was against Ireland joining the EEC that he is now trying to justify his stand."

"I now want to see the record straight so that farmers will not be misled by the irresponsible comments of those who are apparently unable to comprehend even the simplest statement."

"In my statement of May 28 I referred at one point to farmers who, by reason of age or ill-health just cannot undertake a farm development programme. I also referred to those who have not got the outlook or the motivation necessary even to think about development."

In respect of these particular groups, I said that it is clearly little or nothing can be done to improve their positions apart from the effect of higher EEC price levels. This does not mean that everything will be taken from them. In the future they will be better off as a result of EEC but they cannot make the maximum gains unless they put into effect a farm development plan.

"This statement referred only to these groups and not to small farmers in general, as was inferred by some commentators. I have never pretended that EEC membership in itself would make any significant difference, apart from price effects, to the small numbers of people in these groups."

"Further on in my statement, I made the following remarks: 'The basic need now is for capital assistance timed directly at the smaller farmer, to ensure that he has the basic equipment in terms of stock and buildings to allow him to embark on an expansion programme. Price increases of the kind few can expect are not enough in themselves for these farmers. The effect of the price increases must be reinforced by increases in production.'"

WHAT IS AL-ANON?

Al-Anon is a fellowship for the relatives and friends of alcoholics who are banded together to solve their common problems. Whether or not the alcoholic has found a way to sobriety, in A.A. or through other means, the families CAN do a great deal to help themselves as well as the alcoholic.

The Al-Anon purpose is threefold:—
1.—To offer comfort, hope and friendship to the families of compulsive drinkers.
2.—To learn to grow spiritually through living by the Twelve Steps adopted from Alcoholics Anonymous.
3.—To give understanding and encouragement to the alcoholic.

These purposes are achieved by membership. In a group and regular attendance at meetings; by learning that the alcoholic is sick, of an illness he cannot control, and by learning the facts about alcoholism.

It has been found that the best help for the alcoholic and for the family is to be found outside the circle of relatives, friends and neighbours. Preferably it should come from persons trained in this area of work, or from experienced members of Alcoholics Anonymous or Al-Anon. Home remedies for alcoholism are notoriously injurious and can prolong the active drinking of the alcoholic.

Al-Anon groups meet usually once a week at a decided venue. There are no fees or dues, no fuss and complete confidentiality. The meetings usually last one hour and any one can express an opinion or, if preferred, just sit and listen. After the meeting, refreshments are served and this gives new members a chance to meet the other members and air their problems. Al-Anon is non-denominational, non-sectarian, non-political.

Al-Anon help the relatives to achieve better understanding of themselves and the problems with which they have or have had to live with. In this way, the relatives can become calmer, more consistent in attitude, more tolerant, more understanding of the needs of the alcoholic, thereby contributing to the recovery of the person whom they wish to help.

An Al-Anon Group has commenced meeting weekly in Dungarvan.

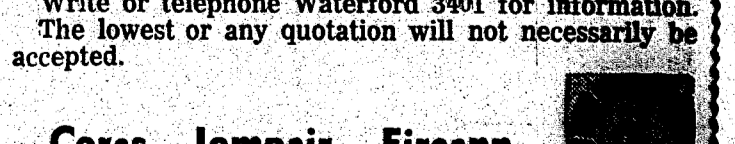
